Minister Announces Increased Grant For County Roads

The second financial allocation under the ten year restoration programme for the country's badly dilapidated county roads network was announced this week by Environment Minister, Mr. Brendan Howlin.

Co. Waterford is to receive a £450,000 £3.15m slice of this year's overall Dungarvan/Clonmel road provision for non-national roads which totals £146m, an all time record for state grants.

Waterford County Council's allocation represents an increase of 18% on last year's figure of £2.6m and comes as a badly needed cash injection during this crisis period when over £1.7m worth of damage has wrought havoc on the County roads infrastructure. The grant allocation is comprised of £1.5m for restoration improvements, £628,000 for restoration maintenance, £269,000 under the discretionary improvement grant and £255,000 for discretionary maintenance. A further £850,000 has been allocated towards EU co-financed improvement grants as follows: £150,000 for Knocklofty Bridge;

and £250,000 for the

Tramore/Waterford road. Meanwhile the 1996 allocation to Dungarvan U.D.C. remains unchanged from last year at £60,000.

Topping the table with this year's largest cash boost is Cork County Council who received a massive £13.67m while Carlow County Council were awarded the lowest allocation of £1.3m. The flood affected area of Tipperary S.R. was allocated

£3.3m while Tipperary N.R. received £3.1m. Community involvement schemes, whereby County Councils and local communities cooperate to carry out works on local roads will continue to be developed and actively encouraged by Minister Howlin during the year.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

I am a farmer. I was born in 1938. My wife is some years younger than myself. I pay into the Class "S" PRSI scheme for the self employed. Recently I've heard that some farmers will get more "back out of the scheme" because they manage their PRSI contribution differently. Is this so?

ANSWER

Presuming that your wife and yourself have no substantial occupations outside of farming and presuming that the farm is generating an income of at least £5,000 per annum net then how you manage your PRSI liability will affect your pension eligibility. If the PRSI is paid solely in your name then in due course you will get to claim a Contributory Pension in your own right and an extra amount for your wife as your Adult Dependent at current rates a total of £72.80 + £48.10 = £120.90.

However if your wife shares with you the work of the farm and you make your returns in both your names (you each have a Revenue & Social Insurance - RSI Number), then you'll both qualify for a full Contributory Old Age Pension of £72.80 + £72.80 = £145, when you each reach 66 years. This will not be possible if all the farm PRSI was paid in your name only but it will be possible if the farm PRSI was paid in joint names since at least the April before the younger spouse reached 56. So the management of your PRSI liability can make a difference.

May we make an appeal through your columns in order that Ireland's very first medically equipped and medically crewed Air Ambulance can begin accident and emergency services this year?

Ireland is in fact the only country in the European Union which does not have a real Air Ambulance for Accident and Emergency Service. The Air Corps mainly provide what we call inter-hospital transfers only.

Most Air Ambulance Services in Europe are not government funded. Most are charitably funded or sponsored. All ten Air Ambu-

are charitably funded - so it can be done.

This service now needs well motivated voluntary area directors to help to organise fund raising events, people and appear on local radio to discuss the service and its needs.

Those ladies and gentlemen who wish to help should have commitment and real ability.

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Junior Encyclopaedia

WOODPECKER

There are over 200 species of Woodpeckers in the world. Most of them usually make nesting holes in trees each year, but this is not the only cause of the tapping you can hear in the woods.

When woodpeckers want to attract a mate or to warn off other birds, he taps his bill on hollow branches.

When woodpeckers hammer at trees, they do not hurt themselves because their heads and neck are specially adapted to take the shock.

The woodpeckers toes in most cases are unusual — they have

two toes pointing forward and two pointing back on each foot. This enables them to climb easily and cling on to tree trunks.

The woodpeckers nails are strong and this helps them to stay upright when clinging to a tree.

In the breeding season woodpeckers make holes in the trunks of trees. The male and female take turns in doing this — or they might just make a hole that is already there, bigger.

The chippings from the hollowed out tree fall into the hole and some of these form the lining of the nest.

The eggs take about twelve

days to hatch and when the chicks are born they are blind at first. When the parents want to feed the chicks they hang upside down in the hole. They feed them by sticking their bill right down the chicks throats.

When the chicks are older they will come up to the hole to be fed. After about a month or two the chicks leave the nest and do not return.

Woodpeckers have long tongues which go right back into their heads and not down their throats. When they are hammering wood they use their long tongues to catch insects and grubs.

BIRDS OF PREY GO FEET FIRST

We wouldn't have a leg to stand on if we didn't have feet. How else would we walk, run, climb or even ride a bike?

But birds of prey would starve without their feet because contrary to what one might expect, most birds of prey don't use their bills to kill, but their feet, says Cathy Kilpatrick, author of books on the subject.

Hawks and eagles have very powerful feet with extremely strong grasps.

A large eagle has enough strength in its feet to kill a small deer or monkey in a few moments.

Each foot has four toes, ending in long, curved claws.
Three toes point forwards and are used to grasp a victim.
The other rear-facing toe is thrust into the victim's body like a sharp dagger.

The sparrowhawk has a long, slender middle toe to help catch prey while in flight.

The osprey is the most prevalent bird of prey.

It has two backward-pointing toes instead of one. These enable it to catch and carry slippery fish — its sole diet.

SEARCH

A hunting osprey in search of food will circle about 30 to 50 metres above the water.

When it spots a fish, it will check its flight, hover for a moment, then pounce head-first into the water

At the last moment, the osprey throws its feet forward in front of its head so it can grab the fish with its claws.

Osprey carry fish head-fist, with one foot gripping behind the other. The toes are positioned two on each side of the fish for a firm grip.

The soles and sides of the toes are covered with tiny sharp spikes called spicules. These prevent the fish slipping out of the osprey's grasp.

ACTION

Sometimes the stabbing and crushing action of feet and claws does not kill a victim immediately.

But a hawk will finish its prev off with a death bits at the

But a hawk will finish its prey off with a death bite at the base of the skull.

Any bones feathers or fur swallowed and not digested are brought up in the form of pellets.

These can be collected and studied. By "reading" them, you can tell what a bird had eaten.

Tallow Celebrates As Mick Is New Irish Manager



VICTIMISING SMALL HERD OWNERS

The United Farmers Association had deplored the proposed partial privatisation of the TB Scheme. In opting for privatisation of the annual round test Minister Yates is allowing himself to be used as a tool of the large farmer lobby and in the process is victimising small herd owners.

As well as increasing costs on those less able to pay the partial privatisation will inevitably increase the incidence of bovine TB in a national context. It only takes one rotten apple to destroy a whole barrel. Past experience in areas such as control of warbles, brucellosis and sheep scab should have been taken into account.

If the current proposals are put into place control of TB will go haywire within a short time and the next Minister for Agriculture will be forced to introduce a severe testing regime, with farmers once again carrying the can for policies of expediency. The health status of our national herd is too important for any Minister to play games with it.

UFA calls for a proper legal scheme under the provisions of the 1966 Diseases of Animals Act including:-

Full replacement value for reactors; Compensation for consequential loss; Annual round test to be paid for by the Department of Agriculture; and Annual test should cover any export certs required within the period.

WORRYING OF LIVESTOCK BY DOGS

South Tipperary/North West Waterford Dail Deputy Theresa Ahearn has expressed concern over the continuing problem caused by attacks on farm livestock, particularly sheep by marauding dogs.

Each year particularly at lambing time, dogs are allowed to run free causing serious menace to sheep. "Even the unsuspected family pet loose in the countryside can cause great distress to sheep and lambs. Uncontrolled dogs can decimate a flock and there have been reports already of killings by dogs".

Dog owners are reminded that stiff penalties are provided under the law for negligent dog owners, pointing out that they are liable for damage and costs in a civil action and that the dogs may be shot by the owner of the

animals subjected to attack. "In conclusion to the cruelty and distress suffered by livestock, the financial losses to farmers can be very considerable but can be prevented by responsible dog owners." Deputy Ahearn appealed to all dog owners, particularly those living near farmland to ensure that their dogs are kept under control at all times, especially at night, so that the suffering and death caused to sheep

and lamb flocks can be avoided.

Eight Weeks Waiting For Local **Driving Test**

Deputy Brendan Kenneally recently raised a question in the Dail asking the Minister for the Environment the current waiting period for driving tests at each driving centre throughout the country.

Minister Howlin confirmed that the waiting period for Dungarvan is 8 weeks, while in Waterford it is 13 weeks. The national average is 14.4 while the longest waiting period is experienced in Tralee where applicants have to wait for 22 weeks.

The waiting periods stated are the longest which apply at these centres. He stated, "many applicants, however, in particular those who indicate a need for an early test for reasons such as employment or travel abroad, are tested more quickly. Last month, for example, 52% of those who applied for an early test were tested within 5 weeks and all such applicants were tested within 8 weeks of applying.

Waiting periods are longer in winter because the hours available for testing reduce due to early darkness. Testing output will increase significantly, and waiting times should be reduced from end February onwards, with the onset of brighter evenings. In order to accelerate and consolidate the reduction in waiting times, I arranged for the recruitment and training of seven additional testers last year. These additional testers are now operational and should make a significant contribution to reducing the arrears over the coming months.

TILLAGE: Malting Barley

Tillage farmers' confidence got a welcome boost from the very satisfactory harvest in 1995. Market prospects for grain, particularly malting barley are very good for 1996, however, good results are, as always, dependent on achieving respectable yields.

Within cereals, malting barley is the one crop that is going through a change of image and has a bright outlook for the next few years, according to Jerry Mc-Carthy, Teagasc Crop Specialist who spoke at the recent tillage seminar at the Teagasc Centre, Dungarvan. There are a number of reasons for the change of fortune. The demand for malt, which was in the doldrums for a number of years, has improved. The new malting variety, Cooper has the yield potential and standing power that is even better than good feed vari-

Margin: A gross margin of £255 for a 2.5 tonne/acre crop is the highest projected margin of all the cereals. In calculating this margin a price of £115 per tonne was used which is £20 per tonne over a projected feed price. With those prospects for malting barley, the crops should be considered by any tillage farmer who has suitable land and who is prepared to implement a husbandry package to give the crop every opportunity of

producing quality grain.

Quality: According to Jerry McCarthy, there are four critical factors that influence quality, these factors also interact with each other. The first crucial decision is site selection. For quality malting barley, choose a medium soil, that is at least three years from grass. Early sowing in good conditions will almost 'guarantee' low protein, low screenings, high K.P.F. and good yields. Nitrogen application will depend on rotation and sowing date. For February/early March sowing and where the crop is grown out in the rotation, up to 95 units/acre can be applied. For late March/early April sowing, reduce this by 10 to 15 units/acre. Where top dressing is required, as it will in most situations, it should be applied by the three leaf stage. Treat the other husbandry requirements with the efficiency needed to maximise yields from feed bar-

FÉEDING EWES

Twin lamb disease is just another name for starvation. It usually occurs not because the feed is not purchased or offered but because for some reason individual ewes do not get their daily requirement. Feeding management is as important as feeding levels during the last month of pregnancy. Any of the following conditions can lead to ewe deaths due to starvation in apparently well-fed

1. Insufficient Feeding Space: Every ewe in a pen needs 18" of trough space at meal feeding time. Add another 2" where troughs meet at right angles. It might not bother you too much if one or two ewes fail to reach the trough for their ration, but there are too many reasons why it should - (a) It will often be the same couple of ewes every time and (b) Just one days feed missed can be crucial for ewes on the edge.

2. Water: Ewes eating large amounts of concentrates have a big thirst. Absence of clean, fresh water will depress appetite and cause digestive problems. Break ice

during periods of frost.

3. Lameness: Ewes suffering from footrot, food abscesses or any other source of lameness will not compete at the trough. Remove them to a hospital pen, or turn them out to grass - consult your vet about antibiotic therapy

4. Bad Feeding Routines: Feed at regular hours each day. When feeding level exceeds 1 lb. daily, split into two feeds - morning and evening. Do not change rations

or ingredients abruptly. Properly fed ewes, produce strong healthy lambs and milk enough to rear them. Most farmers spend enough

money on feeds to achieve these desirable ends.

FEEDING DAIRY COWS

Dry cows should be fed so that they calve in good con-5000 condition at calving means that there is around 50 kg, fat that will be converted into milk after calving. This will allow the early cow to lose about 0.5 kg. a day in lactation and produce slightly over 0.5 gallons extra milk from this fat. Cows that are thinner at calving rarely reach the same peak yield. Most farmers set out to achieve fairly good condition at calving, but there is a variation in most herds, with up to a quarter of the cows being on the thin side. Modern housing does allow farmers to give a bit of extra to the thinner cows and last year's heifers, if they wish to do it. Similarly, in modern housing, it is easy to restrict those that are in danger of getting too fat. A levelling of conditions is a small factor of efficiency, but it will be worth it and should result in less problems later on, such as milk fever and repeating to the bull. Fat cows should be restricted a little on good quality silage.

FINAL LOTTERY PROGRAMME FOR U.S. VISAS ?

Information has just arrived at the Dungarvan Youth Resource Centre, St. Augustine's Street, Dungarvan of the new round of visas for the U.S.A. which are about to be allocated in what could be the final lottery programme. The DV-97 visas are available to people born in Ireland and Northern Ireland (not Britain) and there are only 1,200 visas on offer.

In order to qualify you must:

1. Be born in Ireland or Northern Ireland; 2. Have a pass Leaving Certificate or two years work experience within the past five years in an occupation requiring at least two years training or experience; 3. Enter your application between February 12th and March 12th 1996 (no sooner or later). There is no special application form. Simply provide the following information on plain sheet of paper, typed or clearly printed:

1. Your surname underlined and then your first two names; 2. Your date of birth - day, month, year; 3. Place of birth - city/town, county, country; 4. Your current address - (telephone number optional but useful); 5. Native country if different from country of birth; 6. Your signature. You must also submit a passport photograph with your name printed on the back.

The envelope must be a business sized envelope with Ireland printed in the top left corner with your full name and address underneath.

The address to send applications to is:

DV-97 Program, National Visa Centre, Portsmouth, NH 00212, U.S.A.

The Youth Information Centre also has full details of requirements if your spouse and children need to be included on the application if you were born in another country. The Centre is offering to type up applications and envelopes for £1 but any information on the visas is free. The Centre also warns people to beware of advertisement offering to guarantee green cards for ex-

IFA Welcomes Social Welfare For REPS **Farmers**

Chairman of Waterford IFA Western Development Committee, Michael Walsh, has welcomed the announcement by the Government that the first £2,000 of REPS income will be exempt from the Social Welfare income assessment for farmers. "This move is a step in the right direction and should also be extended to assessment for medical cards," said the IFA man.

Mr. Walsh said however that IFA will be seeking clarification from the Department of Agriculture as to whether costs associated with participating in REPS can also be written off in the assessment procedure. It is estimated that up to 10,000 farmers stand to gain from this concession if they take part in REPS.

The Waterford IFA Western spokesman said that this concession should now improve to up-take of REPS particularly in western counties where there has been a very low up-take primarily due to the fear of farmers of loss of Social Welfare and other benefits. IFA will be meeting the Department of Social Welfare within the next couple of weeks to clarify all of the aspects associated with this important concession.





His outstanding goalkeeping played and was richly rewarded. He won Munster Championship and All-Ireland medals with Clare and with his club, Sixmilebridge. He earned a coveted Munster club medal and is now awaiting the All-Ireland club semi-final where his chances of another major hurling souvenir must be good. Munster selected David in goal for the inter-provincial series and hurling's stamp of excellence was firmly imprinted on this small man with a big heart when his contemporaries all over the country chose him as Ireland's best goalie, All Star Goalie of 1995. David was a worthy recipient of all of those honours and deserved to be numbered among the game's elite.

But even David had a Homeric nod which was visible to the whole hurling world on hurling's biggest day - the All-Ireland Final. Television's all-seeing eye recorded the incident from two different angles so it was well publicised: Offaly's first half goal at the canal end. That score probably looked soft given that it wasn't hit powerfully from close range and that the goalie had clear sight of the ball the whole time. What made it a dangerous difficult shot for David Fitzgerald was that the scorer, Michael Duignan struck it from his backhand or left side. Every ball struck by a right handed player from his left, his backhand side, or indeed by a left handed hurler from his right (his backhand side) has spin on it and sometimes quite a bit of slice. This backspin is a goalie's nightmare because its trajectory is difficult to gauge and the spin causes it to dip suddenly as it nears its target.

Inis backspin used constantly in tennis and golf is part and parcel of the John Fenton type sideline cut. It results from hitting down on the back of the ball and through it, an action in tennis and golf and hurling which causes the ball to loft and sets it spinning backwards on its way forward. Many goalies have been the recipients of an unwelcome surprise by the vagaries in flight of this type of shot. I remember a Junior Hurling County Final in 1981 when Tallow faced Roanmore, a powerful Junior combination destined to bearide the Se-

The only way to deal with any ball coming at chest height or higher is with the hand. A very worthwhile practice routine for a goalie would have two players positioned in the fourteen vard line in front of him, pulling in the air as a high ball drops into the square or perhaps running across in front of him as the sliotar drops. If he can concentrate in training or focussing all of his attention on the airborne ball while being distracted by the clamour of clashing hurleys and moving feet in front of him, he should be quite capable of coping with similar situations in matches. As a rule it is not fear which causes the goalie to drop a catch but failure to concentrate. Mistakes are an inherent part of the enduring appeal of games. They add to the thrills and heighten the excitement and provide proof that even the great performers (and don't forget Packie Bonner) are prone to



Fresh From The Garden

'Spuds' fresh from the garden in early summer are a cheery thought as we face the bleakness of Febru-

Ideally, to think about a crop you need to have been conscientious about your winter digging and ensured that some well-rotted compost was worked into the would-be vegetable patch.

However, all is not lost if you belatedly give the ground a vigorous turning to the depth of a spade and mix in a good helping of compost.

What is more critical than the timing of your digging is choosing a lime-free location - apart from that, potatoes tolerate most soil types.

Then buy the seed potato tubers: Duke of York and Home Guard are hardy and tasty varieties suitable for an early harvest. Make sure the stock you buy is guaranteed disease-free.

TUBERS

Stand the tubers with the eyes pointing upwards in wooden seed boxes or cardboard egg trays in a cool yet frost-free location, which is also light and well ventilated - a greenhouse or conservatory will

They will sprout soon afterwards and can be planted out in March, about 4-5 inches deep and a foot apart in the case of early varieties these guidelines should be increased by about a



third for later and heavier cropping varieties such as Majestic and King Edwards.

Advice on how you plant tends to be more varied: most people like to hoe a trench while others swear by trowelling each tuber into its chosen location.

FROST

Once planted, early tubers need frost protection using straw or shredded newspaper spread around the shoots.

As those shoots develop, you must then mound or 'earth up' soil to protect them and the side shoots. This will produce and condition the new tubers for harvesting.

Unfortunately, this practice also makes it difficult to hoe around the plants without damaging the new roots and tubers.

As a result, efficient hand weeding and mulching preferably with straw — is vital. Apart from starving marauding weeds of light, mulching will also help keep moisture in the soil.

Don't feel bad about being impatient to harvest the first small tubers — that's when they taste best and are easiest to prepare and cook.

There should be plenty more to come too, providing you harvest the early growth carefully and gently mound the soil around the plants again.

You should not, however, harvest later varieties such as Majestic in the same way - you will simply reduce the harvest for late summer.

Once lifted, these are then dried for a few hours before careful storage for the months to come.

KE-UP **BASICS**

Eve Make-up

Eye shadows come in many different types of colour and texture, such as powders, creams and pencils. The most popular, however, is the pressed powder type. The colour should be chosen to match your eye colour or your clothes. The choice of colour should be based on what is attractive on a person more so than what is in fashion

To apply eyeshadow use a brush or sponge tipped applicator. Apply a light colour from the base of the eyelid up to the crease line of the eyelid. In the crease of the lid a darker colour should be applied and blended to

add depth to the eye. Directly under the brow a highlighter such as ivory or white should be used. This again should be blended so there are no harsh lines and the eyeshadow gives a rainbow appearance.

Eyeliners come in cake and pencil forms, the most popular being pencil form. A variety of colours are available but the ones most commonly used are soft brown and black. To apply eyeliner draw a fine line as close to the base of the eyelashes as possible. Coming towards the edge of the eyelid, lift the line slightly. When lining the bottom lid keep the line as close to the lash growth as possible. Excess liner should be cleaned off with a cotton bud tip.

Mascara is used to make the lashes look thicker, darker and longer. If the lashes are darker they make the eyes look bigger. The most popular type of mascara is the brush on liquid form. A thin coat of mascara should be applied to the lashes and allowed to dry. If desired, more mascara can be applied to give a darker appearance. Once the lashes are dry they should be brushed with a clean mascara wand. Tips

1. Blend eyeshadow well to give a rainbow effect on the eves.

2. Always smudge your eyeliner and don't have any harsh lines.

3. Mascara should be applied in thin layers to give a darker, thicker effect.

Menus for the week

Vegetarian Lasagne

Preparation: 25 minutes Cooking: 1 hour 15 minutes Serves: 4

1 tbsp olive oil 2 onions, peeled and cut into wedges 1 garlic clove, peeled and crushed

2 tbsp tomato purée 1 (400g/14oz) can chopped tomatoes

1 tsp sugar 1 tbsp fresh thyme leaves ·1 (400g/14oz) can artichoke hearts, drained and quartered 25g/1oz butter 2 tbsp plain flour

300ml//2pt milk 175g/6oz vegetarian mature Cheddar cheese, grated pinch of grated nutmeg

4-6 sheets no-cook lasagne verdi thyme sprigs to garnish

Preheat oven 200°C/400°F/Gas Mark 6. Heat oil in a frying pan. Add onion and garlic; cook for 3-4 minutes until soft and golden. Stir in tomato purée, canned tomatoes, sugar and thyme leaves. Bring to the boil, reduce heat and simmer for 10 minutes. Add artichoke hearts and cook for a further 5 minutes.

 Meanwhile, make the cheese sauce. Melt the butter in a pan, beat in flour and cook for 1 minute. Away from the heat, gradually mix in the milk. Return to the heat, gently bring to the boil and cook for 5 minutes, stirring constantly, until thickened. Away from the heat, stir in 100g/4oz of the cheese, add the nutmeg and season to taste.

• To assemble, spoon 3-4 tbsp of the cheese sauce over the base of an 1.7 litre/3pt ovenproof dish (at least 4cm/1 /2in deep). Place half the lasagne sheets on top. Spoon over the tomato mixture then drizzle over 3-4 tbsp cheese sauce. Top with remaining lasagne and the remaining cheese sauce. Sprinkle over the remaining cheese.

Place on a baking sheet

and cook in the preheated oven for 40-45 minutes until golden bubbling. Garnish with sprigs of fresh thyme and serve with salad.

Coconut Fruit Merinaues

Preparation: 35 minutes Cooking: 2 hours 15 minutes Serves: 8

For The Meringue: 3 egg whites 175g (6oz) caster sugar 50g (2oz) dessicated coconut For The Filling:

1 ripe mango 1 ripe papaya rind and juice of 1 lime 225g (8oz) creme fraiche 150ml ('/4pt) milk

15ml (1 tbsp) cornflour 2 egg yolks 25g (loz) caster sugar 15ml (1 tbsp) Malibu coconut liqueur (optional) mint leaves, to decorate

Preheat oven 140°C/275°F/Gas Mark 1. Line two baking sheets. · Whisk egg whites until they form soft peaks. Add sugar a spoonful at a time, whisking after each addition, until the mixture is thick and glossy. Carefully fold in the dessicated coconut. Spoon the meringue into a piping bag fitted with a large, star nozzle and pipe the meringue into 8 x 7.5cm (3") rounds on the sheets. Then pipe a border around each to make the nest.

 Bake the meringues for 2 hours, or until they are dry and crisp. · Turn off oven and

leave meringues to cool with the oven door open a little.

 Peel mango and papaya thinly. Cut into cubes and toss together with the lime rind and juice. Leave to marinate.

 Heat the creme fraiche and milk together in a pan until almost boiling.

 Meanwhile, whisk the cornflour, egg yolks and sugar together in a bowl until frothy. Pour the hot liquid over, stir well, then return to the rinsed-out pan.

· Heat gently, stirring, until custard thickens. Pour into a shallow bowl, cover and cool. Stir in Malibu if using. • To serve, spoon some of the fruit into each meringue shell, then top with a little of the custard and garnish with mint. Serve the

A. A common and major complication of diabetes is what is known as proliferative retinopathy. New blood vessels start to develop on the retina, causing a risk of bleeding into the eye and possible retinal detachment. A laser is used to destroy these proliferating blood vessels and so reduce the chances of visual complications. The procedure can be done quite easily on an outpatient basis and is usually only slightly uncomfortable but not painful. There can be a little loss of peripheral vision with this technique, but this is not normally very trou-

blesome.

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

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



"Pitches will be a major problem for the league as the clubs with schoolboy teams all have Junior teams with all teams usually play-ing on the same field. This can cause clubs huge problems especially during the very bad weather. This problem will have to be overcome and the League Committee will be putting some ideas on this at the next meeting.

Promoting the game is another area where the Committee are looking at," continued Hartnett. "While one might think that with new clubs and teams entering the League, the League does not need promotion. Again we have some ideas which would benefit all players over a period of time. Add in finance and age groups and we could be in for a busy summer," concluded Hartnett.

Referee Shortage A

Chairman of the Red House League referees, Jim Foley who some short months ago felt that the refereeing situation was almost solved now feels that we may be back to square one. "It's back to the drawing board," stated Jim. I felt that we were coming to grips with the shortage of referees but now with the introduction of a Third Division and new teams, we are back to looking for

more people to take up the whistle.

After our last referees course, we did get some new referees. We will now hold another course during the summer. Hopefully we will get a good response, otherwise we will have major problems come the start of next season. Anyone interested in taking up the whistle next season can give their names to Jim Foley at the next meeting.

He was both the Munster and All-Ireland Junior Indoor 5k, the latter in another record of 21 minutes 53 seconds. One of his best races came in February when at only 17 years of age, he won the National Senior Indoor 5k in a new junior record of 21 minutes 12 seconds.

On the outdoor scene, the Ring/Old Parish clubman started with a Munster Junior 5k win representing his adult club West Waterford A.C. As early as May he qualified for the European Junior Championship, walking 10k in 44 minutes 28 seconds, a full 17 seconds inside the required time.

Further titles came Jamie's way in the East Munster, Munster and All-Ireland schools, the latter in a 3k record of 12 minutes 32 seconds. 

First Meeting Of Western Board

The first meeting of the Divisional Board for 1996 will take place at Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan on tonight (Wednesday) at 7.30.

The meeting will deal with affiliations, transfers, regradings and declarations. The regradings will as before, be confined to seven per club as unfortunately the motion to have this amended was defeated at the convention.

A Divisional Disciplinary Committee will also be elected at this meeting. The outgoing members are Denis McGrath, Tom Drummy, Tomas O Cadhla, Eddie Cunningham and Tom Browne.

Tom Browne. In the Secretary's notification to clubs, he outlined the different payments that must be handed in at this meeting and the figures give a fair idea of the enormous cost of keeping the show on the road these days. The insurance at £100 per team will mean that some clubs must fork out eight or nine hundred alone for this item. Then there is the fee for playing in the Championships (£10 for each adult team and £4 for minors), £100 each for coaching in hurling and a further £100 for football. Additionally this year there is a £10 levy for the Famine Commemoration. Before this, clubs will have paid on average £400 for public liability insurance. The majority of clubs will get a little change out of a £1,500 cheque for the year. Of course this money is not retained by the Board, who have to rely on gate receipts and sponsorship to stay in front with their finances each year. All the administrative business relating to club matters will be disposed of tonight and any club or individual who overlooks doing something will certainly not be accommodated on the next night which is Friday week when

Due to unforeseen circumstances next Saturday's minor football trials have had to be cancelled. All players will be notified re the new arrangements in due course.

CHAMPIONSHIP FORMAT

It's the burning question of the moment and while it must be left to the County Board to hammer out an acceptable formula for the competitions under their control, the Divisional Boards are at liberty to plan their championship in whatever way they wish. Almost invariably they follow the Senior Board and do as they do. At this point no one is prepared to say with any confidence, what system will be adopted when the County Board holds its first meeting of the year in about two weeks time. The chances of the championship going back to the knock-out system would appear to be pretty slim, even though I have heard it proposed time and time again during the year. It does seem that we will end with a league style championship again but with some changes or modifications.



A lot of people who are prepared to fight for the retention of the league and argue very strongly against the knock-out thing, did an awful lot of talking at the Convention about the importance of the knock-out championship and the folly of giving teams a second chance. No one is denying anyone the right to argue for what they believe is right, but also we have a right to expect a bit of consistency. The majority of clubs will vote against the knock-out simply because if they are beaten in their first match they are out for this. But someone has to accept the blame for adopting a system whereby a club could conceivably lose four games and still come back and become County Champions. To me, that is silly in the extreme. That situation would not be possible if we had a championship comprised of a group of teams all of whom would have a realistic chance of winning the

Everyone knows that by present standards about half the teams in both the hurling and football County Cham-

snowball's chance in hell of winning. In fact if some of the teams which I have in mind did win the Championship, I believe that it would spell disaster for the County teams. This will surely sound offensive to some clubs but it is time that we came back to live in the real world and face the facts as we find them. The recent motion submitted by Dungarvan seemed to be a step in the right direction. The introduction of a 'B' grade Senior football Championship which would leave us with two different championships of eight teams. There would have been no connection between the competitions and each would be treated as a championship in its own right. The eight weaker teams would be in the lower grade ('B') where they belong anyway. The same idea would do a lot of good in Senior hurling also.

This is gone by the board now because Dungarvan allowed themselves to be talked into withdrawing the motion. This brings us back to square one in search of the ideal system - one that will allow clubs to play in a grade to which they are most suited and one that will give many matches and a fair chance of winning a

Ring club have submitted what looked to be a very good blueprint for the Senior football and hurling Championships but after a qualifying competition involving the usual sixteen teams, the losing eight which would play in the Sargent and Phelan Cup competitions but would not play in the championship. This would be fine if the losing eight in hurling and football were permitted to play in the County Intermediate Championships. I understand that Mount Sion have also come up with a very interesting proposal for Senior hurling. This would separate the strong from the weak and it has a built-in clause which will reduce the number of Senior and increase the number of Intermediate teams over a few

Declan Barron, Ardmore has a very comprehensive proposal involving league and championship and if this was made work, it might be the ideal solution. Also we have the proposal from Seamus Aylward which is working satisfacto-

rily in another County.

My solution would be to reduce the group of Senior teams from sixteen to twelve in both hurling and football and allow the relegated teams to play in the Intermediate Championships.

My alternative would be to adopt the Lismore submission of a few years ago and play both championships in groups of four. If all these proposals are discussed at County Board when they next meet, the end result will likely see us carrying on with the same old system of sixteen in each.

If we do not experiment then we will not change. We do need change. In our present financial situation the league style championship slightly curtailed, may be the one to go for.



EASTERN BOARD MEETING

The Eastern Board were due to meet last night (Tuesday) to set themselves up for the year and as they have but one meeting, it means that by now they are ready to go. Rumours that a number of Ballydurn's top players including Peter Queally and Michael Hubbard were transferring to Kill are believed to be unfounded but some players from the club were applying to transfer to other clubs in the east.

thorities to undertake a substantially increased volume of work on county roads this year. He believes that the special ten year plan will result in 'real progress being made in 1996' to restore regional and county roads to what he termed an acceptable standard. In connection with the programme, the government plans to introduce a package of measures to ensure maximum value for money and

outputs. In particular, these measures, he said will ensure that the ten year programme will be focused on works related to the road pavement. County Councils will be required to prepare multi-annual road works programmes setting out the projects they propose to carry out for the first five years of the programmes. A third part of the new package will involve the undertaking of an independent study to establish the extent of deficiencies in the network and an independent audit will be undertaken of County Council functions in the roads area with a view to maximising efficiency.

Minister Howlin said he believed these measures to be a substantial response to deal with the long identified problems of regional and county roads. The additional £60m in state funding provided in 1995 and 1996 for the restoration programme, has got the ten year programme off to a very satisfactory start, he

NOT ENOUGH

Chairman of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Oliver Coffey was present in Dublin last Monday for the Minister's announcement of the grant allocations. While welcoming the £3.1m as an extra boost to the Council's finances, Cllr. Coffey said this year's figure was only £485,000 up on last year. "This amount is nowhere near enough to repair the damage caused last month," he declared. The Council Chairman said he was disappointed that the Department didn't take into account the amount of damage caused by severe flooding and bad weather, which has left the Council with a £1.7m repair bill.

Compared to other counties of the same size, Cllr. Coffey felt that Waterford is still "way down in the league table." No doubt this most recent allocation will be discussed at length by members at next Monday's Waterford County Council meeting. Howev-er it seems the Minister has given his final say on

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
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
