New Garda Superintendent For Dungarvan

Last Thursday saw the arrival of a new Superintendent for the Dungarvan Garda District.

Catherine Clancy, a native of Donegal, takes up the post of Dungarvan Garda Superintendent from Supt. Pat Quinn who returns to Dublin after eight months of service in the town. One of only two female Superintendents in Ireland, Supt. Clancy comes from the Community Relations Section at Harcourt Square, Dublin.

During her successful career with the Garda Siochana, Supt. Clancy worked for six months on a United Nations peace-keeping mission in Cambodia. As part of the U.N. Transitional Authority Cambodia (U.N.T.A.C.), Supt. Clancy was involved in augmenting local police forces in the run up to elections.

She started her career at Pearse Street Garda Station in 1975/'76 and later transferred in 1979 to Divisional Headquarters which were open to female members. Supt. Clancy was subsequently transferred to Naas Garda Station where she spent 12 months. In 1980 **CONTINUED ON PAGE 5**

Demise Of Lismore Music Festival As

Plans for the continuation of the Annual Lismore Festival of Early Music came to a sudden, unexpected end last Monday week with the surprise resignation of Festival Director, Mary Ryan.

News of the Festival's loss to the heritage town has been greeted with shock and disappointment by local inhabitants who have benefitfestival's financial spin-offs over the past three years.

The Festival started on a small scale in 1993 and promised to develop into a major cultural event. The brainchild of Dutch born musical director, Jan Van Putten, on its inaugural year, the musical fete attracted almost 4,000 people. Last year's Festival attracted an Arts Council grant and two new major sponsors, Guinness and Waterford Crystal.

INTERNAL DIFFICULTIES

The first major blow to the stability of the Early Music Festival came last July in the form of two shock resignations from the Festival's organising committee. Instigator and musical director. Mr. Van Putten together with his wife, journalist,

Maureen Fox, who acted as ed greatly from the Festival Press Officer, both resigned from the committee because of what they described as "tensions within the group."

In the wake of these resignations, Festival Director, Mary Ryan stated that "those of us that are remaining will strive even harder to ensure that next year's event is just as successful as the three previous ones. Sadly the above hopes did not come true for the Festival, which has now reached the end of the proverbial road. Despite these and other assurances at the time that the Festival would continue to go from strength to strength, its demise was confirmed at a recent meeting presided over by the Chairperson, Mrs. Ryan.

Know Your Rights

QUESTION

I am married with four children on long term UA £152.80. If I find work work will the Budget changes help me.

ANSWER

From June, if you find work (that will last 4 weeks or more) you will retain the child dependent portion of your Social Welfare payment (in your case £52.80) for 13 weeks. You will also retain the Medical Card for 3 years.

If you work 19 hours or more (including job sharing) and you would get more on Family Income Supplement then you can apply for FIS if the job is for 13 weeks or more.

You should call into your Citizens Information Centre to find out other Budget developments (that will be coming into force during the year), that may be of benefit and interest to you.

A deputation of the Waterford County Executive of the United Farmers Association (UFA) met with members of Waterford County Council at their February meeting to discuss the disadvantages of blanket afforestation and to request the Council to maintain rural roads.

"(1) That planning permission be mandatory for all tree plantations of one acre

PRO and former president or more. Blanket afforestaof the UFA, Paddy Phelan tion has a major detrimental effect on the environment. Adjoining lands on the west-Chairman of the Waterford ern and northern sides of any plantation receive much reduced amount of direct sunlight. In winter this can mean persistent frost, with no thaw, for weeks on end. In summer it means reduced crop quality and poor harvesting conditions.

> "Living conditions of local inhabitants who are surround

ed by trees change drastically. Their view of the countryside and of their neighbours can be shut out as well as their view of the sun. There is evidence that increased pollen count can adversely affect asthma sufferers.

"We in UFA feel that agriculture should take precedence over afforestation for all land that becomes available. Many small farmers need extra land to survive and those small farmers have always been the bedrock of the economic, social and cultural life of our country.

"(2) That teams of workmen should be employed by Waterford County Council, on a full time basis, to maintain rural roads. The traditional method of cleaning water inlets by manual shovel work can never be mechanised and attempts to do so are futile, shortsighted and very expensive. It makes poor sense and worse economics to have perfect roads with tarred surface demolished by water which should be flowing at regular intervals into existing but untended inlets or gullets. It has always been an accepted principle that if you want to maintain a road of any description that you first of all divert water from it. Modern ideas, modern technology or modern machinery do not alter this fact. Given the opportunity water will

be GEONS can found worldwide except where it is very cold. These birds are rounded with short legs and soft feathers.

There are up to 300 species of pigeons and some of these are called Doves, although it means the same thing.

The majority of pi geons live on fruits and seeds and all of them can suck up water with their beaks, unlike other birds that . have to tilt their heads back to

Pigeons are kept by people for showing or for racing. Domestic pigeons all developed from the wild Rock Dove. This bird lives on ledges and cliffs. The female is responsible for building the nest and she does this by making a shallow twig nest in

a dark cave. As I have mentioned, people keep pigeons for racing - they build dovecots for them to live in.

Pigeons were used to carry messages as they nearly always find their way home. They are still bred for racing, but not used now, as much, for messages.

Show pigeons are specially bred for this reason. Their shapes can be changed so much that sometimes they cannot feed their

Wild pigeons are seen in the cities and these are called city pigeons. They come from the domestic pigeons that escaped or were released. They nest on buildings and eat what they can find or are fed in streets and parks. They can be a mixture of colours - black, grey, brown or

Wood pigeons live on farms, When the male wants to mate he puffs up the shimmery purple and green feathers on his neck. The male makes a sound (croons) and the pair nibble each other's feathers and caress. When they have done this they are ready to mate.

They build a stick nest together and the female lays two white eggs in it. To feed the chicks pigeons make a type of milk in their crop and the regurgitate this.

weekend deadline. According to Jan Van Putten, there isn't sufficient time left to save the Festival. The only one of its kind in the country, Mr. Van Putten said the demise of the Early Music Festival and the consequential economic loss to Lismore and the West Waterford region "is nothing less than a tragedy."

Admitting that he was

"deeply saddened" by the

loss of the Festival, an annual event which he had set in motion, Mr. Van Putten said its loss will cost the region many thousands of pounds.

A well publicised event, the Festival had achieved International recognition while the various musical ensembles had brought music lovers from all over Europe such as Germany and Holland to the West Waterford area.

HELP AVAILABLE

Confirming the disbandment of the organising committee, Mrs. Ryan submitted that she would be only too happy to lend whatever assistance she could if another group decided to revive the Festival. While the amount of funds "in the kitty" was very small, Mrs. Ryan said they would be happy to hand them over to any new committee that might be



Dear Sir,

The ATGWU wishes to advise that when it came to its notice in October 1995 that the Tannery site at Quay Street, Dungarvan was in the process of being sold, meetings were held with management on October 17th 1995 at which the elected representatives of our membership were in attendance.

The ATGWU 3/87 Branch has always put employment in the Dungarvan locality highest on its agenda and was bitterly disappointed in 1985 when its efforts together with interested parties to have the Dungarvan Plant purchased by a German industrialist with considerable expertise in the Tannery Industry fell through when the Receiver opted to sell the entire Irish leathers group to International Hide and Skin Ltd.

The ATGWU welcomes any help from elected local politicians, County Manager, Forbairt etc. to have this indigenous industry retained in Dungarvan and is available at all times to meet with the new management, the state agencies etc. to that effect and also to highlight the need for replacement jobs in the event of a closure.

Our members employed at Irish Tanners (Swanpool Ltd.) see themselves as the real losers as far as the "Urban Renewal Scheme" is concerned as it is the developers, the owners of the site and the Urban District Council who will be the real beneficiaries of such development works and they quite rightly see themselves as the forgotten party in this major development programme.



These objectors feel that sunlight and view are already very much compromised in the area as a result of earlier afforestation and they are angry at the prospect of being completely surrounded by trees.

A Good Time For Lawn Work

IT might be some time before the lawn needs its first mowing of the year but you should start your preparations now.

First of all, aerate the lawn by spiking with a fork. It's a good exercise on a nippy February day, but if you have a larger expanse of green, a specialist aerator or slitter might be easier and more effective.

Secondly, consider a top dressing: the cheapest and easiest is simply to make use of dried worm casts by dispersing them with a spring rake.

Surprisingly, some gardeners still regard casts as

an unsightly nuisance and an encouragement to weeds. They may even go to the lengths of applying a worm deterrent to expel what others regard as nature's best soil aerators and conditioners.



TOP DRESSING

Let the worms carry on the good work, I say, and follow-up with a top dressing of your own at the end of the month.

A typical mix would be one part sharp sand, one part peat and two parts sifted loam.

You can also use one of the many commercial mixtures which may be brushed in or dispersed using containers or gadgets supplied. However, this can be expensive and many gardeners prefer to simply recycle compost from the grow bags used to grow last year's tomato and cucumber crops!

MOVED

If you've moved into a new house or simply want to establish a new lawn then turves laid before the end of February have a good chance to put down deeper roots.

If your existing lawn has rough or bald patches or collapsed edges, this is also a good time for repair work to allow a strong restoration before summer and the inevitable shortages of moisture.

Cut out bad patches with a spade edge or turf-cutter and replace with a healthy patch from elsewhere.

If 'spares' are in short supply, edges can be repaired by lifting a square with the damaged side and rotating so that a healthy part faces outwards and the rough section can then recover away from 'the front line'

Finally, check the mower: even if you put it away carefully before winter, it is worth wiping down bare metal with oil to keep rust at bay, oiling and greasing the rotating parts and turning over the engine to discover any possible faults.

These few precautions may save much irritation when you need to use the mower sometime soon!

Chairman of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Oliver Coffey has been informed by the Minister for the Environment Brendan Howlin that the Council has been allocated 40 houses under the 1996 housing programme.

Warmly welcoming this year's allocation, Cllr. Coffey said the 40 houses will go a long way towards easing the pressure on the present housing list. "It's a big improvement from the early '90's when the Council only received 10 or 12 houses for the year", he added.

While there is still a big demand for housing in Co. Waterford, the allocations of the past three years have kept the list under control and at a manageable level, thereby shortening the length of time on the waiting list. Commenting on his Department's allocation, Minister Howlin said that the local authority housing programme has now been brought back up to a sustainable and satisfactory level from the very low levels of the late 1980's and the early 1990's. The expenditure on the programme has stabilised in 1996, he stated, following the significant rate of increase which was necessary in 1993, '94 and again last year in order to expand the programme from its previous low base.

The Minister then urged local authorities to press ahead promptly with preparatory work on their programme so as to ensure that the programme of each authority for the year is achieved.

In notifying the housing authorities of their programmes, the Environment Minister drew particular attention to the need in designing local authority houses, to provide for the security of elderly and disabled residents.

He also urged that in the context of the Village Renewal Programme, particular efforts should be made to identify infill sites for housing. As well as revitalising villages and urban centres, such housing can provide a secure environment for residents, especially those who are elderly or disabled.

Minister To Review National Salmon

Policy

Dail question raised by Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy regarding the 1989 report of the Salmon Review Body, Minister for the Marine, Sean Barrett said a new Task Force Report on salmon management will be published at the end of March.

The Minister decided last year that the national salmon policy needed to be revised and accordingly, the Salmon Management Task Force was established last October. The aim of the group is to develop practical proposals for the management of wild-salmon stocks. Any proposals put forward by the Task Force would be in line with stated policy objectives on conservation and development and would give full regard to the interest of those with legitimate rights in salmon

Responding to a recent exploitation, be they commercial or angling.

In developing these proposals, Minister Barrett asked the Task Force to consult widely with all relevant interest groups and to take account of a number of policy guidelines on salmon management.

These include, the primary goal is the conservation of wild salmon stocks; fishing for wild salmon needs to be managed on a catchment basis; the salmon regulations must make sense and be respected by the majority of the industry to be effective; a new spirit of partnership is needed with coastal communities to manage the wild salmon resources effectively, etc.

A submission by the IFO is being carefully considered by the Task Force along with over 200 other submissions to date. "The level and inten-

sity of interest reflected in the large number of submissions and views expressed," said Minister Barrett, "confirms my own belief that the time was ripe for a renewed national debate on future directions for salmon policy.

Commenting on the current Task Force, Deputy Austin Deasy pointed out that the Salmon Review Body which consisted of senior personnel from a number of departments such as Marine, Defence, Justice and Finance together with an Assistant Garda Commissioner and a Senior Officer from the Naval Service, recommended that a limited amount of monofilament net be legalised for licenced Drift Net Salmon Fisherman.

The Minister is expected to receive and publish the Task Force Report at an early date (probably end March). A full debate on the reports findings will then ensue in

The people and priests of the West Waterford Parish of Clashmore and Piltown are very happy to see the construction of the new Church in Piltown at an advanced stage.

This rural community on the border of counties Waterford and Cork undertook a major project when it was decided to go ahead and rebuild the Church of Saint Bartholomew in Piltown, Kinsalebeg.

The original church was build in 1825 when Fr. Michael O'Donnell was parish priest.

That church fell into disrepair and was demolished in 1989, and since then the old school house has been used a a place of worship, where daily Mass has continued to be celebrated.

A decision was taken to rebuild the church, and having received permission from the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, Dr. William Lee, the rebuilding started in mid-November.

The foundation stone for the new church was blessed on December 19 by Bishop

The steel structure and floors were in place for Christmas and now the walls are completed, with the roof being put on at the moment.

The main building contrac-tors are Hally and Sons Ltd., Ardfinnan, who were also the builders of the new church in Youghal.

The people of the parish can be very proud of themselves in reaching this point, building a church in rural Ireland in the nineties is a feat in itself.

The parishioners have had a large input into planning their church. They have also been very generous and supportive. At this stage a special fundraising effort is needed. A recent public meeting proposed two

schemes:
"THE CALF REARING SCHEME"

Local farmers will be asked to rear a calf to a two year old and the income from sale of same will be allocated to the Piltown Church Building Fund.

"THE BUY A SLATE SCHEME'

The second scheme is a "Buy A Slate Scheme" where people will be invited to buy slates at £10 per slate.

A graph of the roof has been drawn and will be on view at the back of Piltown Hall, where Mass is held. On this graph the slates bought will be shaded in and the buyer will receive a receipt with a section, and number of the slate. There are a total of 6,698 slates available.

On request a special certificate will be available, this will be most appropriate for people buying slates in the name of, or memory of someone else.

A novena of Masses will be said in the church when opened, for the intentions of

all the benefactors.
SUMMER OPENING

It is hoped that these two schemes will receive the support of the people of the parish and beyond. The local Clashmore/Piltown Parish Committee co-ordinated by Fr. Maurice O'Gorman P.P.

and Fr. Gerard O'Connor will make contact with people from the parish, now living away and with people who have roots here.

Speaking to the 'Dungarvan Leader', local curate Fr. O'Connor said, "if anybody wishes to contribute in any other way, we will be so grateful. Over the next few weeks people will be given an opportunity to support us in our project," he added. Rural Ireland is in decline

and it is a tribute to the people of the parish to be undertaking such a major project. The church, though modern in design, is being built on the site of the old church, and so will link the old with the new. One of its features is its dome with the Cross above.

TEAGASC Says

Milk Recording

This is a very useful management aid that is not practised by enough farmers. Very many farmers who have jars or meters have a good idea of the annual yield of their cows but they are missing out on information on milk composition and cell counts.

The cost should be looked on as an investment in the future. This is because the annual yield and milk composition of cows are often better or worse than the appearance of the cow or what the peak yield indicated.

Milk protein % is now very important, each 0.1% being worth about 1.5 p/gallon. The difference between cows within a herd is as much as 0.3% or even more in exceptional cases. This is a difference of up to £50 between the best and worst cows, due to milk protein %

Milk protein can be moved slowly upwards by breeding, it can by moved upwards much faster by milk recording and having plenty of heifers.

Daily management can be assisted by recording also. Individual cell counts are updated every month. The economics of different feeding situations have a factual base and different grassland practices can be assessed. Milk recording is more useful when there are plenty of heifers than where they are scarce. The records help at breeding time and also in decisions about culling and age of cows.

Lameness in Dairy Cows

It is important to maintain a good surface on cow roads for the sake of the cows' feet and comfort. This will reduce lameness. Some repairs will be necessary every year or two. If a farmer has succeeded in providing a smooth road for the cows, the machinery travel on it should be kept to a minimum. Silage making traffic and slurry spreading should be kept off the roadways as much as possible. Fast moving tractors and turning sharp corners into paddocks cause surface erosion, brings up sharp stones and potholes are the end result.

In summary, a good internal roadway is of fundamental importance on a dairy farm and does not get as much attention as it deserves. As milk yield goes up, cows' feet get softer and the quality of the road surface

is even more important.

Even where the road surface is satisfactory, it is good practice to spread a thin layer of sand about one metre wide in the middle of the road every spring. If the cows are not rushed to and from milking, they will use the sand strip, despite the rest of the road having a good surface. This helps to keep lameness in cows to a mini-

SUCKLER COWS

We are at the beginning of the calving season in most suckler herds and this is a crucial time when profitability can be determined for the rest of the year. Success means the turnout of a full crop of healthy calves. It is estimated that about half of all calf losses occur at birth and that nine out of ten calves that die at calving were alive at the start of calving

SUPERVISION

Around calving time, cows need regular supervision. In suckling, where the bigger continental breeds of bull are used, supervision is even more important than when the more traditional bull breeds were used in the past. Where A.I. is used, the unexpected calving date can be accurately determined but where a bull is run with cows, the expected starting date for calving may be all that is

The normal gestation length with non-Continental bulls is 280 days (i.e. nine months and nine days). Cows bred to Continental bulls carry for five to six days longer on average but it is not unusual for cows with Continental calves to carry over 290 days. Cows at full term should be seen at least three times a day.

CALVING

To help estimate calving date, watch for udder development (the teats stiffen in the 24 hours before calving), enlargement of the vulva and dropping of the pin bones. Cows on slats should be moved to calving boxes at this

It is best to have a cow in the calving box about 36 hours before calving so that she has settled in the new environment. Once the cow shows the first signs of calving, like restlessness, check every two to three

hours but do not intrude too much at this stage. Research work at Moorepark suggests that cows may be left for three to six hours and heifers for longer, once the first signs of calving appear before any intervention is required. If no progress is being made after that time only the most experienced farmers should consider handling the cow to detect simple abnormalities such as a leg down, otherwise veterinary assistance should be

Foundation - Blusher - Lipstick

EVENING make-up can be deep and bright without looking overdone. At night you can make you make-up much more imaginative to get a more glamorous

When applying your foundation it can be a little bit heavier than during the day. Using a concealer cover the circles under your eyes, the lines around your mouth and any other imperfections. For extra coverage concealer can be applied under your foundation at night.

Use a darker shade of pressed powder under your cheeks to contour the hollows of your cheeks making sure to blend the

your face at night it is a good idea to first dip your powder brush into your blusher and then into your translucent powder before applying it to the face. This gives a glow of radiance to finished make-up. Apply it to the entire face.

Apply your usual colour blusher a little heavier if necessary. For extra glow you can sweep a brighter shade of blusher tight on the crest of your cheek bone.

When applying your lipstick you can use a lighter or deeper shade than you would usually use during the day. You can match your lipstick with the colours of your clothes. When powdering If wearing a black outfit

Pastry: finely grate rind from lemon. Place flour in a bowl. Rub in the butter and vegetable fat until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs. Stir in the lemon rind and 1 tbsp (45ml) water, adding more water if necessary to make a stiff, firm dough. Lightly flour work surface. Roll out pastry and use to line a 7in (18cm) flan case. Bake blind at 400°C, 200°F, gas mark 6 for 20 mins. For filling: chop 2 oz (50g) nuts and reserve. Place the golden syrup and butter in a pan, heat gently until butter melts. Stir in the reserved chopped nuts, cornflakes and raisins. Stir in lightly beaten egg until well mixed. Spoon into the baked pastry case. Decorate with remaining 1 oz (25g) of nuts. Bake at 375°F, 190°C, gas mark5 for 20 mins, until golden. Serve hot or cold with whipped cream or custard.

Q. I have an ugly rash all over my body, which the doctor said is pityriasis rosea. He said that no treatment was necessary for this condition. I work as a waitress and my boss is not too about me happy being around customers and food. What should I do?


A. Pityriasis rosea is a mystery skin condition thought to be due to a virus, although the exact cause hasn't been identified. The rash, as you are aware, tends to be scaly and red, covering the trunk and limbs and in a 'vest and pants' design. The spots may be slightly itchy and irritating. Flu-like symptoms may precede the onset of the rash and the mains spots follow the appearance of a single large area, usually on the trunk, called the 'herald patch'. The condition clears up in a month or two without treatment as your doctor said. A cream may be used to alleviate any irritation. It is not infectious so you can work normally, as long as you adhere to accepted hygiene practices.

Q. My 14 year old daughter has a chronic illness that

medication every day. Lately she's been refusing to do this its causing conflict at home. Why is she rebelling and how can we help her? A. For an adolescent who is struggling to be independent, it is hard to have to accept instructions from parents and doctors. Your daughter probably wants to feel like the rest of her peer group. Taking medication and doctors seeing isn't By refusing, normal. she may be trying to protect herself from the stigma of being different. Try to work out areas in her life where she can have more autonomy. Stress the importance of taking the medication and then encourage your daughter to take as much responsibility as possible for her treatment, thereby letting her know trust you Sometimes parents try to over protect their ill child, which reinforces the child's fear of not becoming independent. See if you can find a selfhelp group for her illness which includes other teenagers. She might feel easier talking to them and eventually become more willing to take care of herself.

- £300; a sum which had to be forked out by Telecom Eireann on two previous occasions.

In light of this senseless vandalism to the phone kiosk, the utter thoughtlessness of perpetrators involved could have serious repercussions for residents in the area, many of whom are totally dependent on the phone booth. In cases of emergency, precious moments could be lost in searching for a non-vandalised phone. Telecom have stated that they will consider the removal of the booth should the problem re-occur. 



GETTING READY FOR ATLAN'

In just five months time, Cobh's Sonia O'Sullivan will travel to Atlanta as Ireland's best hope for winning an athletic gold medal, a feat last achieved exactly forty years ago by Ronnie Delaney in the 1500 metres at the 1956 Melbourne

Ahead of Atlanta, Sonia is presently training in the city of Delaney's famous win in Australia and despite a current injury problem, she is totally focused on the ten days from July 26th to August 4th which has quite accurately been described as the most important competition of her life and on which the success of her career will be ultimately judged.

In Australia, Sonia's coach, Kim McDonald has set up a training camp in South Yarra, a suburb of Melbourne. The weather is perfect there at present for training as it is warm and not too humid. The training group consists of eight Kenyan distance runners, the American's Bob Kennedy and Steve Holman; England's Jill Hunter and the Irish trio of O'Sullivan, Geraldine Nolan and David Matthews. The group's manager, McDonald organises the training and he likes his runners to train in warm weather at this time of year and in Australia it also means that they have longer daylight hours during the summer 'down under'.

INJURY TREATMENT

The Cobh girl's injury is progressing well though she is still not back to full running training. She is running once a day and she supplements this with aqua running, a swimming pool session for about an hour everyday. During this type of training, she wears a heart monitor to ensure she is 'running' hard enough. The rest of her training is comprised of mountain bike spins, lifting weights and hundreds of on the bike. Her leg is iced up to five times a day and fill that ambition. Let's hope she does.



this is alternated with some ultrasound treatment. Her most effective treatment is the deep massage which she receives from Gerard Hackmann, the Irish physio attached to the training camp. The massage is also the most painful treatment for her injury as it breaks down the injured tissue and helps it to heal quicker.

IMMEDIATE PLANS

For the next five months, the 1995 World 5K Champion plans to train as hard as last year and look for areas where she can develop her speed and endurance. This, she hopes, will give her more tactical options to choose from dur-* SONIA O'SULLIVAN * ing the racing season. The Cork favourite is keen to run in the World

Cross Country Championship in Cape Town, South Africa in March. Caitríona McKiernan has won the silver medal at the last four championships and an appearance by O'Sullivan would add further to the Irish interest and team strength in the race. Sonia sees the Cross Country Championship as a short term goal pointing to the Olympics and it is a quality race as it brings all the best distance runners in the world from 1500 metres to the marathon together on the one stage. She feels the Cape Town race would tell her where she stands in relation to the training completed up to March and perhaps dictate her training programme in the remaining months before Atlanta.

CHINESE CHALLENGE EXPECTED

Sonia O'Sullivan expects a renewed chinese challenge for Atlanta and she intends being ready to face it. She believes her experience in the last Olympics, where she finished fourth will stand to her. Whoever the opposition is, Sonia desperately wants to improve on that finishing position, run a better race and be ready for any sit ups. The treatment of her injury consists of contin-surprises and early challenges during the race. Waterford as well as being represented by Jimmy O'Gorman and Tommy Hennessy, had chairman P. J. Ryan, Seamus Grant, Anthony Walsh, Tony Morrissey, Denis Hanrahan and John O'Leary present at the meeting.

BREACHES OF DISCIPLINE

In one of the longest provincial secretary's report on record, Donie Nealon dealt with ever single aspect of the Association in the province and devoted a lot of space to the matter of indiscipline on the field of play in the championships. He referred in great detail to three such occasions and unfortunately Waterford and Tipperary were involved in two of these.

Writing about the Waterford and Tipperary under 21 football tie at Fraher Field, he said: "A disgraceful row broke out early in the second half in which fists and boots were used by a number of players in a most vicious fashion, resulting in three players being suspended, two for three months and the other for one month. Both counties were warned severely for the misbe-

haviour of their players." The Munster Secretary castigated the Clare County Board for the behaviour of those managing their under 21 hurling team. When Tipperary could not see their way to postpone the under 21 final, Clare informed the Council that they might not be fielding at all. He described their conduct as an exercise in brinkmanship which kept the Council, the press and the public on tenterhooks until mid-day on Wednesday, before announcing, first on Clare F.M. that they would after all, be field for the final that same evening. However the matter did not end there because in what seemed to be a well planned, deliberate maneouvre, they did not arrive in Thurles until seven minutes after the starting time of 7.30 p.m. and then did

not field until 7.40 p.m. He went on to write that the Munster Council felt most embarrassed when the referee and the Tipperary team were kept waiting for 20 minutes on the field. Immediately after the full time whistle, Clare hastened off the field and did not wait for the chairman's address or the presentation of the cup. He said that the punishment did not fit the crime when a fine of only £100 was imposed. The third and most serious breach of all for the pro-

file of the Association was the event during the second half of the Tipperary versus Waterford first round S.H. game at Pairc Ui Caoimh when literally all hell broke loose in the worst and most disgraceful row seen in years at this level in the province. Hurleys and fists were used deliberately on both sides and there was complete disregard for each others safety and if ever the name of the Association was besmirched in the eyes of the public, this was it.

He said that when it was shown later on R.T.E. News and Sports Programmes, hurling lovers everywhere felt betrayed. A total of seven players, 4 from Waterford and 3 from Tipperary were summoned before the Council and serve compensations were imposed on a total of 4 players while both County Board

were fined £500. He referred to the use of video evidence and said he had never know the Council's Activities Committee to be so fair and so painstaking in dealing with such a seri-

The Statement of Accounts showed that a massive £1,286,156 was taken in gate receipts in the province this year.

The Munster football final between Cork and Kerry accounted for £282,682 while the hurling final involving Clare and Limerick at Thurles brought in £359,447.

At Pairc Ui Caoimh the Tipperary/Limerick match brought in £182,296 and the Waterford v. Tipperary first round game had a gate of £78,651.

Dungarvan Fraher's Field was paid £1,424 in rent for Munster Council games played here last year. Also Waterford received a total of £18,800 for coaching (juvenile) expenses. In addition we got a sum of £1,780 for the purchase of juvenile hurleys.

The grants to major county grounds show a sum of £100,000 for Walsh Park and £5,000 for Fraher Field. The Convention Booklet contains a fine photograph of the new stand at Walsh Park.

The total amount in grants, etc., given to the six counties of Munster todate amounts to a massive £4,152,985.
