# Grant Aid Announced For Helvick Fishing Vessels

The Minister for the Marine, Sean Barrett, T.D., has announced grant aid of £2.6m. for the modernisation of 92 vessels in the fishing fleet around the country.

Nine boats in the Waterford region will benefit from this investment programme including three vessels based at Helvick, Ring.

This EU grant aid is being targeted at upgrading the whitefish fleet in order to enhance safety and improve the quality of fish landed. Minister Barrett believes that this level of investment will have a significant effect on the whitefish fleet, improving safety on board vessels and crew facilities. The

grant aid will also enhance fish quality and efficiency, leading to better prices and more economic operations.

The 3 Helvick vessels receiving grant aid for modernisation are: An Ainnir Ordha (£39,746). An Finin (£2,505) and Aine Caitriona (£9,563).

Four boats at Dunmore East, one in Duncannon port and one in Passage East, have also received funding.

Commenting on this latest round of fleet modernisation allocations, Minister Barrett said: "the modernisation of the whitefish fleet is one of our main priorities. This level of investment will make a significant contribution to improved safety of this segment of the fleet. It will also help to increase landings and maintain jobs in the fishing sector," he added.

# Armed Gardaí Thwart Cappoquin Bank Robbery

A superbly organised garda surveillance operation successfully thwarted a daylight bank raid in Cappoquin on Monday afternoon last.

Two men in their early twenties, using a 750 c.c Honda motorcycle as transport, entered the Bank of Ireland branch at Lower Main Street, Cappoquin around 2.50 p.m. Their faces were covered by motor cycle helmets and they were armed with screwdrivers which they brandished at two female members of staff.

The bank employees were then ordered to hand over all the cash on the premises. There was one female customer in the bank at the time and she ran screaming into the street as the robbers began filling the bags with bank notes amounting to approximately £2,750.

While the raid was in

While the raid was in progress, two armed garda officers, Detective Sergeant John Molloy and Garda Eddie Fitzpatrick, both of whom are stationed in Dungarvan, took up positions on the road outside.

Garda Fitzpatrick knocked over the robbers 'get-away'

motor cycle and positioned himself to the side of the main entrance to the bank while Det. Sgt. Molloy was faced directly in front of the building's main entrance.

As the men emerged from the bank they were confronted by both armed officers who ordered them to drop the money bags. The duo offered no resistance and were immediately arrested before being transported to Dungarvan Garda Station where they were detained overnight. All of the money stolen in the raid was recovered.

Later on Monday evening, a major search of the surrounding areas was undertaken by unarmed gardaí from all over West Waterford. It was believed that there may have been other members of the gang waiting in the vicinity to link up with the two men who actually carried out the raid. The hunt however revealed nothing



# **IDA Address South East** Regional Authority

A high powered IDA team pointed Manager of the South addressed the South East Regional Authority in Clonea Strand Hotel, Dungarvan last week to advise on the recent changes within the agencies regional structure.

Tom Rochford, Division Manager with national responsibility for Property & Regions Divisions within IDA, outlined the new management structure which has been put in place. The IDA regional office will remain in place in Waterford with no reduction in staff numbers. Pat Loftus has been appointed Manager of the South East Region, while Barry Condron, as the newly appointed Area Director, has responsibility for both the South East and South West Regions.

This new structure, continued Mr. Rochford, reflected the changes effected in 1994 which saw the original IDA divided into two, with the new Industrial Development Agency becoming solely responsible for inward investment and the development of existing overseas investment, while responsibility for the development of indigenous industry passed to the newly created Forbairt organisation. Pat Loftus, the newly ap-

East Region, described the IDA performance in the South East Region for 1995 as exceptional and early indications were that the year ahead will be at least as good. Last year was exceptional for three reasons, continued Mr. Loftus. Firstly, last year saw a total of five new IDA sponsored greenfield projects locate in the region which was the highest number to locate in the region for many years. Secondly, the South East Region was re-established as a credible location for the electronics industry with the introduction of Seagate Technology, who already have in excess of 1000 people employed in Clonmel and thirdly, the huge potential of the Belview Portal Area was further confirmed with the decision by ITW Mima to locate beside the Louisiana Pacific/Coillte project.

The immediate strategy, revealed Mr. Loftus, will be to leverage the spin off potential of the Seagate project for surrounding towns, to build on the strategic potential of Belview Port and to fully implement the newly approved greenfield and expansion projects throughout the region.

Knockanore Community Council members decided to call a public meeting recently to discuss the deterioration of public roads in the parish, and to highlight the need for Waterford County Council to give better attention to the community in general. The Shamrock Inn was the venue and the Chairman of the Community Council, James Tobin, presided over a capacity crowd.

Invited guests were members of Waterford County Council, Ballyduff's Jim Quirke sent his apologies, Cappoquin's Ollie Wilkinson arrived as the meeting ended, having to attend a similar meeting in Mount Melleray, while Tallow's Willie Mc-Donnell faced the music answering a number of the Engineer inspection of questions from the audience.

The meeting discussed the general state of the parish roads where seven had to be closed after the recent heavy rain. Members were critical of Waterford County Council for their neglect of Knockanore. The members agreed that the following must be dealt with immediately:

(1) Two men to work permanently in Knockanore, Glendine and Kilwatermoy;

(2) Ballina Hill needs urgent attention: (3) Repair work to be car-

ried out at Ballyphillip; (4) That the scenic route signs be removed, if im-

provements are not done; (5) Dykes and drains choked, hedges not cut for a number of years;

(6) County Engineer to visit Knockanore, Glendine and Kilwatermoy.

Following the public meeting both Tom Linear and John Sweeney two senior hour long meeting was successful as some of the requests were agreed to, while others were refused, such as the cleaning of the scenic route road. Mr. Tobin pointed out that thhe cleaning of this road would be of vital important as Knockanore Community have plans to enter the Tidy Towns competition shortly. This and other requests are to be followed up at the March meeting of Waterford Co. Council.

Mr. Lineen, Senior Executive Engineer, told the community members

I saw in the Budget that there is to be a Special Grant for Twins. When does this come into effect?

The new grant, £500 at birth, £500 at 4 years and £500 at 12, is in place so that if you have twins now, or have twins who are going to be 4 or 12 years shortly, you will get £500 from the Department of Social Welfare.



#### Junior Encyclopaedia

INGFISHERS small hole nesting birds. There are around 80 species and they are found practically all over the world except in the far north, and far south.

They mostly live near water, where they dive for fish, catching them with their spear-like beaks. Other species of kingfishers like to eat insects and reptiles. A kookaburra is one of the kingfishers that will eat the above.

Most of the kingfishers are brightly coloured, though they fly so quick they look just like a blur of

Beefeaters are also related to the kingfisher family. They are very coloured and live in tropical places such as Asia, Africa or Australia. They gather in large flocks and eat bees and other insects.

Kookaburras, as mentioned above, live in the Australian Bush. They are well known for their wild "laughing" chorus that can be heard at dawn and at dusk. One bird starts and the others join in.

The male kingfisher sits on a branch watching until he sees a fish in the water. He dives down and grabs it with his beak. He may knock it against a branch to stop it moving and

In the early part of spring, the male courts the female by giving her a present in the shape of a fish. He gives it to her, head first, so she can swallow it with ease. Then, together month after they hatch.

they dig out a nest tunnel in the river bank. To mate, the male hovers above the female and lands on her back. He holds on to her neck with his beak and flaps his wings to hold his bal-

After the mating process, the eggs start to grow inside the female. She then lays up to six white eggs in the nest. After about three weeks the eggs hatch and the chicks are born naked and blind. They like to eat the small fish that their parents feed

The chicks grow fast and at first their feathers are covered in spiny quills. The quills soon split and the feathers appear. Their first plumage is drab, but after they moult in the autumn, they grow bright colourful feathers.







# Brian O'Shea Briefed On IDA Ireland Development Plans For Waterford

Brian O'Shea T.D., Minister of State, has been in contact with Kieran McGowan, Chief Executive of IDA Ireland, regarding IDA developments for Waterford in 1996.

The Minister has been informed that in 1996 the IDA will focus on the two main population centres in the county — i.e. Waterford City and Dungarvan.

This focus will involve supporting the construction of a new privately financed 20,000 sq. ft. advance factory on the IDA Industrial Estate in Dungarvan, the upgrading of three separate 20,000 sq. ft. units at Waterford Industrial Park and the promotion of the newly acquired 50 acre IDA site beside Waterford Port.

Furthermore, IDA Ireland works closely with the Chamber of Commerce and local bodies in Dungarvan to improve the towns attractiveness to overseas investors and are currently participating in the production of a new promotional brochure.

Minister O'Shea added that the conversion of new and expansion projects currently under negotiation in the area will provide another main focus for 1996. The commencement of recently

approved greenfield and expansion projects like:

— ITW Mima, who will produce industrial stretch film and provide direct employment for 80 people with investment of £11m

— MB Ireland, who are on target to provide 70 additional jobs in an expansion jigsaw puzzle project with investment of £3 million,

— Norton Pharmaceuticals, who will provide 100 jobs in an expansion of its generic pharmaceuticals plant, with invest of £10 million, will impact positively on both Waterford City and County during 1996.

Projects from surrounding areas will also have a positive effect on Waterford during the year. These include:

— Seagate Technology Ltd., Clonmel who announced last year that they will create 1,000 new jobs over a three year period with £21.5 million investment, in the manufacture of hard disc drives. (Seagate has exceeded it target and currently employ approx.

# Muintir Na Tire Annual Conference

At the recent Muintir na Tire Annual Conference President John Quigley said, "Muintir na Tire has experienced growth in the number of new Community Councils seeking affiliation. This is due in part to a very positive response to the organisation receiving a higher profile in the media, as well as what might be described as the "rediscovery" of Muintir na Tire."

We have been inundated with requests from all over the country to set up Community Alert since the recent savage attacks on people in rural communities." Jim Quigley said "Muintir could have doubled its press coverage if it had taken the popular route and condemned all before them, but Muintir na Tire took a responsible stand. Of course many older people were and are frightened but there is no point in compounding the situation be creating fear unnecessari-

ly."
The recent allocation of £50,000 from the Department of Justice will allow Muintir na Tire to provide 3 more full-time Community Alert Development Officers. This will bring the number of officers to 5, one in each of the five new regional Garda divisions.

The survey carried out last summer showed that Community Alert was a success story. This was carried out in three Garda areas — Roscommon/Galway East, Wexford and Core West.

The results show that where Community Alert is active, crime has decreased. Attacks on the elderly decreased by 17%, burglaries decreased by 25% and all other crimes by 21%.

The problem of public liability insurance for Community Alert signs erected by local authorities for Community Alert has come to the fore with a number of these authorities refusing to include these signs under their own public liability insurance. Muintir na Tire feels that local authorities should erect and cover the signs under their insurance policy. This would be a welcome and responsible contribution by local authorities to community

"The whole question of public liability insurance continues to dog voluntary effort in this country. How many worthwhile activities have gone out of existence in this country because of the cost of public liability insurance? How many Community Councils are struggling to pay their an-

nual premium?" Jim Quigley said "greater media attention and public debate on this issue would be welcomed. It would appear that there is no competition in public liability insurance for the voluntary sector. In addition thousands of pounds of public money, which should be spent in improving this country, is being spent settling insurance claims. This cannot be allowed to contin-

ue. We need all party consensus and action now."

The Conference dealt with Community Councils incorporating themselves into Companies Limited by Guarantee which is necessary because of the present compensation culture in this country.

Also it dealt with the question of Community Councils applying to the Revenue Commissioners for Charitable Status.

It discussed the need to carry out a fundamental reappraisal of the role of Muintir na Tire itself in the years ahead.

**Ballymacarbry Community** Alert Secretary's month old petition calls for the remit of the Medi-Alert System to be extended, or for the setting up of a similar system directed at crime protection. Medi-Alert works on the principle that customers supply three contact names and telephone numbers of relatives or neighbours to the company. They then receive a button device which is worn on the wrist. When pressed, this device alerts help.

Since this lady launched her campaign in Clonmel on January 26, she has collected signatures from County Waterford, Tipperary and Kilkenny City.

tures. She has also submitted her proposal to the Government Task Force, which is inviting members of the public and companies to put forward crime prevention ideas. This Task Force, which includes representatives from the Departments of Social Welfare, Justice, Health and Environment, has reacted positively to her proposal. Mrs. Kearns has taken leave from her job, plans to finish up the petition after her visit to Waterford, but she is determined that her campaign won't end here. She says that she will keep going as long as she can until some thing constructive is done. "I see these defenseless and vulnerable people feeling scared in their homes," she said. "I am totally committed and the more encouragement I am getting, the stronger I am. ### **GUN CLUBS** TARGET FOREIGN SHOOTERS

The umbrella body the most of the country's gun clubs has decided to open unfriendly legal fire on foreign tourist shooters in an unprecedented court action.

On last Monday the National Association of Regional Game Councils NARGC made an application for a judicial review in the High Court in which the country's gun clubs did seek to have the issue of hunting and firearms certificates to foreign tourist shooters declared illegal. The NARGC has decided to seek an injunction to prevent further licences being issued. This action is being taken against the Minister for Gaeltacht, Michael D. Higgins, following what the association termed "years of inaction" by the Government on the issue of tourist shooters. Mr. Desmond Croftan, NARGC Director, said the abuses of our wildlife by tourist shooters and their promoters are legendary now in Ireland.

There is hardly an Irish citizen who is not aware of this situation. Still successive Governments while they were strong on words they had been silent by their actions. Jim Wilson, Chairman of the Irish Wildbird Conservancy (I.W.C.) said that while his organisation had always adopted a "neutral policy" on this issue of shooting, they had, and would continue to lobby against the shooting of species thought to be under threat. Over many years the I.W.C. had been alarmed by reports of tourists gunmen shooting song birds and other non game species.

#### THE LATE SR. ROSARIE DUFFY

On Thursday last, February 29th, the death occurred at Milford Hospice, Castleroy, Limerick City of Sister Rosarie

Sr. Rosarie was a native of Co. Galway and entered the Presentation Sisters, Lismore in 1951 and remained in Lismore until 1991 (40 years) when the Presentation Sisters withdrew from Lismore. Following the closure of Lismore Convent, Sr. Rosarie was transferred to Cashel.

During her time in Lismore, Sr. Rosarie taught in the Primary School First Class, the First Communion Class and she prepared many boys and girls for the reception of their

First Holy Communion.

She was also noted for her great work for the missions, helping especially the missionaries from Lismore working in foreign lands. Sr. Rosarie was 34 years old when she entered the convent in Lismore and was a trained National School teacher - she was what is called a late vocation. Sr. Rosarie retired from teaching in 1982 at the age of 65 years and had reached the age of 79 years at her death.

Before entering the Presentation order, Sr. Rosarie taught in West Tipperary and was a very active member of the Jundrum branch of I.N. I.O. in the late 1940's. On March 24th, 1957, Sr. Rosarie took her final profession in the presence of Bishop Cohalan, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore.



# Bridge The Gap With Gladioli

There is one thing go be said in favour of gladioli — they do very well in a drizzly or showery summer, so we can always get great comfort from them.

And with their wide range of bright colours, they help to bridge the gap between the flowers of midsummer and the dahlias and other autumn flowers.

They make excellent clumps in the herbaceous border and are useful dot plants in summer bedding schemes. I don't recommend planting them alone, I much prefer them in groups of eight or nine, here and there, in the mixed flower border.

I've always said they show to better advantage in association with other plants in their greenery, and they also find support for the flower spikes, which are inclined to be a bit top-heavy when standing alone (unless they are individually staked.)

Corms should go in now, marking their positions with sticks. As you might have guessed, they like good, well-prepared soil. If you have looked after the soil during the past few months — that's to say, it's been dug deeply and well manured — then you should not need to do any more now than lightly fork to loosen it up.

But if you haven't done any preparations, it will pay you to dig the site about 18 ins. deep and mix a good dressing of rotted manure with the lower soil (not nearer than 8 ins. from the sur-



face). If you can't get manure, then well-rotted compost will be fine. If it's not already in the soil, a little lime may be added.

There are those who say that gladioli won't do well in heavy soil. I don't agree with that. So long as drainage is adequate, the results will not disappoint you.

The best way to plant them is to dig out a good spacious hole about four inches deep and spread a layer of sand over the bottom.

Then press the corms into it — right way up, of course! — about six inches apart. However, the distance between the corms should vary according to variety. The smaller, of the primulinus type, should be around eight inches apart, while the larger, of the larger-flowered type, will need at least 12 ins. between them.

You can plant them any time from now until the middle of May, according to whether you want them to flower early or late.

Have only one variety in each border clump. For bedding also, I've always found it's best to keep one or two varieties.

Jim Lynch has 110 cow spring calving herd on his Ballylemon farm but uses two outside farms of 90 acres for his Silage ground and Beef unit. He does not graze before first Cut and spreads 4 cwt. of 0-7-30 in September followed by 3,500 gallons of Slurry in December. In early March he spreads 100 units of Topper Urea and aims to cut by mid May. According to Jim the key to Quality Silage is to wilt, fill and seal all in one day.

Speaking on behalf of the Judging Panel, Tom Rafter said, "I.F.I. are delighted to be associated with this First Quality Silage Award in Co. Waterford. I want to thank

my fellow Judges as well as Co-Sponsors, Waterford Foods plc and Teagasc in helping make the inaugural Awards such a success". # THIS WEEK TEAGASC Says

SUCKLER COWS

EU Suckler Cow Premium Scheme 1996:

Applications for Quota Reserve.

Applications forms are now available. Closing date Friday, March 15th, 1996.

With an increasing number of farmers in Co. Waterford developing a suckler herd, it is important that standards are set to help develop the enterprise to a viable and competitive level. Accordingly reproductive targets in the suckler herd should be:

1. 80% of cows to calve in eight weeks; 2. Less than 5% of cows culled for infertility; 3. Average herd calving to calving interval of not more than 365 days.

It is vital that the output of the cow is maintained at the highest level. A high proportion of suckler cows have a calving to calving interval of well in excess of 365 days. This poor calving interval principally relates to body condition at calving.

Feed should be adjusted to ensure cows are in the correct body condition at key times of the year. With calving approaching, cows should be in a fit condition. If cows are too thin, extra feed will be required after calving to ensure the right condition at mating, whereas, overfat cows are more likely to have calving difficulties. Special attention should be given to the in-calf heifers - they should be fed to maintain condition until one month before calving when rations can be slightly reduced.

The period between calving and mating in the most crucial because if the cow is not in good enough condition at mating, she is less likely to conceive. During this period it is important to minimise loss of condition so that cows are not too thin at turn out. For most farmers, this means feeding good quality silage of hay ad lib, supplemented with 2.5 to 3.5 lbs. of concentrate.

Once cows are successfully back in calf, the feed requirements are lower and cows can lose body weight without adversely affecting themselves, their calf or the developing foetus.

SLURRY SPREADING

Safet

With the present favourable conditions, many farmers are availing of the opportunity to get slurry out on grassland.

Slurry in storage generates poisonous gases which are released in large volumes when mixing takes place. Extreme care must be taken when mixing and emptying takes place in the house. All stock must be removed and ventilation provided. No one should enter the house while agitation is taking place. If possible agitate in windy conditions.

#### FERTILISER FOR SILAGE

Silage quality has been very variable over the past few seasons but experience has shown that farmers who are consistently making high quality first cut silage adopt a very specific procedure in relation to fertiliser and slurry application.

Dr. Noel Culleton, Teagasc, Johnstown Castle recommends the following procedure for fertiliser application for first cut silage.

 Use 90 to 120 units of Nitrogen per acre. Recent reseeds and Italian Ryegrass can take the higher level of Nitrogen with the lower levels going to old permanent pasture.

2. Apply the Nitrogen at least eight weeks before the target cutting date so as to ensure at least six good growing weeks to utilise all the Nitrogen.

3. If possible, take the opportunity to graze the silage ground before closing, reduce the level of Nitrogen on silage fields that got an application of Nitrogen for this early grazing. Assume that one third of the Nitrogen applied for early grazing will be available for the silage crop.

4. Avoid applying slurry after the second week of March if at all possible and especially if there is a good cover of grass. 1,000 gallons of undiluted cattle slurry will contribute eight units of Nitrogen to the silage crop if applied in the spring and so it is important to cut back accordingly if slurry has been applied.

Mr. Skehan said he was confident that the refunds would be increased following a meeting of an ICMSA delegation and senior European Commission officials in Brussels last Thursday February 29th.

Kilmeaden based Mr. Skehan said that the ICMSA group had sought from the officials an increase in export refunds for live cattle and beef. However, it seemed he said that for the immediate future, the Commission will confine the increase in export refunds to live cattle only.

"I am confident that the Commission will act on live export refunds, possibly at the Beef Management Committee on Match 15th.

"While ICMSA will continue to seek a full restoration of all export refunds, I am convinced that the likely to £70 per animal.

Export refunds on live cat- upcoming increase in export refunds for live cattle is a welcome development and should restore some confidence to the cattle trade".

Mr. Skehan added that he believed the expected increase in refunds should be sufficient to bring about an active live trade which, he said, would restore balanced competition between the factories and live exporters.

A. People do grow shorter as they age - this is true for everybody from about 50 onwards and especially true for women I'm afraid. This can be kept at bay by keeping yourself active and fit, eating a good, balanced diet with plenty of calcium, and possibly having hormone replacement therapy when you start the menopause

Q. Towards the end of my third pregnancy I developed a breast abscess which the doctor said he couldn't treat until after delivery. As a result, it became very large and painful and I spent two weekshin hospital

having it drained. A month later it reap-peared and I had to go through the whole procedure again. When I was pregnant again on the fourth it returned and has reappeared three times since then. Will this ever clear up for good - and can it turn cancerous? I am only 30.

A. A breast abscess if allowed to become large stretches the milk duct and when it heals, leaves behind a small, internal pocket of scar tissue. This is very prone unfortunately to re-infection, especially if every trace of pus was not removed when draining or if germs re-enter through a cracked nipple. At the first sign of tenderness, prompt treatment with antibiotics may help to prevent it from recurring. Scrupulous hygiene and the use of an emollient on he nipple to prevent cracking will also halt it recurring. If it continues to happen you may need to have the scarred area removed surgically. Having breast abscesses does not mean you're . more prone to breast cancer - I am sure your own doctor can reassure ish, Englandoanshiring dalaringo, ciatives.

Many of them knew nothing about it and weren't aware of any necessity to bother with it. it was something barely tolerable, a kind of junket which was never properly understood. Nor was any effort made to understand it. In our own county at that time, coaching was a dirty word which officially Waterford had little time for. A very prominent figure in our county dismissed it contemptuously. "Coaching is all very fine up to about 14," he is in record as saying. So you stop learning at 14!!! There was never any genuine effort made to evaluate the Gormanston course and how our county could benefit from it. In fact when the matter of selecting the Waterford representatives to attend the course came up each year at County Board meetings it was summarily dealt with. A letter was read from Croke Park. The Chairman looked out over his glasses for any response. Usually there was a detached silence. "Anyone interested in going to Gormanston?", he'd inquire. After a few moments a name would be muttered, the Chairman would nod assent and move quickly on to the next business. Thank God that coaching irritant was out of the way. In theory any yob could volunteer and be accepted. His credentials for acceptance didn't matter a hoot. All he needed on his C.V. was that he was prepared to spend a week in Gormanston. There was no obligation to return to his county and use his experience for the benefit of any club, even



#### REFEREES COURSE

A Grade 3 referees course has been organised for all referees in West Waterford. This very intensive and interesting course will deal with all aspects of refereeing, ranging from fundamental and basic guidelines. Rules sections 1, 2 and 3; Rules of control and authority; Rules of specification; Guide on fitness for referees and testing and assessment of referees. This year all existing current referees are expected to attend the course as a refresher to familiarise themselves with rule changes and interpretations. New referees will find this course the ideal starting point as it deals with every level of participation and advancement.

Clubs are especially reminded that they will be expected to provide a referee for all three away U-12 games. They are expected to have that referee on this course. One thing I know for certain is that those who attend the course will most definitely benefit from it and will no doubt enjoy the ten hour session over three nights. The Bord has wisely enlisted the services of the Coaching and Games Development Committee to present and coordinate the course. The dates for our course are Tuesdays, March 19th, March 26th and April 2nd at Dungarvan G.A.A. Club Pavilion starting each night at 7.30 sharp.

The answer to our question - the goalkeeper bounces the ball twice inside the small square in football, it's a penalty.

The goalkeeper in hurling picks the ball off the ground inside the small square. What should the referee do award a 20 metre free at the centre point of the line?

If an attacking player legally enters the small square (i.e. after the ball), and the ball is played from that area but is returned before the attacking player has time to leave the area, provided that he does not play the ball or interfere with the defence, then a foul is not committed.

What happens if a player who takes a sideline puck or kick, plays the ball again before another player has played it?

The referee should cancel side line puck or kick and throw in the ball where the foul occurred.

If a player wastes time by delaying a puck out or kick out, what should the referee do?

Cancel puck out or kick out and throw in the ball on defenders 20 m in front of scoring space. That should sort that one out.

Finicky old rules these ones, but all very important. The correct application of any of these rules or indeed the incorrect application, could decide the winning or losing of a game, you never know. Interestingly enough the rules are clearly stated in the Playing Rules Booklet - I just wonder how many team mentors, club officials or indeed players have read and studied the playing rules.

Funny isn't it, we all want those frees for all our team, no matter who fouls. So much so that we are prepared to argue against matters of fact. Let's brush up on the





The decision of the meeting to reject the rulings of the G.A.C. could only be described as a 'bombshell' as nothing like this has happened before. In effect, the decision undermined the authority of this high profile committee which consists of the three Chairmen, the three Secretaries, the County P.R.O.'s and the County Treasurer and it is certain to have certain repercussions on future matters that have to be adjudicated upon by the same committee.

A most acrimonious debate erupted when the Chairman announced that having deliberated on two occasions on the appeal lodged by the Kilrossanty club, who submitted that the Western Board had followed the wrong procedures in dealing with the referee's report of the Kilrossanty/Geraldines Junior hurling championship match played at Fraher Field in October last, they found that the Divisional Board had acted in accordance with procedure and general rules. The Chairman then stated that their findings would be put to the meeting for approval. He said they had already been given a full and fair hearing and that there would be no debate. Sean Lannon, Kilrossanty insisted on giving his club's views and despite the insistence of the Chairman, he continued to talk and others joined in support. Some contended that the Divisional Disciplinary Committees were no longer in existence since the restructuring of the County Board last year.

After a 35 minute discussion, the Chairman said he was putting the G.A.C. findings to a vote and after a second ballot was taken, it showed a 21 to 16 vote in favour of rejection. The attendance numbered about 74 so just half of the Board abstained. A second appeal by Niall O'Connor against a six

In reply to a question from James Tobin about the issue of official passes to those members who were entitled to have them, the Chairman stated that he had set up a small committee who will meet immediately and make recommendations to the Board before the next meeting.

Referring to the monies due for the Grounds Development at Walsh Park and Fraher Field, he said the amount was considerable but with full co-operation from clubs and all playing their part in the new Deise Draw, it should be very considerably reduced by the end of the year. Noel Fleming said that as far as our debts were concerned, the County Draw was our big chance of turning the corner and this would be possible if the same effort was made at both ends of the County. The Chairman reminded the meeting that the city area was the weak spot and if this area came up trumps we would be on a winner.
CHAMPIONSHIP

#### **FORMAT**

This was the big matter for discussion and there were contributions from many parts of the floor. The five proposals which were listed on the circular sent out with the minutes, were all talked about and one or two more were mentioned.

John Heneghan, Lismore, who was plugging for the knock out system, said that the league system in operation here in Waterford was putting standards backwards instead of forwards. It is said that it was ruining people's appetites for the game of hurling. He said we have double standards in dealing with the format of our games and he referred to the proposals before County Convention, when everyone were shouting that teams should be given only one bite of the cherry and here at Board meetings they will not hear of a knock out sys-

The Lismore proposal was that four groups be played with four teams in each. This was moved on a number of occasions before but was well defeated. John Jackson proposed the status quo and this was heavily beaten. Noel Fleming said that twelve teams were enough in each championship and two groups of six would be the ideal.

Then came the main proposals from Cnoc Sion, Ring, Ardmore and Sliabh

gCua. Because of a similarity in the proposals put by Ardmore and Sliabh gCua, the former agreed to withdraw in favour of the second. This was for a knock out football championship with a losers group and the Phelan Cup to be run on a league basis etc.

The Ring motion related to both Senior championships and after it was agreed by the meeting to put the Mount Sion (hurling) motion versus the hurling section of the Ring motion, a vote was taken and the Mount Sion proposal was agreed on a 28 to 22 vote. That decision decided that the format of the Senior hurling championship 1996 will be as follows:

1. Two groups of eight in each (seeding as per standing in 1995 championship. These groupings to play a full Senior hurling league programme of seven games each.

2. Competition to be known as Sargent Cup/Senior Hurling League.

3. The top team in each group to qualify for the league final.

- 4. Competition to start in April and continue regardless of intercounty commitments - no postponements.

5. County selectors to have first call on all players.

6. On completion of league, top four teams (two from each group) to enter the championship at quarter final stage and be seeded separate-

ly.
7. Championship to commence on open draw/knock out with bottom four teams in each group playing first round.

8. Four winners to proceed to second round in open draw with four teams remaining. Four losers to play off for one or two relegation places.

9. Second round winners (four) to play against 'seeded' quarter-finalists with an open draw for semi-finals.

10. Two year trial period consider no promotion from intermediate grade in order to reduce Senior teams to twelve and increase intermediate grade by same number.

11. Lawlor's Hotel to continue championship sponsorship. Board to actively seek sponsors for league.

12. Midweek games to be played if necessary.

This exciting new formula should invest greater interest in the hurling championship and it will achieve the overdue need of having the number of Senior hurling teams reduced to twelve within a couple of years. When the proposition was approved, the County Chairman said he against the change and voted would favour three teams 257.200 00

being relegated and being replaced with the intermediate County champions and

#### this was agreed. SENIOR FOOTBALL

When the Ring proposal was voted on, a majority favoured the proposed formula which is close enough to what was in operation last year, except that the top five (instead of the top six) in group 'A' will play the top three (instead of the top two) in group 'B' after a sixteen team league has been played in two groups of eight each to determine groupings etc.

The eight teams not involved in the knock out part of the championship will play for the Phelan Cup on a knock out basis. This will reduce by eight games, the programme for the Phelan Cup. It will have the effect of freeing the strong Senior football clubs from Phelan Cup activity and allow them free for intercounty games etc. It will give the eight weaker teams, while retaining Senior status, a worthwhile competition which one of them must win. Lowest teams in league section (found by play-off if necessary) will be relegated to intermediate grade.
DUNGARVAN MOTION

This proposal, which had been before County Convention and withdrawn, sought to have a new championship (football) introduced and be designated as Senior 'B'. It was moved by Michael Lyons but received no sup-

#### INTERMEDIATE HURLING

This championship was discussed when Nioclás MacCraith proposed that it revert to becoming a divisional championship as it was some years ago. He said the Western Board had discussed the matter and were all in favour of having it changed back with each division playing its own championship and the County Board playing the final.

The proposal was very strongly opposed by the eastern delegates, who submitted that in the east with only five teams, it would not be a championship at all. One delegate pointed out that three of the teams - Kilmacthomas, Ballydurn and Kill - were within only miles of each other and the other two - Mount Sion and Ferrybank - were neighbouring clubs. The matter, when put to a vote, was carried with all western clubs, with the exception of Abbeyside, voting for the change. All the
