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## Local House Guttled In Blaze

An early morning blaze in a house at St. Thomas Terrace, Dungarvan caused over £40,000 worth of damage, leaving the building practically destroyed.

The fire is thought to have started shortly after 2.00 a.m. in the kitchen and quickly spread to other areas of the house. Owner of the house, Breda Darcy and her son Ross were both asleep at the time.

At approximately 2.20 a.m., Ross awoke to find thick smoke throughout the house and immediately made his way to his mother's bedroom where he managed to get her out of her window as the hallway was impassable. The brave teenager then ran across the road and phoned the Dungarvan Fire Service. Chief Fire Officer, Tony

McCarthy told the "Dungarvan Leader" that the fire station received the call at 2.36 a.m. Two units of Dungarvan Fire Brigade were quickly on the scene to control the blaze. The cause of the fire has not yet been determined. Mr. McCarthy added that the house adjoining the Darcy's suffered external damage to the house eaves and gutters.

Fortunately no-one was injured in the blaze and both fire units left at 6.32 a.m. But for the quick thinking and swift actions of Ross Darcy, the fire would have had tragic consequences.

# Slow Progress On New Dungarvan College Prompts Meeting With Department

Rapidly deteriorating conditions in the existing Technical College at Wolfe Tone Road, Dungarvan, coupled with poor progress made to date on the new £1.5 million replacement college at Quann's were the source of strong criticism at last week's meeting of the Co. Waterford VEC.

Built in 1938, conditions at the existing VEC College would not be accepted anywhere else according to CEO Kieran Heffernan who told this month's meeting that teaching staff and students at the school have been tolerating the outdated facilities for years.

Likewise, Cllr. Austin Flynn, a teacher at the school, said the current scenario was not fair on students or staff, many of whom are living in hope of a new ultra modern college on the green field site at Quann's.

The VEC's quarter of a century wait for a brand new vocational school however is again dragging on as the various stages of work involved in getting the new school off the ground have fallen far behind the initial pre-contract timescale.

According to this purely indicative timescale, the sixth and final stage of the project, i.e. tender stage, would originally have been reached by the middle of next month. As the current situation stands however, sanction for stage 3, which is the developed sketch scheme, has yet to be approved by the Department

of Education.

### 'DESPERATE' SITUATION

Briefing members on the up-to-date situation regarding work on the new college, Mr. Heffernan revealed that the head of the Department's Building Unit, Noel Montayne, said that some final technical points still need to be 'ironed out' in stage 2 of the project. Mr. Montayne hoped to have the situation sorted out within a week.

The CEO said that it appeared to him that the project is moving very slowly and even the college architect, Shay Cleary, felt that the project should be pressing ahead faster.

Pressure should be put on the Department urged Mr. Heffernan, as the situation is "pretty desperate" at this stage to get the project to tender as soon as possible.

"Every effort should be made to spell out the issue to the Department regarding the need for a new school," he stressed.

### SEND DELEGATION

On the subsequent proposal of Cllr. Michael O'Riordan it was unanimously agreed to send a delegation to meet

with Mr. Montayne to impress on him the continuously deteriorating condition of the existing VEC school.

Come September and the influx of additional students to the college, Mr. Heffernan warned that the VEC will face a difficult challenge regarding the school's condition. "We must make every effort to show the Department the position we're in," he further stated.

Meanwhile, Cllr. O'Riordan forecast that if the new college is not at tender stage by the Government Estimates in November, then the VEC will "lose out" on the project.

"There could well be a general election next year and we'll be caught between the third and fourth stages," he submitted.

In support of the delegation to the Department of Education, Jimmy Byrne warned that the committee "is going to lose out if we don't do something drastic."

The main message arising from last week's Co. Waterford VEC meeting is the critical importance of the new 400 student school to Dungarvan and to the VEC and he underlined the need for a rapid advancement with plans for this new educational facility.

### O'SHEA TO VISIT COLLEGE

Speaking after the meeting to the "Dungarvan Leader,"

VEC Chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne said that he has again made the strongest representations possible to Junior Minister Brian 'Shea, T.D., who has now promised to come to Dungarvan and visit the existing college and meet with members of the teaching staff.

"He will view at first hand the situation and the real grievance of staff and pupils," said Cllr. Kyne. He agreed that despite the efforts of the CEO and Committee members, the delay in the project has, for a long time, reached 'an unacceptable stage.'

"From my experience, complicated technical requirements are emanating from the Department," Cllr. Kyne stated, "and the latest round of which arose because of inconsistencies, just couldn't be tolerated."

"Despite my anger at this ongoing saga," he declared, "I am still getting positive statements of support regarding the building of the new college, but the lack of significant progress in recent months requires more real progress to ally my criticism of the Department and these delays," he added.

The VEC Chairman said he will continue to use any influence he can to push the project to a final conclusion.

In conclusion, Cllr. Kyne said people could rest assured that his commitment is not being dimmed in any way by the slow progress on the new college.

## Local VEC Members Prepare For Crucial Oral Hearing

Next Monday representatives of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee will travel to Waterford to take part in an oral hearing with members of the Commission set up to investigate the rationalisation of VECs.

The subsequent report by this Commission, who are undertaking similar oral hearings with every VEC body throughout the country, will decide the fate of the VEC structure and will be presented to Government next month.

### DOWNGRADING OF VEC STRUCTURE

The hotly debated Government White Paper on Education proposes to replace the existing system with ten Regional Authorities - a move which has caused a storm of protest by vocational committees nationwide.

Under the White Paper, the proposed new role for vocational bodies, such as the long established Co. Waterford committee, is merely that they will become trustees for vocational schools and colleges such as Dungarvan Technical College, St. Declan's in Kilmacthomas and Waterford RTC.

After years of providing valuable educational services for adults, the young

unemployed, long term unemployed and pre employment courses, etc., Co. Waterford VEC would be downgraded to only providing an administrative support service for schools.

The group from Co. Waterford VEC to meet with the Commission next week comprises of Cllr. Lar Hart, Cllr. Con Casey, who is also a member of the Irish Vocational Education Association, VEC Chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne, CEO Kieran Heffernan and a member of the VEC teaching staff.

### FAIT ACCOMPLI?

The general feeling among VEC members is that the Commission has already made their decision regarding the future role of the VEC structure and the task is now to change it.

Speaking at this month's VEC meeting in Dungarvan Cllr. Casey said the Commission is expected to recommend that the number of VECs be reduced which, he revealed, would effectively

mean mergers. Cllr. Lar Hart declared that a 'fair fight will have to be put up' at the oral hearing adding that the Commission's decision is practically made already.

CEO Kieran Heffernan outlined to members the various strengths of the VEC which must be highlighted at the hearing. "We have to justify our existence", he declared and added that the committee's capacity for networking with other agencies and groups, how the VEC evolved and grew over the years, their voluntary input into organisations and the value for money aspect, will all have to be put forward at the hearing including a full list of the committee's activities.

In a detailed report prepared by the Co. Waterford VEC in the case for its retention as the 'most effective unit of education provision in the area', the committee states that, "this VEC deserves no less than the opportunity to continue its work at local level to serve the people of County Waterford in a responsive, cost-effective manner as they have always done".

Monday's oral hearing is seen as a crucial part of the local VEC's fight for survival as they present their case to the Commission whose ultimate decision will decide their fate.

FARM ANIMALS CATTLE

CATTLE are classed as the most important domestic animal. They change the grass which they eat into the milk we drink. They are able to do this because they have four stomachs to digest the food.

Cattle, sheep and goats all digest their food in the same way, and are called ruminants. There are different breeds of cattle — some are kept for meat, others for milk and some are kept for both. In some countries cattle are still used for ploughing and pulling carts.

Cattle that are kept solely for meat have broad, fleshy hindquarters, a thick neck and short legs. They are shaped like a rectangle. Cattle like to eat grass, but they do not have upper front teeth. They wrap their tongues around the grass and pull it into their mouths. They chew the cud with the

aid of their back teeth.

In most breeds of cattle, cows, like bulls, have horns. The horns are usually cut when the cattle are young calves so they won't hurt each other.

Some breeds, such as "polled" cattle, never have horns. The cows/bulls coats consists of thick short hair.

In cold climates the hair is longer for warmth. The skins of cattle may be made into leather. Cows have an udder with four teats. The milk is produced from the teats either for the calf or for human consumption. Cattle are cloven-hoofed animals. As they walk through a muddy lane, they leave tracks which show up the two toes that make up each hoof.

If a farmer has only a small herd of

cattle he will know each one individually, but for the farmer who has a big herd there are various marks available.

The bull is never kept with another bull as they would fight. They are kept in fields or a pen on the farm. A cow is ready to have calves when she is two years old. When she is ready to mate, she is said to be "in season." Forty weeks after mating, one calf is born or maybe on occasions two.

When the calf is born it weights 25-45 kg. Its hair is curly but goes straight after a week. After two hours it can stand and then looks for milk. The calf licks and nudges her calf to help it find a teat. The calf drinks by wrapping its tongue around the teat and by sucking hard. The calf often butts the udder and



this may help bring on the milk flow.

The calf of a dairy cow is taken away and fed on a substitute as the farmer needs the milk. The calves of other breeds such as beef cows, stay with their mothers because the farmer doesn't need the milk.

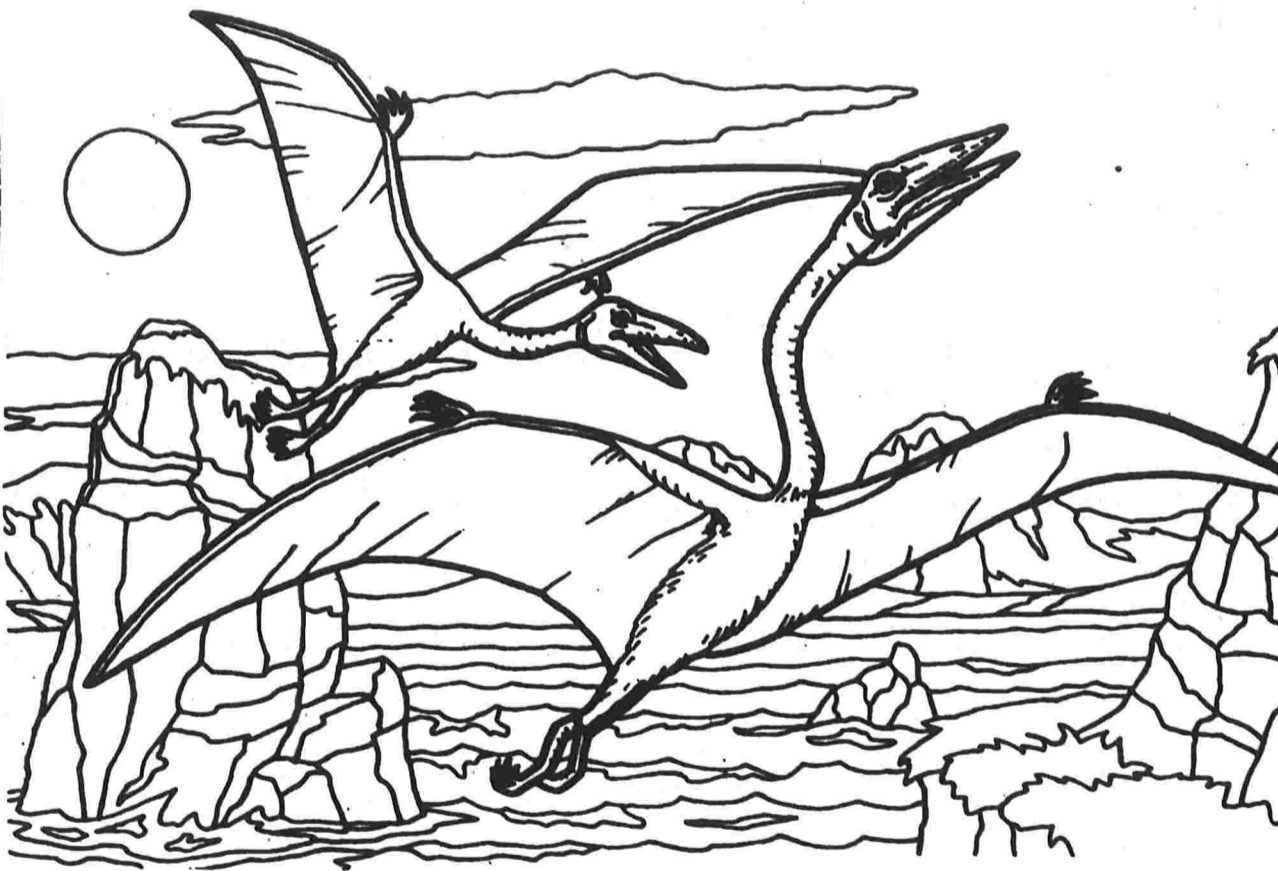
The cow grazes around her calf at first, but as it gets older she grazes further away. If the cow loses her calf she calls loudly until it comes to her. The calf will try several other cows before it finds its mother.

As the calf gets older it will join a group away from its mother, except when it is suckling. They chase each other and run around the field.

Calves sleep close together, lying down and if one calf wants to play it will butt and sniff the others until they get up. They have mock fights by pushing their heads together. A calf is a very curious animal in that it will sniff strange objects and then lick them.

How Motorbikes Started

MOTORBIKES didn't always look as they do today. The first ones were crude machines that often broke down. Many were just bicycles fitted with clip-on engines.

But in 1894, Professor Enrico Barnardi went one step further.

He couldn't find an engine small enough to fit onto a bicycle frame, so he made a special trailer for the engine and attached it to the back of the bike. The idea was that it would push the rider forward.

It was an ingenious idea, but unfortunately the trailer-cycle tended to overturn round sharp corners, says Stephen Hoare, author of books on bikes.

Another invention, the monowheel, was even more bizarre.

Its daredevil American designer, E. J. Christie, claimed it could reach up to 248 mph (400k/hr.)

Like the penny-farthing bicycle, his machine relied on the fact that a giant wheel could travel a greater distance per revolution than a small one.

But unlike the penny-farthing, the monowheel rider was perched on a seat at the centre of the wheel, above the axle.

His weight was balanced by a big 250 hp aircraft engine fitted below. The engine drove a heavy chain which turned the wheel axle.

Unfortunately, Christie's test drive was never recorded.

The first motorbike to be commercially produced was the Motorrad in 1896.

It was a very advanced design, and the makers Hildebrand and Wolfmuller had to build a large factory in Munich, Germany, to cope with all the orders.

The Motorrad had a two-cylinder four-stroke engine that gave it a top speed of 28 mph (45k/hr.)

The bike was also produced in France, but despite early success, the machine developed mechanical faults and customers began to demand their money back. Soon, H. & W. were bankrupt.

# Assistant Garda Commissioner Visits Hometown For Civic Reception

Described by the Chairperson of Dungarvan UDC, as "a man who has given long, loyal and dedicated service to the nation's police force and has distinguished himself and enhanced the force, in his near 44 years of service", Dungarvan native Bernard Curran returned to his hometown last Wednesday where he was awarded a civic reception to mark his pending retirement as Asst. Commissioner, An Garda Síochána.

Originally from Shandon, Mr. Curran left Dungarvan in 1952 for the Garda Training College in the Phoenix Park.

During his four decades of service with the force, Mr. Curran was based almost exclusively in Dublin, rising rapidly up through the ranks to Chief Superintendent and later Asst. Commissioner Curran in charge of the metropolitan area.

On reaching the highest echelons of the force, Mr. Curran was responsible for the welfare of over 4,000 gardaí and had total control of policy and jurisdiction over all operations in the city.

The entire national Garda force has benefitted greatly from his achievements in modernising operational methods, updating communications and transport and introducing more serviceable uniforms. Mr. Curran was instrumental in opening a new Garda Station in O'Connell Street, Dublin while he also commissioned a new command and control system in the city.

It was therefore no wonder that Dungarvan U.D.C. saw fit to honour Mr. Curran's

distinguished service to An Garda Síochána in light of his pending retirement.

## "A BEACON OF JUSTICE"

Among those attending the reception in the Town Hall were Mr. Curran's brothers Jack and Tom; Joyce Curran of Ring (the widow of his late brother Jimmy); Maura Foran, representing his late brother, Michael; his sister Mary Walsh; his sons Mark (soon to become Garda Inspector), Darragh, Niall, Maurice, Gavin and his daughter Emer.

A large Garda contingent of friends and colleagues from around the country was also present including Chief Supt. Ray McAndrew, Supt. Matt English, Supt. Pat Quinn, Supt. John Keane in charge of the Garda Band, Chief Supt. Sean O'Halloran, Inspector Michael Blake and Supt. Catherine Clancy of Dungarvan Garda Station.

Welcoming Mr. Curran and his wife Marie, U.D.C. Chairperson Cllr. Nuala Ryan said the Asst. Commissioner has dedicated his whole life to the service of the people of this country.

"His contribution has been one of distinction, his loyalty to the force and to the State unquestionable and his service to both unquantifiable," she declared. In a world where the demand for 'sentence first and verdict afterwards' is growing daily, Cllr. Ryan described Bernard Curran as a beacon of justice. She said he has been a restraining voice and influence within the force, recognising that justice is not the preserve only of the judge but of every member and element of the justice system.

As a Senior Garda, Mr. Curran made genuine efforts to open up the Gardaí to publicity and contributed to making it an organisation fit and ready for challenges which face it in the last decade of the twentieth century.

Cllr. Ryan went on to say that in all his dealings with the public and with those whom he commands, Bernard Curran is still known for his humour and above all, his humanity.

On behalf of her fellow Council members and the people of Dungarvan, Cllr. Ryan wished Mr. Curran and his wife every success, happiness and contentment in the years ahead.

To honour the occasion, the Chairperson made a presentation of a plaque and beautifully inscribed scroll to Mr. Curran and a bouquet of flowers to his wife.

## GLOWING TRIBUTES

Endorsing the honour awarded to Mr. Curran on his own behalf and on behalf of his two Labour colleagues, Cllr. Billy Kyne said he looked forward to local authorities, community leaders and the Gardaí working together to take on all challenges which the new millennium brings.

During the turbulent 60's and 70's, Cllr. Kyne said the Gardaí played a significant role as a 'binding force' at that time with Bernard Curran working behind the scenes, sharing leadership. When the values of home and community are challenged, people look back to the Gardaí, he stated, adding that the great tribute being paid to Bernard Curran is well deserved.

Likewise on behalf of Fionna Fall, Cllr. Austin Flynn

said it was great for Dungarvan to hear of someone getting to the top. The outstanding achievements of Mr. Curran came from a lifetime of high standards and Cllr. Flynn thanked him for the dedicated way he has served the people of Ireland, Waterford and Dublin.

## DEEPLY APPRECIATIVE

Obviously impressed with the reception awarded to him, Mr. Curran said it was a proud moment in his career, one that will remain with him as a memory. "Any success I've achieved in An Garda Síochána," he said "is attributable to countless people."

The Asst. Commissioner said he spent all of his spare time in Dungarvan during his younger days and he intended to spend much more of his time in the town in 1997.

Conveying his thanks to the local Gardaí, Mr. Curran said the esteem in which the local force are held locally is a great tribute to them. Recognition is also due, he said to the many thousands of gardaí who were subjected to moments of stress and danger at his say so, over the past 25 years. Extremely honoured and privileged to be honoured in such a way in his hometown, Mr. Curran stressed "it means a lot to me." He subsequently presented a piece of Dublin Crystal to Chairperson, Cllr. Ryan.

Following the civic reception, Mr. Curran and his family attended the Garda Band Concert in The Park Hotel.

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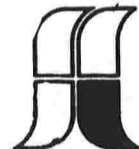

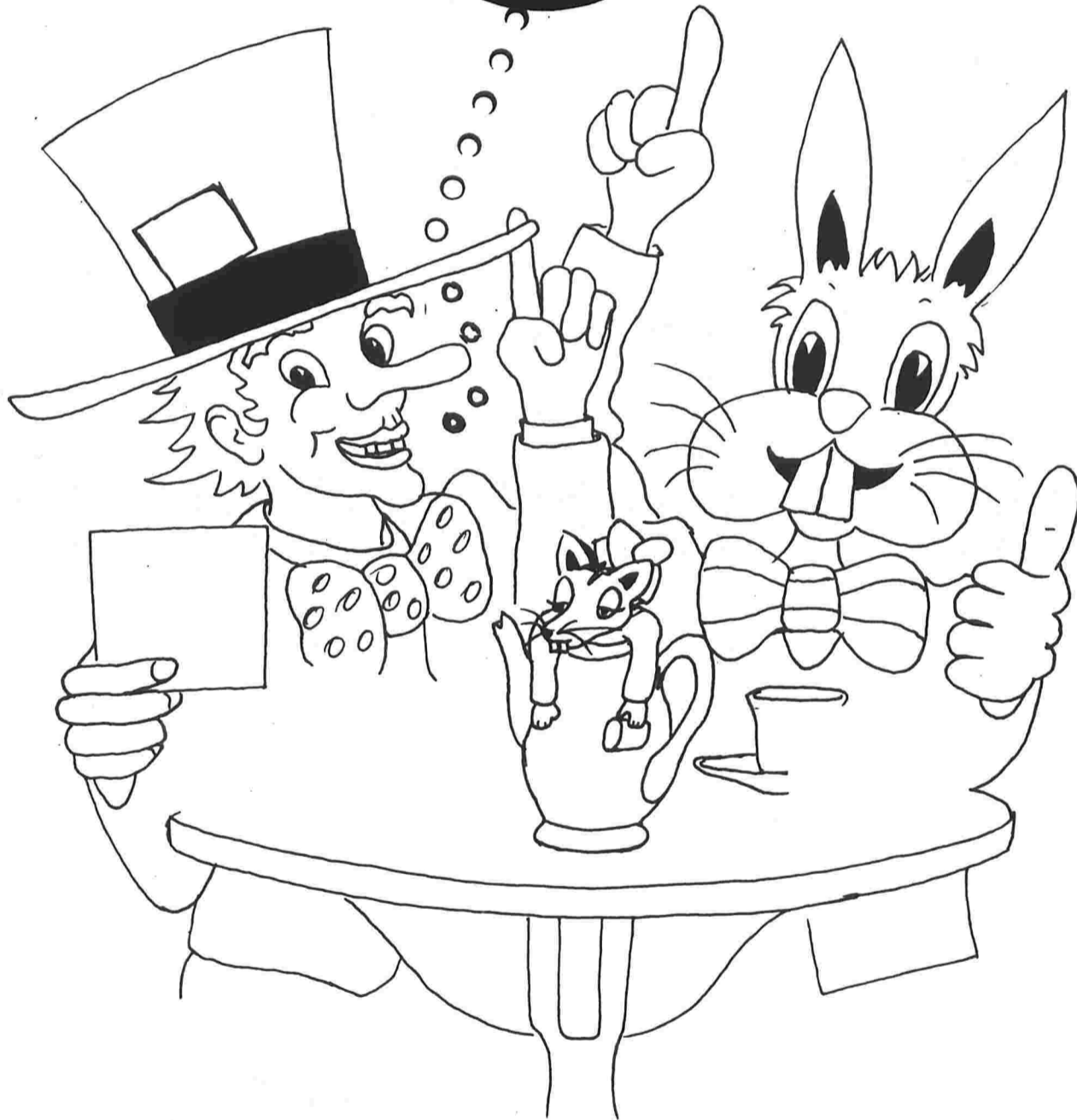

## Local Runner Completes Boston Marathon To Enter Record

Dan Dineen of Clonea, who raised over £2,500 for Cerebral Palsy Ireland in the run up to the Boston Marathon, is now set to enter the Guinness Book of Records.

Dan completed the gruelling course in a pair of green wellingtons — the first Irish man to undertake such a task in the 100 year history of the marathon.

Over 40,000 people took part in the Boston Marathon. Members of the Boston Athletic Club and 35 people from throughout Ireland witnessed Dan's attempt at the Guinness Book of Records from when he started to when he finished. Irish man Dick Hooper, who won the Dublin Marathon three times, was Dan's leader and organiser on the day.

Speaking to the 'Dungarvan Leader' Dan said the runners enjoyed a sunny day for the race, although there was still some snow on the ground in parts.

There was a new method of timing finishers, he revealed, as the race organisers used a timing computer chip on each runner's shoe. In Dan's case, he had to have a hole specially made in the wellies to hold the chip. He completed the marathon in 5 hours, 6 minutes and 33 seconds and subsequently received a medal from the Boston Athletic Association and a personal medal for completing the course in wellies.

With plenty of Irish supporters cheering him along Dan didn't even realise he had conquered Heartbreak Hill, the toughest incline on the course, until he was a mile down the road!

Following his Boston success, Dan has submitted an application for the Guinness Book of Records and is now waiting for confirmation.

In the meantime, next Friday he will raise funds for Telethon People In Need as he runs the Irish mile from New Line, Abbeyside to beyond the Friary in his green Boston marathon wellies. This event is being organised by Dungarvan Athletic Club and your support would be greatly appreciated.



# Labour Councillors Call For Local Housing To Be Made Available At Realistic Prices

The current high financial cost of housing in Dungarvan and the subsequent difficulties this poses for young couples and single people wishing to acquire a house of their own, has prompted the three Labour party members of Dungarvan UDC to call on the local Council to start a housing co-operative programme in the town.

Under this programme the Council would acquire a land bank to start a housing coop such as in the case of Comeragh Crescent. This would also entail the possibility of soft loans and other financial arrangements that would allow housing to be made available at more realistic prices.

Proposing this notice of motion on behalf of his colleagues, councillors Lar Hart and Paddy Power, at last week's Council meet-

ing, Cllr. Billy Kyne said that the prices of houses recently acquired has confirmed again how the market has put house purchase outside more and more of our young people (£34,000 - £53,000 for 3 bedroom semis).

Added to this, he continued, the local authority's loan system for 'would-be' house purchasers has a single income limit of £14,000 gross while the Council has a general policy not to ac-

cept housing list applicants whose earnings are in excess of £12,000.

The Abbeyside Councillor continued, "all lending agencies have a rule to only loan at a maximum of 2.5 times the applicant's income, so that again highlights the impossible situation facing someone within our local authority's limits - refusing them a chance of a Council house while offering them a loan that won't purchase a house for them".

In light of these financial obstacles and income limits, many couples and single people just can't get into a realistic scheme to buy a house, he felt.

## REALISTIC SCHEME

"We as a Council have to take a separate effort and system", stressed Cllr. Kyne who added that if the local authority is not going to grant an applicant a house and he/she can't afford a market driven house then there must be an intermediate means.

"It is our belief that Dungarvan UDC should set up an extensive scheme of housing support in regard to site purchase, house building and soft or other systems of attractive loans", he stated. "Other savings of scale can be achieved when a number of housing applicants avail of joint legal and other services together with other joint purchaser strategies".

The motion was seconded by Cllr. Paddy Power.

Supporting the call for a new Council cooperative housing programme, Chairperson Cllr. Nuala Ryan gave the example of the private housing estate at Comeragh Crescent which enabled people to purchase their own homes.

## WILL KEEP OPEN MIND

Responding to the Labour Councillors' call, County Manager Donal Connolly said a cooperative or joint housing scheme with a building contractor is something the Council certainly hopes to achieve. When the local authority acquires land in the future, Mr. Connolly said he would earmark private low cost housing. "I'll keep an open mind on it", he promised.

## Ardmore Firm Targets Asian Market

Among those who participated in the workshop was John King of Manatee Ltd., Ardmore, a company which manufactures award winning machines for cutting and collecting water weed. Manatee Ltd. also has a workshop in Tallow and currently exports to Britain, Portugal, Poland and the Czech Republic.

panding the company's target markets to include Vietnam and Malaysia.

## G.P. Primary Vaccination Scheme

The child diseases of diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, polio, hib disease, measles, mumps and rubella (German measles) can still cause very serious illnesses in babies and children. All parents are therefore encouraged to make sure that their baby gets the necessary vaccinations at the right time to ensure protection. In order to make it more convenient for parents, arrangements are now in place which allow everyone to get these immunisations free of charge from their own family doctor.

Because of this new scheme, Community Care Doctors will not continue to give the three in one (DPT) polio, Hib, and Measles, Mumps and Rubella (MMR) primary vaccinations and therefore all Community Care Immunisation Clinics will cease operation from 19.04.96. From that date all babies starting their immunisations and infants needing to have their immunisations completed will go to their family doctor for vaccination.

Your Public Health Nurse will ask mothers of new babies to give her the name of the General Practitioner to whom they wish to go for vaccination. This information will be used to let both yourself and the G.P. know when it is time to bring your child for vaccination.

The local Health Board Office will issue a temporary certificate of immunisation which will be updated by your doctor during the course of immunisation and a final certificate of immunisation will be forwarded to you as soon as the course of vaccination is completed. This certificate may be shown to the person in charge of the pre-school as evidence of vaccination and as it is a most important document should be held by you for use when visiting doctors and hospitals. If for some medical reason it is not possible to give all vaccinations to your child, then arrangements can be made for the issuing of a vaccination certificate which lists the exempted immunisations.

# Humble Apology Extracted From Local FF Politician Following 'Shotgun' Outburst

The now infamous 'shotgun' slur on the travelling community was retracted last week by Waterford County Councillor, Paddy Kenneally, who issued a humble apology after his controversial and shocking outburst at a recent Council meeting.

His racist remarks of "... the sooner the shotguns are got ready and the sooner these people are put out of the country, the better..." were in stark contrast to his reticent and seemingly diplomatic public apology after some earnest 'heart-to-heart' talks with Fianna Fail party leader Bertie Ahern.

The wayward politician was summoned by party chiefs to Dublin last Wednesday where according to senior party sources, he

was "read the riot act" by Mr. Ahern.

A well known and respected Fianna Fail member in his home county, Cllr. Kenneally's undemocratic tirade caused many red faces among fellow party members who moved quickly to distance themselves from his remarks. An embarrassed Bertie Ahern extracted a public apology from the Aglish man after a marathon meeting in Leinster House.

Putting his 'gunslinging' days behind him, Cllr. Kenneally then faced the national media and apologised for the comments.

A party statement read as follows: "having discussed the matter with the Party Leader, Councillor Kenneally expressed his profound regret for the intemperate nature of his remarks." He also withdrew any suggestion or implication that people should take the law into their own hands beyond the strict right of self defence, or that certain minorities within the community should be treated as outcasts or objects of fear and hatred.

The contrite Councillor added that his remarks were not in keeping with the long-standing position of the Fianna Fail Party.

## THREAT OF PROSECUTION

Profound regret or not, Cllr. Kenneally still faces the threat of a criminal prosecution under the Incitement To Hatred Act, as Gardai prepare a file for the Director of Public Prosecutions.

Dungarvan Gardai have already interviewed several of those who attended the

County Council meeting where the Aglish man made his ill-fated remarks. Local journalists who reported on the meeting will also be questioned. In light of Cllr. Kenneally's apology, a Garda spokesman gave no comment on the investigation's current position.

No further disciplinary action is expected to be taken by Mr. Ahern who stated last week that it is a core F.F. value to reconcile the common good with respect for minorities... "creating an atmosphere of toleration and pluralism, free from discrimination, hatred or incitement on religious, or racial grounds".

The public apology which he extracted from Cllr. Kenneally may yet go a long way towards restraining future excessive outbursts against the travelling community.

The lesson to be learned from this episode it seems is that towing the party line means adhering to a general party policy, not looking for quick 'fixes' like running every so called problem out of this county and into the next.

Five acres of grassland surrounding St. Declan's Community College in Kilmactomas are to be let by the Co. Waterford VEC for sheep grazing.

In his monthly report at last week's VEC meeting in Dungarvan, CEO Kieran Heffernan said he had been asked if the committee would consider putting sheep in to graze on the land from June until August.

Supporting the request, Cllr. Tom Cunningham said it would be good for the grounds. It was unanimously agreed to advertise the land with a local auctioneer.

### PROPOSALS TO REMOVE HISTORY FROM JUNIOR CERT

Recent proposals by the NCCA (curriculum advisory body) and the Department of Education to remove history as a core subject in the

Junior Certificate Cycle and thereby make it an optional choice, has been strenuously opposed by VEC member Paudie Geary, himself a history teacher at Dungarvan Technical College.

Speaking at last week's VEC meeting, Mr. Geary said that as a subject in our schools, "history opens up an awareness of our heritage and culture by providing an understanding of the past, an appreciation of the present and a preparation for the future". History, he declared, should therefore be retained as an essential core subject in the Junior Cert.

Should the proposal be adapted then Ireland would be one of the only countries in Europe not to include history as a mandatory subject in the junior cycle syllabus.

Mr. Geary received the unanimous backing of VEC members in his opposition to these proposals.

# Waterford Country Houses Lecture Topic

Dungarvan Museum Society's final lecture in its current winter/spring programme will have as its subject "Some Waterford Country Houses — Their History and Architecture" by Mr. William Fraher.

The talk will cover the early houses such as Ballyduff (the earliest house in Ireland for which the architect's name is known), Norrisland, Mount O'Dell, etc. Some houses such as Ballynatray have had a succession of buildings — tower house, 17th c. house and the present 18th/19th century house. Ballynatray is a wonderful example of the 18th century demense with its riverside setting of woods, ancient Abbey of St. Molana with Templemichael Castle and

Church across the river. Curraghmore House at Portlaw is one of the finest country houses in Waterford with important interiors and a beautiful landscape setting. 19th century houses will include Carriglea, Cappagh, Ardo and around the Dungarvan area houses such as Cloncoskeran, Clonea, Ballinacourty and The Hermitage. The latter was designed as a thatched Cottage Orne and was the childhood home of the artist Sarah Purser. The lecture will be

illustrated with numerous slides featuring old prints, paintings and interiors.

William Fraher has published extensively on his native Dungarvan and is author of "Dungarvan — An Architectural Inventory" (Dungarvan 1983), "The Augustinians in Abbeyside 1290 - 1990" (Dungarvan 1990), "A Guide to Historic Dungarvan" (Dungarvan 1991) and compiler of "Calendar of Minutes and Records of Dungarvan Town Commissioners and Urban District Council 1855 - 1955" (Dungarvan 1991), "Dungarvan in Old Picture Postcards" (European Library, Zaltbommel, Holland 1994). He has also contribut-

ed to "The Famine In Waterford" (Geography Publications 1995) and is a regular contributor to "Decies — The Journal of Old Waterford Society." He is a founder member and current President of Dungarvan Museum Society and was involved last year in the archaeological dig in Dungarvan Castle. His publications are now regarded as essential reference works on the Dungarvan area.

The public lecture, which will be illustrated with numerous slides featuring old prints, paintings and interiors, takes place in Lawlors Hotel this Thursday, April 25 at 8 p.m. and all are welcome.

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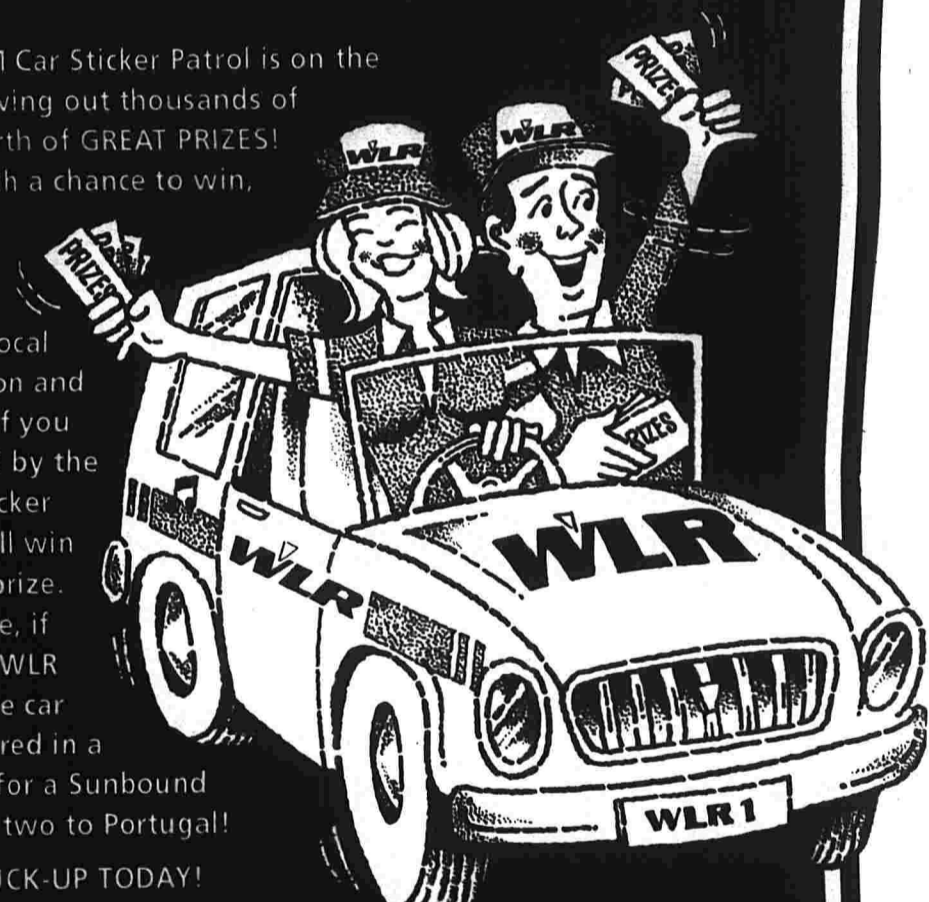
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# Lismore Notes

**Some Blooming Good Pest Killers**

THE coming of Spring doesn't only bring good things to the garden — the first of the unwelcome visitors can make their presence felt: slugs and other pests.

So I thought this week I'd talk about some blooming good pest killers, with blooming being the operative word.

If you get troubled by eelworms attacking your vegetables, grow some African marigolds. It could solve the problem in a natural way.

It is just one of many old country beliefs that experts are now taking seriously. Some plants, they've discovered, produce chemicals which can kill off or deter pests.

The African marigold is so effective against eelworm that some big Dutch bulb growers regularly put in thousands of them among their bulbs for protection. They reckon it is more effective and cheaper than chemical pesticides.

The common stinging nettle can be a source of free fertiliser if you take the trouble to prepare it. Simply cut young nettles and place them in a butt of rain water and let the mixture ferment for a month.

Then dilute it and feed it to the plants. The nettle has many nutrients, among them nitrate, phosphate, iron, silica and other salts invaluable to growing crops.

But do leave a few nettles in the garden. Endangered butterflies lay their eggs on the leaves.

Rhubarb leaves, poisonous and therefore usually thrown away, become an effective insecticide when soaked in water and the liquid, rich in oxalic acid, sprayed on fruit trees will kill many pests without harming the fruit.

Planting a piece of rhubarb stem with cabbages prevents club-rot (a fungus disease) from attacking the plants.

An old Dorset tradition for making your roses do well recommends planting onion or garlic next to the bush.

The reason is that the smell of the onion helps keep the rose pest-free, making it healthier and, therefore, sweeter-smelling.

So, if you prefer the natural way to get rid of garden pests, why not give these ideas a try?

The milking parlour is an ultra-modern 24 unit Alfa Laval Lowline which was installed in the last five years and helps keep milking time to just over one hour.

Phil says the key to quality standards is to keep cows in a clean, dry environment. The cow's tails and udders are clipped regularly, teats

are dipped after every milking and dry cow therapy and teat seal are used at drying off.

The Powers have worked hard at their dairy operation to ensure maximum output from content and healthy cows, producing top quality milk in a clean environment.

They are worthy winners of the Waterford Regional Award.

Meanwhile the 1995 winner of the Snowcream Super Supplier Award for Milk Quality emerged as top Wexford farmer, Sean Stafford of Ballyscarton, Gorey.

### SILAGE

Grass silage is the principal form of conserved winter feed in Co. Waterford. High quality, well-fermented grass silage does not just happen. It requires attention to detail in planning and ensiling. Last year, demonstrated the major influence that weather can have on the process. Nevertheless, most farmers succeeded in making better silage than they had anticipated. This week we would like to discuss the key management practices required to produce high quality grass silage.

### Fermentation

The basis of the preservation process is the conversion of grass sugars into acids. Satisfactory preservation is likely to be achieved when:

- There is sufficient sugar in the grass.
- Air is excluded from the silo.

Air in the silo, low levels of sugar in the grass and soil or slurry contamination result in the wrong type of fermentation taking place. When the pH is sufficiently low, the activity of spoilage organisms, such as Clostridia and Coliforms is suppressed. It is accepted that, provided there is adequate sugar in the grass, the natural fermentation process will proceed to a point at which a stable pH is obtained and secondary fermentation will not occur. The sugar content of grass increases with stage of maturity, while digestibility decreases. Effective sealing to exclude air prevents the activity of aerobic spoilage organisms such as yeasts and moulds.

### Nitrogen

Fertiliser, particularly Nitrogen, is essential to achieve yields and it should be applied at least six weeks before the intended cutting date if grass to use it efficiently, at all times. Phosphate and particularly Potash must balance the Nitrogen applied and be put on either through bag of fertiliser or by slurry. Use soil analysis to estimate levels of Phosphate and Potash required.

### Contamination

Aim to avoid soil and slurry contaminating the grass as this can result in a poor fermentation. Soil contamination is mainly due to scalping the ground by the forage harvester or in wet conditions by lifting mud on the wheels of the machinery. Slurry contamination can be caused by late application of slurry or heavy application prior to the second cut. Light dressings (2,000 gallons/acre) can be applied during the showery weather and within three days of cutting.

### Cutting Date

The most important single factor controlling silage quality is the stage of growth at which grass is cut. As the crop approaches ear emergence, the yield is increasing rapidly but quality begins to decline. The time at which this rapid fall occurs depends on grass species and variety. Cutting date in Waterford is usually from early May onwards and varies from year to year. Late cutting may increase yield but tends to leave a white stubble which is slow to regrow for either follow-on grazing or another silage cut. Taking heavy, late silage cuts is also likely to reduce the vigour of the sward and may mean that yields are reduced in future years

and that re-seeding will be needed more often.

### Wilting

Wilting grass prior to ensiling can have several advantages -

- The concentration of sugar in grass, under rapid conditions of wilting is increased.
  - The volume of effluent is reduced.
  - The activity of the bacteria which can lead to a bad fermentation is reduced.
- In periods of settled weather, every effort should be made to achieve a good wilt (24 hours) which also reduces the amount of grass to be handled and may speed up the whole silage making operation. However, in bad weather, persistence with wilting can lead to field losses and it may be best to either cut direct or lift the swards immediately after cutting with the mower. When direct cutting in unsettled weather, where possible, aim to start ensiling only when the crop is dry.

### Consolidation And Sealing

Silos should be filled -

- Quickly to reduce the time that grass is exposed to the air.
- Evenly to achieve uniform consolidation.
- Cleanly to minimise soil contamination.

Airtight sealing is best achieved by using side sheets along the walls of the silo with two layers of polythene sheeting weighted down over the complete surface with either tyres, bales or farm yard manure. Periodic checking of the silage cover after ensiling is also a worthwhile task. Slack in the polythene sheet can be taken up and any holes sealed immediately. If the clamp is to be re-opened for subsequent cuts, disturbance of the existing top layer should be minimised.

### Additives

There are numerous silage additives sold in the County at present. The best silage additives may be highly effective at improving silage-fermentation and may enhance animal performance when compared to silage which would have fermented satisfactorily without additive use. Nevertheless, it must be noted that they are not a 'cure all' for silage making. When large quantities of low sugar grass are ensiled in wet weather, even the most widely proven silage additives, when applied correctly, may not necessarily produce well fermented silage. For an up-to-date assessment of all silage additives consult your Teagasc adviser.

### Effluent

Silage effluent is a serious pollutant and every effort should be made to stop it entering waterways. Waterford farmers are to be complimented for their efforts in this area and you are urged to keep up the good work in order to maintain and improve on our excellent record in recent years.

Before filling the silo, repairs should be carried out to seal cracks and replace corroded concrete. In all cases, adequate collection facilities should be provided at the silo. A 300 ton silage pit could produce 4,500 gallons of effluent. Frequent checking of effluent tanks is vitally important as overflowing tanks are one of the major reasons for pollution incidence.

## ICMSA Seeks New Rules On Butter-Fat

Rules to determine whether dairy farmers are over quota for fat content in their milk are causing a great deal of uncertainty and anxiety in the sector, ICMSA Dairy Committee Chairman, Tommy Cooke has stated.

He said changes in the butterfat rules being sought by the Department of Agriculture should include a provision for the average butter-fat production figures over the previous year (or, alternatively, the two previous years) to be used as the basis to determine whether the fat quota in a current year is exceeded. Under existing rules, the current year is used as the benchmark for determining liability for excess butter-fat production.

"The difficulty with the current year rule is that producers do not know until after the end of the quota year whether or not there will be an adjustment for fat. This has caused a great deal of uncertainty and frustration for farmers who have no way of knowing whether they will be penalised," said Mr. Cooke.

He argued that calculations based on fat production over the previous year, or the average fat production over the two previous years, would be an ideal solution to the present problems. Such a system would allow farmers the opportunity to adjust deliveries to take account of how their butter-fat levels are running.

Mr. Cooke welcomed the decision of the Department of Agriculture to formally seek changes to the butter-fat rule under the quota system.

He added: "Recently ICMSA lobbied the EU Agriculture Commissioner and Commission Services to change the rule as this falls entirely within the scope of the Commission rather than the Council. Following ICMSA representation to the Minister for Agriculture, Ireland will seek changes to the rule at the Dairy Management Committee."

## IFA Calls On CPSU To Lift Embargo

Waterford IFA Animal Health Committee Chairman, John Hobbs, has said that farmers were the innocent victims of the Civil Service Union's dispute with the Department of Agriculture. Mr. Hobbs added: "Livestock farmers are already suffering severe financial hardship with the collapse in beef cattle prices arising from the BSE scare."

The Waterford IFA man said it is unacceptable that the sale of cattle is also being disrupted because new cattle identity cards are not being issued and the results

of bovine brucellosis blood tests are not being returned to farmers. Furthermore, there is an embargo on the implementation of the new TB and Brucellosis Eradication Schemes directly affecting the issuing of the second phase of testing.

Mr. Hobbs called on the CPSU in the interest of the agriculture industry that they serve, to immediately lift embargo on new work at this crucial time for the whole sector. "Negotiations should be resumed with the Government to resolve outstanding issues," he said.

## I.F.A. Leader Calls For Positive Role From Meat Factories

IFA President, John Donnelly has called on Irish meat factories to "play a responsible and positive role in alleviating the current BSE cattle crisis." Mr. Donnelly insisted factories should submit an EU beef intervention tender this week of 15,000 tonnes at a price close to £1/lb.

Mr. Donnelly said it was time when all sectors of the industry must pull their

weight and optimise the EU Beef Management Committee decision of last Friday in order to shift the backlog of 50,000 cattle that now was accumulated with specialist Winter feeders.

The IFA leader said as well as tackling the volume of cattle overhanging the market, the factories had a duty to pitch the price of this week's critical tender at a realistic level of close to £1/lb.

## Illegal Growth Promoters Must Be Stamped Out

— Farmers Must Learn From BSE Calamity

ICMSA President, Mr. Frank Allen, today said there is no place in his association for farmers who use illegal substances such as angel dust.

Mr. Allen expressed his regret at media reports of the garda discovery of a distribution centre for illegal growth promoters in Co. Monaghan.

He said the recent introduction by the Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Ivan Yates, T.D., of the new measures to counter the use of illegal growth promoting substances must be welcomed by anyone interested in the future prosperity of the Irish agriculture sector.

Mr. Allen appealed to the very few farmers using such substances to stop doing so immediately.

He said he was quite satisfied from the very stringent surveillance procedures in

place already that the use of illegal growth promoters is at an absolute minimum.

He went on: "Irish farmers must learn from the catastrophe caused by BSE. It is in the best interest of all beef producers, both in the short term, and long term that we can absolutely guarantee the wholesomeness of our beef and its freedom from all impurities. Any other approach will destroy everybody's livelihood."

"The 99% plus of upright farmers should exert their own influence to ensure that their livelihoods are not endangered by a few unscrupulous and greedy individuals," declared Mr. Allen.

He assured the Minister of the support of ICMSA with his efforts to prevent the use of any substances which would damage the Irish beef industry.

## Area Aid And Maps Mix-up Cannot Be Allowed To Hold Up Premium And Headage Payments — I.F.A.

Waterford IFA County Chairman James Coughlan has said that the widespread problems with maps associated with the 1996 Area Aid Application from the Department of Agriculture must not interfere with premium, headage and tillage aid payments to farmers.

"Under no circumstances can any livestock or tillage farmers be short-changed on their premium, headage or tillage aid payments in 1996 because of the difficulties involved in the issue of area aid maps to farmers by the Department of Agriculture and the industrial action by some Department staff."

Mr. Coughlan pointed out

that it appears a large number of the area aid maps sent out by the Department of Agriculture under the new Land Parcel Identification System introduced this year are either incorrect or incomplete.

Mr. Coughlan said it is critical for all farmers to make an area aid application on or before the closing date of Tuesday 30th April, 1996 with or without the correct maps. "If a farmer is in a position to correct maps received from the Department of Agriculture he should do so. However, if this is not possible, it is essential that all farmers complete their area aid application by Tuesday 30th April, 1996."

## THE BROTHERS

The Brothers were teachers and moulders of exceptional commitment. Almost all of their waking moments were at the service of the young lads entrusted to them and this indefatigable discharge of their duties and their eagerness to exceed the strict demands of duty showed them to be men of remarkable single-mindedness and dedication. Present in the classroom each morning well in advance of official class time and still labouring diligently late into the evening they willingly engaged in all manner of extra-curricular activity for the advancement of young boys.

Their own school stationery was on sale and their school text books were publications I still haven't forgotten and were in themselves an inspiration. Those texts were very reasonably priced and many a poor man's son was spared the embarrassment of admitting inability to pay by an understanding Christian Brother who discreetly waved payment. Much publicity was given to the Department of Education's free book scheme and later on, the free travel scheme was officially trumpeted from on high. Well the Brothers were far in advance of these developments and were pioneers of welfare assistance to necessitous families whenever a genuine case presented itself. They supplied free education many years before Donnacha O'Malley made it government policy.

I have fond memories of Br. Flatley, an Bráthair Ó Flaithille, who was in the secondary school at a time I was in the primary. Br. Flatley was a Galwayman and a native Irish speaker. He always wore the gold Fáinne thus proclaiming his strong preference for Irish. Whenever he met any pupil, even the tiniest lad in first class, he engaged him in gentle conversation. We all liked to meet him because he was so quiet and gentle and his Irish so clear and simple that none of us felt in the slightest bit intimidated. Brother Flatley's mild character had an uplifting influence on the school and he achieved high academic success during his time in Dungarvan.

Br. Lyons was a man of extraordinary energy. A science teacher, he was a hard worker in class and tireless in pursuit of excellence. He had a unique sense of humour and his standard 'punny' joke for newcomers to his class was a promise to

prove that a sheet of writing paper was equal to a lazy dog. "A sheet of writing paper," he began, "is an ink-lined plane. An ink-lined plane is a slope up. And a slow pup is a lazy dog."

He waited patiently for a response to his dazzling pun, smiling encouragingly as his eyes swept the inert class. To hear the penny eventually drop was his greatest satisfaction.

Perhaps the Christian Brother who left the greatest imprint on Dungarvan C.B.S. was Br. Murray or Br. M. D. O Muireadhaigh. A strict disciplinarian, at a time when all pupils were amenable to discipline and when parents supported school authorities without question, Br. Murray was to the forefront in raising academic standards and introducing educational innovations. He made a big impact on the games scene setting ambitious targets for the premier secondary school teams. The players' response gave the school teams a high status in Munster Colleges competitions during a period when Br. Murray was Chairman of the provincial colleges ruling body. I have some photographs still of our school hurling team, a combination which included Mick Shalloe, Johnny O'Connor, Maurice McHugh, Tom Cunningham and Donal Whelan afterwards to distinguish themselves in the Waterford jersey.

A great bond existed between the members of our team and that closeness was further cemented when Br. Murphy set up Na Sáirséaligh, a team of minors drawn from the ranks of the C.B.S. We had two good teams, the football squad winning the 1946 County Final in a replay, by the startling score 0-1 to 0-0 !!!

I can't even remember rightly who got our one point total - I think it was Jimmy O'Mahony now in New York - but I do recall that the day was wild, wet and windy, that the 'pitch' was near KilmacThomas, that it resembled a benign bog and was a field "kindly lent" by a local farmer (a not uncommon feature of G.A.A. life in those days).

The Minor hurling team was a far more potent force but came up against a really fine Cappoquin team which featured Billy Conway, Michael Kelleher, Joe Flynn and Micky O'Connor, men who spearheaded Waterford's great Minor All-Ireland success in 1948. Still ours was the stronger outfit but in a misguided zeal for a neutral venue, the Western Board fixed the game for Modeligo

where, at the time, there was only an academic interest in hurling. The field was a broad meadow with enough succulent grass to feed a boat-load of Libya - bound steers so the game developed into a war of attrition in the long grass with Cappoquin one point ahead at the final whistle. They went on to win the title.

Br. Murray had an acerbic sense of humour with a penchant for the caustic comment but like Goldsmith's Village Schoolmaster "if severe in aught, the love he bore for learning was at fault." He did many unobtrusive, kind acts to further the careers of former pupils. I had personal experience of his kindness after I had qualified as a teacher. With no permanent appointment, I sought temporary work wherever it was available and Br. Murray employed me while he secured temporary employment for me as a substitute in first Carlow C.B.S. and then Enniscorthy C.B.S. where I remained until my appointment to Tallow. Again, in the tradition of the Brothers, he pursued a pupil's interests long after he (the pupil) had fled the nest so to speak. He enjoyed a long life after leaving Dungarvan and transferring to Tralee and Limerick. What I remember most about his latter years was his love of motoring and how his performance behind the wheel drove the fear of God into every other road user !!!

Whenever I think of the great work of the Brothers, I feel both humble and grateful. Certainly there were some members of the order who were a reproach to it but, by and large, they were admirable men to whom Ireland (and other countries too) owe a huge debt of gratitude. Their founder, Edmund Ignatius Rice is due for beatification later this year. Let that occasion be a celebration of a succession of educators and inspirers who shaped and moulded the soul of Ireland over the best part of 100 years and whose memory will remain ever green to any Christian Brother's boy.

### PLAYERS' INSURANCE

A bone of contention for many years has been the G.A.A.'s insurance of it's players. Successive schemes bore a variety of flaws but it must be impossible to devise a scheme which would give complete cover to the injured and at the same time, not be open to abuse by the unscrupulous and dishonest.

The current G.A.A. Players' Injury Scheme, managed by Coyle/Hamilton is a reasonable one. It covers the players' loss of wages (excluding the first week) to a maximum of 28 weeks at £100 per week. Unrecoverable medical and dental expenses with the exception of the first £50 of each claim, are paid up to a maximum of £1,000. No adult hurler finds this sufficient but it is assumed that every regular club player will take out personal insurance which would fully recompensate him in the event of an accident. Many players have this type of cover and if I were playing competitively today, I would do just that. So it is incumbent on our wage-earning players to ease their minds and protect themselves by taking out personal insurance.

## Council Seeks Compensation For Recent Oil Pollution

Waterford County Council together with two other local authorities are to pursue the insurers of the Liberian-registered Sea Empress after it was confirmed last week that the crude oil cargo carrier was responsible for the recent pollution of the South East and South Coast.

Small globules of oil, which originated from the Milford Haven disaster in Wales were washed up on Tramore, Clonea beach, and subsequently the Cumnigar and Ardmore where they lodged in between the shingles. The pollution initially began around St. Patrick's weekend when Council workers worked round the clock to clean up the county's scenic coastal locations. Samples of the oil which

was washed up on the coastline were sent to the Fisheries Research Centre of the Marine Institute in Dublin and results of the analysis showed that the breached oil matches the certified samples of the Sea Empress crude cargo oil. A major clean up operation of the affected areas has already cost the Council substantial financial resources described by County Engineer John O'Flynn as

"money we can ill afford to spend".

Speaking at a recent Council meeting, Mr. O'Flynn said that the danger now is that the oil globules will get buried in the sand, where it could be unearthed by children or dogs during the summer season.

### POLLUTER PAYS

Minister of State at the Department of the Marine, Eamon Gilmore said it was Government policy to pursue the 'polluter pays' principle whereby polluters are held liable for damage caused and costs involved in clean up operations. A special claims office has been set up in Milford

Haven by the Insurers of the Sea Empress to process all claims resulting from the oil spill.

Waterford Co. Council is currently formulating their claim for the costs involved in the clean up of the beaches and will be submitting them to that office within the next week. It is estimated that the claim is likely to be for several thousand pounds.

Meanwhile, the Council is continuing to monitor the beaches and coastline in case of further oil being washed ashore. Some minor clean up work in Ardmore, Tramore, Bunmahon and Clonea is still ongoing.

## Keep Cool In The Heat

WHAT is worse than feeling hot and sticky in warm weather? More perspiration is attacked by bacteria. Personal hygiene is a must in warm weather.

Anti-perspirants are the most effective way of dealing with odour. They constrict the skins pores which prevents moisture from escaping. They also contain a deodorant which will keep you smelling fresh all day.

Deodorants unlike anti-perspirants disguise odours with a fresh smell. The most popular deodorants are creams or roll-ons, however if sharing a deodorant with anybody else an aerosol is probably the most hygienic. The body can become immune to deodorants, so it is worth changing brands occasionally. Deodorants should be applied to clean dry under arms a few minutes after washing.

It is not just heat that causes us to perspire. Fear, stress and vigorous exercise also cause this. Some people are more prone to heavy sweating. 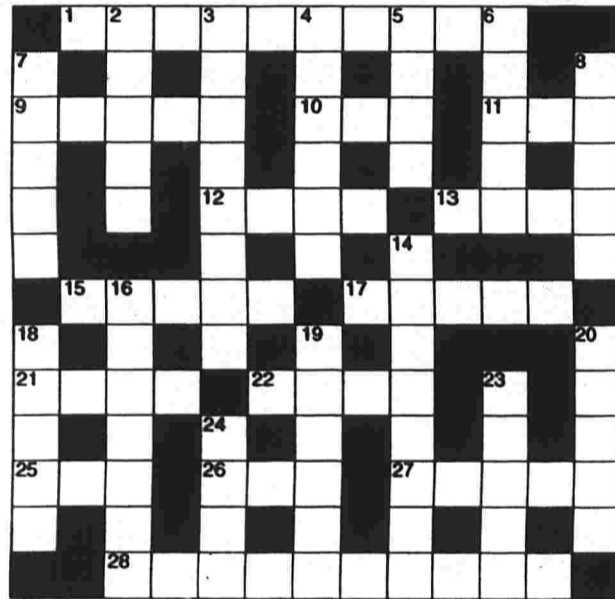

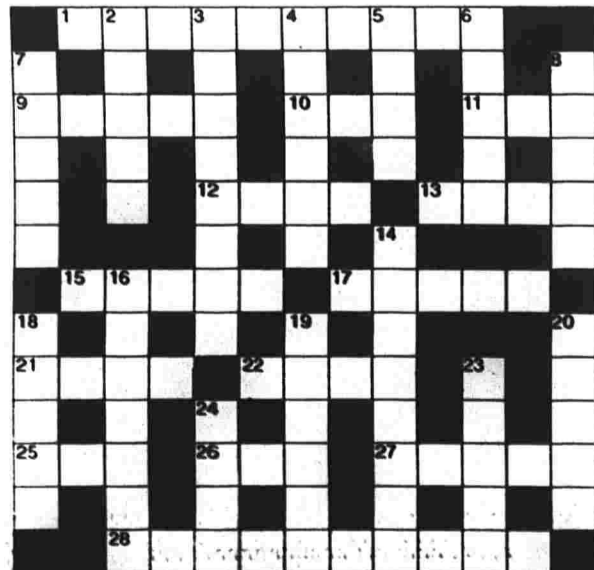

• Spoon into a greaseproof paper lined 2 1/2pt (1.4 litre) pudding basin. Half-fill a roasting tin with boiling water, place basin in centre and cover with greased foil. Bake at 375°F, 190°C, Gas 5 for 40 mins.

• For sauce, gently melt sugar, butter and evaporated milk in a non-stick pan. Bring to the boil and stir for about 5-10 mins until toffee sauce thickens. Turn out pudding and pour the sauce to serve.

# Family Health

**Q. My son was lucky enough to get a job on a farm about twelve months ago, which was what he wanted to do. The trouble is that a few weeks ago he developed brucellosis. Is this a serious condition? I am worried about other members of the family contacting it even though my son lives away from home.**

**A. Brucellosis can be a serious condition. It occurs mainly among the farming community, those working in the meat industries and vets. Brucellosis can also be spread by the consumption of dairy or milk products which are infected. In your particular circumstances you have no cause for concern regarding the spread to other family members. The symptoms of brucellosis are similar to those of 'flu'. They also resemble other illnesses, which can make diagnosis difficult. When diagnosis is made early, prompt treatment gives very satisfactory results. Features of the illness include muscle pains, sweating and fever. The chronic form of the illness is worrying as patients can feel depressed and lethargic for some time. Relapses can occur, but early recognition and treatment helps to prevent this.**

**Q. I've developed ridges across my fingernails. Otherwise the nails and cuticles seem fine. What**

**could have caused this?**  
**A. I suspect these are Beau's lines - horizontal ridges which represent periods of arrested nail growth. They tend to occur at times of serious illness. Since it takes several months for the nails to grow, your episode of ill health was probably some time ago. No treatment is necessary as the ridges will grow out with the nail.**

**Q. A girl in our office developed shingles on her chest. It was a fairly mild attack - and she said she felt well enough to work. Her doctor said it was alright for her to work while she still had the rash - which surprised us. What are the chances of one of us contacting it?**

**A. After a dose of chickenpox, the virus that causes shingles can lie dormant in the nerve roots of your spinal cord. The virus may become reactivated by stress, other illness or for no apparent reason and then spreads along the nerve causing the painful rash of shingles. The virus is found in the blisters of both chickenpox and shingles, so it is possible to catch chickenpox (but not shingles) from someone with shingles. Since 99% of the adults in your office will have the chickenpox as children, there is little risk of anyone being infected. The doctors decision to allow her to go to work is a reasonable one.**

## Household Hints

1. After cleaning brass and copperware, apply a good floor polish and rub with a soft duster for excellent results.
2. While slimming, don't cut down on fats too drastically or your health and skin may suffer. Fat remains for a long time in your stomach and prevents a hungry feeling. It helps to bum up starches.
3. Finger marks on polished furniture usually come off with a cloth dipped in paraffin.
4. Coffee stains can be removed by brushing the marks with glycerine, then rinsing with lukewarm water and pressing on the reverse side with a cool iron.
5. Dried mowings tend to collect in the cylinder fins of petrol mowers. Always remove these otherwise engine cooling may be affected. Work out the worst with a piece of wire and finish the job with a rough brush.

### THE STATE OF UNDERAGE HURLING IN WEST WATERFORD

Dear Sir — Minor hurling has been the poor relation to the other championships in the West of the county for a long number of years and it's the fault of the officers of the Western Board and the County Board who have done nothing to foster hurling in the county.

Now that minors are preparing to sit the Leaving Cert., the Boards in their wisdom decided to run the minor hurling championship up to the middle of May. In the "A" championship there are five teams, that means four games. What's wrong with the whole summer to play the championship as the parents keep telling them that now is the time to study, you have the whole summer to play hurling, but for some teams the championship is over.

My view is that the Board just want to get the under-age championships out of the way as they are a bother and the real championships are the junior and intermediate.

In five or six years time we will be down to ten-a-side hurling as the kids themselves are fed up with three or four games a year, whereas they can play soccer every Sunday.

I felt I had to write this letter as we are in a very sorry state now for a good number of years.

The majority of the minor clubs come under their club juvenile committee and the mentors in charge have no say at Western Board affairs, so why not hand the minor grades over to Bord na nOg who do a great job of running their championships and who show great leeway where juvenile affairs are concerned.

I would like to call on the County Board Chairman to call a forum to get the views of the people who are worried with the state of hurling, especially under-age hurling in the county.

One minor hurling All-Ireland appearance in 48 years, is it good enough? Therefore, why not leave the kids study for exams without having their teachers and their parents coming down on them for playing a game they love — hurling.

# Ned Power Mount Odell

## —A Sporting Story

The sporting life of Mount Odell's Ned Power has and continues to be filled with enjoyment, commitment and success. As an athlete who dominated many sports meetings in the 1930's, a G.A.A. player who played officially with a minimum of seven clubs, a boxer, a road bowler, a greyhound trainer and a long time supporter of Tottenham Hotspur from his years in England, it is refreshing to meet with a man with an unblinkered view of sport and who epitomises its true meaning.

Born in 1914 in Mapstown, Dungarvan, Ned's parents were Margaret and James Power and their house was situated on the site of the current home of Ned O'Brien. Ned grew up in a sporting atmosphere, his father being a founder member of Brickey Rangers G.A.A. who this year are celebrating their centenary. Their family later moved to Lisfennel where they worked on the farm of George Cummins for going on thirty years.

### FIRST RACE

Ned Power was first introduced to athletics as a 14 year old at the Dungarvan C.B.S. Schools Sports at the Gaelic Field. He won three sprint races which wetted his appetite for further com-

petition. He journeyed with Paddy McGrath and Maurice Milleadha to the Nire Valley Sports at the Mill Field where he surprised many with a clearcut win in the open one hundred yards final. A self confessed caf-fler, Ned once broke his ankle 'collecting' apples one evening but Mrs. Murphy, The Sweep successfully treated his injury and so his sporting future was not threatened.

### BUSY SCENE

The youthful Ned Power had entered a sporting and very active athletic scene. Large numbers regularly attended training and sessions under Mr. Nolan, Chemist, Main Street at Willie Curran's field, Lisfennel which was properly marked out. From those years, Ned remembers such as Martin and Stephen Curran and Johnny McGrath, Twomilebridge, Mons. Paddy Lannon, Fr. Jim Sullivan, Dec Goode, Joe Power (Bakery), Willie Brien and John and Jimmy Murphy, The Sweep, Willie Claxton, Ballyneety, Davy Galvin, Christy O'Connor, Michael Nagle and Tom Fitzgerald as athletes of note.

Though a useful sprinter of himself, along with Jimmy Murphy, The Sweep, Ned remembers Mons. Paddy Lan-

non as the pick of the bunch and a sprinter of real potential. Another Sweep man, Willie Brien, was a top middle distance runner, his best event being the 800 metres while Martin Curran was a very good cyclist and a competitor that was as tough as nails. A Limerick man, Christy O'Connor, was working in Nolan's Chemist at the time and his brother J.J. was a miler of national reputation, running 4 minutes 10 seconds for the mile at a time when the four minute barrier had not yet been achieved. Martin Curran's sister Cathy Carey was a talented cyclist and she could give the men a minute and a half lead from The Square and still reach the top of Ring Cross before them. At sports meetings, Tom Fitzgerald, The Sweep could throw the 5616 shot 27 feet as a mark for the competitors but they rarely managed to meet the mark. If he competed regularly himself, he would have been one of the top throwers of his day.

### SUIT LENGTHS, TEAPOTS AND SILVER CUPS

Ned Power competed at sports meetings throughout the 1930's when a one shilling entry fee allowed the athlete into as many

events as he wished. On one such occasion in the Gaelic Field, Ned won a suit length for first place in the 220 yards. He then won a similar prize for his brother in the 880 yards and in winning the High Jump with a leap of 5 feet 9 inches, he received a suit case in which to bring his prizes home !!! In those years, sports meetings in Abbeyside were held over right the Hermitage and for his victories, Ned won a silver teapot for three successive years.

In 1936 a silver cup was the prize for the best all-round athlete at the Youghal Sports Meeting. Ned and his friends cycled up The Sweep to compete for the trophy which soon turned into a head to head between the Lisfennel man and a jumper named Barry from Lismore. Ned won the 100, 200, 400 and 800 but as Barry won the High Jump, Long Jump and Hop Step and Jump, Ned competed in an unusual event for him, the 16 Pound Shot where he finished second, securing for him the all-round silver cup which he duly brought back on the bar of his bike to his home in Lisfennel. That was 60 years ago but the genuine pride in winning, it is still as fresh in his memory today.

Though not winning, one

of Ned Power's greatest achievements came in 1935 when working as a volunteer in The Curragh. He took on the Irish 800 metres Champion, Paul Keogh and he was pipped by half a foot in a thrilling race.

### FOOTBALL AND HURLING

At tea-time, one evening in 1939, the Power household in Lisfennel was visited by Paddy Slattery and Francie Flynn who were on their way to the Channel Islands. Before the supper was finished, the emigration party had increased to three and Ned Power's athletic career was halted to be followed on his return by further enjoyment and success with the Brickey Rangers and other G.A.A. clubs during the 1940's.

Prior to his departure, Ned won two Waterford Senior Football medals with Dungarvan in 1937 and 1938 and on his return, he joined the Brickey Rangers championship trail which yielded a County Junior Football title in 1941 and the hurling and football double in the same grade in 1945. The hurling team defeated Dungarvan, who had their future All-Ireland stars of 1948 on board, in the 1946 Senior Championship by a handsome score and in the final against Erin's Own when they conceded a late goal and lost by a point, the Brickeys true hurling potential would have been recorded on the roll of Waterford Senior Hurling Champions.

Known in his time as Ned, Ed and Nedeon, he played as Jim Power in the 1943 Birmingham Hurling Championship final at full-back on the winning Warrickshire team, his brother, having returned home after the semi-final.

Abbeyside's Jimmy Terry was a selector on the team and Ned later presented his brother, who was rated a skillful hurler, with the winning medal. Ned Power also played with Eire Og, Abbeyside and the Nire. When working in Cork in the late

1940's where he met his wife Patricia, who hailed from Mayfield, he played with St. Finbarr's and he hurled against Christy Ring and Jack Lynch. He also lined out with Cork side, Kilmurray. Ned's abiding memory of these years is the memory of these years who he classed as fine players with a great pride in their club.

### BOXING, BOWLING AND BUILDING

Ned Power spent much of his working life on the buildings. Locally he worked for Thomas McGrath and he was on the building of the cinema and one hundred and thirty nine houses in Dungarvan. When he married in 1950, he and Patricia emigrated to Finchley, North London and he worked for McAlpines and Hills until his retirement.

Prior to his second bout of emigration which lasted thirty years, Ned joined the active boxing scene in Dungarvan where he and his clubmates were trained by Jamsie Hayes and Sergeant John 'Boy' Murphy in a hall in Chapel Lane. His boxing weight was 11 stone 10 and he and Peter Crotty, Paddy Donoghue, Tom Cowming, Jadda Power, John Michael Street, Matty Barry, John Downey, Do Do Daniels and Robbie Walsh regularly travelled to tournaments in Portlaw, Waterford and Tramore.

On the road bowling scene, Ned spent many happy days between Lisfennel and The Marine and sometimes from The Marine to Kiely's Cross with Peter Crotty and a Mr. Pettrell who worked in John Crotty's Hardware. Ned and Peter walked and ran the return journey via Towler's Glen and they were usually practically home before Pettrell caught them on his bicycle. Ned's social life centred around dancing on the hob in Kenneally's at Pulla where a game of skittles and a bottle of orange was also enjoyed.

## The Dogs-Ned's Favourite Sport

There is no doubt but Ned Power's favourite sport, matched only by his wife Patricia's enthusiasm, is greyhound racing. Their successful line of Odell dogs has brought them great pleasure but perhaps they also have a line to the man above as their long time family friend, Fr. Jim Sullivan was the first to hold their most famous dog Odell Supreme when he was born.

The Powers first got involved in dogs in England in the mid 1970's with Power's Equal who won seven races in a row. Ned and Patricia, who have two daughters Margaret and Noreen and two sons Hugh and James as well as seven grandchildren, returned to Ireland in 1980 where they set up their home and kennels in Mount Odell in the Brickey Valley.

Daughter of Power's Equal, Odell Tansey won thirteen races and her daughter Odell Supreme won countless races including 14 victories on the trot. Supreme, Yankee and King were regular winners for the Powers in the 1980's. Odell Yankee won the Ryan Puppy Cup in Cork in 1985, Odell Supreme won the Guinness Stake in Cork and the Waterford Crystal stakes in 1986 and Odell King won the Kantogher Co-Op Laurels in 1988.

Their most notable achievement was surely the Anglo-Irish International in 1986 with Odell Supreme when the 'black' won both legs, the 525 yards in Wimbledon and the 550 yards in Shelbourne Park. Before or since, no other dog has won both legs. Primarily a sprinter, Supreme was expected to 'die' towards the end of both races but her trainer Ned got every last effort out of her. She is now thirteen years old and along with Yankee, Valley and the Powers other former greats, is now enjoying her well deserved retirement in Mount Odell.

Dungarvan Urban District Council acknowledged the Power's contribution to greyhound racing when they awarded them a reception in 1988. Their last big winner was Odell Valley who won the Guinness Stakes in 1991 and the Cork Plastics Stakes in 1992.

Ned Power's appetite for sport continues after practically 70 years involvement in it. He is currently training Odell Sail and Odell Rock from whom he expects great things with Sail, already winning three races and he was the fastest of 60 dogs in Waterford last Saturday week.

Ned's sporting story is an example to us all. Irrespective of success or defeat, he participated in and enjoyed whatever activity came his way, a policy he pursues to this very day.

Kerry U-21 game contained the following paragraph and I quote: "Last week a new Coisde na Peil was appointed in the county and if this committee are given the authority to take the football problems by the scruff of the neck, as they intend doing, who knows, but that something positive will emerge. 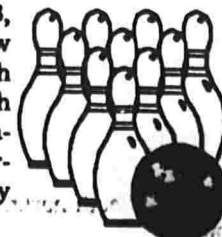

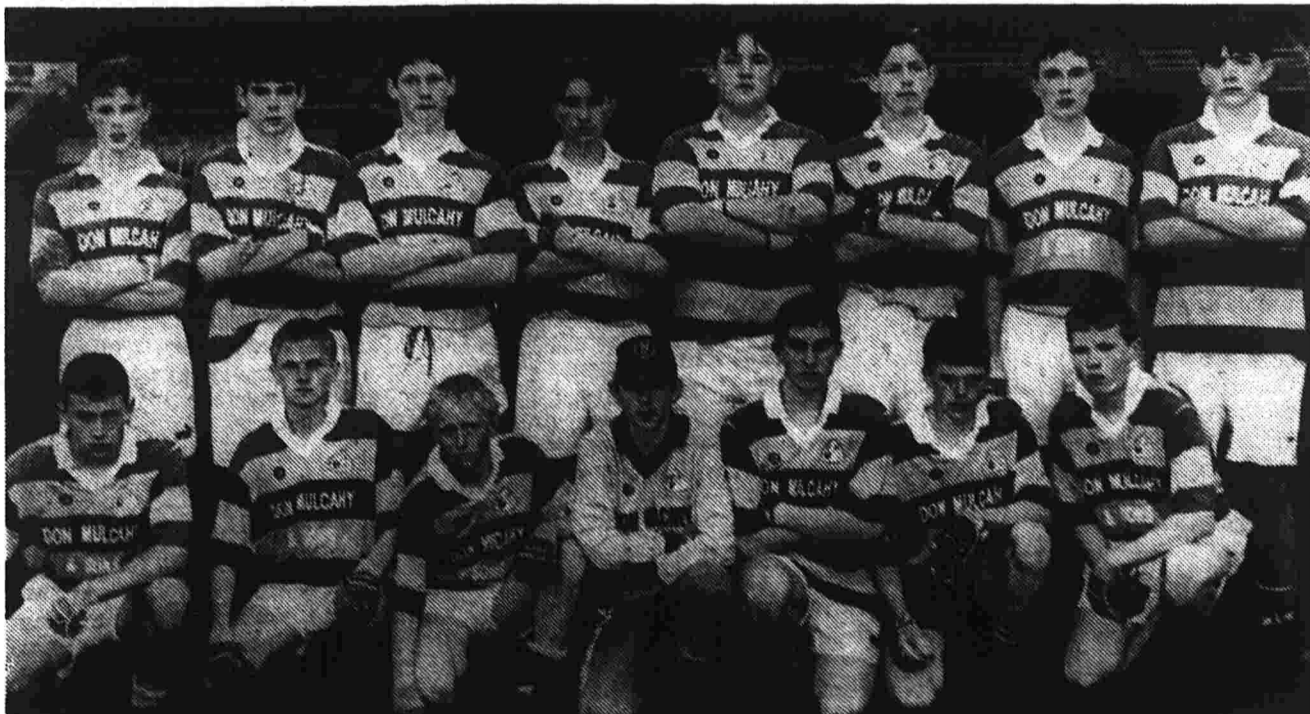

The G.A.C. were due to meet on Monday night to review the situation with a view to seeing if they can be fitted in without disrupting the full schedule.

## Launch of Golf Classic

The 1996 County Board Golf Classic was launched at the Granville Hotel, Waterford on Tuesday evening of last week and the organising committee showed tremendous enthusiasm about making this the most successful of the tournaments which have helped the funding of county teams over the past number of years.

The 'Classic' will take place at the West Waterford Golf course on the weekend of Friday, May 31 and Saturday, June 1. This is on the eve of the Waterford v Tipperary senior hurling Munster championship game at Walsh Park.

The purpose of the tournament is to help finance the training and travelling of our eight intercounty teams, which in any given year, cost in the region of £100,000. This is one of the chief fund-raising efforts on behalf of the Board and it is imperative that it will succeed.

Each club unit will be asked to enter a team (there will be special prizes for the best GAA team). This year's competition will embrace a team of four players to play two fourball, aggregate of both scores to count with maximum handicap of 20 (men), 28 (ladies). The entry fee is £250 per team.

The cost includes meals for all participants. Time sheets and entry forms are available from the Secretary, Pat Murphy, West Waterford Golf Club.

## RESULTS

On the quietest weekend since the championships got underway, there were only three matches played (in addition to the round of minor games on Friday).

At Fraher Field on Saturday evening, the 1995 intermediate football champions, Kill, shocked Sliabh gCua in a close and very exciting game that attracted a small crowd because of the poor weather conditions. In their first game, Kill played a draw with Bonmahon and as this game went into its final minutes, it looked as if they would again be sharing the points.

However, a last gap point gave the points to Kill. Interestingly, Kill, who have won and drawn a game, are the table-toppers with three points. The final score was: Kill 2-7, Sliabh gCua 2-6.

## U-21 FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

In the two matches played, there were wins for An Gaeltacht who defeated Lismore decisively on a 2-9 to 0-2 scoreline and also for St. Olivers who had six points to spare over Kilgobinet at Fraher Field.

## M.H. Championships

This weekend marks the start of the minor hurling championship and a full round in both 'A' and 'B' championships is fixed.

In the top championship, which is a miserable competition with only five teams participating, we have first round matches involving Abbeyside versus Dungarvan at the Fraher Field and Tallow v. Lismore at Ballyduff. Fourmilewater have a bye.

In the 'B' minor championship all eight teams will play as follows: Stradbally v. Colligan at Abbeyside and Clashmore will take on St. Olivers at Cappoquin; Gaeltacht will play Ardmore at Dungarvan C.G. and Cappoquin and Naomh Brid will be at Colligan for their tie.

All these games are at 7 p.m. on Friday and a further round will be played on the following Friday. In all, a total of four rounds will be played before the championship is called off until after the summer examinations.

## COUNTY BOARD

The Senior Board will not meet until the second Monday, May 13 and their chief concern will be finance and championship progress. Also high on the agenda will be the arrangements for the Munster Championship game at Walsh Park and the arrangements for the distribution of stand and bank tickets. By this time the grounds will have been inspected by the Provincial Council officials who, hopefully, will have certified it suitable for the playing of the game.

## Western Board Meeting

A full meeting of delegates will take place at Lawlor's Hotel on Wednesday week, May 1, to deal with referees reports and to be given an outline of championship progress and plans.

One of the main items for discussion will be consideration of the referee's report of the abandoned Affane v. St. Olivers minor football game played at Bushy Park two weeks ago. Both clubs have been summoned to attend.

## ACCIDENT SCHEME INJURIES

The G.A.A. Accident Scheme which was introduced to ease the final hardships on injured players and which shows an annual loss, recently issued its report for the year ended February 8, 1996 and gave some very interesting details of the type of claims submitted for the various types of injuries sustained in playing the games.

The total number of claims (injuries) dealt with amounted to a grand total of 3,256, made up as follows:

Leinster 1,222, Munster 1,114, Connacht 378 and Ulster 524.

Because of the fact that there are nearly twice as many members playing football, the number of injuries (and claims), related to football:

The total there was 2,078 while for hurling the number was 1,178.

The greatest number of claims was for knee injuries - 393 (football) and 112 (hurling); ankle 220 (football) and 79 (hurling); leg 207 (football) and 67 (hurling); shoulder 169 (football) and 48 (hurling); collarbone 93 (football) and 29 (hurling).

In cases where injuries in hurling were greater we had - teeth 261 (hurling) and 240 (football); hand 104 (hurling) and 63 (football); and finger injuries numbered 110 in hurling and 77 in football. The number of wrist injury claims was three times greater in football (72) as against 24 in hurling. Of the total number of claims, only one related to a death and that was in football.

The number of claims in 1996 was more than 400 greater than in the previous year. In all a total of £1,376,509 was paid out last year and this exceeded by £35,000 the amount that was taken in.

## Cisde Na Peil

The new Cisde na Peil was installed last week when they held their first meeting since their election by the County Board on April 1. Tommy O'Keefe is Chairman and Fr. Pat Moran is Secretary. Declan Barron is the representative to the County Board. The County Chairman, P. J. Ryan chaired the meeting and heard the views of the members on what the role of the committee should be.

One of the prime objectives of the new Cisde will be the restoration of the right to nominate the county football selectors, which was very successfully done by them until this year, when the County Board decided to change the system. Their submissions proposing terms of reference will be submitted to the June meeting of the County Board.

# Twenty Junior Hurling Teams In Action

## Sargent Cup S.H. Resumes For Round Three

Over the coming weekend the Divisional Boards will set their adult championship programme in progress and here in the West we have some splendid contests down for decision with the best of the action being enjoyed at the Cappoquin venue where four of the ten junior hurling ties will be played.

On the senior front, the battle for the Sargent Cup continues and with a number of clubs reaching the point of no return as far as winning is concerned, these pointless teams can be expected to make a big effort to return to winning form. With the weatherman in a very ugly mood at the moment, some changes in the venues are possible, so in the interests of economy, it will be wise to check with

the local club before travelling.

**J.H.C. GERALDINES v. MODELIGO**

Last year was not a great one for Modeligo, but interestingly, one of their better performances was against Geraldines who were then the reigning Western champions. Geraldines were the winners, having scored 3-11 as against 3-5 for Modeligo.

It is another year and things may have changed, one way or another, but at the same time it would be foolish not to install Geraldines as favourites here.

**KILGOBINET v. KILROSSANTY**

This should be another good one on the opening day of the championships and with both sides having gone very close last year, they will

be anxious to get off to a winning start here at Abbey-side on Saturday evening.

Both reached the closing stages last year and clashed in the quarter final which eventually resulted in a narrow win for Kilgobinet, who were then installed as firm favourites to take the divisional title after a battle with Lismore's second strings.

Things did not work out that way, however, as Lismore fought back in the closing stages to snatch the title from their disappointed opponents on a 3-5 to 1-7 scoreline.

Kilgobinet will be slight favourites to repeat their win of last year, but I see it as a very open game.

**BALLINAMEELA v. TOURIN**

Both sides had a good run in last season's championship race, but both fell by the wayside as the competition neared the finish.

Each had some splendid wins before eventually meeting at a late stage in the league section. It was a great contest that finished with Ballinameela winning by the only goal of the game on a 1-8 to 0-8 scoreline. I have no doubt but that the Tom Fives will be going full throttle in this game in an effort to get off to a winning start, but I wouldn't bank on this happening for sure.

**CLASHMORE v. ARDMORE**

Clashmore, in my book, were one of the most impressive sides in the junior hurling championship last year, but losing a couple of matches by a small margin eventually cost them dearly. I saw them score a splendid win over Kilrossanty and their total score of 1-14 came after some very good efforts. They were also in tremendous form against Tourin (and in which they also scored 1-14) and in my view were afterwards unlucky not to qualify.

Ardmore were not as impressive last season and were out of the running at a fairly early stage. One of their better displays was against next Sunday's opponents, but the favourites there, Clashmore, won on a 3-9 to 2-6 scoreline. Coincidentally, it was also a first

round match.

Clashmore will be strongly fancied to win this tie in the feature game at Cappoquin on Sunday.

**GLEN ROVERS v. BRICKEYS**

This is a 'B' championship game and the Melleray based side will be fancied to win now that they are back out of the 'A' championship. Brickey's, who are foremost a football club, played in that not to be forgotten divisional 'B' final against Seana Phobal before a very exciting gathering at Fraher Field and in a hectic finish lost on an 0-10 to 0-9 scoreline.

**OTHER GAMES**

The other matches in the junior championship are in the 'B' or in the second string section. The second string section which merges with the championship proper at a later stage in the season, was given a boost last year, when Lismore's second string team took the title.

In this section, Lismore will be odds on favourites to beat Ring in the evening match at Cappoquin and Dungarvan may prove too strong for Cappoquin at Lismore.

Ballyduff v. Abbeyside's 'A' team at Tallow will be close while Abbeyside's 'B' team will play their first ever match in the grade when they clash with Old Parish at Bushy Park on Sunday.

The only other game in the senior section will involve Tallow and Fourmilewater at Lismore on Saturday evening and the outcome of this one is anyone's guess.

**SARGENT CUP GAMES BALLYDUFF v. ST. MOLLERANS**

This is the opening match at Fraher Field and the likely outcome will see Ballyduff score an impressive win over the 1995 county intermediate champions St. Mollerans. In their game against Lismore, the Mollerans had a lot more of the play than the final score indicated and their young team will benefit from the senior experience in the next year or two, but I cannot see them beat Ballyduff.

**FOURMILEWATER v. ERIN'S OWN**

Erin's Own are still without a point, having lost to Tallow and Roanmore and this would appear to be their final chance of getting into contention.

Fourmilewater's form again Clonea was not very impressive, but they do seem to have the measure of Erin's Own, whom they defeated by 1-10 to 0-11 last year.

**PASSAGE v. TALLOW**

This is the evening match at Fraher Field and on form the Eastern team who have full points to-date, will be favourites to win here. Tallow played very well against Erin's Own, but were very poor against county champions Ballygunner. Passage have already recorded victories against St. Saviours and Fourmilewater.

**ROANMORE v. CLONEA**

A win for Roanmore looks to be on here. Clonea showed poor form against Fourmilewater two weeks ago and will need to show a fair improvement on this if they hope to win the points in this one.

**BALLYGUNNER v. ST. SAVIOURS**

The county champions with full points so far, are not likely to slip up here against St. Saviours who have no points from their two matches to date. This tie is fixed for Walsh Park on Saturday evening.

**LISMORE v. DUNHILL**

Lismore set off the season with a splendid win over Mount Sion at Dungarvan but in their next match they failed to impress against St. Mollerans. By all accounts they must have the measure of Dunhill, but their display will nevertheless be watched with a critical eye by many of their supporters.

**MOUNT SION v. DUNGARVAN**

Both are pointless and are presently propping up the table in group one. Mount Sion's failure to win a point in their first two matches is very surprising and while no one is wondering if the famed Monastery Club, is starting to slip, patrons are asking how long will the losing sequence last? They always seem to find it difficult

to beat Dungarvan and are always extra careful when clashing with the Old Boro. Just the same, they will be all out here to get on to the points table and will field a strong side for this tie, which is scheduled for Kilmacthomas. I don't think that Dungarvan, following defeats by De La Salle and Dunhill, will be able to raise their game sufficiently to overcome 'Sion.

**DE LA SALLE v. PORTLAW**

In the first round Portlaw surprised many people by allowing themselves to be beaten by their neighbours St. Mollerans, who are fresh out of the intermediate grade. On the following Sunday, they surprised again, this time by beating the hotly fancied Mount Sion.

De La Salle have shown impressive form so far and have won both their matches. They could prove too lively for Portlaw in this one.
