£2,000 Drug Seizure In Dungarvan

Dungarvan Gardai have seized cannabis resin with an estimated street value of £2,000 in a weekend raid on a house in a Dungarvan


On Friday evening last, a party of uniformed and plain clothes Gardai from Dungarvan searched a housein Childers Estate, Dungarvan. They were in possession of a search warrant under the Misuse of Drugs Act.

During a search of the house, the Gardai recovered a substantial amount of cannabis — over 200 todate.

grammes — which constitutes the biggest seizure of cannabis resin ever in Dungarvan.

A local man was subsequently arrested and detained for questioning at Dungarvan Garda Station. He was later released without charge and a file on the matter has been prepared and forwarded to the Director of Public Prosecutions.

This significant seizure is part of an ongoing garda supervision of drug related activities in Dungarvan which has proved most successful

I am finishing my first year in college. What are the conditions for going on the Student Summer Job Scheme?

ANSWER

In order to qualify for the Student Summer Job Scheme you must be currently in full-time 3rd level eudcation; 18 years or over on 1st June, 1996 and satisfy a means test.

Student application forms are available (STI) from your local Social Welfare Office and have to be returned to Social Welfare by 31st May.

Second level students or final year 3rd level students cannot apply.

The means test takes account of the students' income (if any) and their parents.

The scheme is aimed at students working for their local communities. The scheme runs from 1st June until 30th September.

The rate of pay for students is £3 an hour to a maximum of £600. The payment is not subject to income

Dungarvan's Gerry Burke Seeks Mastermind Title

Waterford Macra may not be represented at the National final of the 1996 NDC Macra National Talent Competition which takes place on this coming Sunday night in the National Concert Hall in Dublin. But the Decies county will nevertheless have a big interest since Gerry Burke, from Grawnfadda, Dungarvan, represents the City of Dublin Macra branch in the Mastermind event.

The Mastermind is but one of eight separate events which make up the NDC Macra National Talent Competition, which is organised by City of Dublin Macra and sponsored for the fourth successive year, by the National Dairy Council.

This in fact is Gerry's second year to feature in the Mastermind final. He was runner-up to John O'Flaherty from Abbeydomey, Co. Kerry, last year and hopes to go one better this year.

Gerry's specialised topic is Irish Sport. His two opponents on Sunday, night are John McCarthy from Ballybrown, Co. Limerick and Pat Fennessy from Nenagh, Co. Tipperary, thus making it, in effect, an all Munster final.

Gerry Burke reached this year's national final by virtue of victories in the Dublin County Final and in the national semi-final in Dublin on March 31, where he defeated opponents from Offaly, Wicklow, Monaghan and Cavan. His very impressive score of 44 points (i.e. questions) in the semi-final was very much the highest score from the three semi-finals and on that basis, allied to his experience of last year's final, makes the Lucan based civil servant favourite to bing glory to both Waterford and Dublin on Sunday night.

It's The Rarest Species Of The Bear

The cuddly panda is the symbol of wildlife conservation but its existence is hanging by a thread. It feeds on bamboo, but bamboo lives for only a certain number of years before it flowers and

Under natural conditions, the pandas moved to other bamboo areas, but today the animals are hemmed into small reserves surrounded by Intensively farmed valleys.

WHEN whole bamboo forests vanished in western China in 1975, more than 150 pandas died of starvation. Only about 1,000 pandas are still alive.

THE 5 ft. tall panda has lived in China for over 600,000 years and once ranged widely

try. But today it is only found in the Inaccessible areas of the Secgouan Province

UNTIL the middle of the 19th century, pandas were unknown outside China.

THE glant Panda is the rarest species of bear. Until recently it was believed to be a member of the raccoon family. In 1973 It was officially declared a bear after experts studied the blood and tissue samples taken from the famous Chi-Chi after her death at London Zoo

do not behave like bears. They do not hibernate and they bleat rather than roar. Any self-respecting meateating bear would turn up its nose at the

glant panda's diet of bamboo. PANDAS feed and sleep throughout the day and night and in a 24-hour spell can tuck away about 33 lbs. of bamboo. They have to eat so much because they don't digest bamboo all that well and

gain little nourishment from it.

Nevertheless, an adult panda

can weigh around 18 stone.

PANDA cubs are usually born in September and are blind and toothless at birth. Just 4 Inches long, they weigh 5 oz. But they grow quickly and are more than 60 lb. within a year.

FEMALE pandas raise one cub every two years and not all of these survive.

PANDAS are a notoriously unprolific species, which isn't helping their survival chances.





Make Your Lawn A Cut Above The Rest

a rotary, a cylinder or one of the hover machines, depends on your lawn and the way you want it to look.

A lot of people don't want a billiard-table lawn, especially if they have children who like to use it for games. The rotary is ideal for them and cutting is a bit like running a cleaner over a carpet.

If you want a short back and sides cut, with measured lines, then the cylinder machine with its roller is fine.

And lightweight rotary cutters save a lot of sweat if you have to mow a grass bank.

At the same time, unless you have a massive lawn, the seemingly old-fashioned high-wheeled cylinder push mower remains invaluable. Then there's the Rolls-Royce class of mower - a nice little saddled machine on which you can ride around the garden.

However you cut your grass, it's always a job to get it started. You should have started by now, but for the first cut make sure your blades are set high, so that you leave a good 2 inches of grass. Anything shorter will either tear bits

out of wet soil or leave the grass yellow.

After one cut, roll the lawn, but not if wet. Then leave it and start with shorter cuts on really dry days.

With the growing use of power mowers in gardens, accidents have in-

creased over the years. Many could be avoided by following a few strict rules.

Don't wear canvas shoes or sandals (or go in bare feetl) when mowing.

Don't go up and down a steep bank — going down, your feet could slide under the blades; going up, the mower could run back on you. Mow horizon-

Don't lift a mower when the engine is still running. Don't let children stand by while cutting or leave a mower with engine running with small children around.

Don't run a live electric cable across soaking wet grass.

Do wear leather shoes or heavy gardening boots when mowing

Do store a power machine under lock and key to stop youngsters using it.

Do have an automatic cut-off plug when using an electric mower.

Do switch off before refuelling a petrol engine mower.

Do mow when the lawn is dry.

Incidentally, now's a good time to spring-feed the lawn; there are many proprietary preparations available and, when using, do follow the instruc-

Dressing of lawn sand is advised where your lawn is infested with daisies and similar weeds. It also has some feeding value.

tions carefully.

Mr. B. McNally, County Secretary, stated that architects had been appointed by the Council to determine the best possible use for the centre and their report was not yet completed.

It was unanimously agreed to refer this proposal to Waterford County Council.

MORE RESIDENTIAL

LAND

Mr. J. Heneghan moved that Lismore Town Commissioners request that there be an increase in the amount of land zoned residential in its development plan. Mr. Heneghan stated that he felt that planning permission for private building around Lismore was restrictive and he felt that it should be easier to

obtain planning permission for a single site. He went on to state that much of the land zoned for residential use in the recent development plan could be used by just one person. In addition, he felt that there was direct conflict between public and private development in the town.

It was unanimously agreed to refer this motion to the Council and in addition to request that they also provide serviced sites for private housing use.
LOCAL DEVELOPMENT

The Commissioners are to request Waterford County Council to consult with the Commissioners where possible prior to any major development work being undertaken in the town. Referring to previous developments in Lismore, eg, Heritage, Cobblelock, Lighting, Ballalley and Hospital, Mr. Heneghan felt it would be nice if the Commissioners were consulted before such developments took place. He went on to state that the Commissioners should have information at the earliest possible time and before such items become general knowledge.

Mr. McNally stated that most decisions need County Council approval and need to go before the Council

members.
VOTE OF SYMPATHY On the proposal of Mr. B. Leddy it was agreed to extend the Commissioners sympathy to all those involved in the Dunblane

tragedy in Scotland.
CITIZENS ADVICE BUREAU

Mr. B. Leddy proposed that Lismore Town Commissioners seek to provide a Citizens Advice Bureau. In proposing this motion he felt that everyone should have access to the best possible advice on any aspect of life today.

Mr. McNally gave an outline of the type of service that could be provided and hoped to report back with further information at the next meeting.







BALLYMACAR NEWS

WELCOME DECISION OF MINISTER

United Farmers Association welcomed the decision of Minister for the Environment, Brendan Howlin to reduce from 200 hectares to 70 hectares the threshold where an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) becomes mandatory for tree planting.

While this is a move in the right direction it is not an adequate response to the concern being expressed by a large cross section of rural and urban dwellers about the silent scourge of Sitka Spruce which is creeping stealthily over the face of our beautiful countryside. This blanket afforestation threatens to blot out light, view of sky and indeed, whole sections of our rural population along with our natural flora and fauna. It is a recipe of death for whole townslands and even parishes.

Minister for Agriculture. Ivan Yates should now put in place, the long awaited Land Use Policy. UFA again calls for priority for farming over forestry when land is offered for sale or lease. Ireland is an agricultural country and despite subtle attempts to categorise trees as a farm crop, it is as plain as a pikestaff to the general populace that blanket afforestation is a not so subtle mechanism to push maximum number of small farmers off the land permanently.

This pushing of small farmers from their holdings by land and money starvation is unconstitutional and should be stoutly resisted by all farmer organisations.

Coillte and private forestry companies have been driving a coach and four through the democratic rights of rural residents to have a say in matters where proposed developments such as forestry will have a major impact, often negative, on their environment for ever more. If a farmer decides to build a house on his own land, he has to comply with strict planning regulations, yet his neighbour is still free to plant 70 hectares of trees without let or hindrance. There is a very visible anomaly apparent in a situation where every development except afforestation is subject to strict planning regulations.

80 years after the event, a monument will be unveiled by Mgr. Matthew O'Donnell, President of Maynooth College which will commemorate the 15 volunteers from the area who took part in the Easter Rising of

Amongst those 15 was a man named Domhnall Ua

to become the last Governor-General of the country. His son Joe, later married Kathleen Curran of The Quay, Dungarvan and his grandson still lives in Maynooth, the proprietor of a hardware shop there.

The 15 who are to be commemorated assembled under their leader Domhnall Ua Buachalla on the evening of Easter Monday 1916, to march to Dublin to take part in the momentous events taking place there.

They set out with a shot-

Amongst those who also took part in the events of that historic week were Liam O'Riagain from Ring, then a supervisor in O'Buachalla's shop in Maynooth and John Graves worked in the O'Buachalla business as well. With Domhnall Ua Buachalla, Liam O'Riagain got two years in Frongach camp in Wales for his activities and but for his escape from the G.P.O. in the latter stages of the campaign, John Graves would have joined them. He was arrested two weeks later in Maynooth and given six

Area Aid

All crops must be sown by May 15, 1996 in accordance with normal husbandry standards (i.e. the land must be prepared and seed sown in a way and at a seed rate expected to produce a normal marketable crop) and be properly maintained until at least the beginning of flowering - Oilseeds and Protein Crops must be maintained until June 30 unless harvested at full agricultural maturity before that date.

Dairying

A TIGHTER CALVING PATTERN

Waterford dairy herds, i.e. February/March, where the advantage is lower winter feed costs with a high proportion of milk produced cheaply from summer grass. There are however very many dairy herds where calving dates have slipped, with too many cows calving in April and May. While in theory, the month of calving should not adversely affect profitability, provided cows are properly managed, it is difficult to get the best out of cows calving in May and June. These animals are reaching peak yields when grass quality begins to decline and milk yields are not easily sustained when grass quality and quantity begins in decline. The result is a considerably reduced lactation yield for late calvers which tends to lower profit margins per cow.

Traditionally, there is one peak calving period in Co.

place them with early calving heifers. **FIRST CALVERS**

First calvers can be the first to suffer in tough grazing conditions. They will have reduced intakes and will lose body condition. This will result in reduced fertility and late calving. Check cow condition regularly and pay special attention to heifers. You have to give first calvers preferential treatment. They may need extra feeding. In large herds, consider grazing first calvers and lighter cows separately.

The aim should therefore be to cull late calvers and re-

Prepare For Silage

It is most important to prepare well in advance for silage making. In addition to cleaning the pit and surrounding area, farm roads should be repaired and potholes filled. If left undone, these wreck expensive machinery, damage tyres, and lead to breakdowns and delays.

If roadway and gaps are not clean, muck will be brought into the yard on tractor and trailer wheels and will finish up in the pit.

Narrow gateways should be widened to avoid damage to machinery, posts and gates.

Make sure all overhead wires are removed beforehand and remember to cut down any branches that will be in the way of high trailers. The cabs of tractors are getting bigger every year and have long mirrors out to the side. Allowance has to be made for these along all routes the machinery will have to move. Where acid is used as an additive, the barrels should be brought out to the fields in good time. Leaving them in the yard for the tractor drivers to carry out will hold them up, slowing down the whole operation. The barrels can ideally be brought out in a transport box.

Finally, make sure you book your contractor in good

MASS IN OLD CEMETERY

1996 EU Suckler Cow Premium Schemes and 1996 Cattle/Beef Cow Headage and Equine Headage Schemes

Application forms:

Composite application forms are now being posted to all registered herdowners who participated in the following Schemes in recent years;

- EU Suckler Cow Premium Scheme for non-milk suppliers.
- EU Suckler Cow Premium Scheme for Small Scale Milk Producers (with milk quotas of less than 25,638 gallons at 1 April 1996).
- EU Cattle Headage Scheme in More Severely Handicapped areas and Beef Cow Scheme in Less Severely Handicapped Areas and in Coastal Areas with Specific Handicaps.
- EU Equine Headage Scheme in all Handicapped Areas.

The retention period for the EU Suckler Cow Premium Scheme is 6 months from the day following submission of the application and intending applicants are reminded that they should not apply for the Suckler Cow Premium on non-beef breed cows or in-calf heifers.

All applicants should ensure that the application form is completed carefully and fully and in particular that the correct eartag number of the animals being applied on are clearly entered on the application form.

Suckler Cow Quota - 1996 National Reserve allocations

Successful applicants to the 1996 National Reserve have now been awarded quota rights, on a provisional basis, subject to the applicant applying for Premium on sufficient cows to cover the extra quota plus any existing quota he/she may have.

Transfer and lease of 1996 Suckler Cow Quotas

Unsuccessful applicants to the reserve include those who already have sufficient quota to cover the cows on which they intend to apply for the Premium in 1996 and those farmers who do not fulfil the income requirements. Unsuccessful applicants to the reserve who do not have sufficient quota to cover the cows on which they wish to apply for Premium may now lease or buy quota. Applications for leasing or buying quota are now available from Local Offices of the Department.

The latest date for leasing or buying quota is the date on which the application for Premium is submitted to the Department.

only development which is leading to a chaotic buildup of cattle on Irish farms, ICMSA Deputy President, Mr. Pat O'Rourke, said recently.

He said many farmers could not sell stock due to the major disruption in the new Disease Eradication Scheme caused by the CPSU dispute.

Farmers were encouraged under the terms of the new eradication scheme to get pre-movement tests for animals which they intended to dispose of. Now those who did so are really disillusioned because the cards from the animals tested are being held by their vets pending return of the results of their herd's blood test, which are not being carried out due to the dispute. This means that these farmers cannot sell their animals," said Mr. O'Rourke.

He added: "Farmers with breeding stock and dairy

are really suffering now because this is the traditional time for disposing of such animals.'

Mr. O'Rourke called on the Minister for Agriculture to intervene in a bid to resolve the dispute which is causing major disruption for farmers.

He said the dispute had also disrupted commitments under the Charter of Rights and led to reduced opening hours of Department offices.

Mr. O'Rourke said there is growing anxiety among farmers who, due to the dispute, cannot get official advice on how to fill up their Area Aid forms, which must be submitted to the Department by April

The Deputy President said staff were refusing to give advice on telephone lines established by the Department to advise farmers on filling the forms.

IFA Demand Compensation For Heifers And Bulls

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan, has said that the Minister for Agriculture, Ivan Yates has completely ignored heifer and bull beef producers in the current UK BSE crisis.

Mr. Donovan said that in addition to negotiating a £150/head Slaughter Premium for steers Minister Yates must insist that this compensation is extended to cover heifers and bulls.

"Because there is no premium payment on heifers, specialist producers are losing up to £200/head.

The Waterford IFA Livestock leader said that farmers selling cattle under the new intervention arrangements must insist on payment on the day from the meat factories. "Farmers must be unequivocal in insisting on payment on the day for the sale of their stock."

I.F.A. Call On **Lamb Factories To Resist Negative Price Pressure**

Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman, Harry Gray, has called on the Irish lamb their quotations from factories to strongly resist the 175p/lb to 160p/lb. the French importers on lamb prices. Mr. Gray said the factories must prevent a repeat of last year's early lamb price collapse.

The Waterford IFA man pointed out that as a result of a major reduction in lamb. from 33FF per kilo 28FF

per kilo today, the Irish lamb factories have reduced

huge price discounting from Mr. Gray said the Irish lamb factories must fiercely resist this huge price discounting from France and owe it to their early lamb suppliers to ensure that prices do not drop below 160p/lb. He said it was outrageous that some factofies were trying to get the price down to 150p/lb.

BLEPHAROPLASTY Eyelid Correction

Eyelid correction is often formed in conjunction with a face lift, and is quite an easy procedure. A piece of skin is removed from the upper eyelid and from the lower lid, and an incision is made on the outer side. The incisions are sutured with silk or nylon thread.

The hardest part of the procedure is deciding how much or how little skin should be removed. For example too little skin may not correct the problem, and too much might make the eye look distorted. Inside the upper and lower lids are pockets of fatty tissue, the fat in these pockets also has

to be trimmed during the operation. The exact amount of the fatty tissue must be removed to give the desired appearance.

In the case of a drooping eyebrow, a larger incision can be made toward the temple directly above the evebrow. There is an operation which can be done if

there is a retention of fluid on the eyelids. However this procedure is not very successful as puffiness is inclined to reappear shortly after the operation.

Blepharoplasty is usually carried out under local anaesthetic and the operation lasts about an hour and half. The stitches are removed about four or five days later.

By Dr. DAVE BARRY

Q. I've had an abnormal cervical smear test result and now awaiting laser treatment. I haven't got a family as yet. Will this type of treatment reduce my chances of conceiving in the future?

A. Laser treatment is usually given only to the most superfi-cial layers of the cervix and this is unlikely to cause future problems. If, on the other hand, a more radical procedure to remove the abnormal cells proved necessary, some scarring is possible. This would not stop the sperm getting through, so conceiving wouldn't be a problem, but it might make the cervix more reluctant to dilate during labour. Interference of any kind with the cervix, runs the risk of infection in the pelvic organs, but this is unlikely under proper surgical

Q. I'm 15 and for the past six months I've been making myself sick after binging. About a week ago, when I blew my nose a big blood clot came out. Is this related to the vomiting?

A. The nose bleed and vomiting are separate issues. Nose bleeds, especially in someone your age, are seldom anything to worry about. Its probable that the vigorous nose blowing ruptured a small blood vessel. It is common for blood from the nose to trickle down into the stomach and then be vomited up. The opposite, however, does not occur. Blood from the stomach would not form a clot in the nose. You are playing a very dangerous game with the binging and vomiting as this can cause health problems. Persistent vomiting can damage and even rupture the gullet, while stomach acid in the mouth can damage the enamel on the teeth. An urgent visit to your

It is of particular benefit to those approaching exams, both Junior and Leaving Certificates. It is also extremely useful to young people entering third level education where they no longer have the imposed discipline of a school system.







WATERFORD **COACHING** AND GAMES DEVELOPMENT **COMMITTEE**

The above committee has been meeting on a monthly basis since its inception in April 1995. Chairman of the committee is Pat Moore and Secretary is Mac Darragh Mac Donagh. The committee has been involved in and

has organised the following projects:

(1) Our primary function is the organisation and overseeing of the Primary Schools coaching programme, namely the coaches Peter Power, Pat Curran and, for the Spring and Summers months, Paraic Fanning. This involves the drawing up and publication of a poster/schedule. The T.S.B. in Dungarvan have kindly sponsored the 1996 Peter Power Poster. Peter visits over 40 schools in total. Paraic Fanning visits 12 schools in the Rural East from April to June and both coaches coach in our Summer Camps during the Summer months. Pat Curran visits over 50 schools in the entire county and is also involved in Summer Camps. Our feedback from the people that matter, i.e. the teachers and children is extremely positive and all look greatly forward to the coaches' visits.

(2) A second function of ours is the overseeing and compilation of the FAS/CE Scheme. This has proved to be a great success and many coaches, over 20 in all, are being trained and are in turn coaching the children in the county's primary and post primary schools.

(3) Another aspect of the committee's work involves the organisation and running of adult coaching courses, namely at foundation and level one. These are nationwide standardised courses. The Foundation Course is a 7 hour course, and it qualifies one to coach up to under 14. The Level One Course is a 20 hour course and it qualifies one to coach adult club players. Any coach who successfully completes the course(s) receives certification from Croke Park.

(4) The G.A.A. has a special Transition Year module which enables transition year students to attend a special coaching course, and part of our brief is to facilitate schools to the best of our ability to assist them should they wish to avail of this course.

A major problem in Co. Waterford at the moment is the acute shortage of referees. We, in conjunction with the county refereeing body, ran 3 courses at different venues and a total of 32 referees attended. Hopefully some or indeed all of these will become actively involved this year, thus alleviating the current referees workload.

(5) Another problem facing the association is the fall off in the numbers playing our games between the ages 15-18. Some of the problem is the infrequency of games and regular competition. Bearing this in mind, we hope to organise a special under 17 league in both hurling and football, to be run on a county wide basis, and com-

mencing in September next.

(6) One of the most exciting developments in the hurling arena in the last number of years has been the development of the indoor hurley. This is a hugely exciting development as it opens the whole prospect of hurling becoming an all year round sport and not just a summer one. With the indoor hurley, we are no longer at the mercy of our unpredictable weather or our unplayable grounds. Over 6 indoor hurling tournaments were held at different venues during the months of December, January and February. These proved to be a huge success and most importantly, they encouraged clubs to have hurling sessions with their own young players, who otherwise would have been idle.

(7) The major project that the committee took on was the organising of intensive coaching for under 12 to 4 different venues on 4 different dates. We are currently half way through the process. The top 80 players will be brought in to a special gala session to be held in June which will involve a number of top class inter

(8) Waterford received 300 helmets and 480 hurleys from the national hurling body. Our committee's task was to allocate these to various clubs throughout the

Sale Of Presentation Convent, Dungarvan

The Presentation Sisters wish to announce their decision to dispose of their convent in Dungarvan. The convent dates from the early 1850's and has accommodated, at different times, as many as 24 resident community members. Over the last 20 years, there had been a significant decrease in the number of members and consequently a sharp decrease in ordinary income. Indications are that this trend is likely to be the situation in the foreseeable future. Combined with these circumstances are features such as the high maintenance costs of such a very large building for a very small group of residents.

The drop in intake of new membership has brought about a high proportion of retired and elderly members in Ireland. This necessitates finding new ways of caring and nursing for those who need it. This is a serious responsibility and has to be taken into consideration. These changes in circumstances bring about the need to look at all properties being held and to determine where it is best to dispose of or to retain property. In addition some properties, by reason of their location or use, are not marketable at the moment.

Over the years, the congregation has invested considerable resources in various ministries, particularly in education in Ireland. This has been done through providing buildings and sites for educational purposes and other projects. Resources have also been used in assigning members to minister in areas of need where little or no renumeration from any source was available. Assistance and support were frequently provided for those in need. The congregation is under constant pressure to help fund its needy projects in the different locations throughout Ireland. In addition, the sisters have always been supportive of missions overseas. Recently they have undertaken a new mission in Slovakia, Eastern Europe.

For all these reasons arising from internal and external factors, the congregation no longer finds the large convent in Dungarvan suitable for its purposes and has decided to put it on the market. The proceeds of the sale will help to defray the financial responsibilities for all the above needs. The community will be rehoused in a more economimaintained accommodation in Dungar-

Since its foundation in Dungarvan almost 200 years ago, the community has provided educational facilities for the town and the surrounding districts, as well as providing opportunities for pastoral and counselling services. Rationalisation of schools in the town in recent years brought its own changes to the Presentation schools. The decision to dispose of the convent property will not have any negative impact on the school situation. The sisters will continue to be involved. They will also continue in other ministries for as long as resources are available.


