New 200 Acre Dump Site Needed In Co. Waterford

The search is now on for a 150 to 200 acre site in Co. Waterford which would be used as a super dump to cater for the combined waste of Waterford city and county.

This £4.3m landfill would replace the existing waste disposal site in Tramore which is located in an unsuitable scenic area, the dump at Ballinamuck, Dungarvan which is nearly full and the Waterford city dump at Kilbarry which

also has a short timescale remaining.

Locating such a huge acreage for what will most probably become a highly controversial issue will not be easy however. Prerequisites for the dump, which will be in operation for 20

to 25 years, excludes all coastal zones, amenity areas and water sources etc. It is expected that a site will be identified in the next two months.

At present, the combined waste of Waterford city and county stands at over 60,000

Contractors To Be Invited For Construction Of New Dungarvan Hospital Unit

Brian O'Shea T.D., Minister of State at the Department of Health has announced that the South Eastern Health Board has been given the go ahead to place the advertisement inviting contractors for the new 27 bed unit at St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan.

Mr. O'Shea said that this was the first step in selecting a contractor for the project. The list of contractors responding to the S.E.H.B. advertisement will be assessed as to their ability to complete the project within budget and timescale. A short list of contractors will then be invited to submit tenders. It is expected that

the invitations to tender will issue around the middle of June.

Minister O'Shea added that he was pleased that further progress had been made in the planning of the new 27 bed unit project. He repeated his deep commitment to the provision of health care facilities for the elderly at St. Joseph's, Dungarvan. Work on the project, costed at around £1m is expected to commence towards the end of August 1996.

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy, Austin Deasy has also welcomed the announcement by the Minister for Health Michael Noonan.

QUESTION

I would like to get some information on the Health Services in Ireland. We have just moved here from France. We have 3 children and I am particularly concerned to know of services for children. My husband is working here and we have just bought a house.

ANSWER

There is an excellent booklet "Information Guide to Our Health Services" and an accompanying leaflet available free of charge from your Health Board. If you go to the nearest Health Centre to where you are living, you should be able to get a copy of it. While there, you might enquire of the Public Health Nurse, the Child Health Services provided in your area.

Further Blitz On Drivers Launched By Minister

A further campaign on law-breakers of the EU Social Regulations on drivers hours by truck and bus drivers was launched recently by Minister of State at the

Department of Transport, Energy and Communications, Emmet Stagg.

The campaign will involve an intensive period of nationwide roadside checks by inspectors from the Dept. in conjunction with the Gardai. This is the third such campaign since the Minister of State took office.

"Compliance with the drivers hours and other social regulations relating to the use of tachographs is a prerequisite for a safe, vibrant, professional and viable haulage and passenger industry", said Mr. Stagg. "I have already proven that regular road check campaigns are a significant deterrent to drivers contemplating breaking the law".

In addition to this most recent blitz on drivers, Gardai in the South East are currently carrying out a series of coordinated checkpoints at many locations throughout Co. Waterford and Wexford, South Tipperary, Carlow and Kilkenny. These checkpoints are being carried out on a 24 hour basis on major and minor roads.

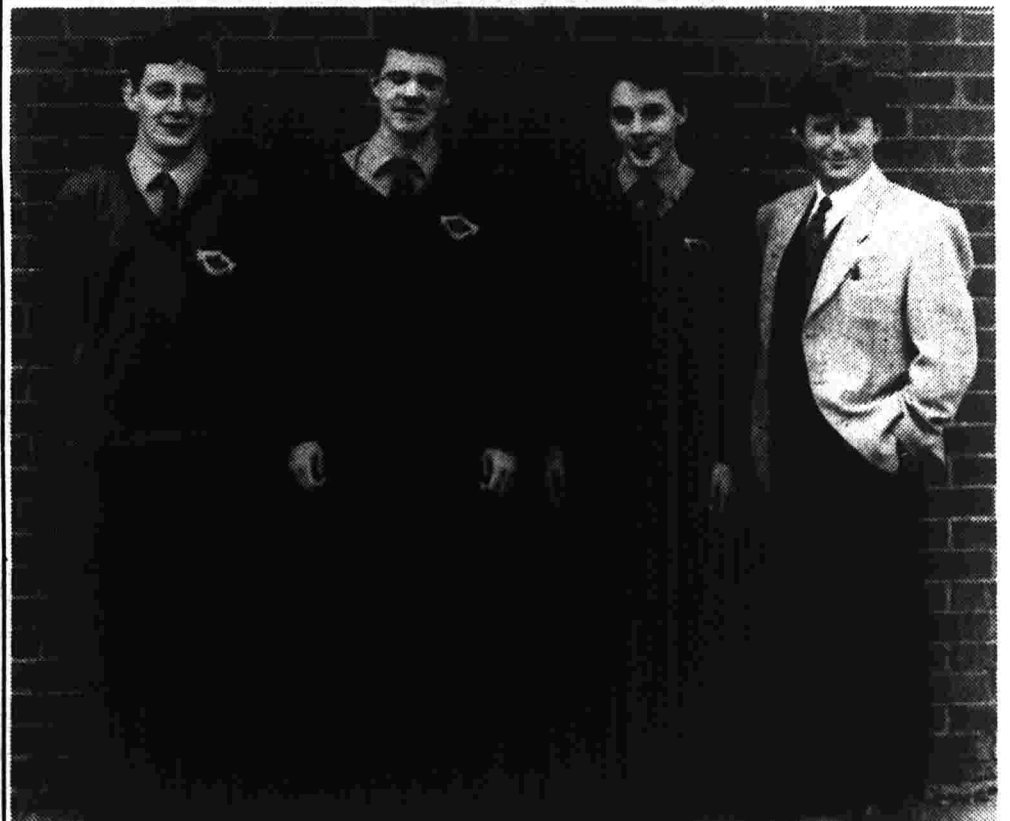
each year, almost half of all deaths in this country.

FINAL EXCAVATION WORK AT DUNGARVAN CASTLE

tonnes per annum. This figure however is expected to rise to over 100,000 by the year 2020. Obviously to cope with such a dramatic increase in waste which amounts to nearly £1.4m a year in waste collection, street cleaning, transportation and disposal costs, a major overhaul of Waterford's current waste management strategy is needed. Such a strategy was outlined last Monday at the respective meetings of Waterford County Council, Dungarvan U.D.C. and Waterford City Corporation.

Prepared by John B. Barry & Partners, consulting engineers, the strategy study was adopted by all three local authorities and represents the first step on the road to a central landfill site.

RECYCLING TARGETS

Included in the study are the national recycling targets which have to be achieved in every county by 1999 under the new Waste Management Bill which is currently going through the Dáil and expected to pass into law later this year.

To meet these requirements, recycling units for paper, glass, plastic, newsprint and organic waste such as grass clippings etc. will be located in towns and villages throughout the County.

PROPOSED DUNGARVAN STATION

Another recommendation of the strategy study is the possible provision of transfer stations similar to that in Lismore at Dungarvan and Waterford city. This proposal however, will be subject to further detailed analysis. The proposed transfer sta-

tion in Dungarvan would be located at a cost of £1.35m. Transfer stations are a type of 'half way house' for waste. Rubbish deposited at the transfer station is separated into recyclable waste such as newspapers, glass and cans etc. while the remainder is put into sealed containers and transported to the main County landfill. The site would be open on weekends and during daylight hours in summer.

The station in Lismore is on a much smaller scale than that proposed for Dungarvan. It caters for recyclable oil, glass, fridges and newspapers and transports the remaining rubbish to the dump at Ballinamuck, Dungarvan. The Lismore site was the first such local authority facility in the country and has been a successful role model for many councils nationwide.

Meanwhile the existing dump at Ballinamuck will be restored to its natural state including the fishing facilities on the Colligan river which flows through the dump. Indeed the facility was described by Urban Councillor Paddy Power as one of the finest white trout rivers in Ireland.

WHEELIE BIN PROBLEM

Although the study was approved by Dungarvan U.D.C. last Monday night, it was apparent from members comments that the recommended introduction of a wheelie bin system in Dungarvan would pose major problems.

Responding to these concerns raised mainly by Cllr. Tony Wright and Cllr. Billy Kyne, County Manager Donal Connolly said the local U.D.C. will have to

look at the more economical wheelie bin option and perhaps initiate a wheelie bin pilot scheme in a certain part of the town. As a further step towards reducing costs, the study also recommends that Dungarvan U.D.C. amalgamate its collection systems with the County Council for the rural outskirts of the town.

LONG BATTLE

The next few months will be the start of a long uphill battle for the three local authorities involved. Wherever the 150 to 200 dump will be located, there are sure to be objections from neighbouring residents and communities. As Cllr. Billy Kyne said, "adopting the strategy is the easy part - but the part that lies ahead will be difficult." A lot of

difficult decisions will be made, he warned in what will be a highly emotive and very divisive issue. Likewise, Cllr. Tony Wright stressed that there will be many problems associated with the location of the dump. "No one wants them," he declared.

County Manager Mr. Connolly agreed that the way ahead "will not be easy". Public demand however, is forever increasing environmental standards and he thanked both the members of the County Council and the Urban Council for adopting the strategy. "We have to have the courage of our convictions", he urged, regarding these high environmental standards and to make "brave decisions" on behalf of the public.

Junior Encyclopaedia

THE RABBIT

HAS EVERYBODY got time for the rabbit? The farmer or the gardener are no friends of the rabbit. The rabbit can create havoc in a vegetable patch and can be very destructive. The disease myxomatosis was introduced in Australia earlier this century to thin out the rabbit population. It worked there so the disease was introduced into other countries including Ireland and England. We rarely see rabbits die of this disease now, but it still exists. The signs and symptoms of this disease are blindness, bulging eyes and other ugly symptoms. The theory of this disease is if rabbits breed above ground, they won't get it, but they are susceptible to it if they breed underground.



Black rabbits were common here many years ago and it is said they resulted from too much inbreeding within communities. The rabbit we know as our pet is called an albino rabbit. They are white with pink eyes.

Rabbits are possessive of their territory. They will fight violently to keep their piece of ground. The male which is called a buck will mark his boundary by 'chinning' it. He chooses the line of his boundary and rubs his chin along it. There is a tiny gland at the base of the jaw which secretes a fluid with a characteristic odour. This is a warning for other rabbits in the family to stay away from the boundary line. If an intruder (another rabbit) crosses the boundary the male will squirt them with urine. If the intruder doesn't get the message after that a fight will start.

The female rabbit is called a doe and during the courtship, she and the male will be very gentle towards each other. They will sit beside each other for hours at a time. The female will lick the male's forehead and she will lick his ears.

If the rabbit is alarmed, it will thump its foot loudly on the ground. It will run for cover with its tail in the air which reveals a white patch underneath. This is a signal for the other rabbits to take cover too.

Greedy Snake Tried To Eat Elephant

LET sleeping snakes lie — until spring when Britain's adders wake from their winter hibernation. South West Asia can grow to lengths of more than 30 feet.

The humble adder, whose bite seldom kills if treated quickly — is put in the shade by its relatives in other parts of the world. At least 40,000 deaths from snake bite are recorded each year — many of them in Asia, home of the deadly king cobra and dozens of other killer snakes.

The king cobra can reach more than 18 feet in length and is the longest venomous snake in the world. There are records of fully grown elephants being killed after a bite on the trunk.

But the largest snakes in the world are not poisonous — they kill their victims by suffocation.

The anaconda of South America and the python of

And they have appetites to match their size. One python was found by natives in India attempting to eat a live elephant.

It had managed to swallow one of the animal's back legs but had then come to a halt. The natives freed the elephant by hacking the python to pieces.

Pythons are able to eat quite large creatures because of their expanding jaw bones which move independently of each other.

At the end of the last century a 9-foot long python was discovered in the palace of the king of Siam. It has entered through a small hole in the wall but was unable to escape because of a bulging stomach. Inside was one of the palace cats.

Council To Monitor Deelish Water Supply

Additional monitoring of the Deelish water supply which serves part of the Burgery, Ballinacourty and Garranbane is to be carried out by Waterford County Council following recent high levels of aluminium reported by local water consumers.

The issue was raised at last Monday's Council meeting by Cllr. Billy Kyne who sought clarification on the problem from County Engineer John O'Flynn.

Mr. O'Flynn confirmed that a sample taken by local residents from the Deelish water supply had shown high levels of aluminium.

The sample however, was taken a day after a pipe had burst in the supply which caused sediment to be released into the mains. Subsequent samples of the water taken by the Council however, showed the water quality to be perfectly normal. "The bacteriological quality at all times was satisfactory," stated Mr. O'Flynn.

From meetings between local consumers and Council representatives held on May 3rd last, it emerged that the Council will review the treatment facility and carry out additional monitoring of the supply.

Indeed the Deelish supply is currently monitored in accordance with EU regulations and the Council has significantly upgraded the system, replacing 2,500

metres of old cast-iron pipes with new PVC mains. A further meeting between consumers and Council officials will take place in the next month or so.

New Book On Dungarvan Christian Brothers

COMPENSATION TRIBUNAL FOR CERTAIN PERSONS WHO HAVE CONTRACTED HEPATITIS C FROM ANTI-D IMMUNOGLOBULIN, BLOOD TRANSFUSION OR OTHER BLOOD PRODUCTS

- I The Compensation Tribunal established by the Minister for Health on 15th December 1995 is now dealing with applications from:
- women who have been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C antibodies or Hepatitis C virus resulting from the use of Human Immunoglobulin - anti D within the State;
 - persons who have been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C antibodies or Hepatitis C virus as a result of receiving a blood transfusion or a blood product within the State;
 - children and partners of persons referred to at (a) and (b) above who have been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C antibodies and/or Hepatitis C virus;
 - persons responsible for the maintenance of any of the persons referred to at (a), (b) and (c) above, and who have incurred financial loss, and/or incurred expenses, as a direct result of providing such maintenance arising from the condition diagnosed and referred to at (a), (b) and (c) above;
 - dependents of such persons at (a), (b) and (c) above where such person has died as a result of having contracted Hepatitis C.

- II The Scheme requires such applications to be made (a) not later than six months from the date of the establishment of the Compensation Tribunal or (b) the date when the claimant becomes aware of such a diagnosis (whichever is the later) except where otherwise provided in Clause 19 of the Scheme.

DUNGARVAN TREATMENT PLANT

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy recently tabled a question in the Dail on the current position regarding the provision of a waste water disposal scheme for Dungarvan.

Minister for the Environment, Brendan Howlin revealed that the Environmental Impact Study for this scheme was certified with modification last December. The Preliminary Report of the scheme is currently under examination in his Department. "In view of the existing level of commitments under the water and sewerage programme, I cannot say when it may be possible to approve it," he added.

The proposed waste water treatment plant would be located at the former Quigley-Magnesite plant in Ballinacourty.

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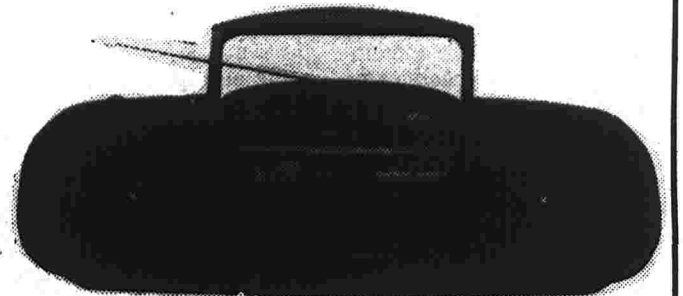

Horse Sale At Ballyrafter Centre

Following on from the very successful first sale of horses last September at The Ballyrafter Centre, Lismore, Co. Waterford a further sale is planned for Tuesday next, May 21st.

These sales have been adopted from the old way of selling at fairs; buyers and vendors coming together and dealing privately. The excellent facilities at The Ballyrafter Centre provide the forum whereby horses can be shown over a course of fences or unbroken horses jump loose. Each horse is allowed plenty of time in the arena to show their potential both on the flat and over fences.

An exceptionally good catalogue of horses have entered from three year olds to Grade D jumping horses.

The catalogue gives full information of owners, breeding and performance record to date and the buyer has the option to make a deal on the day or can arrange to see the horse again at a later date, allowing them the opportunity to assess the horse fully before buying.

With no commissions, it is a straight forward method of sale which is both an advantage to the buyer and the seller. The sale commences at 12.00 noon with four year old riding horses, followed by five year olds and over and then horses which have competed in either showjumping or eventing and have a points record. The unbroken horses are shown later in the afternoon.

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Melleray Up In Arms Over Proposed Wind Test Systems

An objection has been lodged with Waterford County Council regarding a planning application for two wind farm 'test' sites near Mount Melleray. The application was lodged by Bristol-based Colham Energy Ltd. on March 27th last for two 'temporary wind monitoring systems' and two 40 metre masts, one at Tooranahareen and one at Knocknafallia.

Should planning permission be granted to Colham Energy, the masts will remain on site for a year. If the wind measurement stations prove successful, the company will then apply for permission for a wind farm in the area. The proposed masts would be located on the lands of Sir Richard Keane of Cappoquin Estates. Neighbouring residents however have voiced their concern over the planning applications, claiming the site is unsuitable for these masts.

Be that as it may, many people are still unaware of the full facts involved in these planning applications. What exactly does a wind monitoring system involve, will it affect the scenic Knockmealdown area and who are Colham Energy Ltd.?

FACTS ABOUT COLHAM ENERGY

- Colham was incorporated in 1993 specifically to develop and promote the use of energy from renewable resources, particularly wind and biomass, i.e. forestry and energy crops.

- The two directors of the company are Paul Gorst Linsley who is an organic farmer and Maureen De Pietro whose name appears on the planning application.

- Colham has already developed one wind farm at Bessy Nell, Newtownstewart in Co. Tyrone (10 X 500 kilowatt wind turbines).

- The company has two contracts to sell electricity to the ESB which were awarded under the Alternative Energy Requirements for wind farms in Co. Clare and Co. Leitrim. These are being developed with Irish companies.

- Colham has also made an application for a 5 megawatt biomass (forestry and energy crops) power plant in Ogham, Co. Tyrone and has other similar projects in Ire-

land and the UK including the conversion of local authority waste to energy.

MEASURE WIND 'S ENERGY

Both 132 ft. masts will measure the wind's energy through the use of a small wind vane and sensor at the top of each mast (less than 10" in size). This in turn is connected to an electronic data logger attached to the mast near the bottom. The logger collects and stores information on characteristics of the wind including the speed and direction.

The mast itself is 4.5" wide, comprising of a slender metal tube which rests on a metal plate. It is held in place by four guy wires which in turn are securely held by earth anchors. Colham claims that the continued agricultural or recreational use of the land will not not be affected.

Both masts are part of the Talltower Mast System, designed by NRG Systems for wind energy resource assessment. Talltower masts are the most easily erected masts available, requiring little maintenance, durable and easy to install.

By virtue of its light weight, the mast can be erected manually and removed when required. No concrete is necessary and as it's light enough to be handled manually, the masts can be transported to the site without the necessity for construction of an access. This was also a major concern voiced by the objectors.

If planning permission is granted by the local authority then both masts will remain in place for 12 months to enable wind characteristics to be studied. During this period, enquiries and investigations would be carried out including all necessary consultations with the Planning Authority and others to establish the suitability and viability of the land for a wind farm.

NO ARCHAEOLOGICAL OBJECTION

Thomas Condit of the National Monuments Service disclosed that there is no archaeological objection to either proposed development. He then pointed to the presence of an earth work on the west of the Knocknafallia site of archaeological interest. Mr. Condit stressed that there should be no interference with this earthwork. In case of any application for wind farms in the vicinity of the measurement stations, it's likely that the National Monuments Service would require the submission of archaeological impact statement for both locations.

WHAT THE OBJECTORS SAY

A group of local residents have now formed the Knockmealdown Protection Committee in a campaign against mast developments in the area. Following a meeting on April 23rd, the committee decided to lodge an official objection with the Council against the proposed 40 metre wind monitoring systems.

Chairman of this committee is Willie O'Donoghue of Crowhill Upper, Cappoquin who told the press last week; "We're talking of Knockmealdown drive, a scenic area, a mountain range which at this moment is totally undisturbed and we feel that it's just not suitable as a site. We know at this stage from discussions with the landowner that the follow-on from those will be a wind farm if it's successful. We know what a wind farm involves and we just know that it would be an unmerciful monstrosity in this area".

The objection has already been signed by individuals from Lismore, Cappoquin, Ballyduff, Dungarvan, Afane, Modeligo, Villierstown, Aglishe and Clogheen etc.

There are four main points put forward in the objection;

(1) "It's common knowledge that this application for test masts at Tooranahareen and Glenfallia is a forerunner to an application for a wind farm development"... "we feel test mast application is totally unnecessary".

(2) Another concern for the objectors is that the proposed

masts do not interfere with the scenic beauty of the area.

(3) "Given the project involves the development of an industrial site in a rural area, there has not been enough investigation into the repercussions of such a development and we believe it will interfere with the farming interests in the area".

(4) "The applicants have not indicated what companies will be responsible for power generation. Given that several UK based power generation companies are extensively involved with nuclear power the development should indicate on whose behalf they are developing this site".

NATURAL ENERGY SOURCE

Speaking to the 'Dungarvan Leader' Sir Richard Keane said he invited local residents to his house earlier this year to outline the proposed development.

A wind farm, he claimed, would prove most beneficial for the area although the wind tests might also find the area to be unsuitable for such a project.

"My own feeling is that the policy of the Department of Energy, following an E.C Directive, to promote the production of electricity from wind or water, rather than the burning of oil, gas, coal or turf, which pollutes the atmosphere, should be supported", he stated.

Sir Richard then submitted that unlike the finite resources of oil and coal, etc., wind is a constant and natural source of energy which does not cause pollution to the environment.

SHRINKING FUEL RESERVES

Indeed the current trend in most developed countries is to seek alternative methods of energy to eliminate smog, dirt and pollution, and to help retain the earth's shrinking fuel reserves. Alternative energy is freely available by harnessing the power of the sun, the tides or the speed of the wind.

In the case of the proposed wind monitoring systems at Melleray, an eventual wind farm would only be practical if strong, steady winds are recorded.

£370,000 In Public Projects Underway In Ardmore

Ardmore Enterprise Co-Op recently reviewed with Waterford County Council officials progress on the many public projects now underway in Ardmore village. These projects include — upgrading of the public water supply (£200,000), boat cove improvements (£80,000) and new tourist centre at Ardmore Beach (£90,000).

Ardmore suffered from an inadequate water supply in the peak Summer period. The original system installed in the 1930's never anticipated the huge increase in tourism and the consequent demand for water rationing which we had during the 1980's and right up till last August. Last year a new bore hole was sunk and this was connected into the existing network at Duffcarrig. This new supply is excellent, providing very high quantities of water. The next phase of the project, which is currently underway is the linking of this supply to the reservoir in Dysert. This is necessary as the old pipe network within the village requires additional input points or feeds so that everywhere gets a balanced and adequate supply. It has resulted in considerable disruption and inconvenience. Thankfully road reinstatement and retarring has begun. This will be completed shortly. The Ardmore Enterprise Co-Op sought and got the agreement of Telecom to duct the telephone cables adjacent to the Round Tower area. This work is being done by placing ducts in the same trench as the water pipe. The water supply project has moved ahead after the Enterprise Co-Op met with the Minister of State in the Department of the Environment in The Custom House in 1994 and convinced him and his officials of the importance of this project for Ardmore.

The Boat Cove improvements were suspended during the Winter period due to the bad weather conditions. These will now recommence next week.

Ardmore Enterprise Co-Op put this project forward under the Village Renewal Scheme. It was supported by Waterford County Council and given the approval of the Department of the Environment last year. The project involves providing additional space for boat parking and installing a breakwater protection on the

North side of the slipway. The Enterprise Co-Op has provided the necessary local contribution of £1,000 to allow these works to get underway. An approach to the Department of the Marine has resulted in a further grant of £45,000 being provided to the project.

The Tourist Centre at the beach carpark is now nearing completion. This unusual two storey circular building will provide the following facilities - Tourist information and service office, Beach guard depot, First aid post, Public toilet facilities (including disabled facilities), Bureau de

Change facilities, Office facilities for Ardmore Enterprise Co-Op.

The cost of this project is £90,000. Ardmore Enterprise Co-Op is providing £20,000 of this. Already £10,000 has been paid, with Waterford Development Partnership providing a £5,000 grant. The architect for the building is Mr. Damien Dillon of Dungarvan. The builder is Mr. Mike Foley of Monareta. Because of its unusual shape (no straight lines and very similar to a sand castle), it is attracting considerable comment locally. It is expected to win Archi-

tectural Awards for the local building team. In addition to the visual attraction, it will provide much needed facilities for the visitor to Ardmore Beach. It will make your trip to Ardmore with the children that more enjoyable and safe.

Ardmore Enterprise Co-Op congratulated Waterford County Council on a 'job well done'. The recent progress and developments are impressive additions to the economic infrastructure of Ardmore. It certainly sets the scene for a healthy future for this beautiful seaside village.

New Wheelchair Ramp At Clonea Beach

General access to one of the county's most popular beaches, Clonea Strand, was significantly upgraded last Friday with the official opening of a new wheelchair ramp at the beach.

The ramp was provided by Waterford County Council following discussions between Dungarvan M.S. and Co. Manager Donal Connolly. Among those attending the opening ceremony were members of Dungarvan U.D.C., Fr. Moylan O.S.A., who blessed the access, Inspector Michael Blake of Dungarvan Garda Station, members of Dungarvan M.S., Tom Keith M.C. and Waterford Co. Council members.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan, Cathaoirleach of Dungarvan U.D.C., said that for too long, access to too many places "has been denied to those who do not fall into the category of people, which is usually and consistently catered for."

From mothers wheeling prams, elderly people to people in wheelchairs, Cllr. Ryan maintained that the effect is the same; "they are disadvantaged as citizens."

"Thankfully there has been a growing awareness over the past number of years of the basic needs of these people and their right to equality of consideration," she added.

This new situation has been brought about through the activities and efforts of groups such as the Dungar-

van Multiple Sclerosis branch. "There has been a very necessary and very effective education campaign and I'm delighted", she enthused, "to see that it has brought positive results, not only in Co. Waterford but nationwide."

Cllr. Ryan was also loud in her praise of Mr. Connolly who realises what a benefit the new ramp has brought to those who need it and the degree of independence it has given to people whose freedom would otherwise be greatly curtailed.

Concluding her speech, the U.D.C. Cathaoirleach welcomed this new initiative on behalf of her fellow Council members. "I hope that it's only the start of a programme which will open up access to places previously denied to the physically challenged," she added.

PLAQUE TO BE ERECTED TO INSPECTOR POTTER

The town of Cahir in South Tipperary is to stage a Military History Weekend Conference in Cahir this coming September.

As part of the weekend, a plaque is to be erected in honour of District Inspector Potter, an Inspector of the Royal Irish Constabulary who was captured and executed by the I.R.A. during the War of Independence and is buried in the Church of Ireland graveyard at Kilcommon, Cahir. This weekend is being organised by the Cahir Social and Historical Society which was established in December 1994.

In this new period of reconciliation, Irishmen involved in conflicts of all kinds in all places are to be honoured for their courage, patriotism and idealism, claims one of the organisers of this event. Gilbert Potter of Apsley House, Cahir had come to Cahir in 1912 as a District Inspector of the Royal Irish Constabulary. For eight years he and his wife Lily lived in Apsley House, Wellington Street, Cahir and became very popular and thoroughly integrated into the Cahir community. In particular, he is remembered for his role in keeping to a minimum the presence of the dreaded Black and Tans on the streets of Cahir. In April 1921 Dinny Lacey's column of the 3rd Tipperary Brigade I.R.A. was in the Cahir district, having been informed that it had become usual for a convoy of British troops to pass between Clogheen and Cahir each Friday. On April 22nd, an ambush was arranged and the sharp encounter that followed led to the death of one soldier and the destruction of the convoy. At Curragh-Clooney as the column marched along with their booty, a Model T. Ford car rounded the corner and almost ran into the rear guard. The occupant identified himself as D. J. Potter of the R.I.C. Cahir and was immediately taken prisoner. The column moved on through Newcastle and into the Nire Valley where he was held at McCarthy's of Knockavannagh where he looked for a prayer book. The next day the column, with their prisoners, crossed the Comeraghs and moved to Coolnahorna. The following day he was told he was being held to ransom for the life of Thomas Traynor, a Dublin shoemaker convicted with the Great Brunswick Street ambush and sentenced to death. No reply was received from the British but there were claims that a secret deal was offered whereby four I.R.A. prisoners would be allowed to escape if Potter was released. Whatever the true account, the result was Traynor was hanged on April 25th leaving the I.R.A. in a dilemma. The alternative was to execute Potter who was a kind and cultured gentleman and a brave officer.

While in captivity, he was allowed to keep a diary and on entry in it for April 27th 1921 reads "sixth day slept well, rose 7.30 a.m., tea and egg at 9.30 a.m., at about 11.00 a.m. I was told I was to die this evening at 7.00 p.m. The young men who have been guarding me have been kind all through. Their authorities have made the order and they are sorry. They are, I am sure, humane leaders who will pity my wife who is Irish as I am also. I ask you dear Lily to let not bitter words against our enemies escape you, do not allow hatred to dwell in you. I want love in your heart. It comes from our Father." He was executed by firing squad that evening. The following August his body was returned and buried with full military honours in the Church of Ireland Cemetery at Kilcommon, Cahir. As an official reprisal, the British Military blew up several houses in South Tipperary including Tobins of Tincurry, a safe haven for the man on the run.

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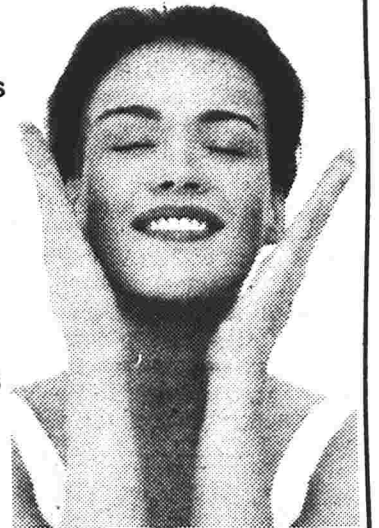

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Give Border Plants Lots Of Support

NOW is a good time to stake your border plants. They should be shooting up nicely at this time of year and if you don't get round to supporting them, you run the risk of some of the shoots getting bent in any heavy rain that's around the corner.

You can divide herbaceous plants into two categories — those which bloom before the end of July (lupins, delphiniums, oriental poppies, geums, gypsophylas, bocconias, peonies and an-chusas) and those which bloom after.

The kind of stakes you use will depend on the type of plant. For instance, for those that are low-growing and tend to spread (e.g. geranium grandiflorum, phloxes, etc.) a ring of bushy pea sticks would be ideal support.

Use three or more tall canes or sticks for such things as delphiniums and lupins, etc. In all cases, do make sure that your supports are well and truly into the ground. I suggest at least 6 ins.; make sure they're just clear of the outer shoots and open them up slightly at the top to allow for the plant's growth.

A 4 ft. tall plant, for example, needs a stake projecting 3 ft. above the ground level.

If you're using bushy sticks (twigs) then you won't need to tie up the plants to them, but you will in all other cases. String's okay, but not the best. I much prefer green twist or raffia, and if you use raffia, it's easier to use if you soak it in water first.

There's a technique for tying, too. First you should wrap the twist or raffia round one of the stakes, leaving a free end long enough to tie. Next take it round the plant loosely, wrapping the material round each of the other stakes, before making a secure tie with the free end. What you must never do is draw the tie too tightly — always leave room between the stake and the plant stem.

When staking such plants as delphiniums, a single tie is all that's required. First wrap the material round the stake, and then cross it between the stake and the stem before enclosing the stem in a securely tied loop, large enough to allow for natural expansion.

And here's another tip — make each tie immediately above a leaf joint. That will stop it slipping.

There are other ways of supporting border plants of course. Some gardeners prefer to use string netting with bushy plants. It's a special wide-mesh netting and you cut it into squares, one square for each plant. You tie the squares to four stakes pushed into the ground around the plant. It can be very effective as the plants grow through the meshes and are supported by it.

These days you can also buy special inter-linking plastic-covered (dark green) metal angled L-shaped rods, one end of which is pushed into the soil around the plants and the other hooks into its neighbour, forming a triangular support.

They are quite invisible among the fully-grown herbaceous plants.

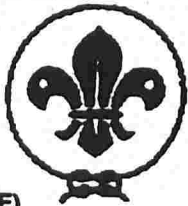

PROTEIN 350

- * The protein 350 target is to make first cut silage with a DMD of 70 to 75.
- * Aim to harvest silage without seedheads in the second half of May. Once seedheads begin to emerge, silage DMD drops by 3 to 4 units per week.
- * Where silage lodges, cut it as soon as possible as it will begin to rot at the base and DMD will drop by up to 10 DMD units in a week.
- * An ensilability test will give you the sugar levels in your silage which will guide as to whether an additive is required and which type.
- * Where an additive is required, you must make an estimate of silage yield per acre to decide on the application rate. You can do this by either weighing a trailer load or by cutting a few strips in the field. The grass yield from 1 sq. yd. multiplied by 4840 gives you the per acre yield.
- * In wet ensiling conditions, use an acid or sugar based additive and increase application rates by 50%.
- * In good weather conditions, try to get a quick wilt.

Opening the gates of the mower and tedding the grass will help.

SILAGE

* Teagasc has set a target of improving milk protein percentage from 3.2% to 3.5%. Target milk protein % for May should be 3.4%.

* Average milk protein % for May '95 was 3.18%. To improve your protein %, the actions you should take in May include -

1. Manage grass properly in May; 2. Make 75 DMD silage; 3. Ensure compact calving; 4. Use positive protein % bulls.

MANAGE MAY GRASS

- * Rotation length should be 18 to 21 days in May.
- * May grass must be grazed to an average of 6 cm (2.5 inches) to ensure quality grass for the coming months. If not grazed to 6 cm, it should be topped to this level.
- * Grazing too tightly will depress milk yield and could result in cows not going in calf.
- * Grazing too laxly will result in poor stemmy grass and reduce milk yield and milk protein % for the rest of the year.

* Topping should be carried out after the second rotation i.e. from mid May onwards.

* The correct post-grazing height will be about the height of the toe of your welly in the bare areas. Better still you can establish average post grazing height by taking 20 readings at equal distances across your paddock with a measuring tape, measuring the height of the top leaves/stem and averaging the results.

COMPACT CALVING

* In a Spring calving herd, compact calving close to turn out to grass reduces costs and improves protein %.

* Essential steps to get compact calving are - keep proper records in a breeding chart, tail paint your cows to improve heat detection and consider synchronisation for replacement heifers or where calving pattern is bad.

* Cows must be on a good plane of nutrition during the breeding season. Aim for high intake of grass and supplement with meal in difficult conditions.

POSITIVE PROTEIN % BULLS

* Replacement heifers should only be bred from A.I. bulls. Replacement heifers from non A.I. Freisian bulls will give poor yield and poor milk composition.

* Breed at least 50% and preferably 60%+ of your herd to Freisian A.I. bulls to ensure adequate quality replacements.

* Select bulls on the basis of - 1. R.B.I.; 2. Protein %; 3. Other traits e.g. udders and legs.

* It is possible to improve yield and composition through careful bull selection.

* To improve milk protein % bulls selected should have a proof of more than plus 0.03% protein.

* If you want a list of the best bulls for protein improvement, call to our office.

Carrickbeg/Windgap IFA Branch Meeting

At the recent meeting of Carrickbeg/Windgap IFA Branch meeting members heard Sean O'Neill, Secretary of IFA's National Animal Health Committee, give details of the new T.B. Scheme and Calf Identification Scheme. On the new tags, Mr. O'Neill said that they will be more easily identified and this will allow more accurate recording than the old system. He said that in 1994 over £3 million in premia had been lost due to incorrect tag numbers.

On the control and eradication of T.B. Mr. O'Neill informed the meeting that over 99.5% of cattle in Ireland are TB free and in Co. Waterford approximately 48 herds are "locked up" which is well below the national average. The IFA man also stated that the current Vet fees are excessive and that farmers should negotiate with their Vets as reduced rates are available. On TB itself, Sean O'Neill said that 20% of TB cases are caused by old cows in the herd who become immune to the test. Farmers should use a blood test to identify these animals.

70% of TB cases can be attributed to wildlife. He also said that the current CPSU dispute is causing major problems for farmers wishing to sell stock and that IFA are insisting that the Minister for Agriculture, Ivan Yates breaks the CPSU stronghold in order to allow farmers to sell stocks.

Hugh O'Neill, O'Sullivan & Co., addressed the meeting and dealt with the current level of problems with Area Aid applications. He stated that farmers should be aware of the change to the stock density limit. It has been reduced to 0.8L.U./acre, but the limit for Extension Premium has remained at 0.566L.U./acre. He also dealt with the new changes to the REPS Scheme and the serious delays in second payments.

Finally, John Dowley, Chairman of Waterford Foods, briefed the meeting on the current dairy markets. The Chairman of the branch, Ray Murphy opened the meeting on the floor and a lively discussion took place on the above topics. He then thanked the guest speakers and this concluded the business of the meeting.

ICMSA Proposals On Headage Payments

The Minister for Agriculture must ensure that no farmer in the newly designated disadvantaged areas will lose out on 1996 headage payments because of the delay in finalising the regulation in Brussels, ICMSA Rural Development Chairman, Dan McCarthy, said recently.

Mr. McCarthy said that he was disappointed and concerned at the delay in getting EU Council approval for extension of the disadvantaged areas in Ireland. Mr. McCarthy, a member of the Appeals Panel, said that a tremendous amount of work was undertaken by groups of farmers around the country and by the Appeal Panel in putting together the submission to Brussels. There is no real excuse for the inordinate delay. The farmers in the new areas have already lost out over the years on headage payments to which they are properly entitled.

Mr. McCarthy said that while the deadline for sheep headage was January 9 last, and the deadline for application for headage for beef cows is May 31, he had received a commitment from the Department that sheep and beef cow headage will be paid to farmers in the newly included disadvantaged areas in 1996, based on their application for the ewe premium or the suckler cow premium. It would seem that the Council Regu-

lation will not be approved before September next.

Mr. McCarthy advised farmers with beef cows in areas likely to be included in the forthcoming extension to the disadvantaged areas to apply for the Suckler Cow Scheme before the closing date May 31 so that their application for headage payment can be processed at an early date. However, Mr. McCarthy said that farmers who apply for the scheme later in the year must also be accommodated for and receive their full entitlement to headage payments for 1996.

Union Dispute Is In Breach Of PCW

ICMSA President, Frank Allen, declared that the industrial action by the Civil and Public Services Union was a clear breach of the Programme for Competitiveness and Work.

Mr. Allen has written to the Chairman of the Central Review Committee, Paddy Teehan, urging him to call an immediate meeting of the committee to address the problems being caused by the dispute.

Waterford IFA County Executive Meeting

At the well attended May meeting of Waterford IFA County Executive meeting, Chairman, James Coughlan voiced the concerns of farmers in Co. Waterford on the issue of the CPSU dispute. "Farmers are extremely frustrated with the current situation, farmers who have cattle to sell are completely at the mercy of the CPSU", he said. He continued, "the beef industry is already on its knees and this action by the CPSU is totally unacceptable.

Other issues at the IFA meeting were current severity in grading, Finance Bill and Disadvantaged Areas Appeal.

The Chairman congratulated and welcomed Eddie Keane, National Chairman, IFA Poultry Committee to the meeting. Mr. Keane outlined the main issues on

the agenda at present. He dealt with the current EPA regulations which will eventually affect every sector of agriculture. He stated that from September 3 this year agriculture will be subject to EPA licensing. The Executive decided to have a full discussion on this important topic at the next meeting.

National Council representative, Gerry Murphy, who represents Co. Waterford's 24 branches on IFA's ruling body, reported on the monthly National Council meeting of the Association held in Dublin, where the issues of the BSE crisis and current dairy market situation were discussed.

The next meeting of the Co. Waterford IFA Executive will be held on June 4 in Lawlors Hotel, Dungarvan.

IMPORTANT NOTICE 1996 CATTLE HEADAGE SCHEMES Tagging of calves

The closing date for receipt of completed application forms under the 1996 Cattle Headage Schemes is 31 May 1996.

Calves born in 1996 are eligible for grants under the 1996 Cattle Headage Scheme for farmers whose land is situated in More Severely Handicapped Areas. The eartag number of each animal applied on must be inserted on the application form.

While distribution of the new plastic tags and accompanying documentation is proceeding as planned some farmers, particularly new herdowners in More Severely Handicapped Areas, may not receive their new tags and accompanying documentation in time to allow a Cattle Headage application to be submitted before the closing date of 31 May 1996. Such farmers are advised that if they have calves on which they wish to apply for 1996 Cattle Headage grants they should immediately make arrangements to have those calves tagged by their Veterinary practitioner using the old metal tags. Such animals should not subsequently be tagged with the plastic tags.



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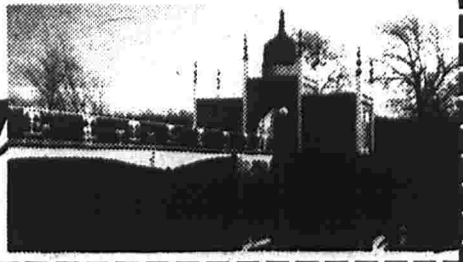

Residents Object To Ballinacourty Pier Development

A petition carrying over 250 signatures has been presented to Waterford County Council with regard to a development by Gold Coast Holidays Ltd. at Ballinacourty pier.

The development, which has already exceeded several terms of the planning permission granted by the Council, involves the construction of a new entrance, and car parking facilities at the 18-hole Gold Coast golf course overlooking Dungarvan bay.

Gold Coast Holidays Ltd. has now lodged a further application seeking to retain what has already been constructed at the pier and for permission to complete the work.

According to Cllr. Billy Kyne, who raised the issue at last Monday's Co. Council meeting, in the original application no reference to widening the road or the taking over of the local beach and boating access area was made.

He claimed that the 2 turrets were built in the wrong location with both being two-storey although planning permission specified that one should be single storey. The height of these towers had been exceeded by half a metre while the extent of the rock fill and the subsequent taking over of the beach area had also exceeded the original permission by a totally unacceptable degree.

Cllr. Kyne continued that in the original application, the section on land ownership was not filled in while no documentation on the high water mark or queries to the Dept. of the Marine were raised in regard to incorporating part the beach into the road widening area.

"It's time for a committee to be set up where the residents, planning officers from Waterford Co. Council and the developers can come together and solve all problems", he stated.

The people of Ballinacourty he declared have been more than patient.

CAN'T SEE ANYTHING WRONG

In total contrast however, Cllr. Jackie Fahey said the Council should give every consideration to what the development means.

"I can't see anything wrong", he stated, adding that he was surprised to hear of the objection.

"Development of that area is highly desirable...tourism is very important...especial-

ly the golfing scene", he added.

Likewise Cllr. Ciaran O Rian said he saw no reasons for any objections to the development. The two turrets were beautiful structures he claimed while the developers employ almost 200 people, giving valuable employment to local residents. "Is there a lot of jealousy attached to this?" he queried.

POLICING SYSTEM

Totally opposed to the development was Cllr. Tom Cunningham, who said there will be uproar if it goes ahead.

Cllr. Tony Wright submitted that a policing system for major developments should be put in place. "It's not good enough to grant planning permission and forget about it," he stated.

Cllr. Austin Flynn and Cllr. Lar Hart also denounced the actions of the company.

REJECT FAVOURITISM CLAIM

Rejecting any claims of favouritism by the Council, Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly said the application was dealt with fairly on its merits. While admitting that the developers exceeded several terms of the planning permission, Mr. Connolly said there was no intention on the developers part to mislead the Council or the residents.

A decision will be made on the developers current application in due course and in the interim, Mr. Connolly said he will meet with the objectors to discuss their views.

Deprived Of Compromise And Common Sense

Dear Editor,

It was with disbelief and astonishment that I learned of a situation which took place in C.B.S. Dungarvan this week. The local C.B.S. school had qualified for a prestigious Munster semi final in Under 16 1/2 'B' football which in itself was a great achievement for such a small school. On the way to the semi final they had claimed the scalps of some of the great footballing colleges.

An amazing situation developed when the school refused permission to three key players on the team to take part in the Munster semi final. These three lads are transition year students

doing work experience, and the companies involved were willing to see the lads play the game. The parents of the lads made representations to the school principal and the teachers involved, all to no avail. To my knowledge many representations were made from other quarters as well.

As an ex-pupil of the C.B.S. I feel very disappointed that a decision such as this was made, because the whole ethos of the C.B.S. was, in my day, centered around our national games as a big part of the complete development of the student. The Christian Brothers were and are known far and wide for their

nurturing and promotion of our national games and they have, to their credit, many All Ireland medal holders and on the local scene many county medal winners.

This decision, I believe goes against every ideal and principal of the Christian Brothers, it would never have happened in the days of Bros. Looney, Cleary or Whelan. It is always a great honour to represent your school and I believe this decision has slurred this honour, and will definitely have a long lasting effect on this group of boys.

Many teachers in all the local schools give generously of their time after school hours to give some of the enjoyment and personal development they received back to the next generation. The stu-

dents and everyone associated with underage games in this county appreciate the work that is being put in by all the local teachers. When decisions like this are made, we must work even harder to support the teachers in our schools who are willing to teach and promote our National Games and to ensure such decisions do not damage the commitment of our players and coaches.

Education is not all about academic achievement it also entails the complete development of the student and our games are inclusive in that development.

TALLOW G.A.A. CLUB NOTES

McCarthy Thoughts

Friday, April 16th marked another milestone in the history of our town with the visit of Charlie and Mick McCarthy and young Michael. The events have been well chronicled in this paper and of how Tallow honoured Mick, but for Charlie it was a very special occasion too. Eavesdropping on the many exchanges of memories and stories among his friends and acquaintances was rewarding and revealing. His delight with anecdotes of his youthful hurling days was genuine and he relished a discussion on skills of his time. His own agility and skill and craft are well documented and he demonstrated to Tom Doyle, our club secretary, how he caught the high dropping ball while keeping all of his fingers intact.

"I was often asked," he said, "how I didn't get my fingers broken. This is how I did it - right hand fully outstretched (he was a citeog) with the hurley covering it". Simple I suppose but only with practice.

He had a busy night chatting with Mick and Babs Mulcahy, once his next door neighbours, Mrs. Daley across the road in Chapel Street, hundreds of friends, team mates and opponents whose reminiscences he enjoyed hugely. Do you know that Charlie had a good eye for the women? Didn't he train the Tallow camogie team one year - wonder would he do it again.

Before the night was over he made a presentation to a lifelong friend, Con Ryan, of a sliotar. It was an old sliotar, the actual one used in the final of the Yorkshire hurling championship in 1950 which St. Joseph's Barnsley won so gloriously and in which Charlie distinguished himself. In return our club had a little memento of his visit for Charlie. Chairman Sean Sheehan presented him with a club jersey, a gesture which touched him deeply and was a source of delight to him.

An interesting historical perspective on the McCarthy visit came to light in the form of an interesting article taken from the 'Southern Star' which, when addressed to the 'Dungarvan Leader' with instructions to pass it me, Michael Power forwarded. The article was written by Patrick Conn, a journalist of international repute who knew Charlie McCarthy very well indeed around 1949-50 because they were close friends in Barnsley when he (Conn) was club chairman of St. Joseph's Barnsley and Yorkshire delegate to the GAA's British Provincial Council. It was Charlie who recommended Conn as provincial delegate on the grounds that he reckoned that Conn was the ideal publicly conduit as sports editor of the 'Barnsley Chronicle' and because his hurling-orientated parents with a strong hurling tradition, one from Connemara, the other a Tipperary descendant, ideally fitted Conn for any position involving the promotion of Charlie's beloved game of hurling. Charlie and Patrick enjoyed only one full season together because Charlie soon left the miners' hostel beside the splendid coke-based pitch to get married and set up his own home and Conn, the journalist, moved south to join newspapers in London. But in that one season when Charlie was captain of the team, they never lost a single match and the friendly combination of skillful hurler and articulate administrator and leader set new standards in that region before going their separate ways. So it is scarcely surprising that Patrick Conn was eagerly looking forward to renewing acquaintances with Charlie after a lapse of over 40 years.

Patrick Conn has an intriguing background story of historical interest to Jack Charlton's and Mick McCarthy's appointments as Ireland's manager in turn. But for the initiative and persistence of Conn, our law as it stood 40 years ago would have precluded their appointment. It was as a result of Conn's protest in 1955 that a new Nationality Act came in force the year after which

permitted citizenship to children and grandchildren of Irish emigrants on proof of birth certificate. Up to then the offspring of economic or political Irish exiles had no rights of citizenship through blood and choice. They were treated worse than aliens and property ownership penalties imposed if they dared to return to the land of their parents and take up jobs. It was a punishment in line with the execrable Penal Laws.

In those times, grown up children of exiles who were not rich or fiscally astute were told that they must pay stamp duty of 3% for new homes (natives paid 1%), and a massive 25% for second hand houses or flats compared with 3% for those born within the state. Blatant discrimination.

It was in 1955 when he was working for the Irish Times group as a sub editor that Patrick Conn lost the initial deposit on a house in Churchtown, south Dublin, because he was unaware of this mischievous exclusion from citizenship benefits. Amazingly if an Irish parent left the country before 1922, when the Irish Free State was established, all offspring were, like Conn, denied nationality if they came here to live and work. Incensed, Patrick began a protest campaign with the Department of Justice. National newspapers gave it prominence, one with the heading, "Conn finds water thicker than blood". Politicians (wouldn't you know) and lawyers soon joined the campaign which bore abundant fruit when the new Nationality Act 1956 came into force.

Without that piece of legislation, Jack Charlton's success story wouldn't have been possible, Mick McCarthy could not have played 57 times for Ireland or succeeded Jack and many many of our teams over the last 20 years would not have been available for selection. All because Charlie's friend wasn't satisfied to tolerate an abuse enshrined in law which penalised those with a love for their ancestral homeland.

I just wonder was Charlie among the first Waterford players to perfect the catching technique? I remember Shem Downey, Kilkenny (father of Angela and Ann the famous camogie twins) in the middle and late forties as he defied slashing sticks to snare the sliotar into his steady grasp by safely protecting his catching hand with his hurley. It seemed to me at the time to be an unjustifiable risk, a bit of Russian roulette with one's hand. Such is not the case of course when the skill is performed correctly. As applies so often where the overhead ball is concerned, a player's correct positioning is all important.

That same skill performed by a defender needs a slight amendment of technique and the back trying to secure possession must be strong and place himself at his opponents back hand shoulder if he wishes success. Tom Fives of our present Waterford team knows how to do this but many others think they have a divine right to catch every ball unchallenged and don't choose the right circumstance in which to attempt the catch successfully. In that area of decision-making, the intelligent player stands out; he knows when to flick or block, move or pull, lift or handle. Most team players are required to make 50 to 100 decisions in every game and winning could very well depend on how quickly those are made and how correctly.

Charlie has all of his fingers still and he needed every one of them on that exciting Friday night to cope with the endless succession of handshakes and hugs. It was an emotional night for him and disappointingly the visit too brief, the time too short. There will be other Tallow trips I'm sure and Charlie and Mick and the family will always find welcoming hands to grasp in the small town of their roots.

Chemical refining of the skin

A CHEMICAL peel consists of a caustic substance being applied to the skin in order to burn the outer layer of the skin. Chemical refining of the skin is used on rough, freckled or blemished skin in order to restore it to a smoother younger texture. A chemical peel may also be used after a face lift to smooth out any remaining fine lines. The caustic substance is applied to the skin with cotton applicators only to the area which needs

treatment. A mild sedative is all that is needed for the procedure. The skin turns red after a few minutes. Waterproof tape is placed over the area which has been treated for two days before being removed carefully. Antiseptic powder is then applied frequently until a crust forms. The crust falls off after about seven days leaving the skin pink. The skin should not be exposed to the sunlight and it takes about five months for the

skin to completely return to normal. When having a chemical peel, the entire face must first be treated, but specific areas may be treated later. It is important to seek professional advice about skin peeling. If the peel is not done exactly right it can cause scars or blotchiness to the skin. However, the skin generally reacts well to the treatment and an overall improvement is made to the appearance of the skin.

Cheff's Corner

Menus for the week



Lardy Cake

1 packet (250g) pizza bread mix
4 oz (125g) mixed peel
4 oz (125g) mixed dried fruit
1 level teaspoon mixed spice
4 oz (125g) light brown sugar
6 oz (175g) lard
Honey or Syrup, to glaze
7 x7in (18 x18cm) baking or roasting tin

METHOD: Make up the pizza bread mix according to the directions on the packet. Roll out the dough on a lightly floured surface to a large oblong. Mix together the peel, dried fruit, mixed spice and sugar. Dot a third of the lard over the dough. Sprinkle with one third of the fruit mixture, then roll it up Swiss-roll fashion. With the join underneath, give

the roll a quarter turn. Seal the ends by pressing them with a rolling pin then roll it out again into an oblong strip. Repeat the lard, fruit mixture and rolling up twice more. Finally roll the dough into a square to fit the tin and, with the point of a sharp knife, score the top into a diamond pattern. Place the tin inside an oiled plastic bag and put in a warm place until doubled in size. Set the oven to fairly hot, Gas Mark 6 or 400°F/200°C. Bake the lardy cake just above the centre of the oven for 30-35 minutes until well risen and brown. Brush with honey or syrup to glaze. Leave in the tin for 10 minutes before turning out to allow the cake to absorb the lard. Best served warm. It can be refreshed by wrapping in foil and heating in a very hot oven Gas Mark 8 or 450°F/230°C for 10 minutes.

Green Pea Soup

Serves: 4
1oz (30g) butter
1 bunch spring onions, trimmed and sliced
1 clove garlic, peeled and

crushed
12 oz-1lb (350-500g) frozen peas
1 pint (600ml) chicken stock or water and a stock cube
1 level teaspoon caster sugar
Salt and ground black pepper
1 round lettuce
Garnish for cold soup:
2 tablespoons freshly chopped mint and a little diced ham
Garnish for hot soup:
cream or fromage frais

METHOD: Melt the butter, add the onions and garlic and cover the pan with lid. Soften over a low heat for about 3 minutes - don't let them colour. Add the peas, stock or water and a stock cube. Add the sugar, and salt (If no stock cube was used), and pepper. Bring to the boil and simmer for 5 minutes. Wash and roughly chop the lettuce. Add to the soup and simmer for a further 3 minutes. Cool a little, then blend in a processor or blender. If liked, sieve to achieve a smoother soup. If serving cold, cool quickly and stir in mint and sprinkle over finely diced ham. If serving hot, reheat quickly and stir cream or fromage frais into each bowl.

Family Health

By Dr. DAVE BARRY

Q. My seven year-old daughter has complained of headaches almost every day for the past six weeks. She is off school a lot and the doctor cannot find a reason for them. What do you suggest?
A. If she is otherwise well, the chance of there being any serious cause is not very high. Diagnosis of recurrent headaches in young people can be very difficult. The position of the headaches is important - for instance, if they are on one side of the head it could be migraine. Any associated visual change may also point to migraine. You may be able to pick up triggers, such as certain foods or times of day which set off her headaches. Most recurrent headaches in children are 'psychogenic', which means there is no discernible physical cause. This does not make the distress and pain any less

severe, or problem any easier to solve. To set all your minds at ease, I suggest you ask for a referral to a paediatrician.
Q. I am two months pregnant. I worry about having a miscarriage as my mother who had a large family had four miscarriages. Is there a hereditary element involved?
A. There is no reason to believe that hereditary is involved in miscarriage. They occur for a lot of reasons including illness during pregnancy, hormonal imbalance and some abnormality of the fetus. In some cases there is no explanation as to why a miscarriage occurs. Try not to worry - you should be enjoying your pregnancy. Do remember to keep all your appointments with your doctor. If there is any evidence of bleeding do not hesitate to see your doctor straight away.

Household Hints

- Unwrap cork tiles and leave for 24 hours before laying, otherwise the cork will expand and lift after fitting.
- If you're not sure if an egg in the fridge is fresh or hard-boiled, spin it on its side on a flat, hard surface. A raw egg will spin unevenly, a hard boiled one spins evenly.
- Stop your kettle furring by keeping a marble or piece of sponge loofah inside it - the lime scale will collect there instead of on the element.
- To stop mildew growing on shower curtains, hang a packet of silica gel crystals (from chemists) in the shower cubicle. It will absorb the moisture.
- Or leave the curtain opened out after having a shower to allow the air to circulate and stop mildew forming.

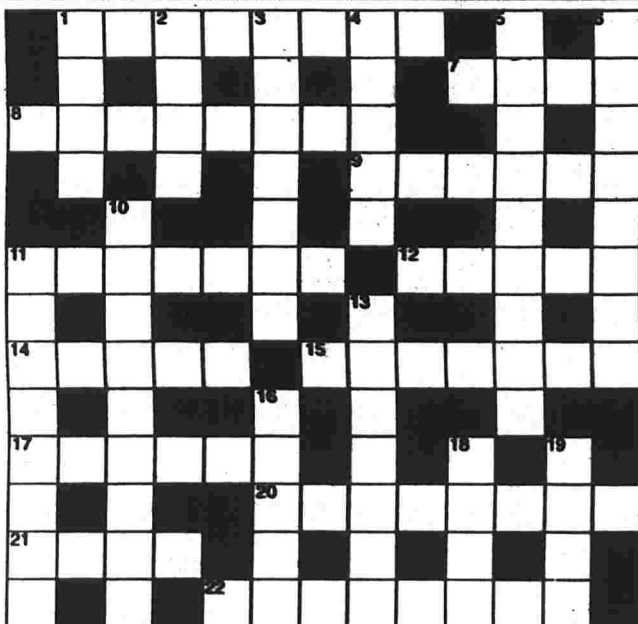

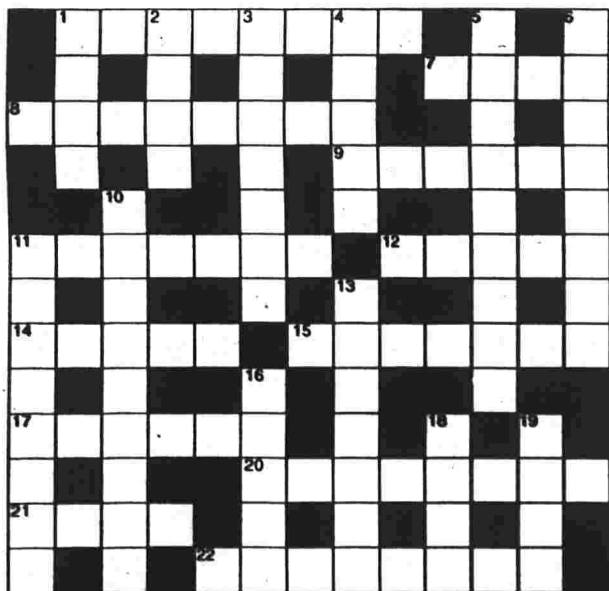

What was to be one of the games of the season never got going. After turning in their best display of the season in the previous round, Dungarvan can only be disappointed to have given one of their worst here.

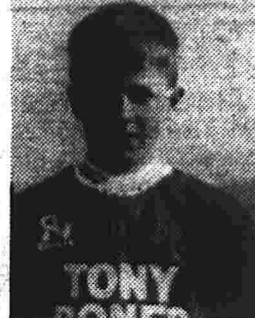
To their credit Kilmacthomas came up with the determination that the Blues were not going to get a hat-trick of wins over them this season.

Summer Series —
Starting Next Week!

The Nike/Ballycotton Summer Road Race Series '96 kicks-off on Thursday evening, May 23, when the little village of Ballyandreen (two miles from Ballycotton) hosts the first of this year's events, starting at 8 p.m.

Now in its sixteenth year, the four race series is regarded as an integral part of the southern running scene, attracting around 200 competitors to each of the 5 mile events from the Cork and West Waterford areas. The races take place on the fourth Thursday of May, June, July and August. After Ballyandreen, the remaining events will be in Shanagarry (June 27), Churchtown South (July 25) and Ballycotton (August 22).

As usual again this year there is a comprehensive list of prizes in each race, including spots. The overall awards will be based on the cumulative time over the four races and the first fifty men and first fifteen women overall will receive a t-shirt. In addition, each runner completing the four events qualifies for the special souvenir plaque, which is a much sought after prize.

The entry fee for the first three races is £2 per race, with the final race at £2.50 of which 50p goes to a charity. Once again, the '96 series is sponsored by Nike who also sponsor the Ballycotton '10.'

Last year the Ballyandreen '5' had a total of 202 finishers. The winner in a time of 25:15, was Liam O'Brien and amazingly, Liam has won this race every year since the inaugural event in 1981. This must surely be the longest winning streak in any one race in this country.

Indeed, the only comparable performance in these islands would be that of Mike McLeod (former Olympic silver medallist) in the Saltwell Road Race in the North-East of England, which he won 16 times from 1974 to 1989. However, that race, unlike Ballyandreen, has had other winners. So, if Liam wins on this occasion he will equal McLeod's record run of victories. Liam's course record of 24:00 was set in 1994.

The first woman last year was Niamh Richardson in a time of 28:43, which was 10 seconds outside the record held since 1988 by Eileen Prunty.

Although the Ballyandreen course is not an easy one, a total of 55 runners finished under the thirty minute barrier in '95, which was, however, 30 less than the previous year.

Just a reminder once again that the Ballyandreen '5' is on Thursday, May 23, as there are five Thursdays in May. Entries will be taken from 6 p.m. onwards on the night and runners are asked to arrive early as parking and changing facilities are limited.

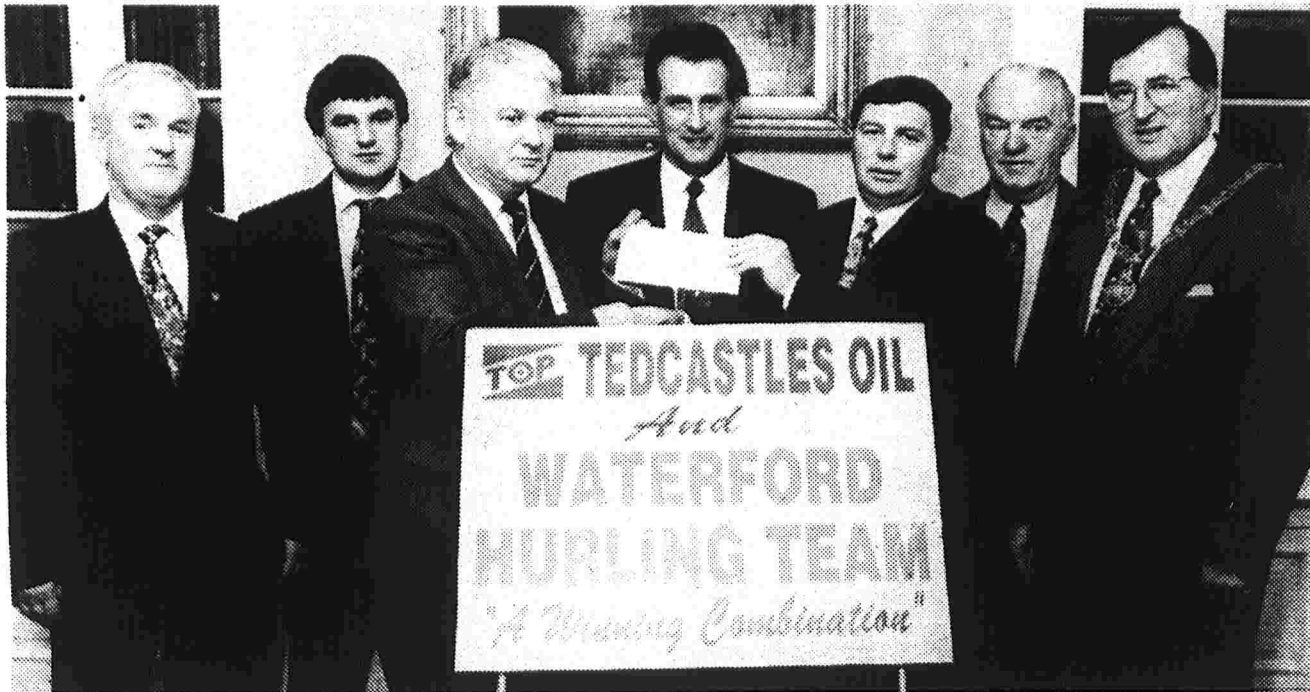

Waterford Senior Hurlers Play Dublin In Erin's Own Tournament

Waterford senior hurlers will have their final outing together before meeting Tipperary two weeks later, when they line out against Dublin in the final of the Erin's Own sponsored tournament at Walsh Park on Sunday evening. The expectations are that for this game the selectors will field a team which will be on the lines of the side to play against Tipperary in the Munster championships two weeks later, but a lot will depend on the availability of some players who have club engagements in the days before the Dublin match.

This game on Sunday evening will be watched with more than a little interest by patrons and note will be taken of the performances of several players whose form seems to be a source of concern to followers.

SARGENT CUP

We are now moving to the second last round of the competition and in response to an appeal by the county selectors, a number of the scheduled round six games have been brought forward to Thursday (tomorrow) evening. The appeal was to have this round of games called off until after the Tipperary game on June 2, but the GAC did not agree to call off the round fixed for the 19th inst., and did a rescheduling, as referred to above.

I have been told that this arrangement has not satisfied the selectors or players and that a further request was being made to the County Board on Monday night.

The dissatisfaction that presently exists between the team and the GAC is a result of the refusal of clubs to release their players to train with the county teams. When this cup competition was debated by the County Board before being accepted it was agreed (or supposed to have been agreed) that players required by the selectors, would be released and replaced by players whose status would not be interfered with. As far as I am aware, no clubs released players to accommodate the county selectors. All were obviously treating the cup competition as a championship, which it was not.

The Coiste Gnotha have now come up with a formula which was due to be recommended to County Board on Monday night and if approved will prove very advantageous to the top four teams in the cup as they will be seeded going into the

championship proper in July. Overall, this tournament was not all that it was cracked up to be and I doubt very much if it will be repeated next year.

The matches listed for this week are expected to produce results that will certainly copperfasten the claims of the top four — Lismore, Ballygunner, Passage and De La Salle — as the leading foursome who will battle for the honours and qualify for the seeding later on.

BALLYGUNNER V. ERIN'S OWN

It cannot be much more than a formality for the county champions who are unbeaten to date and with ten points are certain of qualifying. Erin's Own, who are still but a pale shadow of their former greatness, are making good progress, but it will take time before they measure up to the standard of the 'Gunners.

PASSAGE V. CLONEA

This will prove to be nothing more than a training spin for both sides. Unless there is a major shock, Passage will win and bring their points up to eight. Clonea are one of a number of teams doing very poorly in the cup and are already in the 'also-ran' group.

MOUNT SION V. ST. MOLLERANS

Even though Mount Sion defeated Ballyduff on Sunday there is now no way back for them as far as reaching the top four is concerned. They are the pioneers of the new-style cup competition and up to this stage have fared very disappointingly. It will be regarded as the biggest surprise of the entire competition, if they go under to the 1995 intermediate champions, St. Mollerans.

They were accepting the situation as it is and agree that this is a matter for the club and the club only but the haphazard running of games and the switching from football to hurling and vice versa was mentioned as an unhelpful factor.

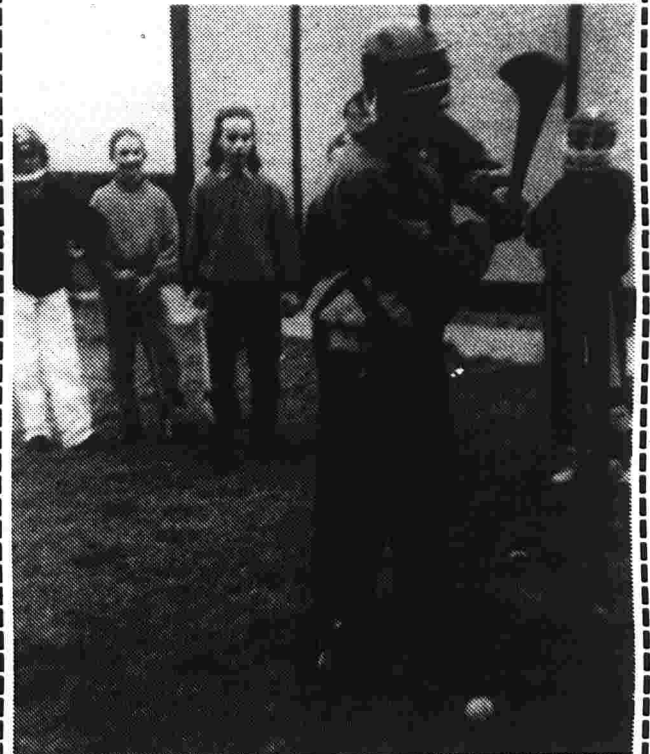
beyond doubt and allowed the home side to run out easy and deserving winners.
