Still No Start On Dungarvan's Multi Million Pound Shopping Complex

The bricks and mortar stage has been long in coming for Dungarvan's multi million pound development at Main Street which would see a semi-derelict area of the town transformed into a major shopping/residential complex.

The developers - Irish Nationwide Building Society (INBS) - lodged their first planning application for the project with the local authority in February 1995 and received permission to proceed with the commercial development last December. In the interim however the weeks have

stretched into months without any indication of a start being made.

There is now growing concern in the town about this serious delay in getting the multi-million pound development off the ground. Apart from the employment created in the construction phase, the project itself is

expected to create more than 100 jobs.

BADLY NEEDED KICK-START

Seen by most as an essential kick-start to Dungarvan's urban renewal aspirations, the Main Street project was the first planning application to be lodged under this scheme. The development however will have to be completed by July 1997 to qualify for a substantial package of financial incentives such as

attractive tax allowances and rate remissions.

On the announcement of the proposed development which involves the construction of 17 retail units and 23 upstairs apartments, much excitement was generated locally. This dilapidated part of the town was the source of much criticism by local townspeople and urban councillors, who have waited many years for a major investing party such as

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Council Flooded With Objections To Wind Masts

The planning section of Waterford County Council has been practically flooded with objections to two proposed wind farm 'test' sites near Mount Melleray. To date the Council has received at least 100 objections drawn from a wide geographical area and spear-headed by the Knockmeal-down Protection Committee who are strongly opposed to the erection of both wind monitoring systems.

The planning applications for the wind test systems were lodged by Bristol-based Colham Energy Ltd. last March for the erection of two 40 metre masts, one at Tooranahreen and one at

Knocknafallia, on the lands of Sir Richard Keane of Cappelquin Estates.

Should planning permission be granted to Colham, the masts will remain on site for a year to enable wind characteristics to be studied. During this period, enquiries and investigations would be carried out to establish the suitability and viability of the land for a wind farm.

A decision on the application was due to be made by County Manager Donal Connolly by last weekend but the Planning Dept. has since made a request for additional information from Colham which will put the

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

Can I get tax relief in relation to medical expenses and how do I do it?

ANSWER

If you have paid Income Tax for the year of claim (no tax, no refund) you can get relief in relation to medical expenses. There must not have been reimbursement by an insurance company (e.g. VHI) for those expenses, though a claim can be made for non-reimbursed costs (e.g. not paid by VHI).

Relief can be claimed for an individual to the extent that expenses in the tax year exceed £100 per annum or £200 per annum for 2 or more persons (a family).

A claim form MED 1 is available from your Tax Office (MED 2 should be completed by your dentist for dental expenses). Receipts, naming individual(s) concerned, the amount paid and the date of payment have to be provided.

Allowable expenses are hospital, G.P., drugs, medical appliances, physiotherapy, orthoptic treatment, nursing home charges. Not allowable are routine dental or optical treatment, or routine maternity treatment.

Relief for any Income Tax Year is given by repayment. A condition for eligibility is that a "Return of Income" has been made for the year and the tax has been paid as due.

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COMPENSATION TRIBUNAL FOR CERTAIN PERSONS WHO HAVE CONTRACTED HEPATITIS C FROM ANTI-D IMMUNOGLOBULIN, BLOOD TRANSFUSION OR OTHER BLOOD PRODUCTS

I The Compensation Tribunal established by the Minister for Health on 15th December 1995 is now dealing with applications from:

- women who have been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C antibodies or Hepatitis C virus resulting from the use of Human Immunoglobulin anti D within the State;
- persons who have been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C antibodies or Hepatitis C virus as a result of receiving a blood transfusion or a blood product within the State;
- children and partners of persons referred to at (a) and (b) above who have been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C antibodies and/or Hepatitis C virus;
- persons responsible for the maintenance of any of the persons referred to at (a), (b) and (c) above, and who have incurred financial loss, and/or incurred expenses, as a direct result of providing such maintenance arising from the condition diagnosed and referred to at (a), (b) and (c) above;
- dependents of such persons at (a), (b) and (c) above where such person has died as a result of having contracted Hepatitis C.

Persons described at (a), (b), (c), (d) and (e) above may make application for compensation on the prescribed application form, which may be obtained from:

II The Scheme requires such applications to be made not later than six months from (a) the date of the establishment of the Compensation Tribunal or (b) the date when the claimant becomes aware of such a diagnosis (whichever is the later) except where otherwise provided in Clause 19 of the Scheme.

III Copies of the Compensation Scheme may also be obtained from the Secretary to the Compensation Tribunal on request.

Please note that the six month period, referred to at clause II (a) above, expires 17th June 1996. To comply with this time limit the completed application form will be accepted without the supporting medical data/records.

SCHOOL AMALGAMATION A REALITY

As announced in the local and national papers last week the amalgamation of the Lismore C.B.S. and Presentation Convent primary schools has almost certainly become a reality.

When writing in these notes on the amalgamation, we wrote of the 15% local contribution demanded by the Department of Education and expressed the view that it would be a large burden on the local community. However thanks to the generosity of the Christian Brothers, that 15% will not have to be met

locally. The Christian Brothers have announced that they will meet the approximate £90,000 - (15% of estimated £600,000 cost of new building). However a fundraising committee has been set up to raise £15,000 for additional extensions.

In June 1995 the go ahead was given for six classrooms and a G.P. room and in August 1995 the County Council granted planning permission. As we wrote some months back, the Department now want the six rooms cut back to five rooms

and a G.P. room. On May 1st last, a deputation met the department on the classroom issue and as yet no word has been received back.

The deputation consisted of Bro. Mullally Principal C.B.S. Primary and Mr. Declan Doocey, Board of Management C.B.S., Mrs. Deirdre Kennefick, Principal Presentation Primary and Sr. Aileen Fenton, Chairperson Board of Management, Presentation.

Let us hope they will receive a reply quicker than the problems of Kilrush Community School where an amalgamation was agreed and the Community School agreed in 1992. Kilrush had three schools amalgamated and are still awaiting a single site school.

The above was reported in one of the national daily papers last week.

SAVE BALLINACOURTY PIER!
Dear Sir/Madam,
Ballinacourty Residents Association and friends would like to make the public aware that private development at Ballinacourty Pier, currently stopped by Waterford County Council, is subject to an application for planning retention, by the Developer. Objections have been lodged locally against retention and completion of development and we are at present awaiting the decision of the County Manager, Mr. Donal Connolly.

The Residents Association would therefore formally wish to object to the Planning Application Retention, lodged by Gold Coast Golf and Leisure, on the following grounds

1 — The creation of traffic hazard by converging two-way vehicular traffic including coaches, with normal boating and water-sport activity, boat trailers reversing down the slip; transportation and use of sail boards; launching and landing boats. All this concentration on a 90 degree bend, one of the most dangerous in the area.

2 — The danger to pedestrian traffic, particularly to Children using the slipway and pier area for fishing, paddling, swimming and boating. Pedestrians will now be at risk from increased and increasing traffic coming from all directions.

3 — The environmental impact on an area always associated with leisure/maritime pursuits; the nature of this new development with rock protective armouring and its extended filling in of beach and foreshore, will act as a deterrent to normal use of the harbour.

4 — The interference with foreshore, resulting in loss of small beach without application and granting of foreshore licence from the Department of Marine.

5 — The environmental impact visually of the erection of two turrets to match structures on existing hotel development, rather than complementing rural/maritime nature of location.

6 — No directive to retain old stone wall in keeping with Sylvan, rural setting. Planning application for retention states "boundary to be selected".

7 — Environmental impact of turning a focal community area into a private entrance to a privately owned golf club.

1995 Record Breaking Year For Waterford Foods

The Annual General Meeting of Waterford Foods plc. was held in the Park Hotel, Dungarvan last Wednesday where less than 100 shareholders turned up for what was a rather quiet and uneventful affair compared to previous years.

Perhaps the news of record sales of nearly £787m in 1995 and expectations of reaching the billion mark turnover in '96 threw a positive light on proceedings, and verbal confrontations were a welcome absence.

In his address, Managing Director Matt Walsh reported a very good year for the Group in '95 in terms of earnings growth, margin improvement and strategic development. Operating profits increased by over 20% to £39.7 million while operating cash flow exceeded £45m in 1995, representing an increase of 17% on the previous year.

He announced that this year the company will exceed the billion pounds in turnover for the first time ever but admitted that he was 'not so mesmerised' by this figure, being more concerned about continued

quality standards.

Naturally the acquisition of the Cheese Company in Britain last September represented a major milestone in the development of the Group. With a full contribution from the Cheese Company in '96, Mr. Walsh said he expects that consumer products will account for over 50% of turnover. Indeed Waterford Foods is now one of the leading dairy businesses not only in Ireland but also the UK with 36% of revenues arising in both countries.

FUTURE MERGERS?

The possibility of further strategic alliances, mergers or partnerships with other dairy conglomerates was not ruled out by Mr. Walsh who said that the Group intends to consider these options in the near future. The Waterford MD however stressed

that any such move would have to be demonstrably advantageous to the interests of the company and its shareholders "in this era of tremendous change".

BSE AFFECTS VEAL MARKET

The drop in demand for red meat products due to the BSE scare had a significant impact on the veal market which is one of the main markets for skim milk powder and whey powder but Mr. Walsh firmly stated that there was no connection between BSE and dairy products.

FURTHER MILK PRICE ADJUSTMENTS

Speaking on the 3 pence reduction per gallon in milk supplies last April, Mr. Walsh said that in the current market environment, it is inevitable that further adjustments will take place to bring milk prices into line with market returns.

Waterford is the leading provider of liquid milk in Ireland represented by a number of brands including Premier, Snowcream and other regional brands. Waterford has 30% of the national milk market while almost three quarters of the Dublin milk market is currently served by the Group (70%).

NEW CHEESE VARIETIES

Mr. Walsh noted that the Group's product development initiatives had created a pipeline of new product opportunities which would consolidate the company's leadership position in fresh dairy products. New cheese varieties at the Kilmeaden plant are already at an advanced stage and are reported to be demonstrating exciting prospects.

In his outlook for the Group, Mr. Walsh said that the dairy sector will continue to change rapidly well beyond 1996. He remained optimistic regarding the under performance of operations in the United States during 1995 and said an improvement in performance is expected this year.

Concluding his address, Mr. Walsh reaffirmed the commitment of the Board and management to positioning the Group to progress "in this challenging environment and serving the long term needs of our shareholders, suppliers and stakeholders".

FOUR MAIN OBJECTIONS

The Knockmealdown Protection Committee, under chairman Willie O'Donoghue of Cappoquin,

have put forward four main points in their objection to the proposed development. One concern expressed by the committee is that the test masts will be a forerunner for a wind farm development. Another concern is that the masts would interfere with the scenic beauty of the area and have possible repercussions on farming interests. The last concern of the objectors is that Colham have not as yet indicated what companies will be responsible for power generation. Given that several UK-based power generation companies are extensively involved with nuclear power, the objectors feel that the applicants should indicate on whose behalf they are developing the sites.

MEASURING WIND ENERGY

It is proposed that both 132 ft. masts would measure the wind's energy at their separate locations through the use of a small wind vane and sensor at the top of each mast. The mast itself is 4.5" wide, comprising of a slender metal tube which rests on a metal plate. Colham claims that the continued

agricultural or recreational use of the land will not be affected by these wind monitoring systems. By virtue of its light weight, the mast can be erected manually and can be transported to the site without the necessity for construction of an access.

Colham has already developed one wind farm at Bessy Nell in Co. Tyrone and has made an application for a 5 megawatt biomass (forestry and energy crops) power plant in Ogham, Co. Tyrone. The company also has two contracts to sell electricity to the ESB which were awarded under the Alternative Energy Requirements for wind farms in Co. Clare and Co. Leitrim. These are being developed with Irish companies.

Sir Richard Keane of Cappoquin Estates claimed that a wind farm would prove most beneficial for the area.

"My own feeling is that the policy of the Department of Energy, following an EC Directive, to promote the production of electricity from wind or water, rather than the burning of oil, gas, coal or turf, which pollutes the atmosphere, should be supported", he stated.

The County Manager's final decision on the planning application by Colham will no doubt be eagerly anticipated and is unlikely to be confirmed earlier than the end of June.

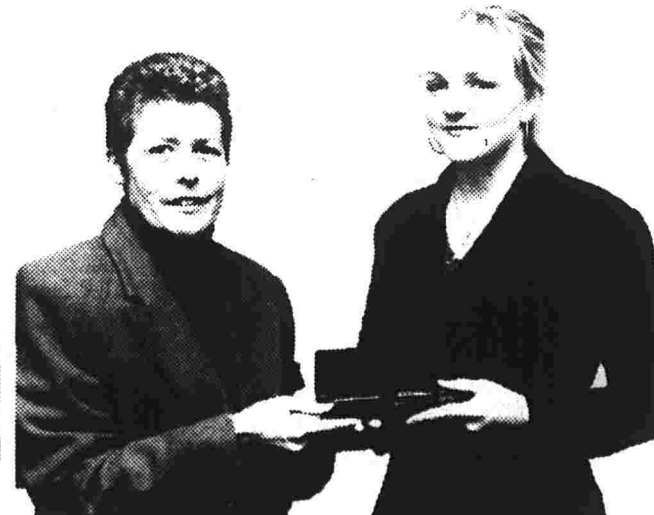

Defeat With Honour

Well done Waterford. To the victors belong the spoils and no one can honestly claim that the better team was beaten because Tipperary were far more dangerous all through. The intelligent and unselfish English may have scored only two points but he was menacing in every move he made and created many chances for his colleagues. Whatever our weaknesses - Tipperary had some, we had many - our grim determination to give of our best was maintained right throughout the hour and ten minutes and even into extra time.

Paul Flynn's goal from a free left just two points between us with time ticking on over the 70 minutes when Michael Hickey secured possession on the right wing about 30 yards from goal. It was unfortunate that he should be the man fated to have the chance of narrowing the gap to the minimum because he was only a couple of minutes on the field and couldn't have settled into the game. Turning to his left (the correct thing to do), he tried from a static position for a point only to have Shelley easily block his effort. From Shelley's clearance the ball was swept upfield for Tommy Dunne to send over the final point. If Michael could have taken a few steps (he's allowed four) he would have got clear of Shelley's 'sturdy frame' and scored. Of that I have little doubt because Michael is an accurate striker. Peter Queally (I don't know why he was taken off) showed in the second half how this should be done. Grabbing a Tom Fives sideline cut, he took four quick steps to the left, during which he looked up to line up his shot, before sending over a fine point. One reporter missed this completely or was at a different match because in his report for his paper, he only saw Ken McGrath's point with not one word about Peter's lovely strike. The same expert told us that only one point of our first half total came from play which was true.

Really, we achieved on Sunday as much as could be expected given that we repeated too many of our former weaknesses such as our tackling of the man in possession. Several times from a puckout, we saw the high ball falling down to where three or four Waterford players had obligingly bunched with their markers in close attendance. Which of the seven or eight under the one ball won the pull? You're right, none of them. In that situation, the

player first to the break secured the sliotar, usually the Tipperary man. Surely we could have avoided that lottery with a little thought, team discussion and practice. Even in a small club like Tallow, our team knew the importance of having "one Tallowman under every ball".

I know it's repetition to the point of boredom to say that as a team and with some honourable exceptions our striking was much too slow. Tipperary are no team of heroes endowed with special physical attributes. They are all very ordinary fellows but in every area of the field where we were outgunned, it was a superior quickness which counted: quickness to read danger, quickness of anticipation, quickness to the ball and above all, quickness in striking. George Frend and Colm Bonner possessed those attributes and were masters in their areas. English has those qualities too, and when good ball came in, he skinned his marker every time. Liam Cahill is as far removed from the general concept of the traditional Tipperary hurler and it is possible to be. He is small, light and nimble. Far more important, though, he is quick on his feet and has two fast hands. His sprints showed that dexterity but his goal was a triumph for quickness. On one of the few times that he got the better of Hartley, Liam McGrath drove in a snappy diagonal ball. Leahy grabbed it with Sean Cullinane crowding him and hand-passed to Cahill who didn't grab it but volleyed an unstoppable ball to the net. It was only a half chance which nobody but a quick striker could have taken.

We in Waterford have some quick striking players but not enough of them. We had one last Sunday, Derek McGrath but he spent most of the match sitting on the sideline. He was a far better bet than two of our forwards who had no quickness except at throwing the sliotar 'accidentally' into an opponents face. Until we quicken up, we won't get sufficient scores to win big matches and will have to include listening to the patronising sympathetic cluckings of our neighbours after further defeats. The pace of U-21 will not be good enough for the rigours of Senior and surely we must have come to a realisation of that fact by now. If not, the future is bleak.

My apologies for again mentioning ground hurling but sure you know by now that it is one of my hobby horses. We used it effectively

a few times on Sunday. None to greater effect than Fergal Hartley whose fine ground stroke to the right wing in the second half made it easy for Billy O'Sullivan to gain possession. That was a superb example of the correct use of the ground stroke. Had we plied both corners with the diagonal low ball, we would have had a more productive afternoon. Leahy for Tipperary had a few good doubles on the ground even though Tony Browne was his master for the hour overall. Is it not significance that Leahy only bested Browne with the quick double on the ground?

Our forward division is our major weakness. There seemed to be no general pattern and there was indecision and a lack of the conviction in ourselves which would allow us to be more positive. No back can block or otherwise prevent a forward in possession from striking what I call a 'simple ball,' one hit quickly and across his marker some 10 or 15 yards such as English did time and again. The long swing and big pull are only for frees or for those rare occasions when a player is in splendid isolation. Did you notice that Colm Bonner (he gave a fine display) rarely made a huge clearance. He soloed in the correct manner to get clear, shortened his grip and placed the ball to his team's advantage. His short snappy solo was a good example of how and when this skill should be performed and was in sharp contrast to the inane solo of one forward in the second half. This Waterford man lifted (he never pulls on the ground) and ran and ran until, confronted inevitably by a Tipperary back. Then he was forced to pass, which he did, over a colleague's head and hurley (Fionn Mac Cumhaill would have struggled to take such a pass) and a Tipperary back got possession. Interestingly this same forward performed this self same trick in the second half of the league match against Galway, the Galway back gratefully accepting his generous pass after he (the forward) had run into a cul-de-sac of his own manufacture. Are players made aware of such inanities? No progress is possible unless such useless habits are discontinued with. In a former existence as a midfielder, Colm Bonner used to set off on those wild self-indulgent aimless jennet express excursions until maturity permitted him to see the folly of it all.

On this business of passing weren't Fergal Hartley's

passes when pressurised quite wonderful? The intelligent Fergal knew when and how to pass and he was so calm and self-possessed that panic never intruded. He played a mighty game as did Stephen Frampton whose positioning for passes from Fergal and Tony Browne was admirable. Tony was great from the start and kept Leahy very quiet. That trio comprised our strongest line. Did you notice how Tony hit up under the ball to avoid being blocked whenever his tackler was within blocking range?

Our late goal owed much to Paul Flynn's strike but much more to the very bad positioning of the six on the goal line or rather the 3 on the goal line and the other three who had moved but so that they in effect hindered and blocked each other's view. Brendan Cummins was at least a yard in front of the others and when the ball passed him, the unsighted defenders were helpless. Do you remember something similar happening to Limerick in the closing stages of the 1994 All-Ireland? And to Cork in the last minutes of the 1986 final against Galway? All defenders of a close in free should form one straight line.

Here's wishing well to our remaining hopes, the Under 21 and minor teams. Let's hope they have learned something from Sunday last because we did many good things. May they play with the wholeheartedness and spirit of Fergal Hartley's men whose determined play right to the final whistle erased from memory the shame of Pairc Ui Chaoimh last year and made us proud to be followers of Waterford.

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Children Will Enjoy 'Jar' dening

If you or your children have "green fingers" but nowhere to use them, don't worry about it.

Bowls, jars, yogurt pots, seed trays, bottles, plant pots and window boxes all provide growing space if you don't have a garden. You and your children can have great fun growing plants and flowers in this way.

Save the seeds from oranges, lemons and dates, and let the family enjoy watching them grow into plants.

Soak the seeds overnight in water. Let them dry. Fill a yogurt pot with seed compost, wet it thoroughly and plant the seeds about 1.5cm. deep.

Cover the pot with brown paper and put it in a warm dark place for a few weeks.

When the shoots appear, put the uncovered pots in a sunny place. Plant out well-growing shoots in single pots.

They probably won't bear fruit, but the leaves will make very attractive house plants.

Another easy and inexpensive way to grow plants is to cut the tops from fresh vegetables like carrots and parsnips.

Put them in plates or saucers of water, topping up the water when needed, or try an upside down plant.

Cut off 5cm. of root vegetable top and trim the leaves.

Hollow out the base and put a toothpick through it.

Tie cotton thread to the toothpick and hang up the plant. Fill the hollow with water.

One mouth-watering idea is to grow your own strawberries.

There are two kinds of plants to buy: one bears several crops and is called a "perpetual." The other bears only one crop, but is hardier.

Plant one-crop strawberries from July to early September, and perpetuals in spring.

Garden centres sell special barrels with holes for strawberry growing, but a cheap alternative is to build a tower of smaller and smaller flower pots, one on top of each other.

Fill them with potting compost and make sure there is good drainage. Put in plants about 20cm. apart.

Keep the soil moist and the pots in a sunny place. Pick the strawberries as they ripen.

Propagate one-crop strawberries by fixing runners into pots of compost and letting them root.

A THOUSAND WAYS TO IMPROVE YOUR IMAGE

Hand Care

OUR HANDS sometimes suffer, as they may often get less attention than they deserve. They are exposed to extremes of temperature, water and household chores. Allow yourself an hour once a week to keep your hands looking good.

If your hands are rough, mix some sea salt with a little oil and rub over the rough areas, this will act as an exfolic moisturising the hands as well. Rinse with warm water and pat dry. Almond oil is a good conditioning treatment for your hands. Easily available it will condition your hands and nails if left on overnight. If you are unable to get almond oil why not try some petroleum jelly. Apply at night

and cover your hands with cloth gloves.

To have nice nails it is a mist to look after your cuticles. Push the cuticles back when they are soft. A good time is after a long bath. Use an orange wood stick with the tip covered with a little cotton wool, or a towel to gently push back the cuticle. Any loose cuticle or hangnails should be cut with a cuticle scissors. These however can be sharp, so

be careful not to cut the skin. Don't pull hangnails as this will worsen them and possibly damage the cuticle.

Buff your nails regularly, this will increase the circulation to your nails thus strengthening them. Soft buffers are easily available but as an alternative use a little vegetable oil and soft cloth to make them shiny and healthy looking.

To remove stains from nails and fingers, dip your fingertips into half a lemon for a few minutes. Repeat once a day until the stains have disappeared.

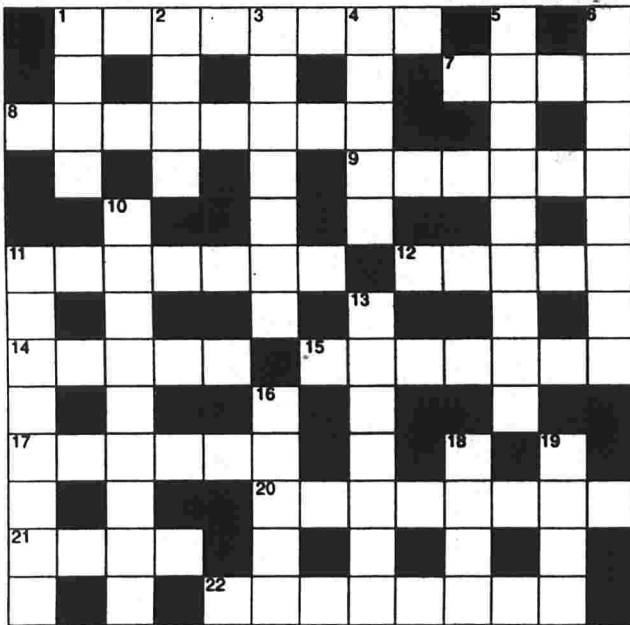

Menus for the week



Italian pork chops

Preparation time: 20 minutes
Cooking time: 40 minutes
Serves: 4

- 1 large red pepper, deseeded and halved
- 1 large yellow pepper, deseeded and halved
- 1 large orange pepper, deseeded and halved
- 4 tsp (60ml) olive oil
- 4 boneless pork chops
- 2 tsp (10ml) garlic Italian seasoning
- 1 1/2oz (40g) butter, softened
- 2 tsp (30ml) fresh chopped basil
- 1 tsp (5ml) lemon juice
- 2 onions, chopped
- 2 cloves of garlic, crushed
- 400g carton passata (sieved tomatoes)
- 1/4 tsp (2.5ml) sugar

Fresh basil leaves to garnish

• Preheat grill, put peppers shiny side up in grill pan and brush with 1tbsp (15ml) olive oil. Cook for 7-10 mins until skin is charred in several places. Put in closed plastic bag for 5 mins, then peel away pepper skins and slice.

• Season pork chops with pepper and Italian season-

ing. Heat griddle or pan until really hot, add 1tbsp (15ml) olive oil and cook chops for 20 mins, turning once. Mix together butter, basil and lemon juice, roll into a sausage shape and freeze.

• Heat remaining olive oil in a pan, add onion and garlic and fry gently for 5 mins until softened. Stir in passata and sugar and season with salt and ground black pepper. Simmer for 5 mins, add skinned peppers and warm through.

• Pour peperonata sauce into base of serving dish. Arrange pork chops over sauce. Cut basil butter in slices, place on chops and garnish with fresh basil leaves. Serve immediately. This tastes great with garlic bread and a green salad.

Vegetable Risotto

Serves: 4it

- 4 tsp oil
- 1 onion, chopped
- 175g (6 oz) brown rice
- 3 cloves garlic, crushed
- 600ml (1 pint) water
- 1 tsp salt
- 2 celery sticks, thinly

- sliced
- 1 red pepper, cored, seeded and diced
- 250g (8 oz) button mushrooms, sliced
- 1 x 425g (15 oz) can red kidney beans, drained
- 3 tbsp chopped parsley
- 1 tbsp shoyu
- 50g (2 oz) roasted cashew nuts
- chopped parsley to garnish

METHOD: Heat 2 tbsp of the oil in a pan, add the onion and fry until softened. Add the rice and 2 cloves garlic and cook, stirring, for 2 minutes. Add the water and salt and bring to the boil, stirring. Cover and simmer gently for 35 to 40 minutes, until all the water has been absorbed. Heat the remaining oil in a frying pan, add the celery and red pepper and fry for 5 minutes, until softened. Add the mushrooms and remaining garlic and fry for 3 minutes.

Add the cooked rice, kidney beans, parsley, shoyu and nuts. Cook, stirring to mix, until the beans are heated through. Serve garnished with parsley, and accompanied by a green salad.

Family Health

By Dr. DAVE BARRY

Q. I am 37 and, although I use moisturiser on my face every morning, and night cream before retiring at night, I have far more wrinkles than my friend, who is six years older than me. Why is this?

A. As we get older, the elastic tissues of our skin are replaced by non-elastic fibres, causing wrinkles. In some people this is worse than in others - for example, if you're thin, lines tend to be more noticeable. Weather conditions can also be a factor - a lifetime spent in skin drying winds or in the direct rays of the sun will have an adverse affect on the condition of the skin. Mannerisms such as frowning and smiling can encourage wrinkles also. Using a non-scented moisturiser is a good idea, as it prevents the skin losing natural oils and moisture, and so helps protect it from the elements. And, while character lines can't really be avoided, using a good night cream, avoiding extreme weather conditions and having a positive approach to life will definitely

keep you looking and feeling much younger.

Q. My teenage daughter has developed a habit of removing her spectacles to rub her eyes. She says her eyes are sore but we've had her glasses checked and the prescription doesn't need changing. What do you think could be causing her eyes to become so irritated?

A. Rubbing the eyes is a common and very bad habit - whether or not the person wears glasses - the eyes are very delicate structures. If your daughter can see clearly, has no pain in her eyes, the whites of her eyes, the whites of her eyes are clear and there's no obvious abnormality that you can see, it's likely common irritants in the air - especially if you live in the town or city - are causing her mild eye irritation. As she's had her eyes examined recently, ask the pharmacist to recommend over-the-counter eye-drops or lotion. This should soothe her eyes and hopefully break the habit.

DUNGARVAN LEATHER FACTORY The End Of An Era!

This week to mark the closure of Dungarvan leather factory on the Quay after 60 years of operations, we recall the official opening of the plant back in 1937. In that year, the 'Cork Examiner' carried a full page feature on the new factory and gave a detailed account of the opening ceremony which was performed by Sean Lemass, Minister for Industry and Commerce, later to become Taoiseach.

GREAT FINANCIAL BOOST

The formal opening of the Dungarvan tannery on Monday, May 3rd, 1937 was a special day in the life of the town. The factory itself had actually been in production nearly 12 months before the official opening and in that short space of time it proved to be of untold benefit for the district providing considerable employment for local residents.

With the exception of some of the clerical staff all male labour was employed and almost all were local. In total there were 120 operators employed at the factory during the early days and the weekly payroll of about £300 naturally came as a great financial boost to the town.

Factory employees were enrolled in special classes at the old Dungarvan Technical School where they were given training as operatives in the handling of the various machines.

Formerly used as busy corn and coal stores, the new owners, Dickens Leather Co., had to make extensive alterations to accommodate the premises to their purpose.

As output increased the company later acquired the

large adjoining premises running into Church Street, known locally as Barry's Corn Stores.

VIRTUAL MONOPOLY

Dickens Leather Co. obtained a virtual monopoly of the Free State market for its products and future prospects looked bright. Incorporated on 23rd October 1935 there was great interest generated in this new tannery project. Of its nominal capital of £40,000,

£24,000 was issued. The issue of shares was closed within a few minutes of the opening and the sum asked for was even oversubscribed.

Dickens were the only factory in the Free State involved in the production of lining and upper leathers for boots, shoes and slipper manufacturers as well as leathers for the gloving, clothing, belt, braces and fancy leather trades. (CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE)

In the early days, the Dungarvan factory imported the raw hides, chiefly from the East Indies. The imported skins reached the factory in a partly tanned state and from there to the finished leathers they were processed on the premises. As time passed, the plant used native Irish skins.

MODERN MACHINERY

The factory used the most modern equipment of that era, namely measuring machines which measured every skin in square feet and splitting machines in which skins were split and divided into two for the thinner leather products. The factory was powered at that time by a 100 h.p. steam unit. The exhaust from the engine was used to heat the factory, dry the leather, heat the baths for dyeing and re-tanning before returning to the boiler. The normal working hours at that time were from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. with a break of 1 1/4 hours for dinner.

RED LETTER DAY

According to the report in the 'Cork Examiner' on Tuesday, May 4, 1937, Mr. Lemass was met at Dungarvan Town Hall in Friary Street by the directors of the factory and members of the Urban Council. A guard of honour was then formed by Civic Guards and the procession was led by the Barrack Street Brass Band, Waterford through the town to the tannery.

Following a number of addresses the factory was opened by Mr. Lemass with a gold key presented to him by Kennedy O'Brien, Chairman of the company. The factory buildings were subsequently blessed by the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, Most Rev. Dr. Kinane.

Following the opening Mr. Lemass was entertained to luncheon at Egan's Hotel, O'Connell Street (now the Ormonde Hotel), by the directors of the company. Speaking at the lunch, Mr. O'Brien said the establishment of the factory in Dungarvan was due mainly to the efforts made by the members of the Dungarvan Industrial Development Association which included Dr. Michael Casey.

"I should like to express appreciation to those who invested the necessary capital to permit this industry to be started", said Mr. O'Brien. "I can assure them that it is now firmly established, that the company's prospects are, in my opinion most favourable and that their interests will be looked after to the best of my ability by me and my co-directors".

As an example of what had been achieved in the leather industry Mr. O'Brien presented Mr. Lemass with a pair of slippers. The upper leather of the slippers were manufactured from native Irish sheepskin tanned in the Dungarvan factory.

ADD TO LOCAL PROSPERITY

Speaking in Egan's Hotel, Mr. Lemass said the new industry offered considerable prospects of development for the future, thereby enabling it to extend its roll of its employees and enlarge the

sum which is distributed in weekly wages. This he felt would extend the trade of Dungarvan, help to add to local prosperity and promote the general business activities of the town.

Mr. R. Dickens paid tribute to the wonderful cooperation he had received from the people of Dungarvan while Dr. Casey said he wanted to see more people employed in the town and he wanted to see Dungarvan and the whole of the county prosperous.

Among those present at the opening ceremony were; P. J. Moloney, Director Leather Factory, B. S. Woolnough, Director do., J. T. Freeman, Secretary do., S. Goulding T.D., P. J. Little Parliamentary Secretary to the President, N. Wall T.D., Mrs. Redmond T.D., S. Moynihan County Commissioner, Dr. D. T. McCarthy, A. E. Ryan State Solicitor, Superintendent M. Walsh, Canon O'Brien P.P. Dungarvan, Bro. McMahon and many more.

THE INTERVENING YEARS

The lucrative operations at the Dickens plant continued smoothly until November 1944 when workers took the step of seeking recognition under the Constitution, i.e. the right to associate, and continued their united struggle for over 16 weeks for that right for the ATGWU. In mid January 1945 the branch finally won recognition.

In 1962 Dickens Leather Co. was taken over by Dungarvan Leathers and an unofficial 6 week dispute erupted in the summer of that year. Thirty to forty workers were laid off at the plant and as a result the workforce stayed out although no pickets were put up. The Labour Court later ruled in favour of the workers and the men involved were taken back and received compensation. Later that year Tony Mansfield, District Officer of the Dungarvan branch of the ATGWU, who played a major part in the dispute, was appointed Chief Shop Steward until 1977.

The Dungarvan factory again made headlines when the ATGWU took the case involving the Contributory Pension Scheme, negotiated in 1975, to court and won. Mr. Mansfield revealed that the union is moving gradually towards the distribution of this settlement.

In the early '70's, Dungarvan Leathers became part of Irish Leathers Ltd. which went into receivership in June of 1985. Receiver Bernard Summers sold the assets to Dungarvan native, Raymond Lannon, founder of the Kilkenny based International Hide and Skin Co.

Mr. Lannon continued to manage operations at the plant until earlier this month when the factory shut down in anticipation of its sale to McInerney Construction. The 29 union members at the factory however succeeded in negotiating a redundancy package better than the employer involved had ever paid elsewhere.

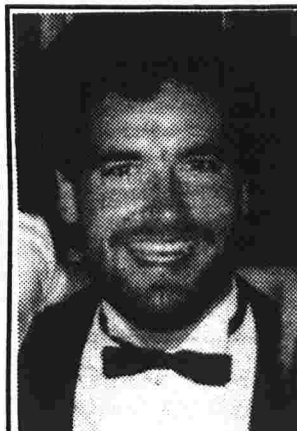

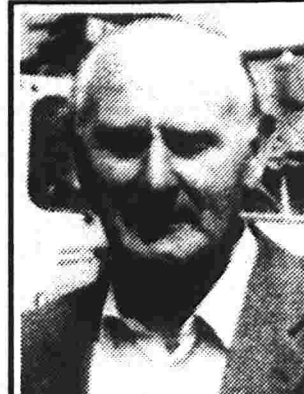

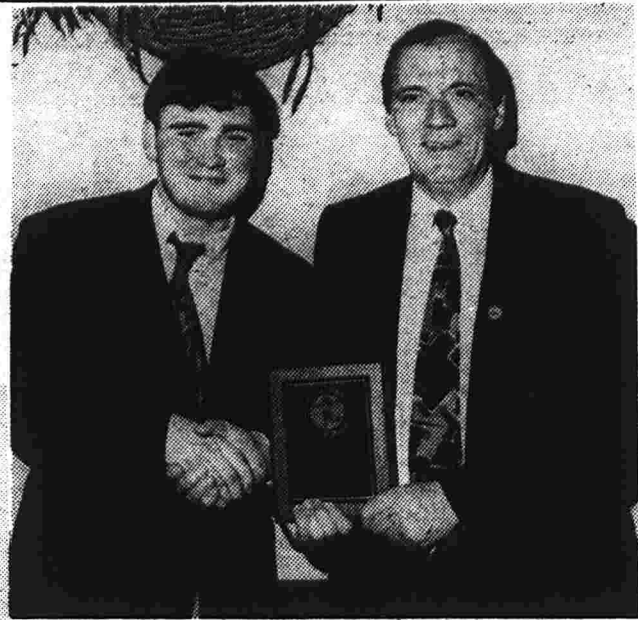

Radley On The Crest Of A Wave

Following eight months of inactivity through injury and numerous unsuccessful attempts to get back racing, local athlete Mark Radley must have been delighted with his win in the SmithKline Beecham 4km race on Clonea Beach last Thursday evening.

MUNSTER SENIOR HURLING CHAMPIONSHIP

Waterford Suffer Double Defeats In Exciting 1st Rounds At Walsh Park

Tipperary 1-14 Waterford 1-11;

Players on both teams certainly gave it their all and had luck been on our side in both matches the results might have been different to what was generally predicted, particularly in relation to the senior game in which our opponents, Tipperary were installed as favourites to win out in Munster. The junior game, also against Tipperary looked to be firmly within our grasp, but suddenly and unexpectedly slipped away in the closing minutes. Waterford and Tipperary fielded as selected for the senior game which was played in brilliant sunshine and with a light breeze blowing into the city goal.

To lose any seventy minute provincial championship game by just a puck of the ball, is bitterly disappointing and while the majority of our supporters went to Walsh Park much more hopeful than confident, they came away disappointed that we did not at least enjoy a share of the spoils, having seen the team give it every ounce of effort, skill and fierce determination, only to lose by three points. There was general feeling that a decision by referee Dickie Murphy in awarding a free to Tipperary instead of to Waterford when Ken McGrath had been fouled in the 30th minute, was a bad decision and was later to prove a costly one for us as it made Tipperary's half-time lead at five instead of two points. But in the overall assessment of the match, the fact must be faced that the inadequacy of our attack remains a problem and we did have chances that we were unable to avail of to the same extent to which Tipperary were able to take theirs. Also on a 'man to man' basis, we do not have players of the same quality of George Frend, (who was awarded the man of the match distinction by Cork's Tom Mulcahy), Colm Bonner, Michael Cleary and Nicky English, who remain All Star material.

The general feeling around after the game was that Waterford played to their full potential and did not fail because of effort. Going out in the red hot heat of a Munster championship battle against a county who, exactly twelve months ago, had inflicted an embarrassing 21 points hammering on us in Cork was a very daunting assignment that took every ounce of courage and skill

at our disposal. The players gave it all that, but sadly it wasn't enough against Tipperary, who before the game had declared themselves worried about meeting Waterford at home.

PLAY

Waterford playing into the breeze were the first to attack and within ten seconds of the throw-in Paul Flynn sent wide.

Tipperary opened the scoring when team captain Michael scored the first of his four points from frees. Tom Dunne made it two for Tipp. when he had a 6th minute point from play.

One minute later Waterford opened their account when Johnnie Brennar pointed a free. Nicky English restored the two points lead for Tipperary when he sent over from play in the 8th minute and shortly afterwards the very skillful English broke through our defence and sent in a rasping shot that was brilliantly saved by Ray Barry. Johnnie was wide with a '65' and Michael Cleary and Paul Flynn exchanged points from frees. Flynn was wide in the 16th minute but pointed a free in the 17th to leave the score at 0-4 to 0-3 at that point. Another great save by Barry was followed by a Liam McGrath point to make it 5/3 and it was double scores when Nicky English pointed from play in the 22nd minute. SENIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIPS RESUME

Exciting Fare Promised In Round Four

Some of the Senior football teams who will be beaten in round four on the coming weekend will find it difficult to get back into the championship. This can apply to teams like Dungarvan, St. Saviours and Ballinacourty, all of whom have to win a game so far.

In Group One, six teams will be fighting for five places and with Rathgormack and Stradbally looking safe enough, it seems at this stage that the four who will be fighting for the three places are Kilrossanty, Dungarvan, Gaultier and Tramore. One of that quartet will lose out and Sunday's results will go much of the way towards telling us who this will be.

In Group Two, it is looking as if it will be a fight between the Nire, Dunhill, Kill and Kilmacthomas for the three places which are up for grabs in this section. The one thing that now looks sure is that from here until the knockout stages, we are going to have a real championship battle for the places on offer in the final stages. Some splendid contests are listed on the programme of matches that are fixed up to July 21st.

Stradbally v Kilrossanty

This exciting clash is fixed for Sunday evening at Fraher Field and as ever it is a meeting that will attract the football people not alone from the confines of their respective parishes but from well beyond as well.

When they met at the semi-final stage last year, Kilrossanty got two fast goals per Niall Connors, that surprisingly decided the issue in favour of the Comragh club.

INBS to revitalise the area. The former Mulcahy's site has been boarded up for the past 8 years while the adjoining former licensed premises of Ducey's has stood vacant for over 4 years.

Under the Derelict Sites Act 1990, Dungarvan UDC were obliged to draw up a register of all derelict sites. This register was drawn up in 1991 and included both the Mulcahy and Ducey properties. Owners of all derelict sites are required to pay an annual levy to the Council, based on the value of their property. Due to the fact that both Main Street sites were included in the proposed development, no levy under the Derelict Sites Act was ever paid to the Council for these properties. It is up to the County Manager Donal Connolly to reactivate the derelict status of these buildings.

DIFFICULTIES

There are rumours of a difficulty in finding an 'anchor' tenant for the large complex which is planned to include a major supermarket. Earlier this year, Aidan Scully, Property and Valuation Manager, INBS told the 'Dungarvan Leader' that it was early days yet to identify a tenant for the large 1,164 sq. m. shop unit. He reported that INBS had dealt with a huge number of enquiries from prospective tenants for the seventeen retail units ranging in size from 31 to 62 square metres. When contacted this week however, Mr. Scully declined to comment on the project or any possible negotiations with supermarket operators.

CONCERNED AT DELAY

While the properties continue to stand as an embarrassing eyesore in a prime development area in the town, the delay is also causing concern among councillors.

Local urban and county councillor Billy Kyne submitted that while he understands the difficulty of putting any package for such a project together, it's only reasonable to admit that there are 'significant levels of concern' about what some people perceive as a lack of progress on the development.

"No one needs any reminder of the Minister's words at the launch of the urban renewal scheme when he urged not to expect any extension of the scheme's

deadline of July '97", he stated.

"As a councillor in the town, the derelict aspect of the site has now gone on for 8 years and if this opportunity to develop is lost, it surely brings into question the powers that the local Council has under the Derelict Sites Act", he added.

Continuing, Cllr. Kyne said he was not commenting in a confrontational manner but stressed that the patience of the general public, in putting up with this derelict block in a prime location, is now wearing thin.

"I acknowledge that the developers must obviously maximise the sale value of any site but I would suggest that they must equally consider how long the site has been derelict and their responsibilities to the town in general if it is to remain derelict for years to come", he further added.

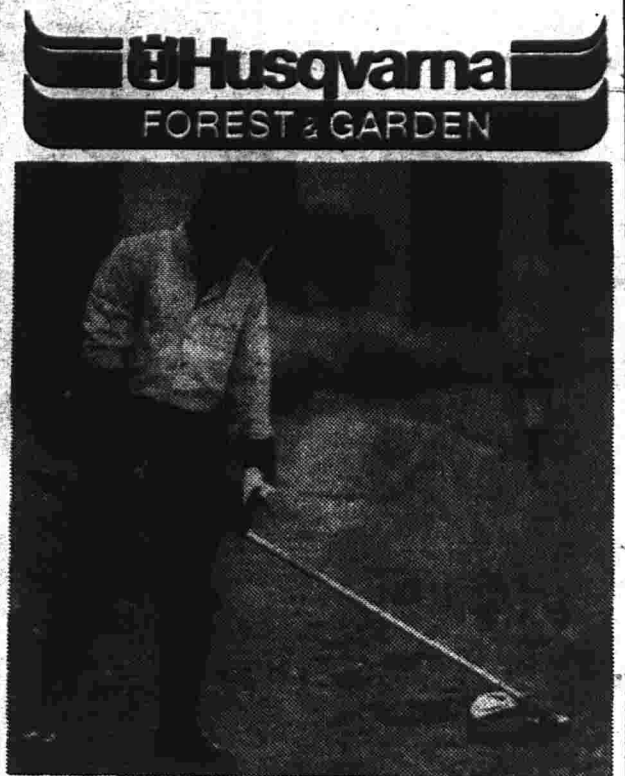

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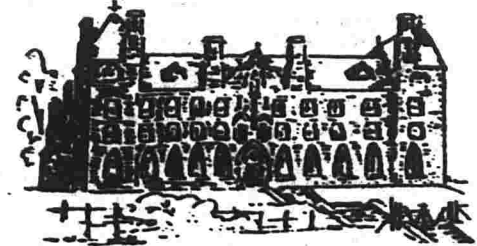
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
