Myself and my wife are old age pensioners, concerned about our security. We were not covered by the budget provisions regarding installation of alarms. Have there been any further developments?

The Working Party established by the Minister for Social Welfare has made a number of recommendations, one of which has been incorporated in the Finance Bill 1996, that is, that tax relief will also be given to the relatives of pensioners who install an alarm on their behalf.

Monies are to be made available in grants by the Department of Social Welfare to voluntary groups to support the installation of security equipment. Details on this are not yet available,

Pharmacists Warn About High Incidence Of Hayfever

Waterford pharmacists are mounting an information campaign, this month, which runs throughout the summer months, about our most allergic condition - Hayfever. It is a condition which is most prevalent in late Spring and early Summer.

"It is estimated that between 10% and 20% of people are affected at some stage in their lives" says Waterford pharmacist Richard Phelan. But there are a number of useful hints which can be followed to considerably ease the problem."

Hayfever is caused by an allergy to pollen. It is commonest in young people and generally starts in the teens. It declines as people get older; about one in six teenagers suffer compared to about one in 12 people aged 30 or over. Hayfever tends to run in families and sufferers are most likely to develop it if they were born slightly before or during a pollen season.

"The main thing is not to confuse the condition with the common cold" says pharmacists "because many of the symptoms are the same, sneezing, runny nose, congestion/swelling of the nose and itching of the nose and eyes. In addition, there may be sore throat, swollen eyelids and headache or a "muzzy" head; and wheezing and breathlessness in those who suffer also from asthma.

"By noting when you suffer from Hayfever, you can work out which pollens you are allergic to. In Spring, mostly April and May, the commonest cause is tree pollen; between May and early July, it is likely to be grass pollen. Hayfever in the Autumn may be due to pollen from weeds, fungal spores or herbaceous plants' says Mr. Phelan.

A number of hints may be followed which may help sufferers cope with Hayfever.

Pay attention to the media for pollen count predictions: A pollen count of about 50% or above will generally be expected to result in symptoms, but some may experience symptoms with counts as low as 10; Sunglasses may cut down on pollen reaching the eyes. And remember, seaside holiday are generally more pollen free than inland holidays. People who get hayfever should go indoors, shut the windows, change their clothes and shower to remove pollen from hair and skin. Sufferers who require additional information should ask their pharmacist

Junior Encyclopaedia

The Puffin

YEARS ago, the puffin was pickled and eaten by the upper classes as a delicacy. Today they are still eaten in Iceland and the Faroe Islands. Large gulls have also a preference for puffin meat.

The puffin is brilliant at fishing for food. It dives into a shoal of fish and surfaces a couple of seconds later with as many as eight or nine fish it its beak. If the fish are small the puffin may have as many as fifteen in its beak. The puffin nests in a burrow among the dunes or on the land above the cliffs. The puffin may choose a burrow previously used or even an old rabbit burrow. The mating puffins choose their nesting site together and examine it thoroughly before moving in.

Sometimes, the sea can become blackened and oily caused by oil spillage. Many seabirds and puffins die as a result. An oil spillage can

wipe out a whole puffin colony.

The female puffin lays only one egg, so it takes ages for a colony to re-establish after disaster.

Around the Irish coast there are twenty puffin colonies. The largest one is in county Kerry, where there are an estimated 7,000 to 10,000 breeding pairs.

The puffin looks to be buoyant and compact on water, but when it lands, its splayed feet give an awkward appearance. The call of the puffin sounds like a low-pitched growl.

Why Many Thought Paganini Was The Fiddler On The Roof

Many people believed he was the Devil In human form. It was said that at the age of five he suddenly sat up in his sick bed and called for a violin.

And although he hadn't touched one before, he played it like a master.

Many years later it was claimed that his violin had strings made from the intestines of a woman he had murdered.

He toured Europe thrilling and frightening audiences with his chalk-white face, deep-set burning eyes and lank hair falling over his shoulders.

He sounds like a fiction-writer's dream. But Nicola Paganini was real enough.

Nineteenth century musical writers described him as the greatest violinist who ever lived and he inspired composers like Rossini, Chopin, Berlioz, Liszt and Rachmaninov.

His compositions for violin were so bizarre and difficult that few performers attempted to play them.

COMPOSITION

He once played his own composition, Perpetual Motion, in three minutes and three seconds — and that worked out at faster than 12 notes a second.

The stories about his being the Devil were so convincing that for 13 years after his death in 1840 his son carried his body all over Europe looking for a final resting place.

It's difficult to establish what was fact and what was fiction about Paganini's reputation.

But it is sure that he taught himself to play the violin and played it in public at the age of 11.

He did serve a sentence for killing a woman and, while in prison practised on a violin that he had made himself.

HYPNOTIC

He had a hypnotic effect on audiences and an ability to perform the fiendishly difficult violin pieces he had composed while standing on the stage apparently in a trance.

When he died at the age of 57, his son Achillino took the body to Villefranche in the South of France, while he appealed to the Papal Court in Rome for permission to bury it. This, however, was not successful.

But the townspeople broke into the house, carried the coffin to the beach and left it in the sea, hoping that the waves would carry it away.


RESCUE

Achillino was tipped off, rescued the coffin and buried it secretly in a headland cave. A year later, he decided to take the body to Paganini's birthplace, Genoa. But when he arrived there the authorities wouldn't let him take the body ashore.

Altogether, the body was moved 10 times and buried six times before the Empress Maria Louise, then Duchess of Parma in Italy, agreed to burial there.

It was not until 1876 that permission was given by the Vatican to have Paganini's body buried in consecrated ground.

In great state, the body was exhumed and carried to an ornate tomb in one of Parma's churches.

Widespread and deep regret was expressed at the announcement of the death of Mr. Thomas (Tom) Harty, Ballinamona, Old Parish, which occurred on Wednesday morning, June 5, at his residence after a period of failing health but at an advanced age. The deceased was a very well known and popular gentleman and a member of a very old Ballinamona family.

The late Tom Harty was deeply involved in many sports all his life, especially where the horse was concerned. He was a founder member of the Dungarvan Point-to-Point Committee and was still a member up to the time of his death. He was recognised nationwide as an exceptionally great judge of a horse and his advice was widely sought. He had bred many a horse who later became famous in the racing world.

The homestead at Ballinamona became a very famous name as the greyhound Highland Rum, winner of the English Greyhound Derby in 1939, was reared and owned by the late Jim Harty (who was a brother of Tom) at the farm in Old Parish.

But besides Tom's attachment to sporting activities, he was a man of the people who was always ready to listen and to give advice when required. COMPENSATION TRIBUNAL FOR CERTAIN PERSONS WHO HAVE CONTRACTED **HEPATITIS C FROM ANTI-D** IMMUNOGLOBULIN, BLOOD TRANSFUSION **OR OTHER BLOOD PRODUCTS**

- The Compensation Tribunal established by the Minister for Health on 15th December 1995 is now dealing with applications from:
 - (a) women who have been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C antibodies or Hepatitis C virus resulting from the use of Human Immunoglobulin anti D within the State;
 - (b) persons who have been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C antibodies or Hepatitis C virus as a result of receiving a blood transfusion or a blood product within the State;
 - (c) children and partners of persons referred to at (a) and (b) above who have been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C antibodies and/or Hepatitis C virus;

A Woman's World

'A Woman's World: Beyond The Headlines' is a new collection of articles by Irish women in which they write of challenges facing women in the developing world. The book was recently launched in the Oak Room of Dublin's Mansion House.

The best known contributor is the brilliant award-winning journalist Maggie O'Kane, whose "Brick By Brick: Rebuilding Mozambique' deals with that country's many tragedies. Ann Kiely, a native of Cappoquin, also has a fine piece entitled 'Meeting Women's Needs: The Challenge of Afghanistan' in which she writes of the difficulties facing the people of that unfortunate country. It is based on her experiences while working with the women of Kabul who, like the rest of Afghan women, are the chief sufferers of the effects of almost 20 years of war, ruin and poverty.

The book was launched by Ms. Joan Burton, Minister of State at the Department of Foreign Affairs. In her speech she singled out one of the greatest curses of the developing world — the land mine. Ms. Burton was very hopeful that an international ban would be achieved and she detailed the efforts of the Irish government to secure this aim.

However, as we all know now, the international conference was held, but the agreement was so watered down, despite the efforts of the UN, Ireland and even President Clinton, that the deadly fields of mines will still be sown all over the world.

Ms. Burton was followed by Ms. Mina Jilana, a human rights lawyer from Pakistan. Her offices at home had been bombed, but she accepted it as an occupa tional hazard. Ms. Jilana noted the rise of women political leaders in the modern world and particularly in Asia. but she emphasised that all this meant nothing unless the new leaders did something for human rights and women's rights.

BEEF INDUSTRY **CRUMBLES** IN STATE **OFCRISIS**

Agriculture Minister, Ivan Yates stands idly by while the beef industry crumbles in the worst crisis ever says South Tipperary/North West Waterford T.D. Noel Davern.

Not alone will farmers be affected but up to 15,000 workers in the meat and subsidiary industries will lose their jobs, Mr. Davern claims. As we can only consume 14% of our meat production, we need to export 85%. The failure of the Minister to visit countries where our beef was traditionally bought will result in the acceleration of this crisis, he said. Libya, only in the last week has bought 2,000 cattle and 500,000 sheep from Australia. Mr. Davern went on: The Arab countries will only entertain the rank of the Minister.

The government would do well to take the example of former Taoiseach Charles Haughey when he visited Libya and former Minister, Michael O'Kennedy visited Iran successfully to sell our beef in similar circumstances.

He criticised the failure of the Minister to get adequate compensation for many who will be left with no income and even more frightening when animals can't be sold. Massive and immediate intervention is needed short term and in the long term, a strategy and plan of where the future of the beef industry is going. "Leadership is sadly lacking and is obviously not available in this government."

Kenneally Slams Delay In New Technical College For Dungarvan

Waterford Fianna Fáil Deputy, Brendan Kenneally aware of the urgency of this came back in March and spoke out recently in the Dáil on the current delay in getting the long awaited Dungarvan Technical College at Quann's off the ground. Deputy Kenneally outlined the deteriorating condition of the present school and pre-fabs at Wolfe Tone Road and said he felt there was a deliberate policy on the part of the Department of Education to frustrate the project.

Minister Niamh Bhreathnach, the Waterford Deputy gave a brief account of the history of the college and the increasing shortage of suitable accommodation for

OVERCROWDED PREFABS

Dungarvan Technical College was built in 1938 to cater for approximately 100 pupils. "At that time", reported Deputy Kenneally, "it contained a Woodwork room, Metalwork room, Domestic Science room and four general classrooms. These seven permanent classrooms are still there and have not been updated since. The school has had to do with the addition of 11 prefabs in the meantime.

"First, two prefabs were built and a Mathematics room was provisionally adapted to a Science room. In the 1970's two more prefabs were built and the Typewriting room was updated. In the 1980's further prefabs were added."

Continuing, Deputy Kenneally said that the Co. Wa-Vocational terford **Education Committee are** currently renting accommodation at the Presentation Convent primary school to

Biggest Treasure Trail On Earth

On bank holiday Monday, June 3rd, two treasure hunters accompanied by two Dalmatian dogs passed through Dungarvan on a 400 mile treasure trail around Munster.

"The Biggest Treasure Trail on Earth" is expected to raise £50,000 over twenty days during which time the two hunters and their support crews will travel through most towns in Munster as part of a major fund raising effort for the Lavanagh Centre (formerly Cork Spastic Clinic). The Centre's pool is urgently in

upgrading.
The trail started on June 1st in Cork and arrived in Youghal the next day before heading to Ardmore where a car treasure hunt was held. Hidden along the 400 mile route are medallions ranging in value from £100 to £500. The group arrived in Dungarvan on Monday and a Treasure Trail Craic Evening was held in the Marine Bar at which some of these 'new found' medallions were raffled as prizes.

Other towns on the route are Carrick-on-Suir, Clonmel, Canir, Milistreet,

and Bandon etc. The treasure hunters start off before 11 a.m. each day and allow 20 minutes per mile. The trail finally ends on June 21 in the Lavanagh Centre. Billy Downey whose son David has Cerebral Palsy and attends the Lavanagh Centre regularly for treatment is accompanied on the trail by his two dogs and by Colm Doyle who is a personal assistant at the centre.

The trail organisers are encouraging people to walk with the hunters and therefore-take part in the world's biggest treasure trail.





Grassland Management — June To September

The two main concerns in summer grazing are to keep leafy pastures in front of cows and to plan good production and utilisation from August onwards. Growth rates are reduced and can be very variable particularly in coastal areas of the county during this period. Skilful management is required if pasture quality and milk yields are to be sustained.

The grazing area can be increased to around 0.65 acres/cow during the June to late July period and to about 1 acre/cow from early August onwards.

The prudent use of Nitrogen i.e. 25-30 units/acre/rotation and adjustments in rotation speed between 21-25 days are the main tools for keeping a constant supply of grass in front of the cows.

Grazing severity is not as critical from July 1 onwards provided paddocks have been well grazed earlier in the season. The recommended post grazing height at this time is 3-3.5 inches. The milk yield effects of pasture quality and grazing intensity mid-season have been well researched at Moorepark. The clear message is that quality grass grazed to 3-3.5 inches will give excellent milk yields.

Meal feeding should not be necessary mid-season where high milk yields are required or pasture quality is

EXTENDED GRAZING

Extending the grazing season involves a planned approach to producing good quality grass in October/November and a grazing system that allows high utilisation. On drier soils both of these are achiev-

All farmers should adopt a sensible strategy for lengthening the rotation from mid-August onwards. The driest paddocks should be well grazed or topped. Apply 36 to 40 units of nitrogen to all paddocks capable of being rested for over 30 days. Nitrogen application should cease around mid-September.

The paddocks grazed in early to mid-September should get their last grazing in late October/early November. A good roadway and easy access to grazing areas is vital for effective utilisation.

Be Careful With Animals

Animals account for some accidental deaths on farms most years. When you are dealing with male animals or with female animals with young, be careful at all times. Accidents happen because farmers fail to treat their animals with due caution.

Never trust a bull — the quietest animal is potentially a killer — always be careful and never get into a position where you can be trapped.

A bull should never be left "unringed" after he is ten months old. When buying a bull, find out about his temperament from his former owner.

Housing should be such that it could withstand any strain which the bull might enforce — always have an escape route.

When leading a bull, position yourself to one side and slightly behind the bull's head. If he is grazing, have a chain attached to his nose.

Some bullocks and cows, especially heifers with calves, can also be dangerous.

Silage Effluent — Reman Vigilant

Everyone is well aware of the serious pollution that can be caused by silage effluent. While effluent production peaks 3-4 days after the grass is ensiled, considerable quantities of effluent continue to be released for 3-4 weeks after ensiling. It does not end there, even small quantities of effluent continue to be released right through to feeding time. The simple message is to re-

 Continue to safeguard against overflowing tanks by checking effluent levels regularly and emptying them in

 Continue to check for leaks from silos, tanks and effluent channels and examine nearby waterways, drains and drainage systems, as effluent can seep underground for considerable distances.

 Be prepared to take immediate action to intercept and contain any escaping effluent.

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



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Good Time For Shrub Cuttings

Now is a good time to take cuttings of shrubs for propagation.

With flowering soft-wood varieties such as buddelias, mock orange, keria and forsythia, cut off the tip of a young shoot, just below a joint, to a length of about three

Remove the lower leaves and dip the base into one of the proprietary hormone rooting aids. These hormone preparations do a great job in getting a good root formation to form quicker.

They come as powder or liquid. Make sure you follow the maker's instructions carefully.

I always put soft-wood cuttings into a cold frame which has a sandy bed. Plant about one inch deep and say, three inches apart.

If you don't have a frame, then you can plant your cuttings in a shady spot in the garden, but make sure you've prepared it properly. Fork it over and mix in lots of sand. When you've smoothed it over, spread a thin layer of sand on. the surface.

You can propagate all kinds of shrubs and it will save you a good deal of money next year when you have your own supply of healthy young plants available.

Shrubs such as green, gold and silver box, olearias and escal-

been well-prepared.

lonias, and some forms of conifers, are very easily propagated by pulling off two inch long side-shoots. When you pull them, you should get a little bit of the parent stem. Trim it gently before

deep boxes filled with moist sand. These boxes should go in a shaded cold frame. Or you can put them in a shady part of the garden, but if you do, don't forget to dampen them overhead on bright days. Later on, when roots have formed, you should transplant your cuttings, nine inches apart, in a border that has

planting close together in two-and-a-half inch

Layering is another easy way to increase your ornamental shrub stock. Layering is when you slit and bend a healthy low-down branch into the ground or into a mound of good soil on the ground. It sounds complicated but is very simple to do, in fact.

You should layer a shoot nine to twelve inches below the tip. Cut a longtitudinal slit in the stem - from one to three inches according to the thickness of the stem - making sure it has a tongue or loose end.

Before you make the slit, remove all the leaves four inches on each side of where you're going to make your cut. It's a good idea to place a matchstick in the slit to keep it open.

You now want to get the stem with the slit in it into the soil without breaking it. The best way not to force it is to make a six inches wide, five inchs high mound of good soil into which a little sand and peat have been mixed. Bury the cut part of your stem into the top of the mound and peg the stem down on the parent's side with a wooden or wire hook.

If the stem is strong you'll probably need to use two hooks.

Cover over the stem with more soil and press down fairly firmly.

If all goes well, the layers will have rooted and be ready for cutting off and planting next March. - TOM SOTER

To keep your nails healthy, shape them by filing gently, do not cut you finger nails as this may weaken the nails. You can file your nails to look round or square. If a nail cracks or splits, file it immediately, so it doesn't get any worse. If you have very wide or square nails, make them look longer by putting a deep colour nail polish down the centre leaving the sides free from

When painting your nails, always start with a coat of base polish. This evens the nails as well as preventing the nails from becoming discoloured. If you haven't any base coat, use a top coat or clear varnish as an alternative.



By Dr. DAVE BARRY

Q. Since our children went back to school last September we've had more than our fair share of head lice. I treat them, but they get them again and again. I'm really fed up with this and don't know what else I can do. Have you any useful hints? A. I think nearly every

school I have heard about have been overrun by head lice since the start of the school year for some reason. Head lice have nothing whatsoever to do with hygiene - in fact, they thrive in clean hair. They are passed on during head-to-head contact and can spread quickly through the whole class and family. It's very important that every parent takes steps to treat the whole household once word is passed on through school that it is doing the rounds, and that parents then in turn inform the school when it found their children signs of lice.

The lice itch most, and can be found especially around the nape of the neck and behind the ears. Its best treated with both lotion and shampoo. 





Letter To The Editor

The Editor, "Dungarvan Leader". A chara,

One could not fault the Waterford hurlers for either their commitment or fitness in the championship game against Tipperary. However, it is not enough to simply say that our forwards were not good enough to break down the Tipperary defence. The fact is that there did not appear to be any game plan or strategy to open up the defence in order to create scoring opportunities. While the Waterford half backs and midfield got plenty of possession (especially in the second half), their only idea was to hit the ball in a straight line as far as possible (several times, straight into the goalkeeper's

Compare this with the short but well directed deliveries from Colm Bonner. Or the way Michael Cleary repeatedly picked up knock-downs after two Waterford players went up for the ball with one Tipperary man and had all the time in the world to send low balls into the gaps in the Waterford defence. Note also the way the Tipperary half forwards regularly switched the direction of play. The naive way the Waterford seniors played also contrasts sharply with the kind of ball the U-21's have been sending into their forward line in their recent tournament

A couple of other points of detail are worth noting such as the low trajectory puckouts into the wind by the Tipperary goalkeeper. Also, why was Paul Flynn allowed to opt out completely from the prematch puckabout? I watched him for five minutes, apparently wandering around aimlessly, without once hitting a ball. If he had hit 30 balls in this period, would he have missed that point-blank first minute opportunity which might have done wonders to settle the team down?

The question now is, of course, where do we go from here? Already many people are expressing anxiety that we have got no return yet from the U-21 players who won the 1992 All-Ireland. However, it is worth noting that the Limerick team which won the minor All-Ireland in 1984 and the U-21 title three years later had to wait a further seven years to make a senior championship breakthrough.

However, in the case of Waterford, we should not just be looking to the 1992 teams for the breakthrough. I don't know how widely known it is that since then, Waterford has produced three further very good minor teams. Good luck as much as

cellent game in Páirc Uí Chaoimh in 1993; we beat Tipperary before losing the 1994 Munster final; while, in my view, the 1995 team was more talented than the 1992 minors but, after beating Clare and Tipperary, they failed to rise to the occasion against a great Cork team in last year's Munster final. And this year again, we have a potentially good minor team.

This, of course, is all no coincidence but is a direct product of the excellent coaching going on in our schools. The problem is that there is no proper system in place for developing this talent further at adult level. We now need to put a medium (three-year) strategy in place to get the best out of the assembly line of young talent which has been emerging in recent years. One-year appointments of selectors is not unsatisfactory. At the same time, we have to be very careful in who is appointed, in order to avoid a repeat of the wasted Leahy years.

We need to put someone in charge who is able to relate to and earn the respect of the young players of today. We need someone who can provide leadership and can get the full commitment of all the players, both on and off the hurling field. While we need someone who knows his hurling, what we need most of all is someone who can instill confidence and selfbelief (as Ger Loughnane did in Clare).

I'm not sure if there are people answering this description out there, but if there are, I don't think the task of finding them should be left to one man. We need a "search committee" to consult widely with those in the know and to look into the record and background of potential candidates. And target candidates should not have assistant selectors foisted upon them that they do not want. The rule that county champions have an automatic right to appoint a selector has no rational basis and should be dispensed with.

There should be no rush in finding the man we want; we have more time than ever for the job this year. But, one way or another, we have to get it right this time. If we fail to get a successful senior team from the present crop of youngsters, I think we might as well throw our hat at it and start following Clare and Offaly, who have shown how it can be done.

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Major Kilmac' Road Realignment Project To Go Ahead

Planning on a major road realignment project on the N25 Cork/Waterford road at Kilmacthomas is now set to go ahead. The new project at a cost of £12 million will link up with major improvement works currently being undertaken on the Leamybrien stretch.

Three separate design routes were shown to the public and following a meeting in Tramore, 67% opted for the southern route which was also the choice of Waterford County Council's planning au-

Speaking at last Monday's Council meeting, County **Manager Donal Connolly** said the planning process for the realignment project is now being put in motion. Design plans for the 8.5 km stretch can be inspected by interested parties. By mid-July, Mr. Connolly said the road design staff in Tramore will have the planning doc-uments ready. The new project is expected to cost £10.5 million, excluding contractor and supervisors

Waterford County Manager, Donal Connolly, disclosed that over £4 million in funding is available nationally which has been set aside by the Dept. for coast protection work.

Meanwhile, proposals in relation to the Cunnigar and Tramore were submitted to the Dept. of the Marine by the Council in 1995 in response to requests for a list of priority works.

The following are the lo-cations in West Waterford and surrounding areas where proposed protection

works to alleviate storm damage is proposed; Ardmore - Curragh, provision of gabion and rock armour defences (£242,500); Currock armour (£12,500); Cunnigar, gabion and rock armour protection (£222,500); Abbeyside Strand, gabion and rock armour protection (£65,000). Clonea Strand, repair existing rock armouring, strengthen existing rubble protection, gabion and rock armour (£146,500); Ballyvoile, rock armouring and repair base of sea wall (£31,000); and Bonmahon (£180,000).

The Council is now waiting on a reply from the Dept. whether or not urgent funding for coastal protection work in these areas will

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
