## Quality Of Driving In Dungarvan Getting Worse Says Cllr.

According to Abbeyside Councillor Billy Kyne, the quality of driving in the inner town is getting worse. In the last six weeks, Grattan Square has been chaotic, he slammed, while ongoing deliveries on busy streets, at all hours of the day are causing major obstructions to traffic flow.

Cllr. Kyne was speaking at a meeting of Dungarvan UDC last Monday night when members met to discuss a number of traffic management proposals for the town.

His views were shared by the majority of members including Cllr. Damien Dillon who slammed what he termed as the 'great discourtesy' with which people treat each other on the road.

Cars, he said, are being parked abandoned everywhere. He suggested that a more rigorous enforcement of the laws and bye laws is needed. Greater courtesy is needed on the roads in Ireland, not just Dungarvan, he added.

Among the recommendations put forward by Council officials were; increase in parking disc from 10p to 30p; provision of additional

yellow lines at Church Street and New Chapel Street; introduction of residents parking permits; introduction of disabled drivers parking permits; car park bye laws, i.e. 30p charge for parking discs in car parks.

## New Burial Ground At Ringnasilloge

A proposal for a new burial ground at Ringnasilloge, containing 322 grave spaces has been unanimously approved by Dungarvan UDC. The graveyard will be located outside the boundary wall of the CBS playing fields at Ringnasilloge, near Childers Estate.

Access to the site, which will be surrounded by a 2 metre wall, will be provided for both pedestrians and traffic. The graveyard will be managed and maintained by the church authorities. Based on current demand, the new burial ground is expected to be sufficient for 25 to 30 years.

Following discussions be-

tween the Council and Canon G. Power P.P. last year, it was agreed that for burials taking place in the new burial ground, following the Requiem Mass in St. Mary's Parish Church, the funeral cortege will travel via the existing graveyard through an access and along a footpath to the new site.

A notice regarding the burial ground was published last April in local papers and no observations or submissions were received from the public.

The Council are now to proceed with the development of the new burial ground.

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## Know Your Rights

**QUESTION:**

I have retired home here from the U.K. I have a Social Security Pension and a Works Pension on which I pay tax here and the 2.25% Levies. (I have a Medical Card under E.U. regulations). Have there been any benefits to me since the Budget ?

**ANSWER:**

People (except civil servants, local authority officials) who receive an occupational pension and/or social security pension from the U.K., who are resident here are subject to Irish tax laws and not to the U.K. The tax is payable by direct assessment in a lump sum in October each year.

What is new is that from April 1994 you get the PAYE allowance - £800 (as well as the usual personal allowances) even if you are not paying tax on the PAYE system. Up to now Medical Card holders granted under E.U. regulations were not exempted from the Levies (2.25%). From April 1996 they will be exempted.

## Launch Of Guide To EU Funding For Agricultural Co-Ops



The Irish Co-operative Organisation Society (ICOS) has advised co-ops to maximise the benefits of capital and other investment opportunities currently available under the EU Structural Funds. Speaking at the launch of a comprehensive Guide to EU Funding for the agricultural co-ops, ICOS Director General, John Tyrrell, said it is likely that Ireland will not be able to avail of the same level of Structural Funds after 1999. He said that participation in current EU funded programmes would therefore be in the long term interest of the industry.

The guide to EU Funding was published jointly by ICOS and Waterford Foods plc.

As well as providing details on sources of capital investment funding, the guide also contains sources of funding for investment in communications technology, energy, research and technological development, and employment and training. There are also sections detailing funding under the various rural development and border initiatives, fisheries programmes, details of project finance for developing countries and funding for small and medium size enterprises.

# Monkey Business Drove Cop Squad Nuts

Chicago police were puzzled for a long while by a spate of 'locked room' burglaries. The breakthrough came when detectives at the scene of a jewel robbery realised someone must have got into the flat through a ventilator, too narrow even for a child to have squeezed through.

Suspicion that crooks were training monkeys to negotiate tiny skylights and other small apertures to open doors from the inside were confirmed by the discovery of monkey paw prints near the ventilator.

It went berserk and mauled the old man to death. The villains then robbed him. Their plot only backfired when they boasted about how clever they had been. The police got the message — and the murderers

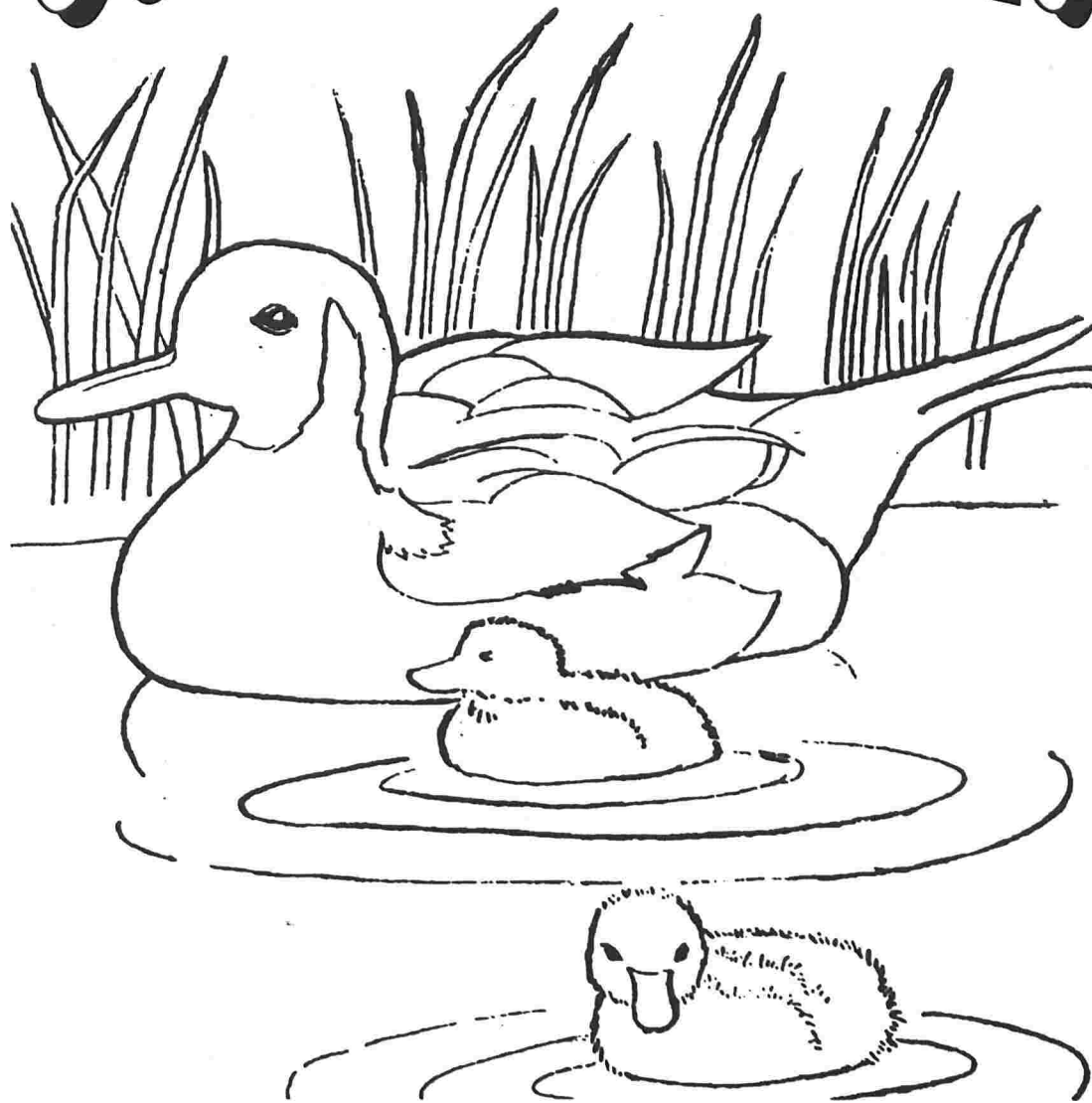

## Junior Encyclopaedia

### The Salmon

Most of our sea fish travel huge distances within a year, but they usually stay in British or Irish waters. One fish that differs is the Atlantic Salmon. It likes to go further afield, which brings it to the Atlantic Ocean. It does this annually and it is known as a sort of fish migration. This migration of the salmon is a source of wonder for all of us. The other surprising thing is that if the salmon makes the journey successfully it returns to the exact spot in the river where it hatched out. This is usually a large river.

Naturalists think the salmon migrates due to a number of factors:

Ocean currents, sun, stars, and even the pull of the moon. The salmon swims close to the surface at all times, which might help in this respect. The biggest mystery is how it manages to find its way back to where it was born.

A scientific theory suggests that the adult salmon is lured back somehow by a secretion known as pheromones which the salmon left behind in the river and which can reach across the sea to give a signal as a kind of invita-

tion to follow.

As soon as the salmon reaches fresh water it immediately starts to change colour. This is more noticeable in the male. It changes from a silvery colour to a pinkish-red with mottled streaks. By the time the female reaches the breeding ground, she is heavy with eggs.

She can sometimes crash into rocks, as she cannot swim over them and if this happens she may die.

A lot of people think that the salmon does not feed while living in fresh water. They then start to ask the question how can anglers lure them with bait and catch them.

What happens is that the salmon's stomach shrinks as it journeys upriver. Because of this it does not need to eat a lot, but if it is offered a tasty worm, it will willingly accept it.

From the time they are born, salmon are known by different names. Young salmon are referred to as 'fry'. Later in their development they are called 'parr' and just before they mature they are called 'smolts'. It is thought that only about 5% of the fry live long enough to become 'smolts' and few 'smolts' live long enough to make it across the Atlantic twice. Many salmon are fished from the sea in Irish or American waters.

CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1 who failed to agree on a uniform charge.

At present a parking disc for on-street parking costs only 10p per hour while the charges in both Council car parks at Friary Street and Davitt's Quay are 30p per hour on a sliding scale thereafter. An eight hour stay in one of the car parks costs £1.20 which would rise to £2.40 if the new price of 30p for every hour is adopted.

Proposing that the Council adopt the new 30p charge was Cllr. Michael O'Riordan, seconded by Cllr. Austin Flynn who felt that in light of the free half hour parking, the new charge would not affect those people who come into town for a 'quick message'.

Cllr. Kyne however said he had reservations in raising the price of parking discs. In connection with proposed changes in the operation of car parking, members had only agreed on an increase of 10p to 20p at a meeting held in March last year. Now however, it was proposed to increase this price to 30p for both on-street and car parking discs and Cllr. Kyne expressed his resentment at the way this charge had been 'foisted' on members. He suggested that a 30p charge should be retained in the car parks and a 20p charge for on street parking.

County Manager Donal Connolly responded that this system of two separate discs would be totally unworkable and would involve more expense for the Council. At present the Council takes in less than £8,000 per annum in revenue from car parking charges. Mr. Connolly went on to say that any private operator or business would

not operate the car parks the way the Council is doing at present.

A subsequent proposal by Cllr. Tony Wright that the Council defer a decision on the traffic management proposals including the car parking disc charge to the July meeting was then adopted on a 5 to 3 vote.

### PEDESTRIANISE MAIN STREET

As a test for the August bank holiday weekend, Christmas week, Feile na nGael and other main events, Cllr. Kyne submitted that the Council should seriously consider pedestrianising Main Street. He said the Council are missing out on an opportunity and should try the idea out on a trial basis.

Inspector Michael Blake of Dungarvan Garda Station, who also attended the meeting, agreed with Cllr. Kyne and said that for major festivals such as the Guinness Feile na nDeise etc., it would be an ideal time to evaluate the pedestrianisation of the street.

County Engineer John O'Flynn disclosed that Main Street was pedestrianised for two months when the Council were laying a sewer pipe there some years ago. The system had worked well at the time, he added.

Mr. Connolly said he would be in support of pedestrianism but in view of urban renewal works on the Quay, the road needs to be kept open for the immediate future.

### ONE-WAY WESTERN TERRACE?

The current traffic problem at Western Terrace which links into the congested O'Connell Street was also raised at the meeting.

Mr. Connolly suggested that a one-way system in the direction of Mitchel Street

to O'Connell Street would be the best solution but would aggravate current traffic congestion in O'Connell Street. Due to the presence of Nugent's Supervalu and two supermarket car parks however, the lower end of Western Terrace would have to be two-way.

Mr. Connolly said he would discuss the matter further with Paul Daley, of Waterford County Council and the gardai and perhaps introduce the aforementioned system on a trial basis.

Inspector Blake also felt that a one way system in the direction of O'Connell Street was the best solution for Western Terrace. For this to work however cars should be prevented from parking at the junction with O'Connell Street. A footpath, he added, should also be provided at the top of the Terrace for the safety of school children and pedestrians crossing the road.

### 'GREATEST DISASTER AREA IN TOWN'

Described by Cllr. Austin Flynn as the 'greatest disaster area in town', congested traffic problems in busy O'Connell Street were also discussed in great detail. Cllr. Flynn claimed that drivers are now trying to avoid the street as it is congested all day long, particularly the narrow section of the street beyond the junction at Western Terrace.

Likewise Inspector Blake said O'Connell Street was the main traffic problem area in the town and he suggested that the existing double yellow line should be extended farther up the street to Dr. Stacey's.

An irate Cllr. Kyne said it was ridiculous to drive up the street and see a forklift in the middle of the road

and lorries on loading and off loading at all hours.

### OVERALL PLAN NEEDED

Replying to Cllr. Kyne's statement that the Council are not managing traffic, only responding to problems, Mr. Connolly said that pending more advancement in the urban renewal developments, it was premature to bring in an overall traffic management plan.

Likewise, Mr. O'Flynn said that when the Quay area has been developed, it will dramatically change the traffic flow in the town. When this work has been completed a review of the situation can be made. He agreed with Kyne that the Council are only 'tinkering with problems' in the absence of an overall review but funding is needed for any changes and the Council will have to generate that money.

### TRAFFIC NEWS

Meanwhile the construction of the roundabout at the Park Hotel junction is expected to be completed by the end of July.

Included in the UDC's roadworks programme for this year is the provision of a mini roundabout at the top of Mary Street/Mitchel Street and rumble strips adjacent to Dunabney.

In the case of the proposed construction of a multi storey car park at Scanlon's Yard, four parties have expressed an interest in the project. However until progress has been made on the development of the shopping centre complex on the Mulcahy/Ducey site, the project has been put on ice. According to Cllr. Wright, a number of residents in Emmet Street have expressed concern about the implications of such a multi storey development.

# Deputy Deasy Speaks Out On Hedgecutting During Nesting Season

Speaking in the Dail recently, Waterford Fine Gael Deputy, Austin Deasy told the Minister for Arts, Culture and the Gaeltacht that although the bird-nesting season is in full swing, a number of local authorities and individuals are busily cutting hedgerows and destroying other habitats.

Deputy Deasy asked what action the Minister would take to prevent these activities until such time as the breeding season is over.

Minister Michael D. Higgins replied that the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) have issued a letter to all county councils and corporations drawing their attention to the potential damage caused to nesting birds by hedge cutting and requesting them to refrain from the activity in so far as is possible during the breeding season. Where there is evidence that such activity is being undertaken by individuals in con-

travention of the Wildlife Act, the matter should be reported in the first instance to the Garda Síochána and/or the NPWS where it will be investigated.

The Minister continued: "I am also hopeful that the Rural Environment Protection Scheme (REPS), administered by the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry, will play an important part in contributing to the protection of those types of habitats. Measures are provided in that Scheme to maintain existing features that make up farmland habitat "mosaics," such as hedgerows, field edges, areas of scrub and unmanaged vegetation, drainage ditches, etc., which are so valuable to farmland birds."

## DUNGARVAN WALKING CLUB NOTES

This Saturday, June 22nd is certainly a red letter day for the club when three months of organising and planning sees all roads leading to Clonmel for the George Harney Memorial 38 kilometre walk in aid of West Waterford Hospice. The organising committee have left no stone unturned in pelting out a route that takes in all the high points along The Comeraghs and Monavollaghs while at the same providing a route that allows both the very experienced mountaineers and the less experienced walker take part in the walk.

Stage 1 of the walk from Clonmel at S215217 Map 75 to Nire Car Park starts at 9.00 a.m. sharp. This stage of the walk which is 15 kilometres takes the group through Lachtnafranke, Moangarha and Glennanore with the group expected to complete this section in four hours approx. For those who wish to leave the walk at this point and rejoin at Stage 3, transport will be provided.

Stage 2 will take the group from Nire Car Park to Seefin and on to Mau Mau Road. This section which again is 15 kilometres is unquestionably the most difficult stage of the walk and it is advised that only experienced walkers should undertake this section. The group are expected to arrive at Mau Mau Road between 5.30 and 6.00 p.m. with

Stage 3 taking the group up to Cruachán and down through Lacken, Fruithill and The Burgery with the walk expected to arrive in Dungarvan no later than 9.00 p.m.

The response to the walk from clubs throughout Munster and the Dungarvan community has been very encouraging to the organisers and should prove a fitting tribute to the late George Harney who worked so tirelessly to establish the club prior to his untimely death. We have also received great help and support from our friends in West Waterford Hospice who will supervise all checkpoints along the route.

A number of very minor but nevertheless important adjustments have been made to the original schedule so those intending to take part are advised of the following - Bus to Clonmel leaves Bean A Leanna at 8.00 a.m. sharp and the official starting point now changed to Poulmagunoge. Bus to Mau Mau Road to take part in Stage 3 will leave Arus Brugha at 5.15 sharp and those intending to take part in this section are advised to book their tickets in advance from Michael Power, Book Shop, Mary Street. The charge for this section is £5. All taking part in the walk are requested to register at the finish at Bean A Leanna.

## National Park And Stately Home In Lismore?

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy has asked the Minister for Arts, Culture and the Gaeltacht if he will enter into negotiations with the owners of Lismore Castle and the surrounding estate with a view to having the castle classified as a stately home and the surrounding grounds classified as a national park.

Speaking in the Dail recently, Minister Michael D. Higgins said he was satisfied that Lismore Castle is afforded adequate legal protection under the national Monuments Act as it is included in the list of recorded monuments in Co. Waterford.

"While Lismore castle is de facto a stately home", he stated, "there is no special provision for such a classification under the relevant Acts. As regards the grounds of Lismore Castle, these would not fulfil the required criteria for designation as a national park", he added.

Describing the Minister's reply as 'unacceptable', Deputy Deasy declared that if Minister Higgins was reasonably acquainted with the situation he might well accede to his request.

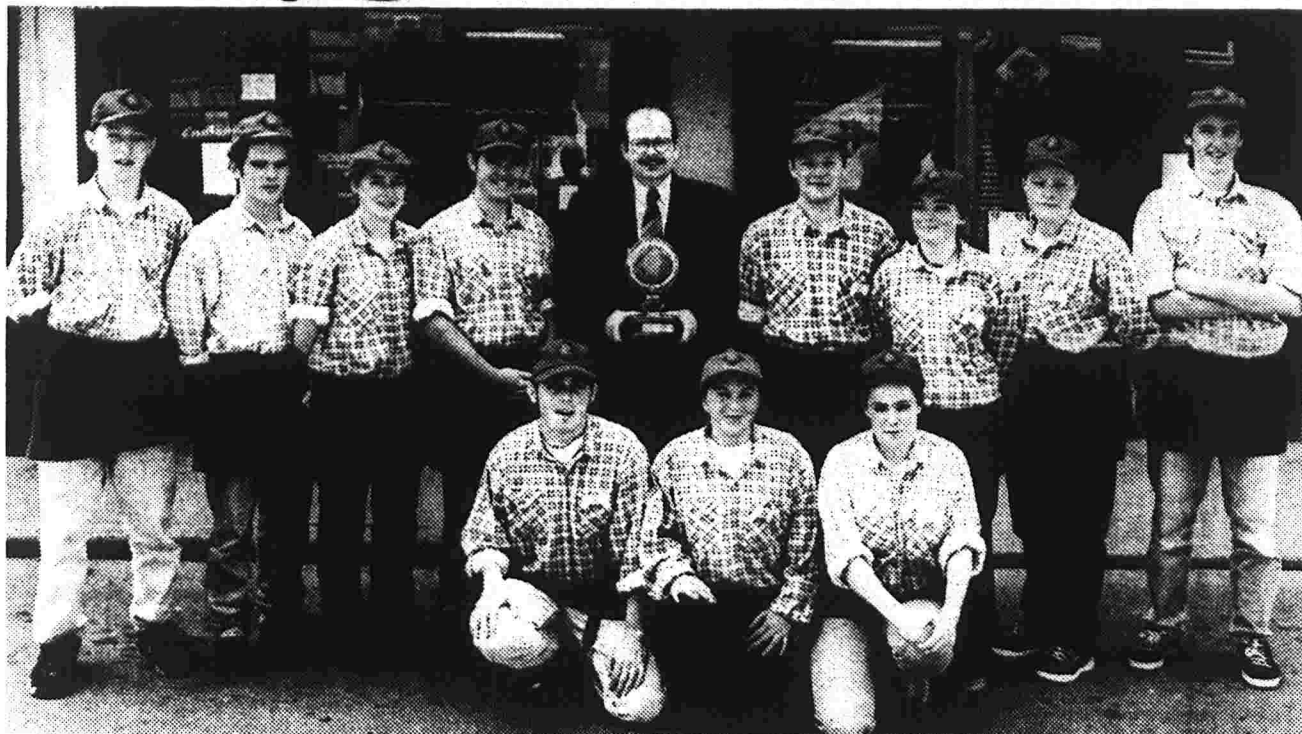

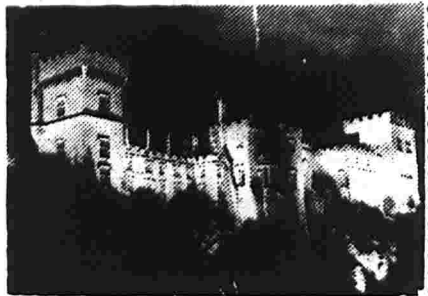

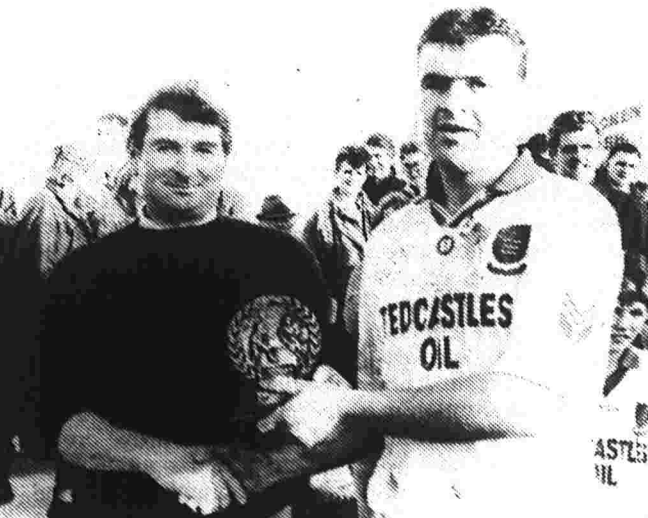

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# Hand Weed For A Good Job!

*All your annuals should be growing at a fair rate of knots by now — but, alas, so are the weeds which, as usual, seem to be growing even faster.*

You won't need reminding that weed seedlings grow very rapidly at this time of the year and you won't get rid of them simply by hoeing. Regular hoeing does much, of course, to keep weeds down, but for the best results I'm afraid there's nothing for it but to get down on your knees and hand-weed.

It's one of gardenings worst jobs, but you do get a certain amount of satisfaction from it when you look at the pile of weeds you've pulled out after a good session.

I've always found that it pays to soak the soil well beforehand. It makes weed-pulling that much easier.

If you're weeding rows of small plants, make life easier for yourself and use a kneeling mat. You can buy them, but it's cheaper to use an old cushion or piece of carpet. Personally, I use an out-of-use rubber hot-water bottle.

The kinds of weeds with which you will have to contend are determined by such things as locality, soil, climate and cultivation.

Take lawn daisies, for instance. Lots of folk don't mind the occasional daisy in their lawn; but when a lawn becomes infested with them, then you will need to dress the patches generously with lawn sand when the weather looks like staying dry for a while, or you can apply a selective weed-killer. Your local nursery or garden centre can advise you.

Weeds on paths look especially unsightly and there are a number of proprietary weed-killers you can use. Where a path to be treated has a very hard surface, it should be lightly loosened with a rake before the weed-killer is applied (according to maker's instructions).

Apply when the path is moist because it will then find the roots more readily. However, you'll just be wasting your time treating a path when it's actually raining or rain is threatening.

I've found that a fine-rose watering can with the rose turned downward make the best distributor for liquid weed-killers.

Use weed-killers on a calm day, you don't want the wind to carry liquid to neighbouring plants and grass. As a further safeguard against splashing, cover flower edgings and grass verges with brown paper (or thick newspaper), weighted down with stones.

Selected weed-killers are so called because they kill weeds and not grass in lawns. They are mostly in liquid form and if you're using a watering-can, make sure you wash it out very thoroughly afterwards.

As well as for use on lawns, certain hormone preparations are available for killing brushwood, brambles and so on in rough land, or weeds in the bases of hedge-grows.

And finally, while you're weeding, you might as well snip off all dead flower heads, especially roses. Take them with as long a stalk as possible, and always cut above a leaf. The appearance of herbaceous border plants will be much improved by routine removal of spent bloom.

# Public Should Have Been Admitted To Horizons Food Fair

"The best exhibition of Irish food in years and ordinary consumers didn't even get to see it. That was the only criticism ICMSA President, Mr. Frank Allen, had of the major Horizons Food Fair being held in the RDS this week.

"With £4 million going into the organisation of the event, it's a real pity that members of public did not

get a chance to see the food on display. It would have been an excellent way to create awareness of our excellent food products among consumers here in Ireland," said Mr. Allen.

"In future the general public should be admitted to the displays. All are consumers of food and the attention of young people in particular is necessary if we are to tar-

get our products to coming generations of food purchasers."

However, he described the trade fair as an outstanding display of the best of Irish food.

He continued: "The Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Ivan Yates T.D., An Bord Bia and the participants are to be congratulated for the organisa-

tion of the event and for such an impressive display.

"Such exhibitions of Irish food should be a permanent feature of our overall marketing strategy. The possibilities of combining tourism and food in joint promotions should receive serious consideration, as both complement each other", said Mr. Allen.

## Beef Farmers' Incomes Could Fall As A Result Of BSE Crisis

"The BSE crisis could cost Irish beef farmers £200 million in 1996 if cattle prices fall to the floor level set by EU safety-net intervention and if there is no increase in the £57 million premium compensation currently on offer in Brussels. On the basis that incomes on cattle and beef farms last year were equivalent to about 40% of the value of farm output, income nationally on these farms is estimated at about £520 million in 1995. Thus a £200 million loss this year would cut incomes of the 100,000 farmers involved in cattle production by almost 40%."

This was stated by Con Lucey, IFA Chief Economist at a Press Conference in Dublin where he presented an analysis of the potential impact of the beef crisis in the current year.

Mr. Lucey said: "The IFA analysis has looked in some detail at two possible scenarios for cattle prices in the second half of 1996. If cattle prices continue at their current levels for the rest of the year the loss to producers attributable to BSE is about £150 million. However, if the 'worst case' were to happen and steer prices were to fall to safety-net intervention, with proportionate reductions in prices of other categories of cattle, the loss attributable to BSE would be about £200 million."

Commenting on this, Waterford IFA Chairman, James Coughlan referred to the implications of the BSE crisis for overall farm income in 1996. He said that national farm income could

fall by 10%-12% this year. However, if the Minister for Agriculture was successful in achieving full compensation in Brussels for the BSE problem, the farm income loss would be contained at a level of about 5%. He explained that lower milk prices and higher prices of inputs, particularly feed-stuffs, fertiliser and fuel, would be the main contributory factors.

The IFA document which was prepared by Con Lucey and the Association's Director of Livestock, Kevin Kinsella states that: "IFA has already identified the 'Winter Finisher' group of farmers as the group suffering the most severe loss in proportion to their incomes. If cattle prices in the second quarter of 1996 are compared with the prices in the second quarter of 1995, as an indicator of the loss due to BSE, the results show an average loss of £137/head for factory steers; the equivalent loss on finished heifers is £109/head.

The Waterford Chairman James Coughlan said that IFA's first priority is that the magnitude of the losses to Irish cattle and beef farmers arising from the UK BSE crisis are quantified. He said: "The compensation being negotiated by the Minister in Brussels must be in line with the actual losses. The £57 million currently on the table is far short of what is needed and I will be continuing to insist that the Minister pursues full compensation at the crucial Council of Ministers meeting in two weeks time."

## ICMSA Slams Rural TDs

TDs from rural areas are failing in their duty to properly represent the farming community in Dail Eireann, ICMSA President Frank Allen said.

"There is now ample evidence from the events of recent weeks to prove that the majority of TDs from rural areas have little or no genuine commitment to a large percentage of their constituents — farmers and their families," Mr. Allen declared.

"ICMSA is asking all its branches throughout the country to closely monitor the performance of their local TDs in relation to promoting sound agriculture policy and rural development. On the basis of these

findings, farmers and all people living in rural areas will be able to judge for themselves who they should vote for in next year's general election."

Mr. Allen added that ICMSA was furious at the large absence of rural TDs from a number of political parties at the recent Dail debate on BSE.

The wholesale lack of commitment by rural TDs to the farming community was also reflected in the fact that only four Deputies were present to discuss the Department of Agriculture estimates when they were presented to the Dail Committee on Finance and General Affairs last week.



## PAINTING FARM BUILDINGS

Existing buildings can often be improved by a change of colour. Light or bright colours tend to reflect light and make buildings stand out in the landscape. Darker colours are less prominent, blending with the countryside and making large structures look smaller. The colour combination used is also very important, dark tones should always be used for the roof and lighter tones for the sides of a building. The exception to this rule is in a prominent site. Here dark colours should be used on both roof and sides.

Weathering lightens colours, therefore, always use the darkest shade of any colour. Those preferred for farm buildings include dark greens, dark browns and dark greys. Avoid bright blues, light greens and mauves.

Traditionally many buildings in Co. Waterford had red oxide roofs and whitewashed walls. This combination can still look very attractive in a traditional farm landscape and is well suited to particular locations.

## SUMMER MASTITIS

Summer Mastitis is a disease of the dry udder in July and August and is probably transmitted by flies. Prevention is possible using the following measures. Fly control using sprays, ear tags or udder creams. Long-acting, dry cow intramammary antibiotics. Daily inspection of livestock.

## SHEEP

For the next three months, the breeding ewe will be the most neglected animal on many farms. This, of course, is wrong. The practice of subjecting whole flocks of ewes to starvation diets is as inappropriate as allowing entire flocks to become grossly over fat. Every flock of sheep consists of individual ewes - some thin, some fat, some young, some old, some good milkers, some bad milkers.

To arrive at a situation next September where effective flushing can be done requires that a "levelling-out" process takes place between now and then. The first step is identification and grouping of ewes with similar needs.

One week after weaning, all ewes should be handled to: (a) Select culls on the basis of teeth, udder, feet, lambing problems etc, (b) Condition score and group ewes according to whether they need to gain, maintain or lose condition.

The following guidelines should be used:

### GROUP 1

Fat ewes, condition score 3.5 or better. These can be stocked at 15 to 20 per acre depending on initial grass supply. Some will lose weight more quickly than others and these should be withdrawn before they get thin.

### GROUP 2

Fit ewes - condition score 2.5 - 3.0. These do not need to lose weight and should be allowed more grass. A stocking rate of 10 - 12 ewes per acre should provide maintenance.

### GROUP 3

Others - This group contains ewes in poor condition, last years ewes, ewe lambs which reared lambs and any old ewes with poor mouths being kept for an extra season. These should be stocked at about 8 - 10 per acre on good grass.

## Yates Agrees To Pursue IFA's 3 Year Quota Leasing Proposal

At a meeting in Dublin last Friday, Agriculture Minister Ivan Yates agreed to pursue the IFA Dairy Committee proposal for a 3 year milk quota leasing scheme aimed at helping smaller and medium sized producers.

Following the meeting, which was attended by IFA Dairy Chairman, Liam Foley and General Secretary Michael Berkery, Mr. Foley welcomed Minister Yates commitment to pursue the necessary changes in EU Commission regulations to allow the IFA leasing proposal be implemented.

Commenting on this, Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman, Gerald Curran, said the aim of the IFA proposal was to help

small and medium sized producers obtain secure access to quota held by non-producers at reasonable prices.

"IFA wants a 3 year Co-op based leasing scheme to attract quota away from private leases and the one year temporary leasing market. A 3 year scheme is necessary to give greater security to vulnerable producers depending on leased quota," Mr. Curran said, adding "producers have found the availability of quota increasingly uncertain under the one year temporary leasing scheme."

"I now expect Minister Yates to ensure that the necessary changes to EU regulations are made as soon as possible," he concluded.

## CO. WATERFORD ICMSA NEWS

John Skehan, Chairman of County Waterford Executive of ICMSA has welcomed the decision by the Department of Agriculture to introduce a milk quota subsidy scheme for those purchasing additional milk quota through the milk restructuring scheme.

Meanwhile ICMSA Dairy Chairman, Tommy Cooke, has called on the Minister for Agriculture to immedi-

ately introduce the milk quota subsidy scheme.

Mr. Cooke said that almost £2 million was available as a carry-over from previous years and that this should be used immediately to provide a subsidy of 75p per gallon.

"The conditions to qualify for the subsidy scheme should be changed. The condition that at least two thirds of a persons income must come from farming

has caused a lot of developing farmers to be disqualified and ICMSA would like to see this condition change to 30 per cent of total income coming from agriculture. This would be in line with other schemes such as the Ewe Premium National Reserve," said Mr. Cooke.

He said last year applicants were rejected because of the income limit of £15,000. This should be increased to at least £16,250 in line with the rules of other schemes.

Mr. Cooke said that an early announcement on the scheme by the Department would allow co-ops to have completed all the allocations under the 1996 milk quota Restructuring Scheme by the end of July. This would be an important target date as farmers would know what amount of additional quota they may then require by way of temporary leasing. The second phase of temporary leasing which must be completed by 30th September is likely to commence in mid-August.

By completing the allocations from the Restructuring Scheme before the commencement of the second phase of temporary leasing would be a practical way to proceed and would allow farmers to plan their quota for the rest of the year.

not as vibrant as this time last year the British Wool Marketing Board is guaranteeing UK flock owners a minimum price of 95p/kg for wool.

In order to obtain the maximum price for wool Mr. Gray said that farmers must ensure that their product is top quality and presented in a correct fashion. "This means that sheep should be properly dragged before shearing, shearing should be carried out on a dry day in a clean area. "It is essential that there is no foreign material such as baler twine, etc., allowed contaminate the wool. Fleeces must be properly rolled and packed.

The Waterford Sheep Committee Chairman said that with top quality wool, properly presented farmers are in a strong position to demand 84p/kg for their product.

## Waterford IFA Sheep Chairman Demands 84p/kg For Wool

As the country's 48,000 flock owners begin shearing their flocks, Harry Gray, Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman, said that farmers must break the cartel that is attempting to set wool prices at 60p/kg (27p/lb) in the last number of days. He said this move by wool merchants is totally unjustifiable. "The Department of Agriculture has specified that based on recent wool sales in the U.K. Irish wool is worth 84p/kg for lowland breeds and 70p/kg for hill breeds."

Mr. Gray said that not all wool merchants have agreed to fix prices at 60p/kg and farmers should shop around, bargain hard and demand a minimum of 84p/kg for their wool.

Mr. Gray said that despite the fact that the wool trade is

## Waterford ICMSA Calls For Improved REPS Planning

The quality of planning in the Rural Environment Protection Scheme (REPS) leaves a lot to be desired in some cases, Waterford ICMSA Chairman, John Skehan, said recently.

He said it seemed that the money earmarked for the scheme was being used to support a whole army of independent planners and consultants. REPS was supposed to be primarily aimed at farmers to improve the environment and farming.

Questioning the quality of plans carried out under the scheme, Mr. Skehan added: "while I accept that there are teething problems in any new scheme, REPS planners should have sufficient knowledge and experience now to do proper planning for farmers."

"The clarification and changes announced by the Department of Agriculture recently should make it clear to planners and farmers what is required. Planning for the REPS scheme does not come cheaply with costs ranging up to £500. Farmers expect that for this money a proper scheme will be drawn up for their farm which will meet all the requirement of the Department and that the planners would set out what the farmer must do, based on the new guidelines set down

by the Department."

Mr. Skehan added, "farmers should not pay planners for extra farm visits, where this is needed as a result of bad planning."

He said most farmers have to undertake costly alterations to the farm to qualify for REPS. The last thing they want is endless paperwork and endless visits from planners and Department Officials.

ment Officials.

"From my experience most farmers have proper plans and are following them currently. ICMSA are now seeking a firm commitment from the Department that these farmers will be paid on time in future. There can be no justification of any delays in REPS payments where farmers are complying with the rules," said Mr. Skehan.

# Coca Cola Féile 1996

The first Coca-Cola Féile in 1971 was a massive, intimidating, undertaking by the host county Tipperary and while co-operation was forthcoming from within the county and from the participating counties there were many hiccups as one would expect. Despite whatever shortcomings that existed, general delights and satisfaction were expressed at the finished product. Over subsequent years, a detailed system evolved which would make Féile a smooth sophisticated operation displaying great attention to detail and achieving high standards of performance and presentation. There were no fax machines at the beginning and computers were hardly even in the embryo stage. Nowadays Coca-Cola Féile Na nGael is a model for anyone who seeks to organise a similar huge hosting of young people for weekend sport.

Coca-Cola Féile is under the patronage and control of Cumann Luthchleas Gael whose rules have to be complied with and a National Steering Committee appointed by an t-Uachtarán C.L.G. Jack Boothman has full authority over all aspects of the competition. In effect however, Pat Guthrie, the Dublin based Clare man is the master mind and controller general of Féile. He has an encyclopaedic knowledge of all the festival's constituent elements and vast experience of dealing with them and bringing this great national undertaking to fruition.

Once the County Féile Executive was set up some nine months ago, it was time for Pat to come into the county and put in place the structures which would ensure a successful conclusion to next weekend's events. If Pat hadn't received full support from the Executive and from the clubs, all of his expertise and dedication would have been in vain. So from that first Friday night in early December when Pat had meetings with the County Féile Executive and the 34 Waterford clubs at The Park Hotel, there was progression. Monthly targets were set for all so that nothing would be allowed to hinder the overall objective: full preparedness for Féile weekend June 20th - 23rd and an outstanding Féile for the 3,000 boys and girls from more than 34 clubs

throughout the counties of Ireland and Britain.

Since December, meetings have proliferated for Executive, for clubs, for Féile committees, for the many sub committees, for Féile and field officials. Progress was monitored, motivation, encouragement and assistance given, all culminating in last Wednesday's final meeting in Dungarvan where programmes and tickets were distributed as all clubs in the county prepared to receive their guests. Clubs in Waterford deserve congratulations on their wholehearted involvement in Féile and on the sincere honest efforts they have made to ensure that Waterford maintains the very high standards of those previous 25 Féiles. It must be admitted that Coca-Cola have outlined very clearly what is expected and required from each club. They have issued guidelines and checklists in connection with both long term and immediate preparation. Itemised lists included information on flags, their number and size, jerseys, nets, bunting, accommodation, meals, the Féile banner, the duties of Féile and field officials. Coca-Cola fund all the brochures, handouts and literature associated with the festival set up and man the Féile office at the Granville Hotel, Waterford and underwrite all of the expenses of staging Féile. They have spared no efforts in their determination to make it a memorable experience for both spectators and participants. There is no charge for any of the Féile events.

Stephen Power's Féile Executive Committee is fortunate to have a calm, capable Runaf in the person of Portlaw man, Denis Hanrahan. He never missed a meeting and there were many, and was helpful and supportive of all of these sub-committees. There are nine sub committees altogether. The Parade is in the capable hands of Johnny Cleary, a Tipperary native who is a member of the Garda Síochána. He exudes confidence and assurance and is a most dependable man. Liam Cheasty of Butlerstown has charge of organising the referees and venues for the games and has compiled a comprehensive fixture list.

Pat Moore of Ballinacmack undertook to produce the Féile programme and to

shoulder the duties of P.R.O. For a man so totally involved already to the G.A.A. as top class referee, constantly in demand, club administrator, selector and coach, it was typical of the generous-hearted Pat to accept those two demanding tasks. His hundred page programme meets the highest standards for layout presentation and content and must be the best programme for Féile to date. Every home in Waterford should have a copy of this quality production.

Br. Griffey of Mount Sion, that tireless promoter of all things Gaelic and cultural, promoter and lover of hurling for as many years as I've known him, took upon himself the tasks of organising the school's visitations by G.A.A. dignitaries and hurling stars.

That quiet dynamic man from St. Augustine's College, Br. Finbarr Spring has a very demanding position obliging him to take responsibility for the running of Féile handball competitions. The absence of convenient alleys in sufficient numbers created many organisational problems for Br. Finbarr but he is a most resourceful person and has found accommodation for all participants and venues for all the games.

No better person could have been entrusted with the camogie affairs of Féile than Maria Pollard of Tramore. You are quite right in assuming from that surname that she is related to Mossy Pollard of Lismore, the famous referee of the 40's, 50's and 60's, a man steeped in Gaelic traditions. Maria is married to Mossy's son Eamonn and is principal of a large Waterford city school. She has been involved in camogie over very many years and is now one of the country's top referees after a highly successful playing career. A well-organised lady she has completed all of the necessary arrangements to entertain camogie visitors from Limerick, Carlow, Wexford, Cork, Tipperary, Antrim, Kilkenny and nine other county Féile champion teams.

Stewarding, an area of supreme importance, is the brief of John O'Leary, Kilmeaden. Without sufficient stewards and effective co-ordination of their work, the big outdoor events such as the Parade and the Féile

Mass at Walsh Park will suffer. John can be expected to meet this challenge.

Betty Forristal, whose late husband Tony was such a committed hurling man and dedicated servant of Waterford underage affairs, has the credentials to make a success of her area of responsibility - catering. This will present no great problems to Betty who knows what is involved and has made ready her strategy. She is only too well aware that she who fails to prepare, prepares to fail so her preparation has been methodical and meticulous.

The only other sub committee is that which deals with the All-Ireland Skills Competition. Ned Power has charge of that and I can tell you that he feels honoured to have been chosen to chair this committee because hurling skills are important to him. Some of hurling's finest performers were once winners of this competition. Shane Aherne, Ferrybank and Waterford hurling star won the All-Ireland Hurling Skills title in Kilkenny in 1978. Shane continues to display his skills and did so only very recently with Waterford junior hurlers at Walsh Park. At the very first Coca-Cola Féile in 1971 Tom Cashman's Blackrock won Division 'A' and young Tom outscored every other competitor in the Skills final. Any roll call of the most skillful hurlers of all time would have to include Tom Cashman.

Coca-Cola Féile Na nGael is only some days away now. No effort has been spared to make it a success. If you're a poor sinner like the rest of us, perhaps you would use your influence with the Lord and entreat Him to let the sunshine pour down on Féile 1996. I don't know if any Waterford team will win a divisional championship and quite frankly I'm not too concerned. What I hope for most of all is that everyone, host and visitor alike, enjoy the company of the Gentle County natives, enjoy the games and the camaraderie which they generate, bear witness to the community bonding and forging of friendships through hurling, camogie and handball. And may our visitors depart retaining happy memories of the Féile visit to the sunny south east.

## Treatments For Thread Veins And Sun Spots

Very few people are so lucky to have normal flawless skin. However with a little help from your beauty therapist, skin marks such as thread veins and age or sun spots need not be a major problem. Thread veins are small red lines which can occur on the face. They are caused when the blood stays in dilated blood vessels. Thread veins usually occur in fine skin. Stimulants such as extremes of temperature, spicy food, alcohol and sun can cause inflammation of thread veins. Qualified electrologists can treat small areas of thread veins by using a fine needle with an electrified current passing through to seal the vein. This treatment may be

painful and will leave small scabs on the skin for a few days. Laser treatment may be done on large areas of thread veins, however, this may be quite expensive and should only be done by a qualified nurse or doctor. Laser treatment is also used to treat port-wine birthmarks and patches of skin pigmentation. Several treatments may be needed to achieve the desired result. Sun spots are usually caused by over exposure to the sun. They are usually dark pigmentations in the skin which resemble large freckles. Some dark patches can be faded with specialised creams available from most

chemists. Laser treatment may also be used to treat sun spots. All marks on the skin may be disguised with make-up. If none of the mentioned treatments appeal to you, visit a beauty salon and get advice from a qualified make-up artist on what is the best way to cover up your skin marks. Your skin may not be flawless, but you can still look good.

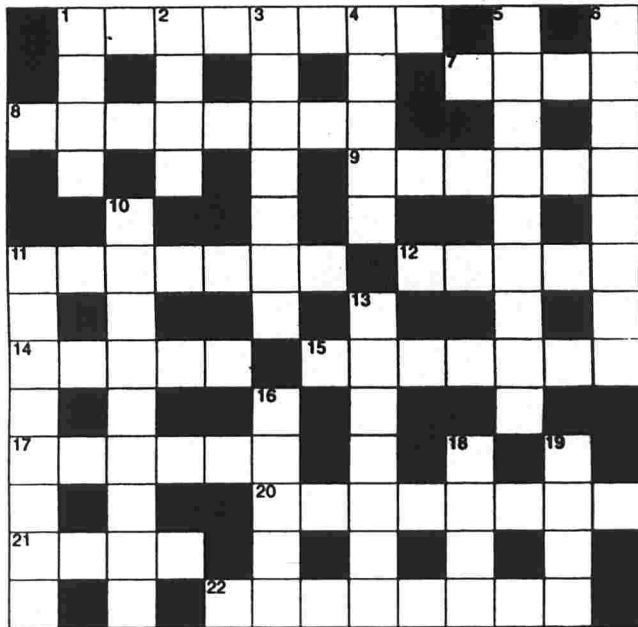

# Chett's Corner

Menus for the week

## Shoofly Pie



- 350g/12 oz shortcrust pastry, thawed if frozen
- beaten egg to glaze
- 75g/3oz soft dark brown sugar
- 75g/3oz plain flour
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp ground ginger
- 1/4 tsp ground nutmeg
- 75g/3oz butter, cubed
- 100ml/4fl oz boiling water
- 4 tbsp molasses
- 1/4 tsp bicarbonate of soda

icing sugar to dust

**METHOD:** Lightly grease a 20cm/8in round pie dish. On a lightly floured surface, roll out two-thirds of the pastry and use to line the pie dish. Trim the edges. Prick all over with a fork. Roll out the remaining pastry and cut out approximately 24 leaves. Mark veins on the

leaves with the tip of a knife. Stick leaves round the edge of the pie with beaten egg. Chill for 30 minutes. Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/ Gas mark 4. Place a baking sheet in the oven to heat. Meanwhile, mix the sugar, flour, and spices in a bowl. Add the butter and, using fingertips, rub in until the mixture resembles fine bread-crumbs. In a separate bowl or jug, mix the water with the molasses and bicarbonate of soda. Spoon half the crumb mixture into the pastry case, then pour half the molasses over. Repeat. Place dish on the baking sheet and bake for 35-40 minutes until set. Serve warm or cold, dusted with icing sugar.

## Winter Braised Beef

Preparation: 15 minutes  
Cooking: 3 hours  
Serves: 6

- 1 (1.1kg/2 1/2lb) joint boned and rolled brisket beef
- 2 tsp ground black pepper
- 1 tbsp oil
- 1-2 tbsp mushroom ketchup
- 450ml/1 1/2 pt hot beef or vegetable stock
- 1 bay leaf
- a few sprigs of fresh thyme
- 225g/8oz shallots or button onions, peeled
- 225g/8oz small carrots, trimmed and peeled
- 1 small savoy cabbage, trimmed and cut into wedges
- sprigs of thyme and bay leaves to garnish

**METHOD:** Preheat oven to 170°C/325°F/Gas mark 3. Roll the beef in the ground black pepper on a board or large plate. Sprinkle with a little salt. Heat the oil in a large frying pan and fry the joint for 2-3 minutes until light golden. Remove and place in a deep roasting tin or shallow ovenproof casserole. Add the mushroom ketchup and stock to the juices in the frying pan and bring to the boil. Pour over the beef joint, add the bay leaf and sprigs of thyme. Cover tightly with a lid or foil and roast in the oven for 1 1/2 hours. Remove from the oven and add the shallots or button onions and the carrots. Cover again and roast for a further 1 1/2 hours, adding the cabbage wedges after 1 hour. Serve in the roasting dish garnished with thyme sprigs and bay leaves. Serve creamy mashed potato as an accompaniment, if liked.

### HOUSEHOLD TIPS... HOUSEHOLD TIPS...

- Clean very dirty windows with 125ml (4fl oz) ammonia and 125ml (4 fl oz) white vinegar mixed in a bucketful of water. Or if the glass is very fly-spotted use plain hot water and put a dash of paraffin on the cleaning cloth, allow to dry then polish off.
- If you need to polish stair rods, put pieces of paper underneath to protect the carpet.
- Keep wicker waste bins and laundry baskets smelling sweet by scrubbing them out once in a while. Do this out of doors with warm, soapy water and salt. Leave to dry in the fresh air.
- Tie a rattle to the car seat. The motion of the car will set it off and entertain a wakeful baby.
- Cream will whip up faster if you leave it in the fridge until you need it, then add two or three drops of lemon juice.
- Rub discoloured tile grouting with a toothbrush dipped in half-and-half solution of household bleach or liquid anti-septic and water.
- You'll never have to scrub out the grill pan again if you line the bottom with aluminium foil. When you grill something fatty you'll need only to throw away the foil.

## Family Health

By Dr. DAVE BARRY

**Q. We took in a stray dog recently and I was really horrified when she passed a segment of tapeworm. Is it likely that the family could become infected?**  
**A. If you handle an infected dog, then yes, you could be infected. Dogs pick up the tapeworms if they exercise in areas where sheep are reared. Tapeworms can cause cysts in any organ of the human body and must be taken seriously. The dog must be wormed on a regular basis especially if you are living anywhere near sheep now. This is an inexpensive, effective and essential way of guaranteeing that the dog is no longer a health risk to the family or others.**

**Q. For the past month or two I have been suffering with leg cramps. These are particularly bad when I travel long distances in the car. I get them occasionally by night when they are extremely painful. As I have to travel a lot with my work, these cramps are worrying. What is the cause for these and can they be treated?**  
**A. One of the causes of muscle cramp, which is an involuntary contraction of a muscle or group of muscles is disturbance in the flow of blood to the tissues. This type of circulatory disturbance warrants checking. I suggest you see your own doctor for advice.**

**THE "LEADER"**  
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IS  
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**Tales From The Deise**

This Anthology treats on the heritage and history of Newcastle, the Nire Valley and the parish of Newcastle and Fourmilewater. The area covered by this Anthology includes a portion of West Waterford and South Tipperary nestling in the valley between the Comeragh and Knockmealdown mountains and which formed part of the ancient kingdom of the Deise.

The village of Newcastle is gently caressed by the broad sweep of the River Suir as it nestles cozily at the foot of the Knockmeal-down mountains. Visitors to the area are usually left searching for words to adequately describe its natural beauty. One such visitor summed it up well when he said "I think I've died and just arrived in Heaven".

Nestling in the Comeraghs, the Nire Valley is the ideal base for the tourist and especially for the walker wishing to explore these solitary and dramatic mountains. The name "The Nire Valley" comes from the Gaelic "Gleann na hUidhre" which means the Glen or Valley of the Yellow/Brown stone which is to be seen along the river bank. The Nire River tumbles down through the valley from its source high up in the Comeragh mountains to join the smooth flowing Suir River near Newcastle.

In "Tales from Deise" a special emphasis is given to land ownership, to the Cromwellian confiscations, to the new landlords and, finally, to the transfer of ownership from the landlords to the tenants through the agency of the Irish Land Commission. This transfer of ownership has been described by a distinguished historian as "the greatest revolution in the history of modern Ireland".

The names of the individual tenants, the size of the holdings, the price paid to the landlord and the annuity fixed by the Land Commission is given in each case.

The book includes Chapters on the Tithe War, the evolution of the Creameries, the history of the local schools and G.A.A. Clubs and a number of nostalgic articles on old times in the Nire Valley. The book, therefore, opens an important window on social history in the corner of Deise. The book also features the achievements of the Ballymacarbray Ladies Football teams.

In the Nire Valley time is not important and life is a kind of ritual: whether herding sheep, working a dog, dancing a set or drinking a pint, all things have their own time and place. Dairy farming has always been the traditional way of life in these districts. In recent years, however, significant strides have been made in developing the tourist potential of the area.

It is hoped that the publication of this Anthology will help to promote this development, a greater appreciation of our environment and heritage and encourage many more visitors to visit Newcastle and the Nire Valley.

The book which retails at £8.95 is edited by Michael Hallinan and published by Kincora Press. It will be officially launched in Ballymacarbray Central School at 12.45 on Friday, June 28.

# Waterford Tourism Plan Will Yield Jobs

Nearly 2,500 jobs could be created across Co. Waterford and annual tourism revenues could be increased by as much as 60 per cent in the next four years if the recommendations of a major report on tourism development in the county are implemented.

The Waterford Tourism Plan was published today, Wednesday, June 19 at a presentation in Dungarvan, headquarters of Waterford Foods.

The Plan, prepared by consultants Tourism Development International, was commissioned by Waterford Tourism Limited, an organisation backed by a coalition of local authority, private industry and tourism interests in the country.

Revenue forecasts of £140 million by the year 2000 are based on a 30 per cent increase in tourist numbers to 1.18 million and an increase in the average length of stay by holidaymakers in the county.

"There is ever-increasing competition — both national and international — for the tourists' hard-earned dollars, pounds, lire and francs" said Waterford Crystal Chief Executive Redmond O'Donoghue who chaired Waterford Tourism. "This important study was designed with three objectives in mind. Firstly, we needed a baseline study of what tourists seek in their holiday destination; secondly, we sought a set of recommendations for the development of tourist facilities; and, finally, we looked for suggestions for a suitable infrastructure to develop and grow the industry in the county.

"We cannot — and will not — just sit back and wait for someone else to do this for us. I am convinced that everyone in Waterford will get behind this initiative and, when they do, I am sure that they will be rewarded by its success".

## PACKAGE HOLIDAYS

The Plan recommends that an annual marketing budget of £250,000 be allocated to the promotion of package holidays in County Waterford. Waterford Tourism Limited, representing all the countywide interests, should be charged with fund-raising for marketing purposes.

According to the Water-

ford Tourism Plan, a high level of visitor satisfaction was recorded with the accommodation base in the county. However, to cater for the projected increase in visitors — and the extension in their average length of stay in the county — a 25 per cent increase in approved and registered accommodation will be required.

## MORE VISITOR ATTRACTIONS

The Plan also identifies the need for more visitor attractions in the county and suggests that an opportunity exists to capitalise on the wealth of demesnes and large houses. Additionally, according to the Plan, the Comeragh Mountains offer potential for interpretation and there is also an opportunity to establish a wildlife sanctuary in the county.

Consideration should be given to the establishment — in the west of the county — of a major cultural centre which would focus on Gaelic cultural traditions and folklore, providing first-class evening traditional entertainment for visitors.

The Plan recommends that more attention be given to the provision of traditional Irish food and seafood at good value prices. It calls for the establishment of a "Good Food Circle" grouping local producers, retailers, quality restaurants and pubs, which would reflect the growing international status of Waterford as a quality food production region.

## OUTSTANDING POTENTIAL

County Waterford, the Plan states, has outstanding potential as a centre for activity-based holidays, specifically water-sports, walking, angling and equestrian activities.

The Plan identifies the need for investment in tourism infrastructure including national primary road approaches to the county, signposting, car/coach parking, the phasing out of unsuitable landfill sites in Dungarvan, the provision of more sewage treatment plants and the development of facilities for outdoor leisure activities.

The marketing approach should draw on Waterford Crystal's worldwide reputation for quality and, under the Plan, it is envisaged that an identity for the region would be strategically developed under the theme: "Waterford — the crystal county of Ireland".

The long drawn out issue of the provision of a play area for Dungarvan resurfaced at last Monday night's UDC meeting when Cllr. Tony Wright asked if the Council had made any further progress with the matter.

Cllr. Wright has stressed the need for a town playground on numerous occasions in the past and said that the children he had originally been talking about are now adults.

In reply, County Manager Donal Connolly said he regretted the delay in getting a play area off the ground but said the provision of any children's facility is not a simple process. He men-

tioned difficulties with public liability and vandalism etc. Play areas are usually suited to 3-12 year olds but are often abused (unintentionally) by older children in the 13 to 17 age bracket.

At present Mr. Connolly said he is working with a number of local residents associations with a view to identifying play areas in, for example, Kyne Park and Childers Estate. The next step would be to decide on what equipment to install for the children which would be inspected on a weekly basis for safety reasons. He hoped to introduce any future play areas under the Estate Management Scheme.

Patricia's coach, Mr. Eric Flynn also paid tribute to Patricia, stating that her many successes to date had been achieved through a combination of commitment, ability and dedication. # LISMORE'S GLORY YEARS

As the staging of Féile Na nGael in Co. Waterford approaches, let us look back on the years that Lismore had the privilege of representing the County at the national competition.

Eight times in all as follows - 1981, 1984, 1985, 1987, 1988, 1989, 1990 and 1991. The five in a row from 1987 to 1991 must surely stand a record in the County.

1981 — In 1981 the first year Lismore represented Waterford at Féile Na nGael, the closing stages of the county competition were held on a blitz basis at St. Augustine's College grounds in Dungarvan. Here Lismore defeated Mount Sion in the opening game, Erin's Own in the semi-final and scored a big win over Roanmore in the final. So they were off to Galway and their first appearance in Féile Na nGael.

Preparations and fundraising events were organised for the trip to Galway. On the last Friday in June, we departed for the west. Kiltormer were Lismore's hosts for the weekend. A big contingent of supporters travelled from Lismore and Ballysaggart for the weekend. Indeed the first game against our hosts, Kiltormer on the Saturday morning looked more like a home game for Lismore as their supporters outnumbered the

home team by almost 40 to 1. Lismore won that game in the afternoon.

They defeated Sarsfields of Galway and later that evening Gort were defeated to give Lismore a place in the Division Two Final. This final was played in Pearse Park. The entire population of Lismore and Ballysaggart must have travelled for this final. Unfortunately it was not our day and Portlaoise defeated us in that final. However, there was some consolation as two weeks later we won our first County U-14 hurling title beating Ballygunner at Walsh Park.

Before leaving the Galway Féile, it is worth noting that two of the teams we defeated in 1981, later went on to win All-Ireland club titles in 1990's, Kiltormer and Sarsfields on two occasions.

1984 — In 1984 Lismore again qualified to represent Waterford at Féile Na nGael. Féile on this occasion was held in Co. Wexford. Our hosts were Ferns. We travelled to Ferns at the end of June. This time we were playing in Division One with all the top teams.

In the opening game on Saturday morning, we played our hosts Ferns and scored a comfortable win over them. In the afternoon we defeated the Galway champions at the Buffer's Alley Grounds. This was a top class game with Lismore

just shading the verdict in the end. That win gave us a place in the semi-final. Na Piarsaigh from Limerick City provided the opposition. The game was played at Oulart on Saturday evening but the Limerick boys had the better of us on that occasion.

Current Limerick hurler Damien Quigley was a member of the Na Piarsaigh Under 14 team that evening.

1985 — We again qualified for Féile Na nGael in 1985 beating De La Salle in the County Final. Wexford were the hosts again with the Glynn/Barntown Club being our hosts. The format of Féile had changed somewhat this year.

The opening games were played on a league system starting on the Fri. evening. On the Friday evening, we scored a good victory over our hosts. Then Saturday morning saw us play the Dublin champions Craobh Chiaráin. Much was expected of the Lismore team but the Dublin side spoiled our day. In the afternoon we had a good win over Rathnure but it was Craobh Chiaráin who advanced to the semi-final.

Later four of the 1985 team were to win All-Ireland U-21 hurling medals with the County in 1992 - Sean Daly, Kieran O'Gorman, Michael and Mark

O'Sullivan. Sean Daly played on the Munster Railway Cup hurling team in 1993.

1987 — After a break in 1986 we again won on the right to represent the County at Féile in 1987. Clare were the hosting county and we stayed with the Scarriff club. We were playing in Division Two having played in Division One in 1984 and 1985.

In the first game, we defeated our hosts Scarriff. On Saturday we scored wins over St. Colms of Derry, Tulla of Clare and the Westmeath champions to qualify for the final of Division Two. St. Pauls of Belfast were our conquerors in the final played at Cusack Park, Ennis.

The captain of the 1987 team was Anthony Tinneally who is now living and working in Co. Down. He is playing hurling there also and in 1993 was a member of the Down team that won the All-Ireland junior hurling title.

1988 — 1988 saw us on the road to Féile once more. The counties of Laois and Offaly were the hosts. We were the guests of Borris-In-Ossory, Co. Laois. In the games, we had wins against Borris-In-Ossory, Ballygalget, Co. Down, Camross of Laois and Westmeath champions to qualify for the Division Two final. This was

our third appearance in the Division Two final, previous years being 1981 and 1987. Ferbane/Belmont stood between us and victory. Well win we did on the score of 1-4 to nil. The homecoming as All-Ireland champions will always be remembered.

Paddy O'Donnell was the winning captain that day and he was also the captain of Waterford Minor hurling team in 1992 when they lifted the Munster crown after 44 years.

1989 — For the third year in a row, we were off to Féile. Again the counties of Laois and Offaly were the hosts. We were staying with the Kilcormac club in Co. Offaly. We had the distinction of losing no game but failed to make the knockout stages.

In the first game, we drew with our hosts. Then we beat the Limerick champions, Adare and St. Rynaghs of Offaly but were eliminated on scoring averages.

1990 — We beat St. Saviours in the County Féile Final at Fraher Field, Dungarvan. This time we just had a short journey to make. Féile was being staged in Co. Tipperary and Clonmel were our hosts for the weekend.

On the playing field, we defeated Clonmel, lost to Glenmore of Kilkenny and defeated Arravale Rovers of Tipperary. As Arravale

Rovers had defeated Glenmore, scoring averages were again invoked and once again we were eliminated where maybe, with a bit of luck could have made the semi-finals.

1991 — The County Féile Final against Mount Sion at Walsh Park went to extra time. We won in the end by a score of Lismore 0-9 Mount Sion 1-5.

So for the fifth year in succession we were off to Féile, as in 1989 and 1990, we were playing in Division One. Our hosts for 1991 were the reigning All-Ireland Féile Na nGael Division One champions Durlas Og of Thurles.

On the playing field we were defeated by Durlas Og, Na Piarsaigh of Cork who won Division One that year but we had some consolation in defeating Roscrea.

So after a lapse of five years, we are back playing in Féile Na nGael. This year Féile Na nGael will be staged throughout Co. Waterford for a full week at the end of June. Lismore will be playing in Division One and will be hosting the Cork champions.

Over the years, many of our players have travelled away to Féile Na nGael and have got great experience and enjoyment from it. So encourage our present Under-14 hurlers as they prepare for this year's Féile.

# PRIMARY SCHOOLS G.A.A.

### BACKGROUND TO SPORTING BEHAVIOUR

The primitive group hunts

were the first expression of sporting activity. Some sports people feel that games such as soccer, hockey, gaelic football or hurling

are modern expressions of this early instinct for competition and supremacy. Most primitive cultures have ritual displays of strength and skill, i.e.

- the Minoan Culture of Bull-Jumping — Greece

- the Aztecs played a ball game with a fixed hoop and scoops — Mexico

- the Plains Indians invented Lacrosse to help train warriors for war — U.S.A.

- the Aborigines had folk heroes who could throw sticks better than anyone — Australia.

### OLYMPIC GAMES

The tradition of sporting behaviour reached a climax in the culture of classical Greece. The city states, such as Sparta and Crete, vied with each other in sporting contests such as those held in honour of Zeus every four years on the plains of Olympia in Elis — the precursors of the modern Olympic Games. The Greeks glorified the ideal of the human physical form and vying against each other in competition was the natural extension of this.

### ARENA AND AUDIENCES

A significant addition was the formalisation of these contests, with specially built arenas and wagering audiences. The popularity of these competitions were given extra influence through the extension of the

Roman Empire, e.g. chariot racing and rowing contests.

### PREPARATION FOR WAR

In less-developed civilisations, most athletic competitions were seen as preparation for war. This is most clearly seen in the jousts of medieval Europe, where deaths were common and the rule was kill or be killed.

As Europe emerged from medieval days, the lead was given by prominent powers such as France and Spain in the development of spectator sports.

The opportunity for leisure time which urban living afforded in the 17th and 18th centuries provided a major impetus to sporting contests such as fencing, archery and boxing. Landlords, especially in England and France, often sponsored their local teams at racing or cricket. This increased interest in organised sport was reflected on a national level in Ireland with the foundation of the G.A.A. in 1884 in Hayes Hotel in Thurles, Co. Tipperary. With the reinstatement of the Olympic Games in 1896, the scene was set for an international dimension to sport.

### CHRISTY RING TROPHY

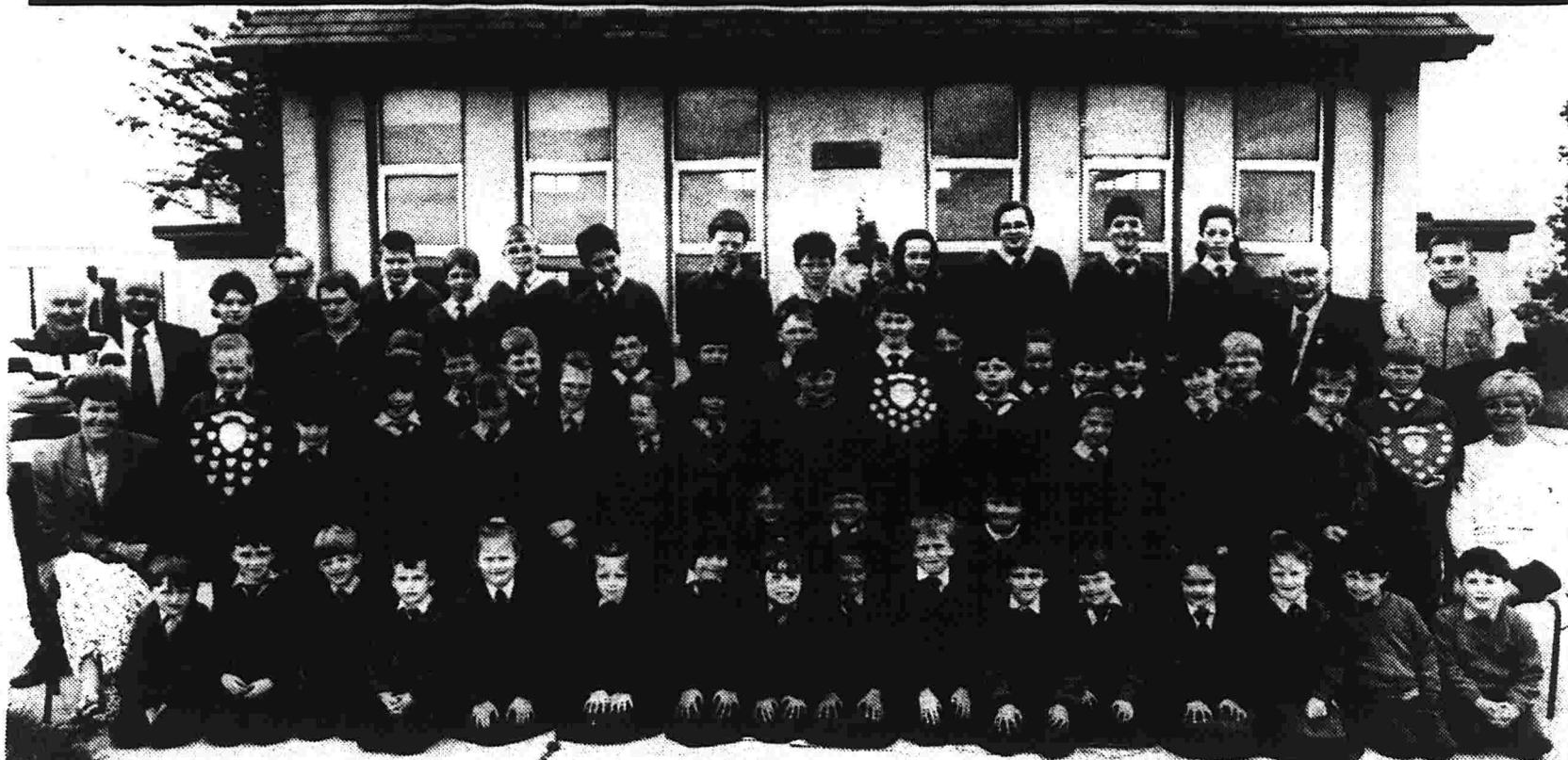

for Div 4 and it commemorates the late Bishop of Ossory whose love of the poor made him one of the outstanding churchmen of recent times.

### MICKO McMAHON TROPHY

He was President of the G.A.A. in Clare for 20 years and was an outstanding worker for Gaelic games in the Banner county. This is for Div 5. In addition to the trophies, all winners and runners-up are presented with medals.

The Feile proper begins with the arrival of the visiting teams from the other 33 counties, including London and Warwickshire and the games will start sharp at 9.30 a.m. on Friday morning.

Each Waterford club will host and accommodate a visiting club and will play the same club in their first game at their local ground which will have been specially prepared for the Feile.

The games will continue on Friday and Saturday and the finals will take place at Walsh Park on Sunday.

One of the outstanding features of the Feile is the annual parade of the 66 clubs and this year it will take place along the Quay in Waterford and proceed to Walsh Park when the Presidential address will be delivered before Mass will be celebrated by Most Rev. Dr.

William Lee, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore. Almost 4,000 are expected to be seated in the stand in Walsh Park for the Feile Mass.

### PARADE

No other pageant can compare with the parade of 66 teams each bearing the club banner which in some way identifies the club with its home locality. The parade will have a total of 22 bands and will be headed by the Artane Band which is so much associated with the All Irelands.

On Saturday last, people in the Dungarvan area saw a delightful 'dress rehearsal' of the Waterford banner-parade through the Square. The general comments were very complimentary and every club must feel proud of its banner. Saturday then, will be very special and the thousands who will be spectators at the parade will begin to realise what it is all about.

### PROGRAMME

The one hundred page programme which has been specially produced for the Feile is by any standards a first-class production and describes in splendid detail every facet of the Feile activity from Day One, which was June 10th when the school visitation began, right up to the official lowering of the Feile and national flags at the end of the

ceremonies on Sunday. The programme was compiled by the Feile P.R.O. Pat Moore and his small committee and the production is a credit to them.

It is on sale to members of the public for £1 and is tremendous value.

### Chairman's Comments

Chairman of the Waterford Executive of Feile, Stephen Power has this message for all participants, "As ambassadors of your respective counties, you compete with pride and dignity and above all, you enjoy yourself during this Festival, Stephen who has headed the very hardworking committee for the nine months of preparation, has expressed himself delighted with the way in which everyone has co-operated, clubs, individuals, committees, and believes that with such thorough and efficient planning and organisation, the 26th Feile must be something that we here in Waterford will be very proud of.

# Juvenile Hurling Festival Takes Pride Of Place On Very Busy Weekend Programme

## FOOTBALLERS TO PLAY KERRY IN SENIOR AND JUNIOR FIRST ROUNDS AT DUNGARVAN

The hosting of the 26th running of Féile Na nGael throughout the County during the week and culminating in the final ceremonies i.e. the parade, Mass, Presidential address and semi-finals on Saturday and Sunday are tending to overshadow the three important intercounty championship games in which we take on the mighty Kingdom in football and hurling. There are club championship games here and there as well making it all add up to our busiest weekend ever.

With the Senior and Junior Football Championships clashing with the Féile ceremonies on Saturday evening, it will mean a problem for many patrons who obviously cannot be in two places at the same time.

Here and there in the County, the Munster Council has been criticised for fixing the Intercounty programme in competition with Féile. Fixing it for the same Sunday as the Féile finals was thoughtless and bringing the games forward to Saturday certainly was not the answer.

The U-21 hurlers travel to Tralee on Friday evening for a 7.45 p.m. start to their first round match and even though very many would-be supporters will find themselves club tied with Féile matches being played at their venues on the same evening, the County selectors are hopeful that as many as possible will travel in support.

## FOOTBALL V KERRY

On Saturday evening at Fraher Field, both our senior and junior footballers face the daunting task of trying to beat Kerry in the second rounds of the Munster Championships. Installed at 5-1 favourites to win the All-Ireland, the visitors are the hottest of favourites to win the double here and any other result would be deemed a sensation.

The gap in standards is great indeed because this

new young Kerry senior side are reputed to be the nearest that the Kingdom selectors have got to the great Kerry teams of the seventies and eighties. This might not have been obvious in the first rounds against Tipperary at Clonmel three weeks ago when they let it go to the final ten minutes before pulling away to win decisively. The fright of what might have happened there will make them approach this game with caution and we can therefore expect them to explode into action from the throw-in.

Waterford's league record over the past eight months was poor to say the least about it and unless there is a big improvement on that form, we don't have a snowball's chance of beating them.

Of course league and championship are very different and invariably players perform better in the championship. The news from the camp is that the lads are going to give it real go and will play with the full intention of winning. That kind of spirit is certainly encouraging to hear as it means that in giving it all they have got, they will at least stretch the hot favourites to the limit and make it a game worth watching.

The team was not selected at the time of writing and I understand that it will be named in time for publication. What a pity they cannot follow the lead given by the others and name their teams a week before they play. It is reasonably certain that Tramore's Tom Brennan will be in goal where he has played well throughout the league. In the first round against Cork last year, his brilliant display was one of the features of the game when he denied the hot favourites a single goal.

In defence, such players as Michael Fenton, Michael Fitzgerald, Michael O'Brien, Don Mahon, Alan Reynolds, Dan Crotty, Liam Dalton, Niall Geary etc. will be in contention for places and others who have performed well throughout the

league and who will be up for consideration are Vinny Murray, Martin and Richie Power, Brian Whelan, Matty Kiely, Stephen Cunningham, George Walsh, Shane Bergin, Jim Maher, P. P. Ferncombe, David Burke, Tom Noonan etc.

All are very experienced players and will certainly know what to expect from Kerry. Playing at Fraher Field before a big home crowd will mean something to Waterford but considering everything, it might be stretching the imagination a bit in saying that it will make the difference here between winning and losing.

## JUNIOR FOOTBALL V KERRY

In the run-up to the games against Kerry, both juniors and seniors have trained together and this opens up the possibility that players recruited to the junior panel by the junior selectors John Sheehan, De La Salle Manager, Tommy Hennessey, Kill and Tom Browne, Ballinameela can be selected for inclusion on the senior team.

I understand that there is splendid rapport between the two selection committees and that they are working hand in hand to try to make a break here. That is as it should be and both groups are to be commended for their attitude in this regard.

Our record in the junior grade is poor and of the 66 Junior Football Championships played in the province since the start, we have just won one title and that was 48 years ago or back in 1948 when we were strong in the grade. Kerry on the other hand have won 32 or half of the total almost. The affiliation system in Kerry makes it possible for players who play in their Senior Club Championships on group teams to field in junior. The system here is very different and it is enormously to our disadvantage when we come to grading our Intercounty teams.

Last year and also in 1994, there was an inordinate delay in putting junior selectors in place and in both instances the prepara-

tion was hurried and the results were that when we met Kerry in 1994 and Cork last year we were easy meat for the two counties who have monopolised this championship for as long as the records go.

This year the preparation, at least has been better organised and according to reports, the selectors have a good panel together. Games against Cork in Fraher Field had been arranged for last weekend but because a few players were carrying injuries and the risk of further injuries was too great, the selectors decided against the challenges. This was disappointing but from the selectors point of view, it was wise not to risk further problems.

As expected, the panel from which the 15 will be selected is spear-headed by the County champions Kill who won the Intermediate and Junior titles in successive years. On the panel in training are John Kiely, Ray Hennessy, Donnie and Liam Lannon, Brendan Mooney, all Kill, Owen Dunphy, Paul Cleary, John Walsh, De La Salle; John Reynolds, James Maher and Aidan Ahearne, Ballinameela; Francis O'Rourke, Clashmore; Eamonn Crotty and Liam Curran, Ring etc. It goes again without saying, that Kerry will be hot favourites but if the inevitable happens, it certainly won't be for want of trying on our part. The junior game (60 minutes) is at 6.15 p.m. and the senior (70 minutes) is timed for 7.30 p.m. A programme compiled by County Board Na nOg will be on sale.

## WATERFORD V KERRY U-21 HURLING

The preparation of our team has gone without a hitch and with all the players on the panel reporting fit, the selectors are reasonably confident that the training and excellent challenge games played to date will have moulded the side into a championship winning outfit.

Just the same their policy is to take it one step at a time and defeating Kerry on Friday remains their prime objective at the moment. No plans are being made for

anything further than this until they return from Tralee.

Having engaged in a selection process throughout the winter and spring months, the management team got their panel together and trained at several venues when weather permitted but more importantly they organised a number of top class challenge and tournament matches that helped to bring the side to a state of fitness and give the players the confidence they need to embark on the championship trail that hopefully will take them out of Munster this summer.

So far 32 provincial U-21 championships have been played since the start of the competition which commemorates the 1916 Rising (Corn Na Cásca) and Tipperary, out in front have won 14 while Cork have 13, Waterford have 3 and Limerick have 2.

Our most memorable victory was in 1992 when, after winning out in Munster, we went on to win that epic All-Ireland against Offaly after a replay at Nolan Park. Two years ago, having beaten Tipperary at Walsh Park, we went on to beat Clare in the Munster final only to suffer a heavy defeat at the hands of Kilkenny in the semi-final at Thurles.

Last year was undoubtedly one of our most disappointing seasons in the U-21 grade as with what was judged to be a splendid side, we lost to Clare by a single point (2-8 to 2-7) in a game that was clearly 'sewn-up' before we let it slip. It was rightly described as an agonising defeat.

As will be seen below, a number of the players of last year's team are available and will line out on Friday at Tralee. An old timer who never misses a hurling game in which Waterford is involved and would travel to the ends of the earth (in his own words) to see them play, told me that he was always apprehensive about travelling into the Kerry homeland to play them in hurling. In support, he reminded me of the day in June 1990 when we travelled to Kenmare for the first round of the U-21 hurling championships and came off the luckiest of winners by a mere two

points on a scoreline of 1-5 to 0-6. Going to Kerry, we cannot ever afford to take chances. At the same time the relevant records of the June 1993 Minor Hurling Championship when taken into account must mean something to our advantage. Cork beat us in a thrilling game at Páirc Uí Chaoimh by 2-12 to 0-12 in a match where the scoreline gave a very wrong impression of how good Waterford were on the night. Exactly two weeks later the same Cork team defeated Kerry by the embarrassing score of 6-31 to 0-1. A 48 points beating is the highest on record for as long as can be remembered. If we win here we meet Clare in Thurles on July 7th.

The team was announced on Wednesday evening and shows only one change from the side which defeated Kilkenny at Touraneena two weeks ago. J. J. Ronayne, Dungarvan replaces Gavin Breen, Abbeyside and in attack there is a switch involving Michael Molumphy and Derek McGrath.

All the panel have played at Minor or U-21 level already and won't lack Intercounty experience. Patrick Dunphy in goal, Roy McGrath, James O'Connor, Derek McGrath, Barry Walsh all played in the U-21 game against Clare last year as did Liam Hearne and Darragh O'Sullivan who are listed among the subs for the Kerry game.

## TURNSTILES

New and very modern turnstiles are now in operation at the Fraher Field, and County Treasurer Tony Morrissey told me that these will accurately record the attendance at all games from now on. This, I understand, will mean that persons such as pensioners, juveniles and patrons holding official pass cards, will have to enter the grounds through a separate gate, as otherwise the turnstiles would not be an advantage.

The installation of the stiles has been welcomed by the stilesmen who have been pressing to have them fitted for some time.

TELEPHONE (058) 42059**V.E.C. Members Criticise Delay In New College Plans**

Education Minister Niamh Breathnach was accused last Monday of lacking the good will to give Dungarvan its new technical college, which it has awaited for almost quarter of a century.

County Waterford's Vocational Educational Committee meeting expressed fears about the big delays in starting construction of the £1 million-plus school.

Cllr Michael O'Riordan said Ms Breathnach had stated in the Dail that progress to the building stage would depend on funding — but at no time had she given a commitment to providing the money.

"I am very disappointed with her performance" he said.

Chief executive officer, Kieran Heffernan, told the meeting that the Past Pupils' Union of the existing technical college in Dungarvan — where staff and students had to make do with serious overcrowding — had joined the effort to get the new school underway.

But progress within the Department of Education remained "painfully slow".

Mr Heffernan said the department had to make 14 changes in phase two of the plan and he hoped it would process them as quickly as possible.

Chairman Billy Kyne said a new architect had been appointed in the building section of the department in the past fortnight. It was hoped he would come to Dungarvan to see the urgency of their new school project.

Cllr Kyne said the new architect was entitled to be given a chance, and he personally would have faith in him to "drive the project on".

The chairman said that he hadn't heard anything that would suggest the school would not receive funding.

Jimmy Byrne quoted rumours in Dublin were of a possible general election next spring. If that happened, and the Dungarvan project wasn't under way by then, he feared the town would lose out again.

Cllr Austin Flynn said the project had stalled and no progress had been made during the past six months. If the Minister had the will to get the project moving it would move — and fast.

"It seems to me, however, that this particular Minister doesn't have the will either to the school or to Dungarvan" he said.

The meeting was told that there had also been a lack of progress towards the provision of a major extension to the V.E.C.'s other school, St. Declan's Community College, Kilmacthomas. Tom Cunningham said it was expected enrolment figures would increase by about 150 next September but he wondered where, and how, the school was going to accommodate them.

"Do we close the door and turn them away?" he asked.

The C.E.O., however, said the school had a contingency plan drawn up to cope with the expected increased student numbers in the next school year.
