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# Paddy Power Takes U.D.C. Chair As Ryan Steps Down

Former vice-chairman of Dungarvan UDC, Cllr. Paddy Power of Abbeyside, was unanimously elected to the Urban Council chair last Monday night to succeed outgoing Cathaoirleach Cllr. Nuala Ryan.

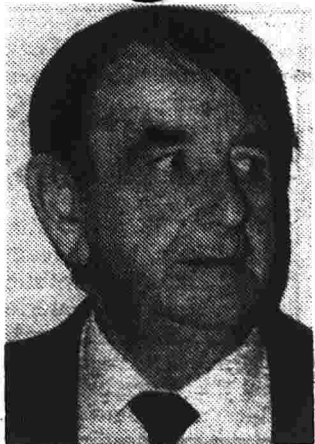
The new Labour Chairman was first elected to the Council in 1985 and has previously served as Chairman during the 1990/1991 term. He was proposed at the Council's AGM by Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) and seconded by Cllr. Austin Flynn (FF).

Proudly wearing the UDC chain of office, Cllr. Power admitted he will have a hard act to follow in Cllr. Ryan's footsteps but said he will do his best during his term of office over the next 12 months.

The loose agreement between Labour and Fianna Fáil saw the position of vice-chairman going to Cllr. Flynn who was proposed by Cllr. Lar Hart (Lab) and seconded by Cllr. Nuala Ryan (FF).

### A HIGH PROFILE YEAR

There were many glowing tributes paid to outgoing Chairperson Nuala Ryan who successfully completed a high profile year, representing both the Council and the town at numerous public receptions.

mentioned the many developments which have and are still taking place in Dungarvan such as the first sod turned on the new advance factory at Clogherane; commencement of developments on Davitt's Quay under the urban renewal scheme, which will incorporate a new public library; 9 new houses let in O'Connell Street; 13 new houses under construction at Stephen Street; upgrading of the 'Lookout' under the urban and village renewal scheme; new social welfare office

under construction at Friary Street; acquisition of the Beeches for future housing development and a civic reception for Asst. Garda Commissioner Barney Curran etc. A regrettable downside to the year was the closure of the leather factory, but Cllr. Ryan felt that future developments on this site are for the betterment of the town.

## Talking Politics — No Guarantees For Next County Chairman

While the AGM of Dungarvan UDC passed off peacefully this week with Vice Chairman Paddy Power taking the seat as expected, the same will not be the case for next Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council where there are no guarantees in the succession poll.

Outgoing Chairman Cllr. Oliver Coffey will certainly chair a memorable last meeting as the various political factions within the Council try to decide on a candidate.

Under a former pact between Labour and Fine Gael, it was expected that a Labour nominee would succeed as chairman, (probably outgoing Vice-Chairman Cllr. Paddy O'Callaghan). It now emerges however that this pact only covered a 5 year tenure since the last County Council elections in 1991. It was therefore agreed between both parties that a simple toss of the coin would decide who would

begin a new cycle of rotation.

Fine Gael won this toss and are now strong contenders to retain the chairmanship of the Council with a shake down expected between Youghal-based Cllr. Gary O'Halloran, Cllr. Nora Flynn of Cappoquin and Cllr. John Carey of Passage East - while Cllr. Pat Coffey of Portlaw can't be ruled out either.

The first three councillors have all expressed an interest in the chair and can count on at least eleven votes (8 party votes and 3 Labour votes).

Fianna Fail however, already has a guaranteed ten

## Know Your Rights

### QUESTION

I am in a bedsit and the roof is leaking into the kitchen. I've been on to the landlord and he keeps saying he'll do something about it, but hasn't since I told him 3 months ago. Is there anything I can do?

### ANSWER

Since January '94 landlords of houses including apartments, flats, maisonettes, etc., have had a statutory duty to ensure that their dwellings comply with certain minimum standards. This obliges a landlord to ensure that the house is in a proper state of structural repair. The local authorities are responsible for enforcing the legal requirements in relation to standards, rent books and registration of rented houses.

You should contact the County Council, Corporation or Urban District Council in the area in which you live. The Council have powers to investigate any breaches and prosecute offences.

The Department of the Environment have published a useful leaflet for landlords and tenants — Charter for Rented Housing — which explains simply the rules governing the letting of tenancies. It is available from your local authority or from your Citizens Information Centre or Threshold, which provides housing advice to tenants and landlords. The nearest Citizens Information Centre can be found by checking the Golden Pages Directory under Citizens Information Centres.

# Council To Clamp Down On Litter In Dungarvan

Dungarvan Urban District Council has recently developed proposals for improving its performance in preventing litter around the town.

The new action plan against litter titled, 'It's Our Town - Don't Rubbish It', will be actively promoted over the next 2 years. Items dealt with in the plan include graffiti, fly posting, open spaces, and derelict sites, etc. Proposals under a number of various headings are outlined as follows;

## APPOINTMENT OF LITTER WARDEN

The plan proposes that litter warden duties will be assigned to one or more members of Council staff such as the Traffic Warden who currently spends a lot of his time in the town centre area.

If the Litter Warden has cause to believe that a person has committed an offence he will request that person's name and address. Refusal to impart this information or the giving of false information is an offence under this section. As an initial measure, the local Council will operate a fixed penalty, on the spot, fine system. New legislation, due later this year, has promised to strengthen enforcement and other provisions.

## FAST FOOD TAKE AWAYS

According to the plan, the areas immediately adjacent to Dungarvan's fast food outlets give great cause for concern. A number of bins are provided in the vicinity of each outlet and these are

emptied by Council staff on alternate days Monday to Friday. This policy has now been reviewed however and future collections from bins will take place each week-day with an additional collection taking place on Saturdays. In total there are 134 litter bins throughout Dungarvan and Abbeyside.

The Council intends to seek the cooperation of the traders involved with a view to ensuring that bins are emptied on a regular basis, over the weekend period.

## SCHOOLS TARGETED

Although littering in the area of schools is a problem in Dungarvan town, it is not a serious concern for the Council. Nevertheless the UDC intends to target schools, both primary and secondary, to ensure that a problem does not develop. Additional bins will be put in place in the vicinity of the bus stop and the area will also be regularly patrolled by the Litter Warden.

## ILLEGAL DUMPING

Indiscriminate illegal dumping is also cited as a problem in the urban area. The most common occurrences mentioned in the plan are; bags of domestic refuse appearing at entrances to housing estates on the night before collection; bags of refuse being dumped on beaches; and bags of domestic refuse

being abandoned in right of ways.

Congress Villas, Keating Street, Cathal Brugha Place and Caseyville have all been identified as particular blackspots. The UDC intends to toughen its resolve with a view to identifying and prosecuting these perpetrators.

## PRESENTATION OF DOMESTIC REFUSE

In the absence of a wheelie bin system, the problem of litter as a result of improperly presented domestic waste has escalated. County Manager Donal Connolly is currently in the process of commissioning a feasibility study in relation to wheelie bins.

However following a public awareness campaign involving mail handouts and press releases, 99% of all domestic refuse in the town is now being presented in an acceptable fashion.

## STREET CLEANING EXTENDED

The town square and central streets, are swept on a daily basis, including Saturdays and Sundays. In addition the handcart is used two and a half days per week to clean areas which are inaccessible to the mechanical sweeper. The plan recommends that in future the use of the handcart will be extended to provide a mid-day service to certain key areas of Dungarvan.

## BEACH CLEANING

A Council staff member will be delegated responsibility this year for monitoring litter, on the beaches of Abbeyside and Quann's, on a more regular basis. Bins will also be put in place on both beaches and 'Litter Free Zone' signs are to be erected. The Litter Warden will include the Quann's area in his daily patrol.

Dog fouling will be recognised as litter and will be subject to on the spot fines, similar to any other incident of littering.

## IMPROVE TIDY TOWNS' POINTS

For the 1996 Tidy Towns Competition the Council will make a concerted effort to improve the town's performance, with specific emphasis being placed on litter control. Last year Dungarvan received 28 points in this category but with closer cooperation between the local Tidy Towns' Committee, the UDC and Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce, it is anticipated that this result will be greatly improved upon in this year's competition.

## MORE RECYCLING

The existing bottle bank and textile bank in Davitt's Quay car park will be replaced in the near future by more up to date models. Consideration is also being given to the additional provision of a paper bank. The plan states that alternative sites for the recycling facility must now be examined as the Davitt's Quay site is not an ideal location.

# Fancy Going For A Drive On A Swan!

When is a car not a car? When it looks like a gun-carriage, a sailing ship or even a swan. It might seem hard to believe that early car makers went out of their way to build anything other than the sleek vehicles we see today.

But as Jonathan Rutland tells us in *The Wonder Book Of Cars* when the first motor cars were built, people could not see any use for them. They were used to travelling on foot or horseback, or in horse-drawn carriages. The first self-propelled road vehicle looked something like a sailing ship on wheels. It was built in the Netherlands in 1599 and could move only if there was a strong wind to push it along.

The first person to make a steam-powered vehicle was Nicholas Cugnot, a French engineer. In 1769 he produced a three-wheeled guncarriage with a huge boiler in front of the front wheel.

Top speed was three miles an hour and this clumsy vehicle had to stop frequently to raise steam. It was rather difficult to control — and eventually it crashed into a wall.

The world's first practical cars were invented by a Cornishman, Richard Trevithick. His creations were driven by steam. The first, called Captain Dick's Puffin, managed to climb a very steep hill in 1801. The second looked like a coach and carried eight passengers through London at 12 miles an hour — to the amazement of on-lookers — in 1803.

Steam coaches, which came along later, were unpopular. People preferred to travel by train or in horse-drawn carriages.

In 1897 an odd-looking car was designed that would not frighten animals or pedestrians. It was a mechanical 'horse'. Inventors made many other weird cars. Some were practical, others meant just for fun.

A streamlined boat-like car appeared in the early 1920's. The efficient, but unpopular, Tropfenwagen had fins on each side to reduce air resistance.

This idea is still in use today as it not only increases speed, but also saves fuel. One car made for fun had a huge swan-shaped bonnet. It was built by the Brooke Car Company and it even hissed like an angry swan.

A crude five-wheeled 'fun-car' similar to a modern go-kart, was made for young Americans in 1920. The Briggs & Stratton Flyer had no gears, suspension or clutch. But it could travel at 25 miles an hour on the engine of a lawn-mower.

One of the world's most expensive cars is the Lincoln Continental used by the American President. It is protected by two tonnes of armour plate and can travel at high speed even with all four tyres punctured. It cost about £250,000.

## Junior Encyclopaedia

If a beetle is light enough it can walk on the underside of a leaf. But the lightest beetle will not and is not able to walk on the ceiling of your home.

The housefly on the other hand has no difficulty landing or walking on any surface whether it is upside down or not. The housefly can do this because its feet are specially adapted for walking on all surfaces even smooth ones. Each foot has two very small claws, which will find tiny rough spots to cling to even on the smoothest of surfaces. We cannot see any rough spots. Between the claws, there are two soft sticky pads and these act as little tiny suckers.

When a housefly wants to land on the ceiling, it spreads its legs out and does a half-roll turn. As it settles on the ceiling, the sticky pads and claws get a grip.

When the housefly moves, it walks in small jerks and makes a slurping noise. The housefly is not a pleasant visitor to the kitchen as it carries bacteria on its feet. It lands on exposed food which will have to be thrown

out as a result - when the fly lands on your food, it vomits on it before it eats it. The vomit softens the food, so the fly can suck it into its mouth. They also leave droppings and these are seen more in the summer on a surface such as a mirror. There are also other visitors to the kitchen such as the blow-bottle and the green-bottle. These are known as bottles and are as dirty in their habits as the housefly. They look for raw meat and other foods, on which they lay their eggs. These eggs will hatch out in just a few hours.

The name housefly is used to describe different species of flies which don't alter much in appearance.

There is a fly known as the cluster-fly and gets its name from joining other cluster flies on a wall. It is also a parasite of the earthworm.

The autumn fly breeds on cowpats and then comes into our homes. If you have a butchers

or you have a lot of fresh meat around, the flesh-fly will be attracted to your business or home. It is big and has a chequered body. It loves the smell of raw meat and will lay its eggs there.

# John Treacy Presents Gaisce Awards

The Award Ceremony was one of nine Regional Award Ceremonies last May which saw over four thousand young people, aged between 15 and 25 receiving their Awards.

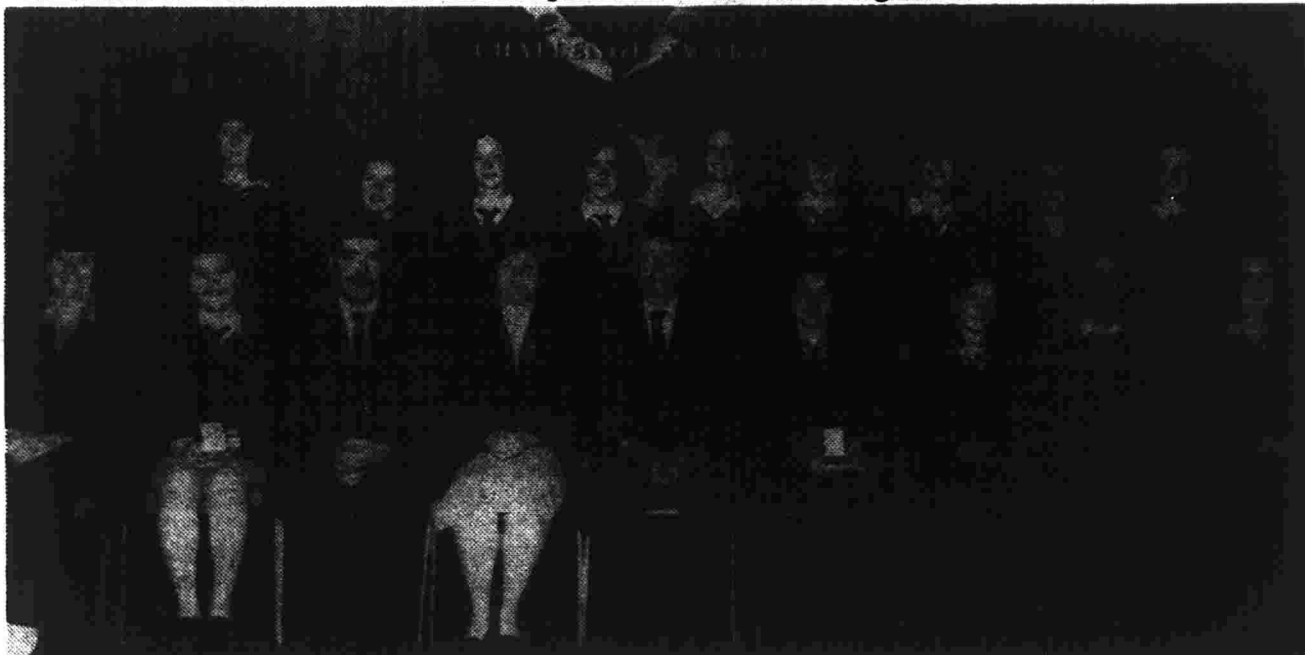
The President's Award is

the Nation's highest Award from the President of Ireland to the young people of Ireland, and recognises excellence and achievement in tasks well done, performed in a voluntary non competitive manner. In order to achieve an Award, a young person in consultation of their Presidents Award Leader or PAL must set and achieve demanding goals for themselves over a period of time in four key disciplines. The four areas are personal

skill development, community involvement activity, venture activity and sport. There are three levels of attainment namely Bronze, Silver and Gold, and the Award is earned depending on the time level of commitment as opposed to the degree of difficulty. To earn a bronze level Award usually takes 6 months, silver 12 months, and Gold 2 years.

There are currently 8000 young people participating in the Gaisce Programme,

and to date almost 30,000 young people have earned Awards over the past ten years, since the Award was first inception in Ireland in 1985 - International Youth Year. Commenting on the extraordinary number of recipients this month, Mr. Michael Webb Chairman of Gaisce remarked; 'Gaisce is committed to continually providing young people with the resources and support to become part of this unique Programme. We hope that many more young people will decide to participate over the coming 12 months.'

# Promoting Fitness And Health

Being fit and healthy is becoming more and more a priority in Irish society. Many people are not aware of the right choices they need to make in order to achieve a healthier lifestyle. How often should I exercise?

For how long? What type of exercise is best for me? These questions and many more often go unanswered and as a result people tend to get switched off, injured or just don't bother.

Instructors who hold the National Certificate in Exercise and Fitness are specially trained to provide the necessary education, expertise and guidance to ensure that their clients learn to enhance their lifestyles through exercise and healthy living. The National Certificate in Exercise and Fitness (NCEF) was launched in 1987. Approximately 1,500 people have been awarded the certificate from 27 counties around the country. Many of these people are now employed across a broad spectrum of the health/fitness industry.

They work in a variety of settings, from community halls to hotel leisure centres and from state prisons to local gyms and fitness studios.

The certificate programme provides training in areas such as exercise to music (aerobics), weight training, circuit training, fitness training and programme planning for individuals or groups. Qualified instructors can advise clients on how to lead a healthy and active lifestyle in an informed and enjoyable way. Many NCEF instructors work with local teams, e.g. GAA, rugby, soccer or with groups such as ICA, community associations, etc.

Instructors who hold the basic certificate can, if they wish, go on to specialise in such areas as resistance

(weight) training, personal training (i.e. working with a client on a one to one basis), or aqua aerobics.

NCEF holders come from a variety of backgrounds including athletes, housewives, coaches, factory workers, members of the Garda Síochána, nurses, prison officers, secretaries and grandmothers. The NCEF can provide an opportunity for a person to begin a new career, either part time or full time. Others may find the qualification beneficial if they wish to re-enter the workforce or would like a career change. In some cases being an NCEF holder may enhance an existing job or qualification, e.g. a community worker who wishes to run fitness training programmes with group or adult in his/her catchment area.

The course which can be taken on a part time or full time basis is run in Waterford, Portlaoise, Limerick, Dublin, Kildare and Sligo.

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# New Multi Million Pound Tourism Plan To Market Waterford As 'Crystal County Of Ireland'

Details of a multi-million pound tourism development plan, incorporating both Waterford city and county were unveiled at a function in Waterford Foods, Dungarvan last week.

Nearly 2,500 jobs could be created in the county and annual tourism revenues could be increased by 60% in the next four years if the recommendations of this new plan are introduced. Described as "a road map for future tourism in Waterford which will maximise revenue and job creation opportunities", the plan is expected to be in place by the 1997 season and will run until the year 2000 at a cost of £250,000 per annum.

The Waterford Tourism Plan was prepared by consultants, Tourism Development International who were commissioned last January by Waterford Tourism Ltd., an organisation backed by a coalition of local authority, private industry and tourism interests in the county.

Tourism Development International is managed by Michael MacNulty who has also prepared similar tourism development plans for Kerry.

## LITTER AND SEWAGE PROBLEMS

The consultants presented the main highlights of the plan and subsequent recommendations based on extensive research to a huge gathering who were representative of a wide range of tourism related activities located in and around the county and city.

Two workshops were held both in the east and west of the county to get feedback from traders, retailers and visitors to the county. In addition a visual and environmental audit of Waterford was undertaken.

According to trade operators and visitors, there is a high level of satisfaction in the tourist trade in Waterford. Problem areas however were identified as litter in the city and towns, traffic management and sign posting. Another major problem in Waterford is untreated sewage on beaches which needs to be addressed immediately.

## WHAT'S NEEDED?

More blue flag beaches should be developed and sewage treatment plants are needed to enhance water quality in the county. Approach roads to Waterford

need to be upgraded while car parking also needs to be looked at. At the moment, accommodation is evenly spread throughout the county except for West Waterford. Overall however, it needs to be increased by 25% in the next five years to provide over 2,000 rooms in the county.

There is also a need for more mid-priced restaurants, seafood menus and traditional Irish food. Night-time entertainment and visitor attractions in the county need to be developed and improved while social history and the Irish language could be a focus for visitor interest. More traditional Irish music sessions in pubs throughout the county are also needed. According to the consultants, there is a noticeable lack of cohesion, coordination and cooperation in the tourism industry in Waterford at the moment.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommendations include the opening of large houses around the county such as at Lismore. The plan also recommends the establishment of a day and night cultural/entertainment attraction in Dungarvan, a small scale interpretative centre in the Comeragh Mountains and a wildlife discovery centre in Tramore. The early Christian site at Ardmore should be enhanced while a Waterford-Good Food Circle, grouping together the food producers of the county and city should also be set up.

With the exception of golf, more investment is needed in walking, angling, water sports and equestrianism. The presentation of industrial heritage towns such as Villierstown and Portlaw also needs to be enhanced.

## THE CRYSTAL COUNTY OF IRELAND

According to Mr. MacNulty, the average length of a stay by holidaymakers in the county is two days while in Kerry it's 5 days. In a bid to increase the number of Waterford visitors to 1.2 million by the year 2000, a variety of package holidays need to be developed and packaged.

"We have to position Waterford as a new tourism destination for overseas visitors", he stressed. This can be achieved, he said, by branding Waterford tourism products with the hallmark of quality spearheaded by the slogan, "Waterford - The Crystal County Of Ireland".

Waterford Crystal is regarded as Waterford's unique selling proposition and the county should be matched to the crystal product in terms of 'sparkling, pure, prestige, heritage, traditional, Irish and up market'.

£88 million was generated in revenue in 1995 and if the recommendations of the Waterford Tourism Plan is introduced, this figure is expected to rise to £140 million by the year 2000.

## WATERFORD PACKAGE HOLIDAYS

Mr. MacNulty then gave examples of a number of package holidays to Waterford such as; a scenic/sight-seeing tour of Waterford; the Waterford Stop-over (2 nights accommodation and evening entertainment with a substantial discount on the second night); Waterford Culinary Short Break; Conference and Incentive Trip; Historic Waterford (county's finest attractions and monuments with lectures, guided tours etc.); Waterford Shopping Experi-

ence (2/3 days accommodation with discount offers, shopping vouchers and evening entertainment); Sparkling Seashore holidays (7 day family package); and activity package holidays (cost including accommodation, tuition, equipment, meals and fees).

As mentioned, the cost of the plan is £250,000 a year, most of which will be spent on advertising package holidays. 40% of the money will be spent in Britain, 30% in mainland Europe, 10% in Ireland and 20% in North America. The tourism trade, which includes B&B's, hotels, guesthouses, pubs, restaurants, farmhouses etc., will be asked to provide £57,000 a year; £50,000 from local authorities;

£50,000 from industry and EU funding to cover the difference.

It is also envisaged that a 5/6 page plan sponsored by a local interest and detailing the plan's recommendations will be distributed to households throughout the county.

## RED LETTER DAY FOR TOURISM

Redmond O'Donoghue, Chairman of Waterford Tourism and Chief Executive of Waterford Crystal said it was a red letter day for Waterford city and county in relation to tourism.

Waterford County Manager, Donal Connolly also welcomed the plan and described it as a major stepping stone for tourism development in the county. He assured all present of Waterford County Council's

full support of the plan.

Likewise Chairman of Waterford Co. Council, Cllr. Oliver Coffey said that with the support of the tourism industry, the local authorities and industry and business in general, they can take the tourist industry in Waterford forward to its full potential over the next 5 years.

"The targets set out in the plan are however very ambitious and it will take the support of everyone involved right throughout the county if targets are to be achieved", he added. Despite the limited resources of the local authorities, said Cllr. Coffey, they are committed to the aims of the report and to meeting their share of the costs of the proposed marketing plan.

## DEPUTY DEASY QUERIES MINISTER ON MONEY FOR NEW DUNGARVAN COLLEGE

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy raised a question in the Dail recently asking the Minister for Education the moneys, if any, she will provide to ensure the provision of a new Vocational School in Dungarvan, a new permanent extension to Saint Declan's Community College, Kilmacthomas.

Minister for Education, Niamh Bhreathnach replied: "I would like to assure the Deputy that I am fully aware of the need for the new Vocational School in Dungar-

van and the extension to St. Declan's Community College, Kilmacthomas and every effort is being made to progress the architectural planning of these projects so that work on the new buildings may proceed at the earliest opportunity.

"However, as both of these projects are at an early stage of architectural planning, it is not possible to say when construction will commence. Accordingly, the question of funding does not arise during the current financial year."

## Over One Hundred Complaints Made To Ombudsman In '95

The annual report of Ombudsman Kevin Murphy was published recently and shows that during 1995, he received a total of 101 complaints from Co. Waterford. Of this number 33 were outside his jurisdiction leaving a balance of 68 valid complaints.

A total of 66 complaints were finalised in '95. Of this eleven were resolved in favour of the complainant and in a further 19 cases assistance was provided. 23 complaints were not upheld and a further thirteen were either discontinued or withdrawn by the complainant.

A breakdown of the number of complaints within jurisdiction handled during the year shows that 28 concerned civil service departments and offices. Of these civil service related complaints, seventeen involved the Department of Social Welfare, five concerned the Department of Agriculture and four were against the Revenue Commissioners. There was only one complaint made in Co. Waterford against the Department of the Environment. Of the remaining complaints, 22 concerned local authorities, 11 related to the Health Boards, five to Telecom Eireann and two to An Post.

In his report, Mr. Murphy emphasises his increasingly proactive role in ensuring that public bodies give the citizens of this country the quality of service to which they are entitled. He makes the point that the public is entitled to be dealt with properly, fairly and impartially by the public service.

# Ring Company To Take Advantage Of Mediterranean Markets

Twenty-five Waterford companies participated in Bord Tráchtála's latest Opportunity Europe seminar which focussed on the Spanish and Italian markets. Bord Tráchtála overseas marketing executives gave market presentations and held individual meetings with local companies, exploring the various business and marketing elements of exporting into Europe for the first time.

Irish export growth was very strong in 1995 and the forecast for 1996 is for a 10% increase. Indigenous exports to Spain mainly comprise engineering, electronics and consumer goods. Spain is Ireland's ninth main export market and Ireland is ranked 14th as a supplier to Spain.

Ireland also enjoys a thriving trading relationship with Italy. Exports to Italy grew 17% to over IR£1 billion in 1995 and the country is now Ireland's seventh largest market.

# 14 Children Arrive In Dungarvan From Chernobyl

Ten years after the world's worst nuclear disaster, the Irish charity, Chernobyl Children's Project, is breaking its own records by bringing a total of 1,200 children from Belarus and Western Russia to project centres in Ireland.

Fourteen children from these affected areas will arrive in Coolnasmear tomorrow night, June 27th where they will be collected by local organiser Patricia Walsh.

The 14 children will go to stay with families in Dungarvan and Abbeyside, including the surrounding

areas of Kilgobinet, Colligan, Ballylemon and Coolnasmear etc.

The special welcome for Chernobyl's young victims in this the tenth anniversary of the disaster, means that families throughout the area will be opening their doors and their hearts to these children for 4 weeks this summer.

Rosemary Phelan, the main local organiser of this annual event outlined the various activities planned for the children including tours and outings. She also thanked local businesses for their generous sponsorship.

By the end of this year the Chernobyl Children's Project will have brought approximately 2,500 children to Ireland as part of its annual programme that provides a four week break for children from Chernobyl to enjoy a unique healing holiday. A month spent in Ireland's clean, uncontaminated environment, with access to fresh air, food and vitamins, will build up the children's damaged immune systems to such a degree that their own doctors believe the equivalent of 2 precious years of life are restored to them on their return.

# European Hillclimb Challenge For Dungarvan

For the first time ever, a round of the European Hillclimb Challenge is to be held in Ireland. Details of the event, which takes place at the Sweep, Dungarvan on July 12th-14th were announced last week.

Round 6 (in Region 3) of the FIA Hillclimb Challenge, the Dungarvan based event, is being organised by the Tipperary Light Car & Motorcycle Club and the Carrick-on-Suir Motor Club, through the offices of the R.I.A.C., with George Clancy taking up the reins as clerk of the course.

## HIGH PROFILE EVENT

The European Hillclimb Challenge welcomes sponsorship from two strong supporters of Irish Motorsport, Stena Line and Dunlop along with invaluable support from Dungarvan UDC and Michael Burke of Lawlor's Hotel. The practical support from Stena Line will make it as attractive as possible for overseas visitors to attend and the proposed television coverage through the support of Dunlop will ensure a high profile for the international two day event.

Belgium, Luxembourg and England host the other rounds in Region 3. The South Eastern event will also play host to rounds 7 and 8 of the Dunlop Hillclimb Championship for the Frank Keane Trophy which is made up of ten rounds in total.

## FASTEST HILL IN IRELAND

Hillclimbing is an old friend to the Dungarvan area, the first event having been run in 1951 when the best time was made by Pierce Cahill in a time of 1 minute and 53 seconds in a 1287 c.c. Iona Special. The average speed at that time was 54.15 mph. The current record for the hill, on the now by-passed section of the road to Cork known locally as the 'Sweep', is held by one of the top Irish drivers, Richard Young, who broke the record in his V8 powered Coogar Single Seater in 1995 to bring it to 52.15 seconds (averaging over 90 mph).

Young, who won the Dunlop Hillclimb Championship in 1989 and 1990, says that, "it (the Sweep) is definitely the fastest hill in Ireland, and because it is so fast it's demanding. It's probably also the widest, and smoothest of the venues in use here - when you get to the top after a good run you feel as though you have achieved something!"

The hill 'run' for this year's event has been extended and the new 'Euro' version is sure to set a test-

ing challenge for the top drivers from Ireland, England, Wales and Continental Europe who are expected to compete.

Competitors already confirmed are current Dunlop Hillclimb Champion Andy Kittle in a Judd powered Pilbeam MP 72, current Championship leader Jenny Kennedy in a Crossle 33F and current hill record holder Richard Young in a Coogar.

## EVENT DETAILS

The event kicks off on Friday, July 12th at the Nissan Garage, Youghal Road, Dungarvan at 6 p.m. where a scrutiny takes place. On Saturday, 13th a practice run will be held at 10.30 a.m., first run at 12 noon and prize giving ceremony in Lawlor's hotel later that evening. On Sunday the run continues at 12 noon with further prizegiving in Lawlor's in the evening.

## REGULAR FIXTURE

Norman Williams, Event Coordinator of the European Hillclimb in Dungarvan, said that judging from the vast interest from both Irish and overseas competitors, he had every confidence that the Dungarvan European Hillclimb Challenge will become a regular fixture on the European calendar.

Mr. Williams thanked hotelier Michael Burke and local B&B owner, Nora Fahey for their enthusiasm in helping to raise local support and sponsorship. The inclusion of Stena Line's 'Endeavour Award' for first time drivers in the local championship, he added, has been a great encouragement in getting drivers out competing at many events.

"The important thing is to make this event successful and the word will filter through so that next year will be even better", Mr. Williams concluded.

## FORTWILLIAM HOUSE SOLD

Last week news broke that Fortwilliam House in Glencairn was sold for £2 million. This price represents the most important house sale so far in Ireland this year. Situated on 390 acres it carried a guideline price of £1.7 million and was sold to an English couple by private auction.

Fortwilliam House was built in 1836 to the design of James and George Pain from sandstone, and is bordered by the River Blackwater, which we all know boasts some of the finest and richest fishing in the country. At the time of writing these notes the names of the new owners of Fortwilliam House, once owned by the Duke and Duchess of Westminster, have not been disclosed.

The sale of Fortwilliam made all the national and evening daily papers during the week, and all are of the same opinion that the sale was the most important house sale in Ireland so far in 1996, and all agreed that Britain's wealthy have become increasingly interested in buying estates and houses in the Irish Republic in recent years with 65% of the residential properties sold here between \$400,000 and £600,000 were being bought by U.K. buyers.

# Ways To Keep Weeds Down

**Intrusion by weeds can make gardeners psychopathic by the time July comes round. But the 'final solution' - a hefty dose of weedkiller - is not quite so acceptable in these 'greener' times.**

Many gardeners have responded by wielding the trusty hoe more frequently and vigorously to lop the heads of weeds before they become established.

You can also use a mulch - something organic, such as garden compost, pulverised bark or lawn clippings - which will deprive the weeds of light and help keep moisture in the ground too.

But there is another method of weed control which is often overlooked; ground cover plants. Many can cover so densely that they starve weeds of light and offer the double bonus of masking an eyesore and producing a bright display.

You do need to prepare the ground thoroughly first and remove all weeds so that they don't get a chance to establish before the 'ground huggers'. Most varieties are best planted in winter so, either make a note for later, or buy container grown plants for planting now. Some to consider are;



**HYPERICUM** - also known as Rose of Sharon, this is a good all-rounder that thrives particularly in shady spots. It comes in bushy and ground-covering forms and can quickly colonise open spaces to provide lots of attractive yellow flowers.

**IVY** - another tough customer, it can quickly cloak a scruffy wall, tree stump or other eyesore.

**HONEYSUCKLE** - perhaps surprisingly, there is a variety (Lonicera Pileata) of this delicate and fragrant plant family which can be used to cover the ground. However, it does prefer shady spots.

**PACHYSANDRA** - this evergreen is another durable option and looks particularly attractive in its variegated form. Unfortunately, it does not like chalky soils.

**LAVENDER/HEATHER** - excellent for sunny spots and attractive and fragrant too.

**SANTOLINA** - also known as Cotton Lavender, is an aromatic evergreen producing small yellow flowers but more popular for its fine silvery leaves. It likes sunny well-drained soil and must be cut back hard in spring to ensure that it keeps a neat and low profile.

**GORSE** - the Spanish variety (Genista Hispanica) makes excellent ground cover. It is tough and impenetrable.

**WILLOW** - if the weed problem is caused by the site being too damp to grow anything else then the aptly named Prostrate Willow should be a durable colonist.

**FERNS** - again, a good and elegant solution for a damp site.

**BRAMBLE** - the ornamental type is a tough contender for sites which are shady and dry.

**MAHONIA** - another lover of dry and shady conditions, it produces fragrant yellow flowers in abundance.

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy recently tabled a question in the Dail asking the Minister for the Environment if he will provide specific funding to county councils for the provision of sewerage schemes for small towns and villages.

Deputy Deasy told the 'Dungarvan Leader' that he is pressing for sewerage schemes and treatment plants for small towns like Tallow, Ardmore, Cheekpoint and Annewstown, because he feels these towns are generally left well behind in the queue at the expense of larger urban areas.

Minister of State at the Department of the Environment, Liz McManus replied that her Dept. is providing over £120 million for water and sewerage services this year which will contribute substantially to the provision of services in small towns and villages.

In addition to the projects financed under the main programme, Ms McManus outlined the Department's Small Schemes Programme, costing £4m, which is aimed at meeting the urgent water and sewerage needs of small towns and villages.

This year a new sub-programme, costing over £3 million was introduced to provide improved water supply and sewerage services at resort centres. These are, for the most part, small seaside towns, and the schemes will facilitate tourism and other development locally.

# Waterford Foods And Teagasc Join Forces To Help Farmers Cut Dairy Production Costs

A major new farm development programme for Waterford Foods milk suppliers jointly operated by Teagasc and Waterford Foods, was announced by Ivan Yates, T.D., Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, at Agriculture 96 last week.

The initiative has been developed to assist milk producers in the Waterford catchment area to enhance efficiency and boost on-farm competitiveness in the face of changing global dairy market conditions. Priority areas in the programme are to increase the value of dairy output with specific reference to milk protein percentage, and to reduce on-farm production costs with particular emphasis on improved grassland management.

The joint programme was warmly welcomed by Minister Yates who congratulated Waterford Foods and Teagasc for pooling their resources into a structured development programme. "A major priority for Teagasc is to spearhead a national programme to reduce production costs on farms, increase the quality and value of output and defend the viability of Irish farms. This joint initiative with Waterford Foods is an effective mechanism to achieve this task

and I urge Waterford suppliers to participate wholeheartedly," he stated.

Continuing, the Minister said: "On the majority of Irish dairy farms, it is clear that an improvement in return of over 10 pence per gallon is readily achievable through better grassland management and improved farming practices as outlined in the Teagasc 'Cash in on Grass' programme for 1996. The Waterford/Teagasc programme will assist participating farmers to achieve this target."

## FROM DISCUSSION GROUPS TO FARM WALKS

Phase one of the Teagasc/Waterford programme will run over two years and includes:

- Formation of discussion groups throughout the entire Waterford catchment area. Matt Ryan, the Teagasc specialist who trained in discussion group management

in New Zealand, will attend all meetings.

- Enhanced availability of Teagasc advisors to assist Waterford suppliers on a one to one basis.
- Farm Walks focussing on grassland and silage.
- Milk recording clinics.
- Grass re-seeding open days.

This joint initiative will be supported by enhanced farm services developments within Waterford Foods including an animal breeding advisory committee, nutritional advice and development, and accelerated R&D and breed trials at company farms. For instance, as part of this project, an innovative dual purpose breed trial involving Normandy and Mont Beliarde stock is currently being run in conjunction with Teagasc at the company's farm at Castlelyons, Co. Cork.

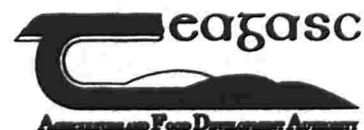
Discussion Groups will be the focal point of the joint programme with up to thirty groups of 20 committed farmers each formed within

the next twelve months.

According to John Moloney, General Manager of Waterford Foods Agri-Trading business, discussion groups are a well-proven method for information and technology transfer. Groups will meet on a monthly basis on each other's farms under the leadership of a group facilitator and attended by local Waterford and Teagasc staff.

Members of the groups will have priority status to visit Teagasc and Waterford research stations and farms, participate on organised tours in Ireland and abroad, attend topical seminars and conferences and have access to periodicals and special newsletters.

Concluding the launch at Agriculture 96, the Chairman of Waterford Foods John Dowley, endorsed Minister Yates's call for participation by Waterford suppliers in the Scheme. "When we see the outlook for dairy markets it is clear that dairy incomes can be substantially defended through on-farm improvements and this must be a priority for all suppliers," he said.



## MILKING MACHINES

Liners should be changed twice yearly, July is about the halfway stage in the milking season, so it should be time to change them now on many farms. This is expensive, but it is a lot less expensive than under-milking the cows or higher cell counts, under-milking during the year contributes to the rise in cell counts that occurs towards the end of the year.

The list of liners that is now recommended by Moorepark includes only very good liners, they milk cows fast and milk them out well and do not slip off or hurt cows' teats.

Eddie O'Callaghan in Moorepark is now investigating the effects of ageing on liners and the effects of not changing liners in time and how this affects cell count and the milking out of cows.

Also in the context of milking cows out completely, cluster weight is very important. The cluster should be 3 Kg. even at 2.8 Kg. there is a small reduction in milk yield of 0.5 - 1 litre per day. Clusters of 2.5 or thereabouts will not milk out the milk, they are slow and can creep up on the teats/udder.

Modern clusters from all of the machine companies are good and are heavy enough, but many of the older ones are not. The liners on the Moorepark recommended list do not perform well in light clusters.

## ACCIDENTS ON THE FARM

The fact that most family farms have resident or visiting children means that avoiding risks to them must be a priority. As well as ensuring that slurry and sheep dipping tanks are properly fenced, attention needs to be given to the risks from machinery. Bitter experience shows that children and moving farm machinery are best kept apart.

With larger and higher capacity machines, operators need all their concentration for the job on hand and cannot reasonably be expected to look out for children in the work area. The answer lies in providing a safe and supervised play area, where they can still see enough to satisfy their natural curiosity - from a safe distance.

It is highly dangerous to carry young children on tractors, yet despite some horrific accidents in recent years, this practice is still common. Even the most modern cabs are not designed for this purpose. Most accidents of this type occur when the cab door opens, a child falls out and is run over. There is the risk of interference with controls and children are also vulnerable in the event of the tractor overturning or objects being thrown up by machinery.

Unguarded machinery and unsafe electrical installations are proven causes of serious and fatal injury. Greater vigilance is constantly needed on farms to keep equipment in better condition and take advantage of available safety improvements. Recent legislation requires that greater emphasis is placed on regular examination and safe use of equipment. Manufacturers are also required to play their part in improving safety standards.

# CO. WATERFORD ICMSA NEWS

John Quigley, Area Officer with ICMSA in the South East region said that farmers in the area have spent a great deal of money investing in effective anti-pollution systems and the vast majority of farmers are doing all in their power to control farmyard pollution.

"While it is in everyone's interest to control pollution, ICMSA and farmers are very disappointed with the Minister for Agriculture Ivan Yates, for suspending the Control of Farmyard

### Pollution Scheme.

"The Control of Farmyard Pollution Grant was a major incentive to many farmers who could not afford, without some kind of aid, the huge cost involved in installing a modern anti-pollution system.

"ICMSA are urging the Minister for Agriculture to restore these grants immediately in order that farmers may continue to carry out necessary anti-pollution work. Also, some change should be made to the tax

system to give an incentive to carry out this work. ICMSA has proposed to the Government that a special accelerated capital allowance of up to 100 per cent (free depreciation) be provided for on-farm investment under approved schemes, for the upgrading of farm facilities and to comply with the provision of the EU Regulation on Milk Hygiene, Animal Welfare and Pollution Control," concluded Mr. Quigley.

Meanwhile, ICMSA Presi-

dent, Frank Allen said that TD's from rural areas are failing in their duty to properly represent the farming community in Dail Eireann.

"There is now ample evidence from the events of recent weeks to prove that the majority of TD's from rural areas have little or no genuine commitment to a large percentage of their constituents — farmers and their families," Mr. Allen declared.

"ICMSA is asking all its branches throughout the country to closely monitor the performance of their local TD's in relation to promoting sound agriculture policy and rural development. On the basis of these findings, farmers and all people living in rural areas will be able to judge for themselves who they should vote for in next year's general election."

Mr. Allen added that ICMSA was furious at the large absence of rural TD's from a number of political parties at the recent Dail debate on BSE.

The wholesale lack of commitment by rural TD's to the farming community was also reflected in the fact that only four Deputies were present to discuss the Department of Agriculture estimates when they were presented to the Dail Committee on Finance and General Affairs last week.

prices. "The intervention pricing arrangements must provide both market support and enable a recovery in market prices."

Mr. Donovan also called for the abolition of the current 400,000 tonnes limit on intervention. "By the end of June there will be 180,000 tonnes in intervention and to prevent prices falling back to safety net levels this restrictive limit must be removed."

The IFA Livestock leader said that the bureaucratic system of deboning in dif-

ferent factory premises and trucking beef across the country is ridiculous and must be scrapped.

In addition, Mr. O'Malley said that a much greater effort must be made by Minister Yates and the Government to secure full premium compensation for BSE losses including a proper package for heifer and bull beef producers. "IFA will not allow Minister Yates do a skimpy loaves and fishes job on compensation."

# IFA Issues Silage Effluent And Slurry Warning

Waterford IFA National Environment Committee Chairman, Matt Cunningham has strongly advised farmers to exercise total vigilance when handling silage effluent and animal slurries.

He said: "A number of incidents in the Cork area in recent days have highlighted the serious risks to water quality and fish life posed by the mishandling of silage effluent, animal slurry and yard washings. Under no circumstances must these substances enter water courses."

Mr. Cunningham restated IFA's advice on the correct handling of silage effluent which is set out in the IFA 10-Point Code on Silage Effluent Control. He specifically stressed that drains and water courses downstream of the farmyard should be regularly inspect-

ed once silage making starts. "Farmers should also have an emergency action plan in place to protect water if any contamination is suspected," he added.

Mr. Cunningham said he was dismayed and disappointed at the recent incidents in the Cork area. He said: "IFA hold no brief for the deliberate or careless polluter."

However, he added that certain comments reported from the South Western Fisheries Board were an outrageous attempt to blacken the name of all farmers. "This does a grave injustice to the tens of thousands of Irish farmers who have invested millions in the environment. 99.9% of farmers conduct their farming activities in a responsible manner to the very highest environmental standards."

## ICMSA DEMANDS TEMPORARY LEASING CHANGES

Mr. Tommy Cooke, Chairman of the ICMSA Dairy Committee, welcomed the bringing forward of the Milk Quota Review Group meeting to Tuesday as requested. He said: "ICMSA have called for radical changes to the rules on Temporary Leasing at Tuesday's meeting of the Milk Quota Review Group. "We will be seeking major amendments to phases 2 and 3 of the Temporary Leasing Scheme to give more priority for leased quota to those farmers who have a traditional dependence on the Scheme," said Mr. Cooke.

"Thousands of dairy farmers will go out of business if they do not get extra quota," he warned.

Mr. Cooke said rule changes to the Temporary Leasing Scheme, to which ICMSA had strongly objected, had been a major contributory factor to the current crisis for the smaller scale producers.

# IFA Calls For Major Changes To Beef Intervention Support

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan has called for major changes to the beef intervention price support mechanism in order to properly support cattle prices and farmers incomes during the BSE crisis.

Mr. Donovan said that the result of last Friday's EU Beef Management Committee rejecting the Irish beef intervention tender in full, demonstrates that the present system is designed to prevent any lift in cattle

# Féile Assessment

Last Sunday at approximately 4.30 at a time when Offaly were well on their way at Croke Park towards dismissing the challenge of Laois, Coca-Cola Féile Portlárige 1996 came to an exciting end at Walsh Park with renowned James Stephens, Kilkenny edging in front of a brave and spirited Kilmallock, Co. Limerick champions, to capture Féile's premier hurling prize - the Christy Ring trophy.

It was a fitting climax to a memorable weekend, one which our County's people will remember for all of the right reasons. The challenge of hosting Féile Na nGael was responded to with eagerness and enthusiasm by our County Board and by our 34 clubs who pulled out all stops to show the nation that Waterford can do it. So may I salute and congratulate all of our club units for their considerable part in making Coca-Cola Féile Portlárige fit to stand with the best ever such Féiles.

A high level of organisation ensured that hitches were few and minor. Painstaking meticulous preparations had gone on for months with regular meetings at club and County Executive level. Targets were set, progress continually assessed, clubs motivated, difficulties tackled and overcome, problems solved.

In G.A.A. affairs, one irritating bad habit has too often persisted - a cavalier attitude to time keeping. The meeting time for 8.00 p.m. rarely starts before 8.15 and if 8.00 sharp is specified, then the attendance may have to wait until up to nine. Similarly at local level, training scheduled for 7.35 may witness the late comers arriving up to eight while games generally start after the appointed time. Féile set new standards of courtesy in regard to time. Every game started right on time and all Féile events were right on schedule from the outset.

Saturday last was a wonderful day for the G.A.A., for our country. Up to 5,000 hurlers, camogie players and handballers participated in the highly spectacular Féile Parade. Assembling and controlling such huge numbers of young people was a daunting undertaking. But with careful planning and stewarding, willing club co-operation, this whole massive operation went off like clockwork. The buzz of excitement increased as each team took up its station along the

Quay from 2.00 p.m. onwards. The 16 bands were in readiness, the teams neatly turned out in their club colours and ready as time ticked away towards 3.30 p.m.. ## Tools For Make-Up

When applying make-up, the tools you use are just as important as the make-up you are applying.

To achieve an even finish when applying foundation use a make-up sponge. If you use your fingertips you will transfer oil from your fingertips on to your face and end up with a streaky look. Before using your make-up sponge dampen it slightly, this will prevent the sponge from soaking up too much foundation as well as helping it to slide gently across the skin.

Use a powder brush in preference to cotton wool or a powder puff. Dip the brush into the powder, shake off the excess and

gently apply all over the face. Remove excess powder by stroking downwards with the brush. Applying powder with a brush will help to prevent it clogging on the skin.

Blusher should also be applied with a brush, this should be a little smaller than your powder brush. Use the brush to gently apply blusher in upward strokes.

An eyeshadow brush is vital for use with powdered eyeshadows. Take a little shadow at a time and apply evenly to the eyelid

with the brush. This will give a smoother finish.

A lipstick brush is used to ensure that the lipstick is applied evenly to the lips. Lipstick brushes also give the lips a more defined shape and will help lipstick to stay on longer.

Finally a slash and brown brush and comb is essential. The lash brush is used to brush the eyebrows into place, whilst removing any excess powder from the brows. The eyelash comb should be used to comb the lashes after applying mascara. This will straighten them and remove any bits of mascara which may be clogged on the lashes.

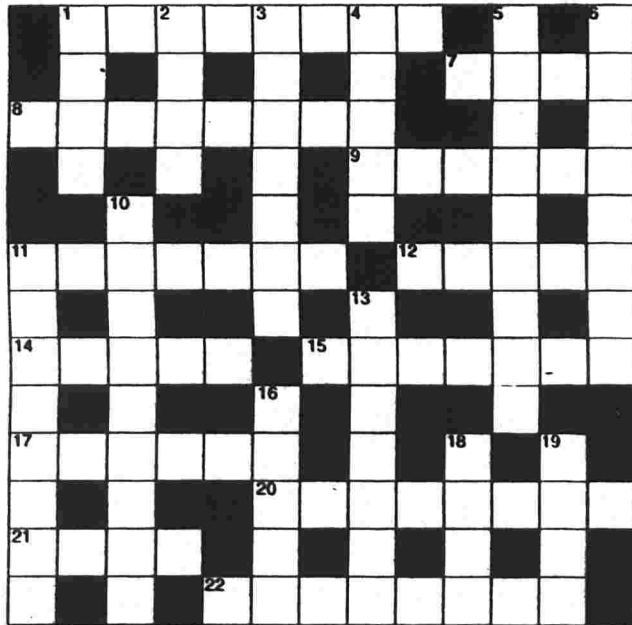

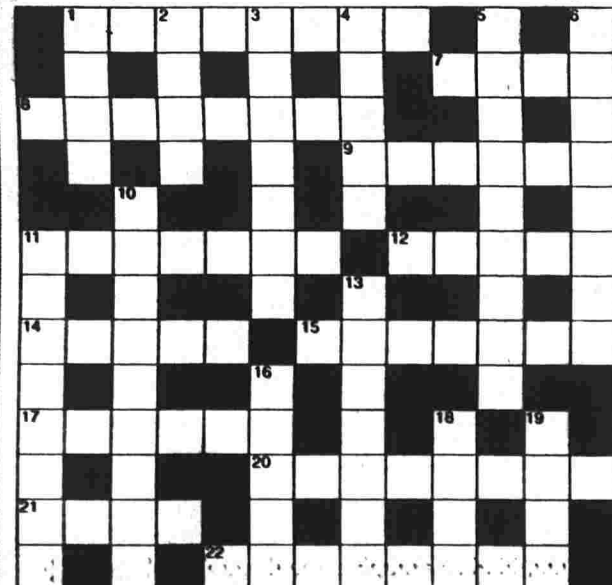

# Chef's Corner

Menus for the week



6 tbsp natural yoghurt  
finely grated zest of 1/2

orange  
**FOR THE TOMATO DIP:**  
6 Tbsp fromage frais  
1 large tomato, finely chopped

1 tbsp tomato puree  
2 tsp fresh chopped chives

**METHOD:** Slice chicken into fairly thin strips and toss in flour.

Heat oil in a large non-stick pan and fry chicken until golden brown and thoroughly cooked. Drain on kitchen towel. To make dips, combine ingredients for each in separate bowls, reserving a little orange zest and chives for garnish. Serve the peanut and tomato dips with chicken, sliced peppers, baby corn and cherry tomatoes.

## Country Vegetable Soup

Preparation: 20 minutes  
Cooking: 1 hour  
Serves: 4

15g/1/2oz butter

1 garlic clove, peeled and crushed  
1 leek, washed, trimmed and chopped  
2 carrots, peeled and finely diced

1 (500ml/17 fl oz) carton tomato juice  
700ml/1 1/4 pt vegetable stock

1 Tbsp Worcestershire sauce  
15g/1/2oz spaghetti, broken into pieces

50g/2oz French beans, sliced into short lengths  
pastry twists to serve

**METHOD:** Melt the butter in a large pan and add the garlic and leek. Fry gently for 3-4 minutes. Remove the leek with a slotted spoon and set aside. Add the carrots to the pan and cook over a gentle heat for 5 minutes, stirring all the time. Gradually stir in the tomato juice, stock and Worcestershire sauce. Cover and simmer for 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add the spaghetti

pieces to the pan and simmer for 2 minutes, then add the beans and cook for 8 minutes until both are just tender. Stir in the leek and season to taste with salt and freshly ground black pepper. Cook for a further 2-3 minutes. Serve the soup with pastry twists.

### HOUSEHOLD TIPS

1. Clean plastic or fake leather furniture with a cloth squeezed out in warm detergent solution (not soap) and polish with a soft, dry cloth. Don't use wax or cream polish - it will leave the surface feeling tacky.
2. To keep your fridge running efficiently, dust the grill at the back from time to time. Turn off the fridge first.
3. Don't use detergent to clean a decanter - you'll never be able to rinse it all out. Swirling it out with crushed egg shells in water is the best way to remove deposits you can't get at.

## Apple Raspberry Creams

Preparation: 10 minutes  
Cooking: approx 10 minutes  
Serves: 4

2 large cooking apples, peeled, cored and chopped  
2 tsp honey  
3 tbsp orange juice  
3-4 tsp granulated artificial sweetener

1 (200g/7oz) carton virtually fat-free fromage frais  
1 (200g/7oz) carton Greek yoghurt  
50g/2oz fresh or frozen raspberries

2 tsp icing sugar  
fresh mint sprigs to decorate

**METHOD:** Place the chopped apples in a small pan with honey and 2 tbsp of the orange juice. Cover and cook very gently until the apple is tender, stirring occasionally. Leave to cool. Mash the apples lightly with a fork and add sweetener to taste. Pour the fromage frais into a bowl and fold in the cold apple mixture. Gently fold in the Greek yoghurt. If necessary, add a little more sweetener to taste. Divide the prepared mixture between four individual glass dishes. Push one-third of the raspberries through a fine-holed sieve to make a puree. Then stir in the remaining orange juice and the icing sugar. Spoon 1 tsp of the raspberry puree on top of each dessert. The take a wooden cocktail stick and drag it from the centre of the puree out towards the edges to create a red and white star pattern. Serve the desserts decorated with mint sprigs and whole raspberries. Serve any remaining raspberries in a small bowl.

## Family Health

By Dr. DAVE BARRY

**Q.** I have five children and when one of them gets a tummy bug they all come down with it. What causes this and how can I stop it spreading?

**A.** The 'tummy bugs' which cause sickness and diarrhoea are usually viruses which are easily transmitted from one person to another if they're in close contact as would be the case in a family situation. Many bacterial and viral infections are transmitted by the 'faecal - oral' route, so meticulous attention to personal hygiene after using the toilet is essential. Food poisoning usually produces sudden and serious vomiting, sometimes with diarrhoea. This results from eating food contaminated with bacteria or toxins produced by bacteria. Good kitchen hygiene with proper storage and cooking of food will minimise the risks of food poisoning. Gastro-intestinal germs may be

passed by a cough or sneeze so, as far as your circumstances will allow, confine anybody with a bug to a separate room and avoid close contact.

**Q.** I take good care of my nails and eat plenty of calcium rich foods. Despite this they are splitting badly. What is the cause of this and how can I stop it?

**A.** I would suggest that you go to your doctor and have him check this out. Occasionally, splitting nails can be caused by psoriasis or anaemia, although there are usually other signs of this. Generally speaking, taking more zinc-containing and whole-meal foods like beef liver, peas, nuts, eggs and bran will be more likely to help than calcium. Household cleaners can be detrimental to the health and appearance of the nails so protect against this by using gloves.

## Primary Schools G.A.A. Notes

### KEEPING THE EXERCISE HABIT

One of the most important questions in this area is why do some people consistently take exercise, while others exercise is confined to switching the channel switch on the tv?

Health promoters are unanimous in agreeing that some regular moderate exercise is good for you. Among the psychological factors which have been found to correlate with keeping up the exercise habit include:

- Positive initial experience of exercising in primary school;
- Participation in some organised sport;
- Higher socio-economic level;
- Fairly steady body size and shape;
- Self motivated person;
- Personality — person is persevering and likes a

challenge;

● Family background encouraged participation.

Bodies are, in fact, made for action/activity and without this they inevitably go into decline. Being just the same is not really an option for biological systems. They must be challenged and progress, or decline into decay through disuse. The effects of both starting into training and stopping are immediate. Beneficial effects are found almost on starting; however any training gains are rapidly lost if the habit is not kept up.

Some of the problems associated with lack of exer-

cise include:

- Coronary heart disease.
- Depression.
- Diabetes.
- Back pain.
- Obesity.
- Asthma.
- Low self esteem.

When the body is at rest, the muscles account for no more than 20% of total oxygen consumption. However, when working at full tilt, active muscles require about 50 times their resting requirement. As muscle groups work in pairs, all continuous skilled activity requires the ability to relax if it is to be effective. Also, the greater the supply of blood to, and the more flexible the muscular groups, the quicker the recovery from exertion.

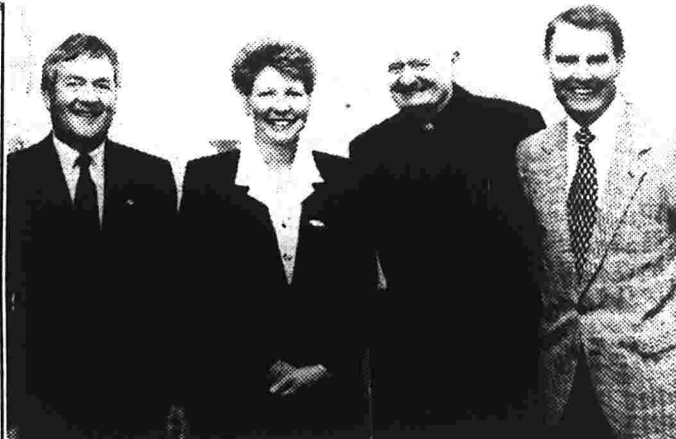

# Double Defeat For Waterford At Fraher Field

The Kingdom in all their glory did not spare themselves in exposing the gap in standards in both matches at the home ground of Waterford here on Saturday evening when a crowd of approximately 2,000 turned up, more hopeful than confident that a shock might be possible.

In the junior game, we were just annihilated and weren't at the races at any stage as Kerry scoring almost at will, piled on the scores with monotonous regularity.

## KERRY 0-24 WATERFORD 0-2

Although we were overwhelmed, a considerable portion of the 22 points gap in scoring must be attributed to the appalling inaccuracy of our forwards who shot over some unbelievable wides. Over all we had eleven wides as against nine for Kerry. At halfway the visitors led by 0-9 to 0-1, our score having come from the boot of Aidan Ahearne in the 23rd minute.

In the 52nd minute Eamon Crotty added our second score, which was also our last and at the same stage, Kerry had 19 points on the scoreboard. There was relief all round when the final whistle blew as the gap would have undoubtedly had the game gone on longer.

Most of the Kerry team had already played in the senior club championships this year. This is permissible where group teams are entered in the senior championship and it creates an awful imbalance in contests where the opposition (like us) is composed entirely of players of a lower grade than senior. In fairness to the selectors, they did their utmost to get the best possible team on the field, but like last year and other years, their efforts were in vain. Being hammered in junior on an ongoing basis, is certainly not good for football and I believe now that the County Board should take a firm decision not to enter junior football teams in the Munster championships for future, or at least until we are permitted to field our second best selection. Here again, Waterford were outclassed, but not to the extent indicated by the scoreboard and the general consensus was that Waterford were unlucky to be so far in arrears at the finish.

A very doubtful foul after only five minutes saw Maurice Fitzgerald shoot home a penalty. The same player failed with a 24th minute penalty when Waterford's keeper brought off a spectacular save. The scored penalty helped Kerry to a 1-7 to 0-4 halftime lead.

Our scores were recorded by Anthony Fitzgerald in the 11th minute, Martin Power in the 18th, Anthony Fitzgerald again in the 31st and Matty Kiely in the 33rd.

After ten minutes into the second half, the Kerry lead was unchanged after Matty Kiely's splendid point followed a pointed Kerry free by Dara Cinneide.

Eamon Breen for Kerry had a great point in the 11th minute and within a further minute P. P. Ferncombe blasted a ball from the edge of the 'square', but was unlucky in that it rebounded off the Kerry 'keeper, Declan O'Keefe. A goal at this point would have re-

duced the gap to just four points and would have given Waterford a badly needed boost.

Maurice Fitzgerald had his second goal in the 17th minute and a third Kerry major from Bingo Driscoll in the 31st, after he had found a tiring defence wide open, gave the game a one-sided appearance.

Throughout the game, Kerry had a total of 15 wides and Waterford had 9.

On Saturday in the 'Star' daily newspaper, Roy Curtis in typical sarcasm wrote in a preview of the game that Waterford 'are a third world football county who are likely to have to wait until the year 2057 before they can again hope to beat Kerry'. Quite an assessment from a journalist who has never seen Waterford play!

Notwithstanding this, football people here must now see that it is time to take stock of things and do something to lift the county from the bottom of the pile. The selectors and all those associated with football continue to do their very best to lift our teams, money is not spared and we have great supporters waiting and waiting for things to get better, but year after year it seems to be just the same all over again. Getting better is taking far too long and as of now there is no light at the end of a dark tunnel and if we go on as we are things will never change.

Poor standards generally seem to be at the base of our problem and with clubs doing precious little to improve these, we will continue to go just nowhere. Steps that might be taken to start an improvement include reducing the teams in the senior championship to eight from sixteen. At least half the present group are wasting their time and their money and energies in trying to win a senior championship. Play the championship on a knock-out basis only and run a league in tandem. Seriously consider the idea of applying to the Munster Council for regrading to junior status and get into a grade that will give us some hope of winning. We have not won a provincial title in the se-

nior grade since the last century and it is time now that we began to look our problem straight in the eye and do something drastic to try to remedy it.

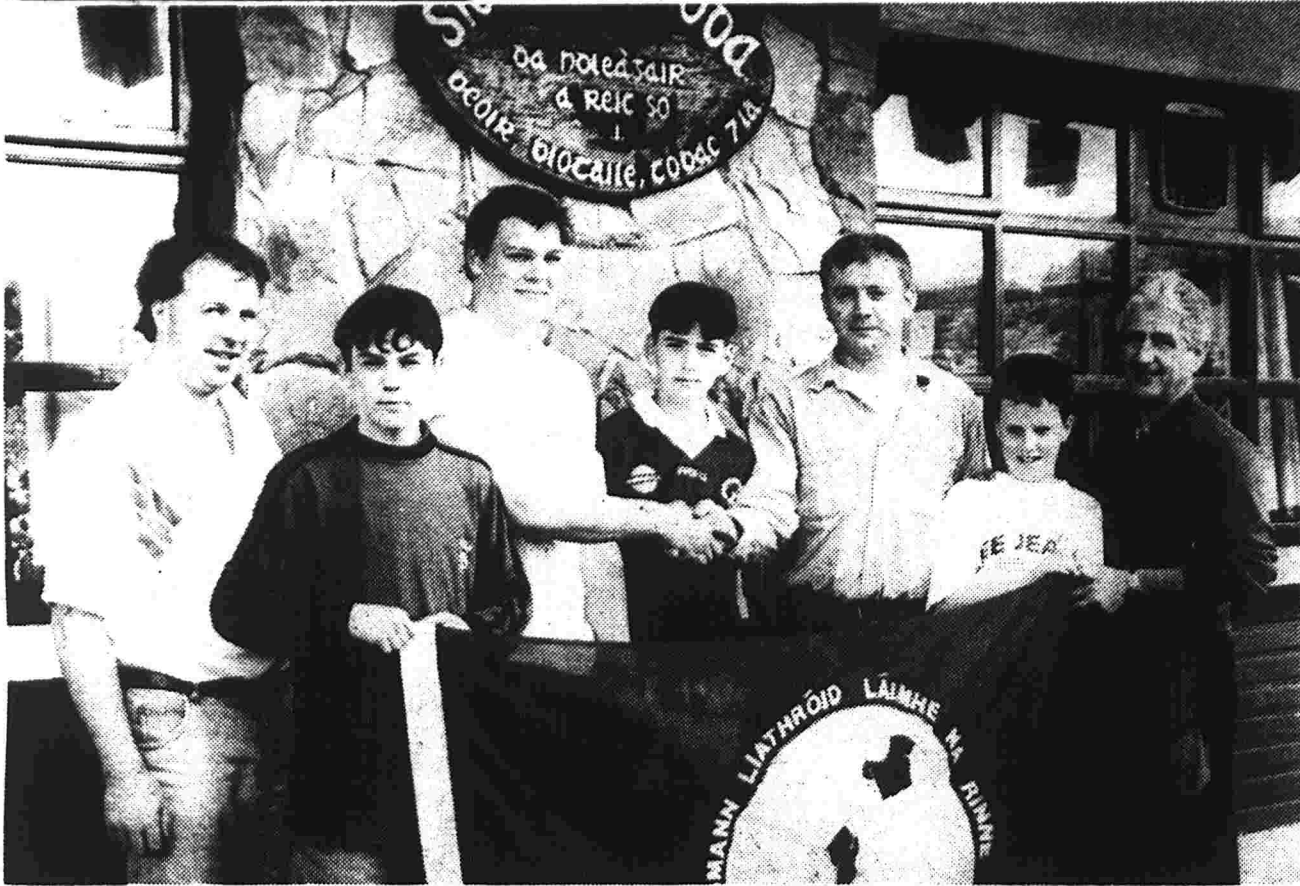
## APPEAL FAILS

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## Huntington's Disease Progressive & Debilitating

Paddy Grant of 42 Pinewood Drive, Kilmaccoma, Clonmel at 53 years of age is one of only 400 people (approx) in Ireland who suffer from this very progressive and debilitating disease.

Huntington's Disease is caused by the relentless destruction of brain cells. Having begun to die, these cells can never be replaced. This fact in turn can lead to various knock-on effects.

Symptoms include changes in usual behaviour including very often depression, moodiness, unusual outbursts of anger or by jerky, fidgety movements and perhaps unsteadiness of the hands or feet, which may result in falls and a tendency to be clumsy.

These are the early signs and increase very slowly in intensity, very often resulting in memory loss and eventually the patient has no control of his movements. In Paddy Grants case symptoms of this disease began to manifest themselves in September 1976, when he had to cease work. Today the sad facts are that Paddy is confined to a wheelchair, is unable to feed or wash himself and of late his speech has got so bad, his family cannot even understand him.

Married to Maura, and with the help of their nine children (5 boys and 4 girls), Paddy has enjoyed a good quality of life, thanks to their great help and understanding. They have also received great help from the Huntington's Disease Association of Ireland and the South Eastern Health Board through its various Doctors, Nurses and Officials.

However, the loss of his voice is a huge handicap to both Paddy and his carers. Recently a computer has been designed especially for such sufferers. This would be of enormous benefit as it would enable Paddy to communicate with his family. Costing £3000 the people of Ballymacarbray, Touraneena, Newcastle and Clonmel area, are being asked to try and raise this sum. Various fund raising events are being held locally culminating in a "Mountain Walk" from the Nire Church to Kilmanahan on Saturday July 13th starting at 7 p.m. and a "Road Walk" from Halpins, Ballymacarbray at 8 p.m. on the same date. This will be followed by a Social in the Hidden Inn on the same

night. Music is by The Country Blue Boys and Mr. Whelan with Admission at £2.

Various Sponsorship Cards for both walks will be in circulation in various shops, pubs etc. over the next few weeks.

This is a most worthy cause which deserves everyone's support. We know Paddy's many friends will support the walkers and attend what will surely be a very enjoyable night on Saturday, July 13th.

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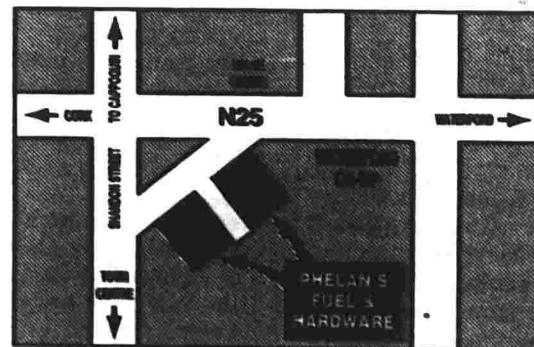
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
