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NEW CHAIRMAN OF WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL

Tense Affair As O'Halloran's Name Is Picked From Hat

Political tensions, broken pacts and cliffhanger voting were all the ingredients of a dramatic Waterford County Council AGM last Monday where new Council Chairman, Cllr. Gary O'Halloran, was literally picked from a hat!

The unprecedented voting pattern which saw splits in both the Fianna Fáil and Labour parties resulted in a tied vote between two candidates.

Cllr. O'Halloran was proposed by Cllr. Willie McDonnell as the Fine Gael nominee for the Chair. He was seconded by Labour's

Cllr. Billy Kyan in keeping with the 17 year old pact between both parties.

The second candidate for the chair was outgoing Vice-Chairman Cllr. Paddy O'Callaghan who broke with the Labour party ranks to propose himself. As a result of a decision taken at an earlier Fianna Fáil meet-

Know Your Rights

QUESTION

It was announced in the Budget that if you were unemployed for a year at least and found employment that you could retain your Medical Card for 3 years. Has this happened?

ANSWER

No. No decision has been taken yet regarding this Budget proposal. This present situation regarding employment and Medical Card holders is:

a) If you were unemployed and on the Live Register prior to taking up employment and you are on a low income and you qualify for Family Income Supplement — you can retain the Medical Card for 2 years.

b) Persons who held a Medical Card while on the Live Register prior to going on to Community Employment retain it for 2 years after securing a placement.

c) Persons on the Live Register starting their own business who are paid the Back to Work Allowance are allowed to retain their Medical Card for 2 years.

Weekly payments made under the Community Employment Scheme, Back to Work Allowance and Family Income Supplement are not assessable when assessing a person's eligibility for a Medical Card.

IDA Expects Further Job Increases In South East

According to the annual IDA report published last week, 1995 was a very significant year for the south east region and one of the most successful for many

years.

Significant developments included the reestablishment of the region as a credible location for the electronics industry with Seagate Technology locating in Clonmel in June '95. The US company's decision to take over the former Digital plant in Clonmel was the culmination of an intensive promotional effort by the IDA.

Seagate produces disk drives for the personal computer market and is already 3 years ahead of target. The

scale of the project is having an impact right across the region in terms of sub-supply and direct employment.

FURTHER EXPANSIONS IN DUNGARVAN

In Co. Waterford further expansions within existing companies, notably SmithKline Beecham and Stafford Miller in Dungarvan are expected to contribute to job increases during 1996. The provision of an advance factory in Dungarvan, currently

nearing completion, will also greatly assist with the promotion of the area.

IDA are continuing to work closely with Dungarvan and Waterford city, Chambers of Commerce, Waterford Corporation and County Council in the promotion of the city and county.

The report maintains that the level of interest in the south east region continues to be high, and the IDA is currently negotiating with several significant companies for different locations in the region.

£1 Million Marina For Dunmore East

Bord Fáilte have recently approved in principle of a grant of £660,000 towards a proposed new marina for Dunmore East to be built at a cost of £1 million approx.

The marina, which is to be built by Waterford County Council in association with the Waterford Harbour Sailing Club, is expected to provide berthing for up to 60 craft, 30 of which will be reserved for overseas visitors.

When completed, the marina will be a major boost to tourism in the Dunmore East area. Work on the detailed planning of the marina is currently being undertaken and it is expected that over the next few months, Waterford Co. Council will be seeking the necessary planning approval for the project.

You Should Always Save Waste Paper

We read from it, write on it, post letters on it and blow our noses on it.

You've guessed it — it's paper. Little in life can happen without paper or board.

It's the Chinese we have to thank for this very special material. In 205 BC the first known paper maker, T'sai Lun, is thought to have used waste products.

Old rags, pieces of hemp rope and fishing nets were boiled in water and wood ash, then beaten so that the fibres broke apart to make a pulp rather like porridge.

This pulp was passed through a flat, mesh strainer to drain out the water, leaving matted fibres behind.

When these fibres dried out, they became sheets of paper. The same process has been used ever since.

But as machinery became more complicated and books were mass produced, mills ran out of rags.

An alternative had to be found. Experiments in making pulp from wood began in the 18th century. Wood contains cellulose, an essential ingredient for paper-making.

But it wasn't until the middle of the 19th century, when grinders were invented, that wood could be pulped in large quantities.

Today, the paper chase still goes on, says Lesley Perrins, author of *How It Is Made, Paper*. Many plants other than trees contain cellulose fibres.

Hemp is still used in paper-making. As T'sai Lun found out from hemp, it can be made into fine, strong papers.

Esparto grass makes "springy" paper and stands up well to the modern printing presses.

Sisal and jute, used for sacking, matting and rope, can be made into paper, as can straw and bamboo.

Waste pieces from sugar cane, bagasse, are also suitable.

But these plants don't have the same qualities as wood, which gives such a variety of papers of high quality. Research still goes on to find a substitute.

If T'sai Lun had lived today, he would have saved all his waste-paper, which, when recycled, accounts for more than half of the mills' raw material.

You can help ensure the paper chain never ends. Save your waste paper and hand it in at your local collection point.

DUNGARVAN SET FOR EUROPEAN HILLCLIMB CHALLENGE

Details of the upcoming European Hillclimb Challenge at the old Sweep, Dungarvan which will take place as part of the annual Dungarvan Motorsport Weekend were announced at a press conference in Lawlor's Hotel last Monday.

The Hillclimb event is set to receive extensive television coverage and has already attracted top drivers from England, Wales, continental Europe, Northern Ireland and all over the country to the Dungarvan venue.

This is the first time ever that a round of the European Hillclimb Challenge will be held in Ireland and the local hill is sure to set a testing challenge for the top drivers.

WHAT'S IN STORE?

The weekend kicks off on Friday, July 12th in Dungarvan Sports Centre, where classic and vintage cars will be on display alongside some of the Hillclimb entrants. Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly will officially launch the motorsport weekend.

Prior to the launch, a scrutiny of the Hillclimb competition cars will take place at 6 p.m. at the Nissan Garage, Youghal Road.

On Saturday, July 13th, Waterford County Council will close the old Sweep from the Ring junction on the main N25 Waterford/Cork road. A practice run will be held at 10.30 a.m. before the first run at 12 noon. A prize giving ceremony at Lawlor's Hotel takes place later that evening.

On Sunday, July 14th, at 12 noon, the Veteran run, organised by Peggy Moloney, will start off in Davitt's car park and return to the square just after 4 p.m. Over one hundred cars are expected to take part in this run.

Meanwhile at the Sweep, the Hillclimb challenge continues at 12 noon. A second prize giving ceremony will be held later that evening.

REGULAR FIXTURE

The Sweep hill run is round 6 (in Region 3) of the FIA Hillclimb Challenge and is organised by the Tipperary LC & MCC and the Carrick-on-Suir Motor Club, through the offices of the RIAC which is the oldest motor club in Ireland. Belgium, Luxembourg and England will host the other rounds in region 3.

Judging from the vast interest shown by both Irish and overseas competitors, the Dungarvan European Hillclimb Challenge should become a regular fixture on

the European calendar.

The south eastern event will also play host to rounds 7 & 8 of the Dunlop Hillclimb Championship for the Frank Keane Trophy which is made up of 10 rounds in total.

BOOST TO TOURISM

Local sponsor of the event, Michael Burke of Lawlor's Hotel said the European status of the challenge will attract visitors and thereby promote tourism in the town. If it is organised successfully this year, then Mr. Burke saw no reason why the Hillclimb Challenge would not be staged in Dungarvan for the next number of years. "It's great publicity... and it will be a big boost to Dungarvan", he enthused.

Mr. Burke thanked Peggy Moloney, local B&B owner Nora Fahey and Chairperson of Dungarvan Tourism, Kathleen Phelan for their help and support in getting the plans off the ground.

Also attending the press conference was John Hackett, President of the Tipperary LC & MCC, who said he was delighted to stage the event in association with the Carrick-on-Suir club and he wished the local organising committee every success.

The Tipperary club was founded in 1950 and organised the first hill run at the Sweep, Dungarvan in 1951. A local man who has also been involved in every Dungarvan hillclimb for the past

45 years is Michael Moloney, Chairman of Dungarvan Motorsport. Mr. Moloney expressed his deep appreciation to the residents of the Sweep and said the organisers will do their best to keep inconvenience as low as possible.

SPEEDING ENCOURAGED!

Superintendent Catherine Clancy of Dungarvan Garda Station said that for a change the gardai are en-

couraging speeding rather than prosecuting it and she wished the hillclimb every success.

Cllr. Lar Hart, Vice-Chairman of Waterford County Council said the hillclimb will be a big boost to Dungarvan and he assured the organisers of the Council's full support and cooperation.

Likewise Cllr. Paddy Power, Chairman of Dungarvan UDC said he was de-

lighted to see the European involvement with the Dungarvan Motorsport Weekend since its small beginnings some 5 years ago.

"Carrick have Seskin Hill and Dungarvan has the Sweep", he quipped.

George Clancy, who will be taking up the reins as Clerk of the course said all involved are looking forward to a safe, sporting weekend.

American Fighter Planes Sweep Across County

Low-flying fighter planes made a dramatic appearance in Co. Waterford skies over the weekend. The American planes carried out several runs over the country as part of their weekend activities from the aircraft carrier USS "John F. Kennedy" which spent the weekend anchored 55 miles off the west Cork coast.

Nicknamed 'Big John', the JFK is the world's largest conventionally powered aircraft carrier and arrived in Dublin yesterday (Tuesday) for a five day visit to coincide with the July 4th celebrations.


Fighter aircraft were spotted flying extremely low over Dungarvan town, Abbeyside, Youghal and surrounding areas over the weekend including an im-

pressive low run over Helvick on Sunday evening. Throughout Monday the giant carrier made her way up the south-east and east coast escorted by the USS "Mississippi". A spokesman for the Maritime Safety Division of the Dept. of the Marine told the 'Dungarvan Leader' that last weekend saw an enormous amount of aircraft activity in West Wa-

terford/East Cork in particular. The military aircraft normally fly low when at sea to avoid radar detection. This tactical 'ground hugging' manoeuvre enthralled many spectators around the county and was shown to full effect during an air display in Salthill, Co. Galway. 1051 ft. long with a surface of 4.5 acres, the JFK can travel at 33 knots (40 mph) and has a crew of 5,200. The carrier was used in the Bosnian conflict and was also involved in bombing missions during the Gulf War. It will be visiting Dublin from 2-7 July and will be anchored approx. 1.5 miles outside Dun Laoghaire Harbour.

The shrubberies in Fr. Twomeys road and Springfield are very overgrown and need some maintenance. This is promised for the immediate future.

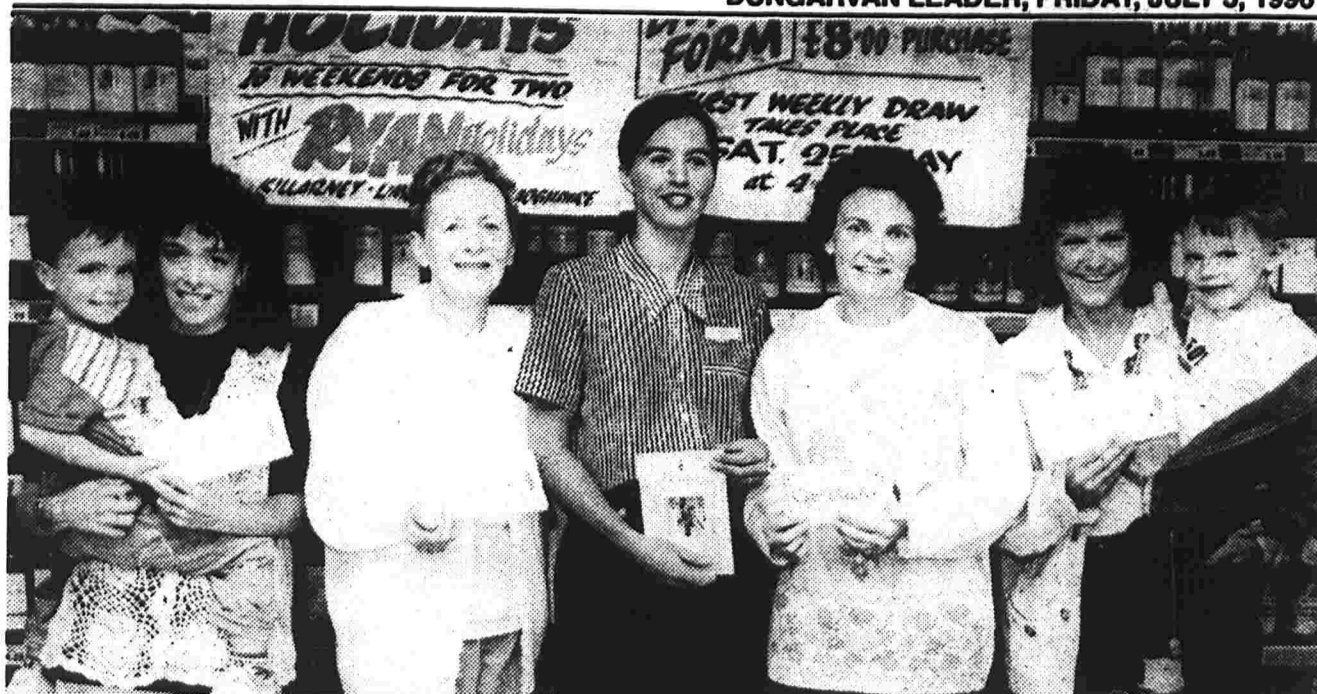
SPRINGMOUNT AREA

3 CANDIDATES FOR VICE CHAIR

CLASHMORE CHAIRMAN

The first Clashmore man to take the Council Chair since the late Charlie Curran, Cllr. O'Halloran is a member of the South Eastern Health Board and a barrister by profession. He is a re-

presentative of the County Council. Indeed, Cllr. Coffey revealed that he wore the chain of office 120 times during his year as Chairman at different functions around the county.

The main highlights of the year for the Kilmacthomas man included the 150th famine commemoration, the Waterford Ladies football All-Ireland victory, the visit of Irish soccer manager, Mick McCarthy to Tallow and the setting up of a new tourism committee to promote Waterford city and county. On the downside, Cllr. Coffey mentioned the extremely heavy rainfall in January which severely damaged the county roads network.

He expressed his appreciation to the Co. Engineer and staff, Co. Secretary Brian McNally, County Manager Donal Connolly, Tom Keith, Council officials, the press and his wife.

Complimenting Cllr. Coffey on his busy year in office, Cllr. Pat Coffey said he maintained and enhanced the profile of the Council. "He was a busy man at home but that didn't deter him from taking everything in his stride", he added.

Cllr. Jackie Fahey said Cllr. Coffey was an outstanding Chairman who represented the Council with great dignity while Cllr. Austin Flynn complimented Oliver on his relaxed and friendly manner.

County Secretary Mr. McNally described Oliver as one of the most outstanding chairmen he met during his time with the Council. Likewise Cllr. Willie McDonnell said the outgoing Chairman had given great leadership to the Council.

ly gave his support to O'Halloran while Cllr. Jimmy Quirke abstained from the vote.

Sole Democratic Left member, Cllr. Tony Wright gave his support to O'Callaghan as did Independent councillor Michael Queally.

Tied at eleven votes apiece, both candidates' names were then put into a hat with O'Halloran emerging as new Chairman for the 96/97 term.

O'CALLAGHAN'S REASONS

Coopted to the Council in 1993 following Brian O'Shea's appointment as Minister of State at the Department of Agriculture, Cllr. O'Callaghan was elected Vice Chairman in 1995.

He was under the impression that he would get his turn at the chairmanship in this, the 6th year of the pact between Labour and Fine Gael. Cllr. O'Callaghan however, revealed that he was informed by fellow party member Billy Kyne that a toss had taken place allowing FG to take the Chair this year, followed by Labour in '97.

Addressing the meeting, the Tramore Councillor said that previous commitments given to him in relation to the Chair had not been honoured by his two party colleagues Cllrs. Kyne and Lar Hart.

He felt he had no option but to publicly explain his position in full and the reasons why he put himself forward for the Chair.

"I believe I have acted with integrity throughout", he added.

The fun and games were far from over however as the second item on the agenda was the election of a new Vice Chairman.

Cllr. Kyne proposed his fellow party member Lar Hart, seconded by Cllr. Pat Coffey (FG). The second nominee, Cllr. Tony Wright was subsequently proposed by Fianna Fáil's Cllr. Ciaran O Rian, seconded by Cllr. Jackie Fahey while a surprise third nomination came from Cllr. Jimmy Quirke who proposed Cllr. Paddy Kenneally who duly seconded himself.

Cllr. Kenneally was eliminated after the first round of voting when he garnered 6 votes, (Hart 10, Wright 7). In the second vote, Cllr. Hart was elected Vice Chairman on eleven votes while Cllr. Wright received 9 votes.

"BLEW THEIR TURN" Commenting on the voting irregularities in the Fianna Fáil camp, Cllr. Wright said the party "blew their turn" at the AGM when they couldn't 'deliver on the goods' to vote unanimously on a chosen candidate.

Likewise Cllr. Jackie Fahey said that as the largest party in the Council, Fianna Fáil would be deserving of the Chair but after the day's performance, he didn't think the party were worthy of the position.

Newly elected Chairman, Cllr. O'Halloran said that in politics the highest respect is due to those who keep their word and he wondered at the political implications of Paddy O'Callaghan's move.

£150,000 Grant Aid For Cunnigar And Tramore

The Cunnigar and Tramore are to receive £150,000 grant aid between them as part of the coastal protection programme for 1996 which was announced last week. The money will go towards study and emergency protection at both locations which suffered badly from erosion during severe storms earlier this year.

PREVENT BREACH OF TOWN

Member of Dungarvan U.D.C. and Waterford Co. Council, Cllr. Tony Wright has been informed by the Minister of State at the De-

partment of the Marine, Eamon Gilmore, that the intention is to carry out emergency protection works at the Cunnigar. These works would effectively prevent a breach at the neck of the Cunnigar which would have serious consequences for the whole Dungarvan Bay area. In addition it is intended to undertake an in-depth study of the erosion problem and possible remedial works at both the Cunnigar and Tramore. The Department officials will liaise with the County Council to draw up the fine details of these

works. Commenting on the projects, Minister for the Marine, Sean Barrett, said the Irish coast is one of the most scenic in Europe and it is the Government's aim to develop the economy of this region in harmony with the environment.

"Coastal protection works are an integral part of our policy to protect the marine

environment and enhance the development of coastal regions", he stated.

Meanwhile work is also continuing on the major Coastal Zone Management Study which will be completed within the next few weeks. This study will provide the basis for the overall policy strategy on coastal planning and management.

School Choir From Devon Sings In Lismore

TRIBUTE TO THE LATE WILLY MOORE FOUNDER MEMBER OF THE 16th WATERFORD BOY SCOUTS CAPPOQUIN

In October of 1969 Rev. Fr. J. Power asked the Praesidium of The Legion Of Mary in Cappoquin to set up the scouts. Two members of the praesidium were assigned to this work. One of those members was the late professor Sean O' Cuirrin, of Church St, Cappoquin.

Willie Moore of Shanbally was one of the many people approached to become involved in setting up a Scout Unit. The two visitors got a courteous reception and hearing, then Willie said, "A, I'm too old to be a scout," in his good humoured manner, "But I'll give ye all the help I can." He then paused and said, "How old should a lad be." We said about 11 years. He said Liam is just about that and so Willie and his son Liam became involved in scouting. Willie was true to his word. He helped in every possible way. He arranged with O' Connors Chickens for the use of a lorry to transport scouts and equipment to all those early Summer Camps.

We are grateful to O' Connors Chickens and the late Willie Moore for giving their services free. Willie loved to stay as long as possible helping and watching the camp being set up. When camp would be struck he would always be along early again to help in every way he could.

In 1970 when the first big charity walk was held for

scouting, the late Frank Mc Grath A.S.M. was the first to hear about it and then with Willie Moore and the scouts master discussed it. Willie and Frank got cards printed and also Willie got permission for the walkers to rest and have sandwiches on Begley's land. Then down to Lismore and home, just about 15 miles.

Willie later gave the scouts the use of his field in Barrack St. They used it often for weekends to practice their camping skills. On occasions Willie would come to our troop meetings and give us his advice and counsel.

In 1972 the scout master who also filled in as unit leader was finding it diffi-

cult to do both, mentioned the problem to Willie who said he would willingly take on this position, which he did in a wonderfully courteous manner. At last he had become a Scouter.

Many many good people helped in setting up the 16 Waterford and are still helping scouting in the Cornerstone Town but this is a short tribute to the father of a very young family at that time, who after his work found the energy, time and enthusiasm to become a member of this great association. Now we can make for him the last circle of stones for Willie Moore has gone to his eternal home with the eternal father. From an ex-scout.

Get Dividing Among Those Clumps Of Madonna Lilies Now

Now — or early next month — is a very good time to plant or transplant white madonna lilies, as soon as they have died down after flowering, especially if you have clumps of them that are clearly overcrowded.

You can lift and divide using a fork. It will pay to moisten the soil first, that makes the job easier. I always divide very carefully by hand, making quite sure that any tangled roots are gently separated without damage. You must, of course, cut off all the withered stems and foliage.

If you plan to put some of them back in the same spot, liven up the soil a bit by digging in some well-rotted manure, leaf-mould or hop manure.

One mistake too many people make is to plant lilies too deeply. Madonna lilies don't root from the stem, and the bulbs should be quite close to the surface.

I usually have the tops of the bulbs about three inches from the surface and roughly nine inches apart.

Another important job in the garden this month is keeping a wary eye open for any disease among your roses.



It's about now that if you're going to have any trouble, the first signs will be appearing, and if you spot something untowards, then give it your urgent attention.

If you see any mealy white blotches on the leaves, that's mildew. It can spread quickly to stems and flowers. You can get treatment for rose disease from your garden centre, but being a gardener in my latter years, I still use yellow sulphur powder, which I dust in the early morning when the foliage is covered with dew. Don't dust later in the day when the sun is up and it's warm or you may get some leaf scorch for your trouble.

Black spot among roses is a real curse, and it can be prevented by spraying with colloidal copper preparations from spring onwards. And make certain you wet the foliage well each time. Again, you can get special ready-prepared treatments from your nurseryman.

If your rose leaves are turning yellowish, then chances are it's chlorosis — the plant is suffering from a lack of iron.

Fork into the soil around each affected bush a 1 oz. dressing of sulphate of iron and repeat a month later. Or you can water on one of the many ready-made iron supplements that are available.

Finally, this month, while looking out for disease on your roses, take a look at your apple trees, too. You might spot white woolly patches on the branches, shoots or trunk. This is the woolly aphid and inside is a scarlet insect which causes wounds which can become infected with canker.

One very simple way to prevent this happening is to brush every patch with methylated spirit, or spray with a solution you can get from your garden centre. If you spray, use as much pressure as possible.

We thank all our committee who handled a very difficult task with great expertise on the night.

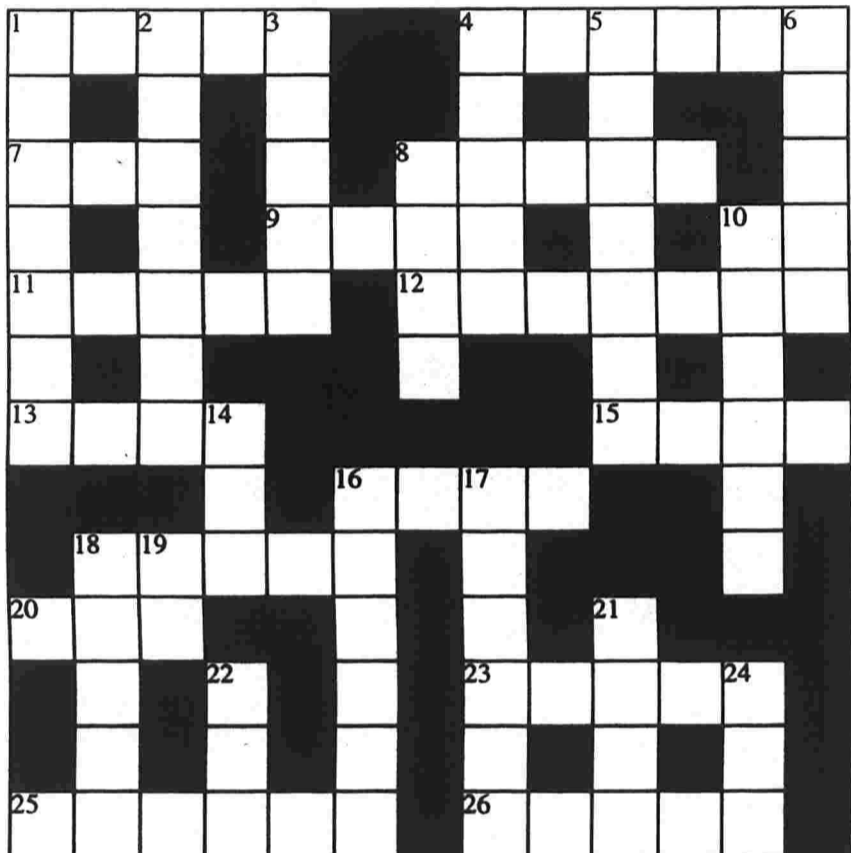

BREEDING

The bull should be out by the 14th July at the latest. Cows served on that date will calve down on the 20th April. With too many cows for quota be ruthless with late calvers. Aim to scan all cows 30 days later.

TILLAGE

SETASIDE MANAGEMENT

The green cover must be cut at least once during the period 15th July to 15th August to leave a covering of 10 cm or less. The cuttings must be left on the land and turning or baling of the cuttings is not permitted. If it is necessary to cut the green cover in the period 15th April to 15th July in order to control weeds or to maintain an acceptable visual appearance the cover should be cut as high as possible, preferably at a height of about 20 cms. Cutting should always be effected in such a way as to allow an escape route for wildlife.

FERTILISERS

Application of fertiliser (organic or inorganic) is allowed between 15th April and 31st October where there is an existing green cover, at levels which will not present an environmental hazard. Application of lime is permitted.

CO. WATERFORD I.C.M.S.A. NEWS

MILK TEMPORARY LEASING SCHEME

Mr. John Skehan, Chairman of County Waterford executive of I.C.M.S.A. welcomed the changes in the milk quota in temporary leasing scheme announced by Minister Ivan Yates.

The changes will take place in the second and third phases of the temporary leasing scheme. Priority will be given to milk suppliers under 35,000 gallons who were allocated quota over the last two years.

Any quota which remains after these allocations will go to producers in the 35,000 gallon to 55,000 gallon category and then if quota is still available it will go to producers with quota of 55,000 gallons and over.

The I.C.M.S.A. County Chairman said that it stands to reason that the smaller milk suppliers should be looked after first in any temporary leasing scheme and if milk is available then all suppliers can benefit.

B.S.E. RESCUE PACKAGE

I.C.M.S.A. welcomes the EU B.S.E. compensation package. However, the Chairman said that it falls well below the losses which farmers have suffered due to the B.S.E. About £57 million of the £70M compensation is earmarked for top ups on the suckler cow premium and the 10 and 22 month special beef premium. The remaining £13M will be allocated by the Irish government.

The County Chairman said that I.C.M.S.A. have lobbied the Minister on how best to compensate owners of heavy heifers and farmers who suffered losses with cull cows.

MILK QUOTA AND SUCKLER COW

The President of I.C.M.S.A. Mr. Frank Allen, has met the Minister for Agriculture, Ivan Yates in a bid to solve the problem that arises if a milk supplier who also has a suckler cow herd, exceeds the milk quota limit of 25,638 gallons by leasing thus forfeiting his suckler premium.

I.C.M.S.A. are seeking to have the 25,638 gallon quota limit increased to 35,000 gallons as the present limit is stopping small quota holders from expanding through temporary leasing.

Training For Farm Women Key To Success Of Rural Development

IFA Farm Family Committee Chairwoman, Joan Fitzpatrick has said that a national focus on providing a range of training options for farm women will play a key role in the future viability of the family farm.

Addressing Teagasc's Forum 2000 in Kildalton on the "Role of Women in Agriculture and Rural Development", Mrs. Fitzpatrick said "as well as contributing 27.5 per cent of the total work input on Irish farms, farm women deal with much of the business side of farming, such as record keeping and administrative work. Farm women need the assistance of bodies like Teagasc to provide the training for their role as farm partners in the area of farm accounts and family planning for the farm business and family. Where women need to work outside the farm to supplement family income, retraining is also of vital importance. Many farms in future will be driven by a greater demand for efficiency in traditional and alternative farm enterprises if they are to survive after the year 2000 and beyond, and women will play a key role in their success.

Mrs. Fitzpatrick wel-

comed Teagasc's announcement to provide one 20 hour course in every county specially for women and the incorporation of the Socio-Economic Advisory Service into the Rural Enterprise Service.

The Farm Family Chairwoman also told the Forum of the need to project a positive attitude to farming. "Farming as a career has a negative image amongst young people and most rural communities will not survive without agriculture as the mainstay. While farming as a career contains many uncertainties, the so-called "safe job for life" outside agriculture is also becoming very scarce," she said. Agriculture must be put back on the list of career options, and this first step would be to put the subject of agricultural science back on all school curriculums. What is needed is a co-ordinated approach starting in primary school, going right through to the career choice in secondary school.

— SAYS IFA WOMAN

Concluding Mrs. Fitzpatrick said "the three services of Teagasc; research, education and advice are

clearly central to the successful adaption to change by Irish agriculture and to future rural development.

IFA Gives Solution To Uncontrolled Forestry

IFA President John Donnelly, has said that the IFA had given the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Ivan Yates, a solution which would help to diffuse the problem which exists with unplanned and uncontrolled forestry in rural areas.

"The Association proposed to the Minister that notice of intent to plant would be a condition of grant eligibility for the forestry programme. This

system would mean farmers in the locality would be notified where land was intended for forestry and also provide them the opportunity to negotiate the purchase of part of the land before it is permanently removed from agriculture", said the IFA leader.

Waterford IFA chairman James Coughlan, said the Association has always been fully supportive of farm forestry development but not at the expense of mainstream agriculture and rural communities.

"Farmers are being constantly squeezed out of the land market and I urge the Minister to take on board this proposal which would go a long way to alleviate the problem", he stated.

Minister For Agriculture's Beef Deal Falls Far Short

Reacting to the beef deal in Luxembourg on Wednesday, June 28, Waterford County Chairman, James Coughlan, said the compensation package agreed by Agriculture Minister, Ivan Yates, fell far short of the compensation required by Irish beef producers whose incomes had been decimated by the British BSE crisis.

The IFA has calculated the losses which Irish livestock farmers will incur in 1996 at between £155m. and £230m. The Minister's package of £69m. is less than half the compensation required in a best-case scenario.

Mr. Coughlan said Winter finishers would be particularly disappointed with Minister Yates's compensation figure of over £50 per head.

"If the Minister had played his cards right at the negotiating table, he could have got close to £100 per head for Winter Finishers who sold between March 25 and June 9."

The Waterford Chairman welcomed the Minister's response to the IFA campaign for heifer compensation and he said young bulls and live exports would have to be included in the national envelope of compensation. "All beef heifers, young bulls and live exports sold between mid-March and early-June must receive premium compensation," he said.

Mr. Coughlan said: "In the final analysis, Winter Finishers have been let down by the Minister." He stressed: "Winter Finishers were in the front line of the

BSE crisis with very severe losses in the first half of the year. Winter fatteners who depend solely on the Winter slaughter premium will feel very aggrieved at the outcome."

Mr. Coughlan called for strong measures to restore consumer confidence and rebuild European beef consumption. He called on the Tanaiste and Minister for Foreign Affairs, Dick Spring, to undertake an immediate Ministerial mission to Iran and secure the full reopening of all third country beef and live cattle export markets.

Mr. Coughlan pointed out that the increase on both the 10 and 22 month Special Beef Premium of £19.08 per head will be worth a total of £35.48m., based on 1995 applications and expected payments. The £22.40 per head increase in the Suckler Cow Premium will be worth £20.27m. on over 900,000 beef cows, bringing the total increase in Special Beef and Suckler Cow Premiums to £55.75m.

In addition, Mr. Coughlan pointed out that there is £13.37m. in special measure payments which will be targeted at Winter fatteners and most likely on the 235,000 steers, heifers, young bulls and live exports sold between March 25 and June 9. "This would only provide compensation of £55 per head on these animals, which is totally inadequate. Teagasc has already calculated that the losses in this period were close to £150 per head."

TALLOW G.A.A. CLUB NOTES

Hurling Skills

Hurling's enduring attraction is a composite of many things: the speed of the game, the frequency of scoring, the manliness of the exchanges, the excitement it generates, the ability to control and use possession profitably which it exhibits. Above any other of its characteristics it is the 125 (roughly) individual skills of the game which set it apart from all other field games. It is extremely unlikely that any present-day player in the country has even half of those 125 skills at his command. But then he doesn't need them all or even half of them. No hurler does and it would be virtually impossible to find time to practise them. Far better to give adequate attention to say, eight or ten skills which must be used in every game and master them. But even that takes up a big proportion of training time so it is only those hurlers who practise outside of the regular team sessions who achieve a high standard.

What promoted those reflections was the All Ireland Skills competition of Feile na nGael. It is just possible that some counties (though they would need to be removed from the mainstream of civilisation) don't know about it even though it has been an integral part of every Feile for 26 years. Every county in Ireland was contacted will in advance of Feile and issued with all relevant literature. It seems that 13 counties care little about skills since only 19 counties were represented at the finals. Can it be possible after all the years of promotional work nationwide and the setting up of coaching structures within all counties that hurling skills have such little or no appeal for the boys in Cavan, Cork, Derry, Donegal, Leitrim, Longford, Louth, Mayo, Monaghan, Roscommon, Sligo, Tipperary and Tyrone? I have been in most of these counties at one time or another and know only too well that their hurlers, their young hurlers especially, have as much love of and interest in the game as those of the other nineteen. In fact there is no county in Ireland, even the weakest, where a handful of skilled perform-

ers can't be found.

I know Patsy Murphy of Dundalk, as fluent a striker of the ball as I've seen. Playing with Louth he could pick off points from a variety of ranges and positions and would shine in any company. Joe Henry was a brilliant forward with Mayo who showed in a League match in Dungarvan some years ago why he was such a celebrated hurler. Peter Stevenson of Derry won an All Star award at football before falling in love with hurling and distinguishing himself in the hurling teams of Derry and Ulster. No, it is an indictment of over 40% of our County Boards or Bord na nOg that lads were denied the chance to compete against their peers in a test of hurling skills. It was the Board's responsibility to encourage and promote the primacy of skill and to allow some by the significant honour of representing his county on a national stage, an honour which any young lad would treasure.

Isn't it incredible that Cork and Tipperary for all their record number of Munster and All Ireland titles in minor, under 21, junior and senior hurling, for all of the generous sponsorship which they enjoy, for all of that huge investment which they have made in coaching and for all of their high profile nationally couldn't ensure that one boy was in Waterford on one afternoon in June to uphold the honour of his county? Surely this must constitute a serious dereliction of duty or are they so insensitive to a boy's love of skills and the enjoyment he derives from exercising it.

Waterford, whatever its other failings, has always been represented at the Feile Skills Competition and has done pretty well over the last quarter of a century. Shane Aherne, Ferrybank, was our first winner before David Kiely, Melleray, later defeated all comers to prove himself the most skilled hurler in Ireland. We came very close a few more times and Tallow lads Stephen Curley and James Murray were the unlucky ones in recent years; they failed narrowly in their bid for All-Ireland success. The point anyway is that no boy should be denied this dis-

tingtion because of official indifference or lack of interest. To think that our most northerly county, Antrim, sent Vincent Leiters the best part of 300 miles while two of our honours-laden near neighbours ignored the whole affair.

Speaking of Antrim and Vincent who represented them didn't he do very well, being second, just two points adrift of the winner. But then that should be no great surprise because anyone who was ever in Antrim knows of their passion for hurling, the warmth of their welcome for hurling men, their pride in their native game and their eagerness to learn more. They like the game seriously and always did. I have very clear recollection of a National League game, Antrim V Waterford many years ago in Loughill (the most northerly pitch in Ireland, near Ballycastle). We had an almost full strength side and had no intention of allowing Antrim to beat us so we didn't lack ambition or motivation. At the call of time only a goal separated us after a close hard game. In fact, the defence was quite busy and the goalie lucky to thwart Seamus Richmond right on time. Seamus found a gap, soloed in closely pursued by Jackie Condon until he was on the edge of the square. He elected to make a handpass into the corner on his right only for the goalie, diving to his left to turn it round the post. A forward in a similar situation nowadays would boot the ball giving the goalie no chance. Later that year Waterford brought the McCarthy Cup to the Deises for the second time.

Vincent Leiters standard bearer of Antrim didn't hail from Cushandall or Loughiel or St. John's. He was from what would be regarded as a very unfashionable club in Antrim, Tir na nOg (no, Oisín wasn't his great grand uncle) but he was a lovely striker of the ball. He secured full marks in Skill 3 and again in Skill 4. Skill obliges a player to lift, catch and strike over the bar. Two sliotars are placed on the 35 metre line. The competitor runs, jab lifts the sliotar, catches it in his hand and strikes for a point. This sequence is per-

formed from the left and from the right, six marks for each successful attempt. Each sliotar may be placed by the competitor, one opposite each goalpost. The crucial element in the performance of this test is that he must run and keep running until he has struck. Some lads jogged, others halted in their stride just before striking so in those cases no mark was awarded. Hurling coaches should advise lads to always strike across the ball. Hitting under the sliotar imparts backspin and slice so it slows and misses the target. Another reminder to competitors is to use their 4 steps profitably while the ball is in the hand before striking it. Those 4 strides give time to look at the posts something you will notice every good hurler doing before shooting. Vincent's two frees were lovely efforts and in each case he made sure to follow through. Had he succeeded with one more lifted sliotar (sideline cut) or penalty he would have won the competition.

Skill 4, freetaking, earned Vincent maximum marks also. Here the taker places two sliotars on the 45 metres line, one opposite each goalpost. Four points are awarded for each point scored. Each time Vincent's lift was good (essential), that is high enough to allow the shoulders to turn thus enabling a full swing to be made. His follow through was smooth and high. Many competing players lashed the ball too hard, an obvious temptation and drove it right and wide. Interestingly, Mike Houlihan of Limerick was in splendid isolation around midfield in the second half of that momentous Clare/Limerick game, when he snapped a clearancer. Under no pressure he lashed, it unmercifully and it sailed high and wide to the right. On the Tallow team of 1984/85 was a powerful hitter of the ball. Mick Beecher, centre back. Mick was an immensely strong fully committed performer who often hit the ball too hard. Whenever he took a 70 I tried to position myself near enough for him to hear me. It isn't a long pook, Mick. Lift it well, hit it early, have

a big long follow through and keep your head still: Free takers could do worse than follow that advice whether Billy Ormonde of Lismore, Mick Jacob of Wexford, Tony Keady of Galway or any other master of that skill, they all had that calm controlled striking of what is not, in truth, a long pook anyway.

Another thing about free taking or just lifting is the absolute necessity to concentrate on each constituent part of the skill properly. Unlike lifting the ball all attention should focus on that alone. Only when the ball is well lifted can the other movements be properly executed. Remember Gary Kirby's fluffed lift when his mind raced ahead of the action? A missed free resulted. Muscular Contracting Treatments

Muscle toning treatments are probably one of the most popular body treatments in the salon. It is the reduction of inches without exercising. There are many different types of machines available but they all help to reshape the figure and reduce inches. They may be used to tone muscles as part of a weight loss programme, or to return a waistline after pregnancy. However it is not advis-

able to have treatment for about three months after pregnancy. Thighs and buttocks may also be reduced if they are out of proportion or it may be used to rebuild poor muscle tone due to lack of exercise. Using muscle toning machines, muscles may be exercised in groups or individually. Pads are placed on the origin or insertion of the muscle. When the pads or electrodes are placed on the muscle a current is applied and contracts the muscles.

The current is then interrupted which relaxes the muscles, this helps to prevent muscle fatigue or discomfort. This can be a quite relaxing treatment but regular treatment is required to achieve the desired effect. As well as toning muscles, blood circulation is improved and the removal of waste products is hastened. Muscle toning treatment is an ideal way to maintain a firm figure and to prevent the accumulation of excess inches.

Menus for the week



Summer Fish Soup

Preparation: 15 minutes
Cooking: approx 45 mins
Serves: 4.

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 garlic clove, peeled and chopped
- 1 onion, peeled and chopped
- 2 celery stalks, sliced
- 3 tbsp freshly chopped flat-leaf parsley
- 1 (400g/14 oz) can chopped tomatoes
- 1 tbsp tomato puree
- 300ml/1/2 pt dry white wine
- 300ml/1/2 pt fish stock
- 100g/4 oz squid, cleaned and cut into rings
- 225g/8 oz monkfish
- 225g/8 oz haddock
- 175g/6 oz large peeled prawns, thawed if frozen
- crusty bread to serve

Heat the oil in a large pan and fry the garlic, onion and celery for 3-4 minutes until softened. Stir in 2 tbsp of the parsley and cook for 1 minute. Add the canned tomatoes, tomato puree, wine and fish stock to the pan and bring to the boil. Reduce heat, cover and simmer for 15 minutes. Add the squid to the

tomato mixture and cook for 10 minutes. Cut the monkfish and haddock into large chunks and add to the pan with the prawns. Stir once, cover and simmer for 10-15 minutes until the fish is cooked through. Spoon the soup into a large serving bowl and garnish with the remaining parsley. Serve with crusty bread.

Singapore Noodles

Serves 2

- 4oz (125g) thin round egg noodles
- 2 tablespoons sesame oil
- 2 cloves garlic, peeled and crushed
- 1 red or green chilli, deseeded, sliced
- 1/2in (1cm) piece fresh ginger chopped
- 2 small carrots, cut into fine sticks
- 2oz (60g) mangetout
- 3 spring onions, chopped
- 1 level teaspoon curry powder/paste
- 2 tablespoons light soy sauce

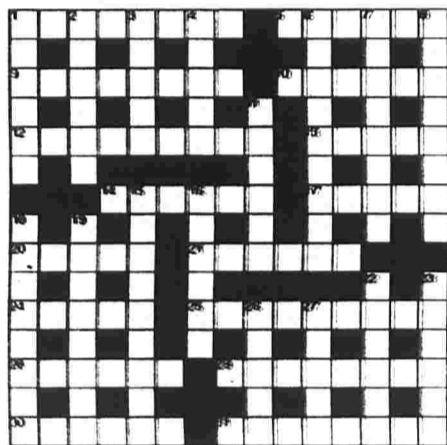
2 tablespoons hoisin sauce
Good handful of rocket or spinach leaves
1 tablespoon sesame seeds, toasted

METHOD
Cook noodles according to packet instructions. Drain, then toss in 1 tablespoon sesame oil in a wok or pan, add the garlic, chilli and ginger and stir-fry for a minute. Add the vegetables, mix in, then add the curry powder or paste and stir fry for 3-4 minutes until the vegetables are just cooked. Add then noodles, soy and hoisin sauces, and 2 tablespoons water, then add the rocket or spinach and cook for another minute or two. Serve hot, sprinkled with toasted sesame seeds. Accompany with a bowl of flavoured soy sauce.

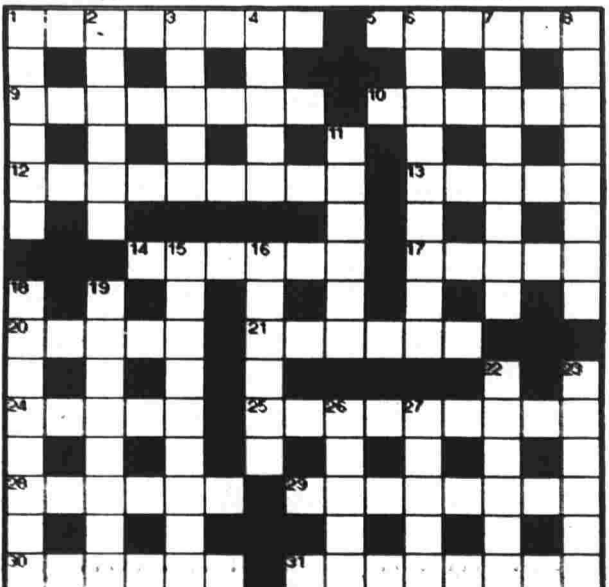

Household Tips

CHILDREN'S SEIZURES

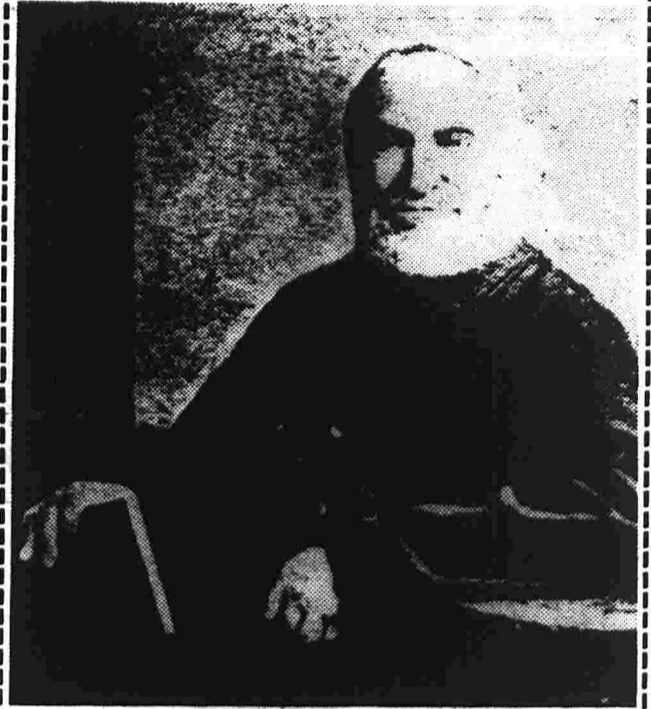

Dear Editor

Now that the dust has settled and we are returning to normality following a feast of hurling, camogie and handball during Feile na nGael, I would like to express my personal thanks to the many people responsible for a Feile of excellence which, not only caught the imagination of the county but the country. Many tributes have been paid to me, as Chairman of the Waterford Executive Committee, for the success of Feile, I want to state publicly that I was only a small cog in a big wheel and there are others who also deserve special mention. The organisation of Feile na nGael was an immense task to undertake and were it not for the commitment and dedication of the various sub-committees and clubs throughout the county it would not have been the resounding success it obviously was.

Our Secretary, Denis Hanrahan, did tremendous work, ensuring that all clubs were kept fully aware of progress and verifying that the numerous forms were circulated, completed by the clubs and returned to Feile Headquarters in Croke Park within the allotted timescale. He was always in control of the situation and dealt with the many minor problems which arose from time to time in his own indefatigable way. Denis was a pleasure to work with and he deserves the highest accolades for his major contribution to the success of Feile.

In charge of Programmes and P.R.O. were Pat Moore and his team and those who have seen the programme cannot but be impressed by the document itself and its contents. The consensus of opinion of those in the know is that the programme was the best yet. The Feile Mass is an integral part of Feile na nGael and the organisation was undertaken by Father Brendan Crowley, Parish Priest of Newtown and Kill. The chief celebrant was the Most Rev. William Lee, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, accompanied by many concele-

All handballers, some 140 in all, were accommodated in the College and all competitions were concluded within the allotted time as were skills competitions. I compliment Brother Spring and his committee for their marvellous input and I am confident that handball in Waterford will flourish under their expert guidance and tuition.

Another integral part of Feile na nGael is camogie and responsibility for planning and organising camogie games rested with Maria Pollard and her committee. With only nine camogie clubs in the county it was necessary for Maria to seek assistance elsewhere. Kilkenny obliged by affiliating five teams under the Waterford banner and Wexford, one team. These teams volunteered to accommodate visiting teams which resulted in 32 teams taking part in camogie. Maria Pollard and her committee undertook total responsibility for camogie and I am indebted to them for their commitment and hard work. I also wish to convey my thanks to the Kilkenny and Wexford clubs who came to our assistance and, who knows, we may return the compliment one day.

The skills committee under the chairmanship of Ned Power, were responsible for organising and running the Waterford Skills competition and the National Skills. With men like Shane Ahearn, Paul Flynn and others on his committee there was no shortage of skills expertise. The fact that both competitions ran smoothly reflects the detailed preparations and I thank Ned Power and his committee for their assistance.

In the days leading up to the Feile na nGael week-end, primary schools throughout the county were visited by many of the dignitaries from Croke Park and some of our intercounty hurlers. The committee charged with organising these visits was chaired by Brother Griffey. He and his committee worked tirelessly to ensure that schools were kept fully in the picture and he must have been pleased with the result.

Brother Griffey also organised the Primary Schools' Quiz which was a huge success. The Quizmaster at the final in the Park Hotel was Micheal O Muirceartaigh and a great night was had by all the children who were plied with lashings of Coca Cola throughout. It was a most enjoyable night for those who attended and it reflects on the hard work put in by Brother Griffey and his committee and I compliment them for their input.

At this juncture, I want to convey my thanks to the teachers and Boards of Management of the numerous Primary Schools visited. Many schools included items of music, song and dance in their programmes whilst others demonstrated hurling skills, etc. and it was obvious that considerable preparation had been carried out. It was an ideal opportunity for children to see at first hand the senior officials from Croke Park and some of the inter-county players. The visitors were impressed by the interest displayed and were complimentary of the work being done in the schools.

The Stewards Committee under the chairmanship of John O'Leary was responsible for nominating and briefing stewards for Feile,

CO. BOARD MEETING

P.J. Ryan presided at last week's Senior Board meeting

FINANCE

Tony Morrissey, treasurer gave an update on the financial position of the Board and said that revenue was slow coming in because of the way the championships in hurling were running. He said until the championship proper commences, the big crowds of last year won't come to our grounds. He felt very confident that last year's receipts will be equalled if not surpassed when we get going. He told the meeting that the cost to-date of running the county teams was £39,170.

The chairman stated that the present policy of keeping our finances under control would have to continue until we get down our overdraft and start operating on a break even situation...

DEISE DRAW

The committee chairman, Declan O' Meara said that the response to the special meeting of club officers which had been organised by the county chairman, was most disappointing and had yielded far less new membership than was expected. A long discussion ensued and many delegates gave their views. The idea of putting a levy on clubs was mentioned, but the feeling which came across didn't seem to favour this course. Declan O' Meara and the county chairman pointed out that the clubs have given a clear undertaking that they would play their part in clearing the county development debt within the specified time and now they have a responsibility in honouring that pledge. A further appeal was made to clubs to canvass additional members and bring their numbers on a par with the previous year's draw.

NO UMPIRES

Brendan Tobin, P.R.O. came out very strong in complaining about referees who turned up at venues without umpires and linesmen. He said that this situation led to all kinds of problems and he instanced situations where trouble had arisen as a result of non-neutral officials being in control. A discussion followed and other delegates contributed.

It was pointed out also that the boards have their own problems in getting referees and referees are doing so many games now, that they experience their own problems about getting their sub-

ordinate officials to attend games. It was decided to bring the complaint to the notice of the referees body.

SELECTION COMMITTEE REPORTS

Reports from the various selection committees were read and discussed and the county chairman thanked the selectors whose term of office was ending and expressed good wishes to the teams who were still left in the championships. When reference was made to the recent interviews on W.L.R. re the senior hurling, the feeling was that these matters would be best dealt with at Board meetings. The Chairman said he was sorry that Tony Mansfield had taken umbrage at what he had said, as he had the highest regard for him and everyone appreciated the tremendous work done by him on behalf of the Board over a very long number of years. He said they would remain good friends. Apart from the interview referred to W.L.R. came under fire from a number of delegates for their policy of giving a platform to anonymous callers, to criticise the G.A.A. on occasions.

The feeling was that the comments related to the Billy McCarthy programme which regularly accept comments from 'Mary' from Bonmahon, 'Johnnie' from Tramore, 'Biddy' from Dungarvan, etc. and other faceless individuals who make sure that they cannot be identified.

The decision of the Munster Council to bring the senior and junior football matches against Waterford, forward to Saturday was complained about and here the chairman explained that it was because of Feile that the games were changed. The meeting unanimously agreed to request the Council not to fix games to clash with the Feile next year. There was some criticism of the 'home and away' agreement where weekday underage games were fixed for distant venues. This matter also will be looked into.

PROGRAMME RETURNS

Brendan Tobin, on behalf of the Communications committee handed over a cheque for £1,500 to the Board and for which the committee were thanked.

CENTRAL COUNCIL REPORT

In this, the following matters were referred to — an

increase of 8% in our allocation of All Ireland final tickets this year; the divide of the Sponsorship money from Croke Park; the playing of the hurling league within the calendar year; the building of the Museum under the New Cusack Stand; the changes in Rule 41, which allows players to travel to the U.S.A. and information on phase 2 of the Croke Park development.

MUNSTER COUNCIL REPORT

Jimmy O' Gorman said that the Munster Council had expressed total satisfaction with Walsh Park and the arrangements for the games on June 2nd. He also gave details of future fixtures, etc.

THE MAHER

DISASTER FUND

James Tobin referred to the terrible tragedy in Laois which had resulted in the loss of so many lives when the fire went out of control. He said that in the circumstances, he felt sure that every G.A.A. club in the county would be glad to contribute, or even to initiate a special fund set up by us,

to relieve the awful problems facing the members of the family who had survived. He suggested £10 or £20 per club. Delegates agreed to discuss the matter at club level.

Western Board Meeting

Greg Fives, Vice Chairman, presided at last week's meeting of the Western Board which took place at Lawlor's Hotel.

At the outset, he explained that he was acting chairman in the unavoidable absence of Paddy Walsh who is presently recovering from a recent illness. He continued by expressing the good wishes of the Board to Paddy and James Walsh and John Joe Scanlon.

MINUTES

The minutes of the previous meeting were adopted.

CORRESPONDENCE

A letter from Kilrossanty Club referred to a Board referee, who they did not want to have officiating at any of their games in future or have him handle games being played at their grounds.

James Tobin said that a similar letter had been before the County Board and it was the unanimous wish of the delegates that the club be asked to withdraw it. John Kiely, Kilrossanty, said his club would be meeting on Tuesday when the request would be considered. The Chairman remarked that this was not a nice type of communication to come before the Board.

Ballyduff Club were given permission to run the Michael Quirke Memorial Seven A side tournament and Stradbally got approval

for the Alo Curran benefit football tournament on Sunday August 4.

This tournament will involve Brickey Rangers versus a Faha selection and in the second match, Stradbally will play a county fifteen, hopefully comprising of a player from each of the remaining 15 senior clubs.

WITHDRAWAL

A letter from Ballinwillin football club informed the Board that they had decided to withdraw from the junior 'B' football championship. The Board expressed regret that the club found it necessary to take this course.

LETTER RE: FRAHER FIELD

A letter to the Board Secretary concerning a Fraher Field matter gave rise to a long discussion about the control of children in the dug-outs on the stand. The letter expressed concern about the manner in which young children were let loose on the stand and exposed to danger when climbing on the protection walls and railings, etc.

Paddy Fitzgerald, Dungarvan, said that this whole business was a matter of serious concern to both the County and Western Boards and if immediate action is not taken, there could be a serious accident. Noel Fleming said he was aware of an instance where the field shop was in danger of being raid-

ed by a couple of non patrons and how their plans became unstuck when he was able to intervene.

Nioclás MacCraith told about the damage being done to the dressing rooms by players kicking a football against the walls and doors. He said that the field committee had brought this to the attention of clubs using the rooms, but it didn't stop.

Other members spoke on the subject of indiscipline among the youth, in particular and Tom Doyle, Tallow, referred to the constant use of bad language but did not know what can be done to halt this unwelcome trend.

Roger Casey, Colligan, proposed that the Board request the Fraher Field Committee to furnish the four dressing rooms with a table which was badly needed. The chairman said that this was an excellent proposal and he asked that the field committee take in on board.

Delegates complained about the National Anthem tape which is played at Fraher Field for important games. It was described as unsuitable.

Brendan Tobin, P.R.O., said it was the official Croke Park recording of the anthem and he was surprised to hear such a complaint. After some further discussion, Nioclás MacCraith said that he would supply a tape of the Anthem for use in the grounds.

At the end of the discussion it was agreed that parents taking their children to Fraher Field were totally responsible for their safety and that the grounds committee or the Boards were not liable if an accident occurred. It was decided to ask parents taking children to the field to exercise proper control.

The matter of appointing stewards for matches which attracted big attendances was mentioned by the chairman and he undertook to look into this matter.

REFEREES' REPORTS

Arising out of these, a number of players were suspended for the minimum. A report of a game where a player was sent off for abusing the referee after the game was debated for some time. The game in question was the junior football championship tie between Geraldines and An Rinn. The player reported was Seamus McGrath, but his

club informed the meeting that no such player was on their team on the date in question. The matter was referred to the referee for clarification. The Board, on the proposition of James Tobin gave the officer board the authority to deal with the players who were to appear in answer to charges of indiscretions.

DISQUALIFICATIONS TO BE RECONSIDERED

James Tobin, Shamrocks and Paddy Fitzgerald, Dungarvan both made impassioned pleas to the Board to have their teams reinstated to the respective championships.

James Tobin said his club had been informed that they were being removed because of their failure to field in the under 21 football against Kilrossanty. He said their problems were very genuine and being required to play three games within a very short time was beyond the capabilities of the club who were limited in numbers. He also spoke about the problems being encountered today in trying to keep hurling and football going in small clubs.

Paddy Fitzgerald, spoke about the disqualification of their minor hurling team, who could not field because 9 of their players were due to travel away on the same day to play a colleges match. He told of the history of the correspondence with the Board on the matter. Eamon O Mairtin confirmed that the players were required for the school team on the day. Several delegates spoke in support of having the teams reinstated and on a proposition both cases were referred back to the officer board, who would take into consideration the sentiments expressed by the delegates.

GAMES OFF

The Secretary, Anthony Walsh, said that all the Boards had agreed to cancel all games for Friday and Saturday in order that supporters of the minor hurling team would be free to travel to Thurles in support. This was accepted by all the clubs, but that no re-fixtures would be made until after we had played the under 21 semi final against Clare on July 10.

John Kiely, Kilrossanty, agreed that the matches should go off, but said he had to comment on the fact that last year when Waterford played Cork in senior and junior football, hurling championships were played all over the county.

A total of 36 delegates were present at the meeting.

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**Council Mourns Death
Of Veronica Guerin**

Investigative journalist Veronica Guerin of the 'Sunday Independent' who was murdered in cold blood last week, was mourned in every corner of the county last Monday, not least at the AGM of Waterford Co. Council.

A minute's silence was observed by all members and officials at the outset of the meeting.

Newly elected Chairman, Cllr. Gary O'Halloran later broke with long established tradition of post AGM celebratory drinks to alternatively make a token presentation of a small cheque to the Independent Newspaper Group. In the absence of any 'Independent' reporter at the meet-

ing, Cllr. O'Halloran presented the cheque to John A. Murphy of 'The Examiner'.

The money, he said, can be added to the fund already being accumulated by the Independent Group as a reward to find Mrs. Guerin's killer.

Describing the late reporter as a brave warrior, Cllr. O'Halloran said he was utterly appalled and disgusted at political 'knee jerk' reactions to the killing. "It sullies the memory of Veronica Guerin", he declared.

To further honour her memory, the new Chairman said he would not undertake any official duties for the remainder of the day.

**ATTACK ON
DEMOCRACY**

Veronica Guerin wrote about the sordid aspects of Irish society - the murders, drug dealing and crime. She helped familiarise the public with this shadowy underworld as her articles unveiled the dealings of crime lords and their lieutenants.

Her determination, courage and sheer independence as a crime reporter was duly rewarded last December when she won the prestigious International Press Freedom Award.

The murder of Veronica Guerin represents an attack on democracy as a whole. Swift, remedial action must now be brought to bear on the cowardly culprits in the form of stringent laws and a complete overhaul of the outmoded justice system.

To Veronica's husband Graham and her son Cathal, we extend our deepest sympathy.
