The new development of the hospital, which has been in the pipeline for the last 25 years, will also include the construction of day care and out-patient facilities.



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Funding Given To Health Board Under Waiting List Initiative

Brian O'Shea T.D., Minister of State at the Department of Health has announced that £480,000 has been provided to the South Eastern Health Board under the Waiting List Initiative for hospitals in the Health Board area.

Minister O'Shea stated that the activity carried out under the Initiative will be in addition to the baseline workload of the hospitals involved and will be of significant benefit to the people of the South Eastern Health Board area in further improving access to hospital services.

Know Your Rights

I am working presently - temporary and full-time. I am pregnant. What am I entitled to?

The Maternity Protection Act '94 provides protection to all employees who are pregnant - there is no service qualification.

Employees are entitled to 14 weeks Maternity Leave. When an employee takes Maternity Leave she must take a minimum of 4 weeks before the last day of the week during which the baby is expected to be born and 4 weeks after this date.

In order to avail of this leave, written notification must be given to the employer at least 4 weeks in advance of the first day of the Maternity Leave stating the day on which the Maternity Leave is due to start. Under the Act there is provision for additional Maternity Leave, ante natal and post natal visits, Health & Safety Leave, maintenance of employment rights during leave, and the right to return to

Further information is available from the Department of Equality & Law Reform, 43-49 Mespil Road, Dublin 4, Tel. 01-6670344, or the Employment Equality Agency, 36, Upper Mount Street, Dublin 2, Tel. 01-6605966, which has a leaflet on all aspects of an employee's rights.

Social Welfare has responsibility for payments to those people who are paying Class A contributions (earning over £30 a week). In order to qualify for Maternity Benefit you must be working and have at least 39 weeks paid PRSI in the 12 months immediately before the first day of your Maternity Leave, or 39 weeks paid since you first started working and 39 weeks paid or credited in the relevant income tax year (for 1996 the tax year is April '94 to April '95, or April '95 to April '96).

Your weekly rate of payment is 70% of your average earnings in the relevant income tax year (subject to a ceiling of £12,100). The minimum payment is £75.70 and maximum £162.80 per week. There is a Social Welfare leaflet on Maternity Benefit SWII available from your local Social Welfare Office.

Concluding the matter, Council Chairman Cllr. Gary O'Halloran said the £300 charge was a matter which neither the members or the executive officials of the Council have any power over.


£120,000 Well Designed **Houses in Tallow**



Make Sure You're In The Pink By Taking Plenty Of Cuttings

It is a good time to increase your stock of pinks by taking cuttings: and it's so easy to do. Yes, I know pinks can be increased by root division, but it's always a good thing to propagate new shoots so as to get a fresh show of them later.

You can take cuttings of pinks of the hardy perennial, double and single types. Choose vigorous, short-jointed growths and cut from immediately below a joint, round about 2-3 ins. long. Pull off any leaves that may be growing a half inch or so from the bottom of the stem.

The best place to root your cuttings is on a north border or in some other cool position where the soil is well

drained (a cold frame would be ideal). Prepare the soil by mixing half a bucketful of sand with each square yard.

Plant the cuttings about 2 ins. apart, deep enough to keep the lower leaves just clear of the soil. They should root quite readily.



But if you want to increase your stock of border or outdoor carnations, they are not as easy as pinks — although you might be lucky and get a few to strike as cuttings. Trouble is, they are usually too slow to form

No, the best way with camations is to layer them, and now is an excellent time to do it. Layering keeps them partly attached to the parent plant until they have made their own roots and can continue to grow on their own.

I've explained how to layer before, but in case you missed it, here's what you do.

First loosen the soil around the main plant and mix in a handful or two of sand.

Select a young, healthy side shoot, strip the leaves from the centre of it and, with a sharp knife, make a half-inch cut in the lower side through a leaf-joint.

Bend this part gently into the soft sandy earth below and peg it firmly into the soil. Cover up, so that all you now have showing above the earth is the leafy end of the shoot.

Water well and soon roots will start to go down from the cut so that, around September, you will be able to sever the layer from the parent plant, lift it and pot it for the winter.

SUBSTANTIAL DECLINE IN RECORDED SUICIDES **SINCE 1994**

In figures supplied by Minister of State at the Department of Health, Brian O'Shea, T.D., a substantial decline in recorded suicides in Waterford City and County in the last two years has been noted.

Minister O'Shea provided the following breakdown in respect of deaths from suicide, both male and female, in Waterford City and County in the last 5 years.

In 1991 there were 6 recorded suicides (all male): in 1992 there was a total of 14 suicides (9 male, 5 female) while in 1993 there were 22 suicides (15 male, 7 female). In the last two years however the numbers of recorded suicides have declined to 14 in 1994 and nine last year.

The Minister commented that the decline in recorded suicides in County Waterford, including the city, in the last two years, from 22 in 1993 to 9 in 1995, is all the more significant when viewed against the overall national picture for the same period which saw recorded suicides rise from 361 to 383.

Mr O'Shea added that in order to address the growing problem of suicide in Ireland, his colleague the Minister for Health, established a Task Force on Suicide in November 1995, with wide ranging terms of reference to examine the reasons for these suicides.

"The Task Force is already well advanced in preparing an interim report, in which they will quantify and define the nature of the suicide problem in Ireland. The rest of 1996 will then be devoted to a major consultative process involving all interested parties and leading to the formulation of a prevention/reduction strategy. The Task Force has already invited submissions from all interested members of the public, statutory and voluntary organisations," Mr.O'Shea said.

Newsagents. All of these spaces are served by a wheelchair ramp for easy access to the footpath and are strictly for disabled drivers only. The fifth dis-abled driver space is located on the left of the entrance to the car park at Davitt's Quay and is also served by a wheelchair ramp onto the footpath. Each of these parking spaces is easily identified by the international disabled driver sign, located on the ground. Cllr. Tony Wright said the

problem of able bodied drivers parking on reserved spaces is a national problem and disabled drivers basically depend on the generosity of the motorist involved.

Bruton Criticised Over Failure To Keep Promise

A Fine Gael member of Waterford County Council has criticised her own party over failure to honour the commitment given by the Taoiseach John Bruton to license Community TV.

Speaking at a recent Council meeting, Cllr. Nora Flynn said she was disappointed that she had to raise the issue but "promises made were not kept". She claimed that in 1995 on a visit to Cork, Mr. Bruton had promised to license Community TV as part of Fine Gael policy.

Cllr. Flynn said that the exclusive license given to microwave tv reduces competition and the granting of a temporary license to Community TV would end the monopoly.

She subsequently proposed that the Council call on the Minister for Transport, Energy and Communications, Michael Lowry (FG) to license Community TV as promised by Mr. Bruton.

Her proposal was seconded by Clir. Tom Cunningham who said that community reflectors in his area are doing a great job.

NATIONAL SAFETY COUNCIL

Swimming But Not Drowning

With this spell of good cohol and never swim alone. weather, many of us will be Swim within your depth and heading to the beach, lake or pool at the weekend. The National Safety Council asks everyone to take care when he/she is in, or near, water. Last summer more than 30 people drowned accidentally.

Drinking alcohol before going swimming has been a factor in many cases of male drownings and the Council particularly asks men to be aware of this danger.

Knowing the hazards will help to avoid putting lives at risk. Pay attention to signs near water warning of specific dangers. Never swim after eating or consuming alparallel to the shore. Don't swim out after anything drifting. If possible, always swim in an area supervised by lifeguards. Heed their warnings and obey the flags.

Red and yellow flags mean that the area between these flags is under the supervision of lifeguards. Red flag means that conditions are too dangerous for swimming and no flag means no lifeguard.

The Council advises parents that children near water must be supervised all the time. A small child can drown in just a few inches

Dosing:- With fresh aftergrass becoming available, dose calves for worms before moving to graze these pastures. The common anthelmintics are adequate at this stage. There is no need to use very expensive

SUCKLER CALVES

Dosing:- Where the suckling herd is being moved to fresh pasture, it is also an opportune time to dose the suckled calves at this stage, the spring-born sucklers are increasing their grass intake rapidly and are therefore likely to pick up more worm infestation, although not as much as bucket-reared calves because the calf stocking rate is not as high. However, with intensive suckling, the worm burden in suckled calves can become significant at this stage. Hoose can also develop, so watch out for coughing and treat if necessary.

Creep Grazing: From August onwards, the suckler cow will give less milk and grass becomes increasingly more important to the diet of the calf therefore, it is a good practice to provide a creep grazing for the calves

SECOND CUT SILAGE

The second cut silage campaign is now getting into full swing. It is vital to be extra vigilant in the control

With high water temperature in streams and rivers and low water levels, even very small quantities of effluent can result in fish kills. Fish are very sensitive to anything that even marginally lowers the availability of water oxygen in present conditions. Do not sail too close to the wind in relation to storage capacity. Be especially vigilant at least until peak flow rates have passed. If tank space is limited, it can easily overflow during this period.

SHEEP

Fly Strike:— August is usually the worst month for fly strike. It is pointless trying to get by through treating individual animals. Where strikes are occurring, dipping or pour-on treatment is the only remedy.

Grass:— Tighten up the stocking rate of weaned ewes so that the lambs will have access to an adequate supply of quality grass.

Cobalt:— The lambs require to be dosed with Cobalt on many farms depending on soil type.

Water:- It is a mistaken belief that sheep do not require water, just like other farm animals. They are not camels. Make sure they have access to a plentiful supply of clean water.

Waterford ICMSA *lews*

Mr. John Skehan, Chairman of County Waterford Executive of ICMSA welcomed the ICMSA initiative in seeking an appeals sys-tem so that farmers are not unfairly penalised or disqualified entirely from the REPS scheme.

Mr. Maurice Harvey, Chairman of the ICMSA Farm Services Committee, said that some of the REPS

compliance checks are subject to different interpretation. For example, it is difficult in all cases to determine whether or not a farm boundary is stock-proof, yet a penalty of up to £500 will apply if the REPS inspector feels that a boundary is not stock-proof.

Based on Department inspection to-date, Mr. Harvey said that 21 per cent of REPS farm inspections involve some penalty and the average penalty is 25 per cent of the annual payment

"If this continues the Department will clawback over £2m. from farmers this year by way of REPS penalties,

Farmers should be able to formally appeal against any REPS penalty that is recommended by a REPS Inspector. The current arrangement by which a farmer has seven days to put his case in writing is grossly inadequate and unfair, he said.

Mr. Harvey expressed the hope that the level of penalties would fall as the specifications were clarified by the Department. "Furthermore, I believe that a system which allows a farmer a time interval following an inspection to bring his farm up to the standard set down in writing by the Inspectors would be a fairer system rather than the strict application of financial penalties as is the procedure at present."

Mr. Harvey said that ICMSA will be seeking a formal appeals system for REPS within the commitments contained in the Charter of Rights for Farmers.

income.
"The Minister must take on board that forestry has reached saturation point in several areas of the country and is in turn leading to the death of some rural communities. IFA is demanding that the Minister ensures that if forestry is to take place in an area that it is not to the detriment of local people", said Mr. Coughlan.



tually from the ceremony. The readings and Responsorial psalm were read by Pat Gordon.

HOMILY

More Provincial Final Thoughts

half time last week, a few more instances of the use (and maybe the misuse) of this interval, come to mind. Whether at club or intercounty level, the mid-match break had better be utilised to your team's advantage and actually needs one's thoughts to be organised and one's demeanour to be calm. If the coach's temperament isn't good he may have let his heart rule his head in the first half, too emotionally involved to enable him to read the game properly and to isolate those areas which need attention.

Time out is allowed in basketball but no such luxury is permitted to hurlers. footballers or camogie players. Given the speedy nature of hurling it would be hard to imagine such sudden unscheduled breaks in play which would ruin the gathering excitement of a close

Quite a number of years ago, I was a Waterford senior hurling selector. Waterford were playing Limerick in a league game at Dungarvan. The first half didn't go too well for us and trooped off at half time 4-1 to 1-9 in arrears. Our coach, for want of a better word to describe the man, rounded on the team, abusing them wholesale for conceding sloppy goals and recording five wides. He posed a few inane rhetorical questions such as "when are ye going to wake up? What do ye think ye're doing? Have ye any pride in Waterford?

I suppressed my disgust and impatience until he had finished and then as calmly as I could, I said something like this. "Hold on a minute lads, I saw that first half too and things aren't so bad really. You've outscored them two to one, four lousy fluke goals and a point (5 scores) to a goal and nine fine points (10 scores) for us. We had five wides. Our striking is better than theirs. We have had more possession than they, are just one point behind and playing into the road goal (the scoring goal). Trust yourselves and believe in yourselves. Keep shooting for points and I promise yours." I can't say what effect that mouthful had on them, but we won and recorded 2-9 in the second half.

I referred a couple of weeks ago to "the hump on the road." That jolt or unexpected development, which can disconcert him who isn't prepared for it. I wonder what, if any, effect the pregame Wexford positional changes had on Offaly last Sunday week. No one, in-cluding Billy Dooley, expected him to be on anyone else except Larry O'Gorman. I suppose an experienced chap like Billy wouldn't be put off by that little detail. But what about Larry's opponent at midfield? Surely it never entered his head that he would be facing the left full back. What it all adds up to really is that your mental prepara-tions should include providing for any deviation from the obvious or predictable course of a game and that your preoccupation with your own preparation would not exclude having to face a different formation to that announced and published.

On many a pre-match occasion, Tallow were cautioned to beware of the opposition lineout, not to be too surprised at unexpected repositionings. We tried to anticipate such moves and our reaction to them. One game, a county senior hurling semi-final, in 1976 I think, showed how it paid to ponder on this matter in advance of the game. We were playing Lismore in Cappoquin and, of course, Ducky Ormonde, their great scoregetter, got serious consideration in our discussions. We expected that he would start in his county position at right full forward. If so we agreed that we were not going to move our centre ack Liam O'Brien back on Ducky. We had every confidence in left full Richie Mc-Namara and the other backs to deal with the Lismore at-

Electrical Body Treatments

Most of us from time to time are unhappy with our body shape. If we need to lose weight, the most effective method is dieting, however exercise also plays an important part in weight loss and control. Most beauty salons provide some form of electrical body treatments to help reinforce the loss of weight provided by diet. There are mainly two types of electrical treatments provided.

General application treatments have a stimulating or releasing effect whereas specific application treatments help to contract muscles and reshape the body.

General treatments include vibratory massage, indirect high frequency and galvanism.

Vibratory massage has similar effects to manual massage, it may be stimulating or relaxing according to the required effect. Indirect high frequency is used to give depth to massage helping to

warm the tissues, dispel nervous and muscular tension and help relaxation. Galvanism on the other hand helps to disperse fat and cellulite.

Unfortunately no machine can produce weight loss without there being a reduction of food intake. However with the aid of electrical inch loss machines the figure may be made to look trimmer, and the muscles may be toned and tightened.

Banana Pie

Preparation: 30 minutes + 30 Minutes chilling Cooking time: 45-55 mins

225g/8 oz plain flour pinch of salt 100g/4 oz butter 50g/2 oz soft brown sugar 1 (size 3) egg yolk 2 (411g/14 oz) jars mincemeat 2 tbsp Cointreau 2 small bananas, sliced thick-

75g/3 oz seedless green grapes 75g/3 oz ready-to-eat dried

apricots, roughly chopped 1 (size 3) egg white, beaten 2 tbsp caster sugar

Preheat the oven 190°C/375°F/Gas mark 5. Sift the flour and salt into a large bowl. Rub in butter until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs. Stir in the brown sugar, then stir in the egg yolk and 2 tbsp cold water until the mixture forms a firm dough. Knead lightly. Cover with clingfilm and chill in the fridge for 30 mins. Roll out half the pastry and use to line a 20cm/8 in fluted flan tin. Line the tin with baking beans or tin foil and bake blind in a preheated oven for 10 mins. Remove the beans or foil and bake the pastry case for a further 5 mins. Remove from the oven and allow to cool slightly, the brush edges of the pastry with

water. Meanwhile mix together the mincemeat, Cointreau, bananas, grapes and dried apricots until well combined. Spoon into the pastry case. Roll out remaining pastry and use to cover the pie. Seal the edges and flute. Re-roll pastry trimmings and use to decorate the top of the pie. Brush pastry with beaten egg white and then sprinkle over the caster sugar. Bake for 30-40 mins until pastry is golden.

Tropical Veg Dip

Preparation: 15 mins Cooking: 20-25 mins Serves: 4

3 small sweet potatoes I small lemon, halved 2 plantains, peeled oil for deep-frying Avocado Dip

2 medium-sized avocados 2 tbsp lemon juice

2-3 garlic cloves, peeled and crushed 1-2 tsp cayenne pepper

12 cherry tomatoes, chopped 6 spring onions, trimmed and chopped

150ml/1/4pt soured cream

METHOD

· Put the sweet potatoes in a large pan with the lemon and cover with water. Bring slowly to the boil and then drain.


· Rinse under cold water. Peel away skin. Cut in half lengthways; slice into thin strips.

· Slice the plantain, diagonally into thick pieces. Heat the oil to 190°C/375°F. · Fry the sweet potatoes and plantains in batches for 4-5 minutes each until crisp and golden. Drain on absorbent kitchen paper.

· Meanwhile, to make the avocado dip, cut avocados in half lengthways and remove stones. Remove skin and place flesh in a bowl with lemon juice, garlic and cayenne pepper. Season with salt and freshly ground black pepper and mash with a fork

· Mix in half the tomatoes and half the spring onions. Garnish the dip with remaining tomatoes and spring onions. Arrange hot plantains and sweet potatoes in a basket. Serve with avocado dip and soured cream sprinkled with cayenne pepper.







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Minister Yates Welcomes £86m Beef Package

ture, Food and Forestry, Ivan Yates, has described the £86m beef package agreed in Luxembourg last week as a very satisfactory outcome for Irish beef farmers. The package involves £70m compensation and a unique concession to Ireland for the continuation of the £16m Spring slaughter premium.

The agreement means an additional £19 on the premium paid on 10 and 22 month male animals and £22.40 on the premium paid on suckler cows. A special National Envelope of £13.3m has been allocated to compensate producers who have suffered most as a result of the BSE crisis. Minister Yates said that this special fund will be used to assist farmers who sold beef bul-

The Minister for Agricul- locks and heifers between March 20 and early June.

The Minister said that he was also extremely pleased that the Council had agreed to the continuation of the Spring slaughter premium or 'Deseasonalisation Premium' in 1997. This premium, which was worth approx. £16m to Irish winter fatteners, is of vital importance to the economics of winter fattening and its continuation into should ensure a more orderly disposal of cattle this

The Minister said that the fact that the compensation will be paid before mid-October will restore a confidence into the beef trade and provide substantial sup-port to the market for the remainder of the year.

First Instalment Of '96 Ewe Premium

The Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Ivan Yates has announced that payments of the first instalment of the Ewe Premium and the Rural World Premium (in disadvantaged areas) 1996 will commence this week.

The first instalment of the Ewe Premium amounts to £5.73 for each qualifying ewe and the Rural World Premium paid to farmers in disadvantaged amounts to £4.96. These payments will benefit about 48,000 sheep farmers.

BSE Compensation Must Go Directly To Farmers — IFA

Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan said this week that the £13.3 million BSE compensation designated for winter finishers must go directly to farmers who suffered losses and not to cattle dealers or agents who may have only handled the cattle without incurring any loss-

Mr. Donovan said that the Department of Agriculture must make the necessary provisions to ensure that the money goes directly to farmers

In addition, farmers who sold finished cattle in marts must receive compensation directly. Dealers who purchased cattle in marts and immediately resold them to abattoirs or factories suffered no loss and are not entitled to compensation.

The Waterford IFA cattle farmers leader said that as well as paying compensation on steers, heifers, young bulls and live exports, it was essential that farmers who sold finished cattle to small abattoirs and marts were incorporated in

Waterford IFA Livestock the scheme. "This can be accommodated simply by ensuring that proof is supplied with applications con-firming that mart cattle were slaughtered or exported live within a short specified period of the mart

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IFA Advises Sheep Farmers To Move Lambs As They Become Fit

With lamb prices hardening to 106p/lb. this week, the Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman, Harry Gray, said that farmers should be extra vigilant in selecting lambs at this time of year and move stock as they become fit.

A firm lamb trade has been maintained this year, helped by the fact that good prices have encouraged farmers to sell lambs before they become overweight or overfat. As the store trade is about to commence, farmers should be conscious of the requirements on our major export markets for lambs of a carcase weight of 19kg., fat cover 2 or 3 and conformation EUR" said the IFA sheep farmers leader.

Mr. Gray said that this week's French price of 17FF/kg. is equivalent to 96.5p/lb. VAT inclusive. "Coupled with the high value of lamb skins at up to £8/head (the equivalent of 20p/lb.) factories are in a position to pay more than 106p/lb. base price."
The IFA sheep farmers

leader said that lamb throughput at the export factories is up 17.5% or 222,000 lambs ahead of this

time last year. Live exports of sheep to the EU are 80% higher than last year at 33.500 head. The outlook for the remainder of the year is for supplies to remain tight.



sumption that Ireland's Sonia O'Sullivan will qualify from the 5,000 metres heats this Friday evening, four years of waiting will be replaced by a rare opportunity this Sunday to win an Olympic title that would crown her golden athletic career. Ireland's last gold medal on the track was won all of forty years ago in Australia when Ronnie Delaney won the 1,500 metres championship in thrilling

Expectations by the National Media of an Irish victory are being hyped day by day and one only hopes that the Cobh girl is being kept unaware of this to some degree and allowed to concentrate on the practicalities of her Olympic challenge. The Irish public should know only too well, after a forty year athletic famine, that Olympic titles don't grow on trees and predictions in some quarters of a definite 5000 victory followed more than likely by a double with the 1500 metres crown are reckless in the extreme.

Sonia's season to date has gone like clockwork with major wins in Oslo, Nice and Crystal Palace to her credit. Her strength and speed in these races have equalled if not surpassed her 1995 form and she is definitely in the best shape of her life and at the best stage of her career to launch an attack on an Olympic title. She is now a seasonal competitor at major cham-pionships and if there is going to be an "O'Sullivan Olympics" it will be in Atlanta 1996. Two factors which must also be taken into account in regard to Sonia's Olympic challenge is that her greatest competi-tors including the Chinese have not yet raced against her this reason and that the weather conditions, like our soccer team experienced in the World Cup, may also have a major bearing on the destination of honours. However, Sonia O'Sullivan has lived for these Olympics, so don't forget, race time is 1.45 a.m. Monday morning. You'll get your money's worth.

IT ALL STARTS HERE!

Friday, July 19

One thousand dancers simultaneously jump and high-kick while belting out the song "Welcome To The World", accompanied by a 250 strong troop from the Atlanta Gospel Choir, while rushing into various positions to form the Olympic Rings, with word "Atlanta", the Centennial Games logo, a dove of peace, and even (with a southern twang, of course) "How Y'all Doin"!" And that's just for starters! With the five Olympic spirits being hoisted precariously high over the Olympic Stadium — there's high spirits for you — the ancient Temple of Zeus is reconstructed in the centre of the field. A triumph of lighting, it harks back to the days of the ancient Games, and to mark each of the modern Olympiads, 26 athletes emerge one-by-one from a hidden opening in the middle of the field, each carrying a flag referring to a particular Olympiad. The biggest cheer is saved for the last athlete who holds a banner "Atlanta" in gold lettering. She races up the ramp, waves the flag to enthusiastic cheering and that's the cue for the parade of nations to begin, starting as always with Greece. Of the 197 teams, 32 parade in their national costume, even Switzerland. Ireland's team, containing 24 athletes, ten showjumpers, ten yachters, six rowers, six canoeists, five swimmers, five cyclists, four boxers, two shooters two tennis players, a gymnast and a judoist, are led out with the flag by Francis Barrett, the first member of the travelling community to represent Ireland in the Olympics.

With the greatest number of Olympic athletes ever at a Games assembled in the field, from the middle of them — just as Gladys Knight and Celine Dion had done previously — out of the ground comes former World heavyweight champion Evander Holyfield with the much travelled Olympic torch. Joining him is current womens 100m hurdles champion Paraskevi Patoulidou of Greece in recognition of where it all began. Four time Olympic swimming gold medalist Janet Evans then takes up the story, bounding up the ramp towards the person who will light the Olympic Flame. His identity kept secret, he steps out of the shadows and what a surprise. It's Muhammad Ali. Greeted by chants of "Ali! Ali!", the former world heavyweight champion stares out into the stadium. Sadly, "the greatest" is now a shadow of his former self, ravaged by Parkinson's Disease. Dramatic as it may be, it's a sorry sight to see Ali's left hand shaking beyond his control. Muhammad Ali lighting the Olympic Flame will surely be a moment that will be remembered for a long time. With a few short words, President Clinton opened the Games, fireworks go off and the most elaborate and longest four hours opening ceremony ever comes to an end. The Games can begin.

With Ireland, New Zealand, Belgium and China all winning gold yesterday, the Olympic swimming threw up another shock result as Claudia Poll of Costa Rica won the final of the womens 200m freestyle, beating odds-on favourite multi-millionairess 18 year-old German Franzisca van Almsick into second. South African Penny Heyns broke the 100m breaststroke world record in her heat (1:07:02), yet seemed disappointed after winning the final in a much slower time. Still, at least she has the small consolation of a gold medal. The darling of the crowd won silver, 14-yearold Californian Amanda Beard.

In football, Brazil got that sinking feeling as Juninho, Bebeto, Aldair and Co. were beaten 1-0 by Japan; and it looks like more tomatoes for the Italians they lost 1-0 to Mexico. REQUIRED MENTAL ATTITUDE **MISSING**

A chara

Two weeks age, in the space of five days, three wellprepared Waterford teams played in Munster championship matches. Not one of these performed anywhere near its full potential. For the minor hurlers, it was the third year in a row that they failed to rise to the occasion in a Munster final.

Last year, a poorly-prepared Under-21 Waterford hurling team lost by a point to a more committed Clare side. This year's Under-21 team was possibly the best prepared ever, yet they too lost by a single point again, to more committed opponents. As tends to happen, on both occasions good fortune appeared to favour the more purposeful team.

What this should demonstrate is that all the physical and skill training in the world is of no use, if the required mental attitude is missing. This is not to say that mental attitude is a guarantee of success. However, if a team is unable to compete, failure is a certainty. And Waterford teams simply do not know how to compete in crunch games.

In the late 1980s, Offaly were able to win three All-Ireland minor hurling titles in four years, having never won any previously. The key to this success was the fact that the county's seniors had won two All-Irelands in the previous five years. This gave the minors the confidence and pride to follow suit. Similarly, whereas Waterford were able to edge out Clare under-21 teams in the early 1990s, it is noteworthy that they have turned the tables since their seniors made the break-

It is vital that Waterford find some way of breaking out of this cycle of failure. The good work being done in the schools will eventually peter out unless there is inter-county success in the near future. I believe that the young talent is now coming through to provide success at senior level. The most essential requirement now is to give them the kind of motivation which Liam Griffin was able to give Wexford last Sunday.

There is no shortage of coaches who can impart physical and skills training. Coaches who can cultivate the proper mental attitude are a much rarer breed, especially when it comes to dealing with less successful counties. John Maughan was able to do it with the Clare footballers; in hurling, Dermot Healy did it with Offaly, Ger Loughnane with Clare and now Liam Griffin with Wexford.

Whoever is selected as next coach of Waterford's hurlers must, above all else, have a proven track record as a motivator. The culture of defeat which is now ingrained in the county means that, without this quality, everything else is pointless. It also means, in my view, that we will have to go outside the county for somebody who has been able to do it elsewhere. We in Waterford simply do not know how to compete and win any more.

Acting Town Clerk, Joseph O'Flaherty disclosed that under the Derelict Sites Act, the property was origi-nally put on the Council's

particularly offensive to register of local derelict sites, which required that an annual fee be paid by the owners to the local authority. When planning permission for the site was lodged however, a stay was put on this levy which, Mr. O'Fla-herty said, can be revoked by the County Manager.

Cllr. Damien Dillon submitted that the building should have been let out on a caretaker arrangement over the past few years while Cllr. Paddy Power said the Council had put up with the situation at the run down building for too long and the property should be reclassified as a derelict site. Likewise Cllr. Tony Wright felt that the property should be treated the same as other derelict properties. "Why should they get pref-erential treatment?", he declared.

Call For An Post To Upgrade Dungarvan P.O.

Dungarvan Urban District Council are to call on An Post and the Minister for Communications to upgrade the existing post office in Dungarvan which is currently classed as a mere grade six facility.

Proposing the motion at last Monday night's Council meeting was Cllr. Austin Deasy who criticised the lack of space in the building for members of the public. The facilities for customers at the post office were not in keeping with the devel-opment of the town and Cllr. Deasy claimed that much smaller towns are being provided with grade five and even grade four post offices.

Erected over 20 years ago, Clir. Deasy felt that the post office is physically not big enough to cater for the growing demands of the public. He claimed that customers, including the el-derly and invalid, often have to queue on the street outside the premises, partic-ularly on Thursdays and Fridays, in all kinds of weather. Staff at the local

post office are doing a great job in light of these difficul-ties, he felt.

Reading out what he termed a 'negative' reply from the Chief Executive of An Post John Hynes, Cllr. Deasy revealed that the company have no plans to expand Dungarvan post of-fice and consider the premises to be adequate at present.

"I don't agree that accommodation is satisfactory at the post office", slammed Cllr. Deasy who said Dungarvan is being treated like a small town or village. Banks and other financial institutions have already recognised that Dungarvan is a rapidly expanding town, but An Post have not, he added.

At present the post office handles 24 Social Welfare schemes, such as the Old Age Pension, and Cllr. Deasy said that this number is expected to increase in the near future.

His proposal was second-ed by Clir. Nuala Ryan and found the unanimous support of members. . . .



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
