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## Malicious Fires Started At Local Nissan Station

Over £10,000 of damage to stock and equipment as a result of malicious fires has occurred at Dungarvan Nissan and Statoil filling station on the Youghal Road, Dungarvan.

Started by persons unknown, the three separate fire incidents, which could have had fatal consequences, have caused outrage and shock among residents of the nearby neighbourhood as well as staff members and management at the filling station.

Under the management of John C. Flood and David Dickenson, the business has

enjoyed enormous success in the past two years and has been welcomed by all in the area as a first class de-

velopment of the once derelict site.

Last Friday, the much publicised and eagerly awaited promotional weekend at the filling station had to be cancelled, causing great disap-

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## Organ Recital In Lismore Cathedral

The second lunchtime recital in the series of four in St. Carthage's Cathedral in Lismore will take place next Friday at 12.45 p.m.

Cathedral organist Jan van Putten will play two compositions that rank high on the international organ repertoire. The first piece consists of a number of variations of the chanson "Est-ce Mars?" (Is this Mars, the god of war?) by Jan Sweelinck. Sweelinck was organist of the Old Church of Amsterdam in the beginning of the seventeenth century. Today the church is particularly famous because of its situation in the centre of Amsterdam's canal (and ... red light) district. Among

lovers of music it is renowned not only because Sweelinck turned it into a European centre of organ culture during his lifetime but also because of its two superb organs that attract large audiences to the many organ recitals being held there during the summer season.

The second composition is the popular "Suite Gothique" by the nineteenth century French composer Leon Boellmann. It consists of an introduction, a minuet, a moving Prayer to Our Lady and, finally, a jubilant Toccata.

Entrance to the recital is free, but a donation towards the Cathedral will be appreciated.

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# Know Your Rights

## QUESTION

Can you give me details of what grants are available to students wanting to study abroad?

## ANSWER

Means tested maintenance grants will be extended for the first time in the 1996/97 academic year to students following a full-time undergraduate course of at least two years duration in an EU member state. The course must be in a university or third level institution which is funded from public funds. Maintenance grants have been available for a number of years for students attending colleges in Northern Ireland.

The following courses are excluded: Courses in Medicine, Veterinary Medicine and teacher training including those leading to the award of a Bachelor of Education (these courses are subject to a quota on places in Irish colleges); courses in Colleges of Further and Higher Education, courses in private commercial colleges. Also excluded are courses provided in Britain which are offered in private commercial third level colleges in Ireland and which are validated by that British college. Further details regarding the extension of the grants system to students studying abroad is contained in the Higher Education Grants Scheme 1996 which is available from local authorities.

Maintenance grants will be increased by 5% in 1996/97 and the maximum maintenance grant payable will be £1,600. Income eligibility limits will increase by 2.4%.

Tax relief is allowed for the 1996/97 academic year on fees paid for approved private colleges here. These courses do not attract grants. This provision was made in last year's Finance Act. Also tax relief was extended in this year's Finance Act to students pursuing approved part-time undergraduate courses from Autumn 1996. Students on part-time courses are not eligible for Higher Education Grants.

The tax relief will apply to approved courses of a minimum duration of two years in publicly funded third level institutions and in private colleges which satisfy codes of standards to be drawn up by the Minister for Education (details not yet available). The relief will be confined to students who are paying their own fees and who have not already obtained a third level qualification.

## Drugs And Drink At Old Railway Line?

According to the Chairman of Dungarvan UDC, Cllr. Paddy Power, "a lot of drugs and drinking" is going on under trees along the old railway line, behind Murphy Place, Abbeyside.

Speaking at last week's Urban Council meeting, Cllr. Power claimed that these activities were taking place under the trees which "hide and cover what's going on".

Cllr. Austin Deasy originally raised the issue of the old railway line when he highlighted the overgrown state of the embankments which are susceptible to fires. Cllr. Deasy added that he had recently seen a massive fire along the tracks and suggested that there should be some scheme put in place whereby the Council would clean up the area.

Acting County Manager Brian McNally however, informed members that the railway line was the responsibility of Waterford County Council.

### DRUGS MEETING WITH GARDAI

To keep abreast of the current drugs situation in the town, Cllr. Tony Wright suggested that members of the Council arrange a meeting behind closed doors with

local Gardaí and representatives of the Drug Squad.

He stressed that the UDC should be proactive in the fight against drugs by liaising with the South Eastern Health Board and targeting schools with visits by local sports stars etc.

Cllr. Billy Kyne felt that

the Council could benefit from such a meeting but added that an initial drugs forum should first take place.

Cllr. Lar Hart however slammed, "if anyone doesn't know about the drug problem in Dungarvan, they're going around with their eyes

closed".

Stating that the Gardaí would be slow to discuss the local drug scenario with councillors, Cllr. Austin Deasy said that the subject warranted high confidentiality and is regarded as being highly sensitive by An Garda Síochána.

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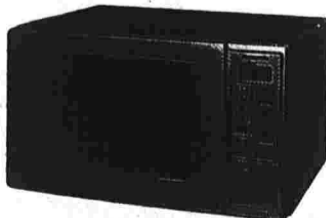


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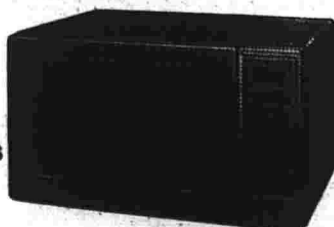


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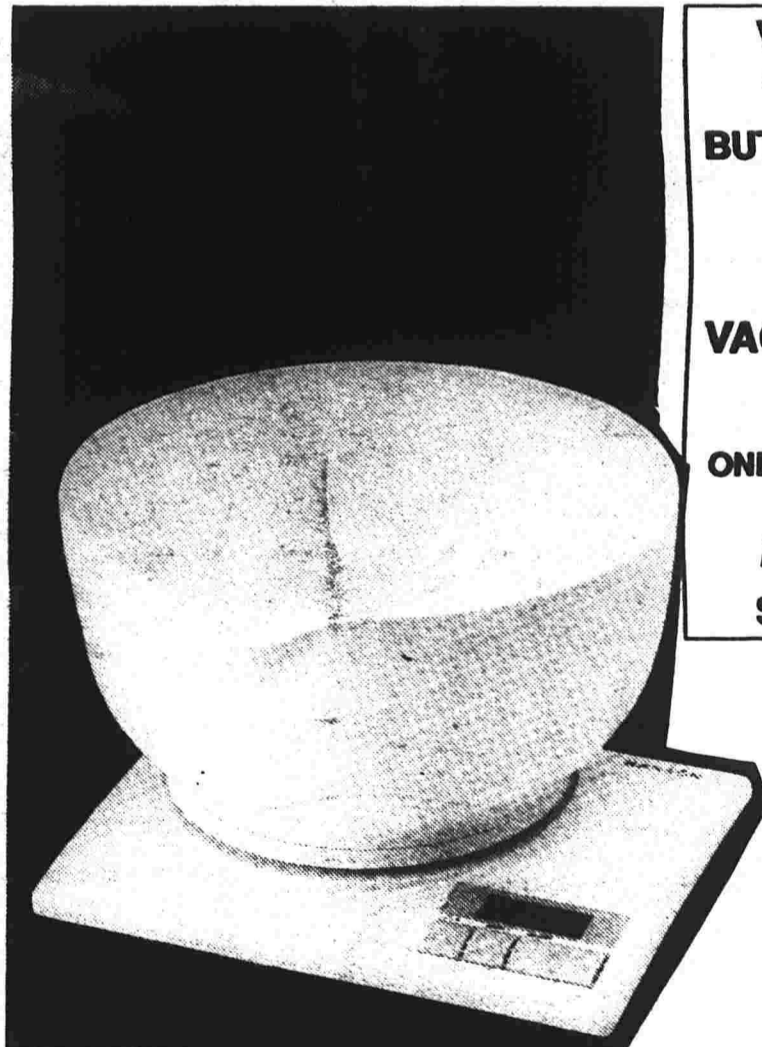
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# Chernobyl Children In Dungarvan

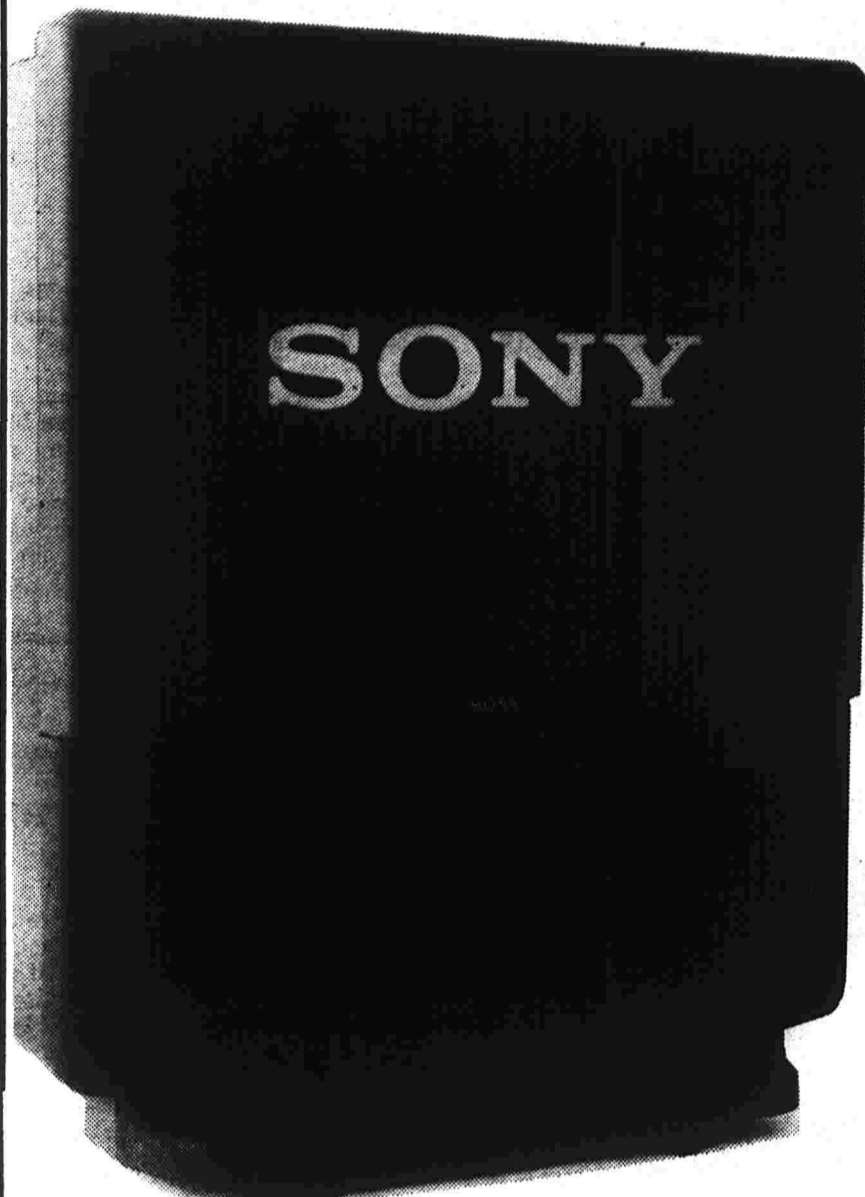
Having immersed himself in the books for long enough, Stephen decided to set about putting his education to practical use by looking for employment. Part of Stephen's college education included a practical "work experience" internship. 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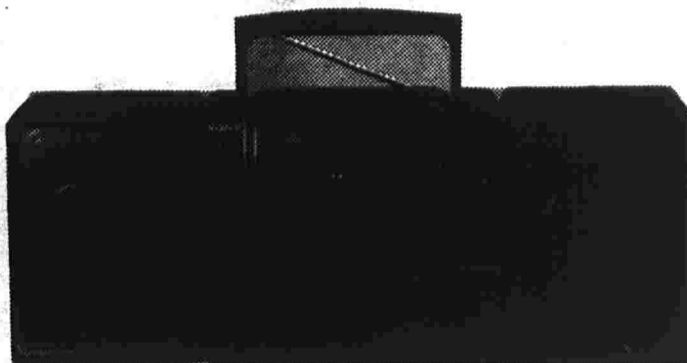

(2) Reflexology — Another service which is widely availed of and in Katy Cross we have a real gem. A very popular and respected person is Katy and is very interested in Multiple Sclerosis and in finding ways to improve the quality of life of the M.S. person.

(3) Swimming In The Park — This is one of the most vital services we have as it incorporates both the social and remedial side of the story. The M.S. people receive great relief and respite from the water and it enables them to have greater freedom of movement on a short term basis at least. This is a weekly service and we have tea and sandwiches after which people have an opportunity to chat about various topics.

(4) Mobile Home — We have a Mobile Home in Clonea which is the only one of its kind in Ireland and is specifically designed for wheelchair users. M.S. people and their families from all over Ireland have availed of this wonderful service and have enjoyed a week's holiday which otherwise would not be feasible. As we are the only branch providing this service we hope other branches will in the future take courage and do likewise as our own M.S. members would like to travel to other parts of the country to holiday.

Allied to these we have a wide range of social and financial services available to our M.S. people.

A proposed development involving the construction of 28 luxury apartments on Davitt's Quay, adjoining the now demolished Moloney Corn Stores has been met with strong opposition from the Dungarvan Museum Society.

The project by Archview Developments Ltd., calls for the demolition of the existing building, a former grain store, and a 'habitable house' at the front. The quayside property is owned by the local Moorings Post Development Company consortium.

Planning permission had been granted by Dungarvan UDC to the Limerick builders to demolish the dwelling and grain store on

the quayside and to construct in their place, 28 apartments with associated site and development works.

In recent weeks however, the local Museum Society have appealed the local authority's decision to An Bord Pleanala, in an attempt to retain the old house for reasons of historical merit.

A decision on the matter by An Bord Pleanala could well take a matter of months while the July '97 statutory deadline for completion of all works under the urban renewal scheme looms ever nearer.

### "CONSERVE & ADAPT"

In a letter to the Council dated last June, the Dungarvan Museum Society said it accepts that in some parts of

the area designated under the urban renewal scheme, demolition and rebuilding is the only practical option, but that this particular area of the quay is certainly not one of them.

The letter reads, "...the fact that demolition and rebuilding in some areas is necessary, it makes it all the more important that areas and buildings capable of being conserved and adapted are thus treated, so as to preserve their essential character and that of the area in which they are set".

The Society point out that their position in relation to the historic core of Dungarvan is to use a "conserve and adapt" approach rather than a "clear and rebuild" one.

## TIMBER EXTRACTING MACHINE DAMAGED

A Timber Extracting Machine was badly damaged last week by a fire which threatened hundreds of acres of trees at Russelstown Wood near the popular walking area of Carey's Castle. Gardaí are investigating the Cause of the fire which burnt up to 80 acres of scrubland and some felled timber. They have questioned a number of youths about it. An amount of damage was caused to the machine which is owned by a private contractor. The fire broke out at around 5.30 p.m. and took around two hours to bring under control. It was lucky, four units of the fire brigade from Clonmel, Cahir and Carrick-on-Suir arrived on the scene to prevent around 750 acres of trees at Russelstown Wood from going on fire. The efforts of the fire brigades were helped by having a large water supply available from the Glenary River.

## MILK QUOTA IS NOT AN ASSET

The United Farmers Association have welcomed the opinion by the Advocate General of the European Court of Justice, that the E.U. Milk quota is a licence to produce and not an asset. Paddy Phelan, Toureigh, Ballymacarbry, National P.R.O. of the U.F.A. said that Milk quota in Ireland had been collared at its inception by the "big farmer lobby" and turned into an asset, thereby effectively excluding small dairy producers from equal access to an essential tool of production. Restructuring Schemes have directed only a dribble towards the suppliers at the bottom, while a cheque book open season has enabled large operators to acquire quota and land at will. Mr. Phelan said that the Irish quota structure was in sharp contrast to France, where the quota is a licence to produce, and the system provides quota free to small farmers and to new entrants, from a national reserve. "The U.F.A. are now calling on Minister for Agriculture Ivan Yates to put fair play before greed, in an urgent shake up of the whole milk quota system". The large farmer lobby are entitled to pursue their aims and objectives within a democracy but they are not entitled to make decisions which affect all farmers. The U.F.A. were calling on elected representatives to ensure that Government policies are formulated in the interest of the common good, and not by powerful groups who want to feather their own nests.

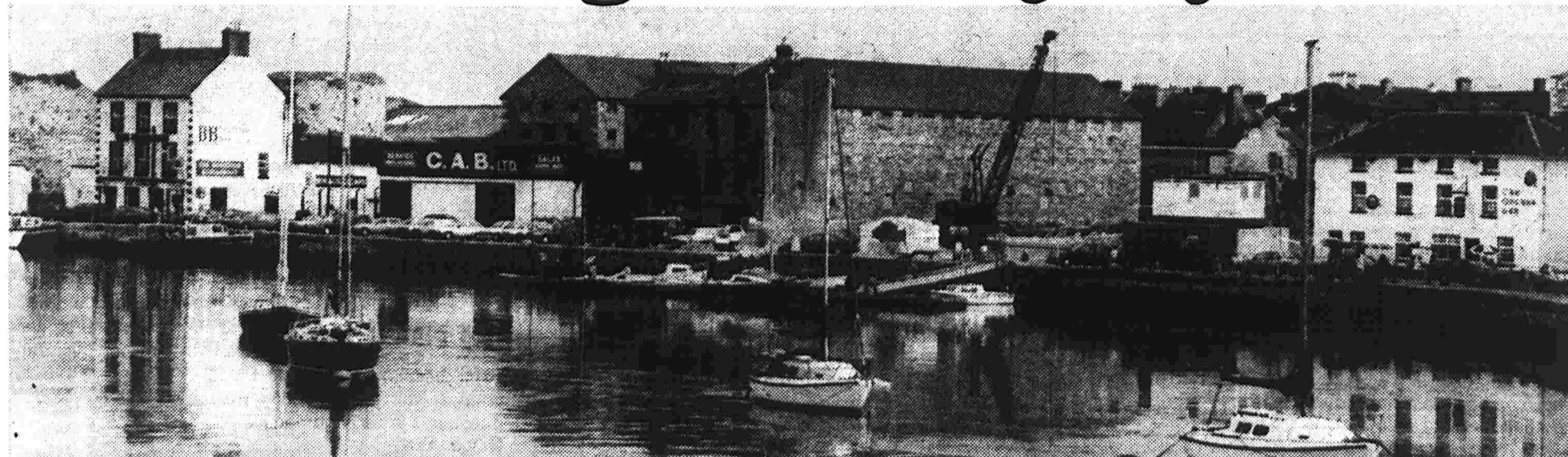

# Major Construction Envisaged For Dungarvan Quayside

The entire Dungarvan quay area has been earmarked as the site for a number of multi million pound construction projects that are set to transform this dilapidated part of the town into a thriving, 'new look' neighbourhood.

The derelict building of Moloney Corn Stores facing the harbour, has already been demolished to make way for apartments, a restaurant and a public library etc. This development is perhaps the most visible sign of the urban renewal scheme which is to continue until July next year. Meanwhile, demolition work on the leather factory by McInerney Construction is now imminent following the builders holiday time. Set to become the largest such development in the town history, McInerney are to construct a grade 'A' hotel, 57 apartments, and eleven townhouses on the site of the redundant leather factory.

Another proposed development on the quay is the construction of 28 luxury apartments on the site of an

old grain store and house by Archview Developments Ltd. This project however is currently being appealed by the Dungarvan Museum Society who have objected to the proposed demolition of an old house at the front of the building.

#### NEW 4 STOREY BUILDING

Replacing the now empty site of the former Moloney building will be a modern four storey building, constructed by developers, Clancy Construction (Drangan) Ltd. of Thurles, Co. Tipperary.

This new building fronting the harbour and situated between Galwey's Lane and Dirty Lane, will incorporate 37 apartments, three maisonettes, two townhouses, a public library and a restaurant/retail unit.

According to Pat Clancy of

Clancy Construction, work on the project is expected to commence within a week or two and will be completed before the end of the urban renewal scheme in twelve months time.

The majority of the spacious apartments will have sun balconies, while a landscaped courtyard and parking space facilities will be located at the rear of the building. The restaurant/retail unit will be located on the ground floor on the corner of Galwey's Lane, while the library will occupy the opposite corner with Dirty Lane.

#### EXISTING LIBRARY TO MOVE?

The provision of a new branch library for Dungarvan has been under consideration by Waterford County Council for a number of years. Proposals still exist to expand the existing Dungarvan library branch at the Old Market House at Main Street.

According to County Librarian Donald Brady, the County Council has already

explored the possibility of a new library as part of the Clancy Construction development and have submitted a theoretical proposal to the Department of the Environment and An Comhairle Leabharlanna (both main funding authorities) for approval.

A decision on the proposal to relocate the existing library in the new building on the quay is now imminent revealed Mr. Brady, possibly within the next few weeks. The County Librarian went on to say that the County Council, the Dept. of the Environment and the Library Committee have all agreed that there is an urgent need for a library in Dungarvan.

In the event of the library being relocated, County Manager Donal Connolly previously stated that he will examine the future uses of the Main Street building including accommodation for the local Museum Society and also the requirements for an Arts Centre for the town.

#### 18TH CENTURY NAME PLATE

When Clancy Construction were granted planning permission to proceed with the development on the quay on July 1st, they were requested by the Urban Council to remove the Galwey's Lane name plate and incorporate it in a similar location on the eastern wall of the reconstructed building. According to William Fraher, Chairman of Dungarvan Museum Society, this plaque is the last of these 18th century street name plaques to survive in its original location. Inscribed 'Galwey's Lane 1740', it refers to a branch of the notable Galwey family of Duckspool House.

The whole quay area of Dungarvan is steeped in local history with riots taking place at the site of Moloney's Corn Stores during the Great Famine in September 1846. According to a report from local historian William Fraher in 'The Famine In Waterford', a crowd of about 3,000 people from Dungarvan, Old Parish, Ardmore and Clashmore etc. attempted to break into the corn stores on the quay, cautioning the local corn merchant against shipping corn in 1846. A number of the ringleaders were subsequently arrested by members of the First Royal Dragoons which led to further clashes between locals and the military with stone throwing on one hand and gun fire on the other.

#### EXCAVATION REVEALS OLD TOWN WALLS

Another condition of the permission was that prior to the commencement of the development, an archaeological investigation was to be carried out on the site.

An initial site assessment of the land from Galwey's Lane to Dirty Lane, undertaken last June by Dave Pollock, Archaeografix of Co. Tipperary, has been submitted to the

Office of Public Works (OPW) who have requested that a further appraisal of the site be carried out.

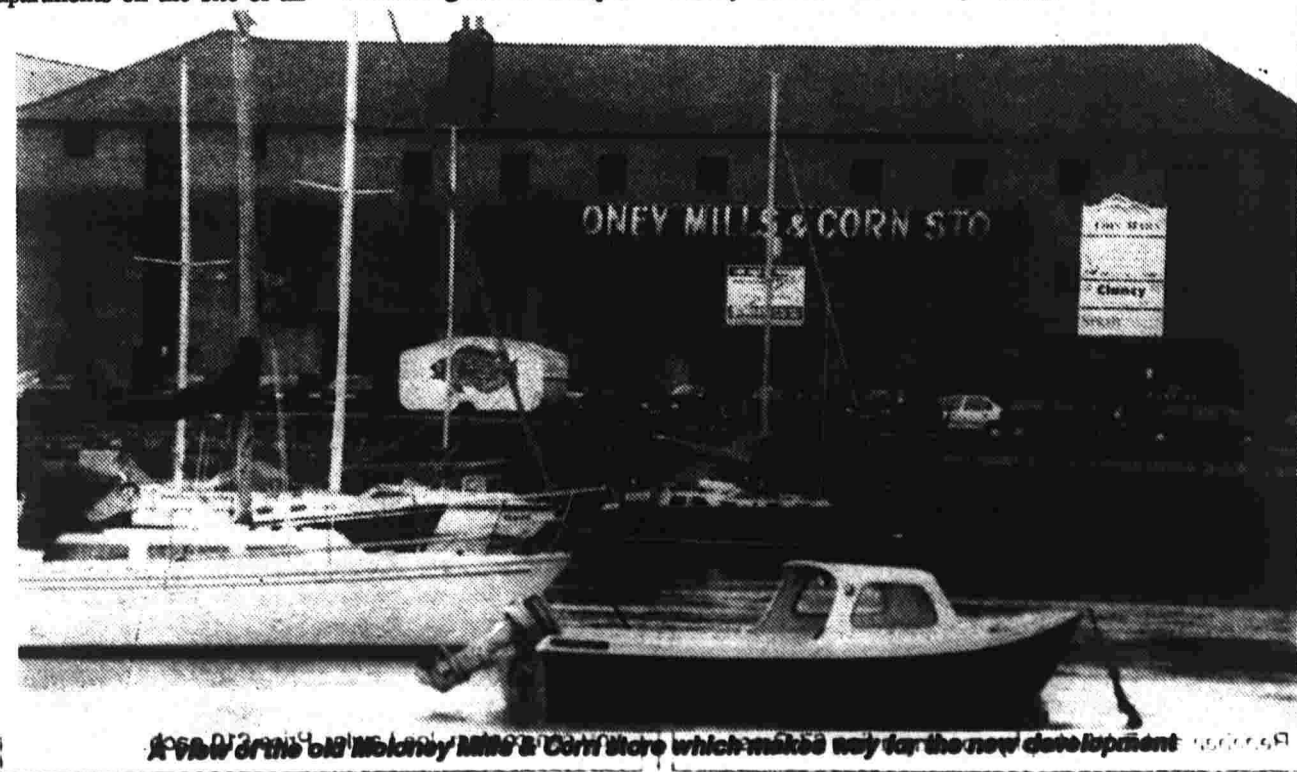
In his report Mr. Pollock said that during the excavation, the concrete floor of the recently demolished corn store was removed. Below this floor of the mill was found the stump of a substantial mortared wall. Mr. Pollock revealed that this wall is clearly the town wall and was potentially in use in the 17th century and redundant in the 18th century. Its construction date is unknown. On the seaward side of this town wall, the report discloses that the ground was reclaimed in the 18th and early 19th centuries.

"Nothing of archaeological interest is likely to be damaged by the proposed development on the seaward side of the wall", Mr. Pollock stated.

He went on to say that a substantial accumulation of soil should be expected on site, representing centuries of cultivation close to the medieval Dungarvan. This soil however has not survived and its removal in the past has meant that the underlying subsoil is very close to the present ground level. As a result, Mr. Pollock concluded his report by stating that "material of archaeological interest on the site of the proposed new buildings, landward of the town wall, would be threatened by proposed development".

#### NEXT STEP

In light of the findings of this archaeological report, the Office of Public Works have requested a further appraisal of the site which is expected to be carried out in the near future. Until the OPW are satisfied that the project will not interfere with any existing archaeological material, work on the new building will remain at a standstill.

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Head Off Potato Blight Before The Blighter Shows!

POTATO blight is a serious disease and should be tackled this month before any signs appear. It attacks the leaves first of all, eventually turning them black. And when you dig up the tubers, they will have soft, affected areas and will quickly rot.

Once it gets going, it spreads very rapidly and what always surprises me is that few growers ever bother to spray their spuds against blight. And some of those who do, say it has little effect.

That's not true — providing the job is done properly and efficiently.

What you've got to remember is that spraying can help prevent blight, not cure it. In south-western areas, attacks can be expected early this month; in the south it's more likely mid-month and in other districts at the end of the month.



You won't see much sign of the disease during any long spell of dry weather, but you watch out after the first heavy rains of July when we get a humid atmosphere — that's when the leaves start turning brown before dying.

You should spray with a proprietary copper fungicide before any symptoms appear. Ask at your local garden centre or nursery and they will advise on a suitable one.

Or you can make your own — a combination of copper sulphate and ordinary washing soda. But it's much easier to buy properly prepared and it doesn't cost very much.

Spray on a fine, dry day, and repeat 10 to 14 days later, especially in warm, damp weather. That way you'll catch any new leaves that will have sprung up in the meantime.

Don't forget to spray upwards from low down so that the leaves are well watered underneath as well as on top.

You won't have to drench the plants, a good dose with a fine, misty spray will do the trick nicely.

Spraying your potatoes against blight can easily increase your crops by 25 per cent.

Incidentally, if you can find any potato sets for planting at this rather late stage of the year, get them and put them in. Planting spuds in July? Why not? I've planted early varieties now and got a very respectable crop in October. Indeed, I once had new potatoes, fresh from the ground, with a Christmas lunch! And yes, I did spray them to prevent blight after planting.

Oh, and while you're about it, give your tomato plants a dose of the same mixture because they are also prone to the same disease. Believe me, spraying is always worth the trouble.

## Dairying WASH EASY FEED HOUSES

Lameness due to footrot is present in most easy feed houses in Spring and it is a serious problem in some. Houses with poor ventilation and low roofs are the worst, but all slatted and auto-scraped easy feed houses can give rise to a bit of footrot over the Winter. Open cubicle houses where the cows eat their silage outside rarely if ever cause the problem. Footrot is caused by bacteria that become very numerous in the warm, dirty conditions of most easy-feed houses.

Power washing of the houses — especially the lower part of the walls, floors and cubicles — followed by emptying the tanks, will help reduce the bacteria numbers at the beginning of next Winter.

Mats can be very dry underneath and, if these are loosely attached, it is good to wash them well and stack them outside for a while. People who do so go to the bother of cleaning and washing the cowhouse might also consider whitewashing the walls in the darker parts of the houses (it is easier to identify stock and their behaviour).

## Arable Silage WHEN TO HARVEST

Where cereal/pea mixtures are sown, harvest the crop when the lower pods of the pea plant are about 2.5 to 3.5 cms. long (1" - 1.5"). The cereal grain will be at the soft milky stage.

Quality — The quality of arable silage is usually moderate to low, 63-68% DMD. Delayed harvesting will result in a large bulky yield of very low quality material (55-66% DMD).

Where there is a big proportion of peas in the mixture and not enough cereal, the crop is likely to lodge. If this happens the peas will decay and quality will fall rapidly, also the young grass will be smothered — so harvest immediately.

Arable silage is difficult to preserve. Dry matter is usually low, being in the range 14-16% DM. Also soluble sugars are low and buffering capacity is high due to the legume component. Witing is an advantage but is not always possible. In non-wilted crops use an effective preservative at the higher rate, preservatives at the normal rate would also be justified for highly wilted crops.

## Early Lamb

Mating is in progress this week on many early lamb producing farms. If possible, group ewes into their mating batches immediately after sponge removal and PMSG injections so that they do not have to be disturbed again before mating.

Rams should be introduced at 45-48 hours after the sponge removal and not earlier. Putting in rams at 36 hours can result in a situation where rams have expended most of their energies on a couple of ewes which come in heat early, to the detriment of the main group some hours later. There is also some evidence that mating towards the end of the heat produces more lambs.

Rams should be withdrawn after three days. If repeat matings are to be allowed, one ram would be sufficient for 30-40 ewes.

## Tillage WEED BEET

Weed beet is potentially a far greater threat to beet than wild oats is to cereals. Within a beet crop there is no chemical control of weed beet and as the pool of suitable beet growing land continues to shrink, it is imperative that the problem is kept under control. Weed populations can increase at a phenomenal rate as a mature bolter can produce up to 2,000 seeds. These seeds, similar to wild oats, can remain viable for a number of years.

## CONTROL

The most effective control of small populations is by hand rouging. This should be carried out by the end of July/early August, before seed is set. After this the plant should be removed.

Where populations are high, cutting or using a weed licker are options. These control measures are not at all as effective as a regular hand rouging. Also check cereal crops following beet.

## IFA Call For Disadvantaged Area Payments To Be Made In September

The Waterford IFA Rural Development Committee Chairman Anthony Ryan recently called on the Minister for Agriculture Ivan Yates to sanction all Disadvantaged Areas headage payments in the month of September in order to alleviate the income crisis hitting cattle farmers in those areas.

"£110m is owed to almost 120,000 farmers who are heavily dependent on disadvantaged area payments," he said. "Cattle farmers will have particular difficulties this autumn and, unless they receive early payments, will be under severe financial pressure. Those in disadvantaged areas cannot afford to wait until the year end for payments which are desperately needed in September."

The monies which are owed through the cattle headage scheme in severely handicapped areas, beef cow

scheme in less severely handicapped areas and sheep headage payments in 1996 must now be advanced in September to prevent further financial hardship for farmers who have this year suffered severe blows.

Mr. Ryan stressed that adequate provision has been made within the EU Structural Funds budget to make such payments available in September.

Mr. Ryan explained that the headage rates for the severely handicapped areas are £84 on beef cows, £40 for other cattle, £70 for beef cows in less severely handicapped areas, and £10 per mountain ewe as well as lowland ewe hoggets. He said the Disadvantaged Areas Scheme which is 65% funded under the EU Structural Funds, will also include payments to farmers in newly designated disadvantaged areas.

## Co. Waterford I.C.M.S.A. News

John Skehan, Chairman of County Waterford Executive of ICMSA said that ICMSA have proposed radical changes to the quota system aimed at solving the plight of thousands of developing dairy farmers who face going out of business unless they are allowed produce more milk.

ICMSA Dairy Committee Chairman, Tommy Cooke, has called on Agriculture Minister, Ivan Yates, to introduce a scheme to allow developing dairy farmers (those with permanent quo-

tas of less than 35,000 gallons) to take quota without having to lease land.

Under present rules farmers are barred from leasing quota for over a year unless they also lease the land attaching to the quota. These land/quota leases are being sold at record prices and are way beyond what small producers can afford.

"The ICMSA proposal to allow farmers with inadequate quotas to lease extra quota without land is allowable under existing quota rules and could be intro-

duced immediately," said Mr. Cooke.

He said it was totally unacceptable that Irish dairy farmers were currently being forced to operate under the most restrictive quota system in the EU. "A system which allows 13% of our quota to be permanently recycled through a temporary leasing pool or to be rigidly attached to land lease is a major obstacle to the proper development of the Irish dairy sector."

Mr. Cooke added: "There

is not enough milk being sold into the Temporary Leasing Scheme to satisfy the huge demand for quota. Additionally, the one year lease limit stipulated under this Scheme is far too short to allow farmers to properly plan the development of their enterprises.

Mr. Cooke said the ICMSA proposal would give a distinct advantage to developing dairy farmers to allow them to build their dairying enterprise on the security of a long term lease of quota without having to shoulder the huge expense of leasing the unwanted land attaching to the quota.

Mr. Cooke pointed out that about 16% of our quota holders are currently not involved in milk production. The ICMSA plan contained proposals which would give new incentives to this sector so that their unused quota would end up in the lands of farmers most in need.

"The ICMSA proposal is that these people should be entitled to full livestock premia and extensification payments for selling their quota to a scheme aimed at helping priority categories of farmers to acquire the extra quota they so badly need to lease over the long term so as to properly plan their enterprises and ensure that they survive in farming, said Mr. Cooke.

He said ICMSA will be making a submission on the details of the Association's plan at the next meeting of the Milk Quota Review Group.

## IFA Dairy Chairman's Meeting With Co-Ops

Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman, Gerald Curran recently said he is starting on a crucial series of meetings with co-ops this week in a bid to maximise the amount of quota available through the second phase of this year's temporary leasing scheme.

The current crisis has caused dire hardship for small dairy farmers who normally could rely on sizable amounts of quota leased through their co-op to cover their production. Typically, a small dairy farmer might own 15,000 gallons, and lease each year a further 15,000. This year, however, this farmer may only have received 2,000 or

3,000 gallons and may already have filled all the quota available to him.

"I want to ensure that co-ops and the Department of Agriculture make an all-out effort to get every last gallon of available quota into temporary leasing to alleviate the appalling crisis facing so many small producers," the IFA man said.

Mr. Curran said he believed that quota tied up in one year private leases, which are now approaching the end of their terms, could also be directed into the temporary leasing scheme.

The IFA man said the Department of Agriculture had made it clear that it is practically impossible to lease

quota privately mid quota year. This provides the Department and co-ops with an unmissable opportunity to redirect this quota into temporary leasing until the end of the quota year.

"We will also approach co-ops to adopt a more flexible approach to deductions from milk cheques for suppliers experiencing severe hardship because of the current crisis. The small producers who have used temporary leasing regularly in the past will have top priority access to all available quota in the next phase, and we feel co-ops must deal sympathetically with genuine cases," he concluded.



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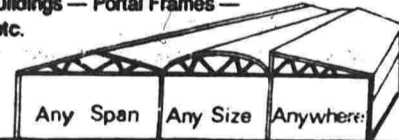

# Mental Attitude

Proinsias Breathnach, Má Nuad, Co. Chill Dara had a very good letter on this paper last week. I don't know him or perhaps he is someone I know but cannot recognise because I presume he is a Waterford man now domiciled in the land of the Lily Whites. He is clearly very concerned at Waterford's failure at senior inter-county level over some years and mentions our successes at minor and under 21 levels in the early nineties which should have presaged a progression at senior level. Sadly there is no evidence that we have identified what is needed nor have we in other respects measured up to the task of preparing any of our teams for the rigours of Munster championship hurling.

Proinsias reckons that we have not got the right mental attitude and in that he is basically correct. But he equates that attitude with motivation and suggests that whoever is selected as the next coach of Waterford senior hurlers must above all else, have a proven track record as a motivator. With respect to Proinsias I think that a team's mental attitude derives from quite a number of factors other than passionate rhetoric. The calibre of the coach or manager decides what these things are and our aim in choosing this man (could it be a woman?), should bring us to consider what qualities our team should show and how they should play. It is a truism to say that in order to compete the players must be very fit, so fit that they are utterly convinced that they are at least as fit as any other team in the country so that they welcome the physical side of the game as much as the skill content. That fitness doesn't mean mere ability to run and run until the final whistle or the build up in speed, stamina, and endurance. With the hard work comes a build up in confidence, a growth in self-esteem and a realisation of how good you are and a positive, feel-good mentality. In the hands of a good coach the team comes to a realisation of how a high level of fitness develops a quickness and sharpness of intellect. This perhaps is the mental fitness, the lack of which prevents Waterford

players (or at least some of them) from quick and correct decision making which Proinsias has in mind when he cites our failures of this year and more recent years.

It is not that Waterford teams don't train hard. They do, and if you were to ask the management of all of our panel (I don't know of the senior footballers) about their preparation you would imagine being told of the dozens of training sessions, the hundreds of hours spent on the training ground. Very often the individual panel put as much time into the preparation as their opponents with the result that they thought they were "well prepared" to use the phrase of Proinsias in his opening sentence about those three Waterford sides defeated recently within the space of five days. Demonstrably they were not well prepared. Even if the amount of preparatory work is acknowledged the training must have been lacking in quality. Erik de Bruin, husband and coach to Olympic heroine Michelle Smith, made that point about Michelle's training. He pointed out that before he took over her training she worked exceptionally hard but her schedule was unfocused, high in quantity but low in quality. He changed all of that giving greater time and attention to technique and the elimination of faults. She didn't spend any longer in the pool than her rivals but the intensity of the sessions increased.

A hurling session which doesn't prioritize certain skills and work hard at performing them at speed will fail to effect improvement, physical and mental. Everything must be done at speed, at match pace. The shrewd Ger Loughnane saw the glaring need for this increase in tempo after watching Clare struggle to match Kilkenny's quickness in last year's League final. He subsequently piled on the pressure in the skill training so that when it came to last year's Munster final and afterwards in the All-Ireland series Clare, were well able for a pacy game. They were thinking quicker, moving quicker, striking quicker, hooking and blocking quicker and reacting to every situation quicker. That type of training tunes players men-

tally as well as physically and develops their mental strength. I was in Offaly a few times doing a bit of coaching and my first visit was shortly after they won a senior hurling All Ireland for the first time when the interest and excitement generated was palpable. What one chap said to me about Dermot Healy's training for the All Ireland amused me. "I couldn't get over how well they played", he said, "with how little training they did". Dermot Healy shared my amusement when I mentioned this to him. "Ah", he laughed, "they saw no rounds of the field, precious few sit-ups or press-ups or leap frog, the core of hurling training sessions for so long. We did everything with the ball non stop, running to the ball, after the ball, after the man with the ball for a full hour. They sweated I can tell you and were hardly aware of the amount of running involved". Central to that training was striking the ball, again and again at pace, on the ground and from the hand, left and right. That kind of hurling training was an amalgam of physical, mental and skill preparation.

In the build up of mental attitude it is very important for the lads to see the efficiency of their work in training, to see how relevant it is to match play and how it prepared them for coping with match situations. The confidence, the collective confidence, built up by a well-structured course of training enables a team to play a match to its full potential in the certain knowledge that they have done it all in training, that the match brings nothing really new or unexpected and that they will win no matter how the game develops or how many obstacles must be surmounted, all because of the mental strength accruing from quality preparation.

I haven't over the last few years watched Waterford teams training so am in no position to comment. I did, however, have a close-up view of our minor hurlers preparing for the 1992 All Ireland. The training was very relaxed and the panel thoroughly enjoyed it but the pace of training was very slow, certainly as far removed from match pace

as possible. There was an almost complete neglect of hurling on the ground. It was never once - certainly on the three nights I was present - done properly. Nor was it encouraged. So our team didn't drive the ball on the ground on All Ireland day because they couldn't - you'll never do in a match what you have not practised umpteen times and we badly needed to move the ball at midfield and in the half forward line where Galway enjoyed a physical advantage. Instead we lifted, handled, ran and (when allowed) struck a high ball continually into our forwards. In training no particular attention was given to a players weaker side. So our number ten and thirteen forced by their marker towards the right touchline never used their left or backhand side but continued to put them wide on the right.

Our potential match winner number fifteen Paul Flynn got a poor supply of decent ball and never got the ideal low fast ball which a good angled ground stroke from midfield would guarantee. The tackling of the backs was crude and physical and no encouragement was given to a defender to think about how an opponent in possession could be legally tackled effectively. What I'm saying really is that the poor quality of the preparation was reflected in the poor quality of the performance. Players sensed the inadequacy of the training so their consequent brittle mental attitude on the big day left them prey to the more committed more confident outfit. The great potential of that team was never fulfilled and much raw talent was allowed to wither and die away.

Whoever takes over the Waterford team had better be clear in his mind about the way he wishes his team to play. If he doesn't explain clearly to the panel why this approach is the common sense one and the correct one he will fail. If ground hurling in certain circumstances and areas of the field isn't given priority success will continue to elude us and we are doomed to further heartache and disappointment. Those junior press sold-and-pass merchants will have to be

curbed and changed into real hurlers or else dropped. The pick-every-ball clients will have to begin using their intelligence.

We simply must try the more direct and uncomplicated route. Liam Griffin has and we must learn from his success with Wexford. Of course we shall have to be most patient. Liam Griffin is and fully realises that Wexford have a bit of road to travel before he will be satisfied. He must continue to remind one of his best, great scorer and inspirational captain Martin Storey that you shouldn't try to catch every airborne ball because you won't be let as Martin found out against Offaly, and he has a sore left hand to prove it.

I honestly think that Waterford needs an independent leader from outside who has a thorough knowledge of the game, can detect and correct technical and tactical faults and weaknesses, who can imbue his panel with ambition to match his, who can instill patience and discipline and loyalty. A man who can fuse all the different personalities into one cohesive unit whose mental hardness will overcome that culture of defeat which Proinsias Breathnach so eloquently bemoans. A man respected outside his own county. Justin McCarthy has the necessary qualification, experience and ambition to fill this role, and he loves a challenge.

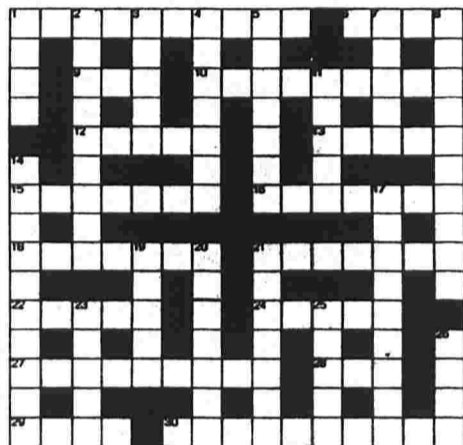
## Vibratory Treatments

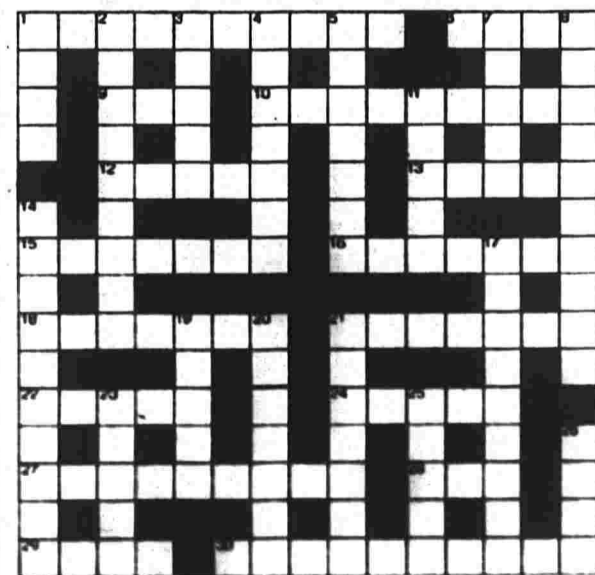

# Chef's Corner

## Menus for the week

### Summer

### Shepherd's Pie

Preparation: 15 minutes  
 Cooking: 45 minutes  
 Serves: 4

- 700g/1 1/2 lb minced lamb
- 1 onion, peeled and finely chopped
- 2 carrots, peeled and sliced diagonally
- 2 tsp plain flour
- 150ml/1/4 pt hot lamb stock
- 1 tsp Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tsp tomato puree
- 1 bay leaf
- 100g/4 oz frozen petit pois
- 2 tbsp fresh chopped mint
- 450g/1 lb new potatoes, scrubbed
- 50g/2 oz butter, melted

Place the mince in a large microwaveproof bowl and cook on high (100%) for 8 minutes, stirring twice. Stir in the onion, carrots and flour. Cook on high for a further 2 minutes. Mix the stock with the Worcestershire sauce, tomato puree, bay leaf and seasoning. Add to the meat mixture and stir well to combine. Cook on high for 10-12 minutes, until the mixture thickens and the meat is tender. Stir in the petit pois and mint. Allow to stand for 8 minutes. Place the potatoes in a large microwaveproof bowl and cover with boiling water. Cook on high for 8 minutes until just tender, stirring once. Drain potatoes

and leave to cool slightly before slicing. Preheat the grill. Spoon the mince mixture into a shallow heatproof dish and top with sliced potatoes. Brush with the butter and grill until just golden. Serve.

### Veggies in the Hole

Preparation: 20 mins  
 Cooking: 40 mins  
 Serves: 4

- For the batter:**
- 100g/4oz plain flour
  - pinch of salt
  - 1 egg
  - 300ml/1/2 pt milk
- freshly ground black pepper**
- For the filling:**
- 4 baby parsnips
  - 100g/4oz carrots
  - 100g/4oz broccoli florets
  - 25g/1oz garlic butter
  - 40ml/8 tsp vegetable oil
  - 8 cherry tomatoes

### METHOD

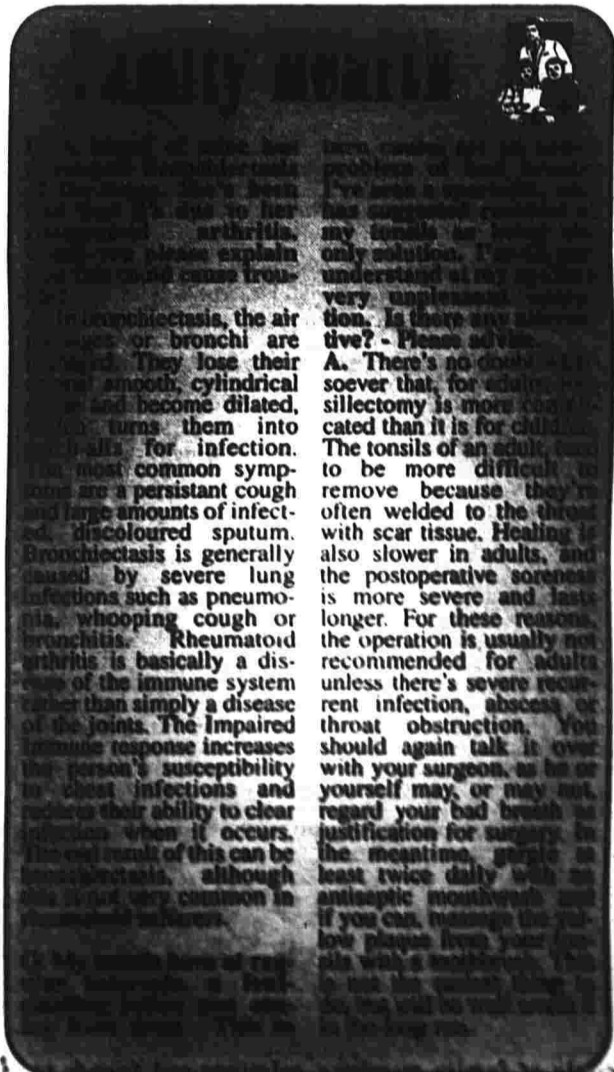
- Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F/ Gas Mark 6.
- Sift the flour and salt together in a bowl and make a well in the centre. Beat the egg and milk together and beat into the flour gradually, with plenty of freshly ground black pepper, until you have a smooth, thick batter. Leave to stand while

you prepare the vegetables or longer if you have the time. This will allow the grains of flour to swell and create an even better rise.

- Peel the parsnips and cut in half lengthways. Peel the carrots and cut into thick sticks.
- Plunge the parsnips, carrots and broccoli florets into a pan of boiling, salted water and cook for 4-5 mins or until just tender. Drain in a colander.
- Cut the butter into eight pieces and divide between eight 7cm/3" wide individual Yorkshire pudding tins, adding 5ml/1 tsp oil to each.
- Place in the oven for 2-3 mins until the butter has melted and is sizzling. Divide the cooked vegetables and cherry tomatoes between the tins and toss together in melted butter.
- Stir the batter, then divide between the tins and bake for 25-30 mins or until golden and well risen.
- Serve immediately with other mixed vegetables of your choice.

## Household Hints

- To make an inexpensive doormat, cover a household brick with thick fabric or wallpaper.
- After washing bed linen, before putting it away, fold it and put it all into a pillow case. This way all your matching sets will be kept together.
- When going away on holiday, always bring the brochures. If the accommodation is not up to the standard, you can show the holiday rep the brochures of what you believe you booked and paid for.
- If you like your fried eggs cooked on both sides, but they break while you are turning them, leave the lid on the pan. This way the steam inside cooks the egg all the way through.
- If you are making batter for Yorkshire puddings, brush some on your roast potatoes. This gives them a brown and crispy finish.

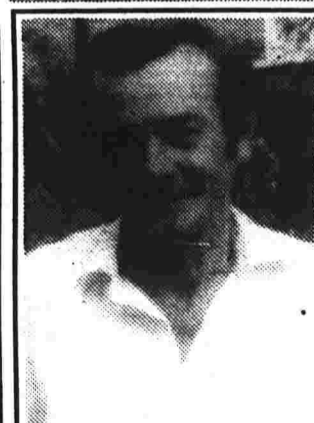

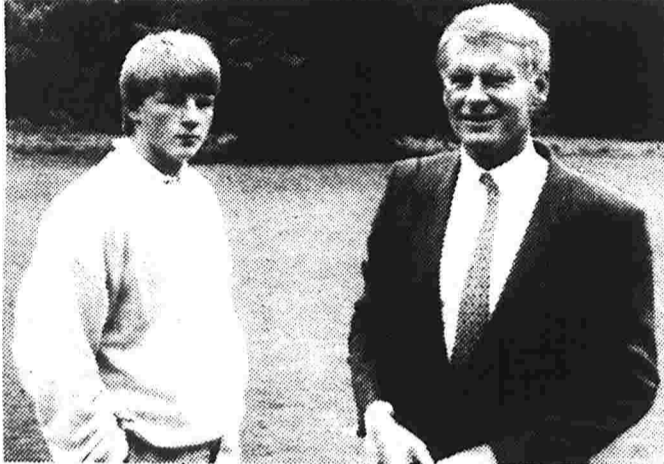

# Lieutenant Junior Cummins

## — A Rank Above The Rest

The best runner ever produced in the Dungarvan area was Junior Cummins. Statements like this can quite often cause varying degrees of controversy but anyone with a good knowledge of the local running scene over the years will readily agree that one John 'Junior' Cummins was indeed a rank above the rest.

Born in 1944, Junior Cummins lived at number 6 O'Connell Street, Dungarvan and he was introduced to athletics by Fr. Jerry Hickey while he was at school in the Friary. He later matured as one of the best 800 metre runners ever produced in Ireland while at the same time pursuing his career in the army at various locations around the country. Junior, one of a family of nine, is son of Rita and the late Jack Cummins who had a drapery business in the town.

In his heyday, during the years of 1964 to 1968, Ireland possessed a wealth of middle distance runners and so running enthusiasts enjoyed tremendous races with Dungarvan's own worthy representative involved in many of these. To the young local athletes of this era Junior was their real life hero.

One remembers watching go karting racing around the centre of Dungarvan in the late 1960's with Tom Coffey and his fellow competitors knocking clumps off the bales of straw placed for protection at the end of Mary Street and then arriving home to see Junior Cummins and his greatest rival Noel Carroll lashing it out on the precious black and white telly over the famous two lap distance.

In the imaginary world, Alf Tupper in "The Victor" fitted the bill with numerous nailbiting escapades but it was the real life Junior Cummins who left the lasting impression with National records, Irish championship wins, a World Military Bronze medal and the famous 1968 Olympic

Qualifying bid, the highlights of his career.

**EARLY DAYS**

During the golden years of Waterford hurling, 1957 to 1963, Junior Cummins began his athlete career virtually unnoticed in local sporting circles. His close associates were the Hurley brothers Noel and John and with a number of other athletic enthusiasts St. Mary's Athletic Club came into being.

The teenage Cummins trained at Quann's and at the Friary Field where Silver-springs now stands. It was at the St. Augustine's Schools Sports that Junior first showed more than the average natural talent which encouraged the school to enter him in the East Munster Colleges competitions. In these years the Friary School was situated in Main Street which is now occupied by the Waterford Foods group.

Junior's first 'outside' competition was at the East Munster Championships in 1958 and while he was to later compete in the 440 yards, 880 yards and one mile events, it was the middle distance 880 yards that proved to be his favourite event. In 1960 the sixteen years old Cummins took on allcomers to win the Munster Schools Intermediate 880 yards title.

This success was a just reward for the efforts of Fr. Hickey and company and so the modern day athletic tradition at the Friary was initiated. Up to 1961 Junior Cummins ran in schools competitions and at the very popular open sports meetings of this era while he also ran some cross country races.

This was the year that Junior finished his Secondary

schooling and left Dungarvan, which is all of thirty-five years ago and accounts for the fact that a whole generation of locals are unaware of his sporting exploits.

**NACA AND ARMY CHAMPION**

The youthful Junior Cummins joined the Army in 1961 which gave him some opportunity to further his athletic career and to compete abroad. Over the years he competed in Brussels, France, Madrid, Greece and Italy while ranked among his greatest achievements must be his bronze medal winning run over 800 metres at the International Military Games in Spain in 1964.

Junior, who was so named as he and his father possessed the same Christian name, won his first national title in 1962 when he became the Irish NACA Junior mile champion in a time of 4 mins. 20 secs. From 1962 to the end of his career in 1970 he dominated the Irish Army competitions being a champion at either 800 metres or one mile during every one of these years.

His club athletic career traced the changing course of Irish athletics in the 1960's. Not being attracted to American scholarships, Junior competed with the NACA up to 1965 and with the AAU up to 1967. BLE was formed in 1967 which, to the best of our knowledge, was an amalgamation of the AAU and part of the NACA. Junior competed with BLE in the remaining years of his career. His NACA clubs were St. Marys AC, Dungarvan and Collins AC, Cork. When returning to Cork he ran BLE with Mallow AC and Grange AC, Fermoy.

**CUMMINS SMASHES IRISH RECORD AT COBH**

The Cork Examiner reported in July 1964 that 20 year old Dungarvan Army Offi-

cer John Cummins raced to glory in smashing the Irish half mile record in one of the greatest NACA races of those years at the Cork County Championships in Cobh. Representing his army club, Collins AC, Cummins pounded around a track which helped him very little in a magnificent 1 min. 52.1 secs. to cut 1.5 secs off Gerry O'Gorman's four year old record and improve his personal best by 4.7 seconds.

In second place eight yards behind was local schoolboy international Ian Hamilton and this race of itself lifted the championships to a level well above the normal and drew a big crowd to the new GAA grounds. The red-haired Cummins possessed great strength and determination and he led by 25 yards at the bell. This good tactical move won for him his second record within a fortnight as he had already broken the Army record in the Curragh with a 1 min. 56.8 clocking.

**1964 ATHLETE OF THE YEAR**

The year 1964 is remem-

bered as "Lieutenant Junior Cummins Year." The 20 year old Dungarvan born runner won two Irish Senior NACA titles, the 1500 metres (3 mins. 39 secs.) and the mile (4 min. 13 secs.) as well as the Irish Junior mile title and the Munster mile title. After breaking the National 880 yards record in Cobh he bettered this mark at a special invitation in Banteer when he clocked 1 min. 50.8 secs., but this was not submitted for ratification due to the nature of the event. Junior Cummins's times in 1964 did much to raise the standards of NACA competitions. — Cork Examiner.

**TURNING POINT IN CAREER**

During the mid 1960's some athletes participated with the NACA and some with the AAU, the two associations that organised club athletics in Ireland. It was generally accepted that the

standard in the AAU was higher than in the NACA. Junior Cummins enjoyed his time with the NACA and he helped to raise its standards, but as 1965 dawned he realised that if he was to realise his full athletic potential he would have to run against athletes who were better than he was and so he joined AAU club Crusaders AC in Dublin.

In 1965 he finished runner-up in the Irish AAU 880 yards championship but his athletic progress was halted in 1966 when he was based in Cyprus with the Irish Army and perhaps this year out affected later happenings, especially his Olympic qualifying bid in 1968.

**IRISH INTERNATIONAL**

When Junior returned to competition in 1967, BLE had been formed and it didn't take the army lieutenant long to get back into the top flight of Irish athletics. He gained his first BLE International when he represented Ireland in the Europa Cup.

## LIEUT. JUNIOR CUMMINS

# One Of Ireland's Best Middle Distance Runners

The standard of 880 yards running was very good and household names in the country such as Noel Carroll (Civil Service), Frank Murphy (Clonliffe Harriers), Eamon O'Keeffe (UCD), the late Fanahan McSweeney (Grange AC), Derek McCleane (Crusaders), Jim Ryan (Civil Service), Ian Hahilton (Cobh) and Billy Bolster (Mallow) were his main rivals. While the standard was good, the international scene had not developed as it is today and so competition was mainly of a domestic nature. Junior's greatest opponent was Noel Carroll and their rivalry brought out the best in each of them and it produced a brilliant year of 800 metres running in 1968.

### 1968 OLYMPIC QUALIFYING BID

*"In three separate attempts Junior Cummins was only a total of eight tenths of a second outside qualifying for the Mexico Olympics."*

Some sportsmen and women have a defining moment in their career and as soon as their name crops up this is mentioned. Included in this list would be such as Ronnie Delaney, Seamus Darby, Ray Houghton, John Treacy and, of course, the growing number of unfortunate soccer penalty shootout victims in recent times. Conversation on Junior Cummins' career quickly turns to his 1968 Olympic qualifying

bid. He himself categorises 1968 as the year he failed to break the necessary 1 min. 48 secs. for the 800 metres but this brief assessment is too harsh. Behind it lies an almighty attempt in the true spirit of amateurism to achieve a special goal. In June of 1968 Junior's personal best time for 800 metres was 1 min. 50 secs. By August he had reduced this to 1 min. 48.2 secs. In this pre tartan track era, a time of 1 min. 48 secs. on grass or cinder tracks is generally recognised as 1 min. 44 secs. on today's tracks. Watch for the 800 metres times at the Atlanta Olympics this week.

Noel Carroll was Ireland's top 800 metres runner in 1968. On no less than six occasions he broke the qualifying time for the Olympics. Fellow Dubliner Frank Murphy won the silver medal in the European 1500 metres final in Athens in 1969 and these two runners and Junior Cummins were involved in a sensational race in College Park in June 1968 when the army man threw down the gauntlet from an early stage (see photo).

### CARROLL FALLS IN DRAMATIC 880 Cummins Beats Frank Murphy

Noel Carroll (Civil Service), Ireland's Olympic nomination for the 800 metres at Mexico was sensationally eclipsed in the 880 feature event at the Civil Service Sports in College

Park (June 9th).

At the second last bend, just about 200 yards from the finish, Carroll stumbled and fell, so that a race which had been shaping up for a tremendous climax was ruined. Nevertheless, Junior Cummins (Mallow), the Army Lieutenant, who had shot into the lead at the bell, and was still in front, though under fierce pressure, when the unfortunate incident occurred, ran on to win ahead of Ireland's latest sub four minute miler Frank Murphy in a personal best of 1 min. 50.1 secs. A fine performance.

### THE WORST KIND OF LUCK

Following the 800 metres at Santry last Wednesday (early August) when Junior Cummins once again missed the Olympic qualifying time by a hairsbreadth, it was suggested by many of those present that the timekeeper had previously erred in giving the Mallow A.C. runner's time as 1 min. 48.4 secs.

This really is the worst kind of luck. In three races, Cummins has totalled an aggregate of less than one second outside the qualifying time. He has been one fifth of a second to slow on two occasions and on Wednesday he was two fifths of a second off the mark. Cummins' time could have been given as 1 min. 48.2 but he would still have been outside the necessary 1 min. 48 secs.

Certainly Noel Carroll did his best for Cummins by taking up the running at the bell, but if Cummins had gone on himself he might have made it. He has run so many races from the front this season that the change may have been a bit sudden. If Carroll had stayed a shade behind all the way from the bell Cummins might have been able to find that little extra to stay in front. As the race turned out he just didn't have the speed to accelerate when Carroll kicked around the final bend.

Some athletes just can't come from behind if they normally run from the front. Perhaps Junior just hasn't the pace to make it in a sprint.

### LAST CHANCE

Junior had one last opportunity in that hectic Summer of 1968 when a Dublin v. Cork match was held in Santry at the end of August. However a sub 1 min. 48 secs. run once again eluded him and so Ireland's lone representative in Mexico was Noel Carroll. It must have been heartbreaking for him but he bounced back the following year to win the Irish 880 yards title.

Cummins Wins Double At Dungarvan Sports — A 400

metres / 800 metres double by Dungarvan born Junior Cummins was the highlight of the Deise Open Sports held under BLE rules at the C.B.S. Grounds, Dungarvan on Sunday last. Deise A.C. is an amalgamation of Dungarvan A.C., Ring A.C. and Friary A.C. and the club must have been very happy with the response of their sports which drew large crowds to the town field.

Lieutenant Cummins, the fleet footed Mallow based Armyman was a facile winner of his two races, demonstration once again his class as a top rate middle distance runner.

Cummins beat P. J. Kelly of D.M.P. and Robert Norwood of Kilkenny in the one lap event and in the 800 metres he relegated the Premier A.C. pairing of J. Ormonde and M. Carey to the minor positions. The evergreen Fintan Walsh won the Waterford 1500 metres title from John Barry (Lismore) and Davy Browne (Tramore).

Two other local winners at the sports were Johnny Lynch (Fruit Merchant) who scored a very impressive win in the novice 100 metres from the De La Salle pair, F. Byrne and J. Wallace, while the youthful Pa Meehan won the under 15 400 metres from A. Cahill (Midleton) and C. Newry (Kilkenny). Hon. starter was Paddy Byrne, Chairman Waterford Co. Board and the prizes were presented by Rev. Fr. O'Donnell, O.S.A.

### JUNIOR BOWS OUT

As an 800 metres runner Junior Cummins' greatest qualities were his basic speed and his great strength and fierce determination. A lacking of an extra turn of speed in the finishing straight was the difference between him and Noel Carroll but then what could Carroll have ultimately achieved if he possessed Cummins' determination and strength?

By the 1969-70 season Junior had reached his peak as an 800 metres runner and at twenty six years of age he retired from athletics as quietly as he entered it in the old Friary field in 1958. His success on the track was matched by his career in the army which in recent times saw him promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. Junior currently lives in Cork, married to Liz, while his son Ivan's sporting ambitions centre around the rugby fields of Ireland. Juniors current sporting interests include a daily seven mile non competitive run while in recent years he has been the Army representative on the Cork City Sports Committee.

Though retired over twenty five years, Junior Cummins' best time of 1 min. 48.2 secs for 800 metres is rarely beaten by Irish runners of this era on the modern tartan tracks around the country. He was a good one!

# OLYMPIC DIARY

## Atlanta '96

(BY WILLIAM DOWNING)

Ireland had never seen the likes of it before. Twenty four hours after the Opening Ceremony came a medals ceremony - with Ireland involved. Having won the 400m individual medley Michelle Smith had given this country its first ever gold medal to be won by a woman. For here, she set out on a path for more glory.

### MICHELLE OUR BELLE

Monday July 23 (Day Three)

With one gold medal in the bag - or wherever she put it - Michelle Smith this morning turned her attention to the 400m Freestyle, where she again qualified for the final, being pipped by one hundredth of a second in the heats by Kerstin Kielgas. This was the race that the Rathcoole swimmer was entered into at a late stage, resulting in protests being lodged by the American, Dutch, German, and Australian Federations. Following a hearing, the first ever, at the new "Olympic Court", Smith was decreed by the International Olympic Committee's arbiters to be okay for the final, and when it came, the final was so one-sided it was unreal. Michelle was solid in each of the disciplines - butterfly, breaststroke, backstroke and freestyle - and devastated the rest of the field having over a second to spare over silver medalist Dagmar Hase of Germany and Kirsten Vliedhous of the Netherlands in an Irish record time of 4 mins 7.25 secs. A second gold medal for Smith, and she deserved a medal too for her composure during the post-race press conference, fending off questions from an over-suspicious American press who grilled her with questions on dope tests and dramatically improved times. She kept her cool throughout, and while American swimmer Janet Evans looked to fan the flames, Smith stood her ground. According to some, she should go for the United Nations.

Defending Olympic champion Aleksandr Popov became the first man since Tarzan to retain the 100m Freestyle Final. Johnny Weissmuller, who achieved the feat in 1932, went on to star as "The King of the Apes" in Hollywood. You're 4ft 11, nine stone, what sport do you go into? Weightlifting obviously, or at least you are if you're Turk Naim Suleymanoglu, who by lifting a total of 55 stone won his third Olympic gold in world record fashion. Despite being knocked onto the seats of his pants ten seconds into his middleweight bout, Brian Magee picked himself up, dusting himself off and dispatched Canada's Randall Thompson 13 - 5 on points. Overall, another day of gold.

### GYM FIXES IT FOR ALL AMERICAN GIRLS

Tuesday, July 23 (Day 4)

The Georgia Dome is due to see its fair share of drama during the Games, and what happened there tonight certainly caught the imagination. Being cheered on by a partizan home crowd, the U.S.A. were coasting the victory in the women's team gymnastics with two performers left, both on the vault. But with Russia

closing on the rails, spritely 15-year-old Dominique Moceanu stumbled and fell on landing from both of her vaults, putting immense pressure on young Kerry Strug, who repeated the act on her first effort. Despite having twinged her ankle, Strug now had to put in a solid vault to grab a victory that was rapidly slipping away. This time she got it right, but at some cost to herself, aggravating the injury and she had to be carried away for treatment in the midst of jubilant celebrations. Having ruled herself out of the individual competition and perhaps the entire Olympics, Strug had sacrificed herself for her team. Having already won South Africa's first gold medal since 1952 earlier in the week, Penny Heyns made it a double by pipping 14-year-old Amanda Beard for the 200m Breaststroke title. In the boxing ring, Ireland had a flyweight victory as Damien Kelly, trailing Bulgarian Julian Strogov going into the final round, pounded his way through on points, 12-11. Michelle Smith's success hasn't rubbed off on her colleagues - both Adrian O'Connor and Marion Madine failed to progress in the pool, and things just keep getting worse for Italian football as Ghana, with a 3-2 victory, knocked out the Italians. There should be a boom in tomato sales, very, very soon.

### WALKING ON WATER

Wednesday July 24 (Day 5)

Michelle Smith let her swimming do the talking by surely silencing her critics permanently as she claimed the third gold medal, this one in the 200m Individual Medley. Having come third in her heat, the Rathcoole native found herself out in lane 1, traditionally the slowest lane, mainly because it's the slowest swimmers who are put there, but, the outside lane did not prove to be an obstacle for Smith as she hauled in leader Lin Li of China having led herself for most of the race. From there, she was not to be denied. Canadian Marianne Limpert took silver, Li got the bronze. The way it's going, Michelle may need another mantlepiece now. It's a new Irish record as well: 2:13:93. Meanwhile, Russian Denis Pankratov set a new world record on his way to victory in the 100m Butterfly, winning in a time of 52.27 seconds. Francis Barrett became the third Irish boxer to qualify for the second round when the light welterweight thumped Brazil's Zely Ferreira 32 - 7, the highest score to date in any of the Olympic boxing bouts. That's what I call making sure. In rowing, Ireland's coxless fours qualified for the final via the repechage, but no joy for the Irish equestrian team, as illness to two of their horses forced them to withdraw. They were fourth at the time.

### U.S.A. ARE FLOORED

Thursday, July 25 (Day 6)

60% of the prime-time Olympic coverage on American network N.B.C. comprises of gymnastics, so it was another all-American night at the Georgia Dome. Or at least it would have been. The individual competition ended in tears for the home town challengers when both Shan-

non Miller and Dominique Dawes were penalised for stepping off the floor, in the third of their fourth exercises. When the same thing happened to leader Mo Huilan of China in her final routine, that handed the title to world champion Lilia Podkopyayeva from the Ukraine, with a silver and two bronze (for a tie) going to Romania - three medals for them but still not a clean sweep. There's one for a pub quiz. 16-year-old Brooke Bennett was cheered on to victory by those noisy home fans to take the women's 800m Freestyle, while by winning the 50m Freestyle, Russian Aleksandr Popov became the first man since Tarzan ... you know the rest! In winning the 200m Breaststroke meanwhile, Hungarian Krizstina Egersega took the Olympic title for the third consecutive time; nobody's done that since Dawn Fraser in the fifties, and as far as Ireland are concerned, it's goodbye to swimmer Nick O'Hehir and judoist Nick Ward. The both failed to nick victory.

### FOUR THE HONOUR AND THE GLORY

Friday, July 26 (Day 7)

Another medal for Michelle Smith, but this time it's not gold. In a new Irish record time of 2:09:91, Smith finished third in the 200m butterfly title behind Australians Susan O'Neill and Petra Thomas, bringing an amazing gold winning-streak to an end, along with Gary O'Toole's Nostradamus-like predictions. He'd forecast everything down to such frightening perfection, he should put Mystic Meg out of a job. Amy van Dyken (U.S.A.) claimed her fourth gold medal by taking the 50m freestyle as the U.S.A. set a world record of 3 mins 34.84 secs to win the men's 4 x 100m medley relay. For many people this was really day one as athletics got underway with Jefferson Perez winning the men's 20k walk, instantly making him a national hero, and probably a saint too, in time. He's Ecuador's first ever Olympic medalist. They'll be dancing on the streets of Quito tonight. Sonia O'Sullivan won her 5000m semi final in a new Olympic record time; it had to be a record because it was the first ever women's 5000m ever run in the Olympic Games. Meanwhile in the same events another budding finalist Mary Decker - Slaney (remember her?) finished seventh in her heat. Not enough. Another final round onslaught gave Brian Magee an 11.6 points victory over Bertrand Tet-sia of Cameroon. He always leaves it late.

### SATURDAY JULY 27 (DAY 8)

Atlanta woke to hear the news that a bomb blast had killed two people and injured 110 during a concert at Centennial Park, an exhibition park opened especially for the Olympic Games. Instantly condemned around the world, it was an unpleasant reminder of the carnage at 1972 Games in Munich. The message from the I.O.C. was a clear one. "The Games must go on". And on they go.

### BAILEY STAR

"This is what it's all about! This is it!" Dennis Mitchell's words to the camera

after winning yesterday's heats summed it up. This was it. One hundred metres of pure speed to determine the world's fastest man. Frankie Fredericks, the favourite from Namibia, won his semi-final in 9.94. The world record had to go in the final. With defending champion Linford Christie out for false-starting twice, Frederick's started brilliantly with Boldon surging forward halfway through. But they had reckoned without world champion Donovan Bailey of Canada who blitzed them both to take gold - and the world record. Bailey 9.84. Fredericks 9.89, Boldon 9.90 - and all in the American's backyard. Gail Devers pipped Merlene Ottey by a thousandth of a second (again) to take the women's 100m crown - the nails did it apparently - while her boyfriend Kenny Harrison out-did Jonathan Edwards for the triple jump crown. For the fourth consecutive games, rower Steven Redgrave will walk home with a gold medal, only the fourth person in history to do this. His Coxless Pairs partner is Matthew Pinsent.

### SONIA'S NIGHTMARE

Sunday, July 28 (Day 9)

Michelle Smith was by no means Ireland's main medal hope going into these Games. Sonia O'Sullivan was, and she went into tonight's 5000m final in the middle of a row over her kit. She was apparently ordered to change from a Reebok kit (her sponsors) she was wearing into an official Asics kit, the company who are kit suppliers to the Irish Olympic team. She was allegedly asked to strip whilst in the tunnel before Friday's race. To complete her misery, she ran possibly the worst race of her entire life in tonight's final, and pulled out after bringing up the rear. Chinese athlete Jungxia Wang outpaced Ethiopia's Pauline Konga for gold. Another Ethiopian, Fatuma Roba, put in the race of her life to win the women's marathon as the U.S.A.'s Charles Austin won a thrilling men's high jump with an Olympic record leap of 2.39m. Silver went to Pole Artur Partyka, and Scouser Steve Smith took the bronze. As Ireland finished fourth in the men's coxless fours final, Damien Kelly outpointed the originally named Australian Hussein Hussein (Kylie O'Reilly can only be around the corner then) 27.20 in a magnificent flyweight contest. Light welter Francis Barrett though was beaten by Tunisian Fathi Massoui. He won just once. That would be enough. The Saw Doctors must have been getting hints off Gary O'Toole.

### ANOTHER GOLD-SMITH

Monday, July 29 (Day 10)

In the wee small hours of Tuesday morning, Waterford athlete Susan Smith whose father David works at E.S.B. H.Q. in the city by the Suir, was hoping to put in an electric performance.

On Community Radio Youghal's daily Olympic Report at 2 p.m. Fr. Liam Kelleher the P.R.O. of B.L.E. who is reporting for C.R.Y. from the Games, said that to his knowledge the Sonia O'Sullivan stripping incident did not happen. During a brief post-race press conference, Sonia makes a mysterious reference to "The Big D". Stranger and stranger. Time to get the dictionaries out. Sonia will go in the 1,500m later in the week.

# Waterford Crush Clare In Munster Final

**WATERFORD 2-19 CLARE 1-6**

The scoreline told the tale as far as the 1996 Munster senior final is concerned at Fraher Field last Sunday afternoon as Waterford proved far too strong for Clare.

From the first whistle there was no doubt as the reigning All Ireland champions turned in a display that suggests that they remain the team to beat as far as all contenders are concerned.

Kicking a total of twenty one scores, a tally that includes two superb goals and some magnificent points, Waterford cruised into a semi final clash away to Monaghan on Sunday, September 8. By half time they led 1-9 to 0-2 and a quick goal on the restart settled the contest.

With underfoot conditions soft because of heavy

overnight rain, Waterford began brightly with a point from Fiona Crotty. From the kick-out Olivia Condon and Rebecca Hallahan combined to place Geraldine O'Ryan for a great long range point in the 7th minute.

Waterford keeper Annalisa Crotty produced a good save as the Clare forwards stretched the Waterford full back line on a number of occasions before wing back Julie Torpey came upfield to shoot the 3rd point in the 11th minute. Geraldine O'Ryan landed two great points, the second from all of forty yards in the 15th

minute.

Clare finally opened their account in the 19th minute with a point from Caroline Quinlan. The Banner side missed a number of scoreable chances before Fiona Crotty shot a Waterford point in the 22nd minute. Marie Crotty pointed two frees, the second from 35 yards. Geraldine O'Ryan added another, over her shoulder, as Waterford moved into an eight point lead.

Wing forward Diane Kelly had a good point for Clare before Waterford struck for their first goal in the 28th minute. Catriona Casey's line-ball was knocked down by Geraldine O'Ryan to Fiona Crotty, who placed a lovely pass in front of Aine Wall. From twenty yards she

smashed an unstoppable shot into the left hand corner of the net giving Clare keeper, Mary Keane, no chance and left the visitors with a mountain to climb.

Within two minutes of the restart the door was well and truly closed as far as Clare were concerned when Martina O'Ryan's long range drive from midfield found her sister Geraldine who quickly found Aine Wall and she expertly drove the ball to the Clare net. By now Waterford were rampant and the Crotty sisters shot two further points. Aine Wall placed Geraldine O'Ryan for Waterford's 12th point in the 38th minute.

The Clare defence were now struggling and Marie Crotty pointed three consecutive frees although Fiona O'Boyle added two similar efforts for Clare. O'Boyle and Carmel Bohannon added two further points but Marie Crotty from a free

and Catherine Walsh answered with two Waterford points. Clare at last got a goal from Sonya Maher, but it was no more than a consolation score and Aine Wall had the last say with Waterford's 19th point in the 58th minute.

On that performance it's going to take a great side to beat Waterford, although it most be said that there is room for improvement. The full back line looked shaky in the early stages and it was left to goalkeeper Annalisa Crotty to produce a couple of great saves.

Cleona Walsh, Siobhan O'Ryan and especially Julie Torpey were the pick of the Waterford defence. Olivia Condon was outstanding at midfield.

The attack always had the measure of the Clare rear-guard. Aine Wall's finishing was lethal, Geraldine O'Ryan destroyed the Clare defence and Marie Crotty

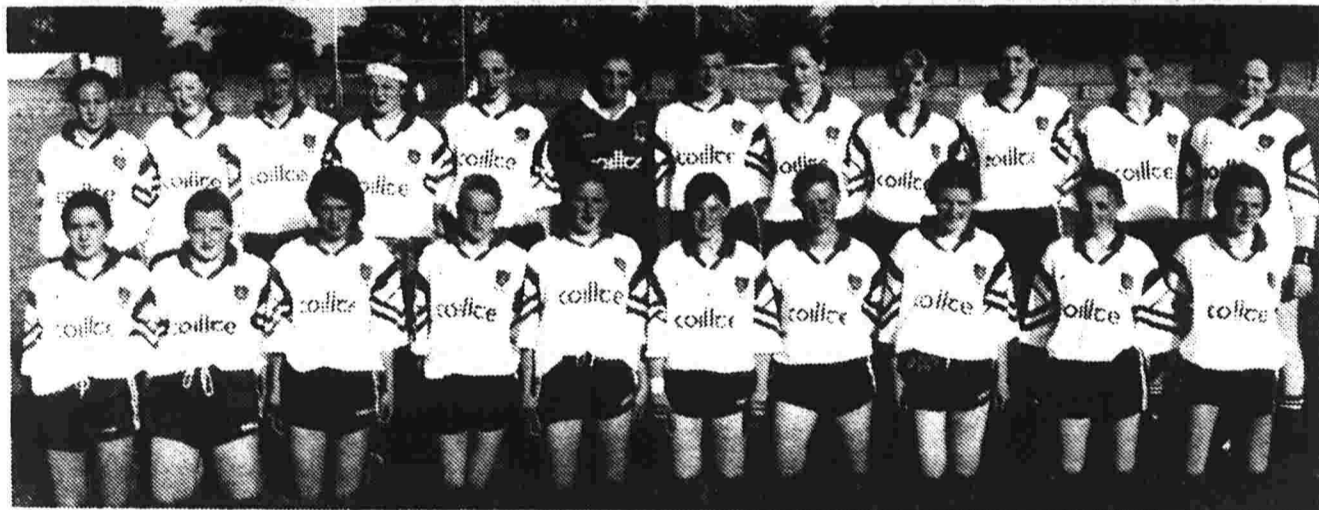
chipped on with a total of seven points. Fiona Crotty made a welcome return to action, after an injury she sustained against Clare in last year's championship and scored three fine points.

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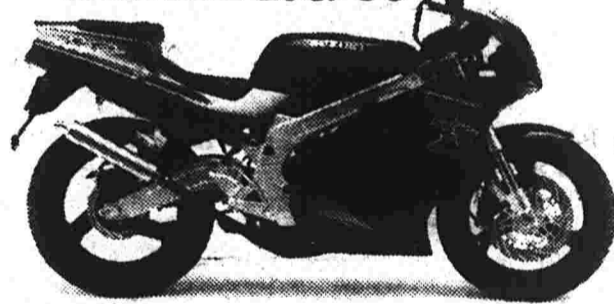
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
