Tragedies Devastate Local Communities

The closeknit gaeltacht community in Ring has been devastated by the weekend tragedy which claimed the life of twenty two year old Muireann Ni Mhuirthe of Helvick.

Only daughter of Sylvester (Bilest) and Breda Ni Mhuirthe, who run the popular licensed premises overlooking the busy Helvick fishing port, Muireann was driving home shortly before 3 a.m. last Sunday when the tragedy occurred.

Her car careered into a wall at Knockenpower, Ring, no more than two miles from her home. And though the alarm was raised soon afterwards by a passer-by it is understood Muireann's death was instantaneous.

Dungarvan Fire Brigade personnel had to use cutting equipment to remove her from her car and she was removed to Waterford Regional Hospital but was pronounced dead on arrival.

The deceased, who commanded the respect and admiration of the entire gaeltacht community, had only recently qualified as a nurse at St. Vincent's Hospital in Dublin.

A member of a family

steeped in the G.A.A. tradition, she was First Aid officer to the Ring club to which her father, Bilest, gave years of sterling service as a player and today as an intermediate hurling selector and trainer of the under 16 and minor hurling teams.

Her boyfriend of several years, Carthach MacCraith, has been one of the most prominent dual players in

Local Man's Body Recovered

A Dungarvan family's worst fears were confirmed in the early hours of Sunday morning last when the body of twenty-eight year old Fergus Allen McCarthy, 5 Huntley Crescent, Southways, Abbesside, was recovered from the river Suir in Waterford city.

The recovery of the body ended a week long river search involving garda sub aqua and local fishermen following reports that a man was seen struggling in the river on the afternoon of Sunday, August 4.

All efforts to rescue him failed and then began the lengthy search which culminated in the recovery of the Dungarvanman's body early last Sunday.

The deceased was son of T. F. (Francis) and Carmel McCarthy and was one of a family of four — three boys and a girl.

A single man, he was a quiet and reserved individual who enjoyed the respect of his legion of friends.

The tragic nature of his death and the utter untimeliness of it, has shocked and saddened the entire local community and left his parents, brothers, sister and many other relatives to

grieve his passing.

The removal of his remains took place from the Drohan Funeral Home on Tuesday evening to Abbesside Church amid huge outpourings of sadness. The vast concourse mirrored the depth of sorrow the tragedy has evoked within the local community.

Following Requiem Mass on today (Wednesday) the funeral took place to St. Mary's Parish Cemetery, Dungarvan, where the burial followed in the presence of another vast concourse of mourners.

The deceased is survived by his parents T. F. (Francis) and Carmel McCarthy, his brothers Dan and Tim, sister Olga, his grandmother, sister-in-law, uncles, aunts, nephew, niece and cousins.

To all of them the sympathy of the entire community is extended.

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QUESTION

Myself and my wife are both over 66 and I get a pension from the Local authority of £164 gross. I have £10,000 in the bank, I have a son aged 20 living with us who is going to college. We do not have a Social Welfare pension. Will I qualify for the Free Schemes?

ANSWER

The income ceiling for a couple over 66, with a dependent child is £174.10 a week to meet the means conditions for qualifying for the "free schemes."

The £10,000 you have in the bank will be assessed thus:

	£10,000
First £200 is ignored	£9,800
£100 for dependent child ignored	£9,700
Balance assessed at 5% to give a yearly value	£485
Divided by 52 to give a weekly value	£9.33
For a couple, weekly value divided by 2	£4.67
Total weekly means £4.67+1	£5.67

Social welfare will add £164+£5.67=£169.67. As this is less than your income ceiling of £174.10 you satisfy the means test for the schemes. You will therefore qualify for the Free Electricity Allowance and Free Television Licence. You will not qualify for the Telephone Rental Allowance as your son is over 18. If your son was under 18 you would only qualify if your wife was handicapped in such a way that she could not get help for you in an emergency.

High Quality Bathing Water In Local Beaches

Sampling of bathing waters, which was first undertaken on a major scale in 1988 when 52 areas were checked, has consistently shown that our waters are of a high quality.

Last year, 98% of Irish beaches complied with the mandatory water quality standards and 88% complied with the guideline values in the EU Bathing Water Directive.

In Co. Waterford the following bathing areas are now covered by the Quality of Bathing Waters Regulations; the beach at Ardmore, Bonmahon, Clonea, Dunmore Strand, Dunmore East, Counsel-

lors' Strand, Dunmore East and the beach at Tramore. The main beach at Youghal and Claycastle are also covered by the water quality regulations.

Commenting on the results of the bathing water sampling, Minister for the Environment, Brendan Howlin said, "it is important that this level of success, in relation to water quality, is complemented by effective measures to tackle litter if the amenity and scenic value of beaches is to be preserved. I appeal to the public to support the efforts of local authorities to deal with this problem and to use litter bins, where

the Ring club during the last decade.

Throughout the week locals have been finding it all but impossible to come to terms with the enormity of the tragedy which has engulfed the entire locality in deepest mourning.

Muireann was a delightfully outgoing young lady, the possessor of a charming personality, and one whose company it was at all times a delight to share.

Her tragic death has taken on a still greater poignancy by the fact that the tragedy is little more than two years after a similar traffic accident in Saudi Arabia which claimed the life of her cousin, neighbour, and very close friend, Dervla Ni Mhuiri.

Ironically, too, her grandmother, Lizzie Murray, was also killed in a road traffic accident more than a quarter of

a century ago.

There were harrowing scenes on Tuesday afternoon when the funeral took place in her home parish. Ring Parish church was packed to overflowing for the Requiem Mass and the funeral then followed to the new cemetery where the interment took place in the presence of over several thousand mourners, representing one of the biggest courses ever seen in the area.

Many people wept openly and unashamedly as family and friends bade a last farewell to a young lady whose tragically untimely death has torn at the very heartstrings of the entire community.

She is survived by her parents Bilest and Breda, her brothers Emmett, Fionan, Cormac and Neil, uncles, aunts, many relatives, and her boyfriend Carthach MacCraith to all of whom sincere and heartfelt sympathy is extended.

NATIONAL SCOUT ARCHIVES AND MUSEUM TO OPEN AT MOUNT MELLERAY

Over two hundred guests are expected for the official opening of the National Scout Archives and Museum based at the Mount Melleray Scout Centre on Sunday next, August 18. The opening will be performed by the Chief Scout, Joseph Lawlor. It will be a dream come true for Jim Hally B.E. former Chief Scout and County Engineer for Waterford. He has worked hard for the past two years along with a National Archive Committee of twenty people drawn from all parts of the country to make it a reality.

The archive section holds all the official files going back to 1927 when the Catholic Boy Scouts were founded by Fathers Tom and Ernest Farrell at Greystones, Co. Wicklow. From a humble beginning C.B.S.I. now have forty thousand members. The files from each diocese in the country include all original letters requesting scouting to be started in the various parishes along with detailed membership lists of names and addresses. For any research student there is an abundance of material.

The Museum houses many artifacts and troop colours going back of the decades and will be of great interest to those inside and outside scouting who will stop and visit.

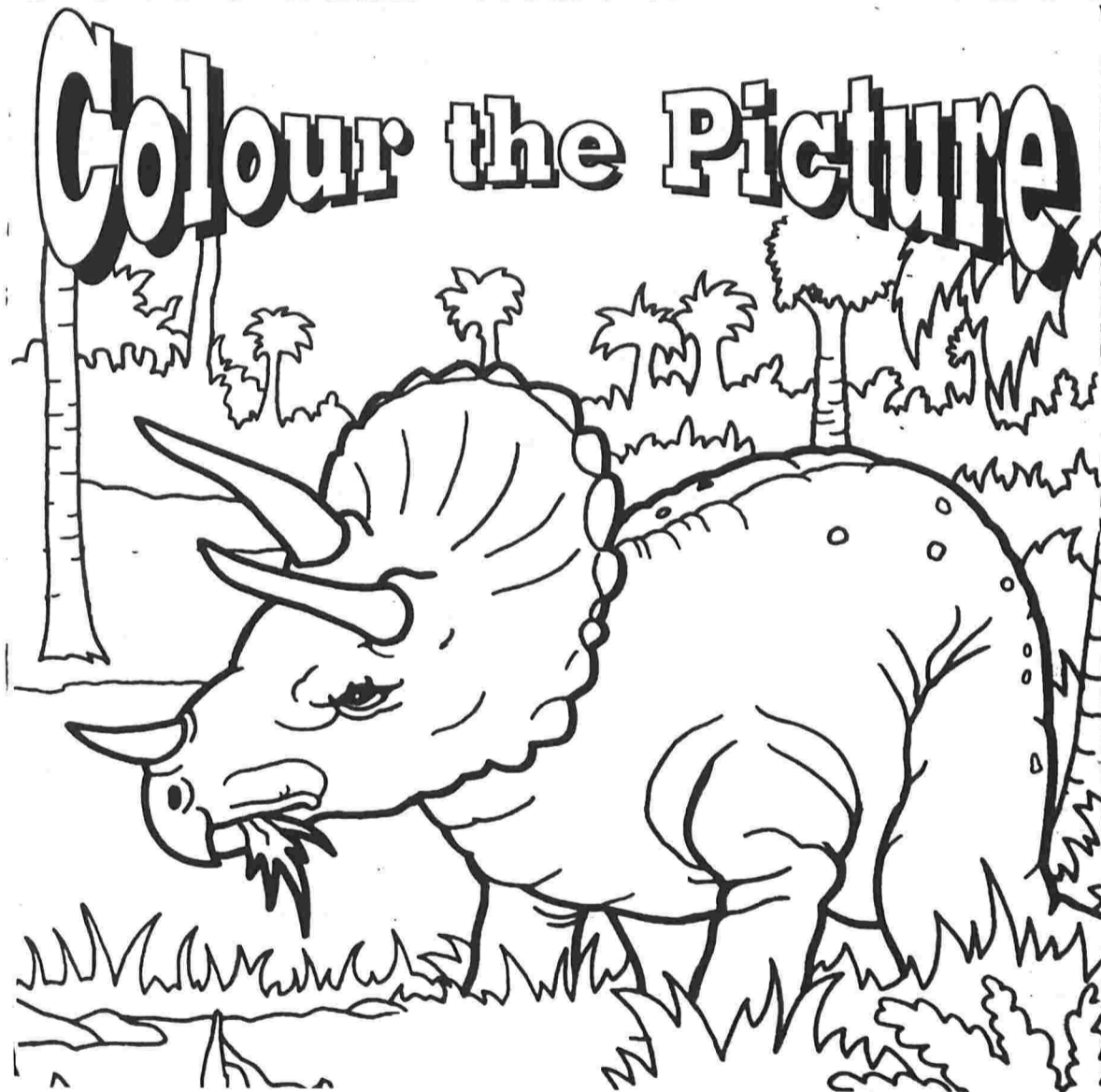

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Junior Encyclopaedia

More About Cattle

When cattle are young, they may threaten each other to find out who's leader. A cow that is going to threaten another one, stands with its head lowered and its hind legs forward, eyeing the other. Sometimes it may paw the ground.

If the other cow makes a threat as well, they fight. They will try to knock one another and push with their heads. The fight will end when one cow loses interest and walks away. In winter, cattle eat hay or silage and sometimes kale. All through the year the farmer feeds them a cow cake which is made from barley, soya, fish meal and molasses. The cow needs to drink about 60 litres of water per day. They drink most after evening milking. While they are drinking they keep their nostrils above the surface of the water. In a herd that is established, there is usually one cow which leads the others when going in for milking. It is not necessarily the oldest or strongest cow. The older cows are usually at the back of the herd along with the weak ones. Nowadays, most milking is done by machine. In hand-milking, the farmer grasps a teat in each hand and squeezes it with his thumb

and forefinger. Then gently but firmly, he pulls his hand down the teat to get the milk out. Cattle try to keep themselves clean. They groom themselves by licking. They scratch the parts they cannot reach by rubbing against fences or trees. They use their tails to brush their skins and also to flick off flies. You might see one cow grooming another on the head and neck. They also do this to please one another.



While the cow chews, it moves its head about looking for the next patch of grass to eat. It can walk up to 4km a day while grazing. Cattle avoid grazing near dung pats. When the cow is finished grazing, it sits down or stands still and chews the cud. Another thing you might see is a lump of salt in the field. The farmer puts it there for the cows to lick and this gives them the minerals they need in their diet.

The programme will feature organ works covering nearly three centuries, from J. S. Bach (1685 - 1750) to

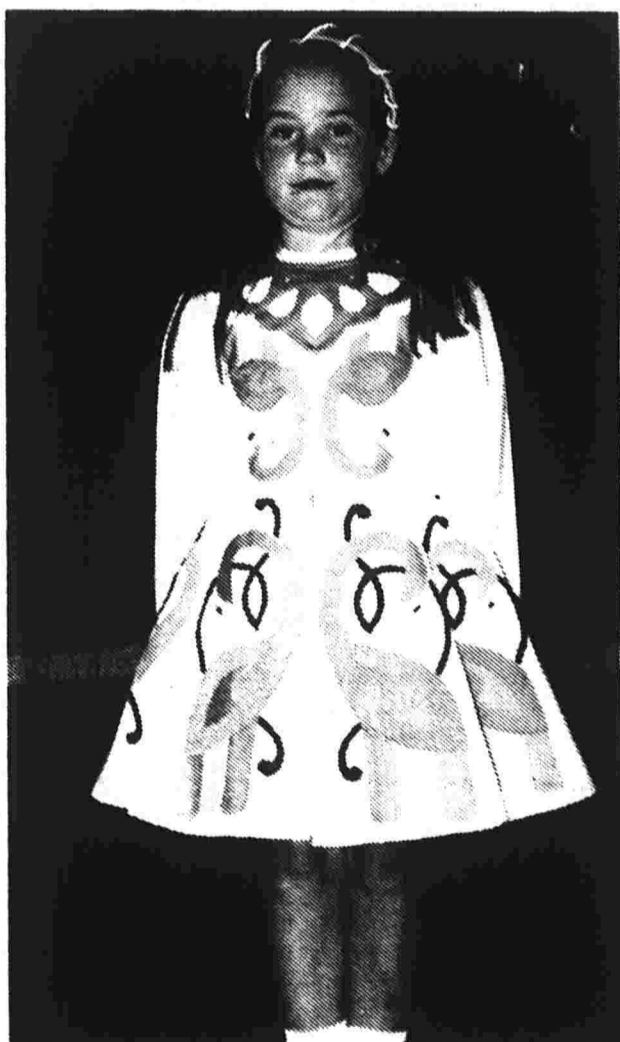
Petr Eben who was born in 1929 and lives and works in Prague. Petr Eben was one of the adjudicators in this year's International Choral Festival in Cork. In this recital his verset on the Gregorian chant "Adoro Te Devote" (also a hymn in the Church or Ireland hymn-book) will be played.

The link with the theme of this series of recitals - "War and Peace" - is formed by a piece from one of the organ Masses by the French composer François Couperin (1688 - 1733), the third verse from the Agnus Dei which is

the prayer for peace. J. S. Bach is represented by a chorale prelude on Komm, Gott, Schopfer, Heiliger Geist, a famous Pentecost Hymn ("Veni Creator ...").

The programme also includes a bright Voluntary by the English composer John Stanley (1713 - 1786), a romantic Andante, composed by Felix Mendelssohn-Bartholdy in 1823 when he was only fourteen years of age and, finally, the famous Toccata by Théodore Dubois (1837 - 1924).

Entrance to this recital is free.

65 New Jobs Created In Co. Waterford

Waterford County Enterprise Board was established in 1993 to fill an identified gap in enterprise support services for small business. The Board has just published a report on its activities for the period October 1993 to December 1995.

In the first two years of operation, a total of £782,456 grant-aid has been approved for 105 projects from every sector of industry. Fifty one per cent of this amount or £362,859, has been paid to date. This has enabled the enterprises assisted to create 65 new jobs — 55 full time and 10 part-time. Since many of these businesses are in a developmental stage, it could be expected that this number would continue to grow over the coming months.

ADVICE AND MANAGEMENT SUPPORT

Alongside its programme of grant assistance, the Enterprise Board is in a position to offer a variety of complementary supports.

This may take the form of sourcing suitable funding from other state or EU agencies and assisting them to obtain this funding. Management development programmes in the form of both one to one consulting and group training are also available and are proving very fruitful for the individuals and companies in-

SECTORAL INITIATIVES

County Waterford has enormous potential for further development in the areas of tourism, crafts and foods. Sectoral initiatives

and studies in each of these areas is part of the Board's mandate and will put in place long term strategies for the development of these sectors. The Board's work in this area has already begun with an investment of £8,000 towards the development of a comprehensive tourism strategy.

The intrepid trio estimate that the journey will take them about 14 hours if the wind and weather is in any way kind to them, however, if the wind is in the wrong direction or if there is heavy

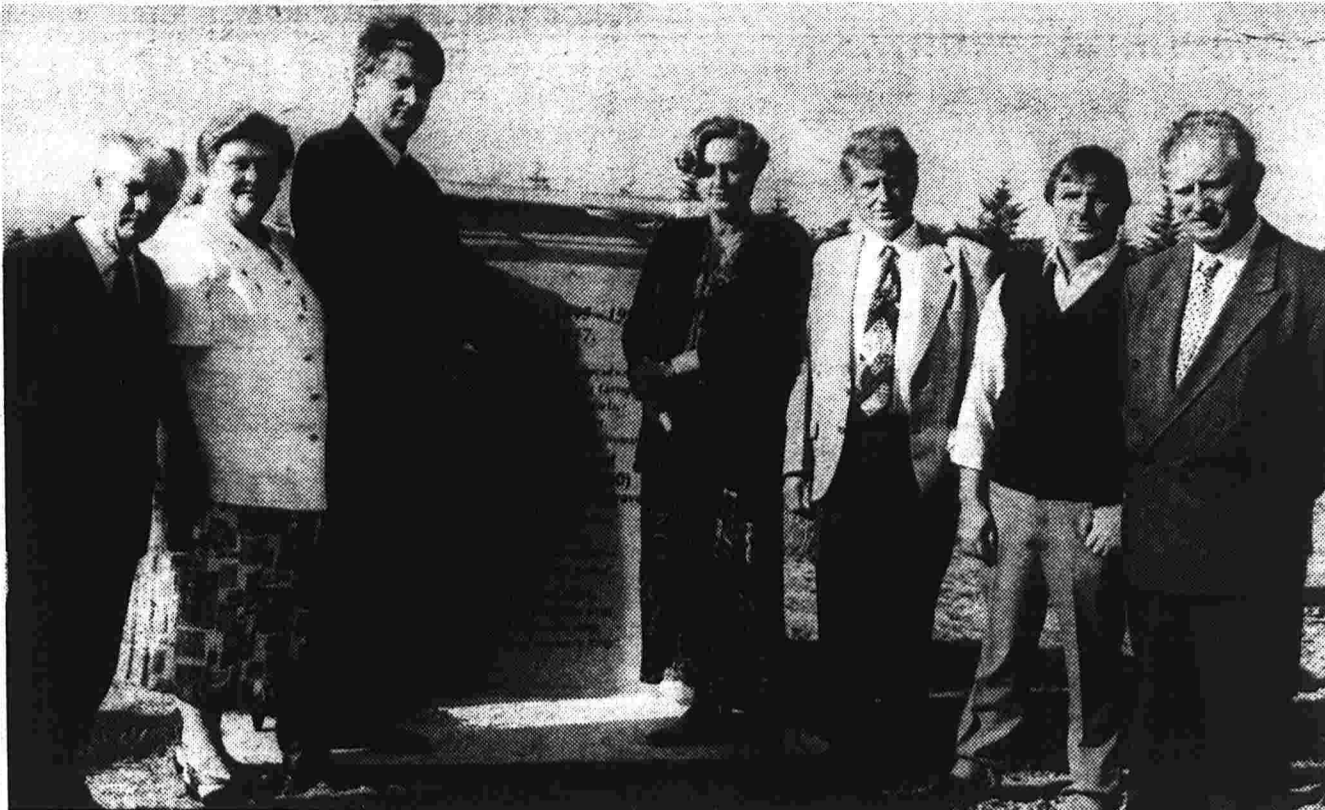

Restarting Cyclamen Growth

DID you save your cyclamen corms last spring? Good. Now's the time to bring them out of the garage or wherever you kept them to dry off.

They are one of the very best greenhouse pot plants because they give pleasure for such a long time — from mid-November to April.

It's time to restart their growth again. Shake off all the old soil and pot them, singly, into 5 inch pots. Make sure they are well crocked, because good drainage is vital.

A good compost is essential — I like John Innes No. 2 — but you can use three parts loam, one part peat and one part coarse sand.

Set the corm firmly, but hardly cover the corms and see that there's enough room for watering at the top of the pot.

Put them in a frame or in the greenhouse, and don't over water them. It's enough to keep them moist and shaded from the strong sun at this time of year.

See that there is ample ventilation. They will soon begin to make new growth. The pots will need to be brought into a heated greenhouse or indoors next month, depending on the weather conditions.

You can also sow seed of cyclamen now, but you must make sure there is some warmth and protection. Sow the seed in a pot of sandy soil, only just covering it.

Put a pane of glass over the pot and keep away from the sun. I suggest to remove the glass twice a day and wipe the condensed moisture from it.

When the seedlings get a couple of leaves, you can pick them off into boxes, and eventually pot them singly into small pots.

With luck the plants will bloom about mid-November till early March.

It's not a bad time to sow border perennials in a seed bed. You should get a good showing in the border next spring, especially with achillea, aconitum, anemone japonica, delphiniums, echinacea, echinops, erigeron, geums, hollyhocks, lupins, sidalcea and verbascum.

Be certain to prepare the ground properly. If you've got heavy ground, soften it up with some coarse sand mixed in. It would pay you to sift the top soil to make it nice and smooth. See to it that the area you choose isn't shaded, doesn't have any weeds and is well drained.

Sow the seeds in drills about a half an inch deep, but if the soil is dry water the drills before you put the seeds in. In fact, it would pay you to soak the lupins and delphinium seeds overnight before sowing. Cover the drills nice and firmly.

And don't think that you've got to give your growing plants lots of patent fertilisers. That's probably one of the worst things you can do.

Just stick to watering. But don't water your seedlings when the sun's very hot and always use a watering can with a very fine rose otherwise you'll wash the soil from the roots. Use warm water rather than icy cold water. You can start using a little fertiliser when your plants have developed into strong flowering plants and are close to maturity.

When the young plants are about three leaves high in their original seed bed, transfer them to a nursery bed which should be in a light, well-drained spot in the garden. Transplant about six inches apart. — **Tom Sabin**

Is The Milk Quota Regime A Victim Of Its Own Success?

The current temporary leasing crisis has led to much divisiveness, condemnation and scapegoating, which has not contributed one single gallon of quota to help small producers.

I.F.A. Dairy Chairman Liam Foley takes a dispassionate look at the situation: "Good production weather, hefty superlevy bills and high milk prices have sent demand for quota sky high and caused severe hardship for many small producers. But throwing away the quota regime will not solve the problem".

THE MANAGEMENT OF MILK QUOTAS IS BASED ON A SOCIAL CONSENSUS

When milk quotas were introduced in 1984, Ireland was given the highest level of quota per head of population, in recognition of its high dependency on dairy product exports. Since then the Irish milk quota has been managed by the Department of Agriculture, with consensus driven advisory input from farming organisations, co-ops, processors and Teagasc, through the Milk Quota Review Group. From the very beginning, the management of quota was a social exercise always giving absolute priority to smaller producers.

TEMPORARY LEASING WAS NEVER MEANT TO BE PERMANENT

The temporary leasing

scheme, created in 1988/89 was no exception to this priority rule. It was meant as a stop gap, meeting on an ad hoc basis the needs of both quota holders unable to use their full quota, and producers in danger of overproduction. Although small producers had priority access to the quota, relatively few availed of it. As the rules directed, the quota was then offered to larger producers. Many of the small and medium size producers who did use temporary leasing became heavily dependent on an undependable scheme, covering in some cases 50% or more of their production in this way. It was cheaper and more tax efficient than leasing privately or buying quota, and the certainty of obtaining quota was never in doubt while supply exceeded demand. Indeed, until last year, the scheme worked well for these producers and an increasing throughput of quota meant that most demand could be satisfied.

SO WHY HAVE WE A CRISIS?

Two years of extremely good production conditions precipitated two successive hefty superlevy bills. At the same time, exceptional dairy markets yielded the

highest milk prices ever paid to Irish producers. With high milk prices and rampant over production, private quota lease prices shot up and lessors were quick at cashing in on this opportunity.

With many other farming enterprises encountering severe difficulties, mixed farmers small dairy enterprises were pushed to producing more milk to make ends meet. As a result, both producers who used to gamble on fleximilk, and mixed farmers anxious to increase milk production have flocked to the temporary leasing scheme, reducing individual allocations to all applicants. It is well documented that, contrary to many strident statements, this huge increase in demand alone has caused the current hardship.

WHERE TO NOW?

While addressing the current crisis, there is a need to provide a longer term solution for small producers depending on what is an insecure scheme. I.F.A. has recommended that all available quota in the temporary leasing scheme this year be directed to small producers who have historically depended on the scheme to cover a large proportion of their production. This recommendation has been followed by the Minister. For next year, the Minister must put in place the 3-year co-

op leasing scheme proposed by I.F.A. last February so that from next April all available new quota leases are channeled through the scheme to smaller producers, giving them priority access to quota at a reasonable cost.

The Minister must recognise the part played by disastrous cull-cow markets which promoted the retention of many cows for far too long on farms, and aggravated the current overproduction of milk. Minister Yates must now introduce an emergency cull-cow disposal scheme to alleviate the problem.

We must also face up to the fact that, ever before the current crisis, we had and still have too many cows to fill the national milk quota.

THE QUOTA REGIME DOES WORK ... TOO WELL?

The people who smugly state that milk quotas do not work anymore must stop and think. Would we have a quota crisis if production conditions had been bad, if depressed dairy markets had forced further milk price cuts, and if other enterprises had been buoyant? We must work single-mindedly at alleviating the dire hardship imposed on many small dairy farmers by the current quota crisis, but in doing so, let us not throw the proverbial baby with the bath water!

RESEEDING WITHOUT PLOUGHING

Many farmers are reluctant to plough stony or difficult ground for reseeding purposes. These fields however can be reseeded successfully without ploughing if the following procedure is followed:

- Spray field with Glyphosate 360 (3 pints/ac) 5-7 days before cutting the crop for silage or before grazing tight with cattle. It is important to have fine weather around time of spraying.
- Apply ground limestone as recommended by soil analysis. At least 1t/ac must be applied prior to cultivation.
- Apply 3 bags/acre of 10-10-20.
- Cultivate top 2" of soil using a power harrow or a spiked rotovator. A disc harrow may also work.
- Roll before sowing. Seed bed must be fine and firm.
- Apply grass seed mixture at about 30lbs/ac.
- Cover grass seed lightly. This can be done using a bush or grass harrow. Seed should not be buried more than 15 mm (3/4").
- Roll slowly with a heavy roller.
- Watch out for frit-fly damage. Control with Decis at first signs of attack.
- Graze with weanlings when grass is 3-4 inches tall.

AUTUMN GRASSLAND MANAGEMENT

The aim of Autumn Grassland Management is to provide plenty of good green grass for grazing from now until early December. While at the same time setting up some paddocks for grazing early next Spring.

Ideally Autumn management would entail three 35 day rotations from mid August to end of November. Longer rotation lengths will depress yield and quality as well as increase the need for reseeding. It is important not to allow the grass to go brown at the base as a result of the grass growing too strong.

To optimise grass utilisation, large fields should be strip grazed. After two days the regrowths should be protected by back fencing. In very wet conditions, grazing time should be reduced to 4-6 hours to prevent poaching.

HEIFER COMPENSATION

In order to apply for the £50 compensation payment for heifers slaughtered in local licensed abattoirs, farmers are required to fill in a special application form (yellow Form B). A sales docket on headed paper from the licensed abattoir, certified by the abattoir management, must accompany the application form. This docket must show the date of slaughter and the full B.T.E. ear tag number for each animal.

The heifers must have been slaughtered in the period March 25 to June 29, 1996.

The completed application form should be sent to the special Beef Premium Unit, Department of Agriculture, Portlaoise.

Closing date of receipt of forms is August 20, 1996.

TILLAGE — AREA AID CUTS

The commission proposals involve a cut of 7.3% in arable aid, bringing the rate of aid for cereals back to £103/acre. This is also the rate being proposed for set-aside, back from current level of £140/acre.

These are still only proposals and while the arable aid cuts will be fiercely opposed, Ireland as a whole would be net beneficiaries from the overall redistribution of the C.A.P. funds.

SCUTCH CONTROL

Many spring crops are now at the correct stage for the pre-harvest application of Glyphosate. The best time for application is when the cereal grain has less than 30% moisture content.

This coincides with the hard-dough stage of grain maturity and a thumb nail impression will remain on the grain. This usually occurs 1-3 weeks prior to harvest date.

Thousands Of Winter Finishers Denied Compensation For BSE Price Collapse

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan has said that a grave injustice was being done to thousands of winter finishers who are being denied their legitimate right to compensation under the EU's £13.3 million BSE compensation package.

"Up to 4,000 winter finishers who suffered losses of up to £150/head on cattle sold since the BSE crisis broke in March, are being excluded from compensation because of flawed administration of the scheme by the department of agriculture."

Mr. Donovan pointed out that the situation was so farcical that farmers were even being refused application forms from the Department's offices in Castelbar this week.

Mr. Donovan pointed out that farmers who had sold finished cattle through marts which were destined for live export, meat factories and domestic abattoirs could not claim their EU compensation entitlements of £50/head because the Department refuses to compensate farmers who did not sell directly for slaughter or live export.

ICMSA Calls For Derogation Of GATT Export Terms On Cattle

EU Agriculture Commissioner, Franz Fischler's proposals for compensating farmers for income losses due to BSE are not really addressing the immediate cash crisis in the cattle sector, according to Frank Allen, President of the ICMSA.

Mr. Allen said: "Cash in the hand in respect of animals sold is the farmers requirement. The producers of store and weanling cattle who are obliged to sell them next autumn or early winter must get compensation to bring their income up to what it would be under normal market conditions."

"In my opinion the EU should look seriously at a deficiency payment system whereby the difference between price obtained and a market price, would be made good to the farmer."

"In addition the EU must seriously consider seeking a derogation from GATT terms governing the export of live cattle and beef from the Community, and the imports of meat."

Co. Waterford ICMSA News

The County Waterford ICMSA Chairman, John Skehan, welcomed ICMSA's initiative in seeking a derogation of GATT export terms on cattle.

"In my opinion the EU

"At a time when Europe is bulging with beef the adverse GATT terms are compounding our problem and these should be set aside until normality returns. We cannot now survive with the 'produce less and import more' syndrome."

"Ireland — being the country within the EU most reliant for national economic welfare on cattle production and on exports — is the country most severely suffering from the GATT terms. Accordingly, Ireland should lead the way in having the adverse terms set aside so that farmers don't go broke pending a resolution to the BSE crisis," he concluded.

MEETING

The County Executive held a meeting on Wednesday, August 7 in Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan. The main issues discussed included the beef situation, milk quotas including temporary leasing, report on national ICMSA tax committee meeting and report on recent National Council meeting.

The meeting was chaired by John Skehan, County Chairman, who thanked

both Waterford Foods and Molloy Butchers for their involvement in the ICMSA beef promotion at the Dungarvan Show.

John Dowley said that Waterford Co-op were heading for two million gallons over quota and it looks like we have a very serious situation.

The meeting felt that more will have to be done at both national and European level to market beef and bring confidence back into a quality product.

ICMSA OPPOSED TO COMMUNICATION MASTS IN RURAL AREAS

In referring to the Guidelines for planning authorities governing the erection of telecommunications antennae, Mr. Maurice Harney, Chairman of the ICMSA Farm Services Committee, said that no further desecration of the countryside can be tolerated. He said that already every rural parish and its bye-roads are visually destroyed with a proliferation of staggering poles with a cobweb of wares and cables across the skyline.

Mr. Harvey continued: "I totally reject the recommendation in the guidelines that the communications antennae be located away from high density population areas and placed in the countryside."

"The place to hide the ugly two-horned monstrosities is on the roof tops of high rise buildings and in industrial areas."

Ownership Of Milk Quotas Cannot Be Allowed Drift Away From Producers

Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman, Gerald Curran has described the indefinite leasing out of milk quota by non-producers as a barrier to badly needed restructuring, which must be addressed. "We cannot allow the ownership of quota drift away from producers," he said.

Mr. Curran said, "The current crisis in the temporary leasing scheme, where small and medium sized producers have been left far short of their quota needs, points to deeper problems in the dairy sector."

The Waterford Dairy Chairman described as "unsatisfactory" the fact that up to 15% of the national dairy quota was now controlled by non-producers, a percentage which is rising steadily.

"This situation cannot be allowed to continue or soon quota will come into the hands of non-farmers who will cream off a substantial rent at the expense of dairy farmers."

Mr. Curran said IFA had a clear policy of favouring the interests of the active producer over those of the non-producing quota owner. "Fundamentally, the quota is a right to produce which must belong to producers."

"If farmers give up production then there is no good reason why they should retain ownership of quotas indefinitely, in some cases for ten years and longer. The principle applies to the suckler cow and ewe premium quotas and the time has come to see how it could be applied to the dairy sector."

Tallow G.A.A. Club Notes

SPORTSMANSHIP AND FAIR PLAY

Those who play a lot of team games and have a healthy attitude to them have a great sense of fair play, of give and take, of accepting the rough with the smooth. Of course in an ideal world every referee would be issued with an extra pair of eyes and have extra sensory perception so that he would detect every misdemeanor and punish it accordingly thus removing any sense of grievance which a player might harbour. The referee would also in this Utopian world have two linesmen and four umpires of razor-sharp perception who would identify any departures from the strict canons of sportsmanship in their area and keep the referee fully informed of these indiscretions.

Sadly poor frail human nature being what it is there is no way that any system of control can ensure that a game is played strictly in accordance with the rules. Isn't it in our nature to bend or circumvent rules anyway? It all boils down to the sportsmanship of players, why they play, and I'm not talking just about winning

and losing because no team sets out to lose and as Pat Fanning used to remind us in the 1950's there is no virtue in defeat. Rather do I mean the player's hurling (or football) philosophy: what he wants from the game, how he approaches the game, his capacity to cope with setbacks and disappointments.

Jimmy Grey of Dublin is a friend of long standing who was Dublin's hurling goalie of the fifties and sixties and whose most notable game was the 1961 All Ireland Final which Dublin had the misfortune to lose by one point. Jimmy is presently manager of the Dublin hurling team having already served as Co. Board Chairman and Leinster Council Chairman as well as being a candidate for the Presidency of the G.A.A. Jimmy told me of an incident in the Dublin v Wexford Leinster Final of 1961 which shows what the ultimate in sportsmanship is. In a game of fluctuating fortunes Dublin were exceeding all pre-match expectations by not alone matching the Slaneysiders in every aspect of the game but by leading them by a single point with

the game going into injury time. Wexford launched a last despairing attack and from the thick of the frenetic action outside the square a Wexford hurl (they never call it a hurley down there) whipped the ball for the corner of the net. In a flash Jimmy dived, getting a stick to it and he lay for a moment with the ball beside his head as Tim Flood thundered in. Fearing the worst Jimmy closed his eyes. When he opened them a moment later, the ball had been scooped out and the final whistle was sounding. Tim was in the net having jumped over ball and goalie. Out went Tim's hand to congratulate Jimmy. "God Tim if you had pulled you were in an All Ireland, said Jimmy, "Ah well," smiled Tim, "you'd be no good tomorrow without your head". Tim Flood was a wonderful hurler but he was an even greater sportsman. Tim was a great lover of music, brilliant on the box, and he was expert at training sheepdogs. He appeared a few times on that delightful television programme "One man and his dog".

Fan Larkin, Kilkenny claimed that there was no such creature as a clean inter-county hurler. It would be like Tom to say such a thing right enough. I'm sure that he didn't mean that inter-county hurlers were psychopaths but rather that no player representing his county was so pristine pure and submissive that he never retaliated, never responded to the provocative word or intimidating pull. Tim Flood was exceptional, the exception that proved the general rule as proclaimed by Fan. Certainly Fan in his early career was far too physical and abrasive and fell far short of the great defender he was later to become. As the years wore on he concentrated increasingly on the legitimate defensive skills of which he became a master. To see him outwit and out-hurl a full forward like Ray Cummins (the best in that position that I've seen) was a sight to behold. Ray towered over him physically but Fan's quickness, skill and expert anticipation overcame any lack of

inches, even for the high ball.

Perhaps what Fan was claiming was that any hurler who is so naive that he merely acquiesces to the inherent intimidation and occasional bullying which is part of the game at that level won't survive and will be taken advantage of repeatedly to the detriment of his team. A player is entitled to look after himself especially if the referee cannot or will not supply the necessary protection. I'm not knocking referees for after all it is players who commit fouls not referees. But the sly foul player isn't easily detected and unless the umpires are good (and to be honest there are dire specimens of that genre) they will be unaware of much of the mean tactics which go on around the goal perhaps before the arrival of the ball and out of the referee's view.

The present hurling rules have made a big contribution to the encouragement of sportsmanship. Gone are the days of the mammoth immobile full back, the big beefy operator who wielded the caman like a claymore and who was usually opposed by a full forward of similar proportions and intent. They epitomised the triumph of quantity over quality and with their own agenda of operations they waged their own private war. The full forward (and he was often literally full after a pre-match sojourn in the hostelry where his team togged out) was usually required to perform two clearly defined functions: scare the wits out of the goalie and pull before during and after the arrival of the ball. In those stirring days the goalie could be charged by his opponents who gleefully indulged themselves if the defensive full back line could be breached. Many full forwards paid an early visit to the goalie and gave notice of intent by a well placed spit on the ground and by throwing a particularly venomous glance in his direction hoping to inspire in that poor sod a measure of fear or respect or subservience.

Playing in goal I was soon made aware of the stark realities of goalmouth life.

Those of you old enough to be now giving thought to your eternal destiny may remember the All Ireland of 1959 which Waterford won. In the replay Billy Dwyer, Kilkenny's full forward paid me his customary early visit when he walked into the square swung the stick a few times raising some dust and turned his most contemptuous dirty look in my direction. It was obvious that I hadn't read the script because rather than cower timidly I did a thoroughly disrespectful if impulsive thing: I stuck out my tongue at him and pulled a funny face. No word broke the silence and the game was soon on. Austin Flynn kept a tight watch on number fourteen who wasn't making the scoreboard. A high ball came in which I caught and cleared before getting Dwyer's best lash across the right knee which throbbed and stung for some minutes. This, I thought, was Billy's gentle response to my earlier impudence so I thought it only right to show a little appreciation in unmistakable terms. I had all the time in the world to study the stocky Dwyer anatomy and noticed the bandage on his left knee. So, after clearing the next ball I gave Dwyer's knee a fitness test by letting him have it with as good a crack as I could muster. I'm afraid that a family newspaper is not the place to repeat Billy's passionate speech in the square. Suffice to say that he cast doubt on my parentage described me as an unclean fornicator and promised, with some feeling that he would arrange a meeting for me with my God before the game was over. My reaction to Billy's dulcet tones, I'm afraid, did nothing to assuage the poor

chap's temper. "Come in whenever you like," invited, cheeky twerp that I was, "I'll be here for the rest of the evening".

During the remainder of the match our paths, so to speak, didn't cross. Not until about two minutes from the end. A high ball came in which was going to end up wide. Billy pursued it hoping, I suppose, to re-establish communication with me. Although my eye was on the ball I could clearly see him coming so I stepped forward towards him, allowing the ball to go over the end line. Just as he pulled I covered my legs with the hurley. I wasn't hit but John Barron rushed in thinking I had been and there was what Micheal O'Hehir used to call "a bit of argy bargy" involving mostly John Barron and his marker who were busy exchanging compliments and indulging in some desultory wrestling. Sending off John and his opponent was harsh in the extreme because they were the victims of circumstances. Referee Gerry Fitzgerald had a few words with me but they were the most welcome I ever remember. "When you're pucking out the ball, hit it to me. The match is over". So I knew before anyone else of the 70,000 people that we were All Ireland champions.

When we met at the banquet for the two teams the following day at Guinness' Brewery. Billy and myself shook hands, had a good laugh and enjoyed the afternoon together. Sportsmanship is broad enough to encompass little storms-in-teacups which occur in the heat of the battle and transcends small-mindedness and vindictiveness.

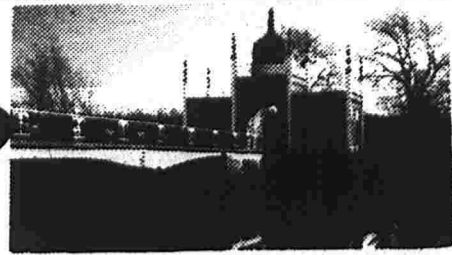

Healthy teeth and gums are a must. By using the right method and spending a few minutes each day caring for your teeth, they will look better and are more likely to stay healthy longer.

Your toothbrush is probably the most important factor in healthy teeth, get advice from your dentist as to which is best for you.

Most toothpastes on the market are effective for cleansing. The varying tastes are due to artificial and natural additives which are used to colour and flavour them.

Dental floss is now widely

used and is said to be essential for control of plaque. It may be waxed or unwaxed, waxed making it easier to use.

Tooth powder may also be used for cleaning teeth and can be good for removing stains. However tooth powder may be more abrasive than toothpaste which may destroy tooth enamel, therefore do not use it more than once a week.

Mouthwashes are widely available in supermarkets and chemists. Breath freshener sprays are also available. We do need breath fresheners for cosmetic reasons, although toothpaste

will freshen breath for a couple of hours, a mouthwash should be used to compliment brushing. However it should not be used as a substitute for brushing.

You can make a simple natural mouth wash at home by dissolving a teaspoon of salt in warm water. Rinse the mouth with the solution but do not swallow it. Salt is a traditional cleaner and may be kinder to teeth than chalk or pumice found in pastes.

METHOD: Preheat the oven to Gas 7, 425°F/220°C, 15 mins before roasting. Halve aubergines and patty pan or courgettes. Deseed and quarter pepper. Peel and quarter onions. Pierce skin of tomatoes once with a fork. Sprinkle vegetables with lemon juice. Bring a pan of water to the boil and blanch the prepared vegetables, excluding the tomatoes, for 1 min. After blanching, drain and rinse well under cold water until cool. Place the cooled, blanched vegetables in a dish with the tomatoes. Place 4 tbsp oil, the garlic vinegar, crushed garlic, chopped rosemary, 1 tbsp honey and seasoning in a small, screw-top jar. Seal and shake well to make a marinade. Pour the marinade over the vegetables. Cover and chill for at least 1 hr, turning occasionally. Using a sharp knife, make small incisions all over the top of the lamb. Insert garlic slices and rosemary sprigs into slits. Place lamb in roasting tin. Mix remaining oil and honey, pour over lamb. Bake for 20 mins, then reduce oven to Gas 4, 350°F/180°C and cook for 1 1/2 - 2 hrs. About 30 mins before the lamb is cooked, drain the vegetables, reserving the marinade. Arrange the vegetables around the lamb in the roasting tin, coating them in the cooking juices. Pour the reserved marinade over the

Family Health

By Dr. DAVE BARRY

Q. For a period of about eighteen months, I used laxatives to help keep my weight down. Although I haven't used them now for about four months, I still get cramps with my bowel movements, which are irregular and often loose. I'm worried now that the laxatives may have done me permanent damage.

A. Your symptoms sound to me as though you're suffering from irritable bowel syndrome. This is a condition where the bowel muscles go into spasm and cause constipation in nine out of ten sufferers. The other one in ten will have loose motions and diarrhoea. All sufferers have some degree of cramp-like colicky pains in their abdomen. Try increasing the amount of fibre in your diet. Eat plenty of fresh fruit and vegetables, wholemeal bread, rice and pasta, and foods containing bran, which all help to bring relief. Should your symptoms continue, your doctor, having confirmed the diagnosis, may wish to prescribe a bowel muscle relaxant.

Q. My mother, who is 65 has been diagnosed as having diverticular disease. She was given very little information about it. Could you please explain it for us?

A. Diverticular disease is a form of inflammation in the large intestine or colon. It's very common in older people. As we get older, little pouches develop in the wall of the colon - probably due to decades of enduring the high pressures needed to empty the bowels. In some cases these pouches (diverticula) can become inflamed and tender, causing colicky pains in the lower left side of the abdomen. Sometimes the inflammation will clog a diverticulum, as a result, it swells to form a throbbing, painful abscess - acute diverticulitis. Most cases of this disease settle with a balanced, fibre-rich diet to help lower the bowel pressure. If your mother does suffer an acute attack, she may need treatment in hospital. Sometimes an operation to remove the affected length of bowel is necessary.

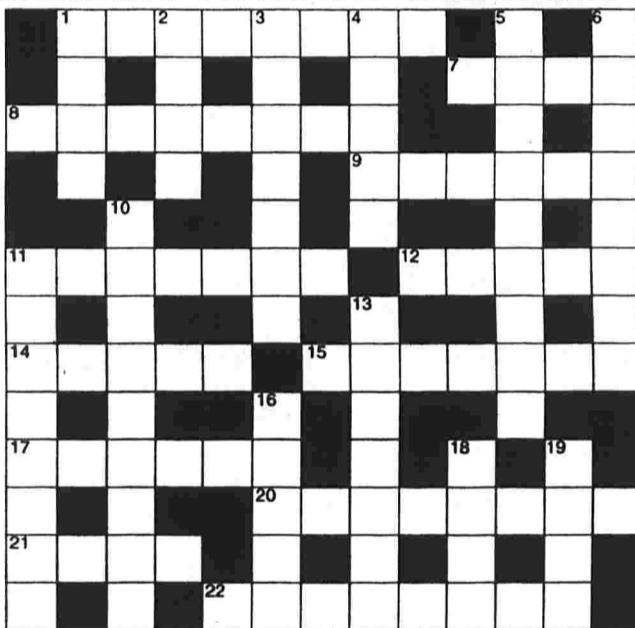

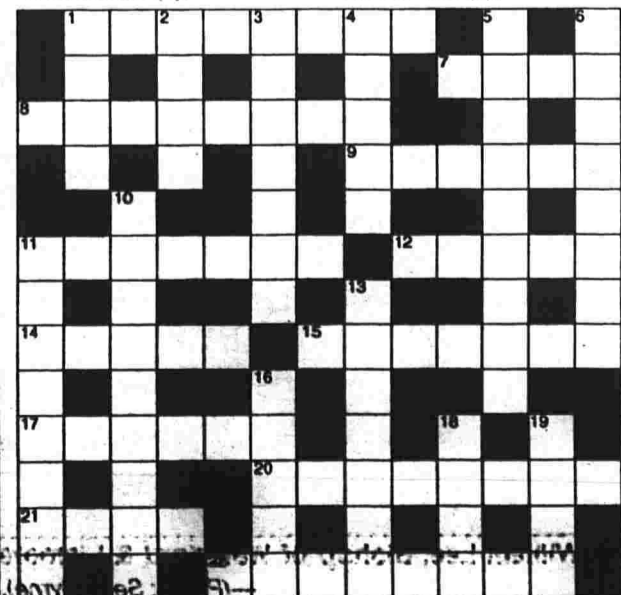

A LOOK BACK AT THE SUMMER GAMES . . .

OLYMPIC SNIPPETS



Ireland have now won 28 medals in the Olympic Games. Michelle Smith's triumphs in the 400m individual medley, 400m freestyle and 200m individual medley and a bronze medal in the 200m butterfly produced Ireland's first ever swimming medals in the Olympic Games - previous to this, Ireland had never even had a participant in a swimming final. In the process of winning three gold medals and a bronze, Rathcoole native Michelle

Smith became the first female athlete to win medals for Ireland, but more significantly, she became the most successful Irish Olympian ever.

Previous gold medals had been won by John Pius Boland (1896 in men's singles and men's doubles tennis), Tom Kiely (1904 in the All Round event, an earlier version of the Decathlon), Pat O'Callaghan (1928 and 1932 in the hammer), Bob Tisdall (1932 in the 400m Hurdles), Ronnie Delaney (1956 in the 1500 metres and Michael Carruth (1992 in the welter-weight boxing).

THE SILVER-SMITH

Current world long jump champion Fiona May won a silver medal for Italy at these Games. May, from Derby, competed for her whole career for her native Britain until she met and married an Italian pole vaulter. She now competes as a naturalised Italian. Michelle Smith could well have done the same, being married to Dutch discus thrower Erik de Bruin, a silver medalist in his event in the 1991 World Athletics Championships in Tokyo. To her credit, she elected to continue representing Ireland though she could now just as easily compete for the Netherlands. And, if it wasn't for the fact that the two had met during the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona, de Bruin never would have become Smith's coach and never would have changed her coaching routine. Indeed, the successes that Michelle Smith enjoyed at these Olympics follows the same pattern as recent successes in Irish sport, help from overseas has changed things considerably. The Irish football team were swimming in a sea of

mediocrity until an Englishman, Jack Charlton, came along. Ireland's two boxing medals at the last Olympics were won with the huge input of a Cuban coach, Nicolas Cruz. It's taken a Dutchman to grab Irish swimming by the scruff of the neck, while a former All-Black, Murray Kidd, is bidding to turn the Irish rugby team from a bunch of plodding under-achievers into world-beaters. The message must be clear: we can't do it on our own. If help has to be got from abroad in order to improve Ireland's sporting fortunes, then that's the way it must be. Erik de Bruin's and Michelle Smith's methods must be tried by others.

ROW, ROW, ROW YOUR BOAT . . .

I'm sure Linford Christie had the world sympathising with him when he was disqualified from the Olympic 100m final for two false starts - not the best way for the Olympic Champion to lose his title. There's also no doubt that his conduct immediately after being disqualified lost him a lot of that sympathy. The same must go for a certain Irish athlete for whom nothing went right in these Games. Her apparent illness during the Centennial Games thwarted her chances, and quite rightly, she had the nation's sympathy. But what on earth was she doing in the middle of the O.C.I./B.L.E. kit row? Or rather, what was she doing at a lengthy press conference 24 hours before a major race? This whole row was about the fact that this athlete was ordered to remove a Reebok kit in the run up to a 5000m heat, and to put on an official Asics kit. The bottom line here is that you run in one kit and one kit only; had she run in the Reebok kit she would have held herself open to be disqualified. Strangely, no other athlete complained of having to wear an Asics kit, but then, they're probably not sponsored by Reebok. Even national heroes have to be held accountable for their actions.

So too must the Olympic Council of Ireland. Their statements about providing exactly what the athletes need and protecting their athletes rang hollow, particularly when the O.C.I. announced in the run-up to the Games that Sonia O'Sullivan turned down the chance to carry the Irish flag. Having been the innocent victim of another invented flag rumpus last year, it was the last thing she needed. Also, the whole controversy over whether or not Michelle Smith could swim in the 400m freestyle should have been avoided. She swam the qualifying time two days after the deadline, which threw the whole matter into the twilight zone that is the grey area. The O.C.I., eventually backed by the International Olympic Committee, felt that she should be able to swim in the event. Interestingly, the American, Dutch, German, Australian and world swimming federations didn't agree. She got the nod in the end and was the best by far in any event. End of argument. The farcical Marie McMahon case finally brought the I.O.C. to the end of their tether, telling the O.C.I. and B.L.E. to get their act together. Certain comments by the O.C.I.

Chairman Pat Hickey about having athletes wearing "their granny's pyjamas", and that Ireland was "a small little country on the periphery of Europe with few successes", were eccentric to say the least. The sooner this organisation is looked into, the better. Now, where did I put those sedatives?

THE BEST EVER

The horror stories really came out during these Olympics - events being delayed because of late buses, computer break-downs, shambolic organisation, over-the-top commercialisation ... these Games had it all. It led wily I.O.C. President Juan Antonio Samaranch to drop the compulsory line about "the best Games ever" from his closing speech. As pleasing to the eye as it was, beach volleyball certainly has its place, but that place should be nowhere near the Olympics. And the same goes for boring baseball, synchronised swimming, table tennis and Olympic handball.

T.V. TIMES

On R.T.E. we had Bill "Interrogator" O'Herlihy and Gary "Nostradamus" O'Toole, with John Treacy at his usual impressive best. It just seems that these days R.T.E.'s biggest problem is that there's too much analysis and not enough action. And Marty Morrissey obviously spent too much time in the Poitín Stil, or else he wouldn't have asked Francis Barrett's traveller parents if they were ever on the receiving end of one of their bairn's left hooks. "Ah, but I've a handy left hook myself, Marty" ... thwak ... might have been a useful reply, at least it would have made good T.V. Mind you, Bill and the boys probably would have spent another two hours speaking about that. As for Eamonn Coghlan's Chinese whisper of "Mystery is power", how can you defend Michelle Smith to the hilt and then castigate a Chinese athlete who has never been found guilty of taking drugs? Swimming commentator Jim Sherwin was magnificent, as was John Kirwan, Mel. T. Hughes and Tom McGurk (awful jackets, though that was probably because he was missing his parrot). On the Beeb, Des Lynam, still the ultimate smoothie, kept hitting the target with gems such as "Now going to the pub isn't an Olympic sport yet, but beach volleyball is ..." Their handling of the Michelle Smith controversy was understated and spot on, they even followed all of our boxers all the way. Gary Lineker's on-screen transformation from a plank of wood to a broadcaster of note was remarkable, though he still smiles too much. Sartorial Scot Hazel Irvine brought some tartan class to the proceedings and was quite brilliant as were the B.B.C.'s swimming team of Hamilton Bland (Bland by name, Grand by nature), Andy Jacobson and yer one out of Gladiators. Barry Davies remains a broadcasting genius, but it was a man in his seventies covering his 11th Olympics who summed it all up in his closing speech. Cue David Coleman: "The fact is the Games have become grossly inflated. Idealism has been overtaken by commercialism. It's time to look back and to cut back, and it's time too to look forward to refining the Olympic programme."

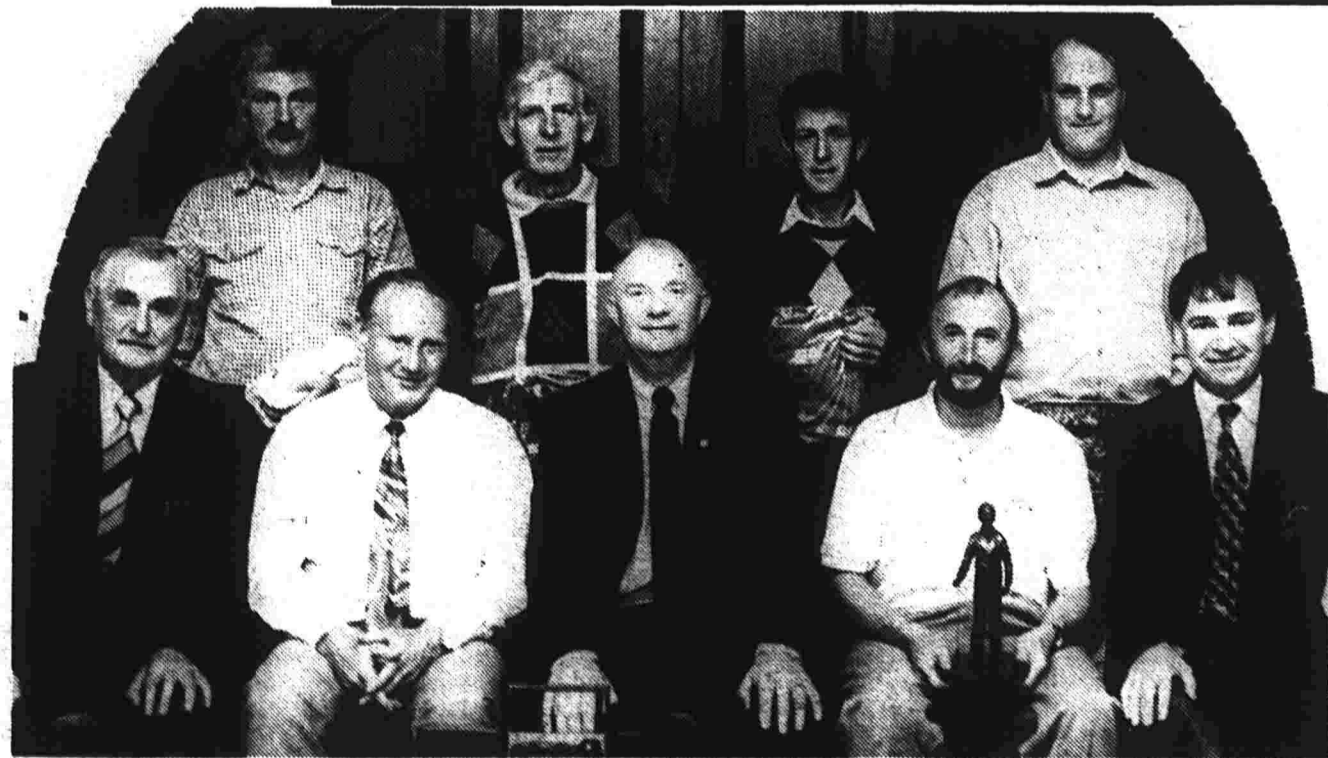

REMEMBERING OTHER DAYS

Reflections On The Career Of Christy Moylan

Christy Moylan died on Tuesday, August 6 after a short illness and was buried in the family plot at St. Mary's Parish Churchyard, Dungarvan, on Thursday, August 8.



In a farewell oration delightfully spoken by former President of the G.A.A. Pdraigh O Fainin, the large crowd of mourners and friends, many of them who were former colleagues of the great hurling artist who was being laid to rest, listened to what was a summary of the career of a player who had helped to bring fame and recognition to his club, Dungarvan and Waterford.

In recounting the achievements of Christy Moylan, Pat Fanning said he had been an inspiration to his club and county

and others who had the privilege of enjoying the hurling artistry of one of the great players who had led Portlairge to their first senior All Ireland title in 1948. The oration, which was loudly applauded, told of the major achievements of Moylan the hurling hero who was once a household name in hurling and football circles in the county and far beyond.

I had seen him play hurling and football with Dungarvan and with Waterford in the 1938 All Ireland final as well as throughout the entire 1948 campaign, but it was not until 1988 when I interviewed him in the lead up to his being presented with the coveted 'Hall of Fame' award at the Burlington Hotel in February 1988, that I got to know him personally. I must say that listening to him answering the many questions put to him about his life wearing the Blue and White of Dungarvan and Waterford were not only very interesting, they were quite entertaining also. His powers of retention were excellent and he was able to recall many incidents and events in great detail. Many were very funny.

He told me that he was first attracted to the game of hurling when he used see some of his schoolmates hit a sponge ball against the churchyard wall when he lived in Boreenatra. His mother, who loved to see him play, bought him a

hurley for a shilling at Fraher's on the Square, unknown to his father who had no interest whatsoever in hurling. He played all his early hurling down in Quann's and didn't play with Dungarvan until he was around eighteen years old.

He felt that he might have been selected for the 1931 panel which won the junior hurling All Ireland, if he had not been in hospital for a suspected appendix at the time. Fellows like Ando Sandford, Dec Goode, Jack O'Donnell, Tom Greaney and Simon Whelan, all Dungarvan clubmen who played on that team were local heroes at the time and he wanted to be like them.

Two years later he was given the chance and was delighted to have been selected to play at centre field with the great Bill Sheehan as his partner. They had beaten Wexford by 5-6 to 1-3 in the 'home' final but only just won the final against London/Irish in a great match by 3-5 to 3-3 at Newbridge, Co. Kildare.

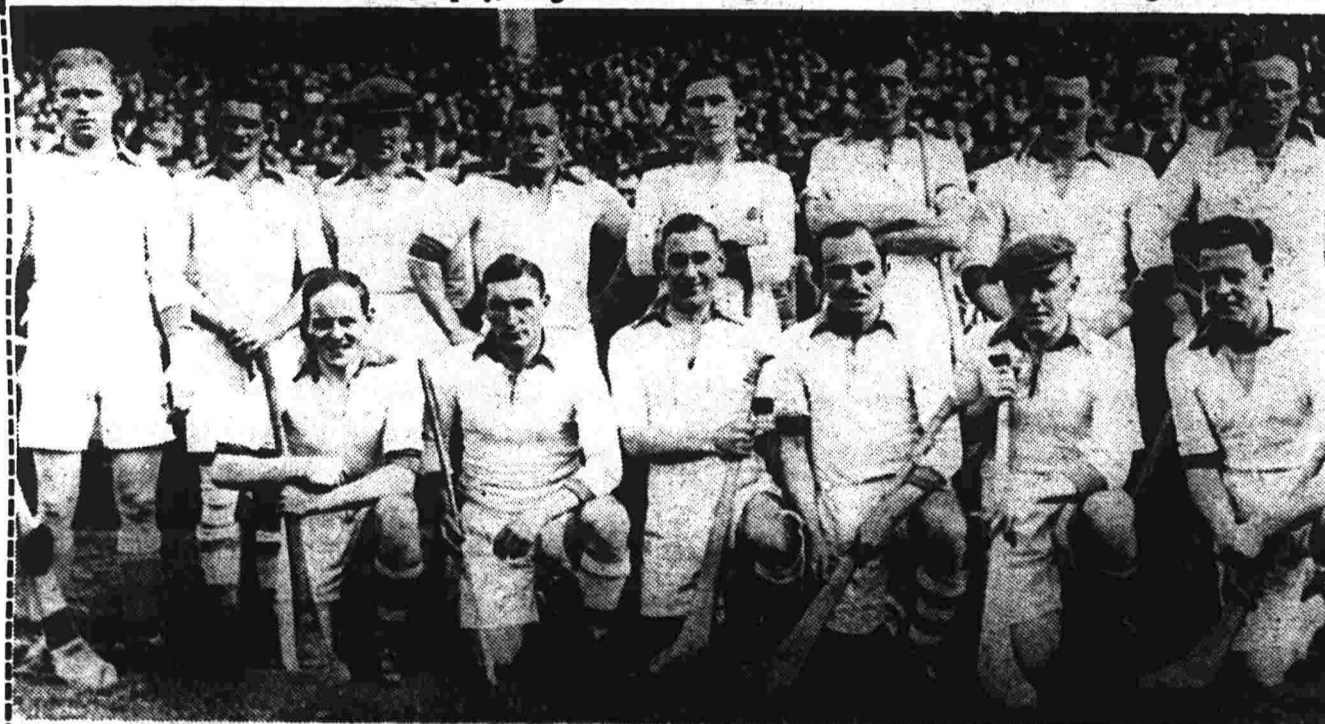
One of the many big thrills of his hurling life came two years later when Waterford qualified for their first senior hurling All Ireland. Christy remembered the wonderful atmosphere at the Shandon field in Dungarvan when a

massive crowd turned up to cheer them against the hot favourites, Cork (who had trounced Limerick in the first round). He felt that the home crowd helped Waterford win that one by 5-2 to 1-3. Clare were beaten in the Munster final and Galway in the semi final. After being beaten by Dublin by just two points, the homecoming was terrible, but when they got to the Railway station in Dungarvan on the Monday night, the people gave them a great reception and the band turned out as well. That incidentally, was the year in which the great Michael O Hehir did radio broadcasts of the finals and also 1938 was the year in which the Cusack Stand Upper deck was opened.

In the next ten years Christy Moylan won county titles in hurling and football with Dungarvan. He recalls 1941 and spoke about his battle with his long time friend, Mick Hickey, in the semi final against Portlaoise. The result of that one made him particularly happy, but probably not as happy as the result of the county final against Mount Sion at Lismore. He thought that Dungarvan should and could have won more hurling titles.

The thirties and forties were his greatest era on the playing fields of Waterford and Munster, he having won Railway Cup medals on five occasions between 1937 and 1942 as well as hurling and football county titles with his club, Dungarvan.

1948 was the year of his crowning glory when he went on to help Waterford win their historic first hurling title at Croke Park. Here are his thoughts and recollections on the '48 All Ireland. "In 1948 I had been in England for three years and came home to see my mother who was ill. I was asked to stay at home if I got a job. We were out on the field waiting for the parade when Jack Lynch, with whom I had played many times in the Railway Cup, came over and welcomed me home. I was all keyed up and nervous. I was playing on Josie Harnett who was very fast. I remember besting him on the run and passing the ball to Tom Curran who sent the umpire bending for the green flag. Matt Fouhy was switched on to me. The excitement was terrible, time was running out and I thought we were three points ahead. Christy Ring was only 40 yards out from the Waterford goal and he knew that Cork were only a point behind. He shot high and skimmed the upright and Waterford were Munster champions. Coming back to Dungarvan that night was wonderful. Winning the All Ireland against Dublin was even more wonderful and the excitement of the thousands of our followers after the final was something that no one will ever forget. Coming back home on Monday was wonderful and people talked about nothing else only hurling. I was glad that I stayed at home from England."

Great Deise Hurler And Footballer Is Laid To Rest

When I asked him to name the best hurler that he ever played on, he unhesitatingly said Mackey. "Mick Mackey was the king of hurling" he said, "Mackey would go into a tussle and come out with the ball. Once he got it in front of him he couldn't be stopped. He was great to read a game, he could give it and take it. I remember clashing with him in one of the great Waterford v. Limerick matches. I was playing on Paddy Clohessy and scored two points. Mackey came across and told Clohessy to move over and addressing me he said, 'I'll quieten you Moylan'. Off the ball and behind the referee's back we had a wrestling match. The heat was really on and there was a hold up in play and someone ran on with an orange for Mick. He halved the orange and tossed one half to me saying, 'here you are Con'. (Mackey always called me Con). That was the kind of man Mackey was."

DISAPPOINTMENT

Having asked about the highlights and lowlights of his career, he said the biggest disappointment of his life in the G.A.A. was that he never kicked a football for Munster. The great John Joe Sheehy of Kerry had seen him play minor football for Waterford and told him that if he kept at it, he would one day play for Munster. He was twice selected and was once even out on the field wearing the number 7 jersey when a Munster selector, Sean McCarthy (Cork), came out and told me to go back into the dressing room that the hurling selectors were 'claiming' me. I never got over that disappointment.

When I asked Christy to confirm or deny the rumour that he preferred football to hurling, his reply was evasive, but I do know that after being presented with the Hall of Fame Award in 1988, he told Mick Dunne of R.T.E. that he should have been given the award for football and not for hurling as 'I was a better footballer than a hurler', he said.

Switching back to hurling, he felt that several inter county matches in which he played were lost on the side line and he gave an example of the 1943 Munster final against Cork which Waterford lost by 2-13 to 3-8 and there were a couple against Limerick as well.

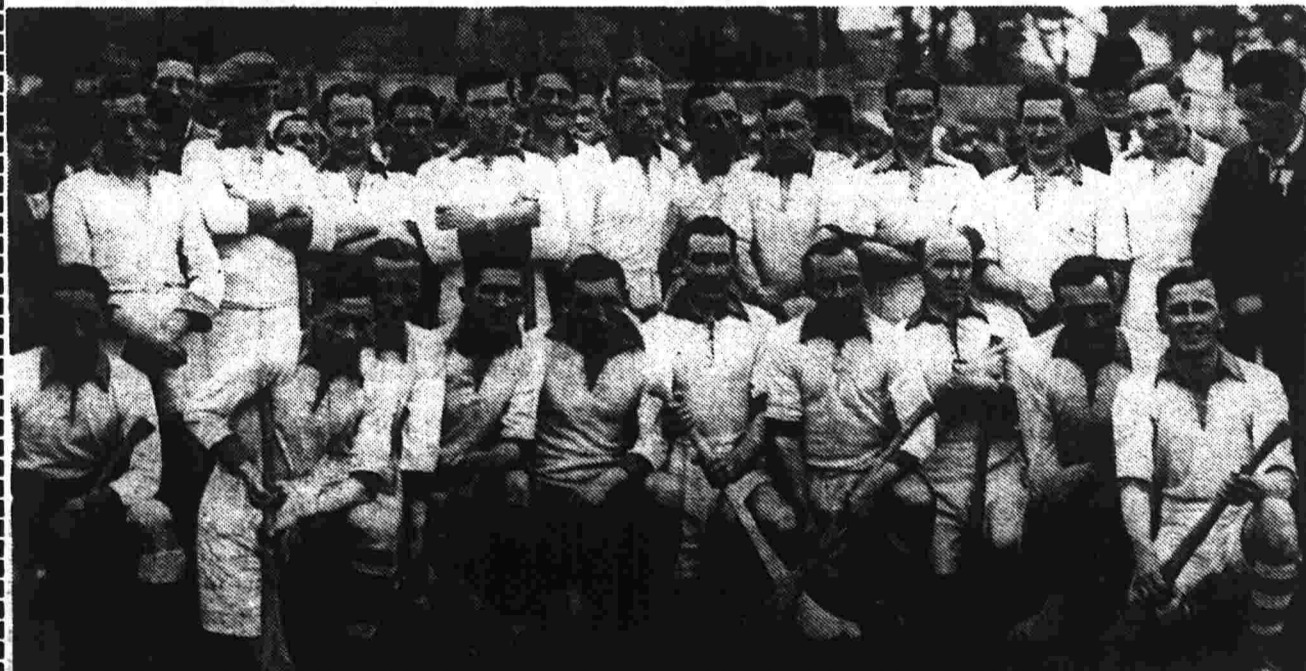
In a recent publication 'Giants of the Ash' published by well known hurling analyst Brendan Fullam, Christy Moylan named the following team which he would have liked to have captained in his time:

Sean Duggan (Galway); Johnnie Quirke (Cork), Charlie Ware (Waterford), Alan Lotty (Cork); Bobby Rackard (Wexford), John Keane (Waterford), Paddy Phelan (Kilkenny); Jack Lynch (Cork), Christy Moylan (Waterford); Jimmy Doyle (Tipperary), Mick Mackey (Limerick), Christy Ring (Cork); Mick A. Brennan (Cork), Nicky Rackard (Wexford), Jackie Power (Limerick).

Looking at the faces of the very many former hurling colleagues and hurling enthusiasts who were present at his graveside, I could not help but wonder was was going through their minds as they watched the former star being laid to rest. I am sure that their reflections would make interesting and exciting reading. Christy Moylan has certainly left us with some wonderful memories, we had too few who were like him.

Dungarvan club certainly did him proud in the fine guard of honour provided at the removal of his remains. It was a turn out worthy of a great player. It was nice too, to see former G.A.A. President Con Murphy in attendance as Con was the official who refereed the 1948 All Ireland final in which 61,742 spectators saw Moylan, wearing the number 12 jersey cutting the ball over the bar, while still on his knees.

To his wife Nan, son John and daughters Kay and Assumpta, we offer our sincere sympathy. May he rest in peace.


