Decision On Melleray Wind Mast Proposal Still Pending

Contrary to public opinion, Waterford County Council have yet to make a decision on two controversial planning applications by an English-based company to erect temporary wind monitoring systems - together with 40 metre masts - at two separate locations on the Knockmealdown mountains near Mount Melleray.

Reports last week indicated that the Council had refused planning permission for these two wind farm test sites but a spokesperson from the Council's Planning Dept. confirmed to the 'Dungarvan Leader' that no decision has yet been made on the applications pending the submission of further information by the company,

Colham Energy Ltd. of Bristol. The reports, she said, had "jumped the gun"

and were completely inaccurate.

REQUESTED ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

A decision was due to be made on the applications last June but County Manager Donal Conolly, to-

Know Your Rights

Survivor's Pension And Half-Rate Disability Benefit

Disability Benefit can be paid for 15 months at half-rate in addition to Survivor's Pension. An Invalidity Pensioner who becomes entitled to Survivor's Pension may revert back to Disability Benefit for the 15 months if they are under 66 years. Increases for child dependents will only be paid with Survivor's Pension. If you are getting a reduced rate of Survivor's Pension more than half-rate DB may be payable. However, this claim will be treated as a new Disability Benefit claim. Your rate of payment on this DB claim will be related to your earnings in the relevant tax year. As you would have been on DB for at least 12 months before going onto Invalidity Pension you would generally only qualify for half of the reduced rate of DB.

FREE SERVICES

If you are aged 60 or over you would retain your entitlement to the free services e.g. Free Electricity Allowance. If aged under 60 you would lose entitlement to the Free Services.

At the end of the 15 months of Disability Benefit you can revert back to Invalidity Pension.

Both Invalidity Pension and Disability Benefit are taxable but increases paid for child dependents with DB are not taxable for 1995.

Note: Survivor's Pension and Disability Benefit may also be paid in addition to Blind Pension. Increases for adult and child dependents are also payable.

TRACING ANCESTORS

Dear Sir,
I will be visiting the Waterford and Cappoquin areas in September from 16th to 19th hoping to find out more about my ancestors. I wonder whether there are any relatives of mine still living in the area and am asking for you help in finding them. This is what I know.

My great-grandfather Dennis Duggan was baptised in Cappoquin on December 26th 1841. His parents were James and Margaret (or Mary) maiden surname Cullinan. Dennis married Margaret Humphrey presumably in Ireland before coming to Bristol in the early 1960s.

Their third son, John was my grandfather.

His wife was Mary Cronin, the third daughter of David Cronin and Ellen Keane who were married in Cappoquin on February 17th 1861. They came to Bristol in the late 1860s after a sojourn in Jersey where they had three children.

So are there any Duggans, Cronins, Humphreys or Keanes readers of your paper who recognise any of these details and would like to contact me.

The motion, which was adopted unanimously, was

seconded by Cllr. Willie McDonnell.

Productive Labour Youth Meeting In Lismore

The most recent meeting of the National Executive of Labour Youth was held in Lismore Heritage Centre last Saturday. The Executive were met by the Chairman of Lismore Town Commissioners, Bernard Leddy on Friday night who welcomed them to the town of Lismore and wished them a "productive meeting and enjoyable weekend."

At the meeting itself the final drafts of a policy document on Crime Prevention and Drugs Rehabilitation, were being approved by the Executive who are eager to launch a "Prevention is better than cure" document before the end of October.

Lismore native, Mark Khan who organised the weekend away from the capital, said "All the parties have started jumping on the bandwagon of the "Tough On Crime" stance.

"What the public need is definitely a tough line with criminals. We need a well thought out plan to effectively prevent and punish crime. If prevention is better than cure than we must be tough on the causes of crime," he added.

Khan was given responsibility to produce a policy document on Education at the meeting. Mr. Khan, who was formerly a Student Union President, and is currently a member of the Governing Body of Carlow RTC, gave this comment:

"We thought it was appropriate that after so many students receiving their top preferences in third level colleges, free fees for university students, grants for Irish students abroad, and tax relief for part-time students, that we launch a new document outlining our goals to bring Ireland into the 21st century, now that we have achieved the goals we laid out for the 90's."

On a lighter side, Mr. Khan pointed to the other parts of the weekend.

The local Labour Deputy, Junior Minister Brian O'Shea, T.D., very kindly took time out of his busy schedule and travelled all the way to Lismore to meet with the Executive.

"I'd like to thank Brian for meeting with us and for being the only TD I've seen around Lismore in August.

In fact, I'd say Brian is the only TD that will have visited Lismore twice in one week as his clinic is in St. Carthage's Hall next Saturday," exclaimed Khan.

"I'd also like to thank Caroline Hickey of the Heritage Centre who gave us great facilities for the meeting and a warm welcome, as well as Sibylle Knobel of Kilmorna Farm Hostel for the lovely stay the Executive had.

"The Executive themselves wanted me to thank the people of the town for their friendliness, hospitality and effort in keeping Lismore so beautiful," commented Khan.

"I think they also wanted to thank Mick McCarthy for giving them an enjoyable Saturday evening and the local publicans for having cheaper pints than in Dublin!" he concluded.

Tenders Invited For New Unit At Dungarvan Hospital

Brian O'Shea, T.D., Minister of State at the Department of Health, has confirmed that a shortlist of developers has been invited to tender for the construction of the new 27 Bed Unit for the Elderly at St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan. The new unit is the first phase of a £5 million hospital development for the town and will also include daycare and outpatient facilities.

Minister O'Shea stated that tenders are being sought in the following categories — Main Building contract, Mechanical Services sub-contract and Electrical Services sub-contract.

The closing date for receipt of tenders is 27 September with work on the £1m project, which is expected to commence in November, taking about 12 months to complete.

Mr. O'Shea expressed his satisfaction that the project has reached this advanced stage and when completed he said the new unit will further enhance access to services for the elderly in Dungarvan and the surrounding areas.

Unveiling Ceremony For Waterford Scholar In Glasnevin

Crowds thronged Glasnevin Cemetery, Dublin last Friday to honour one of the Deise's greatest scholars, John Fleming (Sean Pléimeann). Fleming, who was born in 1814 and who died 100 years ago this year, had lain in an unmarked grave in the country's most celebrated cemetery, until Dr. Pádraig O Macháin of Lismore and Dr. Aoiibheann Nic Dhonnchadha of Ring decided to rectify matters. Funds were raised at home and abroad for the erection of a Celtic Cross on the grave and last Friday, the cross was unveiled in an impressive and moving ceremony.

The ceremony was completed by Dr. O Macháin, who made particular mention of the encouragement given by Coláiste na Rinne, of which no less than seven board members were in attendance.

The cross was blessed with water from the Holy Well at Mothel, John Fleming's native parish.

Nioclás Mac Craith, from Ring, gave the graveside oration. Seldom has Glasnevin resounded to such melodious and moving words as those spoken by Mr. Mac Craith over the grave of John Fleming. At its conclusion the oration was met with sustained and heartfelt applause, and demands that the oration

in its entirety be published forthwith.

Notable among the crowd of several hundred dignitaries present in Glasnevin were, Donal Connolly, Waterford County Manager, Liam Suipéil, Bainisteoir Choláiste na Rinne, Peig Bean Uí Réagáin, Neans agus Breandán O Braonáin, Gerard Greene (Rathgormack), Paddy Gordon, Maire Nic Craith, Gerry and Margaret Murphy (Ballyneale House) and Eibhlín Uí Dhonnchadha (Iarphríomhoide Scoil San Nioclás, An Rinn). Eminent academics and members of the literary community were also in attendance.

Democratic Left Councillors Call For Abolition Of Water Charges

The abolition of water charges should be a key issue in the forthcoming inter-party negotiations for the next Budget. That's according to

Democratic Left Councillor Tony Wright of Dungarvan and his party colleague Alderman Paddy Gallagher from Waterford City, who last week called on party leader, Prionsias De Rossa, to press for the abolition of the controversial charges.

Both councillors, who represent the Waterford Constituency of Democratic Left, claimed that the principle of water charges as a double tax was already recognised by Government, as proven by a tax credit

which is allowed to taxpayers who pay their water charges on time.

Cllr. Wright and Alderman Gallagher stated that while they recognised that the party leader and Democratic Left Ministers had achieved a considerable amount in Government, the thorny issue of water charges still remains at large.

Both Councillors are noted for their outspoken opposition to the charges, with Cllr. Wright continuously raising the issue at both local and County Council level.

Given the current economic climate, whereby over £200 million is avail-

able in tax relief, the D.L. representatives felt the time is now ripe for the party to negotiate the abolition of water charges once and for all. They disclosed that the abolition of the charges would cost £55 million and that there would still be scope for other tax cutting measures for the PAYE worker.

Both councillors added that there was widespread dissatisfaction regarding water charges. While many people pay the charges, there is considerable animosity by a large section of the population countrywide, who refuse to pay what they view as a double tax.

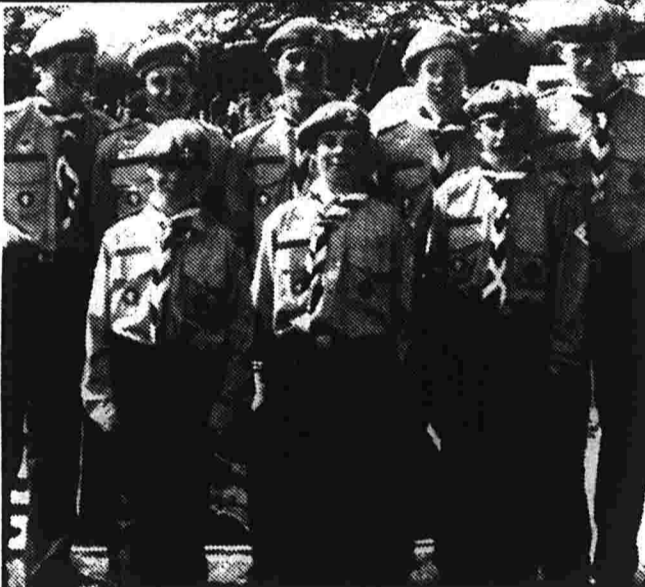

A Natural Barrier Against Intruders

With home burglary higher than it's been for some time — and not just in the towns and cities, either, but also in many rural areas — have you ever considered using your garden to keep the thief away?

You can still have an attractive area surrounding your home-but which is, in fact, a natural barrier against intruders. How? By strategically placing prickly plants.

Any vegetation that's got plenty of thorns and spines — such as roses and cactus plants, for instance — will send intruders fleeing faster than they can say "Ouch."

Even the police agree it's worth a try. As one of them told me: "Burglars will certainly think twice before trying to pass through a wall of thorns."

So here's my suggestions for pretty-but-painful natural security systems to discourage thieves. There are, of course, lots of others besides the following, so visit your local nurseryman or garden centre and see for yourself the ones you prefer.



All varieties of roses are covered with thorns the year round. And they are all decorative too. If you plant rose bushes two to three yards apart around your home they will grow into an impenetrable hedge.

You can also use a trellis to train an individual rose plant to grow near a window to keep people out.

Pyracantha is also known as the "fire thorn." It has clusters of attractive white flowers, orange berries and sharp thorns.

You can either use it as a hedge or plant it along a wall to keep intruders from getting close to your home.

Hollies of course would be ideal. They all have sharply pointed leaves and grow very dense. Ideal to protect windows.

Poncirus trifoliata is a deciduous spiny shrub or small tree up to 15 ft. with a wide-spreading head. Branches are flattened and have very stout spines up to two inches long and are extremely sharp. It would make an excellent hedge around your property and pretty too with its hardy orange-like fruit (not suitable for eating).

Naturally, cactus plants are among the most prickly you can get. Even a single-barrel cactus or a spiky yucca plant will keep people away from a basement or ground floor window.

To find out which prickly plants grow best in your part of the country, your local garden centre will help.

Over 12,000 Arthritis Sufferers In County

"As many as 12,300 people, adults and children, in Co. Waterford suffer from one form of arthritis or another. This is a huge figure which I know will come as a surprise to most. It is because so many are afflicted that we are launching an arthritis information campaign in the county throughout September."

So commented Waterford pharmacist, Richard Phelan, when he announced that, for the first time, Waterford pharmacists and the Arthritis Foundation of Ireland are joining forces in the month-long "what should I know about arthritis" campaign.

"Those who want to know more about the condition should ask in their local pharmacy for the free arthritis information brochure which has been specially prepared to coincide with the campaign. It has been designed in a question and answer format, the questions being those which are most often posed by the public to healthcare professionals," he added. "If possible, they should

also attend Arthritis Information Day (10.30 a.m. to 5 p.m.) in the Royal Hospital, Kilmainham, Dublin on Saturday, September 7."

The pharmacy information brochure provides answers to about 30 questions, covering such queries as — what is arthritis? How long does it last? What are the warning signs? What treatments are there? What about exercise and diet? Is surgery useful? What about unproven remedies? What is rheumatoid arthritis and osteoarthritis? What is juvenile arthritis?

"The word arthritis literally means joint inflammation and refers to more than 100 different diseases", said Mr. Phelan. "Most forms of arthritis are chronic and may last a life time. Treatment depends on many factors, including the type of arthritis, its effect on the body, severity, which joints are affected and a persons age, occupation and every day activities. Most treatments will include some combination of medication, rest, exercise and methods of protecting the joints."

Diagnosing arthritis sometimes takes several visits to the doctor and several tests. The doctor may refer a sufferer to a rheumatologist for a difficult diagnosis or for special care.

Nobody knows what causes arthritis but the warning signs include swelling in one or more joints, early morning stiffness, recurring pain or tenderness in any joint, inability to move a joint normally, obvious redness warmth in a joint and unexplained weight loss, fever or weakness combined to joint pain.

Mr. Phelan said a particularly sad aspect of arthritis is that as many as 5000 children in Ireland have some form of it. The common form is called juvenile chronic arthritis which affects girls more often than boys. Although the condition requires ongoing medical attention, most children lead a full and active life with proper care. It can occur at any age up to 16, but the most frequent times of onset are between one and three years and eight to eleven years.

Last Call For Nitrogen

Work by Willie Murphy at Johnstown Castle clearly shows that the response to autumn nitrogen is best in August and declines steadily through September. By late September, the response is unlikely to be worthwhile even in a mild autumn. For nitrogen applied in late August or the first days of September, a response of 10 kg. Dry matter per kg of nitrogen applied could be expected.

At this level of response, a bag of CAN or equivalent per acre would produce about 150 kg DM per acre at a cost of £6.50. This works out at about 4.3 p/kg DM. The cost of a kg of dry matter in the form of purchased concentrates is about 16p or of purchased hay or silage about 10p. Therefore, quality grass produced through the use of nitrogen at this time is an economical way of getting extra feed.

Location

The best response will be got on the drier fields that have a good proportion of ryegrasses. Land that has been cut for hay or silage will also give a good response as soil nitrogen reserves are usually low after cutting. Apply 30 - 40 units (1 - 1 1/2 bags CAN or equivalent) per acre. Plan the grazing programme into the autumn so that no grass is wasted and cattle/cows are kept out with adequate grass as long as possible.

SHEEP

Choice Of Ram

The first matter to be decided is the purpose for which the ram will be used. Will he be there primarily for the production of lamb for slaughter (terminal sire) or is he intended to produce ewe lambs for subsequent breeding (crossing sire).

Crossing Sire

Crossing sires generally required to produce ewe lambs of high prolificacy, good mothering ability and good milk yield. Teagasc research over many years points firmly towards the Belclare as the best sire to produce prolific daughters. If that is the prime objective, and it should be, comparatively less critical aspects such as slightly lower growth rate should not be given undue importance.

Terminal Sire

Terminal sires are intended to produce fast growing lambs, giving well conformed lean carcasses at a carcass weight of 16 - 21 kgs. Teagasc research shows that on non-Suffolk ewes, Suffolk rams produce the fastest growing lambs followed by Charolais and Texel. As terminal sires it is difficult to see why any breed other than these three should be used.

FARM ACCIDENTS

About 30% of non-fatal accidents on farms are caused by trips, falls, blows and lifting. The injuries sustained are painful and can limit the ability of the injured person to do farm work. Sometimes people injured in these circumstances are incapacitated for the rest of their lives. Most of these injuries can be prevented. Over the coming weeks, I will highlight some of the farmyard hazards to help you identify them on your own farm.

Door Ways

If it is necessary to stoop to go through doorways or to move through a building e.g. a milking parlour, there is a risk of head injury to someone working in this area.

Doors

Swinging doors are dangerous especially in windy conditions. It is essential that doors can be restrained. Fitting sliding doors or small personnel doors in the main door are good ideas.

Gates And Fences

Properly hung gates throughout the farm provide easy access. Considerable scope exists for installing wicket gates or stiles to improve access. Cattle grids need a wicket gate close to the grid for access.

CATTLE CRISIS

John Quigley, Area Officer with ICMSA in the South East region outlines below ICMSA policy to introduce a comprehensive package of measures required to cope with the BSE crisis. The proposals for a six point action programme are as follows:

- Introduction of a more effective intervention system to ensure realistic cattle prices.

- A substantial increase in the ten-month Beef Premium to compensate for losses of over £100 per animal being incurred by producers of light weight cattle (weanlings). This compensation must be specially designed to cover losses suffered by suckler herd owners.

- Introduction of a Slaughter Premium for cows as an incentive for farmers to send their surplus animals to the factory and thereby

eliminate the huge over-capacity in the national herd.

- A 25 per cent increase in export refunds as an incentive for exporters to find markets for all cattle.

- Introduction of a £200 million loan scheme with an interest rate of 5 per cent to encourage farmers to buy and hold store cattle over the coming winter period, to be funded by the banks and the Exchequer.

- A national programme published by Teagasc to advise farmers on the best course of action to take to remain in beef production.

REGIONAL MEETING

The newly elected ICMSA Chairman of the South East region, James Hennessy, said that he is holding a regional committee meeting in Hotel Kilkenny on Monday, September 9 next to discuss the present cattle crisis and the fall out of problems that

are arising from the crisis.

Mr. Hennessy said that he was part of a delegation which met with some of the lending institutions recently in the region and that while things at present may be ticking over, it is from now on that problems will arise as the drop in prices/income takes its effect.

Other items to be discussed at the forthcoming regional committee meeting will be programme for the coming year 1996/97.

Mr. Hennessy reminded farmers that ICMSA will have a stand at the Piltown Show which will be manned by ICMSA officers and staff from the South East region.

Banks Pledge Support For Livestock Sector

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, James Coughlan, has reported firm support for the livestock sector from key bank lenders following the completion of a second series of top level meetings with the banks in advance of the vital autumn cattle selling period. This series of meetings is part of on-going contacts between IFA and the Banks on the BSE crisis and its effects on cattle prices.

Following meetings in recent days with Bank of Ireland, AIB Bank and National Irish Bank, Mr. Coughlan said: "IFA have been involved in briefing the banks on the current state of the cattle market and the impact this is having on farm incomes. We have stressed the need for the banks to take a

longer term flexible view, particularly to allow farmers to alleviate their losses in the autumn period."

"We have received assurances from the banks that they will continue to support the livestock sector and that there will be no action on their part which would undermine the confidence of the cattle trade in the critical autumn period," he added. IFA will be meeting with Ulster Bank, ACC Bank and TSB Bank in the coming days.

Mr. Coughlan advised farmers who may be experiencing some difficulties in meeting seasonal loan repayments to contact their local bank manager without delay to discuss their financing needs and reschedule repayments where necessary.

Demand For All Disadvantaged Areas Payment In September — IFA

Waterford IFA Western Development Committee Chairman, Michael J. Walsh, has called on the Minister for Agriculture, Ivan Yates, to sanction all Disadvantaged Areas headage payments in the month of September in order to alleviate the income crisis hitting cattle farmers in those areas.

"120,000 farmers are owed £110m and are heavily dependent on disadvantaged area payments," he said. "Given the very depressed state of beef prices, cattle farmers will have particular difficulties this autumn and unless they receive early payments, will be under severe financial pressure. While last year's payments commenced in September, the vast bulk of payments were not paid until later in the year. However, this year, farmers in disadvantaged areas cannot afford to wait until the year end for payments which are desperately needed in September."

"The monies which are owed through the cattle headage scheme in severely handicapped areas, beef cow scheme in less severely

handicapped areas, and sheep headage payments, in 1996 must now be advanced in September to prevent further financial hardship for farmers who have this year suffered severe blows.

"Mr. Walsh stressed that adequate provision has been made within the EU Structural Funds budget to make such payments available in September.

The Waterford Western Development leader warned that unless such action is taken by the Minister, farm incomes will be severely depressed in poor land areas where direct supports are vital to the survival of thousands of farmers.

Mr. Walsh explained that the headage rates for the severely handicapped areas are £84 on beef cows, £40 for other cattle, £75 for beef cows in less severely handicapped areas, and £10 per mountain ewe as well as lowland ewe hoggets. He said the Disadvantaged Areas Scheme which is 65% funded under the EU Structural Funds, will also include payments to farmers in newly designated and reclassified disadvantaged areas.

Tackling The Tackle

Tackling in hurling is very clearly documented in the rules. There are no grey areas. Chopping late or early pulling, fronted charging, overholding, exceeding the permitted four steps, pushing, holding, obstructing etc. are clear to any man who takes the whistle and there is no reason for any fit referee to fail in controlling a game.

Provocative and intimidating behaviour, over aggressive or other bookable offences and dangerous play are all easily identifiable with the sanctions to be imposed in each circumstance very clearly outlined. Hurling's speedy nature doesn't give too much time or opportunity for holding or other negative ploys. Not nowadays with the changed atmosphere around the square from the days of "hell's kitchen," the days of Billy Dwyer and Link Walsh.

Many years ago, Coon and Muckalee met in the Kilkenny Junior Hurling Championship, a game always calculated to generate high tension and leave many sore in their gore. This contest turned out to be a fraught one and was witnessed by a huge partisan crowd who were prepared for a battle to the death. An early attack by Coon, the ball lobbed in, the full-back pulled, driving the ball clear just as the full forward started his swing, connecting with the unfortunate number three who went down. In dashed the referee, notebook and pencil at the ready. "You pulled late," he admonished the big man who had pulled "later the same day". "What?" said the number fourteen with wide-eyed innocence. "You pulled after the ball was gone," explained the referee with ill-calculated impatience, preparing to dismiss the perpetrator. "Yerra God man," protested the Cathalainn lookalike, "if 'twas gone, 'twasn't long gone."

Meanwhile back at the ranch, the prone victim of

the foul pull was being attended to and clearly needed some medical attention. First aid how are you !!! And ambulances pushaw !!! But Mick the local butcher, showing uncanny anticipation had brought along his mate's van. "The back doors swung open, the full back carefully placed aboard, the doors slammed and Mick slipped into first gear. He was about to set off when he had an afterthought. He rolled down the window and shouted back. "Lads," shouted the humanitarian Mick, "will I go on or maybe wait for a load."



Most dual referees prefer to handle hurling rather than football. At first glance, this seems strange with hurling very much the faster game. But then football is riddled with foul play and the slower pace encourages this. Tackling in football is never without an element of a foul even when what could be described as a "clean" foul is committed. It is possible of course to manoeuvre a player into relying on his weak foot and to shadow-tackle (forcing an opponent into a disadvantaged position) but even in those cases, the arms and hands are liberally used. This is in clear breach of the rules but when did you last see it penalised? Isn't it high time that all illegal tackles were punished.

The unseemly pulling and dragging, holding and thumping have almost ruined football as a spectacle because few football matches this year escaped this obnoxious fouling. The game played in the best spirit was the Wicklow v Carlow one because an otherwise admirable match, Mayo v Kerry had a surfeit of those objectionable features.

On reflection it isn't all that surprising that football

matches are so besmirched with crude and sometimes violent play. As already noted, the complete lack of any clear definition of a tackle leaves it to the poor referee to decide instantly what constitutes a fair tackle. Besides in his anxiety to maintain a pattern to the game and not interrupt the continuity of play continually the referee often feels obliged to ignore some fouls completely. That is not his function. His job is to ensure that the rules are complied with and that foul play doesn't pay. I have mentioned previously that it is essential for a referee to blow for the first foul, the very first and not as the Galway man Mick Curley did recently, allow play to proceed in the fond hope that all will turn out for the best and that somehow justice will eventually be done and be seen to be done. Pulling an opponent's arm (innocuous enough in itself) so that he loses possession is a foul. It unfairly deprives the victim of possession just as effectively as if he had been pulled and dragged, pushed or tripped. Punish that first foul and don't encourage the foulers because then on the next occasion the perpetrator may feel tempted to make a cruder or dirtier tackle to halt play.

A factor which I think inadvertently contributes enormously to foul play is the frightening fitness level of present day inter-county players, footballers more so than hurlers. Nowadays the Meaths and Dublins of this world invest hugely in achieving a professional level of fitness and to watch them training leaves one in awe of their physical strength. There is also a clear message implied that strength and stamina will be applied in their matches.

It's a few years since I last watched Dublin training but I remember some of their sessions of the seventies and early eighties. In those days, Kerry and themselves set a fitness

standard for all who aspired to All-Ireland honours. To see Dublin prepare in Parnell Park was a revelation. The volume, intensity and variety of murderous physical drills, the absence of any interval between the various segments and the fierceness of the concluding training match left any onlooker limp. One of the gentler parts of the session had the players paired off and each pair spent about five minutes pummeling each other's midriff in turn. This form of torture went on every night. And I presume that you are not so naive as to think that it was designed to stimulate the digestive juices. Was it any wonder that Dublin, like Meath today, played and still play, a very robust style of football. When training is that hard and aggressive, the players tend to let their opponents "know that they are there" in the big games. As one unscrupulous footballer said to me once: "you must hurt him when you tackle him because it is the same free whether you flatten him or not."

A contributory cause to the continuance of foul play is the inherent weakness in the team of officials in charge of controlling the games. There are obvious difficulties at the level of local championship games but there is absolutely no excuse for any team of officials - the referee, two linesmen and four umpires - who fail to discharge their duties fully when placed in control of an inter-county game. The referee may be competent but far too often his two linesmen and four umpires are not. This is being penned in advance of Sunday's All-Ireland so I don't know how the referee will interpret the rules and exert control. I hope the referee has a great game - it's the least that players and spectators deserve but what will the other side contribute? Do the umpires have to have any qualifications for their job? Yet

these four are sole artificers of all scores and a whole year's work can be ruined by their incompetence. Umpires undergo no fitness, aptitude or eyesight test and are virtually anonymous figures who, in many cases never assist the referee to control the game. In that tempestuous Tyrone v Meath game, a lot of tackling on and off the ball occurred on the blind side of the referee. Only once did an umpire liaise with the referee. On all other occasions the referee only got a response of shrugs of the shoulder and blank looks. This position is intolerable and there is an urgent need for action in regard to it. The umpires should no longer be the white-coated anonymous figures of today. They should be identifiable, subject to stringent examination to determine

their knowledge of goal-mouth situations and assessed on a continuous basis before being appointed for major games.

When we are tackling this matter of the tackle in hurling or football, we cannot divorce it from the referees role. Only he has the power to decide on the validity or otherwise of a tackle. Three points are worth making. He should once and for all enforce the role about consistent repeated fouling. It is about time too to introduce a rule which operates in the Australian Compromise Rules games: obliging the player in possession to play the ball immediately without soloing and thirdly the solo should be abolished. Those changes would go a long way towards cleaning up the tarnished image of the game of football.

Cheff's Corner

Menus for the week



- 8oz/225g plain flour
- pinch of salt
- 4 eggs
- 1 tsp/5ml mustard
- 2 tbsp/30ml fresh chopped chives
- 1/4pt/300ml milk
- 2 tbsp/30ml vegetable oil

METHOD

• With a sharp knife, make small cuts all over beef fat. Insert slices of garlic into slits and season. Place joint in a deep bowl, pour over wine and marinate in the fridge for at least 2 hrs or overnight, spooning wine over meat occasionally. • Spread the mustard over meat. Cover with foil. Cook with wine at 400°F/200°C/Gas Mark 6, allowing 20 mins per lb

(450g) plus 20 mins for rare, 25 mins per lb (450g) plus 25 mins for medium and 30 mins plus 30 mins for well-done meat. • Meanwhile, sift the flour and salt into a bowl. Make a well in the centre and crack the eggs into it. Beat flour and eggs together to form a smooth paste, making sure eggs are well combined. Beat in the mustard. Add chopped chives to milk. • Whisk in milk. Cover and leave to stand for 30 mins, then whisk again. Twenty-five mins before meat is ready, divide oil between 6 muffin tins and heat in top of oven. Bake meat and remove foil. Pour batter into tins and cook for 20 mins until risen.

Spicy Roast Beef

Preparation: 20 mins, plus marinating and standing time
Cooking: 1 hour 20 mins - 2 hrs Serves: 6

- 3lb/1.4kg rib of beef
- 3 cloves garlic, sliced
- 1/4pt-1pt/300ml-600ml red wine
- 4 tbsp/60ml horseradish mustard
- Yorkshire puddings

Spicy Vegetable Curry

Preparation: 20 mins
Cooking: 30 mins
Serves: 4

- 50g/2oz vegetable ghee or 3 tbsp oil
- 4 large carrots, sliced
- 1 large onion, sliced
- 1 cauliflower
- 3 garlic cloves, crushed
- 2 cinnamon sticks, each broken in half
- 1 tsp grated root ginger
- 1 tsp cumin seeds
- 1/2 tsp ground turmeric
- 1 tsp chilli powder
- 3 bay leaves
- 1 bunch spring onions, trimmed and sliced
- 100g/4oz French beans
- 2 (400g/14oz) cans chickpeas, drained
- 450ml/1pt vegetable stock
- 50g/2oz creamed coconut

METHOD

• Melt the ghee in a large pan and fry the carrots and onion for 5 minutes. Break the cauliflower into florets and add to the pan with the garlic. Cook for a further 2 minutes. Drain vegetables on kitchen paper. • Add the cinnamon sticks, ginger, lightly crushed cumin seeds, ground turmeric, chilli powder and bay leaves to the pan and fry for 1 minute. • Return carrots, onions and cauliflower to the pan with the spring onions, halved French beans, chickpeas, stock and creamed coconut. Season to taste. • Bring the stew to the boil, reduce the heat and simmer gently for 20 minutes until the vegetables are tender and the sauce thickened. Serve hot.

HOUSEHOLD TIPS

- Make a radiator cleaner with a stick or broom handle that fits down the back of the radiator. Tie a sponge on the end and cover the sponge with an old sock. Change the sock when it gets dirty.
- If you spill ink on wooden furniture, absorb as much as you can into a damp cloth, then rub with a cut lemon.
- To get rid of plant stains inside a vase, add a handful of tea leaves, cover with vinegar and shake.

Family Health

Q. My daughter, who's eight, has a distinctive mole on her back. I have noticed a change in its appearance recently. It now has a very pale ring around it which was not there before. I do not want to alarm her unnecessarily, but we hear so much about watching out for changes in mole appearance these days, I don't know what to do. Can you please advise me?

A. I strongly advise you to take your daughter to the doctor to have this mole checked out. It sounds very much like a 'halo naevus' - a mole with a halo around it. This pale area represents the battle ground between the mole and the body's immune system. It's unlikely there's any malignancy, but such changes should always be checked out. Your doctor can tell you if there's a possible problem and removing the mole for microscopic examination is

usually done if there's any doubt.

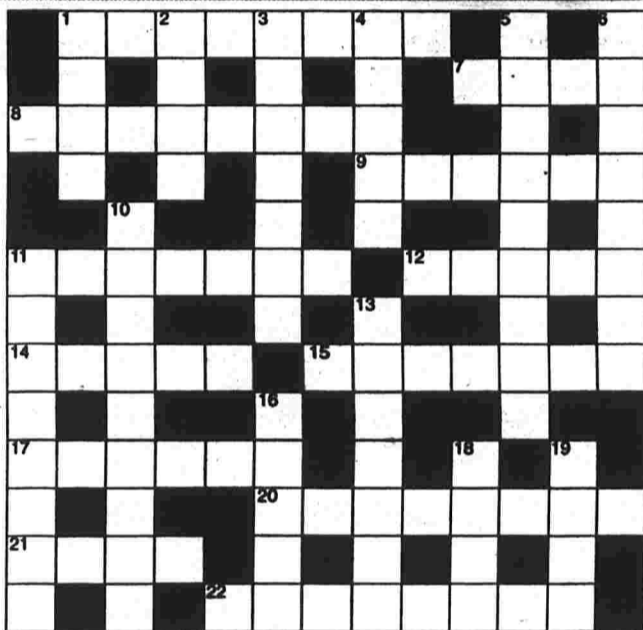
Q. I am thinking of having another baby, and this time I would like to have an epidural. Could you please explain how this works?

A. The epidural is an anaesthetic, injected into the epidural space - an area close to the spinal cord, in the middle of the lower back. A catheter is held in position there so that further doses can be given according to the patient's requirements. It is now used extensively in childbirth and can also be used in many surgical procedures without loss of consciousness. Some patients do experience side effects from this anaesthetic - which can include nausea, light-headedness, difficulty in passing urine and a heavy sensation in the legs. Backache and dizziness can also occur.

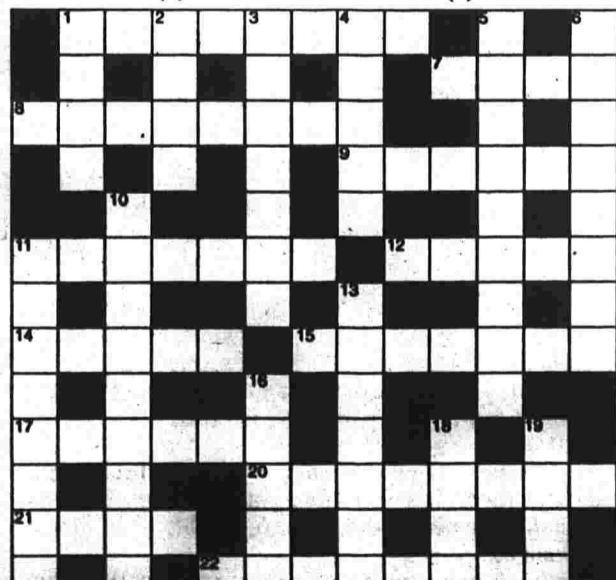

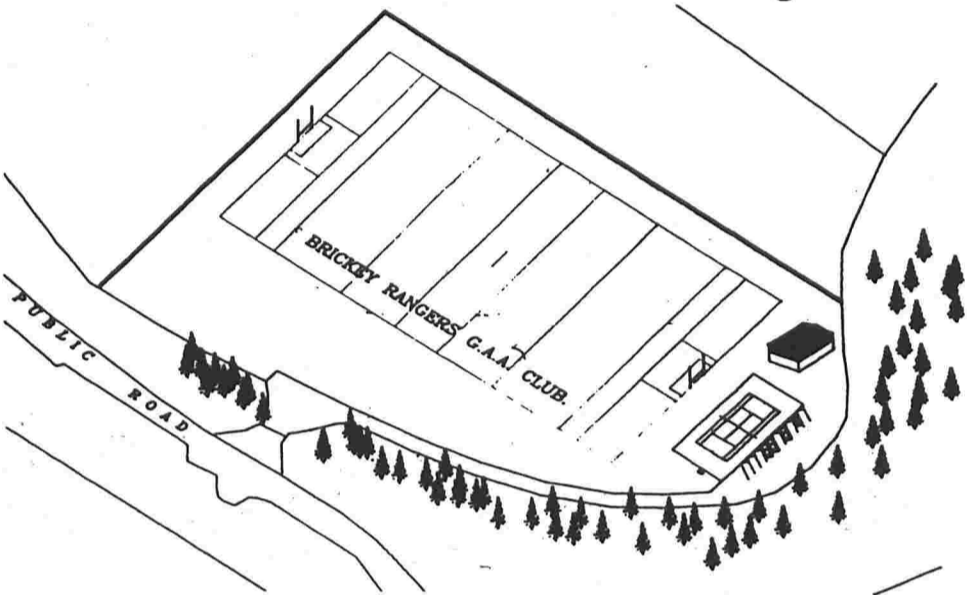

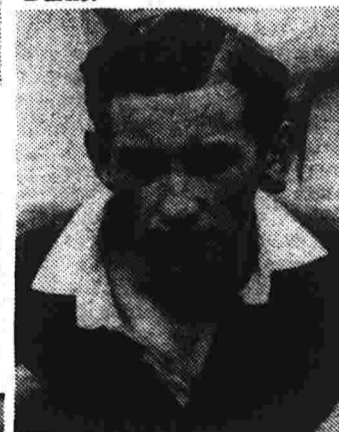

Jim Dee and Dave Morrissey were introduced but even with fresh legs, we failed to score the goal we deserved.

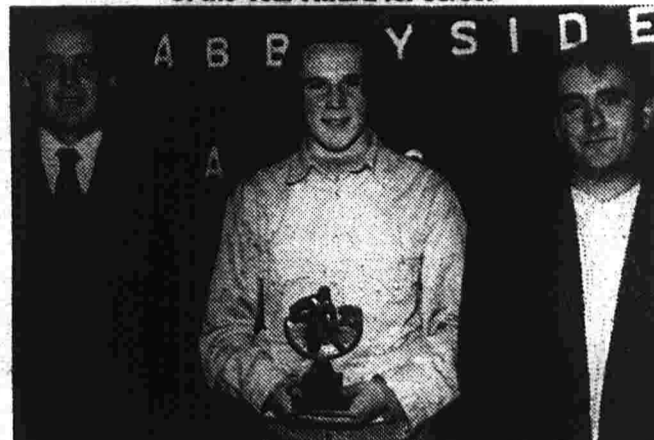

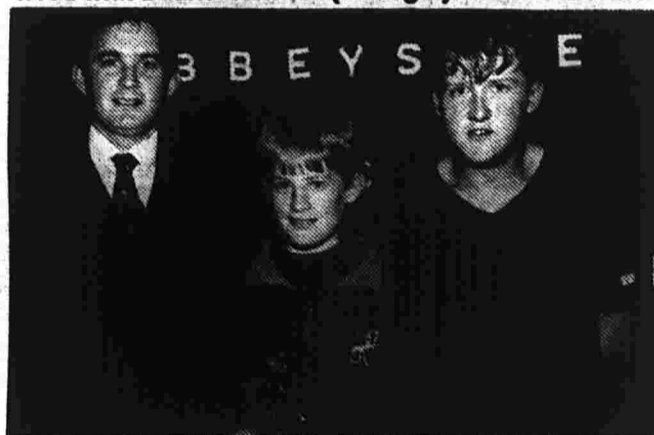

One Big Purple And Gold Party

[FROM WILLIAM DOWNING IN WEXFORD]

The final shrill blow of Offalyman Pat Horan's whistle just past 5.00 p.m. on Sunday evening ended a 28 year long hoodoo that dogged Wexford hurling. It also provided the cue for the biggest celebrations that the county has seen since 1968. Almost instantly after the final whistle, a fleet of cars zoomed down the spacious quay in Wexford town, tooting their car horns and waving purple and gold flags. As the minutes passed, their volume increased until at 5.30 p.m., the mile long quay had turned into one noisy, celebratory tail-back.

The more creative of those in the traffic jam had painted their cars in the Wexford colours with one vehicle displaying two hurleys across the bonnet.

As the crowds began to swell and throng the quayside area, they were then given an interesting sight as four boisterous supporters, in celebratory mode risked life, limb and liberty in climbing out of the windows of a train passing through from Rosslare, they went up onto the roof. The quartet were later joined by a further three Wexford-jersey clad individuals who for half an hour, paraded up and down the stationary train, ignoring appeals from Irish Rail for them to step down. Eventually it needed two members of the Garda Síochána to round up the seven and force them onto ground level again.

Three hours after the final whistle, the large cavalcade of cars were still parading along the quay in Wexford town and the crowd of about one thousand was boosted by the arrival of the first of the trains down from Dublin. The bon-

fires were now blazing up and down the county with the citizens of the railway village of Wellingtonbridge lighting a large fire right in the middle of the road in the middle of the village. This was also the case in the Ferrybank area of Wexford town. A unit of the Wexford Fire Brigade was called out to extinguish the bonfire as it was now blazing out of control.

Gorey was another centre of activity as The Wild Swans, now at number two in the Irish charts with "The Hurling Song" played a live concert to a crowd of at least three thousand. The North Wexford town is usually the first stopping off point on the road from Dublin. Indeed, a three mile tail-back just outside Gorey caused widespread delays but it did give those in their cars a chance to hear a reprise of Liam Spratt's commentary on South East Radio, which was relayed on six other local radio stations across the country, including W.L.R. and on two stations in New Zealand. Spratt's commentary culminated in the broadcast saying that he would make an appointment to give co-commentator Ned Buggy an AIDS test after the former county hurler had kissed him on the final whistle; a statement which should rank alongside Marty Morrissey's "there won't be a cow milked in Clare tonight!" from the Munster Football Final in 1992.

The greatest scenes were expected to be seen at the homecoming for the Wexford team on Monday night as Gorey, Enniscorthy and Wexford town were due to be en fete.

Everything points to an exciting weekend with top-class fare almost guaranteed at Fraher Field and Cappoquin where all the action takes place on Saturday and Sunday.

Given good weather there will be big crowds for all the games and a 'packed house' looks certain for the afternoon programme at Dungarvan where the county champions, Ballygunner, take on Ballyduff in the opener and Lismore play Passage in the feature game. The pairings are as attractive as one could ask for and if all four play to form the patrons will certainly enjoy sitting it out for the two and a half hours that it will take to decide which two will go forward to the county final a couple of weeks later.

We can have a draw or worse still we can have two draws. Any of the two results will throw the County Board schedule out of gear. Also if Ballygunner and Passage survive and qualify, the county final will likely be played at Walsh Park, instead of at Fraher Field where it is scheduled to be played in accordance with the rotation arrangement. So we have lots to look forward to on Sunday.

A PROGRAMME

The County Board have decided to bring out a programme which will cover all three matches on Sunday, thus giving the programme a higher profile and also helping patrons to follow the matches with the respective line-outs available.

BALLYGUNNER v. BALLYDUFF

Ballyduff impressed a lot of people by their display of hurling and fitness in the quarter final against De La Salle and I'm sure they will have made further improvement since then under the strict and watchful eye of former All Star Mossie Walsh who certainly knows what is needed to win games against such high-powered opposition. Their most recent game was their best since the championship powered opposition and a repeat of the same form will cause serious problems for the county champions. Bal-

lyduff will have John Twomey in goal. He is a safe keeper and he is unlikely to worry too much about what Paul Flynn and company will send in.

Outside him, Pat Molumphy, the very reliable Mossy Carey and John Casey will man the full line behind Michael Drislane, Tom Feeney and Gerald Feeney. Paudie Prendergast and Gerard Hickey are as good a couple of midfielders as there is in the county in club hurling at the present and up front. Ballyduff will have Michael Molumphy, Donal Hannon, Owen Corcoran, Kenneth Geary, Michael Walsh, Brendan Hannon, etc. The western side will certainly mount a very strong challenge to the champions, who were lucky to scrape home against an under-strength Roanmore team two weeks ago in Walsh Park.

The champions know full well what an effort it will take to beat Ballyduff in Dungarvan and they will come to town expecting their fifteen to 'fire on all cylinders' from start to finish.

Paul Flynn, Paul Power, David Codd, Billy O'Sullivan, Darragh O'Sullivan, Stephen Frampton, Sean Lyons, Liam Whitty, Pat Harnan, Fergal Hartley, C. Laphorne and co. will certainly stretch themselves to the limit to hold on to their title which they won after a replay against Mount Sion last year.

Here against Lismore in the final of the Sargent Cup five weeks ago, the 'Gunners' played very good hurling against Lismore and many of their 21 points on that occasion, were splendid scores.

Ballyduff have deservedly qualified and there was no fluke about how they did it. They have tremendous confidence in themselves and they have inspirational advisors on the sideline and it will take a very good Ballygunner to beat them at this stage. Despite having written in such a vein, I have a feeling

that the county champions, Ballygunner, will survive this one, probably by a small margin. I hope this prediction won't work out.

LISMORE v. PASSAGE

This is given the feature spot on this most attractive programme and maybe it is because the G.A.C. are perceiving it as the better or more attractive of the two?

I see it as being yet another cracker of a match that will be brimful of skillful hurling and perhaps in the balance right up to the final whistle. The sides have not met so far this year, but when they clashed here in Fraher Field two years ago, Lismore inflicted a fifteen points beating on the Dunmore team. That was pretty decisive, but also it was two years ago and Lismore would be very foolish to expect that it will be the same again.

Passage have come on a lot since, as was clearly seen when they defeated Mount Sion three weeks ago. When Lismore and Passage clashed in the county final at Walsh Park in 1993, it was a cracker of a game and with very little between them at the finish. Not everyone will agree with my view that Lismore have been playing below their full potential all through this year.

There is an unconfirmed report that James O'Connor will miss out on the match and if this is true, the western team will certainly be weakened. If the injured Kieran O'Gorman is fit to resume, it will help to balance things out there. Lismore will have Brendan Ormond in goal, Michael and Mark O'Sullivan, Seamus Prendergast, Brendan Crowley, Anthony Whelan in defence with Paul Prendergast and brother Barney the likely midfield pairing and Dan Shanahan, Dave Bennett, Paul Quinn, Sean Daly, Brendan Ormond, Paul Quinn and company in attack and while they look a very formidable and experienced side, I believe they will have a mammoth task in trying to contain their fiercely determined opponents.

Passage, who will have Ray Barry in goal, Eamon and Sean Cullinane, Seamus Keating, James O'Connor, Pat Connors in defence with Paul Fitzgerald and Paul Connors around midfield and players like Barry Walsh, Martin Murphy, Anthony 'Fly' Fitzgerald, Mossie O'Keeffe, etc. up front.

Passage have the highest 'points' scoring record in the league section this year (104), while Lismore, who played one match less, have only 49 which is their lowest in years.

Our hopes will be with Lismore and Ballyduff in this double header, but I have a nervous feeling about the prospects of both. However, we all live in hope.

This is on hold at present and some of the people in higher places don't seem to favour giving permission. I don't know for what reason, but it is likely that whatever problems are there will be ironed out in time for the competition to go ahead on schedule.

Gerald McCarthy Is New Hurling Coach/Manager

Although there was no official announcement until the special meeting of the County Board on Wednesday night last, the speculators who had been throwing his name about for a couple of weeks in advance of the meeting, had got it right about the appointment of the very well-known Corkman.

There was what looked to be a full attendance at the special meeting, be it for reasons of interest or curiosity and those who had something to say after the package was spelt out were unanimously in favour of Gerald McCarthy, whose track record with Cork (whom he captained to a Senior and U-21 All-Ireland titles) is very well-known down here.

At the outset, the Chairman P. J. Ryan who presided thanked the delegates for attending at such short notice and he then told the meeting that a list of possible coach/managers had been drawn up by the officers and that interviews had taken place over the past couple of months.

Gerald McCarthy, with whom they had held a number of meetings, had met with the officers last week and had agreed to accept the appointment. The terms of the agreement (if ratified by County Board) are that he will be given three years to work with the panel. He will be allowed to pick his own two other selectors and that he be given authority to appoint an assistant coach/trainer from within the County. The Chairman said that Gerald McCarthy had given a clear undertaking that he would give his total commitment to Waterford during his time in the post.

Having paid tribute to the people who had worked with Waterford teams over the years in an effort to bring us to Croke Park and to glory, he said that the new man could

give no guarantee but at the same time, he might just be the one to give us the extra push that will get us over the hill this time. He then threw the proposals open to the board for discussion.

Noel Fleming was first in and he complimented the officers for having succeeded in what they were asked to do and he wished the new man well.

James Tobin also congratulated the officers and he formally proposed that we accept the coach/manager and the full package. Níochlás MacCraith seconded.

Declan Barron asked about sponsorship to defray the cost and was informed that no new sponsorship had yet been negotiated.

Declan O'Meara, Chairman of Finance and Development Committee asked if the new coach would also work with the Junior, U-21 and Minor hurling teams and was told by the Chairman that such an idea was discussed, but it was something that could be borne in mind. Others to speak in favour were Tom Drummy, E. O Murchu, Tom Browne.

Greg Fives said that while it might not be totally relevant to the matter under discussion, he said the matter of running the club championships next year, with the Nations League and Munster championship being run concurrently, it was important that the make-up of the 1997 championships be discussed within the next couple of months by the County Board.

The Chairman then thanked the delegates for their support in the matter and for accepting the proposal unanimously and he and the other officers felt happy that everyone had pledged to throw their full support behind it. This ended the business of the special meeting.

Decision On Melleray Wind Mast Proposal Still Pending

gether with the Council's Planning Dept., sought additional information from the company on the proposed development. In a letter dated May 22nd, the Council wrote to Colham stating that they are "not favourably disposed" to granting planning permission to wind farm projects having regard to scenic amenity, visual impact and exposure etc. but requested Colham to forward additional information in order that a final, balanced decision can be made. The company propose to erect wind monitoring systems at Tooranahareen and Glenfallia - both within a short distance of the famous Cistercian Abbey in the heart of the scenic Knockmealdowns.

As yet Colham have failed to reply to the Council's correspondence, so the application is effectively in 'limbo', pending submission of further information.

FLOODED WITH OBJECTIONS

To-date the Council has been flooded with objections to the wind test sites. The campaign of opposition is being spearheaded by the Knockmealdown Protection Committee, who believe that these initial monitoring systems will be the forerun-

ner for an eventual fully fledged wind farm development on the unspoiled mountain range.

Speaking to the 'Dungarvan Leader', Cappoquin native and committee chairman, Willie O'Donoghue, said the committee is hopeful that Colham Energy will withdraw their applications. While not adverse to the notion of wind farms as a source of natural, alternative energy, Mr. O'Donoghue however said he is opposed to the location of such a development in the two areas in question.

To the west of Knocknafallia lies an historic earth work of archaeological interest while Touranahareen is surrounded by acres of untouched turf banks. Mr. O'Donoghue stressed that this entire area is part of the Knockmeal-down Drive, described in the Aer Lingus tourist map as an area of unspoiled natural beauty, attracting hundreds of tourists each year.

To-date, Mr. O'Donoghue said the committee has gathered over 1,000 signatures of those objecting to the proposed wind masts. These individuals are drawn from a wide geographical area, encompassing Melleray, Cappoquin, Newcastle, Lismore and Dungarvan etc.
