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SmithKline Beecham Invests £12.6m In Dungarvan

Local industry received a major boost this week with the exciting announcement of a further £6.2 million investment by one of Dungarvan's industrial flagships, the 210 job SmithKline Beecham (SB) plant at the IDA Industrial Estate, Clogherane.

Taken in context with on-going major expansion works at the neighbouring Stafford Miller plant and the recent completion of the advance factory facility, also sited on the industrial estate, the announcement comes as a welcome lift to the local economy which will have far reaching, positive effects on job creation prospects.

75 NEW JOBS TO BE CREATED

The £6.2 million investment in both machinery and facilities at the Dungarvan facility is additional to the

previous announcement last February of a £6.4 million injection for the plant following confirmation that the site has been designated as the supplier of high volume products such as Panadol, Coldrex, Hedex, Solpadeine and other OTC brands.

It is planned to have both projects completed by the end of 1997. Construction work on the expansion of the plant has already begun and it is estimated that around 75 new jobs will be created at the Dungarvan plant over the next two years bring the total work-

force up to almost 300.

The combined investment of £12.6 million between now and 1998 is part of a major European rationalisation programme which will expand packaging facilities and increase the output and range of tablets manufactured at the plant.

A new Granulation Suite for the production of brands such as Solpadeine Soluble, Panadol Soluble and Panadol Extra Soluble will also be provided as part of an ongoing process of focusing Dungarvan as the high volume solid dosage manufacturing centre for the SB in Europe.

SURPASSED ALL EXPECTATIONS

The Dungarvan facility was established by Sterling in 1987 to produce finished pharmaceuticals for the European Middle East and African markets. At that time less than 70 people were employed at the plant.

By 1994 there were 165 employed at the ultra modern plant before its sub-

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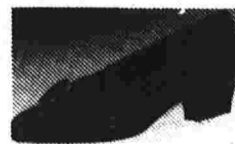
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Waterford Wedgwood Announces Increased Profits

Waterford Wedgwood, the group which owns one of the world's leading luxury brands, Waterford Crystal, has announced a 28% increase in profit for the first 6 months of this year. Sales rose by 8% to £163.2m, reflecting an excellent performance in the U.S., Japan and in Ireland.

With regard to Waterford Crystal, profits of £5.1m were recorded for the first half of '96 on sales of over £60 million. This performance was principally due to record sales in America and Ireland, both of which saw increases of 17% and a further strong contribution from the Marquis brand.

The group's new product development continues to increase in pace with major launches planned in the second half of this year. Commenting on the future of Waterford Wedgwood, Chairman Dr. A. J. F. O'Reilly said the company will continue to consolidate its position of leadership in the table-top industry and to grasp business opportunities.

"This we will achieve through organic growth, the strength of our world famous brands, investment to keep us globally competitive and through acquisitions should suitable opportunities arise," he added.

Know Your Rights

QUESTION

We are both unemployed, my husband for 6 years, myself 5. We are on Unemployment Assistance. We have done FAS courses, been on Community Employment Schemes, tried for lots of jobs to no avail. What else can we do?

ANSWER

There is a new pilot scheme, the "Job Initiative", which is being piloted in the Partnership Areas of Dublin, Cork and Limerick Cities where the new Local Employment Service is in operation. If you live in one of these areas and are over 35 years of age, either of you may qualify. You should contact FAS or your Local Employment Service. There is a limited number of places. The jobs — full time — will be with local voluntary / community groups or public bodies. You will be paid the going rate for the job and the job could be for 3 years. If you have children you could qualify for Family Income Supplement. You will retain Child Dependent Allowances for 13 weeks. You will pay an A rate PRSI Contribution.

If you are not in a Partnership Area you should contact your nearest Citizens Information Centre which has a new free booklet "Getting Back to Work". This booklet covers the options open to unemployed people who may wish to return to work. It deals with the Back to Work Allowance, Community Employment, the various new employment programmes, retaining your secondary benefits, FIS, Tax and Medical Cards.

Last weekend the Fianna Fáil party in the Waterford constituency held their selection convention to nominate runners for the upcoming general election.

Held at Dungarvan Sports Centre, the convention was attended by over 200 delegates under the chairmanship of former minister Deputy Michael Woods. Also present were the party's general secretary Pat Farrell and national organiser Sean Sherwin.

Four members were put

forward for consideration - the two sitting T.D.'s Brendan Kenneally and Martin Cullen, Dungarvan business man Mel Shanley and Waterford County Councillor Ollie Wilkinson of Cappoquin.

It was agreed by delegates to recommend to national executive that one of the two latter names be added on to the party's election ticket.

The two sitting deputies were unanimously sent through for ratification as candidates while a vote took place to see who would be

fielded as the party's third runner.

Mel Shanley received 56 votes and Cllr. Wilkinson went forward on 163 votes.

A prominent West Waterford GAA personality, Cllr. Wilkinson is still waiting to be ratified by party headquarters as the party's third candidate.

At the end of the day, however it will be the final say of had office who may opt only for the sitting pair in a bid to hold on to Fianna Fail's two seats in Waterford.

The Best-Known Harp In The World

The best-known harp in the world has a dual distinction. It is the insignia of the Irish Republic and its picture appears on millions of bottles of stout.

The Irish Harp is said to have belonged to Brian Boru, the King of Ireland who was killed at the Battle of Clontarf in 1014.

Historians believe the harp passed to Rome after Boru's

death. Then, in the 17th century, Pope Innocent XI sent it to Charles II who kept it in the Tower of London until told that O'Brien, Earl of Thomond, "would give a limb of his estate for this relic of his great ancestor."

In some mysterious deal the harp then returned to Ireland and was eventually given to Trinity College, Dublin in about 1760.

It was in poor condition and not played again until 1962 when it was restored by the British Museum. It sounded as beautiful as ever when it was returned to the College. Harps have been played in Britain, particularly in Wales, for centuries. One dating from the 7th century, was found in a Saxon grave near Woodbridge, Suffolk.

Junior Encyclopaedia

The Squirrel

The squirrel leaps from branch to branch in our woods. The red squirrel likes to live in conifer woods, but in a deciduous wood, grey squirrels are more common.

The squirrel's claws are developed in such a way that it is able to grasp branches and climb bark. You will know there are red squirrels present in a wood if you see half eaten cones. Red squirrels aren't regarded as troublesome pests.

The squirrel's nest is called a drey. It would remind one of a magpie's nest only that instead of being far out on a branch it is in the fork of the tree. It is very important not to disturb a mother squirrel in her nest as if she feels threatened she will move to another nest and a baby squirrel can be killed in the upheaval.

There are only a few red squirrels in Britain and Ireland today as they all have succumbed to disease. Today the grey squirrel is more popular.

If you see a pair of squirrels playing around then you are probably witnessing frisky courtship rituals. The male chases the female around both on the ground and in the trees.

The main diet of the grey squirrel is acorns and other nuts. In oak woods, grey squirrels usually bury the nuts and then forget where they hid them. They

usually have to dig a lot of ground before they find them.

The red-squirrels mate in May or June and produce two litters a year. The young are born deaf, naked and blind and there are usually only up to three in a litter. After about eight days, they have their hearing and sight and downy coats start to form. During this time they are dependent on their mother for milk. They can breed at six months, but don't always do so. The male doesn't play any part in bringing up the young.

The drey is made with no entrance hole and the mother gets in by shouldering her way through the loosely built sticks.

The squirrel is a rodent which means it has a pair of large incisor teeth in each jaw for gnawing. These teeth work like chisels with enamel growing

all the time on them to give the squirrel a constant cutting edge. The squirrel can cause havoc in plantations of young trees.

In America the squirrel is eaten as a delicacy.

Minister To Open New Ardmore Beach Facilities

On Friday next, September 13th, the Minister for the Environment, Brendan Howlin will perform the official opening of the newly developed beach facilities at Ardmore.

Designed by Dungarvan-based architect Damien Dillon, this unique 'round tower' building was commissioned by Waterford County Council in association with the Ardmore Enterprise Cooperative. Situated at Ardmore Beach, the building is striking in appearance due to its unusual circular shape and accommodates toilets, information office, treatment room and a lifeguard lookout for the beach.

"BUILDINGS SHOULD BE FUN"

When first approached by the Council to design a building, Mr. Dillon's first image was that of what we all know and recognise as the 'norm' in public conveniences.

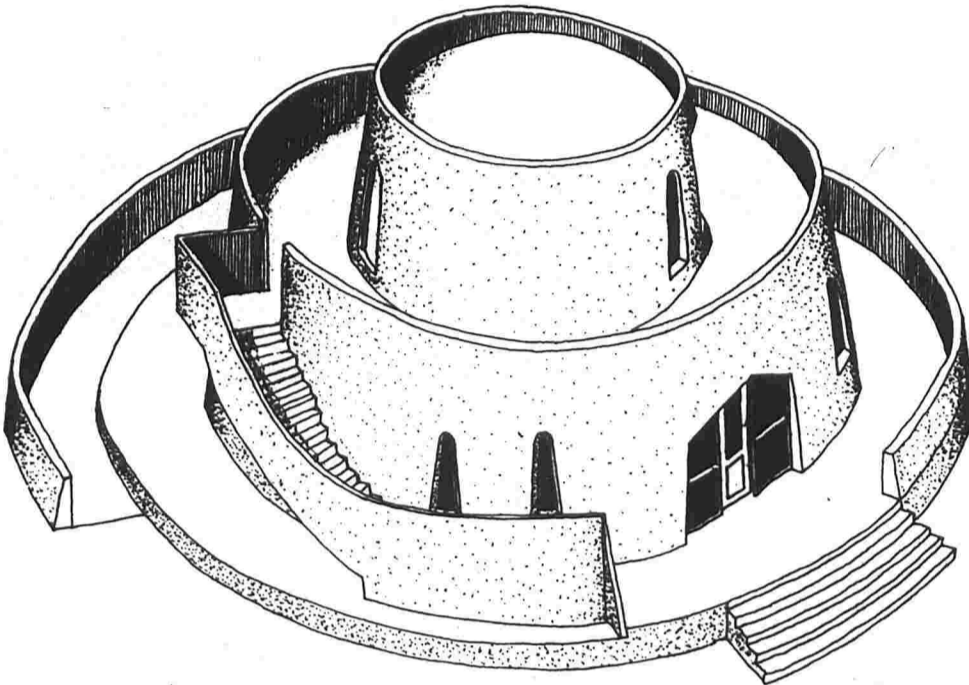
"I determined that this project would definitely not fit aesthetically into that category", said Mr. Dillon adding that due to its location, the fine and well preserved Round Tower, synonymous with the seaside village, came to mind.

"The other image conjured up was 'lighthouse', because of the proximity and association that Ardmore has with the sea", he added.

During the design and sketch stage process however, the various interested parties such as Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly and the Ardmore Enterprise Co-op had difficulty visualising the project, so it was decided to call on the services of Paddy Keneally, a local and well known maker of model ships, to make a model of the building, which greatly helped in the explanation of the concept.

Apart from references to the round tower and the lighthouse, there is also a comparison to be drawn with sandcastles as the exterior of the building is executed in white sand and cement.

In the words of the Dungarvan architect, "buildings should be fun", and this is what Mr. Dillon hopes to have achieved in the unique design of the Ardmore facility.



SUITABLE LOCATION?

"The notion of accommodating public toilets, tourist office, etc. together in one building may seem unusual", said Mr. Dillon, "but there is logic in that the tourist office is manned on a regular basis and it is hoped that this will act as a deterrent to vandals".

He went on to say that there is no doubt about the suitability of the location. The toilets will accommodate bathers wishing to use toilet facilities on the one

hand, and the lifeguards lookout will provide for the supervision of bathers on the other hand.

The siting of the tourist office has been questioned locally, but in Mr. Dillon's opinion, the customer seeking tourism information is drawn through the village to get information and, in doing so, gets to immediately understand the uncomplicated nature of the village and the general services on offer.

"Ardmore features regularly and consistently in the

National Tidy Town competitions and this fact will be manifest to tourists seeking knowledge in the tourist office", Mr. Dillon stressed. "I can say this as this was not my idea, but it is the cleverness of the local hardworking Enterprise Cooperative".

Waterford Foods Announce Increased Turnover Of £540.4m

Dungarvan-based dairy giant Waterford Foods plc. announced the group's financial results for the first half of 1996 earlier this week.

One of the leading dairy businesses in Ireland and the UK, with a significant presence in America, the group continued to perform well throughout the first six months of this year.

Operating profit showed an increase of 26.5% to almost £23 million on an increased turnover of £540.4 million. These increased figures arose principally from last year's acquisition of The Cheese Company in Great Britain.

In spite of continued improvements however, the performance of Waterford Foods which has sales in excess of £1 billion annually, was impacted by weak international markets for dairy products, BSE in the UK and high milk prices relative to market returns. The impact of the BSE crisis had an adverse effect on UK produced commodity products due to

reduced export demand. Profit before taxation in the first half fell by 4.2% to £10.6 million while impacting on these figures was a sharp increase in interest charges which rose from £5.5m to £9.8m during the period.

According to Chairman John Dowley, Waterford Foods has made substantial progress in the integration of The Cheese Company and reorganising group structures around core businesses. The Group's restructuring programme, he revealed, is now nearing completion and the full benefits will be evident in 1997.

"In line with the dairy sector generally, the group at present is confronting the challenge of weak dairy markets and a competitive milk market", said Mr. Dowley. "These market conditions are likely to exist for the remainder of 1996".

Next year however, Waterford will lower milk prices to farmers and that change will help improve margins and profits in 1997.

More Sellers And Less Buyers At Tallow Horse Fair

Tallow's 1996 festival fun ended recently in the culmination of the tradition-steeped Tallow Horse Fair. The attendance was one of the biggest ever witnessed at the annual fair as thousands packed the sun-drenched streets of Tallow for an entertaining day out.

First held in 1904, this West Waterford horse fair is one of the longest running in the country.

There was no shortage of sellers at the fair but the same could not be said of hard currency as buyers, particularly those from Northern Ireland and cross channel, were conspicuous by their absence. The thousands who thronged the fair were mainly spectators rather than serious buyers from the sellers point of view.

Some horse traders blamed

the slow business on the weakness of Sterling or the impact of major sales in Goresbridge and Fairyhouse, leaving the fairs with second best.

The cash-strapping effects of the BSE/Mad Cow Disease crisis on farmers however, was quoted as the main culprit for this year's slump in trade.

Of the business conducted there were strong markets for cobs and ponies with some cobs selling freely for between £1,500 and £2,000.

INCREASE IN STALL NUMBERS

Apart from the 'horse business', the number of stalls this year was greater than ever lending a true festival atmosphere to proceedings. Indeed business was so good for some lucky stall holders that they didn't shut up shop until 8 and 9 p.m.

Local businesses also enjoyed the benefits of a packed town, particularly the pubs who attracted plenty of visitors during the hot, thirsty weather.

The majority of local people found the festival to be very well policed this year under the supervision of Inspector Michael Blake and Tallow-based Sergeant Peter Lynch.

AWARD RESULTS

Meanwhile in the competitive part of the fair, the two major awards of the day took place with a superb 3 year old filly, owned by Finbarr Leahy of Ballytrasna, Fermoy, judged the best led horse.

The trophy for best ridden horse, also sponsored by Guinness, was won by Kevin Allen of Tircullen, Tallow. His four year old gelding by Sanctorum out of Bernie's Gift was ridden by Liz Fuller of Tallow.

The Waterford Crystal trophies were presented by Declan Power of Guinness Group Sales.

The Gain Lunging Cham-

pionship, sponsored by Waterford Foods plc and held for the first time two years ago, was the big success of the day.

Held beside the Bride View Bar, entries were significantly up on last year and came from as far afield as County Galway, while the standard was outstanding, according to Lunging Committee Chairman, Moss Geary.

Speaking to the 'Dungarvan Leader' Mr. Geary said the competition even attracted past competitors from Millstreet and Goresbridge.

The championship itself was established with the main aim of raising the standard of horses participating in Tallow Horse Fair - an objective which was successfully reached this year.

"Competition too was tremendously keen and this championship has come to stay as far as the horse fair is concerned," added Mr. Geary.

He paid tribute to the judges, Maurice Coleman and Anne Weston of the Lismore Equestrian Centre.

The championship was won by Sue Thompson of Cappagh, Co. Waterford. Second and third places went to Willie McDonnell of Pallas, Carrigtoher, Nenagh, with fourth place going to Tommy and John Dunford of Ballinakill, Ballinamult.

Call To Re-Roof The Rock Of Cashel

South Tipperary / North West Waterford Dail Deputy Theresa Ahearn (F.G.) has written to An Taoiseach John Bruton recommending that the new millennium be celebrated by re-roofing the Rock of Cashel. She said the most significant way to celebrate the year 2000 would be to re-roof Ireland's most historic monument. Historic events such as the beginning of a new century should be marked by a major contribution to preserve our rich and cultural heritage. The Rock of Cashel is the ancient seat of the Kings of Munster and the best known of all our ancient monuments. It must be the ideal site on which to mark the beginning of the 21st century.

The centenary of Catholic Emancipation in 1829 was celebrated at the Rock of Cashel, when a

Mass was sung in the Cathedral, at which some 300,000 people attended. The greatness of the Rock according to Deputy Ahearn, is its endurance through the centuries and it must claim supremacy in its capacity to celebrate great events.

It will be a waste of money to celebrate the millennium by frivolous events. A roof on the Rock of Cashel would be a significant and lasting landmark for future generations as they progress through the 21st century.

The Cathedral at the Rock, which is dedicated to Saint Patrick, had its roof pulled off during the mid 18th century by the Protestant Archbishop Price, who ruined it to rebuild the old Catholic parish church of Saint John the Baptist for himself. The Cathedral was taken over by the Commissioners of Public Works in 1874.

Embittered Fianna Fail Row Spills Over Into Public Meeting

— INFURIATED COUNCILLOR SEEKS CLARIFICATION

Naked divisions within the troubled Fianna Fail party ranks in the Waterford constituency were made unrestrainedly public this week when an ongoing internal squabble spilled over at a public forum.

Last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council was certainly an emotive, if somewhat unsettled, affair as the Fianna Fail members of the Council split into two opposing factions over the issue of who holds the position of party whip.

The subject was raised by Cllr. Ciaran O Riain who angrily declared that he had taken grave exception to the fact of not being informed of a party whips meeting earlier that day in the County Manager's office.

He firmly insisted that he is the democratically elected party whip of the F.F. councillors group, to which position he was elected at a specially convened meeting in July. Subsequent to this meeting, Cllr. O Riain said he had notified the County Secretary of the change and he now demanded clarification as to why he had not been informed of the earlier whips meeting.

Standing his ground however, Cllr. Paddy Kenneally maintained that he is still

the party whip and that the vote which took place in July is null and void.

HOW IT ALL BEGAN

The controversy all began at the Council's annual general meeting back in June when two rebel F.F. members - Cllrs. Paddy Kenneally (party whip) and Jimmy Quirke (chairman of Cllrs. group) refused to comply with the majority decision of the party's ten Councillors on the vote for the chair and the vice-chair.

Following their refusal to abide by the party pact, the two rebel members were ousted from their positions at a meeting in July at which Cllr. O Riain was elected party whip and Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson elected chairman of the councillors group. They received the full support of councillors Jackie Fahey and Pat Leahy.

Since this meeting the internal wrangling has intensified, exploding into the embittered and electorally damaging squabble witnessed last Monday.

PATH OF GLORY LEADS TO GRAVE!

Heated exchanges and furious outpourings, although not on the meeting's agenda, soon became plentiful despite brave attempts by Council Chairman Cllr. Gary O'Halloran to cry halt to the débâcle.

Cllr. Jimmy Quirke vowed that both himself and Cllr. Kenneally would continue to carry on their positions within the party and that Cllr. O Riain's position would not be clarified as "Kenneally is the whip".

"You can shout until the cows come home, but I am the party whip", slammed a feisty Cllr. O Riain who then demanded clarification from Council officials whether the County Secretary had received notification from the F.F. party headquarters outlining the current position.

County Manager Donal Connolly disclosed that in the absence of any formal clarification from the party's national executive as to who is now the FF party whip, the Council is going on the assumption that Cllr. Kenneally retains the position. He added that he had no

wish to become involved with any political disputes and said he would discuss the matter further with the Fianna Fail party as a group. **HOLDING UP MEETING**

Now standing on his feet, Chairman Cllr. O'Halloran brought order to the meeting, stressing that the Council operates under standing orders and the subject would not be raised at a public meeting.

His sentiments were echoed by the majority of Council members who had viewed the entire affair with wry amusement.

Indeed Fine Gael Councillor Geoff Power's observation that the issue was a F.F. problem and not business for the meeting's agenda was met with sustained applause.

Not to be outdone, Cllr. O Riain ended the dispute with an obscure Cantona-like comment, "I've one final thing to say - the paths of glory lead but to the grave".

There is clearly a long way to go before the gaping differences within the party are resolved and in the run-up to the next general election, Fianna Fail in Waterford cannot afford to get caught up in an internal row that will have a potentially disastrous effect.

Two and a half decades of outstanding service to Waterford County Council culminated in a moving send-off to County Secretary Brian McNally at a presentation in Lawlor's Hotel last Monday to mark his retirement.

A native of Letterkenny, Co. Donegal, Mr. McNally assumed the post on 16th September 1973 and has excelled in his role ever since.

Mr. McNally, together with his wife Anne, reside in Pinewood Lawn, Abbey-side. They have three children.

Known widely as 'Mac', Mr. McNally began his career in local government administration in 1950 with Donegal County Council and he subsequently saw service with Dublin County Council.

His already vast knowledge of local government affairs saw him progress quickly up the ladder to be appointed Town Clerk in Navan before joining Waterford County Council.

A JOB WELL DONE

Following his last appearance at a monthly Co. Council meeting on Monday, Mr. McNally was accorded glowing tributes and praise by his many colleagues and friends.

Council Chairman Cllr.

Gary O'Halloran said it was a sorry day for the local authority and described the retiring official as a great servant to both the Council and to County Waterford.

"On a personal level, he was a great advisor and a good friend", he added.

The high regard in which Brian McNally is held in local government circles was clearly evident at the function as each speaker paid his/her own heartfelt tribute to mark Mr. McNally's retirement.

Declaring to have nothing but credit and praise for Mr. McNally, Cllr. Ciaran O Rian said he will be severely missed from the Council. "He was an outstanding public official", he enthused.

Re-echoing the sentiments of his colleagues, Cllr. Pat Coffey said Mr. McNally was effective, courteous and always available for members.

Summing up the feelings of his fellow members, Cllr. Tony Wright wished Mr. McNally and his wife every health and happiness in their retirement.

Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly said Mr.

McNally had served the Council with integrity and honesty to the best of his ability. The Council and the County owe him a great debt, he added.

Strike Up The Fruit Band

It is an ideal time to get greasebands on fruit trees. Too many folk leave it until later in the autumn and then discover it's too late.

There's a number of moths that pupate in the summer and return to the trees about now to lay their eggs. The resulting caterpillars can damage new-formed fruits or munch away at the leaves in the spring.

And because some of these moths have no wings, to get into the trees they have to crawl up the trunk. That's where the greaseband stops them in their tracks. In fact, the bands stop a whole lot of pests from getting up the trees.

You can get greasebands ready to use — specially prepared paper smeared with grease. Or you can make your own from a roll of paper and a tin of proprietary grease for the purpose.

With ordinary trees having a long trunk, simply tie on the bands about 1 ft. below the lowest branch. With trees whose branches radiate from the ground, put a band on each branch.

If trees are supported by a stake, then you must remember to greaseband the stake too.

Tie the band tightly at the top and bottom to prevent the moths crawling under it and smear the grease around the centre part with a stick or small piece of wood.

Keep a watch on the bands to make sure that no fallen leaves have become stuck on the grease, making little "bridges." Pull them off.

Talking of fruit trees reminds me that you'll probably be wanting to plant new ones next month or November. But now's the time to prepare the site for them.

Give them a good start by preparing the ground thoroughly.

Dig about two feet deep and into each square yard of bottom-spit work three forkfuls of rotted manure. Add 2 oz. of bone-meal to each square yard of top-spit soil.

Make sure you break down the lumps finely, treading firm and then raking because it encourages easy rotting conditions.

All newly planted trees should be mulched, suitable material being rotted manure or compost, spent hops or rotted straw. Have it ready for when you do the actual planting in a few weeks time.

You've probably been gathering and storing apples and pears just recently. When it comes to storage, fruit will keep best in a shed, room or building which is frostproof, dark or semi-dark and not too dry.

For small quantities of fruit, you can buy or make a few of the special fruit-storing trays or cabinets which can stand in a corner of a garage, cellar or loft. Trays that stack one on top of the other can be used, or cabinets with trays fitting in tiers of drawers.

AUTUMN MANAGEMENT OF SUCKLER HERDS

There are a number of autumn management practices that are central to good herd performance at this period of the year. These practices should ensure that—

- The suckled weanling continues to grow and put on weight at acceptable levels.
- The weanling is properly managed so that the stress of weaning and sale (for those that are sold after weaning) is minimised.
- That cow condition is monitored so that weaning takes place at the appropriate time.

DO!

- Feed meals for 6 weeks before weaning.
- Have weanlings eating about 1.5 kg. meals at weaning.
- Allow weanlings to graze ahead of cows.
- Vaccinate against main respiratory viruses.
- Wean outside.
- Wean at least one week before sale.
- Wean progeny of heifers and thin cows first.

DO NOT!

- Wean on morning of sale.
- Allow cows to lose too much condition before weaning.
- Wean in harsh weather.
- Wean-all animals, young and old, at the same time.
- Castrate and dehorn within a month before and after weaning

AFTER WEANING

- Continue to feed meals.
 - Provide best grass available to weaned stock.
 - Leave weaned calves outside for as long as possible.
 - If grass is scarce, supplement with silage or hay.
- #### SELLING WEANLINGS
- Ensure that all stock are:
- Eating about 1.5 kg. of meal per head daily before sale.
 - Vaccinated against main respiratory viruses. Discuss with your vet and have a vaccination certificate available for buyer.
 - Wean for at least one week before sale.
 - Ensure each animal has the proper BTE Card.

DAIRYING

SOMATIC CELL COUNT (SCC)

The Cell Count (SCC) Regulations come into operation from October 1.

- ★ Over 500,000 milk gls. of milk will not be accepted or if so at a reduced rate.
- ★ If you have a problem you must individually test each cow in the herd.
- ★ Dry off and cull high cell count cows.
- ★ The California Mastitis Test Kit (£30) helps to identify which teat of a high yielding cow is causing the problem so that it can be milked into quarter milker.
- ★ Milking routine and the milking machine have a bearing on high cell counts. Contact your Teagasc Adviser.

FARM ACCIDENTS

Avoiding accidents due to trips, falls, blows and lighting—

Surfaces — Surfaces of yards, floors and steps should be level and should not become slippery during use. Make sure that there are no unnecessary ledges, uneven surfaces or holes which could cause a trip. Cover all man holes properly.

Farmyard Lighting — This is an important aspect of providing safe access as a substantial amount of farm work takes place after darkness. ESB staff will advise you on efficient and cost effective lighting for your farm yard.

Slurry — Special suction points should be provided for the removal of slurry from tanks, e.g. manhole in slats. These eliminate the need for lifting slats and reduce the risk of anyone, particularly children, falling into the slurry tanks during emptying.

Waterford IFA County Executive Meeting

At a well attended September meeting of Waterford IFA County Executive, Chairman James Coughlan voiced the concerns of farmers in Co. Waterford on the issues of the on-going cattle crisis and the lack of concern and action by the Minister for Agriculture, Ivan Yates.

Commenting on the last week's Dail protest, he promised that it marked the start of an angry autumn campaign. "Farmers incomes are going to be totally decimated this year and our Minister has sat back and watched the cattle prices fall each week and he has done

nothing." Mr. Coughlan accused the Government of burying their heads in the sand and being out of touch with rural Ireland.

The meeting also heard the Munster Vice-President John Dillon outline the intensive livestock farmers' protest for Killarney on Sunday 22 and Monday 23 September. Mr. Dillon said that the IFA protest will involve a continuous protest campaign for the full duration of the 2 day Farm Ministers stay in Kerry, which he said will be exclusively devoted to discussing the crisis in the beef and livestock sector. The County Chairman along with

the Munster Vice Chairman called for a strong show of strength from all farmers in Co. Waterford. "The Farm Ministers of Europe must be left in no doubt as to the severity and dire impact the BSE crisis is having on farm incomes in Ireland." IFA is determined "to drive home the message to the Farm Ministers that real action must be taken at a European level to tackle the beef crisis." Mr. Coughlan stated: "Large scale cuts in beef production and reducing cereal supports are not an option."

The Livestock Committee Chairman, Moss O'Dono-

van reported to the meeting of the forthcoming livestock meeting in the county to be held on Thursday 12 September in Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan at 8.30 p.m. He announced that the guest speaker would be Raymond O'Malley, Chairman IFA National Livestock Committee and that all are welcome to attend.

A number of other commodity committee chairmen gave their reports and this concluded the business of the meeting.

The next meeting of the County Waterford IFA Executive will be held on Tuesday, 1st October.

IMPORTANT NOTICE FOR SHEEP FARMERS 1997 EWE PREMIUM SCHEME National Reserve etc.

National Reserve

Applications for Quota Rights from the 1997 National Reserve are now invited from producers in the following categories:

Category 1

Farmers under 35 years of age at 1 January 1997 who will apply for the Ewe Premium Scheme for the first time in 1997 and satisfy the following conditions:

- (i) total income, including that of his/her spouse/partner must not exceed £16,472 per annum;
- (ii) where there is off-farm income it should not exceed £11,000 per annum;
- (iii) if already in farming existing livestock units must not exceed 35 - livestock units will be based on 1996 applications for beef/suckler cow and milk quota. (In the case of dairy quota 897 gallons will be equivalent to 1 livestock unit);
- (iv) they must
 - (a) have obtained the Teagasc Certificate in Farming or a higher qualification
 - or
 - (b) have at least 3 years practical experience in farming and have satisfactorily completed a course in farming of a minimum duration of 150 hours.

However, for applicants who will be 28 years of age or over on 1 January 1997, 5 years experience in farming may replace the requirements at (a) and (b) above.

Category 2

Farmers who have applied regularly for the Ewe Premium Scheme and first time applicants in 1996 who can demonstrate that the viability of their enterprise will be jeopardised by the operation of the quota system and who satisfy the following conditions:

- (i) total income, including that of spouse/partner must not exceed £16,472 per annum;
- (ii) where there is off-farm income it must not exceed £11,000 per annum;
- (iii) if already in farming existing livestock units must not exceed 35 - livestock units will be based on 1996 applications for beef/suckler and ewe premium schemes and milk quota. (In the case of a dairy quota, 897 gallons will be equivalent to 1 livestock unit).

Category 3

Farmers who do not qualify under the age criteria, but satisfy the other conditions attached to Category 1.

Application forms for Reserve Quota are available from Quota Section, Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Michael Davitt House, Castlebar, Co. Mayo or from any Local Office of the Department. The closing date for receipt of completed application forms is **4 October 1996**.

Application period for 1997 Ewe Premium

The application period will run from 12 December 1996 to 13 January 1997. Composite application forms covering Ewe Premium and Sheep Headage will issue to producers who participated in the Schemes in 1996.

Transfer and Lease of Quota for 1997 marketing year

Producers are reminded that the deadline for notification of leases and transfers of quota rights will be the date on which the transferee/lessee lodges his/her 1997 Ewe Premium application. Farmers must have their transfer and leasing arrangements completed and notified to the Department by 13 January 1997 at the latest.

ICMSA Presents Plan To Taoiseach To Aid Farmers Hit By BSE

At a recent meeting of the farm organisations with the Taoiseach, the Tanaiste and the Minister for Agriculture, President of the ICMSA Frank Allen, proposed the immediate introduction of a Deficiency Payments System which would fund at least 90% of the difference between market prices received for cattle and an agreed target price for the various categories of cattle.

Mr. Allen made his proposal as part of a comprehensive programme which, he said, should be agreed between Government, the EU, the meat factories and farmers.

He said: "The recovery in the cattle and beef industry can only be achieved through a comprehensive programme involving all the different interests in the sector.

"Each must contribute resources to the programme. The immediate requirement is a basic floor price for sucklers, store cattle and culled cows which must be sold. The prices for beef cattle should reflect the prices paid for stores.

"To achieve these objectives the introduction of a Deficiency Payments System is a vital necessity. This system is the best and most efficient way of getting badly needed financial as-

sistance to farmers to save them and the beef industry from ruination.

"In addition, a programme to restore consumer confidence must be embarked on throughout Europe. This should be funded by the EU, national government and farmers with the objective of increasing beef consumption, through guaranteeing the consumers of the absolute safety of the product offered."

Mr. Allen concluded: "Pending the return of full consumer confidence, the EU and farmers must accept the necessity for some reduction in beef output. This can be achieved through the gradual reduction of slaughter weights — which in itself would enhance quality — and a reduction in the breeding herd."

Muintir Na Tire Advocates Community Alert

At a recent press conference in Tipperary, Muintir na Tire introduced newly appointed Community Alert Development Officers who will join the existing Development team to extend Community Alert into every parish in the country.

Pat Doyle will continue to work as Community Alert

Development Officer in the South-Eastern Region covering counties Wexford, Wicklow, Kilkenny, Waterford and Tipperary.

At the press conference, National President, Jim Quigley spoke of his desire to see an increase in the number of Community Alert Programmes nationally. He wished to re-

mind existing groups to hold Annual General Meetings in order that the campaign be revitalised nationwide.

As he wished the Department Officers a successful year, Mr. Quigley reminded everyone that "the only person who doesn't benefit from an 'alert community' is the criminal."

ICMSA County Chairman, John Skehan, has advised farm families to include both husband and wife as self employed persons when making a return of income so as to make full use of PRSI allowances and benefits.

The County Chairman said that the 1996 Budget changes which had increased the PRSI allowances and the income levies exemption threshold means that most farm families can reduce their PRSI

liabilities by splitting income between husband and wife. The ICMSA Chairman said that the advantages of splitting income between husband and wife are:

1 — The family gains an additional £1,040 PRSI free allowance.

2 — The family gains an additional £9,750 levies free allowance.

3 — The wife (in most cases) will build or increase her entitlement to a contributory old age pension in her own right. This would mean

an additional £21.10 per week pension for the family.

Given the normal family farm income, by splitting the income in the majority of cases neither husband or wife will have income in excess of £9,750 and therefore, will not be liable for the levies — health contributions and employment levies, and thereby save 2.25 per cent of their income.

The County Chairman advised individual farm families to discuss this issue with their accountant so that they

can make the best arrangement to suit their own circumstances but he felt that most farm families could potentially gain by reducing their liability and/or increasing their potential entitlement to contributory old age pension.

I.C.M.S.A. WELCOMES NEW RULES ON EWE QUOTA

The new rules for the ewe quota reserves announced by the Minister for Agriculture recently were welcomed by the Chairman of the ICMSA Sheep Committee, Eamonn O'Rourke from Foulksmills, County Wexford.

Mr. O'Rourke said that he was very pleased that the Minister had taken on board the changes proposed by ICMSA at the last meeting of the Ewe Quota Review Group. The changes to the income and maximum livestock units criteria should enable more farmers to qualify for extra ewe quota this year.

"The amount of quota available this year is substantially up on last year and this provides an opportunity for farmers who meet the conditions to build up their sheep enterprise," stated Mr. O'Rourke.

Mr. O'Rourke advised all farmers seeking additional ewe quotas to apply to the National Reserve as soon as possible.

Application forms will be available from Davitt House, Castlebar or local offices of the Department in the very near future.

IFA On Collision Course With Minister Yates Over Cattle Movement Bureaucracy

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan has described the Minister for Agriculture's proposed new cattle movement system as Dickensian.

"Minister Yates is attempting to saddle up an already crippled beef industry with a totally inefficient system that will deliver nothing but another waste paper mountain for the Department of Agriculture."

The Waterford Livestock Committee Chairman demanded that the Minister immediately abandon those outdated proposals and go for a state-of-the-art on-line computer system. "Nothing

less than full computerisation which can guarantee absolute traceability from field to factory through to the supermarket shelf is acceptable in the 1990s."

Mr. Donovan said that the pen and paper archaic system proposed by the Minister will totally clog up an already crippled livestock trade.

He said "Farmers are fully committed to the introduction of a total Quality Assurance Scheme that can guarantee absolute traceability for consumers."

Mr. Donovan said for the Minister to attempt to introduce a second hand scheme of traceability "on the cheap" is incredible in the present

circumstances in the beef industry. "IFA will not allow the Minister and the Department to grind the livestock trade into the ground under the weight of bureaucracy. We are insisting that the necessary investment is made in the most up-to-date technology which will have the full confidence of farmers and consumers."

Mr. Donovan said "it is time the Department moved out of the dark ages of manuscript paper mountains, carbon copies and rubber stamps and embraced the new technology of microchips, swipe cards and bar codes."

AUTUMN SALES OF CATTLE 1996 PLASTIC TAGGING SYSTEM AND CARD ('FARMER TAG' SYSTEM)

1. Herdowners who are planning to present cattle for sale and who may have a cattle tagging problem should contact their District Veterinary Office for advice.
2. Herdowners are reminded that any alteration/correction made on a cattle identity card renders the card invalid for animal movement or sale at marts or for export or slaughter. Herdowners who may have such cards should immediately contact the District Veterinary Office to obtain and complete an application form for the replacement card(s) necessary for movement or sale of stock.
3. Herdowners who may have sold-on plastic-tagged calves born in the herd are nonetheless legally obliged to register these calves (each herd of origin is known to the Department of Agriculture's computer system) using the Freepost white card supplied with the tags. Where the white card has been mislaid, it is necessary to immediately complete an appropriate form available from District Veterinary Offices. This is essential for Headage and Premia payment purposes.

MOVEMENT PERMITS FOR FEMALE CATTLE

From Monday 16 September 1996, all female stock (including calves) being moved for slaughter or export must be accompanied by a valid movement permit. Permit application forms are available from the Department's Local Offices and also Marts and Teagasc Offices. Completed application forms (to be accompanied by the valid cattle identity cards in respect of the animals listed) can be processed at any District Veterinary Office (by post or by attendance in person). A movement permit will have an operational validity period of 1 month. Both the permit document and the valid cattle identity cards must be presented at slaughter or export premises to ensure acceptance of stock.

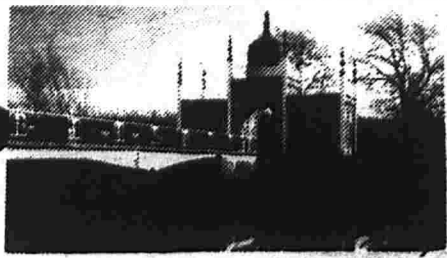

Thoughts On The Final

The occasion had all the trappings of hurling's great annual hosting at Croke Park - the ribbons, the flags, the scarves, the hats, the banners, the noisy horns, the rumbling bodhrans; the expectations and dreams and hopes. Traversing a slow route from O'Connell Street to Croke Park was to experience more of the panoply and colour of this day of destiny. With seething crowds congregated in O'Connell Street and outside Barry's Hotel in a chaotic mass making vehicular traffic a nightmare it was wisest to pick and push one's way on foot past the hundreds of good-humoured supporters including the vendors of match paraphernalia and ticket touts because the congested streets defied any effort of car or bus to complete the journey by match time. A carnival atmosphere prevailed among the huge gathering at the gates of Clonliffe College, a well-established rendezvous for those with or in search of precious tickets. I saw one Wexfordman fulfilling part of his dreams when a life-saver from Antrim arrived just in time with two tickets which erased his worried frowns and gave a lift to the purple and gold heart.

It was my first experience of sitting in the new Cusack Stand, a magnificent structure which towered, it seemed, right over the pitch and afforded a perfect view of every part of the grounds. Unlike its predecessor, the old Cusack, when your ticket might place you behind a supporting column and obscure your view. The splendid new stand makes it easy to follow every puck of the hurling panorama. Whatever its critics may say - and one hurling correspondent of a Sunday newspaper always refers to Croke Park as Corporate Park - this breath-taking piece of modern engineering and construction is a monument to the foresight, initiative, courage and confidence of our association. Some stone age thinkers would have us believe that without this new stand, we would somehow have more tickets available. Watching a game in comfort from the Cusack Stand is in sharp contrast to standing on the terraces under the elements and straining to maintain a reasonable view of this action. If we had two more or even three more new stands, there would still

be a shortage of tickets.

All-Ireland day and the proper presentation of the finals entails meticulous preparation and the co-ordination of many peoples work well in advance. Gone are the days of making it up as you go along, of the haphazard approach. Every detail is planned nowadays and a tight schedule adhered to with precision dominating the day's events. The Artane Boys Band always associated in the public mind with All-Ireland day, singers, musicians and dancers, the underage hurlers and camogie players, the Minor and Senior hurling finalists all combine with the electric atmosphere generated by over 65,000 expectant and excited people to offer us a spectacle of brilliant colour and throbbing excitement which is unmatched by any other sporting occasion in the land. Where else could you imagine a concourse of intense and passionate rival supporters intermingling without incident? It must be a wondrous experience for any non-native to be part of such an exuberant spectacular day of pageantry and skill.

The whole amphitheater erupted as the Senior finalists dashed out on to the field from beneath the stands. The thunderous roar which greeted Wexford and Limerick must have shocked them into a realisation that now their fate was entirely in their own hands and those of the referee. They welcomed the opportunity to hurl the ball to one another in twos or threes which always helps to calm those jangling nerves. For the next hour and a half, all eyes would be focused on them, their counties hopes resting on them.

I thought at that stage that Wexford were far better organised than Limerick. They were calmer in their disciplined compliance with the rituals of the day. They calmly accepted the demands of protocol. They were more focused and passionate in their style of play and in their mental attitude to the rigours of the game. They had an utter self belief even when matters were going Limerick's way early on with the Shannonsiders leading 0-5 to 0-1. Both teams had made a thorough preparation for this great test of their character but Wexford seemed to have anticipated those setbacks which a game sometimes provides such as

the loss of a player or having an extra man. In a word, they were splendidly prepared mentally and physically by their management but specifically by their outstanding manager, Liam Griffin who must even at this stage of the year be deemed manager and sports personality of the year. The man would inspire anyone and I find it easy to relate to his hurling philosophy.

It was a pity that Limerick dropped out of the parade. A pity because it spoiled that emotional part of the ceremony when spectators can salute their heroes. A pity too because it left the Limerick players to fret and fidget to become anxious and tense as they awaited the end of the parade. Such a hiatus in the schedule tends to fray nerves even further. I don't honestly think that Limerick's action was in any sense a deliberate effort to insult or belittle. It was perhaps impulsive of the captain who was immediately followed by his team-mates. It was most ill-advised because while a player is marching in the parade, his mind is fully occupied, the rhythm of the music and the striding out dispels some of the nervousness and there is a reassuring solidarity which, keeping in step with his team mates promotes. Limerick players meanwhile were left alone with their thoughts, as they waited and waited for what seemed like ages.

How soon I wonder before the throw-in to start the game is dispensed with. We have seen it many times as a means of intimidating the opponent before, during and sometimes after the ball is thrown in. It's dangerous and in some cases a means by which a player can, in effect, be put out of the game. I can't say if the midfielders were intent on carrying out a little softening up. I just don't know. What I do know is that Sean O'Neill and George O'Connor hadn't their hurleys on the ground as the ball went in. One had his stick raised which gave him a huge advantage and when he inevitably pulled his opponent took the full brunt of his quicker, stronger stroke. Sean O'Neill was the sufferer. We shouldn't blame George. He pulled as he was entitled to do. The referee was responsible because he should have instructed the two to keep their hurleys on the ground while he threw in

the ball. He was at fault for the incident which led to the dismissal of Eamonn Scallion. Both Scallion and McDonagh, hurleys well raised, leathered one another. Wouldn't it be far better for the game if the team, winning the toss, had an option on taking the puck out to start the game? Any feature of hurling which can be exploited to cause injury should no longer be tolerated.

Oh dear, the poor referee, here we go again finding fault with him. Jim O'Sullivan of the "Cork Examiner" thought that referee Padraig Horan could be well pleased with his performance. I saw no reason why he should be far from positive. He reacted rather than take firm control. He had ignored a lot of foul pulling before matters got out of hand culminating in the Scallion sending off. As a neutral who was thrilled by the gallantry of Wexford's 14 men and the manner of their victory, I deplored what I saw as a weak referee who let things get a little out of hand, then sought to make an example of the first man who stepped out of line and afterwards because of the enormity of leaving Wexford at a numerical disadvantage set out to penalise every Limerick transgression while ignoring fouls by the winners.

In the second half an obvious chop on T. J. Ryan in front of the Cusack Stand went unpunished and on another occasion no free was awarded when a Wexford hurley was wrapped round a Limerick player's neck as he sought to evade his tackler.

Lest this criticism be interpreted as implying that the referee helped Wexford win an All-Ireland, may I hasten to say that the winners fully deserved their victory because they were a better hurling team and played with greater passion. They would have had a more handsome margin were it not for the heroics of Joe Quaid and Limerick had enough scoring chances in the second half but failed to take them. I don't know why their late goal was disallowed. It seemed quite fair. Maybe the referee knows but he sure kept his reasons to himself. Perhaps he saw a foul which nobody else saw. Or it could be that he deemed a player or players in the square. In which

case, he wouldn't be the first referee to exercise remote control from over 50 yards distance. Wexford tackling all through was great with the best example of their patience and discipline coming late in the game when a Limerick attacker got possession, charged into the square and was immediately crowded out by three Wexford backs who didn't allow him strike or pass while they coolly and calmly resisted all impulses to concede a penalty.

Could some kind reader explain to me how it happens that some referees can't count. The rule stipulates that a player in possession may not carry the ball more than four steps. Gary Laffan took eight steps to pass two backs before blasting in that thunderbolt in the first half

which required a magnificent save from Joe Quaid. Another thing, how do some referees misinterpret as a foul on him, the actions of a hurler who when he secures possession, charges straight at an opponent? Martin Storey, in the second half, with the ball in his grasp, charged straight into Foley, the Limerick wing back. He got a free and Wexford got a point. Foley was the victim and his team Limerick suffered. Rough justice.

Nevertheless it was a super day of thrills and excitement, the memory of which will outlast any little irritants and imperfections. Let us never bask in complacent smugness but always endeavour to improve the image of our association and of the great treasure of a field game, hurling.

The six minerals are sodium which is needed for the regulation of the body's water balance, potassium which works with sodium for fluid control, iron which is vital for the distribution of oxygen in the body, the remaining minerals are chromium, nickel and manganese. Royal Jelly can be bought in different shapes and sizes.

Bought fresh it is a white-yellowish liquid, it can be taken daily by spoon and has rather a peculiar taste. It may also be bought in capsule form which is probably most favourable. It is in this form when taken regularly over a period of time that Royal Jelly has been most effective. Royal Jelly is now being used for external application. It comes in creams which can be applied to the skin and is used for such skin complaints as acne and stretch marks.

HOUSEHOLD TIPS

1. Roll a knitting needle in the end of your cling-film and you won't keep loosing the edge.
2. If you have to mash boiled eggs in a hurry use a potato masher - it is a lot quicker than a fork.
3. To keep your wardrobe moth free put some dried orange peel in a cloth or plastic bag. Pierce a few holes in the bag and keep it in the wardrobe.
4. To clean a greasy frying-pan add a generous amount of neat washing up liquid and use a kitchen brush to work up an emulsion. Add hot water and wash as usual. You will be left with a grease-free pan.
5. When stuffing knitted toys, add a handful of pot pourri. This will leave the toy smelling nice.

Menus for the week

Beef and Mushroom Casserole



- 1 1/2 lb/675g round steak
- 1 1/2 oz/40g butter
- 1/2 tbsp oil
- 1 large onion
- 1 1/2 tbsp plain flour
- 1 beefstock cube (optional)
- 4 fl oz/125ml red wine
- 8 fl oz/250ml water
- 1 tbsp tomato puree
- 4-6oz/100-150g button mushrooms

To Serve: Horseradish cream

METHOD: Melt half the butter with the oil in a heavy saucepan and brown the trimmed and cubed meat in batches, transferring it to a plate when nicely coloured. Add the sliced onions and mushrooms to the pan and cook gently, stirring, for 3 or 4 minutes and add to the meat. Add the flour and the remaining butter to the pan drippings, cook for 1 to

2 minutes and gradually stir in the water and wine. Bring to boiling point, and cook until slightly thickened. Stir in the crumbled stock cube, the tomato puree, the vegetables and meat. Cover the pan and simmer for about 1 1/2 hours or until the meat is tender. Correct the seasoning and serve. If a stock cube is not being used, season the stew lightly when boiling up the liquid. Check it from time to time, and add more water if required. Those with a solid fuel cooker may prefer to cook the stew in a casserole in the simmering oven. If you don't happen to have a half cupful of red wine in the kitchen, use 1 tbsp red wine vinegar with extra water. For the horseradish cream, whisk 1 to 2 tbsp horseradish sauce into 1/2 cupful of lightly whipped cream, or into thick yogurt.

Honey Roast Duck

Serves: 4
Time to prepare: 25 mins plus 1 hour marinating
Time to cook: 30 mins

- Marinade**
- 1 tbsp (15ml) finely chopped fresh root ginger
 - 3 garlic cloves, crushed
 - 2 tbsp (30ml) yellow bean sauce
 - 2 tbsp (30ml) light soya sauce
 - 2 tbsp (30ml) dry sherry
 - 4 star anise
 - 4 boneless duck breasts
 - 2 tbsp (30ml) runny honey
 - Sweet and sour sauce
 - 3 tbsp (45ml) wine vinegar
 - 3 tbsp (45ml) sugar
 - 3 tbsp (45ml) dry sherry
 - 2 tbsp (30ml) light soy sauce
 - 2 tbsp (30ml) tomato ketchup
 - 4 fl oz (100ml) orange juice
 - 2 tsp (19ml) arrowroot mixed to a smooth paste with 1 tbsp (15ml) water
 - 1 bunch spring onions
 - 5 oz (125g) thread egg noodles

- Mix together the ginger, garlic, yellow bean sauce, soy sauce, sherry and star anise. Arrange the duck breasts in a shallow glass dish and pour over the marinade, making sure the mixture thoroughly coats the meat. Cover, chill and marinate for at least 1 hr.
- Remove duck breasts from marinade and arrange, skin side up, on a rack resting over a roasting tin. This allows any fat to drip down into the tin during cooking to guarantee crispiness. Drizzle honey over meat. Roast at 400°F, 200°C, Gas 6 for 30 mins.
- To make the sauce, simmer the vinegar and sugar together for 2 mins, then add sherry, soy sauce, tomato ketchup and orange juice. Stir and bring to the boil, then reduce to a simmer. Add arrowroot paste and stir until thickened, smooth and clear.
- Shred the spring onions into very fine strips. Plunge into cold water until required. Put the noodles into a large pan of boiling, salted water and boil for 3 mins. Drain. Cut duck breasts into thin slices and serve on a bed of noodles with spring onions and sauce.

Family Health

By Dr. DAVE BARRY

Q. A friend of mine has developed bronchiectasis of the lungs. She's been told that it's due to her rheumatoid arthritis. Could you please explain how this could cause trouble?

A. In bronchiectasis, the air passages or bronchi are damaged. They lose their normal smooth, cylindrical shape and become dilated, which turns them into catch-alls for infection.

The most common symptoms are a persistent cough and large amounts of infected, discoloured sputum. Bronchiectasis is generally caused by severe lung infections such as pneumonia, whooping cough or bronchitis. Rheumatoid arthritis is basically a disease of the immune system rather than simply a disease of the joints. The impaired immune response increases the person's susceptibility to chest infections and reduces their ability to clear infection when it occurs. The end result of this can be bronchiectasis, although this is not very common in rheumatoid sufferers.

Q. My tonsils have at regular intervals, a foul-smelling yellow pus oozing from them. This in turn causes me an

added problem of bad breath. I've seen a specialist, who has suggested removal of my tonsils as being the only solution. I'm 43, and understand at my age it's a very unpleasant operation. Is there any alternative? Please advise.

A. There's no doubt whatsoever that, for adults, tonsillectomy is more complicated than it is for children. The tonsils of an adult, tend to be more difficult to remove because they're often welded to the throat with scar tissue. Healing is also slower in adults, and the postoperative soreness is more severe and lasts longer. For these reasons, the operation is usually not recommended for adults unless there's severe recurrent infection, abscess or throat obstruction. You should again talk it over with your surgeon, as he or yourself may, or may not, regard your bad breath as justification for surgery. In the meantime, gargle at least twice daily with an antiseptic mouthwash and if you can, massage the yellow plaque from your tonsils with a toothbrush. This is not the easiest thing to do, but will be well worth it in the long run.

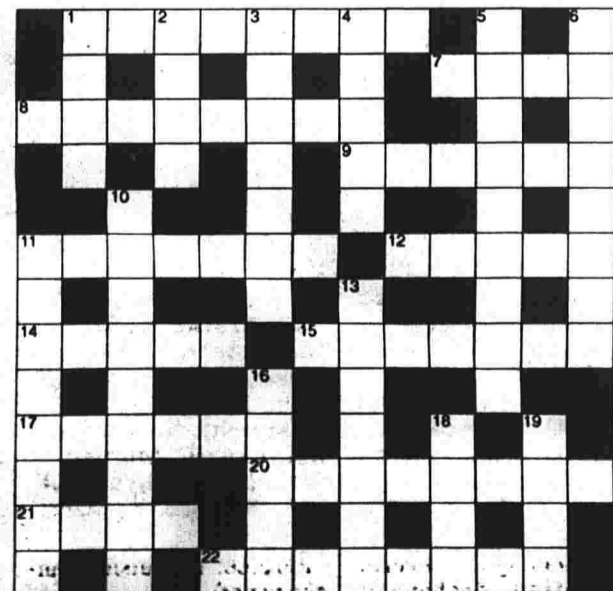

This golf classic, kindly sponsored by the Spratt family, will raise invaluable funds for the unit which will cater for patients making the traumatic transition from rehabilitation programme to adapting to life in a wheelchair in the home environment.

A VERY WORTHY CAUSE

Ward Sister and board member of the NRH is Sr. Aileen McCarthy who incidentally played golf at international level for Ireland.

Outlining the role of the NRH, Sr. Aileen explained that the Co. Dublin based hospital is recognised as the National Spinal Injury Centre, Brain Injury Centre and National Service for Limb Fitting. Victims of road

traffic accidents, rugby, diving, equestrian and all sports related accidents are patients at the hospital. A considerable number of these are confined to wheelchairs for the rest of their lives.

Following their rehabilitation programme, Sr. Aileen said that the planned pre-discharge unit would provide an environment, where the patient and family can experience living independently for a trial period. They will do so without staff supervision, in a more natural environment than the ward, and yet still be within the

safety of the Hospital Campus should any difficulty arise.

"Discharge home should therefore be less traumatic," said Sr. Aileen, "and lessen the feeling of isolation often experienced by patients. They would have already encountered many of the changes and problems that living at home requires of them with an acquired long-term disability," she added.

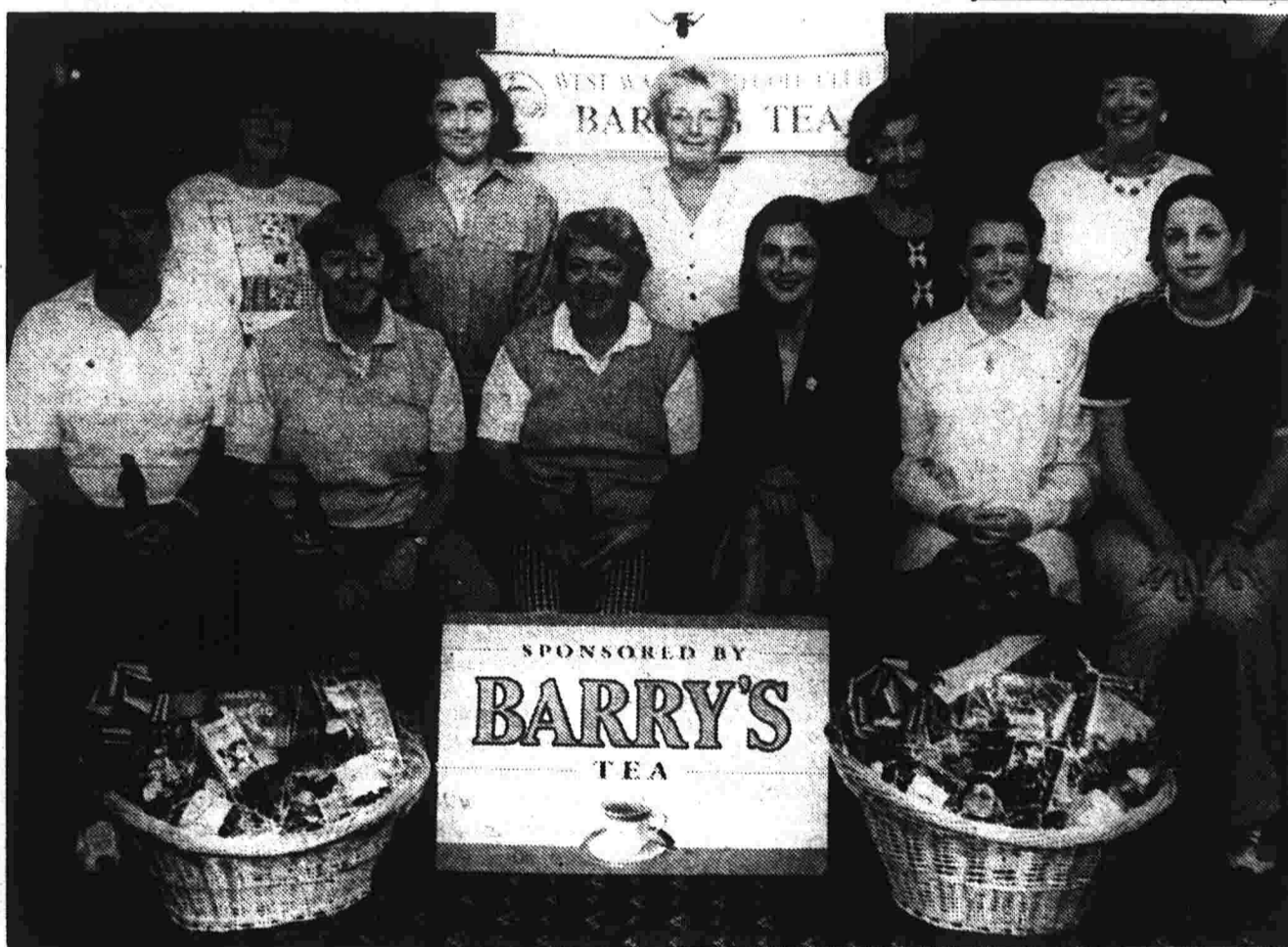

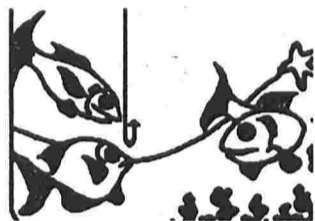

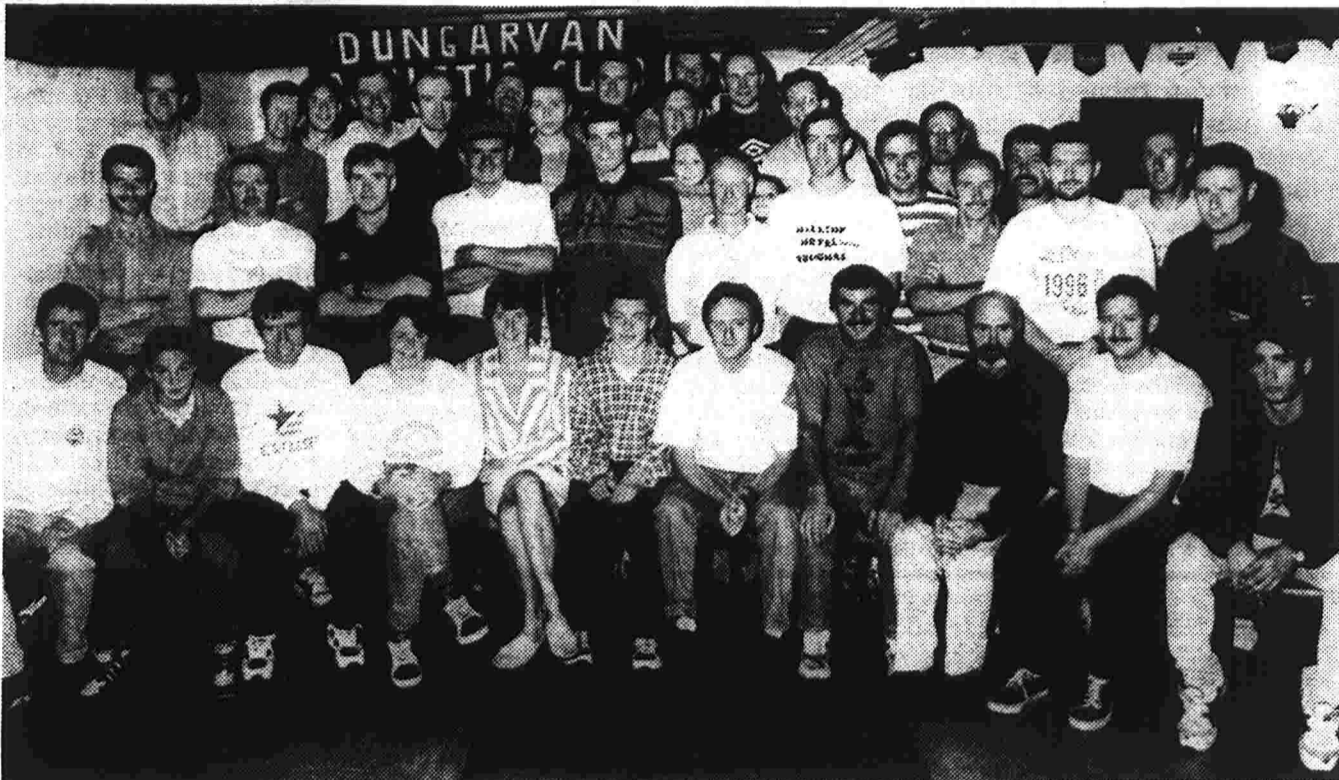

ALL-IRELAND FOOTBALL FINAL

Hundreds Of Waterford Football Supporters Will Travel To See Mayo Play Meath At Headquarters

In accordance with County Board policy, no matches will be played throughout the county on next Sunday, in order to allow players, officials and supporters free to travel up for the big match at Croke Park.

On this occasion, the big match is the meeting of Leinster champions, Meath with Mayo who will represent Connaught.

It will be another great occasion and something to be enjoyed by approximately 66,000 football fans from all over the country who have been lucky enough to have obtained a ticket.

The demand for tickets is every bit as great as it was for the hurling final, and with a number of clubs having swapped their football tickets for hurling, some of them are in a bad way to get their hands on a few.

For the hurling final, it was only the very odd tout who had stand tickets on offer and the price being asked was absolutely outrageous.

One tout close to the Belvedere Hotel in Great Denmark Street had three New Cusack Stand tickets on offer and sought a total of £600. I understand they eventually fetched almost £500.

A Limerick supporter offered £40 for a terrace ticket that was eventually sold for £80.

Some supporters, including a few from Waterford, on the chance of obtaining a ticket and having failed, were forced to watch the game on T.V.

Understandably the hurling final was the object of a lot of discussion throughout last week and different people had different stories to tell about their adventures in the capitol and about the game itself. Everyone seems to be agreed that it was a tremendous game, despite the standard not having been great.

As usual the arrangements at Croke Park were first class and the 'timing' for every aspect of the programme was spot-on and the organisers must get ten out of ten for this. The Big Screen came in for a whole lot of criticism and this is something that will have to be remedied. Apart from the awful din from the volume, the thing is more of a distraction than a benefit to patrons.

Limerick's conduct during the pre-match ceremonies has been widely criticised and people are already wondering what penalties will be imposed on the county as a result.

The official comment from the Limerick officials is one of bewilderment. Trainer/manager Tom Ryan, stated in an interview "to be honest, I could not believe what came over them, or what in the name of Heaven got into them. Whether or not it was pre-match nerves, I do not know. We did everything possible to keep the players nice and calm in the build-up. In fairness to the lads, I believe they thought the parade was going to break up around the forty as it usually does, I know it looked bad when they did not continue towards Hill 16. It certainly was unintentional. I would like to apologise for their behaviour, it was completely out of character."

During the interview, the Limerick trainer severely criticised the Association President, Jack Boothman, for his insensitive and indiscreet comments at the Limerick Banquet in the Burlington Hotel, only hours after the game.

In front of 800 Limerick supporters, Jack Boothman in his after dinner speech, said "Wexford had more passion and hunger. Too many of the Limerick players did not play up to form out there today. Where was the passion? Where was the will to take the ball off the opposing players? Go back and ask yourselves why you did not win today." Tom Ryan said that hours after losing an All Ireland final, as their players were low enough in themselves, was not the time to make personal comments about the performance of their players. It sure wasn't.
