## Waterford Partnership Criticised By VEC In Job Appointment Foul-Up

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Members of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee have expressed deep anger and regret over the failure of Waterford Development Partnership to second a teacher, designated by the committee, to the post of Education Coordinator for the county.

Interviews for the position, which has been vacant since June 1995, were held by a sub-committee of the VEC earlier this year at which Jimmy Taaffe, Manager of the Partnership was invited to attend in an advisory capacity.

Following the selection process a teacher from Dungarvan Technical College was designated for the post which was to be based in the eastern end of the county with WDP. The position would be funded by both the Department of Education and the Co. Waterford VEC.

Earlier this month however, Mr. Taaffe indicated that he already has a man in the post who is doing a good job and he subsequently declined the offer of the designated teacher from the VEC. Up to last Monday

**TUI EXPRESSES

## KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

### QUESTION

I am French, currently enjoying a lovely holiday here. I am considering coming to live here, and I have some questions. Do I have the right to do so? Do I need a resident permit? How do I get one? What if I get sick, what health services am I entitled to? What rights will I have while living in Ireland? Are EU pensioners entitled to the free schemes?

### ANSWER

The answers to all your questions, and many more are available in a booklet "Coming to Ireland". It is one of 8 booklets produced by the National Social Service Board in association with the European Commission. These booklets are available free from your nearest Citizens Information Centre, Centre for the Unemployed, the N.R.B., Youth Information Centre and some Libraries. The other leaflets in this series are:

Leaving Ireland, European Initiatives, Ireland North/South, Europe for Community, Consumer Matters, Environment, Protection for Workers.

# Aglish Scores Well In Tidy Towns Competition

The following is the adjudicators report for the village of Aglish who scored 192 points out of a total of 300 in this year's National Tidy Towns Competition, maximum marks in brackets:

**Overall Developmental Approach (50) 25** — With its extensive open areas and nearby river, Aglish is well placed to take advantage of the emphasis on wildlife and natural amenities. The natural focal point of the old and historic graveyard is also significant in this regard. The work done on repairing and cleaning the walls on the approaches, insulation of flowerbeds and especially tree planting are equally significant in this. Thank you for the comprehensive notes supplied on your entry form, together with the splendid and very clear map of the centre which was a great help on the day of adjudication.

**Wildlife And Natural Amenities (30) 17** — The open fields within the village and especially the stream opposite the Church are important amenity elements. Where possible we would encourage ground planting rather than the use of tubs on this elevated stream setting. Plant tubs, where they are thought necessary, should be fully planted to achieve best results.

The old Church and Community Hall complex at the core of the village is significant to the development of the village amenity. The area

around the Ball Alley might be judiciously enhanced, in addition to the ground between it and church grounds.

**Landscaping (40) 26** — Great success has been achieved by Aglish in the presentation of floral displays, notably on the approach roads from Vicarstown. The wall repairing and cleaning undertaken in this area is also commendable. Good floral displays have been achieved also at the V-junction close to the Agricultural Stores. The large commitment involved in the maintenance of the raised wall display opposite the Post Office and Church is applauded. The stone-faced flowerbed at the Church was splendid but again we would encourage more fulsome planting for best effect.

**The Built Environment (40) 29** — The centre features some fine random rubble dry-fill walls and these have been well presented, particularly on the stretch between the old graveyard and the new circular flowerbed and also at the Youghal/Clashmore junction. The thatch cottage near the church was a delight while the church itself was pleasantly painted. Public buildings such as the National School and the Garda Station in particular were well painted with good floral displays. The Village Inn was very well presented, as was Treacy's Bar and

Swift's Filling Station.

**Litter Control (40) 30** — Litter management was excellent throughout. There seemed to be a near complete absence of litter even in locations where, because of high usage, litter might reasonably be anticipated.

Well designed and suitably sited litter bins were noted on the Villierstown road and also in the centre of the village. Perhaps additional bins might be located close to the Ball Alley area and between the Church and Post Office.

**Tidiness (20) 15** — Again the centre scored heavily in this category because of the pleasant sense of order and neatness it projected. The East Cork Oil Depot was very well presented while the dry-fill walls, already referred to, on the Clashmore road were a delight with all grass and weed removed. Very small amounts of weed were noted at the school entrance while the steam side wall was broken or breached in places opposite the church. Many walls were very pleasantly painted.

A sizable difficulty is the disused factory beyond the school and this can best be tackled, in the short-term perhaps, by appropriate screening. The house opposite the Ball Alley/Church grounds presented some clutter at its sides.

**Residential Areas (30) 19** — The housing estate opposite the G.A.A. Hall presented many good garden displays

but a uniform presentation was not achieved in this area. Some excellent gardens and houses were noted on the Villierstown road while the houses on the Youghal road beyond the Co-Operative Store featured splendid gardens. The freshly painted houses on the Clashmore road were excellent although we would recommend more fulsome planting in the flower pots by their gates for best effect.

**Roads, Streets And Back Areas (40) 26** — All signage and the approach roads were splendid as was the village nameplate. There is a need to develop the concept of a clear-cut start or division between the surrounding rural areas and the village itself. Grass verges were nicely cut back on all the approach roads and the judiciously cut verges helped to integrate the open fields which are part of the village itself.

**General Impression (10) 5** — The centre has largely succeeded in creating and sustaining a sense of entity. This reflects well on the extent of local support that has been secured, the activities of FAS employees together with the committees from the G.A.A., Community Hall and the Schools.

There is a tangible sense of co-operation which is reflected most successfully in this very spirited presentation by a most attractive centre.

"Waterford has been neglected in terms of investment for many years due to

lack of effective political leadership. The Progressive Democrats are intent on nominating a candidate who is capable of promoting the interests of Waterford effectively at cabinet level."

Furthermore, "on a national level the recent report on social welfare spent by Minister for Social Welfare, Prionsias de Rossa, shows clearly, the current government's determination to follow policies of economic decay and destruction long since abandoned by their Eastern European champions."

"This country needs the Progressive Democrats in power to insure a viable future for its overtaxed and under employed youth," concluded Mr. Quinn.

# Ardmore Beach Facility Opened by Minister Howlin

Minister for the Environment Brendan Howlin visited Ardmore last Friday to perform the official opening of the newly constructed beach facilities at Ardmore beach.

Comprising tourist office, lifeguard lookout, treatment room and public toilets, the building is striking in its circular design, reminiscent of the famous Ardmore round tower and the local lighthouse. There is also a comparison to be drawn with sandcastles in an innovative 'seaside' theme.

Constructed by local builder Michael Foley at a

cost of £80,000, the building was designed by Dungarvan-based architect Damien Dillon & Co.

Executed in white stone, the eye-catching building also features stairs and wheelchair ramps for the disabled.

The Department of the Environment contributed £40,000 towards the overall cost, the remainder being funded by the Waterford Enterprise Co-Op, the West Waterford Development Partnership Ltd. and Waterford County Council.

**BENEFITS COMMUNITY**  
Speaking at the opening

ceremony, Minister Howlin said the new facility is a "fine example of what can be achieved by combined public and private sector involvement". He said the award winning seaside resort now has a facility of which it can be justifiably proud of.

"Most importantly", he added, "it benefits the whole local community".

The Minister continued that the feature which most pleases him in the new building is the beachguard look-out post which was successfully in use during the summer. It would be re-

assuring for all engaged in water activities to know that expert help is at hand if needed, he stated.

Chairman of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Gary O'Halloran said he was not aware of any facility in the country which performs such a variety of functions and public services. He praised Dungarvan architect Damien Dillon for what he described as a "unique and brave" design in such a sensitive location.

The new building was ecumenically blessed by Ardmore curate, Fr. Pat Butler and the Rev. D.P.M. Warren, Church of Ireland.

Cllr. Billy Kyne said it is with deep regret that he noted the 'unhelpful attitude' taken by the Waterford Development Partnership.

Both WDP and the VEC, he said, are duty bound to serve the community, and the appointment of an Education Officer is a major step in that. Cllr. Kyne said there was never any doubt of anything less than the filling of the post and the news has come as a great upset to the teaching staff and principal of Dungarvan Technical College.

"We wasted so much time and went through an exercise that was never to be fulfilled", he slammed, "I'm disappointed with the Partnership".

Likewise Cllr. Lar Hart said the vague correspondence from the Partnership was not good enough and the way in which Mr. Taaffe treated the committee was 'not right'.

### "SORRY AND SAD SAGA"

Paudie Geary, a member of the schools teaching staff and representative of the TUI described the entire debacle as a "sorry and sad saga" and revealed that earlier that day an emergency meeting of the teaching staff was called to discuss the matter.

It was not good enough, he felt, for the VEC to be informed by mere hearsay of the Partnership's refusal to second the designated teacher. The expense and time consumed in the interview process was all to no

avail, he added. Indeed, the school principal was in the process of getting a substitute for the designated teacher.

### FLYNN ASTOUNDED

A fellow member of the teaching staff at Dungarvan Technical College, Cllr. Austin Flynn said he was astounded that a body set up to create employment would turn down an opportunity to create a job for the next 12 months. "I have to question the motive for the whole thing", he added, "it's crazy that a teacher could have been employed at no cost to the Partnership".

His namesake, Cllr. Nora Flynn said she was totally disgusted with the matter and pointed out that there are no public representatives on the Development Partnership boards. "What was the point of advertising the position at all", she declared adding that the Waterford Development Partnership have let the VEC down badly.

### WRITE TO WATERFORD DEVELOPMENT PARTNERSHIP

It was unanimously agreed that the CEO, Mr. Hefferman, write to Mr. Taaffe, explaining the committee's deep disappointment over what the members regard as a major breakdown in communications and a change in the agreed strategy and to outline the administrative difficulties this has created.

The committee have also asked for Mr. Taaffe to explain the board's position in the matter.

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# The Main Job Of A Conductor

Ever wondered why an orchestra needs a conductor standing out front waving his baton about?

You'd think the musicians would do just as well without him.

Well, they probably would, but a conductor's most important work is done in rehearsals.

He has to interpret the composer's markings, which means deciding how loud or how soft the

music has to be played, how much to make of crescendi (gradually getting louder) or diminuendi (gradually getting softer). He also has to make sure the beginnings and endings of sections and movements are neat and together.

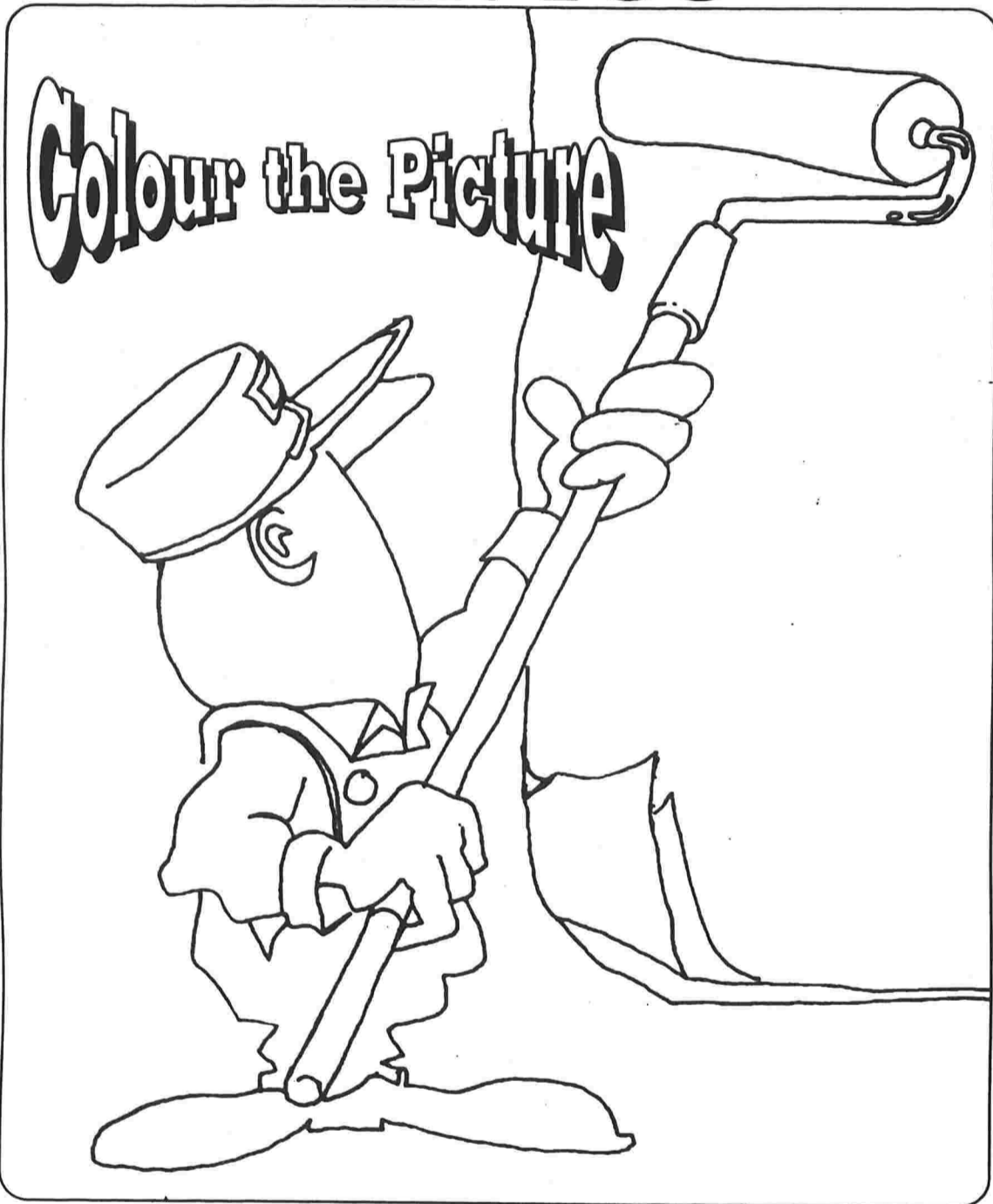
Most conductors use their baton to keep the orchestra in time with the music, but they can also give various indications — a nod, a raised eyebrow, even a wink — to

bring in soloists or different sections such as the strings or brass.

Incidentally, the word orchestra comes from the Greek for "a dancing place."

This goes back to around the fifth century BC when plays were in open-air theatres in front of which was a space for instrumentalists. This area was called the orchestra. Nowadays it refers to the musicians.

## Junior Encycopaedia

### Do Hyenas really laugh?

There is a hyena which is called the laughing hyena. It is the spotted hyena and is the biggest member of its family.

When this hyena is on the prowl, or gets excited over something, it makes an eerie howl and chuckling gurgle that sounds like a laugh. It is not laughing in the sense that human beings laugh. It makes a shrieking noise that sounds like laughing to us. The laughing hyena is an angry looking animal that is about 1 metre in height and about 1.85 metres long. A big hyena may weigh up to 80 kilograms. The hyena sleeps during the day in a cave or burrow. When it gets dark, it comes out to get food. They usually hunt alone, but if there is a kill left by lions or other beasts of prey, there will be a pack of hyenas gathered. Hyenas

have keen sense and this leads them to kill. When they do this, they usually clear up all the remains. The hyena is a cowardly and sneaky animal and it prefers to eat leftovers from another beast's kill. It likes to hang around villages or camps and can attack people sleeping in the open. It also follows herds of cattle or antelope and will pick on a crippled, old or very young animal to kill and eat. The laughing hyena belongs to the African species and can be found in areas from Ethiopia to the cape of Good Hope. In this species of hyena, the female is larger than the male which is very unusual.

# New Bandroom For Dungarvan Brass Band

Dungarvan Brass Band recently announced details of the development of a new bandroom at Davitt's Quay which will commence before the end of September following the signing of contracts last weekend with local building contractor David O'Riordan.

## BANDROOM HISTORY

In years past, the band practised in a variety of locations. In the 1870's when the band was first formed, the bandroom was situated in the grounds of the Augustinian Priory. Later the Town Hall served this purpose as did a room in the Courthouse but by the 1940's a bandroom existed at the rear of what is now the Post Office and area then known as the "Shambles". The present building was built in 1970. Despite the best efforts of the band over the years, the present building has deteriorated beyond repair. The roof has been constantly repaired and only a few years ago fully refelted yet still leaks badly. Dampness and mould have damaged much of the older music and instruments some dating from the last century. The situation became intolerable when rainwater shorted out the heating system leaving the band without heating from last October onwards. The Committee decided that the current bandroom was unsuitable for its members and should be replaced as soon as possible. Plans were already underway for a new bandroom and these have been brought forward.

## NEW BANDROOM

Designed by architects Damien Dillon and Co., the new bandroom will be built by local building contractor David O'Riordan and located on the site of the present bandroom at Davitt's Quay. Part of the adjacent "Linney" a long-time derelict site will be demolished as part of the development. The building will reflect many of the architectural features common to

Davitt's Quay and shall retain and enhance all of the original which pre-dates the current building. One notable feature will be the re-opening and glazing of an old archway on the quay-side wall. Internally, the bandroom will be specially designed for the band's acoustic requirements. Chairman Killian Power says, "Owing to the prominence of the bandroom's position on the quay, we have been conscious of the need to construct a building of suitable character for the location. In this regard, we are particularly pleased with the plans created by Damien Dillon and Co."

## COST

The cost of the bandroom when fully completed will be in the region of £50,000. Although the band has been fundraising for a number of years, there will be quite a shortfall of funds and the band will have to borrow a considerable sum. "It is quite an expense for a small organisation, just under thirty members, most of whom are students and school children. However we are determined to see this through," said John Dee, Treasurer. "It will take many years of fundraising, including this year's Ten Week Draw which begins on September 28th. The generosity of local people has always been tremendous, without local support none of this would have been contemplated."

## CRITICAL OF STATE FUNDING

On the matter of funding, Chairman Killian Power was particularly critical of both the National Lottery and the Department of Arts Culture and The Gaeltacht in its allocation of funding

to voluntary groups. "We have had no response from the National Lottery on the matter of funding and the Arts Council has a notable disregard for the brass band movement as a whole. We have been thrown the challenge of doing this for ourselves and that we will do".

## NEW BAND - NEW BANDROOM

It is expected that construction work will be completed before Christmas and the band will be locating to the new bandroom for the New Year - in the meantime band rehearsals will take place at an alternative location.

"We are grateful to those who have assisted us particularly Dungarvan U.D.C., our architect Damien Dillon

and an energetic Michael O'Riordan without whom this would not have been possible. There's a great 'buzz' about at the moment - everyone is looking forward to the opening of the new bandroom. We have a number of enthusiastic and committed new members joining our senior band and also some former members have rejoined us. Together with our new junior members, they will be playing with us just before Christmas. We've had our share of problems to overcome and 1996 has been an eventful year. However a strong band is about to emerge and our plans for the future are justifiably ambitious" — William Dee, Secretary.

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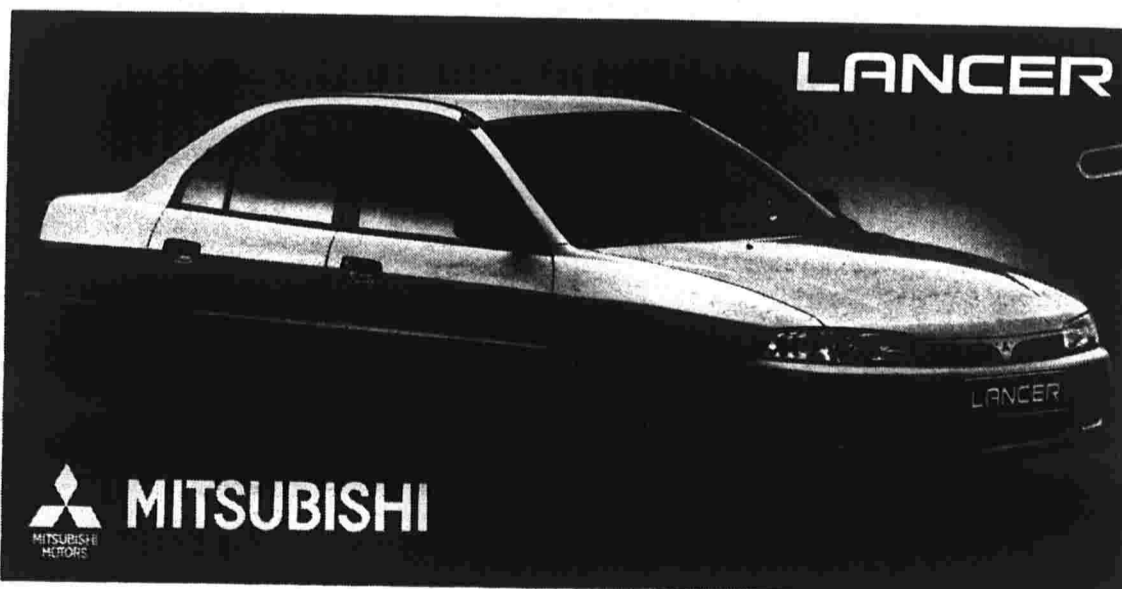

# Filling Of Post At Waterford Regional Hospital

Brian O'Shea T.D., Minister of State at the Department of Health this week gave details of posts filled at Waterford Regional Hospital this year to date and outlined plans for the filling of additional posts at the Hospital.

Minister O'Shea said that 54 posts have been filled at the Hospital to date this year. This comprises of 15 paramedical, 2 medical, 27 nursing, 7 clerical and administrative and 3 non-nursing.

Recruitment is currently underway to fill a further 14 posts before the end of the year in the following areas - 1. Paramedical; 2 Medical and 11 Non-Nursing.

With regard to the appointment of Consultants to the Hospital, Mr. O'Shea confirmed that a Consultant Nephrologist will commence employment at the Hospital from October. A Consultant Dermatologist will commence work next January and a Consultant Oncologist

post has also been approved at the Hospital and the recruitment process to fill this post is underway with a view to the successful applicant taking up duty at Waterford Regional Hospital later next year.

The Minister also pointed out that the South Eastern Health Board has applied to the Department of Health for approval to appoint a 4th ENT Consultant and a 6th Orthopaedic Consultant to be based in Waterford. "This application is currently under consideration in my Department," Mr. O'Shea concluded.

ings have already taken place followed by a meeting of the business people who are affected by the work in the Square area of the town.

Mrs. Kay Murray has been appointed co-ordinator of the project and a fund raising committee has been set up to raise the £8,000 required from the community which is part of the agreement with the Co. Council.

At a recent meeting of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Willie McDonnell, discussed the proposed scheme for Tallow and gave his ap-

proval for same with some reservations. He requested that the amount of street space for tree planting be reduced. He asked that the business people affected by the work involved be given an opportunity to meet with John O'Flynn, County Engineer, to air their views and reservations.

Subsequently ten business people in Tallow met with senior executive engineer Paul Daly and planning engineer Brian White at a meeting in Tallow chaired by Cllr. Willie McDonnell.

All present had opportunity to air their views and some compromises were made. These included the lowering of footpaths, the reduction of street space area and, in one case, to delete one three planting from the plan, if in the Council's opinion it interferes with the entrance to a business premises.

Cllr. McDonnell thanked the engineers for meeting with the business people. He said the project is an exciting one for the people of Tallow and is bound to be a success having the backing of the Tidy Towns Committee and the Enterprise Board. A further £50,000 will be available within two years as a follow-up investment in the town when this project is successfully completed.

# Snippets From Waterford County Council

## POSSIBLE ROUNDABOUT FOR KILRUSH

A roundabout may be on the cards for the controversial Kilrush junction in Dungarvan. That's according to Cllr. Billy Kyne who told last week's Waterford County Council meeting that he had been in contact with the National Roads Authority regarding the issue. Describing the traffic light junction at Kilrush as one of the most problematic junctions he had ever come across, Cllr. Kyne asked County Engineer John O'Flynn to confirm the news.

Mr. O'Flynn said the Council is hopeful of a roundabout for Kilrush. The local authority is currently in the process of designing a suitable roundabout for the junction which will subsequently be submitted to the NRA for funding.

Meanwhile, construction work at the roundabout on the N25 Dungarvan Bypass at the Shandon (Park Hotel) junction, is continuing satisfactorily. Final surfacing is now complete together with work on the footpaths and cycleways.

## COUNCIL TO ERECT 5 NEW HOUSES

Waterford County Council have given public notice this week of housing development proposals at Ballinagoul, Ring and Ballinakill. The four houses proposed for Ballinagoul Mor will be built on a green field site while there is one house proposed for Ballinakill, Kilbrien.

The documentation, layout and house types are available for public inspection in the Housing Section, Arus Bruga, Dungarvan.

## PLANNING PERMISSION GRANTED FOR MASTS

During the month of August, planning permission was granted by Waterford County Council to Radio Telefís Eireann to replace an existing mast at Knockaun-abouchala transposer station in Ballintaylor Upper with a new 51 metre tower and two equipment containers for the provision of new broadcast services in the area.

The Council has also granted planning permission to the ESB for the erection of a 36 metre mast to support radio antennae and also a prefab radio hut at Caronadaverg.

Esat Digifone were also granted planning permission in August for the erection of an 18 metre square steel lattice transmission mast, to form part of the digital communications network at Harristown.

## POTHOLES AT WHITING BAY

Potholes on the road leading into Whiting Bay in Ardmore is causing serious concern for local residents according to Cllr. Paddy Kenneally, who told last week's Waterford County Council meeting that locals are up in arms over the situation. He also highlighted the need for repairs to a road in Ardo.

Co. Manager Donal Connolly confirmed that he would follow up on the matter.

## SPEED LIMIT NEEDED AT AFFANE

It may take 2 years before a speed limit is introduced at Affane housing estate.

The issue was raised at last week's County Council meeting by Cllr. Jimmy Quirke who moved the mo-

tion of motion that the Council request the Gardai to approve of a speed limit in the area.

Cllr. Quirke said he had received a number of phone calls from concerned residents in Affane who felt that traffic is travelling too fast through the estate.

County Engineer John O'Flynn however said that requests for speed limits must go through consultation with the Gardai and could take anything up to 2 years to be introduced at a speed limitation meeting.

Slamming the tortuous delay as "very slow progress", Cllr. Quirke said the situation in Affane is highly dangerous.

## 5 YEAR ROADS RESTORATION PROGRAMME

Waterford County Engineer, John O'Flynn has revealed the latest round of the five year restoration programme for county roads to the year 2000.

The programme, which is already in place, will inject a total of £275,000 each year into the non-national roads network, and will be distributed equally among priority roads.

Speaking at last week's meeting of Waterford County Council, Mr. O'Flynn said the programme will restore the roads in the county back to the state they were in 20 years ago. The money, he said, will go towards surface restoration to build up road edges and drainage, road reconstruction where the road surface has completely broken up and surface dressing.

Welcoming the programme, Cllr. Oliver Coffey said that most of the 'black patches' in the county are included in the list of works.

Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson however said the money now being allocated to the Council is not keeping the authority ahead of the roads problem. Unless there is an increase in finances to manage the county roads infrastructure, Cllr. Wilkinson warned of even greater problems with deteriorating road conditions this winter. He suggested that area meetings should be held immediately to ascertain the worst roads in each area.

"The money currently being used for county roads is totally useless", he stressed, pointing to the countywide crisis experienced earlier this year as a result of heavy flooding.

Mr. O'Flynn confirmed that area meetings will be held in January and February next year.

Meanwhile some of the roads targeted by the programme for improvement works next year are as follows; surface dressing at Ballinagoul (£35,781), Ballinroad Cross (£27,675), Mocollop (£18,000), Whitechurch (£27,000), Renadampaun (£13,400), Kilossera (£11,790), Ring Cross (£34,413), Vee Road (£18,000), Fourmilewater (£9,000), Ballintaylor (£12,250), Kilwatermoy (£5,520), Lyre (£18,000), Kilmanahan (£4,830), Ballyduff (£21,000), Ballylemon (£13,500), Ballyrafter (£21,000), Ardmore (£24,300), Shanbally, Helvick (£30,387), Kilnafrehan (£13,800), Melleray (£18,000), Goat Island (£16,284) and Ballysaggart (£13,500) etc.

Under the discretionary improvement grant, roads will be completely reconstructed at Lissarow (£64,489), Ballygagin/Lisfennell (£38,689), Cappoquin-Ballinamult (£22,552), and Kill-Carrolls Cross (£36,300) etc.

# Work Progresses On Four-Storey Building At Dungarvan Quay

Work is now steadily progressing on the construction of a new four storey building on the site of the former Moloney Corn Stores at Davitt's Quay, Dungarvan.

During the summer, the derelict Moloney building, which was seen as an environmental blight on the seafront landscape, was de-

molished to make way for a major residential/retail development by Clancy Construction Ltd. of Thurles. The Co. Tipperary compa-

ny is also involved in the construction of a luxury housing development at Strandside, Abbeyside.

Situated between Galwey's Lane and Dirty Lane, the new project on the quay is aptly named 'Cois Mara' (beside the sea), and is expected to transform this en-

tire seafront area into a thriving 'new look' neighbourhood.

## NEW £1 MILLION LIBRARY

Cois Mara will incorporate 37 high quality apartments, three maisonettes, two townhouses, and a retail/restaurant unit. A new central branch library for Dungarvan, replacing the existing library at Lower Main Street, will also be housed in 800 sq. metres of the reconstructed building. The cost of relocating the new library is set at over £1 million, subject to approval and funding by the Department of the Environment. Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly however is confident that this funding will be forthcoming and hopes to see the new branch up and running at the end of next year or by early 1998 at the latest.

The restaurant/retail unit will be located on the ground floor on the corner

of Galwey's Lane, while the library will occupy the opposite corner with Dirty Lane.

## NO OBJECTIONS BY OPW

Some weeks ago an archaeological investigation of the site, undertaken by Dave Pollock (Archaeografix), revealed that the development would interfere with "material of archaeological interest". Mr. Pollock also came across remains of the old Dungarvan town walls.

His report was subsequently submitted to the Office of Public Works (OPW) who requested that a further appraisal of the site be carried out. Representatives of the OPW personally visited the site of the demolished corn stores and eventually came to an agreement with the developers that part of the foundations be relocated.

It is now accepted that the project will not pose a threat

to any existing archaeological material.

## ADJOINING APARTMENT COMPLEX

Adjacent to the Clancy Construction site stands a dilapidated former grain store, now owned by the local Moorings Post Development Company.

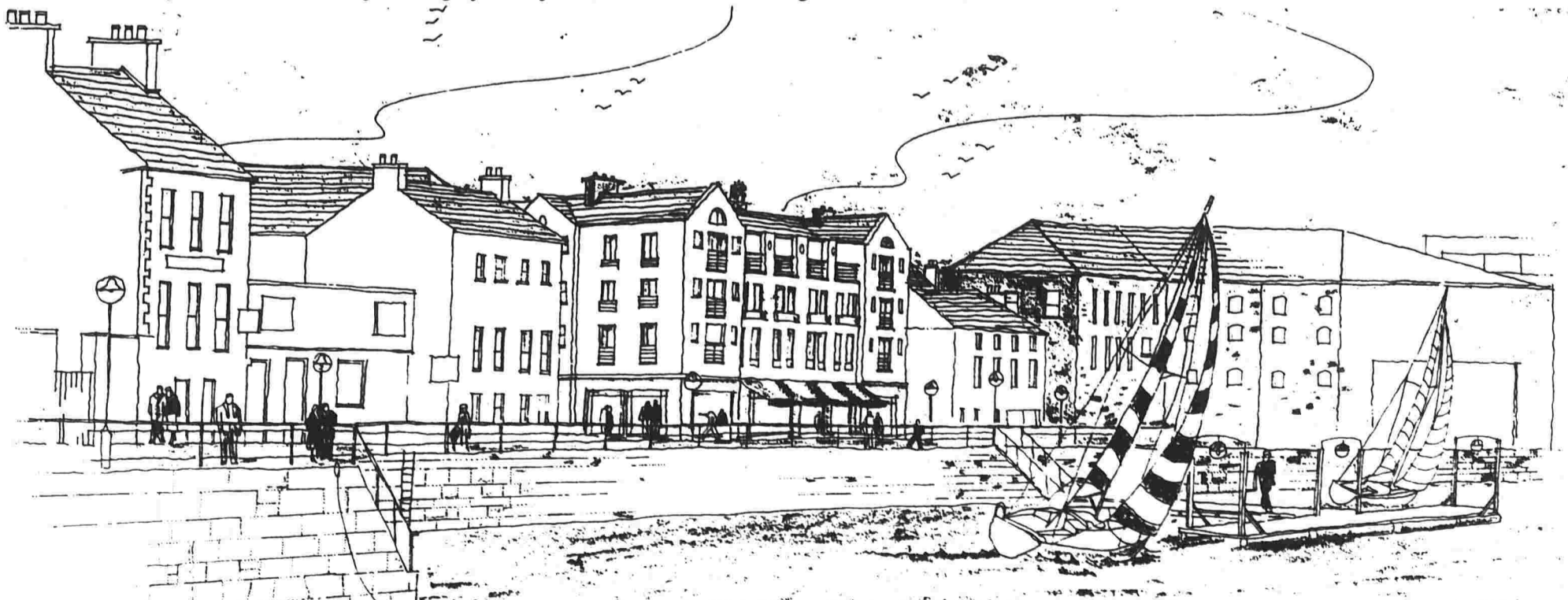
Here, it is proposed by Archview Developments Ltd., to demolish the building and erect a luxury 28 apartment complex in its place.

This proposed development however has been met with strong opposition by the Dungarvan Museum Society who lodged an appeal again the project with An Bord Pleanala, in an attempt to retain the quayside building and a 'habitable house' at the front for reasons of historical merit.

A final decision on the development by the planning authority could well take a number of months.

# Cappoquin Notes

## CAPPOQUIN TIDY TOWNS

**Results:** Date of adjudication: 02/07/96. The following are the marks awarded for this year (maximum in brackets) - Overall Developmental Approach - 35 (50), Wildlife and Natural Amenities 21 (30), Landscaping 22 (40), The Built Environment 20 (40), Litter Control 28 (40), Tidiness 11 (20), Residential Areas 17 (30), Roads, Streets and Back Areas 23 (40), General Impression 5 (10).

Total 182 (300).

The following are the adjudicator's comments -

**Overall Developmental Approach:** Despite the short notice, Cappoquin has responded magnificently to the new requirement for a 3 to 5 year Work Programme which would have regard to and plan to emphasis the wildlife and natural habitat of the town and immediate surrounding areas. Thank you for the detailed programme of works planned for 1996, the additional information together with the most useful maps, all of which enabled the adjudication to be fully reflected of the extensive works undertaken and planned. The Environmental Improvement Study for Cappoquin provides an excellent resource audit and can form the basis for a structured and phased approach to their solution over time.

When allied to the Cappoquin Development Plan compiled by the Cappoquin Community Development Company Limited in association with Waterford County Council, the town is well supplied with good strategic planning for the future.

**Wildlife And Natural Amenities:** The major resource represented by the Glenshelane Wood has thankfully been fully recognised by the Committee and is central to the successful development of a wildlife and major amenity facility for the town. Perhaps the small pedestrian river bridge could be restored or refurbished to create a desirable circular route through the woods.

Tree planting on the Melleray road adds substantially to the amenity value of this approach road. The Grotto positioned at the junction of the Melleray/Glenshelane road is splendid as were the planted rose bushes at the apex of the two roads.

The River is, of course, an important centre and we welcome the plans in respect

of Twig Bog.

**Landscaping:** The Committee's efforts maintaining flowers and rosebeds are applauded. The Village Square was a delight on the day of adjudication. Hanging baskets at various locations, particularly at Misericordia were colourful and imaginative. Floral displays at town nameplates are particularly applauded. The Fire Station was looking well and we applaud the flagpole. The practice of flag-flying should be encouraged. The work in progress removing grass from the top of the rubble wall on the Melleray road was splendid. The planting on the G.A.A. wall was a very positive move. The entrance area to Cappoquin House would benefit from additional attention and planting.

**The Built Environment:** In general, Cappoquin extends a desirable sense of cohesion with clear-cut delineation between rural areas and the Community itself. The Church is an imposing building while it is the streetscape generally and the individual buildings within it which contribute so handsomely to an overall good impression.

Outstanding is the Tavern Bar with its excellent signage and pleasant shuttering. Barron's Bakery Shop, The Saddlers and Troy's Hardware also caught the eye. The Credit Union House featured very fine lettering. Sign and doorway would benefit from furnishing. The fine Doric doorway to Allied Irish Banks is interesting and the Post Office also has appeal. Healy's Pharmacy featured a fine shop front and lettering with disparaging treatments of the two sections of the building overhead, one only featuring fine ornate window decoration. An important element of the built landscape is the splendid dry-fill random rubble walls. It is a delight to record the positive steps being made to retain their character.

**Litter Control:** In general, litter management was of a very high order throughout the centre. There were occasional lapses from this high standard around the river bridge area and near the G.A.A. grounds.

Well designed and suitably sited litter bins are commended. In effect, some of them themselves represent fine street furnishings. Additional litter bins could, with advantage, be provided, per-

haps sponsored by adjacent commercial establishments.

**Tidiness:** Cappoquin has many splendid positive attributes - all of these are applauded. They contribute to a sense of order and neatness throughout the centre. The degree of spoil at the base of wall and between the road and pathway is an element of presentation which will require more attention. Signage generally was of a good order notably Richmond House, the Tavern Bar and Healy's.

The disfiguring derelict car is still located beside the Fire Station. The area surrounding St. Declan's Scout Unit was itself well presented. Perhaps the Scout Troop would assume responsibility for the flower trough in front of their Den.

**Residential Areas:** The residential houses of Cappoquin have many delightful features with excellent individual displays of both houses and surrounding gardens. The Terrace overlooking the Mount Melleray road was particularly striking with very well presented public area featuring plants, shrubs, trees and nicely cut grass. The Terrace opposite the National School featuring again many good individual displays. Grounds of Coisceim were very well presented. The small houses of Castle Street were full of character and well presented being freshly painted and many featuring window boxes or hanging baskets. The houses of Mass Lane were also very attractive and contributed greatly to the overall presentation of the centre.

Unhappily there are very many derelict sites and under used houses in the centre. A real effort needs to be undertaken to identify the owners so that the necessary remedial action can be taken for the buildings/sites released back into productive use.

**Roads, Streets And Back Areas:** The approach roads to Cappoquin are uniformly good and striking. Of particular note is the fine random stone walls on the approach from Waterford. Some of these are unhappily beginning to unravel and early attention is called for. On occasion there is a gap between the surfaced portion of the roadway and the enclosing wall or fence. This has, in locations, become a utensil for spoil and waste which is disfiguring and distracting. In general, a number of road signs require to be washed and/or painted, for example

the cluster of signs at the Waterford/Youghal road junction. Largely speaking 30 mph signage was well maintained. The Fáilte to Cappoquin signs were fresh and welcoming. The grass cutting and tree planting on the Melleray approach road was particularly good. Some litter was noted on the road leading to the Glenshelane Wood.

**General Impression:** Cappoquin is a centre which is clearly extending great imagination and energy in the Tidy Towns campaign. It is very well equipped with plans and with an energetic and progressive local community. It is blessed with a delightful and very extensive amenity in its woodlands and the Blackwater River. The extent of derelict and under-used buildings will call for imaginative preventative and corrective measures.

It doesn't have to be all that deep; nine to twelve inches will be perfect for most things. Simply be sure it is protected from the north and east by a wall or building.

And around this time of the year you will be able to use it to sow seeds and cuttings for winter and spring flowering.

Take violets for instance. Wouldn't it be heartwarming to pick bunches of them in the winter. Well, plants you buy now and plant in your frame will provide a succession of bloom.

When you've chosen the site for your frame, take out the soil to a depth of about a foot, then put in a drainage layer of two inches of ashes. Put about three inches of old manure on the ashes and cover with a firm six-inch bed of three parts loam, with one part peat and one part manure.

When planting the violets, allow a good two inches of clearance between the outer leaves of each plant.

If you haven't got a frame, then you can plant violets outdoors in well-prepared soil. But they won't flower so early or so well as those in a frame. However, you could put them under cloches for a better result.

It's a good time to take bedding-plant cuttings for putting in the cold frame throughout winter.

Cuttings taken now of, say, calceolarias, heliotropes, petunias, marguerites, violas, fuchsias, will quickly root and make strong plants before winter.



Take cuttings from sturdy, healthy plants. You'll only want unflowered, firm, well-ripened shoots, cut just below a joint. Insert them in boxes of sandy soil in a cold frame or even in the open soil with a frame placed over them.

Calseolarias, violas, pansies and pentstemons will all root and spend the winter successfully in a frame. Cuttings of geraniums, fuchsias, heliotropes, petunias, marguerites and verbenas will root successfully standing on a path in a sunny, sheltered corner. But they should be wintered in a greenhouse away from frost.

And while you're in a planting mood, this month's a good time for planting evergreen shrubs.

Remember, shrubs are going to be a permanent feature, so prepare the ground well and choose positions wisely. All too often they are planted simply to fill corners or hide things.

If the roots of any shrubs are very dry when you get them, stand them in water overnight.

Take out an ample-sized hole for each specimen and firm the soil well over the roots.

# Stradbally Wins County Award In Tidy Towns

The picturesque town of Stradbally has captured the County Award in the recent National Tidy Towns Competition to become Waterford's tidiest town. Despite the presence of major improvement works in the village all summer, Stradbally still came out on top to win the County Award with an impressive 229 points out of 300.

Hopes are now high that the village will score even better in next year's competition with the help of a new lighting system, cobbled footpaths and paved streets.

The following is the adjudicators report, maximum marks in brackets:

**Overall Development Approach (50) 29** — Stradbally, the 1995 South East Regional Award winner, has adapted well to the change in emphasis in the Tidy Towns Competition. Thank you for the map and the comprehensively completed entry form — both of which were useful on the day of adjudication.

As usual, Stradbally was a delight to visit and the general presentation was of a very high order.

**Wildlife And Natural Amenities (30) 22** — The Strand and River represent substantial assets and contribute greatly to the totality of Stradbally. The road to Ballybooly Beach has also a delightful rural feel. The stream and trees on the approach from Dungarvan similarly give a lovely sense of enclosure as you climb the hill. The floral displays leading to the ancient Church of Ireland grounds and the grounds themselves, were very well presented.

**Landscaping (40) 33** — We allowed fully, on the day of adjudication, for the inevitable disruption occasioned by the new street lighting being installed. The central Green was, as usual, immaculate and featured superb floral displays. The many hanging baskets and particularly the 3-pronged, free standing hanging basket "trees" are excellent.

With the heightened emphasis on the environment, the Committee should explore ground planting rather than the use of flower tubs for floral displays. The display of planting at "Kismith" on Church Lane was a delight. The work in progress on the refurbishment of the random rubble wall on Ballybooly Beach road is commended.

**Built Environment (40) 31** — While Stradbally has its fair share of individually significant buildings, it is the collective streetscape which is such a joy. Individual houses, painted and adorned

with window boxes and hanging baskets, project a delightful air. The Holy Cross Church and nearby Pierce Barron (1806) School were very well presented. The Post Office was most attractive as was the delightful Church of Ireland National School which featured a very fine display of flowers and was totally litter-free. The small thatch cottage in this area was also very pleasantly presented. "Wheilan's Bar" featured colourful hanging baskets and was also well painted. Comments which apply in equal measure to Tom Condon's Shop on Church Lane. While the toilets were freshly painted it is sad to note the amount of vandalism to which they have been subjected.

**Litter Control (40) 34** — Despite 4 large litter bins at the Cove, some litter was noted in this area and also around the public toilets. The green and the core of the village was free of litter. Minor amounts noted in the Library/Viewmount corner.

**Tidiness (20) 15** — We confirm that we allowed fully for disruption occasioned by the installation of the new street lighting. Signage needed a little attention. The Cove sign was missing altogether and one sign in the centre had been turned in the wrong direction. Signposts need painting or washing. There was some spoil on the sides of roads. The area outside the G.A.A. grounds could, with advantage, be treated with suitable surface dressing up to the roadside walls. The present gap between surfaced area and the wall could become unsightly.

Stradbally exudes a delightful, untroubled by artificial or inappropriate "prettiness". It is a tidy, neat and well presented village.

**Residential Areas (30) 21** — The high standard of the core village is reflected suitably in the residential areas. Viewmount and Rockville particularly were very well presented, with both individual gardens and communal grassed areas being a delight. Individual houses on the Kilmacthomas road and on the Ballybooly Cove road were well presented. Perhaps additional planting could be recommended in respect of

some houses on the latter. The housing stock on Church Lane and especially the thatched cottage were a delight. The individual houses around the Green are the highlight of the centre.

**Road, Streets And Back Areas (40) 35** — Speed limit signs were well presented and hedges were suitably cut back for a rural setting. We have referred to some spoil on the sides of roads. The Kilmacthomas entrance road had the grass appropriately cut back and featured the splendid 3-pronged hanging basket "trees". On the small side road to Monavaud the presentation of the random rubble walls and the planting on top of same were a joy. Stradbally is a delightful village and all of the approach roads were presented in a manner which made them a most agreeable prelude to the village itself.

**General Impression (10) 9** — Few centres exude the same sense of order, colour and cohesion as is to be enjoyed in Stradbally. From the central green the delightfully presented Church Lane, the approach roads and the residential areas all contribute to a splendid high presentation standard.

Compliments are extended to the members of the committee, to the community at large and all who have con-

tributed to this splendid presentation.

**Second Adjudication** — Flowers were preeminent in the overall picture of Stradbally on second adjudication

day. The handsome new paving, the smooth new road surfacing as well as the superb new lighting standards, have enhanced the village centre tremendously. There

was no discernible litter at the places mentioned by the first adjudicator and little elsewhere, which is a real achievement considering the holiday weekend.

## Welcome For Tourism Plan But Job Quality Must Be Monitored

Waterford County Council has unanimously approved funding of £25,000 towards the cost of the new Waterford Tourism Plan, a major objective of which is to establish the county and city as a tourist destination in its own right.

As part of the plan, the county will be marketed as "Waterford - The Crystal County of Ireland" in the hope of increasing the number of tourists visiting and remaining in the county and city from an estimated 907,000 this year to 1,184,000 by the year 2000. The plan also hopes to increase the annual revenue to the County from tourism from £88.4 million in '96 to over £140 million by 2000.

Welcoming the tourism plan at last week's meeting of Waterford County Council was Cllr. Oliver Coffey who was closely involved with the plan in his former capacity as

Council Chairman.

The tourism plan, he said, brings all the major players together such as Waterford Crystal, Waterford Foods, Waterford Corporation, Waterford Regional Airport, the County Tourism Committee and Tramore Failte etc.

The county will have a lot to benefit from the Council's involvement in the plan, he enthused.

### MUST MONITOR QUALITY OF JOBS

Commenting on the job creation potential in the catering industry, Cllr. Billy Kyne said that while he commended the Waterford tourism venture, he urged

that the plan must include some element enabling the quality and quantity of jobs created in the tourism industry to be monitored.

Re-echoing his sentiments was Cllr. Tony Wright who said Waterford County Council is a major player in the Waterford tourism plan and should use its influence to eliminate all or any aspects of 'black economy'.

People employed in the tourism sector should be given decent rates and conditions, he stated, "and not £1.00 or £1.50 per hour and have to work all night".

"Investment in tourism should not be a charter for the rich to exploit the poor", he warned.

County Manager Donal Connolly said it was the intentions of all involved that the jobs created as a result of the tourism plan would be of high quality.

## PROSPECTS OF RE-OPENING BEEF TRADE

A delegation for United Farmers Association recently met the Iranian Ambassador, Hossein Amin-Rad to discuss prospects of re-opening the beef trade between Ireland and Iran.

The UFA delegates were Michael O'Callaghan, President, Barney Gallagher, Nat. Chairman, Pat Dillon, Connacht Vice-Chairman and Paddy Boyhan, Leinster Vice-President.

Mr. O'Callaghan emphasised that the vast majority of our farmers are in the small to medium category and many depend on annual cattle sales to survive on their holdings. He pointed out that UFA had been campaigning to ensure that the highest standard of ethics would operate on farms producing cattle and in factories where beef was processed.

The Ambassador said that as a result of action by the Irish authorities there now was a distinction in Iran between Irish and British beef and that the verdict of an Iranian Veterinary officer due to visit Ireland in the near future would be crucial. The false certificates episode had created a major problem but the Iranians are now satisfied that proper procedures are in place to prevent the re-occurrence of any such malpractice in the future.

The Ambassador was optimistic that Irish beef contracts with Iran would be renewed and he offered his assistance to the UFA President, Michael O'Callaghan in arranging a personal visit to Iran to promote Irish beef.



### DAIRYING

**Grass Intake** — A spring calving cow milking 3 1/2 gallons in September has a dry matter requirement of about 14 kg. per day. For her to eat this amount, the grass must be leafy and grazing conditions good - i.e. good ground conditions and not grazing below 7 cms. If there is a bulk of dead material than intake, milk production and body condition can suffer. The higher the genetic potential the greater the danger. Autumn calving cows yielding about 5 1/2 gallons need at least 17 kg. dry matter intake/day. When grass quantity is high i.e. "leafy, wrist high and green to the ground" the cow will take in about 14 - 15 kg. from grass but the rest must be supplemented if body condition is not to suffer.

**Expected Growth Rates** — Depending on weather, grass growth declines from about 40 kg./ha in early September to about 30 kg. grass dry matter/ha at the end of the month.

This means that at a stocking rate of 1 cow/acre, grass growth should match feed demand up to about 15 - 20th September. At higher stocking rates, feed demand will exceed grass growth by mid September and overall grass supply will decline? Walk all paddocks on a weekly basis to assess pasture cover as availability and utilisation can change very rapidly under wet conditions and poor growth rates.

### SUCKLERS

**Parasite Control** — Where weanlings have not been involved in a season long dosing programme (Avermectin or Bolus) they should be dosed now and again at housing. Use a drug that is effective against type 11 worms at housing.

**Cow Condition** — Wean before cows lose too much condition. This is more important where fodder quality is low and for early spring calving herds. Cows in such herds should be at condition score of 3 or better at weaning. If fodder quality is good, a condition score at weaning of 2 - 2 1/2 is adequate.

**Tetany Control** — Prevent Autumn Tetany by feeding a Magnesium supplement to cows that are still suckling their calves during the danger period (from mid September onwards).

Delayed weaning and a declining feed supply increases the incidence of grass Tetany.

### SHEEP

**Ewes Pre-Mating** — Unless ewes are in poor condition going to the ram, there is no benefit in having them gaining weight at this stage. On this basis it is important to go through the flock and separate out ewes in poor condition (less than 2.5 condition score) for preferential treatment. Ewes in good condition can be maintained on scarce grass until 2 - 3 weeks pre-mating. If the ram is not being let out until mid October it would be important to monitor these ewes every 2 - 3 weeks so that they are maintaining condition.

**Thin Ewes** — Thin ewes are most likely to be old ewes and ewe hoggets after rearing their first lamb. Where pasture is less than 5 cm, these will require 0.5 - 0.75 kg. concentrates/head/day for about 3 - 4 weeks before going to the ram.

It is advisable that ewes during mating and for the first month after mating maintain body weight so as to prevent embryo loss. If grass height is less than about 4 cms, supplementation is necessary - about 0.5 kg./head/day for about 3 weeks after mating.

**Rams** — Essential to ensure that they are in good body condition before mating as it is difficult to supplement them while they are with the ewes. Feed up to 1 kg. concentrate of a 16 % crude protein ration per head per day. It is preferable to feed twice daily. Avoid rations containing Magnesium or Copper.

## Irish Livestock Sector Carrying Disproportionate Burden Of BSE Crisis

IFA President, John Donnelly, has warned that the Irish livestock industry is being asked to carry a totally disproportionate burden of the fall-out from the British BSE crisis, both in terms of the cattle price collapse and the EU's proposals for beef production cuts.

Mr. Donnelly welcomed the fact that the Taoiseach, John Bruton, has become directly involved in the cattle crisis, including addressing a farmers meeting on the beef situation in Cootehill, Co. Cavan, recently.

The IFA President said "the Taoiseach's acknowledgement in Cootehill that the BSE crisis has grave implications for the wider Irish economy as well as for farmers must be followed up by getting EU recognition of Ireland's unique dependence on the beef sector."

"Ireland is sixteen times more dependent on the livestock sector than Britain and ten times more than the EU as a whole."

Commenting on the situation, Waterford IFA Livestock Chairman, Maurice Donovan, said EU proposals to cut beef production take no account of the unique importance of the beef and livestock industry to the Irish economy. "These proposed cuts go right to the heart of Irish agriculture and the wealth generating capacity of the Irish economy. It is totally unacceptable that

## ICMSA Says Farmers Furious Over Vets Charges

Farmers are furious over having to pay extra for TB and Brucellosis testing of their stock under the new Livestock Disease Eradication Scheme said ICMSA President, Mr. Frank Allen.

"The irony is that in the promotion of this new partially privatised scheme which was introduced last April, farmers were fooled into believing that the costs of testing would be reduced," said Mr. Allen.

He said vets are charging farmers well in excess of what they would receive in payment from the Department of Agriculture for the same work.

"Vets fees will have to be cut," said Mr. Allen. "It is high time that vets reduced their fees, otherwise they will face the wrath of farmers who are facing a diffi-

cult income situation over the next few years."

Mr. Allen said small farmers have been worst hit — "a farmer with 10 animals will pay 10% more than the fees that would be paid to

the vet by the Department."

He suggested that farmers should come together and try to negotiate a deal with a veterinary practice to test for the group at a reduced rate.

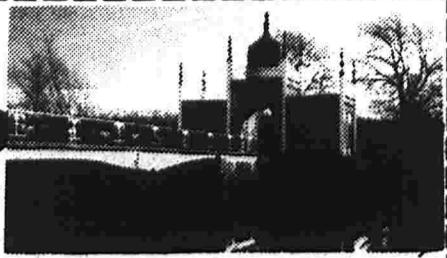

## Concern Over Increase In Local Cancer Deaths

The Chairman of Waterford County Council, Gary O'Halloran has expressed serious concern about what he considers to be a large increase in the number of deaths from cancer in the Dungarvan area in the recent past.

A member of the South Eastern Health Board (SEHB), Cllr. O'Halloran claims his views about the high incidence of cancer, in many cases young people, is shared by a number of medical personnel in the town. Speaking at last Monday's meeting of the County Council, he disclosed that the large number of deaths from cancer in the Dungarvan area was brought to his attention by members of the local medical profession, particularly cancer of the lymph gland.

Cllr. O'Halloran said he has now requested the South Eastern Health Board's Director of Community Care to start an investigation into the matter for him and to ascertain whether Dungarvan is above the national average.

The Clashmore-based Councillor said the issue posed the question whether or not there was a connection between the cancer deaths and the proliferation of telecommunications masts in the area. While not trying to sound alarmist, Cllr. O'Halloran said it was only right that these public concerns should be raised.

He went on to say that he will continue to pursue the matter at SEHB level in the hope of getting answers to his questions.

# THE EXTRA MAN

The sending off of Wexford corner forward, Eamonn Scallan in this year's All-Ireland and subsequent developments in that game brought into sharp focus once more the effects of such dismissals on both teams. An investigation of such incidents over the past 30 years will confirm that it is the team minus one of their number which invariably prevails in the end. There are exceptions of course such as Cork losing Tony Davis and the All-Ireland to Derry but having a man sent off seems to act as a very potent spur to the disadvantaged team and Cork in 1990 scored a well-merited victory over Meath when Colm O'Neill got his marching orders after his feud with Mick Lyons overspilled. The sending off was wrong and Cork's rage at the injustice of it spurred them on and at the same time Meath made poor use of their extra player. If I see a normally well behaved chap striking out at his opponent, I immediately seek the source of the action and ask myself what provocation led him to do so. My eye would be on the provocator. In that game, Lyons had been tipping, digging and niggling O'Neill since before the throw in and of course the white coated umpires failed to do their clear duty and alert the referee to this carry on. Nothing is so exasperating as persistent annoying behaviour so when Colm struck out, he had decided that the referee wasn't going to afford him any protection. Mick Lyons' reaction was quite theatrical. Evinced wide-eyed incredulity he gingerly massaged the affected area where his aftershave had been disturbed. Do people do such things in football, his body language seemed to say. I know you're right. O'Neill should have taken it all and soldiered on or arranged that a team mate deal with his tormentor by, as my Derry friend put it, "taking a race at him." If the strict wording of the rule were to be applied, a sending off was correct. But don't forget the homespun philosophy of my Clare friend, Tom Harvey: "rules are for the observance of fools and the guidance of wise men". The execrable Pharisees of the Gospel were sticklers for the letter of the law. What Tom was saying was that no law should tolerate an injustice and that the "hard man"

should never be allowed make life impossible for an opponent.

I like the story of the Dublin referee (Tony Jordan, I think) who officiated at a Dublin County Championship game involving two teams who didn't subscribe to the injunction of St. Paul to love one another. On one team was a particularly foul centre back whose joy it was to "soften" his opponent by word and action and drive that poor sod to distraction. The back also had the engaging habit of using the sly kick and fist to the ribs and then if there was any retaliation, going down clutching his face, the purpose of the exercise being to get his opponent sent off. The referee knew him just as any good referee should know the persistent violator of the rules. So when the centre back went down, hand to face, the referee rushed up notebook at the ready. "If I see you going down like that again," he admonished severely, "I'll send you off." And he went on to warn him about his conduct and book him. There was no repetition of the "hard man's" histrionics for the rest of the game.

Oh that every referee were so perceptive !!! But back to the extra man, is it any advantage? Of course it is, why wouldn't playing with an extra man be a big advantage to any well-coached team. So what happened to Limerick then? Well there have been thousands of words uttered and almost as many lines penned on that very subject and every opinion expressed has a certain validity. I think the answer must be found in the composition and the management of the two teams - the preparation they had made beforehand for such an eventuality, what suitable players they possessed for the free role and how they intended to deploy their players. A good manager prepares his team for every twist and turn in the day's events. This planning encompasses every minute of All-Ireland day, a day when the unoccupied player is a prey to fears and anxieties, with that big negative fear of failure trying to obtrude its ugly head. To neglect any subject of this preparation is to invite trouble, trouble for individual players and trouble for the team as a unit. From early morning, players should never be alone or isolated. That would allow far too much fretting and worry

ing and those dreadful negative thoughts.

Being aware of the possibility of having an extra man or of being reduced to 14 should always enter into pre-match discussions. Liam Griffin assures us that Wexford took such possibilities into consideration as part of their prematch preparations. They almost certainly teased out their strategy for deployment of their men in any one of many different circumstances. Their deployment of the 14 on match day showed that their homework was done well. Limerick's reaction to the altered situation seems to suggest that the matter wasn't addressed at all before hand. I suppose it was just another part of the generally slovenly and haphazard approach which was evident earlier in the absence of a sense of decorum when awaiting introductions to the President and in the break-away before the parade had finished.

Limerick hadn't the extra man for very long before half time intervened so like Wexford they had ample time during the interval to consider how best to utilise their numerical advantage. They were right, I think, to select a player of skill and awareness for the free man role because such a player could make best use of possession and in theory, at least score points, enough of which would win any match. They chose Carey but as the half wore on, Marsh seemed to have been assigned the role which shows a lack of conviction. Either, in fact, was a suitable choice but they failed to do one other essential thing: to instruct the goalie to drive his puck out shorter but in the vicinity of where Carey or Marsh was giving the team a two-to-one advantage. Joe Quaid, meanwhile continued to make celestial puck outs - long high balls which dropped down on the Wexford half back line who, with the ball taking a while to arrive at its destination, had time to position themselves under it. Liam Dunne and Larry O'Gorman are very effective under the high ball and so their reputations were enhanced by every puck of Quaid's. And Wexford's already high morale increased as the game wore on.

A sending off affects both teams. The team punished, like Wexford, who were prepared for such a setback realise that the task before

be more difficult and are prepared mentally for the necessary increase in the tempo of their play. They are prepared to run stronger, work harder, tackle relentlessly and chase non-stop. With their opponents, the reaction is almost the opposite. They feel the man extra somehow guarantees them victory, that they are less vulnerable. There is an imperceptible overall cosy complacency pervading with players taking it for granted that things will automatically happen of their own volition. The air of urgency is missing. One is inclined to leave it to the other in an atmosphere of diminishing responsibility. When a situation is thrust upon you which you haven't foreseen, there is a lot of confused thinking and a loss of focus.

A game I referred to here some time ago comes to mind again in this context, the Munster Senior Hurling Championship game Cork v Wexford in 1974, I think, which was a home game for us at Walsh Park. You might remember that Paddy Barry, Cork's goalie, was dismissed early on. I'd like to think that I had a slight input in Cork's defeat. Waterford bucked the trend that day winning with the extra man but only by allotting the free role to a player who was suitable for the job.

When Paddy Barry went off, Cork were forced to sacrifice an outfield player to enable them to bring on the sub goalie. They took off the right full forward, leaving Seamie Hannon unmarked. For the remaining 18 mins. of that first half, Seamie stayed more or less in his position although sometimes sweeping out to the half back line. He looked ill at ease, I think, which was no wonder since a defender is used to close marking a specific man and hanging about with nothing to mark except a piece of grass must disorientate a player. I happened to be seated near the Waterford selectors (I was a selector of the Waterford Minor team which played in the first match) and drew Seamus Power's attention to the choice of player for a free role. I suggested a player of mobility and skill, a good quick striker; Pat McGrath.

When the teams reappeared for the second half, Pat was entrusted with this important job. He helped defeat Cork by his intelligent positioning and fine striking while Seamie prospered in an area where he distinguished himself for so many years in 2000 nights

marking defender.

So having an extra man is an advantage, no doubt about it, if the right choice of player is made who is clear about what is expected of him but that will be in vain if the whole team

doesn't increase its commitment and sustain it to the final whistle. The situation can be anticipated by enlightened management making meticulous preparation and then prescribing the correct remedies.

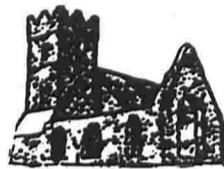

## A Healthy Diet For Children - Solids

WHEN introducing solid food to your babies diet the best choices are pureed fruit and vegetables or special baby cereals made with rice. Foods containing gluten should be avoided before the age of one in order to lessen the risk of an allergic reaction to gluten. Gluten is found in wheat based foods as well as oats, rye and barley. Only introduce one food at a time and allow baby to acquire a taste for individual foods. At about seven or eight months a baby will probably be able to eat mashed or minced food rather than pureed food.

Try to encourage a healthy diet for children from the very start. Try to avoid adding sugar or salt to childrens foods and if buying commercially prepared food make sure it has no added sugar. If when you are cooking food you wish to add salt take a serving out for the children beforehand. Fried foods should be avoided but if you are frying try using olive oil. A child's diet should contain plenty of protein which can be found in red meat, poultry, fish, eggs and cheese. If a child does not eat a meal don't try to make - up for it by giving them

unhealthy snacks or biscuits and cakes. As long as a child is growing well and appears healthy there should be no reason for concern. A balanced daily intake is not always possible with children so it is important to consider the long term, their intake of various foods from week to week.

## Scalloped Fish Pie



Preparation: 20 minutes  
Cooking: 55 minutes  
Serves: 4  
550g/1lb 4oz cod fillet  
1 onion, chopped  
1 bay leaf, optional  
60ml/4 tbsp fresh parsley, chopped  
50g/1 1/2 oz butter  
40g/1 1/2 oz plain

onion and bay leaf, if using. Bring to the boil, cover and simmer for 5 mins until the fish is just tender. Remove fish with a slotted spoon.  
• Take off the skin and carefully flake the cod into large chunks. Arrange in the base of a shallow, ovenproof pie or gratin dish and put to one side. Finely chop the parsley in a processor for a few seconds or use a sharp knife.  
• Heat butter in a pan, stir in the flour and cook for a couple of minutes. Gradually add milk, stirring continuously until thickened and smooth. Season generously with salt and black pepper and stir in the parsley. Pour sauce over flaked cod.  
• Arrange a layer of the finely sliced potatoes with several slices of onion over fish. Season, dot with butter, sprinkle some cheese over top, then repeat with rest of topping ingredients. Bake at 220°C/400°F/Gas Mark 6 for 55 mins.

## Salmon and Dill Scones

Preparation: 25 minutes  
Cooking: 10-15 minutes  
Makes: 8  
225g/8oz self-raising whole-meal flour  
2 tsp baking powder  
50g/2oz butter  
3 tbsp fresh chopped dill  
1 egg, size 3, beaten  
2-3 tbsp milk  
flour for dusting  
225g/8oz smoked salmon  
5 tsp soured cream  
fresh springs of dill to garnish  
lemon wedges and green salad to serve

450ml/16fl oz milk  
Topping  
900g/2lb potatoes, finely sliced  
1 onion, sliced  
50g/1 1/2 oz butter  
50g/1 1/2 oz Gruyere or Cheddar cheese, grated

### METHOD

• Put the cod into a deep frying pan, season with salt and black pepper and pour water over to cover. Add

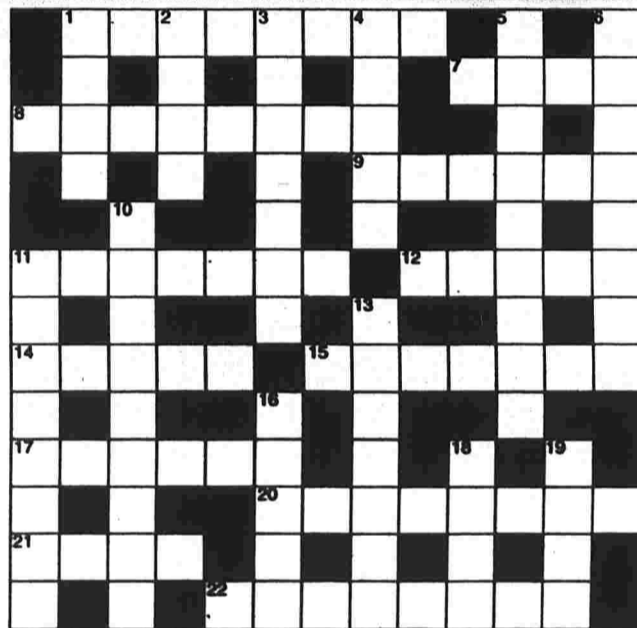
### METHOD

• Preheat oven to 220°C/425°F/Gas Mark 7. Place the flour in a large bowl and mix in the baking powder with a pinch of salt. Add the butter and rub into the flour until the mixture resembles breadcrumbs. Stir in the dill.  
• Stir the egg and enough milk into the flour mixture to form a soft dough. Knead gently on a lightly floured surface until smooth, then roll out to 2.5cm/1in thick. Using a plain 5cm/2 in pastry cutter, cut the dough into 8 rounds, rerolling the trimmings if necessary.  
• Place the rounds on a greased baking sheet and dust with a little flour. Bake for 10-12 minutes until well-risen, pale golden and cooked through. Place the scones on a cake rack to cool.  
• Cut the scones in half horizontally and divide the salmon between them. Top each scone with 2 tsp soured cream, garnish with a sprig of dill and replace the tops. Arrange on a large serving plate with lemon wedges and crisp green salad leaves.

## Family Health

By Dr. Dave Barry

Q. My wife and I have been trying to have a baby for nearly four years now. We recently attended a clinic where I was told that my sperm count was low. I am writing to you to ask your advice on how I would boost my fertility. Can I eat special foods or maybe some exercises?

A. Special foods or doing exercises won't help boost your fertility. There are a couple of things that you can try. Try not to have sex with your wife for a week before she ovulates, which should be fourteen days before her period. Try to keep cool as low sperm count can be caused by the testicles getting too hot. Wear boxer shorts instead of underpants and loose fitting trousers. Avoid sitting in hot baths and try when you are sitting down not to cross your legs. Cut down on drinking alcohol - drink less than 7-8 pints a week. If you smoke, cut this out also, as both smoking and drinking weaken sperm. If these methods don't work, discuss this problem with your own GP.

Q. I have just discovered that my dog is covered in fleas and, as he is allowed all around the house, they must be everywhere. How harmful are they and will I have to get a professional in to get rid of them?

A. There aren't as many fleas in your house as you think as they are low in number. Any fleas that have dropped off your dog will just sit on the carpet or the other furniture until they need their next feed. When they want this, they will jump back on the dog. Fleas don't usually feed on humans if there is a dog around, unless it is gone for a long period of time. Make sure you Hoover the house quite thoroughly and get your dog treated for fleas. Wash the dog's bed and the dog also. There are various flea powders around that can be put on your dog and also on its bed. Ask your vet's or pharmacist's advice on this.

### HOUSEHOLD TIPS

- To make sure buttonholes won't split stitch around them again.
- When cooking bacon with rind, snip into edges to stop it rolling up.
- To cut fresh bread more neatly and accurately, leave it to chill in the freezer for 5 minutes.
- Vaseline brushed daily through the eyebrows with a toothbrush will help maintain their shape.
- If you run out of toothpaste, use baking soda it makes a good substitute.



# Kyne Surprised And Disappointed Over Sole Labour Candidate Decision

Last Monday, Labour party members in the Waterford constituency received notification from the Deputy General Secretary of the Labour party, Marion Boushell, that according to procedures, the Labour branches in Waterford have nominated sitting T.D. Brian O'Shea, as the party's sole candidate to contest the next general election. Nominations closed on September 12 and Brian O'Shea was the unanimous choice.

The news has come as a great disappointment to Dungarvan-based Labour Councillor Billy Kyne who had harboured hopes of a nomination as the second party candidate in Waterford.

The party's selection convention takes place on Sunday 29th September in Connolly Hall, Waterford city at which Deputy O'Shea is expected to be ratified following the wishes of the branches.

## INFERIOR OUTLOOK

In an interview with the 'Dungarvan Leader', Cllr.

Kyne revealed, "I'm never one to look for self advancement just for the sake of it, but I felt in the circumstances and in the strong case we all made in West Waterford to Brian O'Shea, that he would agree to endorse my candidature next time round".

A member of the South Eastern Regional Authority, Dungarvan UDC, the Co. Waterford VEC, the South Eastern Health Board and Waterford County Council, Cllr. Kyne is a well established party figure and is rapidly gaining increasing popularity in the West Waterford area.

Expressing his surprise and disappointment at the directive from the national party executive, Cllr. Kyne wondered what Labour have to fear in trying to build on their vote of almost 12,000 first preferences.

"Why does the party have an inferior outlook than Fine Gael and Fianna Fáil, who are committed to having two candidates at least", he said. These parties, he said, have a built-in recognition of West Waterford and Dungarvan as having entitlement to the identity of a candidate to stand for them.

"The people involved in this low profile consultation process with Deputy O'Shea are bitterly disappointed and some still naive enough to be surprised, like me", he added.

## A MATTER FOR O'SHEA

On being pressed as to what political course of action he will now take, Cllr. Kyne said he will make his next statement at the convention on Sunday week.

"The least we're entitled to is to put our case forward", he stated.

While not relinquishing all hope of a second nomination, Cllr. Kyne said that it is a matter that can be resolved by Deputy O'Shea.

# Bertie Ahern Remains Confident Despite Local Party Turmoils

The damage caused by internal squabbling within the Fianna Fáil party in Waterford was openly acknowledged by party leader Bertie Ahern during a flying visit to the county last Friday.

Mr. Ahern referred directly to the naked divisions within the troubled party ranks on Waterford County Council and pledged to try to resolve the serious internal battles between the opposing factions.

The ongoing dispute over who holds the position of Fianna Fail party whip grabbed headline attention recently when an embittered FF row spilled over into a County Council meeting.

"Our general secretary, Pat Farrell, is presently trying to find a resolution to

what is unquestionably a problem we could do without", Mr. Ahern said during his visit to the western end of the constituency.

"All the parties involved are good Fianna Fail people and good county councillors, and while there is undoubtedly a difference of emphasis and opinion between them, I do not see it as an insurmountable problem", he stated.

### TWO OUT OF FOUR?

Despite the controversial party rumblings, he remained confident that his party would win at least two of the four marginal seats in the electorate at the next general election. "A difficult assignment, but far from an impossible one", was how he described the task.

Mr. Ahern said that Fianna Fail must not go into

the election on a united front, not just in Waterford but nationwide. The target for FF remains an overall majority.

Contrary to a directive issued by the national party executive, the recently held Waterford Selection Convention selected three candidates to contest the election instead of two.

Mr. Ahern said a committee headed by Ray McSharry would consider the problem and make a recommendation to the national executive.

"The final decision will rest with the executive, but I'm certain at the end of the day that they will make the right one", he said. That is seen as a strong indication of the ultimate ratification of the three candidates - outgoing Deputies Brendan

Kenneally and Martin Cullen and Waterford County Councillor Ollie Wilkinson.

"Whether we field two or three candidates, I am absolutely confident that Fianna Fáil will win two of the four Waterford seats", Mr. Ahern added.

### BUSY SCHEDULE

First stop on Mr. Ahern's busy schedule was a meeting in Ballymacarbray with the local Comhairle Ceantair officership before visiting the community centre in Modeligo where he met with local party activists.

Later Mr. Ahern travelled to Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow where he went on brief walkabouts to meet local party members before attending a meeting of the Lismore Comhairle Ceantair.

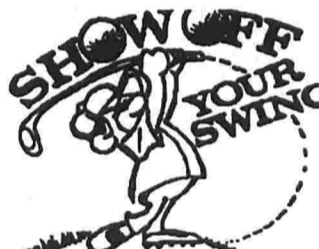

# Exciting Western Board Programme

The Divisional Board have a very attractive weekend programme of matches arranged and for the most part they will be decided on Saturday..

## I.H. FINAL — ABBEYSIDE V. RING

This intermediate hurling divisional final at the Fraher Field is certainly arousing tremendous interest around the division and there will be great disappointment if it does not turn out to be a cracker of a game between the two sides who have survived some splendid contests over the past three months.

Ring, who won the junior hurling and football double in 1991, are playing in their first intermediate hurling divisional final having qualified by beating St. Marys by 2-10 to 1-7; beating Stradbally by 1-14 to 1-8; they defeated Colligan by 1-10 to 0-6 and two weeks ago they came off best after a tremendous semi-final game with Shamrocks whom they defeated on a 1-14 to 1-12 scoreline.

They are an improving panel of hurlers who are responding very well to Finbarr Kelly's coaching and training and fully motivated, they will be a difficult team to beat.

They have a very nice blend of youth and experience in Noel O Murchadha who is a very experienced goalkeeper in both codes. Lorcan O Murchu, Liam Curran, Eanna White, Tomás Maher, Sean Curran, MacDarra MacDonncha, Eoin Mac Craith, Eugene Curran, Carthach Mac Craith, Eamon Crotty, Paudi Walsh, Nioclás Mac Craith, Darragh Breathnach, J. Harty, etc., etc., will be on their lineout and hoping to be among the history makers for the Gaeltacht this year.

Abbeyside, after defeating St. Marys by 2-22 to 1-7, seem to have assumed the mantle of favourites to take the divisional title this year and traditionally this is a role that does not suit them and like most teams the role of underdogs relieves an amount of pressure.

However, it was a commanding display, even if St. Marys were poor opponents. Earlier, Abbeyside had beaten Ballysaggart by 2-17 to 1-8, Shamrocks by 0-10 to 0-5 and Cappoquin by 4-9

to 3-10. In the league section Abbeyside lost to Cappoquin (as they did last year) on a 2-9 to 0-12 scoreline.

In the semi-final, Abbeyside were without their regular goalkeeper Conor Clancy who was out of the country on holidays, but he had an excellent substitute in Eoin Murphy who effected some splendid saves.

Their defence, as usual, will be led by the long serving and most dedicated of players, Michael Collins who will be flanked by Paudie Shields and Gavin Breen. In their half back line, Damien Cliff, Jimmy Healy (another long-serving stalwart) and Dermot Ryan.

Sean 'Hiker' McGrath and Jonathan Moore have struck up an effective midfield partnership and in the forwards the players who have been making an impact all along are Dwaine Moore, Michael Enright, Justin Walsh, Laurence Hurney, Ger Smith, Pat Cunningham, with Michael Cosgrave, Alan Moore, Brian Beatty, etc., etc., to select from.

It is certainly not an easy one to call. I didn't see Ring beat Shamrocks, but I have been told by several that they were most impressive. I did see Abbeyside defeat St. Marys and I must say that they impressed me very much and I feel that Nicky Cashin and his selectors can get as much again out of the team and that they can advance to the county final. However, it is a very open game.

## JUNIOR HURLING SEMI-FINALS

Both semi-finals are expected to be top-class contests on Saturday. At Fraher Field Clashmore and Geraldines will clash in the first semi-final and at Cappoquin at the same time Kilgobinet will take on Lismore or Abbeyside 'B' in the other semi.

Presuming that Lismore will beat Abbeyside on Monday evening, they will provide strong opposition for Kilgobinet again. The teams met in the decider last year and Lismore, fielding a mixture of youthful and experienced players, won the divisional title, but were subsequently beaten in the county final.

Kilgobinet, who have so far defeated all their opponents

ing Ballinameela, Geraldines, Modeligo, Tourin, Ardmore, etc., look to be on top of their game this time and should survive this one and qualify for the divisional final.

At Fraher Field, where Clashmore and neighbours Geraldines meet, the outcome is a difficult one to predict. When they clashed in their final game in the league section they played a most exciting draw (1-10 each) and both have had championship victories over the same opponents.

They are two very strong junior teams and it won't surprise followers of the game if one of them eventually emerge champions.

It is a match that can go either way and may even end in yet another draw as did their last clash.

After a lapse of 34 years, Ardmore regained the Western Minor Football Championship when they defeated the holders, Abbeyside in a very enjoyable divisional final at Fraher Field on Saturday last.

Ardmore's hunger for victory as well as being very clearly shown on the field of play was also very clearly expressed by their huge crowd of cheering supporters on the stand. Abbeyside had been champions for the previous three years and last year defeated Ardmore in a fine game in the divisional final.

On this occasion there was no question about which side deserved to win and at the end of a sporting final, Abbeyside were first to congratulate the new champions.

**WHIRLWIND FASHION**  
Ardmore began in whirlwind fashion and had three points on the board — one by Cathal Hennessey in the first

minute followed by two points from the boot of James O'Donnell by the seventh minute. Then a Wayne Hennessey goal that came floating in from a sideline kick in the 13th minute gave them a decisive lead before Abbeyside had opened their scoring.

The holders then came back into the game and a Colin Keane goal in the 17th minute roused them into action and did something to restore their confidence. But back came Ardmore and a Seamus Prendergast point restored their composure in the 22nd minute. There followed a number of awful wides for Abbeyside who took over control in the last five minutes of the half and had points by John Kyne, James Hayes and Karl Power to leave the score 1-4 to 1-3 in Ardmore's favour at half-time.

Within ten minutes of the restart, Ardmore increased their lead to five points

Seamus Prendergast had their side's third goal in the 47th minute and this put the game out of reach for Abbeyside who nevertheless kept on battling and had their final two scores per Colin Keane and J. The final score of the game was left to Cathal Hennessey who is the team captain.

# County Senior Hurling Final Day At Fraher Field

## Minor Hurling 'B' Final Between Ardmore And Clonea Listed As Curtain Raiser

As always this is a special day on the calendar of events in the county and next Sunday's clash in the Lawlor's Hotel senior hurling championship between the reigning county champions Ballygunner and the western challengers, Lismore, who held the title in 1993 when they relieved Ballygunner of their 1992 title, takes pride of place.

The result will bring to an end the longest running championship in our history and it will be the 68th game of the competition which also embodied the Sargent Cup — a competition for which the same two clubs qualified and which was won by Ballygunner who had two points to spare over Lismore in an enjoyable game at Fraher Field, six weeks ago.

**HISTORIC**

Next Sunday's county senior hurling final will be the 94th hurling final and it will be an historic game in that it will be the first final to be played in this grade since the venue was redeveloped and the new stand erected. In fact it is the first senior hurling final to be played here since 1992 when the final was played on a Saturday in order to allow the winners play in the Munster club championship on the following day. The 'Gunners won that thriller by a single point. And so, this will be the first big test of the 3,000 capacity stand and I have no hesitation in predicting that it will be bulging at the seams before being declared a full-house and patrons arriving later, being forced to watch the game from the banks.

As usual for the final, patrons will come in their thousands in the expectation of seeing a rip-roaring contest between the sides who have survived to do battle for the coveted county title.

So far this year the fare has, for the most part, been poor to mediocre and it was only the odd match that really excited the crowds. So then, we are overdue a cracker and here, I hope, we have the teams that can provide a game loaded with passion, fierce determination and plenty of skill to help compensate patrons for a lot

of the disappointing stuff that has gone before.

Ballygunner are the reigning county champions since they defeated Mount Sion in a replay of the county final in October of last year at Walsh Park. They fared very well in the Munster club championship and have won the 1996 edition of the Sargent Cup by beating Lismore in the final. And they have won all their ten matches, so far this year. With that kind of record, they must line out as strong favourites to retain their title for another year.

Invariably, teams play better in a final, than in any of the preceding rounds, and this must be so here, as far as Lismore are concerned, if they hope to recover the title which they last won in 1993 when beating Passage at Walsh Park. This, incidentally, will be their first opportunity of winning a senior hurling county final at Fraher Field and this again would make the victory all that special.

In their campaign, Lismore played well enough to stay unbeaten up to the final of the league section and qualify for the Sargent Cup final. Their only hiccup all the year was their drawn game with De La Salle, whom they afterwards defeated in a play-off. But even though continuing on a winning streak, not everyone was pleased with their performances. Conceding only ten goals in ten championship matches may highlight the excellence of their defence but at the other end their scoring machine never reached its full potential and scoring only sixteen goals was a poor enough return, considering the poor quality of some of the opposition in their matches.

The message is that Lismore will need to do a

whole lot better than they have been doing if they hope to knock Ballygunner off their pedestal here on next Sunday.

It is being whispered about that Lismore's line-out will be similar to that which played against Passage here two weeks ago. Every player on their panel is experienced, skillful and knowledgeable about what is required to win championships. It is thought that at least nine of the side which beat Passage in the county final in '93 will be included on their team here.

Goalkeeper, young Brendan Landers, is laden with underage medals and now exceeds a dozen from under 14 to under 21. Has played some brilliant matches between the posts for the Black and Amber club and has to be an automatic choice to mind the net. Michael O'Sullivan, holder of an under 21 All Ireland medal, 1992 and holds county championship medals at under 12, 16, 18, 21 and senior. Seamus Prendergast won every honour with the club from under 14 to senior, also Rice Cup and Munster Colleges trophies. James O'Connor, a 1992 minor with Waterford, holds medals in all grades with his club. Brendan Crowley was 'Young Hurler Of The Year' in 1985, another great defender who has won medals in every grade with the club and Munster Colleges as well. Kieran O'Gorman, who missed a couple of games through injury this year, is back and in form at centre half back or at mid-field. He is also the holder of an under 21 medal from 1992 and holds medals in all other grades also. Mark O'Sullivan, a brother of Michael, winner of trophies in every grade with Lismore and was another medal winner with Waterford in Nolan Park in '92. Brendan Prendergast, the oldest player on the side is still a thorn in the side of every opponent who takes him on. He won a British Championship medal with Desmonds in London

in 1985 and won a senior county medal with Lismore in 1991. Paul Prendergast was team captain when Lismore won the title in 1991 and has medals in every grade in hurling. Was on the county team for many years. Paul Quinn is a holder of medals in all grades from under 14 to senior. Dermot Ormond, a 23 year old hurler is also a star of their underage teams and holder of medals in every grade. Dan Shanahan an outstanding county minor who has graduated through the ranks in every grade from under 14 upwards. One of the men they will depend on to send over and under on Sunday. Brendan Ormond a very young player, also a reliable goalie where he served the underage teams for years, he has medals in all grades also. Sean Daly, another permanent county player, he was on the under 21 team in '92 and has won every honour in hurling with the club from under 14 to senior. Dave Bennett, a player who has figured in the scoring in the county minor and under 21 grades, a skillful player who has the ability to snatch scores from difficult positions around the forward line. He too, has lots of championship trophies in the underage grades.

Their substitute bench will have a number of very able deputies for players that may have to be replaced. They include players who have served the club throughout their period of supremacy at underage level in the county and all have county final experience in some grade or other. They include players like Michael Hickey, a match winner on a few occasions, Owen Bennett, Billy Walsh, David Howard, Alan Dunne, Brendan Lawton, Anthony Whelan, Peter Barry, Robert O'Sullivan, etc.

With so much talent available to them Lismore should be very difficult to beat and will be very difficult to overcome, if all their players hit top form on the day.

Against the reigning coun-

ty champions they must hit top form if they are to have a chance of winning and dethroning the 'Gunners who reckon that they always play their best hurling in Dungarvan.

Ballygunner who won three county titles in a row, 1966, '67 and '68, won several underage county titles which enabled them to make a strong bid at senior level in 1992. They surrendered their title to Lismore in 1993 and recovered it last year when defeating Mount Sion in a replay.

They are undefeated this year and in the semi final against Ballyduff they were in brilliant form.

Many of the players in their line out have made the headlines also and their inclusion on the various county teams have made some of the names to become very well known in G.A.A. households around the county.

Goalkeeper Ray Whitty, a very safe keeper for his club and county and like the vast majority of his team-mates he has titles in all grades

from under 14 to senior. From goalkeeper to their number 15 they are very well endowed with players who are skillful and committed. In fact their number 15 in the semi final, Tony Carroll was the odd man out in that he was the only player who was not on their first fifteen for last year's county final. Obviously the policy of their selectors is to persevere with the same team of players and the results are there for all to see.

Cormac Laphorne, Nial Warren and Darragh Laphorne will be their full back line behind Stephen Frampton, Fergal Hartley and Rory O'Sullivan (who is brother of Billy and Darragh), who will be in the half back line. In the middle of the field Paul Power and Liam Whitty, and in attack Mick O'Mahoney, Paul Flynn, Sean Lyons, Billy O'Sullivan, David Codd and Tony Carroll will complete the side to represent the champions in defence of their title.

## Ardmore Take On Clonea

This will be the first ever meeting of these clubs in a hurling championship so to each other the opposition is much of an unknown quantity. In fact the result will make one or other of the team county minor hurling champions for the first time, so each is out to make its own little bit of history.

Ardmore, western champions, did achieve the minor hurling and football western double back in 1962, but were beaten by Mount Sion in the hurling county final and they lost to Tramore in football. Interestingly, there is still a strong link with the 1962 era in the Ardmore club and this year's minor teams. Pat Pender, who is the present chairman of the Ardmore juvenile club was a player in the 1962 finals and Paddy Foley who was club secretary then, is still serving as the secretary of the juvenile club.

In recent years, thanks to the dedication of a great group of people, juvenile hurling and football and now minor in both grades, is making tremendous strides and given a few more years, Ardmore will surely make an overdue breakthrough at adult level.

Their western final game against a fine Cappoquin team was a thriller and was the best seen in this grade for a lone while. In the league section Ardmore had also beaten Cappoquin and others including Stradbally, Naomh Brid, An Gaeltacht, etc.

There is little difference in their hurling and football lineouts and on Saturday

when winning the minor football title from Abbey-side, they fielded most of the players who will line out on Sunday in the county hurling final. It is thirteen aside, as decided by County Board.

James O'Donnell will be Ardmore's keeper and having guarded his net very well throughout the Western campaign, he will be relied upon to do as well again here. In the full backline Declan Pender and Patrick Conway will be in their last line of defence; in front of them will be Brian Lenane, Austin Flavin and Damien Lenane. At centre field Seamus Prendergast and John Conway will hold the fort and in the half forward posi-

tions they will have Wayne Hennessey, Ciaran Foley, at centre forward and who is their top scorer to date with Cathal Hennessey on the other wing. Ardmore's two inside forwards will be Michael Supple and Seamus Budds.

All the above names will have been written very many times in match previews and reports as the vast majority of them are sons of great players who have served the club down through the years in the good and the bad times.

The same applied to the members who manage the present minor teams — John Hennessey, Paddy Foley, John O'Donnell, Pat Pren-

dergast and Austin Flavin.

Clonea, as I have written, are very much an unknown quantity but those who have seen them perform and beat teams like Ballyduff / Butlerstown, St. Mary's, Dunhill / Fenor, etc. have been impressed with them and express the opinion that they will not be easy to overcome.

Here in this side of the county, the big support will be for Ardmore and with a big crowd 'rooting' for them, the lads will be encouraged to play to top form and hopefully take home their first ever minor hurling title.

It will certainly prove to be a top-class curtain raiser and patrons are advised to come along early.

## Under-17 Hurling and Football Competitions

The county coaching and games development committee are proposing to run 9-a-side tournaments in both hurling and football in conjunction with the Divisional and County Boards. The competitions will be played on reduced pitches, 20m. line to 20m. line.

Details are as follows — (1) To be run by above committee in conjunction with both divisional boards; (2) To be optional for all clubs; (3) To be for under-17 — on age as far as possible; (4) Teams to be 9-a-side with panels of 12; (5) To be played on reduced pitches — 20m. line to 20m. line; (6)

Competition goes ahead regardless of number of teams; (7) Emphasis on participation — prizes for all teams who fully complete programme, fair play competition, etc.; (8) To be played on a countywide basis; (9) To be played on a home/away basis — no neutral grounds; (10) In case of clash with Nenagh Co-op team, school team, etc., they get preference; (11) No postponements; (12) Hurling to start on Sept. 29 and playing to finish, every weekend; (13) Football to start in Jan. 1997 and playing to finish, every weekend; (14) Each team provide referee and

pay £20 entry fee; (15) Home players pay £1 to cover referee's expenses; (16) The away team provides referee; (17) Club to be fined £20 for failing to fulfil fixture; (18) All clubs who wish to participate must sign and countersign letter agreeing to abide by rules and conditions; (19) From third week onwards, tables and results to be published in papers; (20) Entry fee of £20 for each club; (21) Divisional Boards to contribute £250 each; (22) Gala presentation night at end of competition — all teams who completed full programme to be invited.
