Wheelie Bin System

Householders in various parts of Dungarvan were last Wednesday issued with wheelie bins as part of a pilot scheme organised by the local Urban Council. During the normal refuse collection.

Council workers delivered wheelie bins to 534 households at Western Terrace, Cloneety, Congress Villas, Cathal Brugha Place, Silversprings, Lisfennel, The Orchard, St. Garvan's Terrace, Caseyville, St. Patrick's Crescent, Keating Street, Lismore Avenue, Comeragh Crescent, Hillview Drive, Spring Marquis, Cappoquin road,

The purpose of the scheme, which is being initially introduced on a trial basis along the Wednesday collection route for six weeks, is to gauge the feasi-

bility of a wheeled refuse collection system for the entire urban area.



Dungarvan Architect Involved In Proposed Shaws Redevelopment

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As reported in last week's edition, Shaws & Sons Ltd. have applied to Dungarvan UDC for full planning permission for the complete redevelopment of their branch outlet at Main Street, Dungarvan.

Submitted by local architect Muiris O Críostóir in association with Edmund Fitzgerald Selby, the proposed development calls for the complete demolition of the existing Shaws building at 14 - 16, Main Street, including part of the property known as the Methodist Church in Friary Street.

The well known Main Street landmark, which is one of the largest stores in Dungarvan, would be replaced by a modern two storey building, some 1,000 square feet larger than the existing premises.

JULY '97 DEADLINE

The Shaws project is the latest application to be made under the current urban renewal scheme, the deadline for which is 31st July next year. To qualify for the many tax incentives available under the scheme, all projects including that envisaged for Shaws, have to be completed within the statutory time frame.

Know Your Rights

What If

QUESTION

What if I lose my Revenue & Social Insurance Number (RSI No.).

ANSWER

Ring or call in to your local Social Welfare Office give them your full name, address and date of birth and they will give it to you.

QUESTION

What if I lose my driving licence.

ANSWER

You should get a duplicate licence by completing form D800 and enclosing 2 photographs and applying to your local Motor Taxation Office - there is a fee of £4.

Please note if you have not renewed your driving licence for over 10 years you must do a driving test again.

QUESTION

What if I lose my bus pass (free travel).

You should get a Replacement Pass Form St. 27 from your local Social Welfare Office which you should get stamped by your local Garda Station. This should be sent to the Free Travel Section, Pension Service Office, College Road, Sligo.

QUESTION

What if I lose my Medical Card.

ANSWER

Notify your local Health Board Office from which you got the card. They will issue you a duplicate card, and in the interim, in case you need to attend your G.P. before the new card arrives, will give you your Medical Card Number.

QUESTION

What if I lose my passport.

ANSWER

You should report the matter to the Gardai or local police if abroad. You should get from the Passport Office or Irish Embassy/Consulate or local Post Office - form Pas L - "Statement on loss of passport" which you must fill out explaining the circumstances of loss and have witnessed by Gardai or local police and return to Passport Office/Consulate. If you require a new passport you will have to complete the normal PAS 1 application form and send all the relevant documentation and the full fee for the passport you require.



Strong Public Reaction To Introduction Of Wheelie Bin System

wheelie bin has been both swift and strong. While some householders have welcomed the new system as a means of alleviating the widespread litter problem caused by opened rubbish bags, others view the new wheeled refuse bin as a major hindrance and unnecessary burden.

Elderly people and residents of terraced houses in particular have complained of the huge task of transporting their wheelie bin through the front door, in some cases having to negotiate steps. The only alternative, they complain, is to leave the bin on the street or in the front garden, (not exactly conducive to Tidy

Towns results!).

"CAN SEE HEALTH
HAZARD"

A public meeting was held last Saturday in the Dungarvan Pipe Band hall where angry residents from estates affected by the recent wheelie bin syndrome met to express their anger.

Organised by Ann Hart of Congress Villas, a huge crowd was present includ-ing local Urban Councillors, Billy Kyne and Lar

Speaking to the 'Dungar-van Leader', Mrs. Hart said it was agreed by a majority decision at the meeting, to use the usual plastic rubbish bags on Wednesday's (today's) collection rather than the allotted wheelie bins. It was also decided that the residents send a deputation to the next meet-

ing of the Urban Council.
"People are very angry and prepared to stand on this issue", declared Mrs. Hart who warned that she could see a health hazard developing in the town if the Council is not prepared to compromise on the mat-

"People have no intentions of using their wheelie bins", she further stated.

Should the feasibility study prove successful and the wheelie bin system be introduced on a wide scale, Mrs. Hart claimed that there will eventually be a fee for weekly collections. Combined with water rates, PAYE, and general taxes, Mrs. Hart said any additional fee will have serious financial repercussions for many households in the

A petition against the introduction of a wheeled refuse collection system in Dungarvan has already received considerable support in the area.

> POSSIBLE REFUSE CHARGE

The wheelie bin system has been in operation in Waterford county since July 1992, where the present cost per tag in the county is

Although County Manager Donal Connolly insists he's keeping "an open mind" with regard to possible domestic refuse collection charges, he previously proposed such a charge in '95 when he remained adamant that the need for a charge would be inevitable in the coming years.

The cost to the Council of

the consignment of new wheelie bins was in the re-gion of £16,000. Added to this the fact that a specially equipped lorry has been hired from Waterford County Council for the job and it's certainly plausible that a refuse charge will be implemented to recoup these expenses should the study prove successful.

Indeed the matter of financing a wheelie bin system throughout the urban area will be discussed as part of a report on the re-sults of the feasibility study at the November meeting of the UDC

Meanwhile the Council has stated that, as with the existing system, there is no charge for wheelie bin col-

troduce a charge for refuse collection in the future will be a matter for the elected members of the Council having regard to the overall financing of services.

ASK FOR **CO-OPERATION**

Dungarvan Town Clerk Raymond Moloney has ap-pealed to the public to bear with the Council during this trial period and has asked for householders' cooperation in using the wheelie bins provided by the local authority. Only with the full cooperation of the residents involved will the Council be accurately able to gauge the success of the scheme.

The wheelie bin study commenced today, (October 9th), and is expected to be completed in 6 weeks time.

Mr. Moloney revealed that a number of people have already expressed their concern at the sight of the wheelie bins and asked the Council if they could have a smaller bin.

As the object of the study is to identify and try to overcome any operational difficulties that might arise, bins of a smaller capacity will be made available if required.

Dungarvan UDC has stressed that the accuracy of the study is dependent on the full cooperation of the householders, on the selected route, and a feedback from those householders regarding the system. Should any householder have any

study they should contact members of the Council staff at the Town Hall who will discuss their concerns.

In a press statement issued by the local Council last Monday it was revealed that wheelie bin refuse collection systems have operated successfully in a large number of towns around the country including Youghal, Clonmel and Carrick-on-

Furthermore the feasibility study has the backing of the ATGWU which represents the operators and with whom discussions were held prior to undertaking

the study.
WHY CHANGE THE **CURRENT SYSTEM?**

There are a number of reasons cited for the introduction of a wheeled refuse collection service in the town to replace the existing manual collection system.

In 1994, the County Council, together with Waterford Corporation, commissioned a Joint Waste Management Strategy Study for both the city and county. Prepared by the firm of J.B. Barry and Partners, consulting engineers, a major recommendation of the study was that Dungarvan and Waterford city be changed over to a wheelie bin system, thereby achieving economies in both waste collection and transportation services.

The wheelie bin method was also favoured in a report by the County Council's Safety Advisors on the existing refuse collection operation in Dungarvan.

Coupled to this is the fact that higher environmental standards are now being required in tandem with the requirements of the Safety, Health and Welfare at Work Act 1989.

These regulations, particularly in relation to the lifting of loads, mean that the current system where the Council's refuse collectors manually lift refuse bins, bags, barrels, boxes, etc., can no longer be tolerated.

Another factor to be taken into consideration is the Council's 12 year old refuse lorry, which is now nearing the end of its useful life and can no longer be maintained at a reasonable cost. As its replacement will soon have to be considered, now is deemed an opportune time to move to a wheelie bin collection sys-







Questions Surrounding 48 Hour Week Directive Still Unanswered

Recent statements from party leaders on the prospects of tax cuts in the forthcoming budget have merely served to deflect critical media comment away from a pending EU Directive, which is set to have a serious impact on weekly working time.

new European directive concerning certain aspects of the organisation of working time, due to be introduced

by 23rd November next. While this directive has several elements, the most important is article 6 relating to maximum weekly working time which stipulates that the average working time for each 7 day period including overtime does not exceed 48 hours. The provisions of this directive apply to all workers, including part-time, shift, night, temporary and contract workers, in keeping with the need to protect the safety and health of

workers.
NO INFORMATION

According to local Labour Councillor, Billy Kyne, the directive impacts across a wide range of working hour practices including shift and time off patterns.

Speaking to the 'Dungar-van Leader', Cllr. Kyne said that across the country and in this county, hundreds of workers have no exact infor-

Directive 93/104/EL is the mation on how this directive will affect them.

Cllr. Kyne stressed that the workers concerned by this directive are not "being greedy" or trying to demand "unreasonable working patterns and earnings". Rather, these workers are in well organised employment where workers rights are generally recognised and respected

Many of the workers affected by the 48 hour a week directive, he revealed, are employed in the dairy sector and similar seasonal indus-

"Historically, these working patterns have a seasonal peak level, which, with ongoing rationalisation, results in core working teams having to match production demands and hence there's a tendency for these workers to be affected by the 48 hour directive", he explained.

Taking a critical view of whether the 48 hour week directive will result in extra employment being created, Cllr. Kyne declared, "this is patently not going to hap-

speaking about. Companies like those have ongoing quota and other problems and far from being a recruitment opportunity, the new directive is a further complication to an already complex situation", he added.
WILL HOURS BE

CAPPED?

Cllr. Kyne said he has contacted the Irish Congress of Trade Unions (ICTU), on the matter as well as the office of the Junior Minister of State at the Department of Enterprise and Employment,

"Both offered some vague or general comments", said Kyne, "but the most critical question of all would not or could not be answered"

"My queries to both the Junior Minister and the ICTU have not got any definite reply", he continued, "they just cannot answer this question; 'If a worker's earning pattern over a year is in excess of 48 hours per week, will their hours be capped?"

Nothing has been offered as a straight answer to this straight forward question, he

slammed.
DO T.D.'S KNOW? Pointing out that the directive must be implemented by November 23, the Abbey-

'surely our four T.D.'s know all about this directive and surely they may be able to answer specific questions from their constituents'

Who can answer these reasonable questions from reasonable workers", he asked, adding that the directive will also impact on employers who, in the dairy industry specifically, have significant challenges

to face.

"As a shop steward and trade union activist, Cllr. Kyne said he has faith in the ICTU. He addd however that in their rush to support a new national understanding, the ICTU "continue to ignore, more and more, the exploitation of young and unskilled workers right across the board."

"This 48 hour directive can be avoided, just like many other worker friendly legislation is being ignored in the more exploited areas of employment.
"We have been told that no

EXTENSION **WORK TO** WATERFORD REGIONAL HOSPITAL TO **COMMENCE**

"Building work on the 32 bed extension to Ward Block 5 and on the physiotherapy department at Waterford Regional Hospital is set to commence in the next couple of weeks."

This good news was recently announced by Brian O'Shea T.D., Minister of State at the Department of Health.

The Minister said that the planning procedures for the latest phase of the hospital's development have been completed and contracts for the building, mechanical and electrical aspects of the project will be signed shortly.
"These latest development

12 months to complete, with the overall cost in excess of £1.3m," Mr. O'Shea added. On completion, the ward will serve as a permanent home for ENT patients at the hospital.

When taken in conjunction with other projects planned or ongoing in the con-stituency such as the new 27 bed unit planned for St. Joseph's, Dungarvan (which is now past the closing date for tenders), Minister O'Shea added that these developments are evidence of this Government's commitment to developing services for patients from Waterford and the South East.

However, these will invariably include topics such as sources of finance, dealing with banks, health and safety, quality control, recruitment, insurance etc.

The ultimate aim of the Programme is to enhance the decision making process within the business.

was the day that the link between Taranto in Southern Italy and Shanrahan in Clogheen was re-established after 1,300 years.

In the 7th century, a holy man named Cathal, having spent several years in St. Carthage's University, Lismore crossed over the Knockmealdown mountains to establish a monastic settlement of Rathcua, later known as Rahan and to this day known as Shanrahan.

After some years in Shanrahan, Cathal ventured on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. On his return journey, he was shipwrecked off the south Italian coast and on finding that the people of that area had reverted to paganism, he resolved to remain among them and convert them back to Christianity. Within a few years Cathal, now called Cataldo, had been elected by the people of Taranto as their bishop. Today St. Cataldo (in Latin Cathaldus) is the patron saint of Southern Italy and such is the popularity of the saint that over 150 churches in the region are called after him.

Last Sunday 1300 years after Cathal had left Ireland, an important delegation from Italy made the return journey. Monsignor Michael Olden P.P., S.S. Peter and Paul's, Clonmel gave the homily on the subject of St. Catheldus. Mons. Dr. Comite spoke to the congregation through interpreter, Signor Farinella and presented a gold replica of the Cross to his Lordship William Lee, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore.

After Mass people made their way to Shanrahan where Edmund O'Riordan, local historian spoke to the crowd on the history of Shanrahan and the Bronze Age Cairn on the top of Knockshanhullion.

Veale and Jimmy Johnson another crack at it in 1997, so here's to next year.



Make The Most Of Your Shape

YOU might not think that now is a good time to start redesigning your garden if you're unhappy with the way it looks. But you'd be wrong.

You can change the shape and "feel" of your garden in many simple ways and by planning it now - and, indeed by doing some of the work throughout the winter months when conditions are right - you could have a completely "new look" by next spring.

Gardens are a place of relaxation and in keeping with this, the style of the features in the garden will dramatically alter the atmosphere.

Patios, pathways, walls, and even barbecues, are all classed as features, playing an integral part in the over-

But in the first instance, the shape of the garden has to be considered.

Long thin gardens tend to suffer from a lack of imagination. It's easy to just border the edges. No, be more adventurous by breaking up the length by creating a figure of eight through the garden - and using an archway across the middle to make an attractive centrepiece.

This will widen the top half of the garden and conveniently hide the vegetable patch at the other end!

Using strong shapes, such as a circular lawn, will widen the garden. Be creating smaller areas along the length (using screening, etc.) an air of mystery develops. Visitors have to search for the rest of the garden and so the length becomes an asset and the width is disquised.

When designing a square-shaped garden, try to avoid angular and rigid lines. Semi-circular patios work well to soften the square and can be complemented by curved

A square can leave the gardener feeling boxed in but this is easily offset using diagonal or circular patterns any paving, either in paths or patios.

With a small garden be careful not to overcrowd it with design features. Keep to simple clean lines on a range of heights to create the illusion of size.

With short but wide gardens, the length can be extended with some visual trickery. To take the focus away from the width, bring the sides in using raised borders and build archways to suggest depth of perspective.

Using different heights

of borders towards the back of the plot will also have the effect of lengthening appearance, as will a path that narrows the further away from the house it is. A patio that is thinner than the width of the garden, covered with pot plants, will complement the effect.

If your sight is on a slope, don't despair. Height variations allow for creative inlaid steps, and will make the most of a difficult situation.

Highlighting the slope, using changes in levels of borders and walls around the garden can look fantastic. If the slope is very steep, build permanent seats into a man-made level breaker (in the slope) to accentuate the height difference.

With any form of major structural change in a garden, consult an expert before beginning. Your local builders merchants can advise on all things including paving slabs, bricks, timber, etc.

DAIRYING

Replacement Helfers

Too many replacements are calving down too small. Be generous with grass to them. If grass is tight, feed them 1 - 2lbs of meals. Keep the thrive going or they will not calve down at 550 kgs. Poor weanlings if they are to calve in Spring 1988 must be fed 3 - 4lbs of meal.

 Prevent parasites such as hoose and stomach worms by good grazing management and dosing.

SOIL TESTING

Soil test results from Teagasc at Johnstown Castle are excellent when it comes to spending your money wisely and making good judgements about fertiliser levels. This is even more important in modern times, given the increasing complexity of fertilisers and the higher nutrient value of slurry from modern slurry tanks.

A sample or two each year from both grazing and silage ground will keep a close eye on how fertiliser levels are going. This is the ideal time of the year for taking samples before any of next winter's slurry or fertiliser goes out.

CATTLE

Prevention Of Viral Pneumonia

Outbreaks of viral pneumonia can be prevented if a few simple management practices are carried out -

- Where possible, purchase only from known sources.
- Do not mix different age groups of animals.
- Isolate brought-in animals from the main herd for at least two weeks.
- Get expert advice on adequacy of housing design and ventilation.
- Reduce stocking levels in fattening units if you push up numbers you must increase ventilation.
- Separate stressful activities such as weaning, castration, dehoming, dosing, introduction of unfamiliar comrades. Allow at least 2/3 weeks between weaning and sale.
- Vaccination against the primary causes of respiratory disease/pneumonia - R.S.V., I.B.R. and P13 viruses. This should be started well in advance of animals moving from the home farm with the initial vaccination against R.S.V.

Remember there is no simple answer. A solution to viral pneumonia/respiratory disease lies in the implementation of all the measures mentioned where appropriate.

TILLAGE

Winter Barley

Complete sowing of winter barley as soon as possible. Higher seeding rates of 160 - 170 kg/ha (10 - 11 st/acre) should be used to compensate for the later sowing. The main varieties include Pastoral (yield rating 101) and Gaelic (100). Gaelic is favoured by later sowing but it does not appear to yield as well in the southern part of the country. Intro (99) is a tall variety with very large seed. Some of the newer malting barley varieties also look promising. These include Regina (104), Fanfare (104), Gleam (104) and Prelude (101).

BYDV

September sown crops which are now at the 2 - 3 leaf stage should be sprayed for BYDV using a contact aphicide. A follow up spray will be required in early November. **Winter Oats**

Winter oats should be sown from October and mid November using a seeding rate of 160 - 190 kg/ha (10 - 12 stone/ac.) The winter oats list is restricted to two varieties - Barra and Kermit. Barra comprises 93% of seed and even though it is 4% behind Kermit in yield rating, it is the variety of choice because of superior KPH. Both are spring varieties and as such are susceptible to frost damage.

Where oats are grown continuously, there is a risk of Oat Mosaic Virus. Kermit appears to be more susceptible than Barra to OMV.

Winter Wheat

Winter wheat drilling may also commence now especially where there is a large acreage to be sown. Lower seeding rates - 160 kg/ha (10 stone/ac) can be used at this stage assuming all other soil conditions are correct. Varieties are similar to those available in 1995/96. Reaper is added to the list while Haven, Woodstock and Riband are dropped. Brigadier, Hussar and Ritmo will be the main varieties to choose from.

Quota Usage Rules

Committee Chairman, Harry Gray, has called on the Department of Agriculture to be flexible in their interpretation of the new rules applying to claw back on the nonusage of sheep quota. Mr. Gray said that it is not acceptable that the Department would take quota off producers, who for reasons outside their own control were unable to meet the necessary usage criteria in 1996.

Mr. Gray said that the Department must be flexible in applying the exceptional circumstances rulings on non-quota usage.

The Waterford Sheep Chairman pointed out that in 1996 producers must use at least 70% of their Ewe Premium Quota every year, otherwise the part not used will be forfeited and claimed back to the

ICMSA Calls For Changes In **Timing Of** Lamb **Imports**

Eamon O'Rourke, Chair-man of the ICMSA Sheep Committee has called on the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry to seek changes in the timing of lamb imports into the EU.

He said the present system of lamb imports is liable to cause unstable markers and affect the incomes of the Community's sheep farmers.

"With the EU less than 90 per cent self sufficient in sheep meat, imports are required. The Minister should seek that the imports of sheep meat to the EU be divided evenly throughout the year so that it does not cause serious market disruption at certain times," said Mr. O'Rourke.

"A large quantity of imports at any time will put a downward pressure on sheep meat prices whereas an even flow of imports would not destabilise the

IFA Call For Halving of **REPS Compliance Checks**

Waterford IFA Rural Development Committee Chairman, Anthony Ryan, has called on the Minister for Agriculture Ivan Yates to reduce by half the number of inspections carried out by the Department of Agriculture on REPS farmers who are due second instalment payments. This reduction is necessary given the improved level of compliance in the REPS scheme which has seen the number of farmers penalised reduc-ing from 25% to 8%.

Mr. Ryan said that reducing the compliance checks will ensure that there is not a build-up of farmers who are due second instalment payments towards the end of the year. To-date 2,000 farmers have been paid over £7 million in second instalwill be the main varieties to choose from.

ment payments, but a further 5,000 farmers would have been due payment worth £17.5 million by the end of October. Reducing the number of compliance checks will ensure that payment can be made earlier. Given the very serious income crisis that many livestock farmers are facing this winter, earlier payments are necessary to maintain cashflow," Mr. Ryan pointed out.

Continuing, the Waterford Rural Development Committee Chairman said the Department of Agriculture has informed IFA that the second half of the REPS payments due to farmers who were approved after February 20 will be made once the six month period has elapsed. ICMSA Urges Farmers To Be Moneywise

"Take care with expenditure" was the message delivered to farmers from the World Ploughing Championships in Carlow by Frank Allen, President of ICMSA.

Mr. Allen said: "The number of uncertainties governing farming over the next few years and the only certainty of changing times, make it prudent for farmers to be extra careful with their finances and not to undertake expenditure on unnecessary purchases.
"Pending the outcome of

the inevitable changes in regulations governing pro-duction and their affects on farming, farmers should concentrate on making their present enterprises more efficient through reducing their overhead costs, and getting the best possible value for their current expenditure on feed, fertiliser,

In this regard agri-firms must take note of the downward trend in the prices of all farm products, and they must keep their prices in line.

"That particularly applies to lend institutions which really have great scope for reducing their lending rates. Evidence of this scope can be got from the obvious difference between the 1% to 3% interest given on the lower end of deposits and savings, and the 11% to 14% interest charged on borrowings. These differences are reflected in the huge annual profits built mostly at the expense of customers through ever increasing transaction charges and in-

Mr. Allen said that legislation gave poor protection to the users of lending institutions — it gave more protection to the institutions than to the customers.

ESB/ICMSA Launch Night Saver'





the old library building in Friary Street, said he is delighted to be associated with the project.

The design of the proposed development, he felt, would greatly enhance and compliment the existing street architecture of the

area.
"We propose to use natural materials with hand painted timber signs", he explained. New shop frontages would also be constructed at Main Street and Friary Street.

Describing the develop-ment, Mr. O Críostóir said that when completed, the building would be in keep-ing with similar high class stores throughout the country. The total retail space in the new Shaws outlet would be 11,175 sq. ft. distributed between two floors.

A unique and attractive feature of the project is the elegant staircase approach to the first floor complete with a glazed roof giving natural light. Throughout the redeveloped building a sophisticated heating and cooling system will add greatly to the comfort of the shopper while the spacious premises will also feature a high level of internal light-

The interior of the premises is designed to cater a number of various departments, each with modern high ceilings.
With access to both Main

Street and Friary Street, the Shaws development would be ideally located close to the proposed new shopping centre on Main Street.

Known historically as the 'Irish Woolen Hall' the proposed transformation of the existing Shaws outlet into an up-to-date chain store would greatly enhance Dungarvan's shopping attraction, thereby creating many financial spin-offs for the town.

"This development", declared Mr. O Críostóir, will ensure the potential of Shaws in the town into the next century'


A decision by Waterford County Manager on whether to grant the project full planning permission is due by the end of Novem-
