Cllr. Advocates Trial Of One Way System

Rumours in relation to the introduction of one sided parking on Main Street in Cappoquin were rejected out of hand this week by Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly.

Cllr. Nora Flynn raised the issue at last Monday's Waterford County Council meeting when she asked the Manager if there was any truth in the rumours and whether the Council would introduce a one way system in the congested street, particularly at the lower end.

Such a system should be introduced on a trial basis, she submitted, and all concerned, together with the Gardai, should meet to discuss and look at the situation "like sensible people".

Likewise, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson said he would welcome a meeting of all groups involved but he was not so sure there would be an easy answer.

Mr. Connolly however disclosed that the Council have just completed a property acquisition on Main

Street which may prove suitable as a car park.

With regard to a one way system, County Engineer John O'Flynn said previous proposals by the Council for a one way system at Main Street were met with strong local opposition. The acute angle bend at the church at the top of the street would create difficulties, he added while one sided parking could only be introduced if a car park is developed.

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Ballinagoul Residents Highlight Danger To Pedestrians

Residents in the scenic Ring area of Ballinagoul have once again highlighted the immediate danger to children and pedestrians as a result of speeding traffic on the road through the village.

The problem was raised some two years ago and reported exclusively in the 'Dungarvan Leader' after which Waterford County Council erected a sign in the area.

Now however, the issue has again raised its ugly

head amid growing fears that an accident may soon happen in the growing community which is home to over 30 children and many young families.

Speaking at last Monday's meeting of Waterford Co. Council, Cllr. Tony Wright said the road in Ballinagoul slopes steeply down to the beach. Taking into consideration the increased number of houses in the area, including Council houses, Cllr. Wright warned that

Know Your Rights

QUESTION

Myself and my husband are both coming up to 66 years of age. He was self-employed all his life - small shopkeeper - and was over 56 in 1988 when PRSI was introduced for the self-employed. We won't get a Contributory Old Age Pension as a result. We do have savings from the sale of the shop of £60,000. Will we qualify for a pension? What if my husband died how would the savings affect me? What about the PRSI he paid?

ANSWER

As a married couple you could have £5,975 savings and qualify for a full Non-Contributory Old Age Pension. If you are younger than your husband, he would get a Personal Rate, maximum £64.50 and an Adult Dependent Rate for you of £38.50. When you are 66 you can apply for a pension in your own right.

A married couple can have up to £70,455 and still qualify for £10 of a pension.

In your situation of £60,000 he would get £12.50 Personal rate and £12.50 for you as his dependent.

If you spend some of this money, e.g. doing up the house - then you would ask Social welfare to re-assess your entitlement.

If either of you dies the survivor will qualify for a Contributory Widow/ers Pension as a result of the PRSI your husband paid, which will not be affected by your savings. As you will qualify for Non-Contributory Old Age Pension you cannot claim a refund on the PRSI you've paid.

You should apply for the pension 3 months before reaching 66 years. As there is just the two of you, you should at the same time apply for a free Electricity/Gas allowance and TV Licence. If you haven't already you should apply also to your Health Board for a Medical Card.

Deasy Speaks Out On Transport Problem For Schoolchildren

The plight of a number of children with special needs in the Dungarvan area who are unable to travel to the Presentation Primary School in Clonmel due to a lack of suitable transport was highlighted in the Dail recently by Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy.

Deputy Deasy asked the Minister for Education if she will provide alternative arrangements for these children who have enrolled at a special class in the Clonmel school for pupils with speech and language disorder.

Minister Niamh Bhreathnach replied that she was

aware of the case referred to by Deputy Deasy and said her Department is currently engaged in urgent efforts to put suitable transport arrangements in place for the children.

"My Department makes every effort to provide school transport for children attending special schools and classes on either scheduled or special services", she stated.

"Because of the dispersed locations of the children (8 in total) it has not proved possible to arrange a transport service to the class. Neither have the children's

parents found it possible to make alternative arrangements within the limits of the grant assistance offered in this case", continued Minister Bhreathnach.

In view of these developments and in order to facili-

tate the children in question, she further stated, the Dept. is now urgently examining ways of overcoming the present difficulty and it is hoped that a satisfactory solution can be devised in the near future.

Change Unavoidable Says INTO Boss

Society is changing and changing rapidly. And these changes are placing huge demands on our schools and teachers. That was the opening message from an address by INTO Assistant General Secretary, John Carr, when he visited Waterford teachers.

At a gathering in the Granville Hotel, Mr. Carr spelled out the demands that would fall on teachers as Irish society changes rapidly. "Over the coming years, we will have more demands on our teachers and schools, more accountability, an ever-broadening knowledge-base to teach, more culturally diverse groups of pupils, more management issues — in short: more work," Mr. Carr told his audience.

"In the current age change is unavoidable. But change is neither inherently good, bad or neutral. And in this changing world, we have a

relatively static school system. This poses a pitfall for any education system — the inherent time-lag between a system's response to the needs of the nation it serves," Mr. Carr went on.

"And in all this, a huge fund of professional assertiveness is going to be needed over the next few years," he continued, "if teachers are to avoid crashing under the weight of incessant demands."

Mr. Carr's comments came at a time when the INTO is putting the Education White Paper under the microscope.

A special one-day congress of delegates from all over the country will assemble in Galway next week for this purpose. Sixteen delegates from Waterford, Dungarvan and West Waterford will attend, and aspirations of the document will be very closely examined by teachers' representatives.

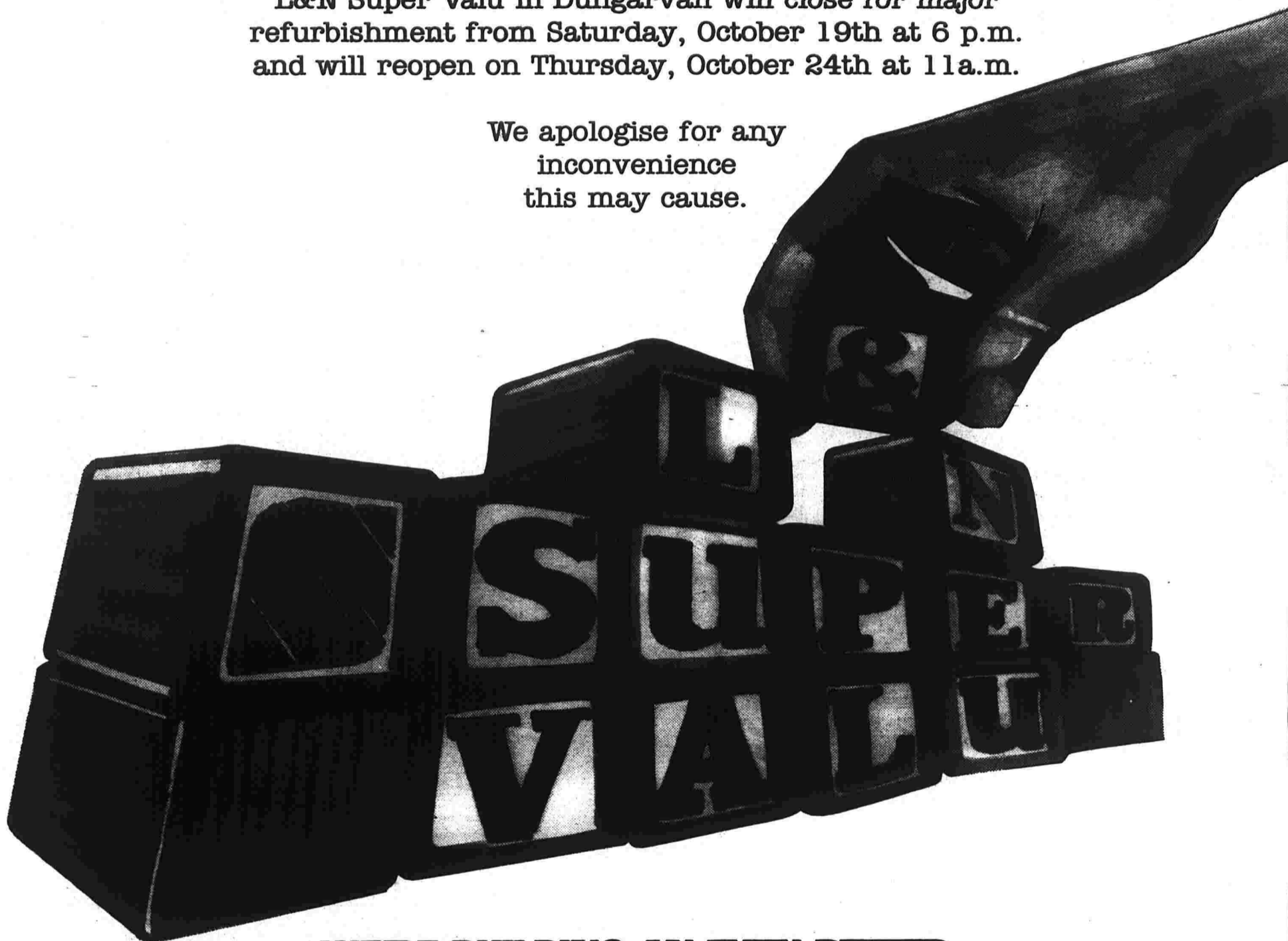

THE SHAPE OF THINGS TO COME SUPER TREES

Scientists have produced trees that spell death to any aphids, beetles and caterpillars that eat their leaves. The trees — popular and spruce — have been implanted with a gene which fills the leaves with a natural insecticide.

The experts at America's Oregon state University hope the breakthrough will prevent gardeners and nurserymen losing tons of vegetables and thousands of flowers every summer.

Further evidence that cereal fibre

dramatically reduces the risk of coronary heart disease has been revealed in new research. Research involving 43,757 men aged 40 to 75 showed that diets high in fibre, especially from cereal sources, significantly reduced the risk of coronary heart disease by

29 per cent for every 10g increase in fibre. This reduction was independent on fat intake.

Sometimes injuries or even surgery can leave unsightly permanent scars, but now, American doctors, using a revolutionary new technique

of applying electrodes on either side of a new wound, have found that the current has helped new cells to grow normally. It is still being tested on voluntary patients and the experts predict that it will be in widespread use within a few years.

Leaf-Cutter Bee

If you see the work of the leaf-cutter bee, you might be inclined to think that it uses a knife or a scissors to cut with. The bee itself looks a bit like the honeybee, but unlike the honeybee, it is a lone bee.

After the female mates, she lives on her own, building herself a small nest in a wall or in a hollow stem. When she lays her eggs, she doesn't lay them in a bundle. Each one is laid individually and parceled up in a few pieces of leaf together with some pollen and honey.

When the grub hatches, it will have all the food it needs to survive and won't have to leave its leafy home until it is mature and ready to fly.

The leaf-cutter bee takes leaf pieces from the rose bushes in our gardens. You might have seen this small circular pieces sawn away from the leaves.

These pieces are removed

by the bee's strong jaws and look very regular and perfect to be the work of an insect. Two or three pieces are used to make the egg chamber for one egg. The supply of pollen and honey is put inside first, then the bee uses her saliva to glue the rolled-up pieces together. Only then does she lay her egg. She seals the chamber up and continues this process until she has eight or nine produced.

The leafy egg rooms or chambers are made in small holes or crevices in garden walls. The bee doesn't nest on the rose bush itself at any time. In the USA and Canada these bees are prized highly as plant pollinators.

Dumping Your Fridge, Sofa Or Washing Machine ?

One of the biggest problems in keeping a house tidy is refuse, waste and unwanted items. One of the biggest problems in disposing of this unwanted material is where to put it. If you have a refuse collection it saves you going to the dump, burning it or furtively throwing it on the roadside in an illegal manner.

But what to do with those large items which the weekly collection cannot accommodate ? Well, Dungarvan Urban District Council once again proposes to make a once-off collection of large unwanted items of furniture and household appliances which are a nuisance at home and which might otherwise end up as an unsightly addition to the hedgerow.

Cookers, fridges, freezers, washing machines, old sofas and beds will be welcomed by the collection truck during the course of next week, October 21st - 25th in the town. The special collection will be in each area on the day after the normal collection and items for disposal should be left outside the house. If your normal collection is on a Monday, the special collection will be there on next Tuesday. If Friday is your regular collection day then you will be collected at the start of the campaign on Monday next, October 21st.

"This is a unique opportunity to get rid of a problem piece of furniture", says Town Clerk, Mr. Ray Moloney, "and will operate in the Urban area for one week only. Unfortunately we can extend to domestic premises only and on the special collection day, normal domestic refuse will NOT be collected. The service will be free which is an added bonus."

This is an ideal opportunity to make a clean sweep of the bulky items cluttering your home and in the case of fridges and freezers they will be disposed of in an environmentally friendly safe manner. 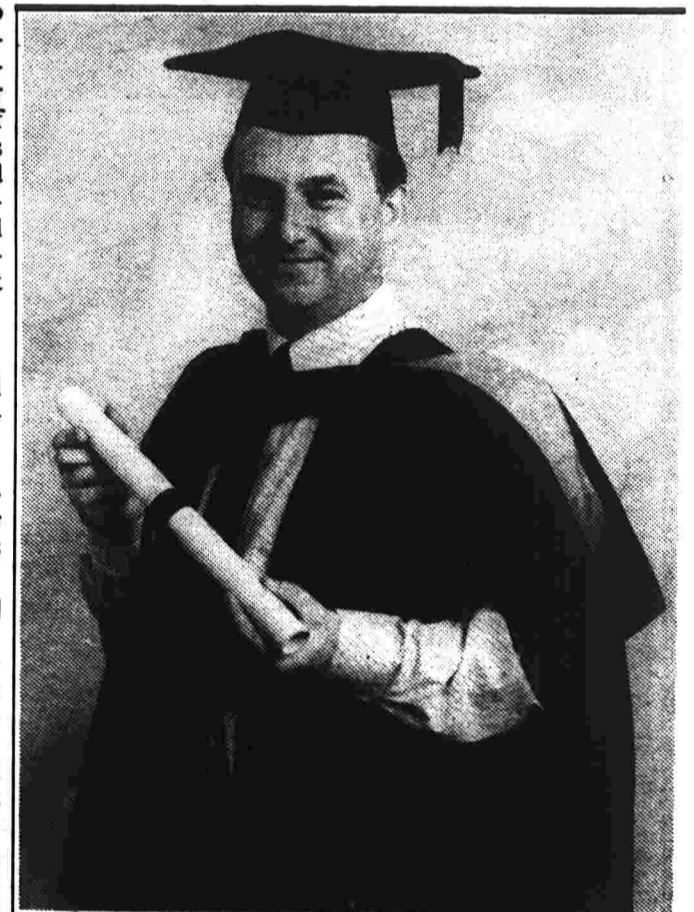

Cllr. Nora Flynn also voiced her dissatisfaction at the mass exodus as did Cllr. Tom Cunningham who sug-

gested that the remaining members call it a day as so many of their fellow members had left.

Six of the nine Fianna Fail members in attendance at the start of the meeting left before the agenda was com-

pleted. They were joined by four of the eight Fine Gael members and one Labour member.

The Society of Friends and Famine-Time Ring

— Museum Society Lecture

Dungarvan Museum Society's first public lecture of its 1996/7 season will have as its topic the work of the Waterford Quaker Relief Committee in assisting the fishing community of Ring during the Great Famine from 1846 to 1851. The charitable work of this body, through its secretary, Mr. Joshua Strangman, and the Rev. James Alcock, Vicar of Ring, is well remembered to this day and was officially marked in an ecumenical service at the grave of Rev. Alcock in Ring in August 1994.

During an international conference of Quakers in Waterford this summer, a visit to the Ring Peninsula by participants, when Níoclás Ó Griofáin acted as tour guide, was rated one of the most successful events of recent Quaker conferences.

On Sunday last at Kilfeacle Cemetery men, women and children assembled as they have done without fail for three quarters of a century, to pay their respects to the memory of a young man who had become a legend in his own short life time. For many years his old comrades divested themselves of their tragic Civil War memories to unite in honouring the man who was their leader. The magnetic power of the soft and low voice of Sean Treacy, despite a shy and reserved manner to attract and hold peoples attention and win them to his way of thinking, was the abiding memory of all who knew him. Former Justice Minister Marie Geoghegan Quinn delivered the oration for the 76th Anniversary of Sean Treacy's death. As usual it is a day when those with links with the old comrades of the I.R.A. and the great women of Cumann Na mBan who were young with Treacy, should attend to pray for and thank all who strove to make our land a nation once again. Seventy six years ago on Monday last October 14 Sean Treacy died as he had lived — the final six years of his short life, fighting against immense odds to free his country from British Rule.

His blood was shed in a crowded Dublin Street on a dim October day in 1920. After the main ceremony the South Tipperary Republican Commemoration committee held their ceremony, the oration was delivered by Martin Ferris of Ardfert and a wreath was laid by Pat Hackett, author of the recently published book "In Bloody Protest".

FIRST WEDDING AT FRIARY IN 43 YEARS

Clonmel's Franciscan Friary recently opened its doors to its first wedding in over four decades. But it could be just as long before another couple exchange wedding vows within its hallowed walls. Tidiness (20) 14 — Some of the low level fencing on the ring road was broken and the use of a strimmer, in addition to conventional lawnmowers is required. The storage of kegs at the front of hotels and bars should be discouraged. Minor items also detected — the overgrown grass at Skehacrine.

Residential Areas (30) 21 — Individual houses throughout the centre, notably at Abbeyside and also on the Clonmel approach road were splendid with fine gardens. The nameplate requires replacement at Park Lane Green. The new planting (Shear's Street) when matured, will contribute to an overall pleasing presentation.

Roads, Streets And Back Areas (40) 25 — Aspects of the main Waterford road are of a high standard.

General Impression (10) 5 — Dungarvan is an attractive town with a substantial and valuable built environment, in a suitable shore side setting. It offers substantial and spectacular vistas but, in place an unevenness of presentation which suggests that the community, collectively, have not assumed ownership or offered involvement in the energetic Tidy Towns Programme mapped out for the next 3 years.

Others who played in earlier rounds were D. Wade, P. Cashin, J. M. O'Connor, D. O'Connor and M. Brett.

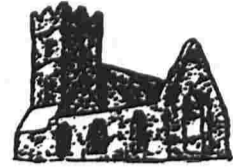

Concern Expressed At Proposed Telecom Mast In Lismore

As reported in a recent edition of the "Dungarvan Leader," the thorny and oft controversial issue of telecommunications masts has again resurfaced in Co. Waterford, this time in the heritage town of Lismore where Telecom Eireann has applied to Waterford County Council for planning permission to erect a 24 metre mast at Ballysaggart Beg.

Speaking at last Monday's Council meeting, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson revealed that petitions opposing the proposed development are now being circulated in Lismore and surrounding areas.

"People are deeply concerned about the effects the mast may have", stressed Cllr. Wilkinson, pointing to recent media reports which linked telecommunication masts to certain health hazards.

"There have been various suggestions in the media that these masts are linked to serious illnesses", he stated, adding that the Council should take the concerns of local people into consideration before any definite decision is made with regard to the granting of planning permission.

Cllr. Wilkinson revealed that Telecom had previously applied for permission to erect a 38 metre mast at a site on the north of the town and he queried Telecom's reasons for changing their planning permission. Reechoing Cllr. Wilkinson's sentiments, Cllr. Willie McDonnell said he attended a meeting in Lismore 3 weeks ago which was attended by a large number of people in opposition to the proposed Telecom mast. County Manager Donal Connolly replied that he has sought further information about the proposed mast from Telecom and he would discuss the matter further with members in the near future.

He also revealed that under new legislation, a national regulatory system is to be put in place later this year giving particular regard to mobile phone masts.

Plant Now For Spring Flowers

OCTOBER is when you should be thinking about spring and how your spring garden will look. That means getting bulbs and other spring flowers planted. And where bulbs are concerned, they should be well established before the hard weather starts.

I always like to mix spring-flowering plants with bulbs. Plants will keep in bloom for that much longer, but, just as important, they'll give the beds a "lived in" and "furnished" look throughout the winter months.

Part of the fun is matching up bulbs and plants. Obviously, you're going to have your own ideas about colour-matching and so on. Sketch out your own plan, but don't forget to make sure that whatever you select for each bed, they all flower together.

There's nothing worse than May-flowering tulips standing in a bedraggled mass of half-dead forget-me-nots. That's why I prefer to plant the early flowering types of tulips, hyacinths, forget-me-nots, etc.

For what it's worth, I've always found that forget-me-nots blend well with tulips, as also will yellow wallflowers, the orange Siberian wallflower.

With daffodils you can associate forget-me-nots, red wallflowers, white arabis or the darker-coloured polyanthuses.

Hyacinths combine well with white double daisies, forget-me-nots or polyanthuses.



You can either mass the bulbs in the centre of the bed and have just an edging of plants, but I would prefer a more "natural" setting, with plants over the whole area and with bulbs in between them.

To see a display made up of tulips arising from a carpet of forget-me-nots is very attractive.

Apart from tulips and hyacinths, almost all the spring bulbs will be happy if they can remain undisturbed for several years and increase naturally. To do this — providing the soil has been well prepared in advance and is very light — plant the bulbs deeper than you might normally have, say as much as 9 ins. deep. They will be quite all right, believe me.

But do remember that if some bulbs are planted deeper than others, flowering will be at different times. The deeper the planting, the later the bloom. So set each same kind of bulb at the same depth.

For normal depths, set hyacinths 5 ins. deep, daffodils and tulips 4 ins. deep. Smaller subjects like snowdrops and scillas need to be 3 ins. deep, crocuses 2 ins., grape hyacinths and chionodoxas, 2 ins.

The measurements I've given are, in each case, from the top of the bulb.

Distances apart? Well, with bulbs alone, allow 9 ins. between hyacinths, daffodils and late-flowering tulips; 8 ins. between early tulips. If growing bulbs and plants together, all 12 ins. between all bulbs, the same difference between wallflowers, and 8 ins. between the others.

Cattle: WEANING SUCKLERS

The date of weaning depends on the condition of the cow and age of calf. Thin cows should be weaned soon in order to prevent any further loss in condition or to allow some recovery before the winter. First-calved heifers do not gain weight during the summer to the same extent as mature cows and are consequently at lower body condition score at this stage. These should be among the first group to be weaned.

The second factor to consider in relation to weaning is the age of the calf. February and March born calves can be weaned about now. April and May born calves should be allowed suckle until November, if possible. Another consideration that will have to be taken into account is the amount of grass available. Where grass is scarce, suckling cows will lose condition. In such cases it is better to wean and feed meal to the weanlings. Spring calving cows should be at condition score 3 at present, i.e. well fleshed.

WEANING PROCEDURE

Outdoor weaning is preferable to housing. Select a well-sheltered well-fenced field with grass. Weanlings remain more settled if left in a familiar field at weaning. Therefore, it is better to withdraw the cows and leave the calves undisturbed. If cows are removed over a period, there is less disturbance. Start with the thinner cows and those that calve early in the year.

It is good practice to dose weanlings for hoose (which also covers stomach worms). Respiratory diseases can be aggravated where there is damage to the lungs with hoose.

Weed Control in New Leys

Check all reseeded areas for weed problems from the two to three leaf stage onwards. It is absolutely essential to control seedling docks before the first grazing. Control annual weeds, especially chickweed and charlock, before they compete with the grass. Where clover is unimportant, use either Duplosan or Astix at 1.0 to 1.5 pts./ac. These products will control a wide range of weeds including chickweed. Where clover is unimportant, use an undersown product e.g. Legumex D.B. (5 pts./ac.) If chickweed is problematic, Legumex Extra will give good control if the plants are not beyond 6" high or across.

Silage

★ It is very important to get silage samples analysed so that a proper feeding programme can be planned.

★ The quantity and quality of available silage together with requirements for the winter should be carefully assessed.

Sheep: DIPPING SHEEP

Read the instructions: Like all farm chemicals, sheep dips should be handled with care. Most of the contamination during dipping occurs through splashing and can be minimised by good dipping unit design and wearing protective clothing.

This should consist of wellington boots, waterproof trousers or leggings, waterproof coat or bib apron, non-lined synthetic rubber gloves and a face shield when handling the concentrate product. Always observe withdrawal periods — animals must not be slaughtered within 14 days of dipping.

Before dipping, make sure draining pens, bath and filter trap are clean. Follow the manufacturer's instructions regarding wash make-up, dilution rates and topping-up. Do not mix different dips together or add chemicals not mentioned on the product label.

DISPOSING OF DIP

Sheep dips are injurious to fish and stream life. Do not contaminate ponds, streams, or water courses.

It should be disposed of immediately after dipping by diluting with water or slurry (3 parts water/slurry to 1 part dip) and spread by slurry tanker. Spreading rate should not exceed 5 M³ (1,100 gals./ha. of spent dip, equivalent to 20 M³ (4,400 gals./ha. of diluted dip).

Maize: Crops are maturing nicely and the earlier sown crops in good sites should be ready for harvesting later this week or early next week, depending on weather. Other crops will take one to two weeks longer to reach maturity in the absence of frost. With a severe frost all crops ideally should be cut within a week.

To achieve an overall crop dry matter of 28-32% and starch levels greater than 20%, cobs should have a dry matter content of 50-55%. The average DM of cobs from five varieties (Apache, Hussar, Janna, Melody, Rival) in the Cappagh Maize Trial on October 7th was 41%. Cob DM's are improving by 4-5 percentage units per day. However, plants minus the cobs were still quite green/wet last week and are only drying out now.

★ With good cob maturity, good harvesting is more essential to crack the hard grain.

★ Apply salt to top and to shoulders and sides of pits in particular.

★ With later harvesting this year it will be too late to sow Westernworlds in most cases especially if they will interfere with next year's sowing date.



FARMING LEADER

Retirement Scheme Regional Imbalance Must Be Rectified

— IFA

Chairman of Waterford IFA Rural Development Committee Anthony Ryan has called on the government to change the rules on the Early Retirement Scheme as it is obvious that a very serious regional imbalance is developing in the number of farmers eligible for the Scheme. Mr. Ryan was commenting following the presentation by the Minister for State for Agriculture, Jimmy Deenihan of the first payment to the 5,000 recipients of the scheme.

According to IFA analysis, over 60% of the successful applicants to date are in the six Munster counties — as Wexford and Kilkenny. On the other hand in the eight counties covering Connacht and Ulster only 18% of the successful applicants are located, said Mr. Ryan.

The Waterford IFA Rural Development leader said that the main reason why the scheme was not successful in the west and north west was that first of all the structure of farming is not as good and secondly, and more importantly, many of the would-be eligible transferees see their future in farming as part-time given the small-scale of farm size. "It is necessary for the government to press the European Commission to change the rules that the person taking over the farm must make more than 50% of his overall income from farming and that more than 50% of his time must be spent on the farm.

Mr. Ryan said the income requirement should be reduced from 50% to 25%, similar to the rule that applies for forest premium. Changing this income rule would effectively mean that many transferees could take over farms while at the same time carry on farming in conjunction with the non-farm job. Given the changes in agricultural policy and the challenges that face rural communities in the future, it is necessary that many of the younger farmers will have to carry on off-farm activities in order to remain in a viable position.

County Waterford I.C.M.S.A. News

The County Waterford Executive of ICMSA held their annual general meeting on Wednesday, October 9 last. Guest speaker at that meeting was Nicholas Ryan, Chairman ICMSA National Livestock Committee.

Mr. Ryan gave a very informative talk on the problem facing beef farmers and the need for proper promotion both at national and world levels.

County Chairman, John Skehan gave a brief run down on the activities of the ICMSA in the county over the last year. He thanked fellow officers for their help during the year. He also thanked the media and press

for their coverage during the year.

Tom Hickey, PRO for County Waterford ICMSA, organised a beef promotion for the executive. Instead of the traditional cup of tea and sandwiches, the attendance were given beef burgers.

Mr. Hickey said that confidence must be brought back into the beef industry by promoting beef and when better than at a farmers' meeting.

Mr. Tom Hickey said that any farmer who is not happy with his disadvantaged area status should make an appeal now.

The meeting felt that those farmers who used illegal

substances in the feeding of cattle have cheated on the genuine farmer in this country and their herd numbers should be withdrawn, concluded Mr. Hickey.

1997 Land Rental Costs Must Come Down

With many grain growers currently renting land, Waterford IFA Grain Chairman Alex Heskin has strongly advised all growers, in particular those who paid excessive prices for rented land in 1996, on the need to significantly reduce their land rental costs.

Mr. Heskin pointed out that growers who continued to pay excessive prices for rented land were taking 'an enormous gamble,' a gamble which has increased considerably since this time last year due to a more difficult

market environment for cereals. "Only for the excellent yields in 1996 many growers would have experienced serious financial pressures due to grain prices not holding up as originally predicted." He added that despite the good harvest, grain margins were lower in 1996 than in 1995.

The Waterford Grain Chairman pointed out that prices of £150-£200 per acre were 'more than excessive' and did not leave any scope whatsoever for below average yields, lower prices,

higher moistures, etc.

Mr. Heskin said that it is critical that a 'sense of realism' pertains in the land rental market this season. He advised all growers to do their production cost calculations very carefully and to build into those calculations a safety factor to account for the possibility of a poor harvest in 1997. "When growers who pay excessive prices for rented land do this, they will see that they need to reduce their land rental costs substantially."

Cyril Back In Charge

Waterford and Tipperary aren't the only counties to have put in place a new managerial structure. Any list of hurling counties with potential to reach the top would have to include Galway although using the word "new" in reference to Cyril Farrell is far from accurate because Cyril has been at the helm on two previous occasions and has now returned for another spell in charge after an absence of five years from the Senior scene. Galway, current league title holders, is always in contention for honours with very definite promise at this time.

Cyril's devotion to the game of hurling is well known. I first got to know him almost 30 years ago when he came to the G.A.A. annual coaching course in Gormanstown. He was a bright spark, eager to challenge ideas already deeply rooted and was eager to learn as much about the game as possible while maintaining his own forthright expression of opinion. In those distant happy hours under the Meath (Gormanstown is one of three of the driest parts of this country) sun his own hurling philosophy evolved. To be honest, he wasn't a good hurler but then the fact that you were born in a stable doesn't necessarily mean that you're a horse. He had the wrong hurling grip which greatly surprised me in a chap who sought to perfect skills in others. This, however, never stopped him from pursuing his hurling passion. Perhaps he thought at this time that it didn't matter and I can understand a young man of 20 paying little attention to a matter which causes him no loss of sleep.

In fact something similar was my experience here in Tallow over 40 years ago when I tolerated the wrong grip in some players and made no effort to correct it. I was far from convinced in those days of the fundamental importance of right-handed players, keeping the right hand on top always when gripping the stick just as genuine left-handers like Billy Sheehan and Liam O'Brien should (and they did) grip the stick with the dominant left hand on top. It was only after searching through that I realised that those 125 individual hurling skills (no game has even half that number) couldn't be performed to a high standard unless you were sup-

ported and that is what you do by gripping the caman correctly.

Some there are who are still skeptical about the importance of this basic and can't accept that an incorrect grip hinders a player's development. One such person used to be Jim Greene. Perhaps he has altered his opinion on this matter since, but on a few occasions over the last 15 years, he has asked me why it is so important to have one grip rather than another. I have tried to explain, avoiding any technical or medical terms like central, nervous system or autonomous nervous system. It's straight forward: gripping one way you are helping nature, gripping the opposite way you are going against nature.

Jim, in my opinion, had the wrong grip because he is not a ciotog. He was a very good hurler, one of the best servants Mount Sion or Waterford ever had. His long service to club, county and province constitutes a very impressive record. A strong, sturdy centre back for many years with club and county, it was only when Jim moved into the forwards that he really made a huge impression, especially at corner forward. He was a deadly striker, very quick and accurate and a prolific scorer. So the question prompted is, what difference did it make to him that he played left hand above right from his earliest years. Wasn't he a very quick striker? What skills were inhibited by his unorthodox grip?

It was in spite of the grip that Jim was so good. Clearly he played a lot of hurling from an early age but with his grip, he most certainly denied himself other dimensions to his game. There are a few important skills which can only be performed quickly in a big game with one hand. Hooking is one, blocking in the air and tackling are others. With the weaker hand in command of the caman, it is extremely difficult to perform those properly at speed. Besides, only in rare instances can a player with the incorrect grip strike from the weaker side. Jim would admit that he was weak at hooking and blocking and never used his left side. Some 20 years before Jim's time, a very good player revealed the same weaknesses - Jim English, the Wexford half-back. English grew up with the grip but his dash and quickness never allowed him to be exposed, not with Billy Backard beside him. Jim En-

glish readily admitted his lack of expertise in the tackling skill and that he never struck a ball from his left because he couldn't. What gave Jim Greene a clear advantage in his striking were his powerful wrists which had strength and suppleness. His employment at Waterford Crystal obliged him to constantly use those wrists, turning them over and back day after day thus strengthening them further. This is what gave him that whip-lash stroke which was to defy so many tacklers in front of goal throughout his career.

But to get back to Cyril, it could very well be that nobody ever mentioned to him when he was young that he would be a better player by changing his method of gripping the hurley. And that consequently he never cared how he or his players held the caman. Anyway he was more concerned with a high level of fitness and a high work rate and an ability to retain possession than he was with burnishing his team's basic hurling skills.

Given his prediction for a running passing game, his team needed great reserves of speed and stamina and this called for a great investment in physical fitness training. His teams of 1987 and 1988 were exceptionally fit and were well worth the All-Ireland success of those years. The style of carrying and passing the ball which Galway had mastered demanded more intense preparations than any of their rivals, Kilkenny for instance whose economy of effort conserved energy and was an object lesson for all. I always felt that the almost continuous brutal training undergone in that period of the eighties shortened the hurling lives of some of the best Railway Cup League and All-Ireland successes in the second half of the eighties had drained much of the zip from the team by the time Cork defeated them in 1990 in a game where Cork's more traditional mix was too strong for a team which ran far too much.

In that successful period, Cyril had two flyers whose grip wasn't a natural one. Anthony Cunningham and Gerry McInerney. Gerry at left half-back was an inspiring player. His natural dash, exuberance and athleticism saw him sweep excitingly out of defence, time and again, before effecting mighty clearances. But for all that he was a limited hurler. He was uncomfortable with the ground ball and could only

strike from his right. In two All-Irelands he was forced over to his left and his attempted clearances from that side went over the sideline in each case. Anthony Cunningham was usually placed at right full forward but he was nearly always utilised as a third midfielder where in his scavenging role, his great pace and unlimited stamina took on solo raids deep into the opposition defence, causing consternation to the bewildered backs and leaving No. 4 to agonize about keeping his station or following the roving Anthony. Because Anthony operated on the right, he needed badly to have an effective left side to score. But he hadn't any use of his left side whatsoever and it is significant that he contributed something meagre like one or two points out of a total of 4 All-Ireland appearances and of course, he couldn't block or hook.

One great attribute has Cyril: a clear vision of what he wants. He is his own man and will only choose selectors he can relate to and who can contribute to the realisation of his dreams. There is plenty of talent in his County what with the succession of underage achievements at Minor and U-21 level over the last half dozen years and even this very year, Galway's flag was proudly carried by its Minor, U-21 and Junior sides into the closing stages of these competitions. Never one to be over-influenced by popular opinion Cyril will, like Liam Griffin, Ger Loughnane and John Maughan discard from his panel any player unwilling to give the cause 100%. People living on artificial reputations or folk memory - "shells in maroon jerseys" Cyril calls them - will be pruned in his unsentimental approach. He has had plenty of time for reflection and has admitted to having a lot of new ideas in a whole range of hurling areas which he is eager to try out. I hope sincerely for hurling's sake that he has revised his opinion on the value of ground hurling which formerly he all but excluded from the game plan of his most successful years. Perhaps he will be influenced by how Liam Griffin and Ger Loughnane integrated this skill into a more balanced and successful formula. With the beaten Munster and Leinster finalists allowed back into the championship at the quarter-final stage next year and the year after, winning the All-Ireland will pose a real off-

ficult problem for the men of the west. In effect, this means that Galway would have to defeat both Leinster finalists and the Munster champions in order to win the 1997 All-Ireland. Tall order Cyril but then his energy, organisation, motivation and ambition should make for an exciting new year.

Good wishes to Eamonn Power who by now is beginning to settle down in Australia. Eamonn was a most loyal clubman, having played with Tallow in every

grade and is just another of our young players to have emigrated. He gradually established himself on the Senior panel and his future looked bright until the urge to explore the land of Oz overcame him. Never afraid of hard work, he carried out the demanding duties of Club Secretary while studying for his accountancy examinations. His allround ability and resourcefulness should be well rewarded in Australia, a land of opportunity and hospitality with so many Irish connections.

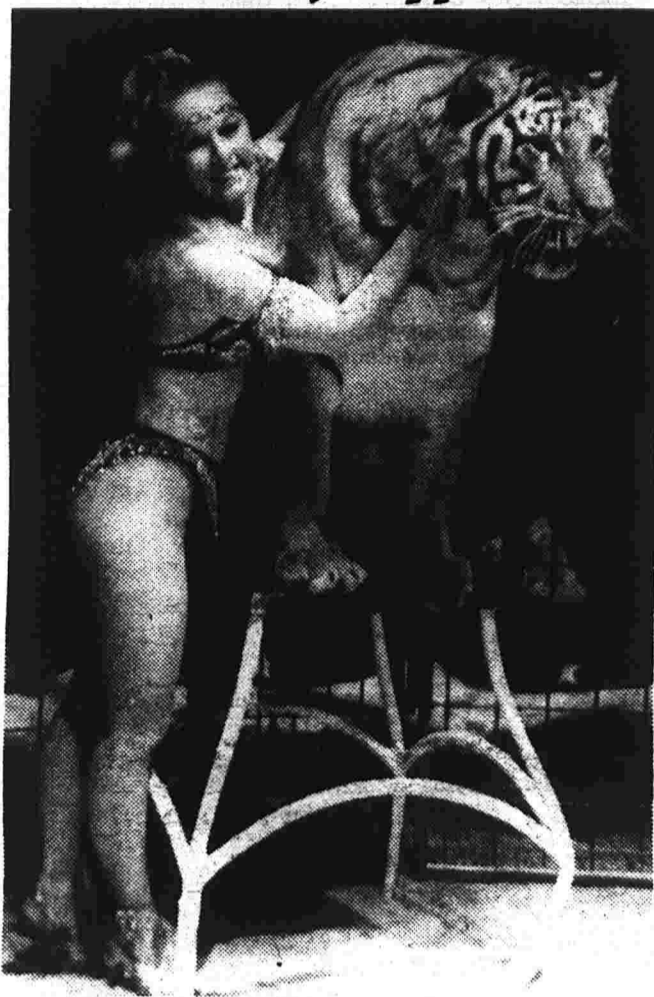

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THE AGENDA

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When baking we tend to use a lot of sugar. Refined sugar only provides sweetness and calories, it has no nutritional benefits. Raw cane sugar is slightly less refined and has some traces of vitamins and minerals. Raw cane sugar such as muscavado is available in both light and dark sugars, light being used mainly for sponges and dark for fruit cakes. Cane sugars may be lumpy so they should always be sieved before using.

Molasses may also be used in baking but as its flavour is quite strong it is best to use in fruit cakes. Molasses is high in iron and contains only two thirds of the amount of calories that are

present in white sugar. Probably the best sweeteners of all to use is the natural sweetness of fruit. Fruits sugar is filled with vitamins, iron and fibre. Fruit such as raisins, sultanas and currants can be used in scones or tea cakes. Honey is a natural product and is favoured in baking as an alternative to sugar. However it only

contains traces of vitamins and minerals but it has a lovely flavour and most importantly it can be used in smaller quantities than sugar. Clear honey is probably the best for baking as it is easier to use than the thicker honeys available. Cakes and buns can be glazed with a small amount of honey brushed on top. Whatever you are baking why not try some of these healthier alternatives to sugar, making your baking a little healthier whilst keeping its delicious taste.

Chef's Corner

Menus for the week

Chicken Korma

Preparation: 20 mins

Cooking: 45 mins

Serves: 4



1 1/2lb/675g boneless, skinless chicken breasts
8oz/ 225g onions, peeled and chopped
1 in/2.5cm piece of root ginger, peeled and chopped
3 garlic cloves, peeled
1 1/2oz/40g butter or margarine, melted
1 tsp ground coriander
1 cinnamon stick, broken
5 cardamom pods
juice of 1 small lemon
salt and ground black pepper

1 1/2oz/40g ground almonds
2oz/50g creamed coconut, grated
1/4pt/150ml full-fat natural yogurt
1/2oz/15g toasted flaked almonds

2 tsp freshly chopped coriander

METHOD

Wash the chicken, then pat dry and slice into 1 in/4cm pieces. Blend onion, ginger and garlic in a food processor for a few seconds to form a smooth

paste. Heat the fat in a large frying pan and fry the onion paste, stirring frequently, for 2-3 mins, or until softened.

Add the chicken to the pan and cook for 5-6 mins, or until lightly browned all over. Stir in the spices and the lemon juice, then season well with salt and ground black pepper, and continue to cook, stirring occasionally, for 10 mins

Add the almonds to the pan, along with the coconut, and mix well. Gradually add the yogurt, a spoonful at a time, stirring constantly to blend the yogurt into the mixture. Continue to cook for 1 min, then add 1/4pt/150ml water to just cover chicken and simmer gently for 15-20 mins, or until cooked through.

Discard cinnamon stick and cardamom pods from the pan, and transfer the korma to a warmed serving platter lined with cooked rice. Sprinkle the flaked almonds and chopped coriander over the top and serve immediately with mango chutney and poppadums.

Mushroom and Tomato Pasta

Preparation: 15 mins

Cooking: 25-30 mins

Serves: 4

4 tsp olive oil
1 onion, peeled and chopped
1 garlic clove, peeled and crushed
1 tsp crushed dried chillies (optional)
1 (400g/14oz) can chopped tomatoes with mixed herbs
1 tsp tomato purée
pinch of brown sugar
450g/1lb flat mushrooms, wiped and sliced
450g/1lb pasta
fresh oregano sprigs to garnish
freshly grated Parmesan cheese to serve (optional)

METHOD

Heat 1 tsp of the oil in a pan and fry the onion and garlic for 3-4 minutes until soft and just beginning to brown. Stir in the crushed chillies and cook for 1 minute.

Add the tomatoes, purée and sugar and simmer for 10 minutes until the sauce is very thick. Season with salt and freshly ground black pepper.

Meanwhile, heat the remaining oil in a large frying pan and add the mushrooms. Cook over a high heat for 5-8 minutes until beginning to brown. Pour the sauce over the mushrooms, stir well and adjust seasoning to taste. Simmer for a further 10 minutes until the mushrooms are tender.

Meanwhile, cook the pasta in a pan of boiling salted water for 8-10 minutes until just tender. Drain and divide between 4 warmed serving plates. Top with mushroom sauce and sprinkle with freshly ground black pepper. Garnish with fresh oregano and serve with grated Parmesan cheese, if liked

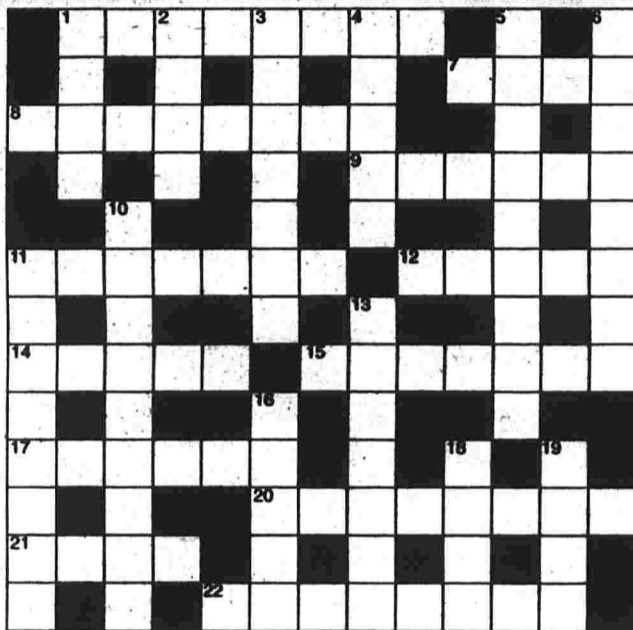

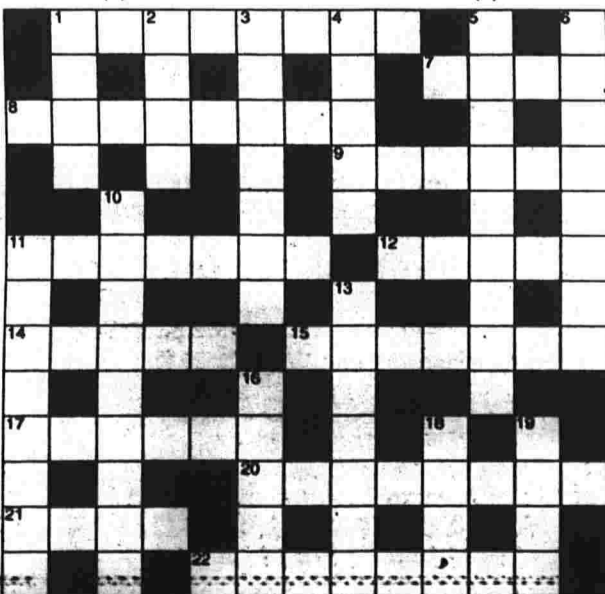

Family Health

By Dr. DAVE BARRY

Q. Can you explain to me in laymans terms what the immune system is and exactly how it works?

A. The immune system is the body's defence mechanism against infection and other threats to our health. For example, when a germ gets in through the skin, our white blood cells immediately appear in larger numbers and engulf the germ in order to fight and destroy it. Our antibodies are also mobilised when we have inoculations to protect against future diseases. We also have chemical antibodies that are already prepared or are produced for the occasion. A good example of this is a boil - the pus which is eventually discharged is a mixture of dead and dying germs, white protector cells and the liquid carrying the antibody chemicals which were dispatched there. Sometimes our immune system can go haywire and attack our own tissues, causing what's known as

auto-immune disease, of which rheumatoid arthritis is the most common example.

Q. My daughter recently had to have part of one ovary removed because it contained a benign cyst. I'm concerned that she will suffer from hormonal difficulties or that it will affect her fertility. Are these problems likely to occur?

A. The simple answer to this is no. Fortunately, as with the kidneys and for that matter with a man's testicles, nature compensates. A woman can function quite normally with one ovary. Even if a woman has one full ovary removed, the other will still provide an ovum a month as usual and all the ovarian hormones that her body requires. So, having a part of one ovary removed, still leaves plenty of ovarian tissue to cope with the body's needs. You can therefore rest assured, you are worrying unnecessarily.

HOUSEHOLD TIPS

- When you are having a shower or bath, stop the mirror from steaming up by wiping it over with neat shampoo. Polish it with a clean cloth.
- To prevent nylon from turning grey, wash it on its own.
- To keep your table mats flat when

- not in use, hang them up on a clipboard.
- To fix a poster temporarily to the wall, use toothpaste.
- If you have no toilet freshener, use some washing up liquid in the cistern.

Michael C. Nagle Cross Country Championship

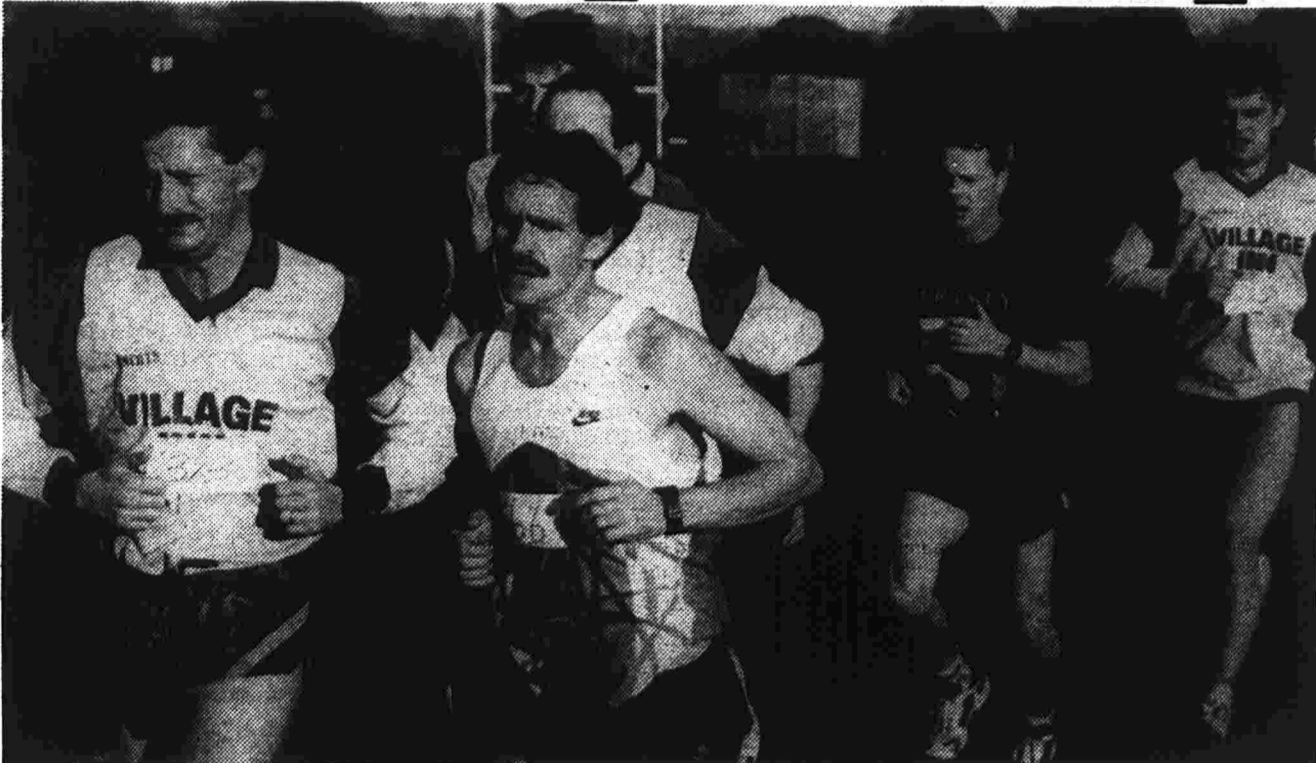
The 4th Annual Michael C. The Terry Fox Run which is held to raise funds to aid cancer research in Ireland takes place on the same day and at the same time from Grattan Square to St. Augustine's College and allcomers are welcome to participate in this family and community orientated walk, run and buggy push.

Thanks to the generous sponsorship of the Nagle family, Abbeyside, Dungarvan AC are in a position to continue and indeed expand this year's run from a local to an open event and also from just a competitive race to a run that will cater for joggers and fun runners of all standards. This can be seen from the fact that there will be a staggering "101 prizes" on offer for all the participants and this should attract record entries to the famed St. Augustine's course.

In addition, all the boys and girls who complete the Terry Fox Run will be treated to a goody bag at St. Augustine's College. There will be no entry fee to the Terry Fox Run on Sunday as all sections of the community have contributed generously to the fund raising efforts thus far.

White and Benny Murphy will provide entertainment. The entry fee to the cross country run is £4 and all the proceeds will be donated to cancer research in Ireland.

IRISH SPRINT CHAMPION

For a number of reasons it is fitting that an event be organised by Dungarvan AC in memory of the late Michael Nagle. An athlete of note in his younger days, he won the Irish Schools 200 yards championship in 1935, representing the local CBS and he set a record of 24.5 seconds which lasted for many years.

He was also Chairman of Dungarvan AC in the late 1960's and early 70's at an important time in the club's history when there was a flourishing under-age section, with Eddie Moore, Abbeyside very much involved.

As editor of the Dungarvan Leader up to his death in 1993, he gave valuable support to local athletics while also acknowledging the international feats of Irish athletes such as John Treacy and Catriona McKiernan.

BRING BACK CROSS COUNTRY

The legacy from the road running boom of the 1980's has been a decline in the cross country scene at adult level and this is very evident in Waterford. This new impetus of promoting a major cross country race in the locality is a timely necessity. In an ongoing attempt to bring back cross country and make it popular with all standards of runners, Sunday's race has been widely promoted both inside and outside the county. The response from runners and supporters on the day will determine the future of the race and hopefully it will be the first successful step in getting field running back on track.

CHAMPIONSHIP STATUS

For the serious club runners within the county, the race was given a timely boost recently when the Waterford BLE Board announced that the County Junior (u/19) and Senior Men's and Women's Championships would be held as part of the Michael C. Nagle race. Both races will be run simultaneously with the men completing four laps and the ladies running two laps of the Friary course.

With the Munster Novice and u/23 championships being held at the same venue two weeks later, Sunday's race will also be a valuable run out over the course for would-be participants.

CASH BONUS

A practical incentive for winning contenders on Sunday has been the inclusion of a cash bonus for the first runner to beat the course record of 26 mins. 38 secs., set by Kieran Maher last year. The minimum bonus is £50 and it will rise accordingly depending on the numerical strength of the field.

TEAM EVENTS

The heart of cross country is team events and for Sunday's race there will be prizes for the first three clubmen's teams of six runners and the first three club ladies teams of four runners as well of course as the first local team of six members. The event also includes numerous age categories from u/19 up to over 60 in the men's and women's races and entries will be taken on the course from 1.30 p.m. onwards.

FUN RUNNERS WELCOME

Sunday's race will have a big welcome for fun runners and joggers. First time runners will be especially welcome and indeed a number of candidates in this department have been spotted purchasing runners and entering St. Augustine's College for a run over the course. It is rumoured that a number of bets have been laid regarding the event but the organisers are not involving themselves in such activities.

To cater for the fun runners, one third of the prizes have been allocated to this category. Outside of the prizewinners in the main categories there will be prizes for the first grandparents, factory/shop worker, unemployed, trade worker, farmer, FAS,

government and non-government runner to finish. Outside of these prize winners there will be a further twenty prizes for the next finishers. There is something for everybody on Sunday so come along and take part in the true spirit of the sport.

ST. AUGUSTINE'S COLLEGE

The organisers and sponsors of Sunday's race are indebted to the authorities at St. Augustine's College for the use of their fine facilities. Dressing and showering accommodation are being made available and Bro. Patrick Lennon will provide a suitably marked course for all the participants.

St. Augustine's has certainly been the home of running over the years and it would be near impossible to hold an event such as Sunday's without the availability of such a fine facility.

FINTAN WALSH WINS LAST TIME ROUND

This is the first time in thirty-three years that the Waterford Senior Cross Country Championship will be held in the Dungarvan area. The last occasion was in 1963 when the race took place in Kilosserra race course.

Waterford AC provided the individual winner in Fintan Walsh who went to the front from the start and he was never really pressed at any stage of the six mile race. This was Fintan's third senior title and it turned out to be the first of four in a row wins for him. He also won in 1959 and 1960 and so he has a grand total of six titles to his credit.

The current PRO of Waterford BLE, Fintan has been the main motivator behind athletics in the county over the past thirty years and he has in fact given a lifetime of service to Waterford both on and off the track.

In Kilosserra in 1963, Fintan led his club team to victory with four runners home in the first eight finishers. They regained the title from the holders Dunhill on a 19 pts. to 31 pts. scoreline. St. Mary's AC, Dungarvan, were third overall.

His recent victories were in Ardmore, Dunmore, Tramore and Killusty, Co. Tipperary and the visiting athletes will obviously have their hands full to defeat him on Sunday.

DEPLETED BRICKEY TEAM DEFENDS TITLE

In the three year history of the race, the local team event, which generates great interest and passion, has been won by Abbeyside, Dungarvan and the Brickeys. Last year the Brickeys recorded an unexpected win against the highly populated urban teams but the chances of a repeat victory this year don't look good. From last year's team Tony Harty, Colin Lyons, Michael Ryan and James Maguire are unavailable and so it looks as if the Valley team will have to depend on the traditional car from Waterford if they are going to field a team.

The Dungarvan and Abbeyside teams look to be evenly matched with the odds favouring the town team who will have such as Mark Radley, Martin McCarthy, Dermot Dwyer, Martin Sandford, Eoin Dee, Paddy Lannen and David Power, Paul Keating and rumours of the Bennett emigrants from Ballysaggart to choose from.

The Village team will be composed of runners in the main born and bred in Dungarvan and if they can reconcile themselves to wearing the Abbeyside jersey, then they could give the town team a good race of it. TERRY FOX RUN

Funds raised in Ireland annually from the Terry Fox Run are devoted to innovative cancer research in this country. Terry Fox knew first hand how great the need for cancer research was. At eighteen years of age his right leg had been amputated above the knee as a result of bone cancer. Before Terry started his Marathon of Hope in April 1980 in Newfoundland, Canada, he had run 3,000 miles in training. He then ran an average of twenty-six miles a day before he was forced to stop on September 1 as the cancer had spread to his lungs. Long before that day he had captured the hearts and imagination of Canada.

Terry Fox died in June 1981 but his spirit is very much alive in this annual fundraiser for cancer research. The researchers tell us that thousands of people with cancer are successfully treated each year and the figure is rising thanks to this research. In the fifteen years since Terry's death, the annual run has grown to the point where it is now regarded as the largest single fundraiser for cancer research in the world.

DUNGARVAN RUN

The Dungarvan Brass Band will lead off the Terry Fox Run on Sunday from Grattan Square at 2.30 p.m. A very large

entry of walkers, joggers and buggy pushers is anticipated and arrival at St. Augustines College is expected from 3 p.m. onwards.

Participants will then be presented with Terry Fox certificates and goody bags to restore that lost energy. The local Terry Fox Committee would like to thank everybody who has contributed to this year's fund raising efforts and express the wish that an enjoyable afternoon will be had by all. 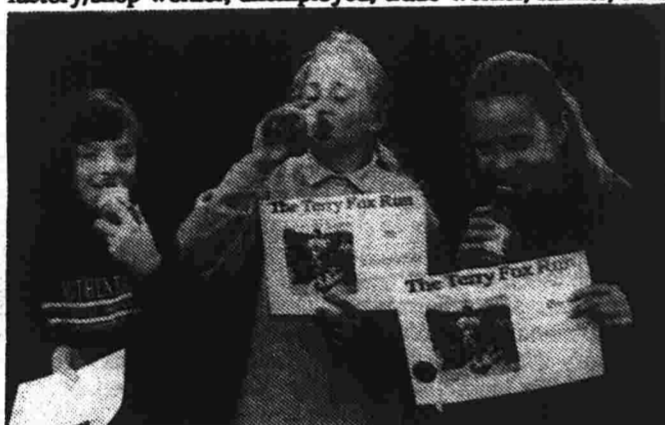

football skills when the evenings lengthen.

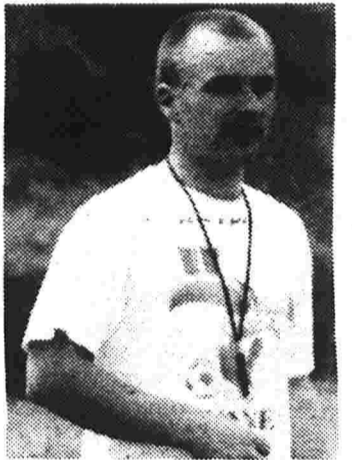
JUVENILE CLUB NOTES

Five County Finals At Home And SH Oireachtas Game At New Ross

It must be the first time in history that Waterford County Board will play five county finals on the same day and while many people may have doubts about the wisdom of such planning, everyone will hope that the experiment will be successful.

The finals are certain to pose a problem for the many patrons who would like to be at both Fraher Field where the three hurling finals will take place and at the same time be at Walsh Park where the two football finals are being decided.

The programme at Fraher Field will commence at 1.30 p.m. when Lismore take on Mount Sion in the Minor Hurling County Final before the Geraldines and Ballygunner clash in the Junior Hurling County Final. These will be followed by the meeting of Abbeyside and Ferrybank in the Intermediate hurling final and which is timed for 4.00 p.m.

At Walsh Park, the big one is the meeting of western champions, Ring and De La Salle in the Intermediate Football County Final. This will have the county 'B' Minor football final involving the Nire from the west and Kilmachomas from the east as a curtain-raiser.

INTERMEDIATE HURLING FINAL

Abbeyside v Ferrybank

For most of the neutrals here in the west, this will be the big game of the weekend and unless either or both teams show a lapse of form, it should produce one of the better Intermediate finals of recent years.

Ferrybank, for some reason that is not easy to understand were installed as the very early favourites to follow on their Junior County Final victory of last year by taking the Intermediate title this time round and as Kill did in football very recently. Making them favourites even before a shot was fired in the current championship was not very hard to figure by the people who watched them play against teams like Ballydurn, Kill, Kilmachomas and Mount Sion. The scoresheets indicate that they are very good or else the opposition was poorer than had been rated. Ferrybank were playing in their first intermediate championship.

It is a very long time but as will be seen from their panel, several of their players are experienced and seasoned campaigners, building up to a more mature team than Abbeyside.

Last year, the city team much against expectations, annihilated the western champions, Lismore in the Junior County Final on a scoreline of 3-21 to 0-4. Reading their scoring record this year in Intermediate convinces one that the County Final performance was not a once-off display by any means. Against Ballydurn, Ferrybank scored 6-5 to 4-8 in their first game in the Intermediate championship and against Kilmachomas they notched up 5-14 to 1-6 and then took Kill for 4-14 to 0-8. These are some of the victories they scored up to the eastern final in which they defeated Mount Sion by 2-11 to 1-7. So Ferrybank have one splendid scoring record and this is something that will cause some little concern in the Abbeyside camp.

The western champions are not overconfident but at the same time are not unduly worried about the scoring records of their opponents. There is good reason for believing that the quality of the opposition here in the west was somewhat better than that which was encountered by Ferrybank. There can be no doubt about the fact that Abbeyside have improved as the season progressed and very few people could complain about the standard of hurling displayed in their matches against Cappoquin, St. Marys and Ring in their final three matches in the west.

The following path to the County Final looks impressive - Abbeyside 2-17 Ballysaggart 1-8; Abbeyside 0-10 Shamrocks 1-5; Abbeyside 4-9 Cappoquin 3-10; Abbeyside 0-12 Cappoquin 2-9 (defeat); Abbeyside 2-22 St. Marys 1-7. Western Final - Abbeyside 3-10 Ring 1-8.

Towards the end of their campaign in the west, the Abbeyside selectors decided on a policy of keeping their lineout unchanged as far as possible and it seems likely that they will show consistency again for the final and name Eoin Murray in goal with Conor Clancy as a reliable standby.

The fullback line will be Paudie Shields with team captain, Michael Collins at fullback and Gavin Breen in the left corner. In their halfback line, we are likely to see

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McDonnell Praises Council Co-operation In Tallow Scheme

The current £70,000 improvement scheme for the Square in Tallow which caused a wave of protest among a number of local retailers and residents is now said to be progressing satisfactorily.

The development which is being undertaken by Waterford County Council as part of the urban and village renewal scheme involves tree planting and seating arrangements in the square together with new pavements and lighting standards. Some retailers in the vicinity however previously voiced their objection to the project claiming that the trees, which will each occupy a space of 18 ft. by 12 ft., will take up valuable parking space in the square.

Speaking at last Monday's Co. Council meeting, Cllr. Willie McDonnell thanked Paul Daley and the Council engineers who met with those locals opposed to the development.

"I feel they have now worked out a reasonable agreement", he stated,

adding that over 80% of the people in Tallow are now pleased with the work going on.

He subsequently requested that a public telephone kiosk be transferred from outside a private house to an alternative location in the Brideside town.

County Engineer John O'Flynn reported that a compromise has been reached which will satisfy the majority of people in Tallow. When completed, he felt that the project will greatly enhance the town.

With regard to the phone box, Mr. O'Flynn said the matter is already in hand by Telecom Eireann.

Near Accident At Affane Cross

The dangerous junction at Affane Cross was the subject of another discussion at last Monday's Waterford County Council when Cllr. Nora Flynn revealed that there was another near traffic accident at the junction last week.

"We will have to put up a sign temporarily warning motorists of the accident blackspot", urged Cllr. Flynn.

County Engineer John O'Flynn however said there is a backlog of design work in the Council's planning section. The number of accidents over the past number of years at Affane Cross, he stated, would not automatically grant the junction blackspot status. The Council is currently working on a new design for the junction.

there is also an increased danger to children and pedestrians on the cul-de-sac road. The residents he stressed, want speed ramps or rumble strips put in place to reduce the incidence of speeding traffic.

County Engineer John O'Flynn promised to examine the situation and report back to the Council. The most obvious solution to the problem in Ballinagoul, he felt, is the introduction of rumble strips.

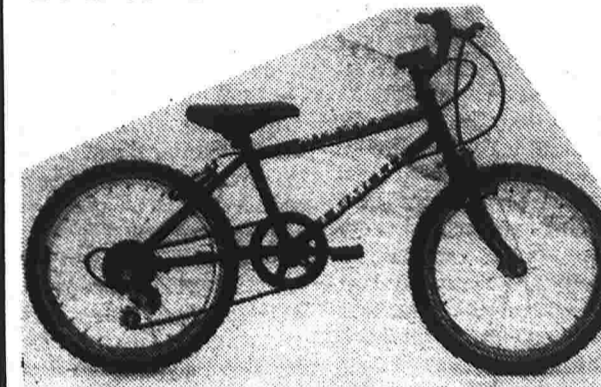
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
