Dungarvan UDC **Calls For Extra** Gardai To Patrol

sioner Pat Byrne to assign additional Gardaí in the town in an effort to patrol Cathal Brugha estate on a 24 hour basis.

In recent months the incidence of terrorism and criminal behaviour in the estate has become widespread, and many local residents are now deeply concerned about the future of their community.

According to local Urban Councillor and Waterford Fine Gael T.D. Austin Deasy, the situation in the Council estate has become intolerable over the past number of months with local residents living in fear of their lives. He knew of three different families in Cathal Brugha Place who, over the past fortnight, have

expressed a wish to leave

the estate.
"It's an appalling situation that people would want to leave the house they have

slammed Cllr. Deasy who declared that police presence is the only way to solve the anti-social problem in the estate. Stressing that something must be done immediately to resolve the

The current wheelie bin pilot scheme in Dungarvan, now into its third week, was described as a 'dry run' by Cllr. Billy Kyne at last Monday's meeting of the Urban District Council when he condemned the unhelpful way in which the bins suddenly arrived at the doors of those residents on the selected Wednesday refuse collection route.

A number of elderly people in particular, he stressed, were distressed at the appearance of these bins, some of which he claimed were lobbed in front gardens. Many houses, such as terraced houses, are

unsuitable for the wheeled refuse collection method and a number of people want the Council to take the bins back. To this effect, Cllr. Kyne urged the Town Clerk to make contact with these people.

Know Your Rights

What is sexual harassment?

Sexual harassment is defined as "unwanted conduct of a sexual nature or other conduct based on sex affecting the dignity of women and men at work. Examples are - sexually suggestive jokes or comments, lewd comments about physical appearance, display of offensive material, suggestions that sexual favours may further someone's career or that refusal may damage it. If you are being sexually harassed at work, get advice from the Employment Equality Agency, your trade union or a solicitor. If appropriate, tell the harasser that his/her behaviour is not welcome and ask that it stop. If it persists report the matter to your employer, to a supervisor, a manager or other appropriate officer. Keep a record of incidents as they happen.

Deputy Deasy Asks For Increased Funding For Sewerage Schemes & Treatment Plants

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy tabled a question in the Dail recently asking the Minister for the Environment if he will considerably increase the amount of money available for the provision of sewerage schemes and treatment plants for small towns and vil-lages, in order that villages such as Tallow, Ardmore, Dunmore East etc. can expect to have works of this na-ture carried out within a reasonable period.

Minister Brendan Howlin replied that a total of £121.8 million is being provided for water and sewerage services this year, an increase of 10% over 1995.

"This represents one of the largest investments in these services ever undertaken", he stated, "and it is contributing substantially to the provision of services in small towns and villages".

The Minister revealed that this year, up to £4 million has been set aside for urgent water and sewerage needs of small towns and villages, including two water projects in Co. Waterford.

"I have also introduced two other subprogrammes that will specifically help smaller towns and villages. The Resorts Initiative is designed to provide improved water and sewerage facilities at resort centres; schemes at 9 centres, including Tramore, have already been approved, at a cost of £3 million", revealed Minister Howlin.

The second subprogramme, he added, provides support for the use of 'reed bed technology', (involving the natural breakdown of sewerage), as a means of providing sewerage treatment facilities for small rural towns. A number of these projects have already been approved

THE KNIGHTS OF OLD HAD THEIR

In early days when knights galloped into battle covered in armour from head to foot, it was often impossible to tell friend from foe.

So that his men could gather round the right leader, each knight wore a special design of his shield and a small flag on his lance.

The were rather like a number plate. This was useful, too, when knights took part in great tournaments.

The heralds, umpires of the Middle Ages, were able to identify contenders by the designs (or devices) on their shields.

All kinds of symbols, among them animals, were used on the shields.

The famous 11th century Bayeux Tapestry shows a record of shields and banners, decorated with beasts, birds and other symbols.

From those devices grew heraldry. This happened in the 12th century, when designs started to be inherited from father to son.

A complete language of terms has come about to describe the devices and the way in which they are ar-

Colours have special names like "or"

meaning gold, "argent" for silver and "gules" for red.

Heraldry covers all the du-

ties of the herald. And heralds have existed since Norman times.

They are still kept busy with applications for grants or arms by corporations and by individuals, and for research.

There are also ceremonial duties as they are in charge of all royal state occasions, such as Coronations and funerals

The Earl Marshal is the great Officer of State responsible for these.

This position is held by all Dukes of Norfolk as male heirs of the first Duke, John Howard.

Leaf-Cutter Bee

IF YOU see the work of the leaf-cutter bee, you might be inclined to think that it uses a knife or a scissors to cut with. The bee itself looks a bit like the honeybee, but unlike the honeybee, it is a lone bee.


After the female mates, she lives on her own, building herself a small nest in a wall or in a hollow stem. When she lays her eggs, she doesn't lay them in a bundle. Each one is laid individually and parceled up in a few pieces of leaf together with some pollen and honey. When the grub hatches, it


when the grub natches, it will have all the food it needs to survive and won't have to leave its leafy home until it is mature and ready to fly.

The leaf-cutter bee takes

The leaf-cutter bee takes leaf pieces from the rose bushes in our gardens. You might have seen this small circular pieces sawn away from the leaves. These pieces are removed by the bee's strong jaws

and look very regular and perfect to be the work of an insect. Two or three pieces are used to make the egg chamber for one egg. The supply of pollen and honey is put inside first, then the bee uses her saliva to glue the rolled-up pieces together. Only then does she lay her egg. She seals the chamber up and continues this process until she has eight or nine produced. The leafy egg rooms or chambers are made in small holes or crevices in garden walls. The bee doesn't nest on the rose bush itself at any time. In the USA and Canada these bees are prized highly as plant polli-

Cappoquin **Hits Out At Hepatitis C**

The sole female member of Waterford County Council has hit out at the Government's handling of the shocking Hepatitis C scandal.

Cllr. Nora Flynn passed a happen". vote of sympathy at last week's Council meeting to the family of the late Brigid McCole of Donegal who died recently after contract-

ing Hepatitis C.
Mrs. McCole had pursued her compensation case against the State, the Drugs Advisory Board and the **Blood Transfusion Service** Board through the High Court. Her last wish was to know the truth and that the people of Ireland should know what really happened in what has been described as the greatest and saddest of public tragedies since the foundation of the State.

"It has taken the death of a woman for a Compensation Tribunal to be set up", slammed Clir. Flynn, referring to the recent move by the Government to set up a Tribunal, dealing with the claims of thousands of Hepatitis C sufferers who became infected through blood transfusions and blood products.

"Who can compensate anyone for their lack of health", she declared adding that the Minister for Health, Michael Noonan must investigate the matter fully. Heads must roll...no expense should be spared", she declared, "and this must never again be allowed to

Stating that she was disgusted by the matter, the Cappoquin Councillor said she knew of women who went around in a state of fret" for weeks not knowing if they might have contracted Hepatitis C.

Mr. Connolly revealed that a tenant management committee for Cathal Brugha is being set up at present, comprising of Garda members, Health Board representatives, social workers, youth workers, Council officials and the Council Chairman.

This committee would provide a system of help, support, encouragement, training and various facilities for local tenants, although Mr. Connolly stated that it will take time to work out a long term strategy of working with residents.

Meanwhile a spokesman for the Dungarvan Gardaí told the 'Dungarvan Leader' that garda members are assigned to patrol Cathal Brugha on a regular basis.

He disclosed that two matters are currently before the court in relation to the situation in Cathal Brugha, one has been forwarded to the Director of Public Prosecutions and the other matter will be dealt with by the court in the near future. Supporting his colleagues, Cllr. Tony Wright said that while some areas of the town are ideal for wheelie bins such as semi detached houses and estates, other areas, terraced houses in particular, are extremely unsuitable. Householders in these houses, he warned, have to drag the bin over carpets and through rooms a totally unhygienic method, "with the dogs of the street piddling against it (bin)".

The County Manager, he stated, cannot bring in a refuse collection charge if the elected members do not

charge", declared Cllr. Wright, "no more than we declared Cllr. would tolerate a charge for public lighting or public

Such a charge, he felt, would be yet another tax on people who already pay on average over £4,000 a year. The funding for refuse col-lection has to be borne fully by the State.

Also speaking on the con-troversial issue of charges, Cllr. Damien Dillon said the commercial property owners in the town are already paying enough taxes and are not going to go along with another charge. He revealed that as a business man in the support it. town he pays ten different "We will not tolerate a taxes and rating systems."

He suggested that with so many different developments in the town at present, the Council could generate revenue from these projects to defray the cost of refuse collection.

FOOLISH TO IMPOSE

Cllr. Austin Flynn said it would be foolish of the Council to try to impose the wheelie bin system in areas where its not wanted, while Cllr. Michael O'Riordan highlighted the plight of residents in Friary Street, Shandon and Garvan's Terrace where the bins have to

be negotiated over steps. Cllr. Nuala Ryan stressed that old people living on their own cannot move their wheelie bin and have to leave them in the front gar-

MANAGER SATISFIED SCHEME CAN **OPERATE**

Responding to the concerns and reservations expressed by members, County Manager Donal Connolly said he was satis-fied that the UDC delivered the wheelie bins to households in a proper manner. Each household on the selected route, he stated, was notified of the feasibility study by way of a handbille continues.

prior to the delivery of the wheelie bins.

He accepted that some people might be concerned at the pilot scheme, and added that he has already met with a deputation of local residents.

"I'm satisfied that the scheme can operate", he stated, adding that smaller bins are available for residents of terraced houses.

The vast majority of peo-ple on the selected Wednesday route are satisfied with the wheelie bin method and Mr. Connolly said he would wait another week or two into the scheme and then consult

with local residents.
On the issue of charges, Mr. Connolly said he has not yet made a decision on whether to introduce a fee and it would depend on the overall cost of the collection to the Council.

"It may not necessarily give rise to a charge", he disclosed.

It is expected that Mr. Connolly's strategy in regard to a possible fee for wheeled refuse collection will be revealed by November 25th, the date when the Council will decide on the estimate of expenses for next year.

And a last warning — don't keep money in your home.

The new regulations will present no problem to the rich of this country but will leave many poorer families in situations where they will not be able to afford a car. 

A Good Time For Planting Fruit Trees

This month is a very good time for planting fruit trees.

The season for planting extends from the time the leaves fall in autumn until active growth starts in spring.

But I've always preferred October planting because trees that have been settled in the ground for some months can take better advantage of the spring growing weather than those that have only just been planted.

Many of you will be thinking about planting apple trees. If you haven't already got any in your garden, then it will be fun to pick your own crops over the years.

But do remember that apple trees — and any fruit tree for that matter — will be permanent features in your garden. It's going to be there for a very long time, so you must choose carefully where you plant them.

There are so many different varieties of apples that you might wish to get some expert advice from your nurseyman. For instance, some apples taste best when they're taken straight from the tree, while others can be stored for a while and still retain their freshness and juiciness. Then again, you may want some cooking apples.

The planting sites for all fruit trees (apples, pears and plums) should be well prepared by digging 2 ft. deep, then, if the soil is poor, spreading a little rotted manure on the surface and forking this in. If you don't

nure on the surface and forking this in. If you don't have any manure, rotted compost will do fine.

Cut back all the broken roots and spread these dur-

ing planting, to their widest extent, covering them with fine soil. Provide a stake for each standard and halfstandard tree, making sure you insert it before you cover over the roots.

You can get special ties for fixing the tree to the stake, but I still prefer the good old fashioned method of using some stout weather-proof twine, having first wrapped a piece of sacking around the stem to prevent chafing.


With apple, pear and plum trees, plant standards 30 ft. apart and half-standards 18 ft. apart. Fan-shaped and espaliers 12 ft., bush 10 to 15 ft. cordons 4 ft.

When it comes to pear trees, you really can't beat the good old Conference, especially as it is a good cropper.

And for a single plum tree, then stick to the best known — Victoria. There are many who will tell you it has its faults and can be susceptible to silver leaf, but even so, I think it's the best all-round plum of the lot.

Good Turnout At Teagasc Beef Producer Meetings

A total of 300 beef farmers attended three successful Teagasc Beef Advisory Meetings in Co. Waterford recently. The meetings were addressed by Teagasc Advisers Patrick O'Brien, Tom Fallon, William McCarthy, Peter Comer, David Wallis and chaired by John Moloney, Chief Agricultural Officer.

Farmers were told by Patrick O'Brien that the current drop in beef prices could lead to a drop in gross margin of £80 per suckler cow for the weanling pro-

ducer. However, this drop could be offset by improvement in efficiencies, especially in the area of grassland management. Increased use of rotational grazing systems will result in grazed grass becoming a larger part of the total diet of beef animals and thereby reducing total feeds costs. One of the more startling figures highlighted at the meeting was that 1 kg. of daily gain cost £1.04 when animals are indoors and £0.21 when animals are grazing. These figures

clearly emphasised the importance of extending the grazing season as long as possible, consistent with good grassland management.

According to David Wallis, a recent Teagasc survey revealed that it is costing £2.23 to produce a kg. of beef in a calf to beef system. This same kg. of beef is being sold for £1.81 at present. This is not a sustainable situation and again through improved grassland management, costs can be reduced by at least 13p per kg. The price which is being paid for calves must also be reviewed in the context of current prices. On the controversial issue of cattle slaughter weights it was pointed out that 40% of Irish steers are over fat and that leaner carcasses with a fat score of 3 or 4 L are what the market requires in the future. These objectives can be achieved without changing from the existing beef breeds, if they are slaughtered at lighter weights.

The meeting was told by Tom Fallon that the relatively low stocking rate on many cattle farms provided an opportunity for dry stock farmers to avail of the Rural Environment Protection Scheme (REPS). If cattle farms do not require to spend large sums of money on pollution control, then by farming according to a REPS plan, income could be supplemented to the tune of £2,000-£3,000 per annum for 5 years. Tom also emphasised the need for care in calculating the stocking rate for the farm when applying for the beef premia as small errors can be expensive if the farmer disqualifies himself from extensification payments.

A lively debate followed the talks given by the speakers, with the questions focussing on the values of stock in various categories for finishing and the relative value of feedstuffs. In closing the meeting, John Moloney emphasised that people should not change from their existing systems of beef production. Instead each individual should focus on maximising his/her income from his/her existing system by reducing costs and improving efficiencies.

DAIRYING

LAMENESS

If lameness is a problem, preventative hoof paring should be carried out by the Farm Relief Service a few months before calving. Bad cubicles and rough concrete surfaces are major causes of lameness and should be avoided. Seriously lame cows should be taken off concrete and put in a straw bedded house.

MILK FEVER

If milk fever is a problem with Autumn calvers, feed one ounce of Cal Mag or equivalent magnesium for about one month before calving. Also, avoid having cows too fat and do not feed mineral containing Calcium. Drenching with 4 ounces of limestone flour at calving and again 12 hours later is also helpful.

Cows should be introduced to low levels of concentrates for 1-2 weeks before calving to avoid digestive up-

Since the introduction of seed-only sowing systems, many farmers are leaving P and K application until Spring. This is fine at high soil levels of P and K but at lower levels the P and K needs to be incorporated at sowing (see table):

A soil test is the only sure way to know your soil fertility. At Index 4, considerable savings can be made on the cost of P and K fertiliser.

Trace elements may be required in the back end where severe deficiencies exist, Zinc, Manganese and Copper should be applied, preferably in chelate form, where known deficiencies exist.

FARM SAFETY

SLURRY GAS IS DEADLY:

Many farmers are now emptying the slurry tanks before the onset of winter. This is a very dangerous job and every precaution must be taken to avoid a build up of Hydrogen Sulphide within the house, resulting in death of animals and humans alike.

- Pick a windy day and open all doors and outlets to ensure high and low ventilation. Do not enter any poorly ventilated space where gas build-up could occur.
- Evacuate all persons and stock from the building.
 Children in particular should not go near the building or agitation point.
- ◆ Stay away from the agitation point for the first 30 minutes of mixing, especially after breaking the crust as this is when most Hydrogen Sulphide is released.
- A special full face mask fitted with a B2 canister gives a high level of protection against Hydrogen Sulphide, if properly used.
- Never go into a slurry thank without suitable breathing apparatus and a harness attached to a lifeline controlled by at least 2 adults.

Mr. Gray said the Minister's failure to act on this issue will come back to haunt sheep farmers in future years when it again becomes apparent that the present sheep policy particularly on ewe premium is fundamentally flawed.

























PEN PICTURES OF ARDMORE'S MINOR FOOTBALLERS






