

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KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question: Who can get a Rent Allowance and how is it calculated?

Answer: A Rent Allowance is a means tested Supplement available to those who are in private rented accommodation. It is administered by the Community welfare officers in Health Centres. You will not normally qualify for a Rent Allowance if you are working full-time, in full-time education or involved in a trade dispute (your adult dependent may). Students on Vocational Training Opportunities Scheme or the 3rd Level Allowance Scheme are allowed to retain their Rent Allowance while studying full-time.

Rent Allowance while studying full-time. In deciding whether or not to pay a Supplement the Community Welfare Officer will take into account a number of factors - The size of your accommodation and of you are over accommodated, whether alternative arrangements can be made. If you have recently moved from your parental home and if so the reason why? If you have moved from less expensive accommodation. If you are sharing the accommodation with other tenants, if you are over accommodated you may be asked to find cheaper accommodation or to sublet. The amount of Rent Allowance you will get will depend on your means. You will be asked to complete a claim form and produce evidence of rent - Rent book, Receipts for Bank Statements. Your landlord may be asked to complete a form stating how much rent you pay (It may also ask for the landlord's registration number with the local authority but as 90% of Landlords have not registered, this is a matter for the local Authority, to deal with and the Community Welfare Officer cannot refuse a Supplement because the Landlord is not registered).

f you are in receipt of Long Term Unemployment Assistance £64.50 for instance, this is £2.10 over the basic Supplementary Welfare Allowance (C.S.A.) which is £62.40 Supplementary Welfare Allowance has £6 towards rent, so you will have £8.10 towards the rent. If the rent is £40 a week, the most you will receive is £40 minus £8.10, or £31.90.

Social welfare has a leaflet SW28 "Do you need help paying your rent or mortgage" and the Irish National Organisation of the Unemployed (INOU) have a booklet "Everything you need to know to get a Supplementary Welfare Allowance."

The absence of a generally available electricity supply severely restricted growth in the rural economy where the way of life had changed very little for generations. Farming for most was of a subsistence nature and there was little in the way of industry. Tourism was undeveloped, emigration sapped the life-blood of the community and, in the home, many of the basics that were beginning to be taken for granted among town dwellers, such as running water, refrigerators, an electric iron or kettle etc., were simply not available.

GREATEST SOCIAL REVOLUTION

In 1941 at the request of the Government, the ESB began a special study of the problem of extending electricity supply to reach the farming community. In 1944 they were asked to proceed with plans for widespread rural electrification over a ten year period to begin when the necessary legisla-tion was enacted. The Board was authorised to spend up to £5 million on bringing supply to rural areas.

1945 the basic organisation for carrying out the Rural Electrification programme was established. It was decided to carry out this ambitious scheme by developing areas of about 25 square miles at a time - one in each county. Many people will remember the demonstration units which visited these areas prior to "switch-on" to show farmers how electricity could benefit them.

The job of supplying rural areas was enormous in terms of manpower and other resources. By the end of 1949, almost 10,000 new rural customers were connected to the ESB network. This was to be the beginning of what has been described as the greatest social revolution in the country

electricity in Ardmore, Old Parish, Ring, Grange and Kinsalebeg. Electricity was already available in Dungarvan since August 21st 1921, supplied by the local Dungarvan Electric Light Company, who were based near St. John's Castle.

Many people will remem-ber the late Monny Coleman who held a longstanding record of 52 years service with the electricity industry up to his retirement in 1975. Monny often had to cycle from Dungarvan to Lismore, Cappoquin and Tallow with all his rolls of cable, wire and materials across the bicycle to wire the houses of these towns.


A TIME OF **INNOVATION**

Amongst the rural popula-When the war ended in tion, it was found that the replacement of old methods of lighting was the main reason for installing electricity. People tended to restrict their use of supply in the early stages but gradually extended it to out-offices and farmyard lighting.

The labour saving value of appliances such as kettles, irons, cookers in the house and grinders on the farm, were quickly appreciated. The iron was without doubt the most popular item. This was a time of innovation many farmers probably remember making an electri-cally heated chicken brooder on the basis of chicken specifications supplied by the Board.

In these early days of rural electrification rural consumers read their own electricity meters and posted the readings to the ESB. This helped to keep down the cost of providing what was for the Board an expensive service.

FROM KETTLES & **IRONS TO PUMPS**

By the end of 1954, more than 100,000 rural consumers were supplied with electricity. Bringing supply to these consumers involved the erection of over 300,000 poles and 16,000 miles of power lines.

The changes which this supply brought to people's lives are evident from figures from 1954. Three quarters of rural consumers had mains radios, two thirds had electric irons and almost half had electric kettles. About one in ten farms used infra red lamps, water pumps and pulpers. Milling machines and grain grinders were also becoming popular. The problems of persuading people in rural areas to take supply, (which were considerable in the early stages of the Rural Scheme), had all but disappeared when the advantages of an electricity supply became well known. Indeed, by

the early 60's most of the rural areas throughout the country were provided with electricity.

BENEFITS AND OPPORTUNITIES

The arrival of electricity in rural areas was a cause of great celebration at the time. Of greater significance however were the benefits and opportunities which followed on from its availability.

Perhaps the most significant of these at the time was the development of piped water in rural areas which was never possible without access to electric water pumps. Many rural dwellers will remember with excitement the first supply of piped water which eliminated the drudgery associated with carrying water from the well.

The widespread availability of electric power also laid the foundations for future industrial development. As the supply was extended hout the country, it enabled industry to come to the small centres of population and helped to stem the tide of emigration. The local forge was converted to a workshop with the aid of electricity. The workshop grew into a small engineering industry which employed more people.

WHERE DOES THE COUNTRY GET ITS ENERGY?



Put your handkerchief under water and it will get wet. Or will it? Not necessarily. Here's a trick that your friends won't believe possible, says Derek Hall in his book How To Make A Rainbow (Hamlyn).

Push your hankie firmly into the bottom of a glass so it takes up as little space as possible.

Turn the glass upside down and put in a bowl of water, keeping it as straight as you can. The water will rise only a little way up because the air inside the glass holds it down. Your hankie will stay dry.

Here's another amazing water trick - performing moth balls.

Fill a glass nearly full of water. Add a tablespoon of baking soda and stir until dissolved. Put a tablespoon of vinegar into water.

Drop three moth balls into the solution, watch what happens. Bubbles of gas form on the moth balls and they will float to the surface.

Some bubbles will float to the sur-

face and some will burst into the air. Then the moth ball to which they were attached will slowly sink. More bubbles will form on the moth ball and it will rise again then fall.

This is because the mixture of vinegar and baking soda forms carbon dioxide gas. Bubbles stick to the rough moth ball surface and act as floats.

With water you can make your own stalactites and stalagmites, which are the beautiful formations found in

Tie four pieces of string to two nails, making sure strings are long enough to reach from the bottom of one jar, over top of box, to the bottom of the

other jar.

Dissolve us much Epsom salts as you can in water (enough to fill the two jars). When no more salt will dissolve it will settle on the bottom.

Fill each jar with solution and place a nail in each with strings draped over top of box. Soon the solution will start to creep up the strings.

As the water evaporates from box and string, the salt left will slowly make stalactites hanging from the string and stalagmites grow up from the bottom of the box.

Why Does Wood Rot?

means it is a living thing made up of little box-like units called cells. Like all living cells - these die. Two of the most common causes of decay are attacks from insects and the growth of fungi.

In leaves or flowers the cells are usually square or round in outline. In timber or wood they are usually long and narrow because they have to serve as tubes for carrying sap from the roots up to the tree trunk. The cell walls are strong and fibrous because they have to support the weight of the leaves and branches of the tree. They connect to make the strong and pliable substance known as wood.

The cells don't carry sap for the lifetime of the tree, because the trunk and boughs grow bigger and soon contain more cells than are needed or required. As a result the inner part of the trunk and branches stop carrying sap, and the cells fill up, over time, with gums and resins which make them harder, stronger and better able to fight off decay

When the wood is cut or sawed the cells are full of watery sap. This timber is left stacked outside for several months, or in a special drying-room, called a kiln, for several days. It is then "seasoned" and can be

Why do Butterflies rest in the sun?

During the summer, you will sometimes see a butterfly sitting on a leaf or a twig with it's wings spread out. It does this to heat the blood in it's wings and raise the temperature of it's body. If a butterfly is not warm enough, it will not be able to fly. The heat from the sun provides the energy that the butterfly needs to fly from flower to flower in search of nectar. The butterfly needs nectar for energy.

How does a homing pigeon finds it's way home without using a map?

The type of pigeon that we see in our towns can be trained to find it's way home if it has been given special training while still young. These type of pigeons are called homing pigeons. Homing pigeons live in big wire cages outside. There, their owner gives them food and water and, after a while, they realise that the cage is their home. Then the pigeons are taken some distance from where they live and are let go. The pigeons can tell from the position of the sun or stars, the countryside and the direction of the wind how to find their way home. 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

TAXI DRIVER HAILED A HEROINE

A taxi driver is being hailed a heroine after transporting an unconscious two year old boy to the Regional Hospital, Waterford, with his mother fearing for her son's life during a traumatic journey. Breda Kennedy phoned for an ambulance when her son Jamie began to vomit blood. Instead of an ambulance a taxi turned up at her home at Highfield Grove, Clonmel. The child kept getting up huge amounts of blood in the taxi, and at Kilsheelan the boy lost consciousness. From Clonmel to Kilsheelan, the taxi driver Joan Lonergan, Upper Irishtown, Clonmel and formerly Hallinan of Knockeragha, Ballymacarbry was in constant contact with the ambulance control centre at St. Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel, pleading for an ambulance and a medical back-up. The mother said she thought her child was going to die, the taxi driver was brilliant. The taxi driver decided in Kilsheelan to take the back road to Waterford to avoid children coming out of school in Piltown, Fiddown and Mooncoin and to avoid the Bridge in Waterford and Mooncoin and to avoid the Bridge in waterstate being open. When they got to the Regional Hospital, Waterford, the doctors could not believe that the child came by taxi, he did not have oxygen or any other medical facilities. We salute this lady driver, she saved this boy's life." "

CRIMINAL JUSTICE A **QUESTION OF** BALANCE

United Farmers Association proposes that the traditional policing policy used in rural freland be maintained for the following reasons. The system of having a local Garda Barracks staffed by a Sergeant and a number of Gardai worked very well in crime prevention and detection and should not now be discarded. Under this system. the local gardai knew every-body in their area and know almost everything that normally happened in an area. Therefore Gardai were in a great position to spot any strange people or unusual activity in their area and to take immediate action to detect or deter crime. If a member of the community had any fear or reason to believe that a crime was contemplated the matter could be raised in a confidential chat with a personally known garda and very often serious crimes were nipped in the bud in this manner.

Most people do not like talking into machines mounted on a barrack wall, if they wish to seek advice or assistance, or if they wish to make a complaint they wish to make a complaint or report a crime. The idea of having squad cars from towns and cities making the occa-sional foray into the countryside is not adequate policing and is not acceptable to rural dwellers. This system means that the gardai do not know the people or the area properly and consequently are not in a position to be fully effective in detection and prevention of crime. Very often criminals will have long flown when the squad car arrives. When there is not a constant local garda resence, criminals can establish soft targets living very often alone in remote areas and move in for the kill when the time is right.

Among the recent spate of murders, robbery with violence and some times torture, there are classic examples of serious crime that could have been detected or deterred by local gardai. Our elderly, isolated and vulnerable people are entitled to the protection and comfort of local gardai.

- ★ Do not drink and drive — alcohol does affect your driving.
- ★ Never allow children to use the front seat of your car put them in the back and fit the proper child safety seats.
- ★ Keep your car roadworthy — have your brakes, steering, lights, tyres, etc. checked.
- ★ Drive with care and caution expect the unexpected.
- ★ If jogging, walking or cycling at nighttime wear bright clothes and reflective arm and body bands.
- ★ Always switch on your front and rear lights when cycling at night.
- ★ When cycling always wear an approved cycle helmet.

Looking back on the report The canal was used for exporting corn with warehouses - still to be seen - at the canal head. There was also traffic in coal and timber and the canal was self-financing with a toll of 2 1/2 new pence (4 - 6 old pence) being levied at the lock.

The canal fell into disuse in 1925 as railway transport and the coming of lorries began to take over. We will again in future notes look more closely at the history of the canal for we believe the canal can be developed into a scenic asset for the town approx. width is 10 1/2 ft. and as a heritage town,

canals are part of our native heritage both functional and historical. The historical integrity of canals must be protected as they represent a landmark in our native historical engineering and also the canal is of great archaeological interest, especially to present day students.

As we have said we will return to the subject of the canal in the next few weeks and maybe some of our readers might be interested in commenting and making suggestions of what should be done to improve the canal and make it a more attractive amenity.

halting site at Shandon where the Minister met with local traveller families and saw at first hand the high level of involvement and co-operation between the local authority and residents of the Shandon site.

According to U.D.C. Chairman, Cllr. Paddy Power, in the very near future the Council will submit proposals to the Minister's Department for the upgrading of the existing halting site.

"The Dungarvan halting site," he stated, "has not been without its problems in the past but with co-operation between national and local agencies and the voluntary sector as well, I am certain we can make progress on our own local problems."

Cllr. Power said the work of the local Shandon site committee is already beginning to bear fruit and in time he felt that the Council will have services of a very acceptable standard for the travelling community at Shandon.

SUCCESSFUL URBAN RENEWAL

Following her visit to the halting site which was well kept and neatly ordered on the day, Minister McManus was escorted to Davitt's Quay where she viewed current construction work on a number of urban renewal projects. The Council had previously requested the Minister for an extension of the Urban Renewal

Scheme deadline which is due to end next July. Under the scheme, McInerneys plan to build a hotel and apartments on the site of the former Leather factory while Clancy Construction is in the process of building a major residential/retail development also on Davitt's Quay. To qualify for valuable tax incentives, however these projects have to be completed by July 31st next year. Describing the projects on the Quay as ample evidence of a thriving private sector in the construction industry, Cllr. Power said the Urban Renewal programme has been highly successful in the town, if a little slower than the U.D.C. would have liked.

"I take this opportunity of asking you, Minister to look favourably on our request of a month ago for an extension of time for this scheme," he stated. "The special nature of the problems encountered by the developers are somewhat exceptional and worthy of consideration," he added.

In reply, Minister Mc-Manus promised to make a decision on the Council's request as soon as possible. She revealed that in the next 6 weeks a major assessment of the existing Urban Renewal schemes throughout the country will be published by her Department.

"The present Urban Renewal scheme in Dungaryan

has been extremely successful," she stated adding that while she is sympathetic to the points being made by the U.D.C., the scheme is due to finish next July. She felt that one of the main reasons behind the scheme's success in Dungarvan was the pro-active role of the local Council in promoting and encouraging investment by private developers.

Following a brief visit of the newly developed local authority estates at O'Connell Street, the tour progressed to the 31 house Respond estate at Spring Marquis now nearing completion. The Minister complimented Fr. Pat Cogan of the Respond Voluntary Housing Agency and said he had pioneered a fundamental change in housing policy with his approach to

estate management. £2,500 TO CHILDERS

The final destination on the Minister's packed agenda was Childers Estate where she saw at first hand the work of the recently established estate management group. Encouraged by this example of partnership between the Council and the community, Minister Mc-Manus announced that her Department has allocated £2,500 (a figure to be matched by the local Council) to the Childers Management Group.

Her brief visit ended, Minister McManus was obviously impressed by her fact finding mission to Dungarvan. The officials and members of Dungarvan U.D.C. acquitted themselves extremely well and an indelible impression of a committed, progressive and positive community.

To mark the occasion, Cllr. Power presented Minister McManus with an exquisite piece of Waterford Crystal.

£50m Headage Payout Already Made _ IFA

Walsh said that up to £50m has already been paid out in headage payments to 40,000 livestock farmers and 12,500 sheep farmers. IFA has now been assured by the Department of Agriculture that all remaining headage worth a further £60m will be paid to all eligible applicants by the end of the year.

Mr. Walsh said headage navments had commenced at the end of September but had been stalled due to payments being made to farmthe BSE

Since October 16th payments have recommenced and it is now expected that all eligible cases would be paid by the end of the year.

It is expected that total headage payout will be of the order of £110m and IFA is now calling for all payments to be made out as quickly as possible given the very serious income crisis that is facing farmers particularly in the Disadvantages Areas.

Allen Blames EU For Slow Progress On BSE

From Luxembourg recently, Frank Allen, President of ICMSA said that the EU Council of Agricultural Ministers is dragging its heels in dealing with income support for cattle and beef farmers.

He said "It is impossible to understand the slowness of progress being made. Income support for cattle and beef producers is of urgent importance. The EU should act decisively and put an overall programme in place to rid the Community of BSE. The longer discussion drags on, the more difficult it will be to retain consumer confi-

Mr. Allen concluded, "there are too many political issues preventing a resolution to income support for farmers. They are the real sufferers. If the EU is not seen to act with a well thought out programme to quickly eradicate BSE, Ireland in particular will bear a heavy cost as we are so dependent on beef and cattle exports."



It's Easier Than You Think To **Breed Your** wn Roses!

It's easier than you might think. The right time to do it is in summer, but I thought that if I tell you how to do it now, it's something you can look forward to doing once the boring winter months are over.


Pick as your female plant a rose which you know produces seed pods (rose hips).

Select a rosebud just about to open and carefully remove all its petals. This will reveal a ring of male stamens which carry the pollen, around the stigmas, which are the female part.

Emasculate the flower by snipping off all the stamens with a small pair of scissors and blow them away. To protect the flower from insects bearing unwanted pollen, put

a polythene bag over it and tie this around the stem. By the next day the stigmas should be sticky and ready for impregnating.

Now comes the sexy bit. Remove the bag, and from an open rose of the other variety you intend to use, pick up some pollen on a



Replace the bag and leave for a week or so. Then remove it or there will be a danger from mildew. By then, fertilisation should have taken place and pollen-bearing insects won't matter.

Label the stem of the bud to remind yourself of the two varieties you used.


Eventually the bud will turn into a seed pod which will be red when ripe. Detach this from the plant, put it into a small box of sand (an old margarine container will do) and bury it in the garden with a labelled marker.


The seeds need winter frosts to help them mature properly. You could put the seed pod in sand in a polythene bag in the fridge — not the freezer — for the winter. But don't forget the label!

In spring, the seeds can be removed from the pod there will be about 25 — and planted in seed boxes.

Transfer the resulting seedling to pots. They should flower in July or August.

Michael Sargent late of Cappoquin and Fermoy

AN APPRECIATION

A final salute to a friend from another time and a better generation. Michael Sargent was full of life from the beginning and as a "little nipper" he caused consternation among the older generation of his day in Cappoquin. He was known to most of them as "Duf-

When he grew up he became famous for his feats in motorcycle racing with his brother Willie who was more into road racing as Michael specialised in grasstrack racing. He was the person to beat if you were to win a race.

While Willie was winning the big races on the road, Michael was the man that tuned the engines for him as he was a super mechanic. It was a sport that cost him the life of his brother. He was later in life to suffer an even greater tragedy with the loss of his son Ed-

He was also very involved in the rowing club over a long period of his life and worked like a slave to make a success of many a regatta.

During his business years in Cappoquin, as main agents for Morris Cars, many people in the county and outside bought their first Morris Minor from Michael. He was a most courteous and kind person to do business with, but with the changing attitudes of the coming generation he was no longer thanked for his help and he closed his business in Cappoquin some twenty-five years ago before taking up a position in Fermoy where he was more successful. Fermoy gained and Cappoquin was the loser as the life went out of that part of the town.

His life-long interest and past-time was "the River" and a boat. He could go up and down the river all day and still want to go again tomorrow. He, with Pat Grubb, was the first to introduce water skiing to Villierstown where both of them would ski to Youghal and back in mid-winter!

He was one of the first to start shark fishing from Youghal and Dungarvan and his ability to tell how big they were, how to gaff a shark and what they did when he had it in the boat, were legendary to those that knew him and understood his technical terms.

When he recalled the stories of characters from the past he seldom realised that in his ability to make the stories so realistic that he was a character in himself. He was a great teacher in many respects, as he could teach how to handle a boat, fish, drive a car and the technical knowledge of the motor trade as many successful men of today learned under his keen eye and quick comments which was not forgotten.

As he was laid to rest in St. Declan's Cemetery, the river was calm and gentle as if in respect to somebody who was sailing out for the last time.

To his son Martin and his wife Mercy their loss is great. May he sail forever on calm water over the oceans of time to a calm harbour in paradise. Be

Roll out the pastry on a lightly floured surface and use to line the tin. Trim the edges and chill for 20 minutes. Meanwhile, heat the oil in a large frying pan and add the garlic and onion. Cook for 4 - 5 minutes. Add the pepper and courgette and cook for a further 3 minutes until softened. Remove with a slotted spoon and drain on absorbent kitchen paper. Leave to cool. Line the pastry case with greaseproof paper and fill with baking beans. Bake blind on the hot baking sheet for 10 minutes. Remove the beans and paper and cook for a further 10 minutes. Remove from the oven. Cool. Reduce the oven temperature to 180°C/350°F/Gas mark 4. Arrange the vegetables in the pastry case. Beat the

eggs and cream together and season well with salt

and season well with salt and freshly ground black pepper. Pour over the vegetables. Bake for 30 minutes until the custard has set. Serve warm with soured cream, if liked.

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



JACK McGRATH — A BRICKEY TRIBUTE

Jack McGrath was laid in his final resting place in the Parish church graveyard on Monday last and he was given an impressive, fitting send-off by the Brickey Club and all his many friends. It didn't surprise me that young and old and all classes and creeds turned out to pay their last respects.

Jack was that kind of man; he had a rare ability to mix and converse with young and old and rich and poor alike. To the youngsters who spent their time in Bushy Park he was a father figure; he encouraged them to kick football and, on occasions, scolded them when they got up to some devilment; it was all taken in the good spirit in which it was intended.

To us adults Jack was the 'Boss' or the 'Gaffer' as he was affectionately nicknamed; he wasn't given the label 'Gaffer' lightly as he had an uncanny ability to manipulate people into getting any particular job done. He didn't take 'no' for an answer. He was a man of action more than a talker. He was a master craftsman and was justifiably very proud of his prowess as a builder; all the jobs he was directly responsible for down through the years bear testimony to his motto that if a job was worth doing, it was worth doing well.

Jack was a clubman apart. The club wouldn't be in the healthy state that it is today without his herculean contribution. He put his heart and soul into the development of Bushy Park and the club pavilion. We all know that it was a labour of love, but it still required great dedication and persistence to bring the whole project to fruition

Financial resources were more often than not in very short supply, but Jack had an extraordinary ability to make do with what was available. He begged and borrowed and often collected items that others had literally consigned to the dump. Usually, he was the only person who could see what possible use these discarded items would be put to; invariably, he was proved to be abso-

lutely 'spot-on."

The story of the building of the club pavilion and Jack's central role in it is one that some day will be fully documented. Jack doesn't need to have a monument built to keep his memory alive; while the club pavilion exists and for as long as boys and girls are kicking football in Bushy Park, Jack will never be forgotten. Just a few short weeks ago, Jack, in conjunction with his great pal Martin "The Captain' Curran, officially opened Bushy Park. Jack didn't admit as much, but it was obvious from his demeanour that this was one of his proudest moments.

Máiread, his life's partner and himself, were a cracking combination. Jack was a very independent-minded person, as is Máiread, and yet they complemented one another in a most unusual and effective way. It would be impossible to quantify the extent to which the Brickey Club has benefitted from the effectiveness of their combined talents.

Jack was active right up to the very end. Just a few weeks before he died he was still out and about driving the 'van' with 'Scruffy,' his little terrier, as his constant companion. This was the attitude with which he bore his final illness. Any enquiry as to how he felt was dismissed in his usual humorous way. In the end he bowed out gracefully, as if, even in death, as in life, he didn't believe in making a fuss. There was a certain completeness about Jack's death; he had reached a fulness of years; he had led a very full life; and he died at home, in his own bed, without pain and with all his family gathered around him. He deserved no less.

To Mairead his wife, to his daughters Kay and Joanie, to his sons Jim, Jerry, Johnny and Albert, to his brother Joe, we extend the sincerest sympathy of the Brickey club.



He said that the failure of the club to give adequate notice that they were not going to field, left the Officer Board with no option but to remove them from the championship in accordance with the terms of Rule 109. The club were notified in accordance with

Tom Curran, Secretary of An Gaeltacht Club, said that a postponement was being negotiated with St. Olivers and it was after this failed that they went about notifying the Board. They were unable to field because a number of their players were working away. Tomas O Caodhla and Nioclas Mac Craith were very critical of the Officer Board and challenged there right to decide the issue without having a meeting of the full Board. A delegate pointed out that if a meeting had to be called every time a club was pe-nalised for not fielding after being refused a postpone-ment, the would be may-

Apart from the three members of the club and Micheal O Toibin, Scana Phobal, there was no support for the submissions made on behalf of the Gaeltacht. Subsequently, the Chairman ruled that An Gaeltacht were properly disqualified in acruling was accepted by the sent (2 weeks) and club meeting.



visibility for divers. Some of these local divers included Trevor Massey, Tony Hickey and Michael and Eamonn Cathal who showed tremendous courage and commitment in braving the elements to search for the body.

The marathon search finally ended last Friday when the body of James Maher was seen floating in the water and was taken from the river by Cappoquin man Tom Morrissey.

The body was transferred by ambulance to Waterford Regional Hospital where a post mortem examination was carried out on Friday night. Gardai say that there are no suspicious circumstances.
