# Co. Council To Tak Water Charge BY AISLING Defaulters To Cour

In an effort to recoup over £400,000 owed in water charges by a small minority of consumers in the County, cash starved Waterford County Council have embarked on a legal course of action.

Due to the legal implications of disconnecting consumers (a method used previously by the Council), it has now been decided to collect outstanding water charge bills through the court.

This is the first time ever that the County Council has resorted to court action against water charge defaulters and it is understood that a number of cases will be heard in court at the end of this month.

According to the Council Finance Officer, Paul Clerkin, resistance to water charges is confined to a small percentage of consumers, namely 15 - 20%. The outstanding bill of £400,000 stretches back over a period of almost 5 years.

Mr. Clerkin revealed that all Co. Waterford con-

# KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

I have a disability and I cannot leave the house. Can I get on the Special Voters List? ANSWER

Application forms - SV1 - for the Special Voters List are available from your County Council, City or Town Hall. Applications made now must be in by 25th November for inclusion in the Electoral Register which comes out on 15th February '97, so you will not be on the List as a Special Voter for the Referendum in

The Special Voters List is for electors with a physical illness or disability who are unable to go in person to vote at the polling station and their condition is likely to continue for the duration of the Register of Electors

There are 2 parts to the application form: (A) to be completed by the applicant, (B) by a doctor. All applicants will be notified by their Local Authority of the decision on the application and if it is refused, will be given the reasons for the refusal.

If you are approved to go on the List, at the time of an election or Referendum, a ballot paper will be brought to your house by a Special Presiding Officer accompanied by a member of the Gardai. Having made a declaration of identity, you will mark the ballot paper in secret and place it in a sealed envelope which the Special Presiding Officer will convey to the Returning Officer of the Constituency.

The thought of a mouse scurrying around the house fills many people with horror.

So imagine what it would be like to be invaded by an army of mice.

This actually happened in Australia. Farmers began to notice armies of mice on their land in 1969.

"They were like a moving carpet in places. A farmer could trap 300 or 400 a night!" says Jane Ferguson in her book A Book of Disasters

(Hippo, 70p).
In the wheat-growing belt of the Malee in the State of Victoria, farmers have never known anything like it. Mice had never before eaten crops that were actually growing.

Not only did they attack the stored foods, but did enormous damage to the sheeps stubble grazing, rice and maize, as well as fruit and vegetables. All farmers could do was to wait for winter and hope the frost would kill the mice, or that they would eat each other.

They finally disappeared as mysteriously as they had come. But 10 years later they were back on the

Not content with eating the harvest, they moved indoors. People found dead mice in baths, sinks and water tanks. Sleeping children were having their hair pulled out to line the mices nests.

### Does a cow have four stomachs?

A cow does not have four stomachs. It's stomach is divided into four compartments, which seems to be almost the same thing.

goats, sheep antelopes and camels all have the habit of swallow-ing their food and later bringing it back up to the mouth. They then can chew their food at leisure. These type of animals are called "cud-chewing" or ruminants. The reason why these animals developed this method of chewing is because their ancestors were easy prey to stronger flesh-eating beasts. Thousands of years ago these animals would eat their food quickly and then go into a hiding place to chew in their own time. They protected themselves in this way.


Chewing the cud is made possible by the cow's complicated stomach. It has four compartments -the paunch or "rerun"; the

"reticulum", or honeycomb bag; the "omasum", or manyplies; and the "abomasum" or true stomach.

When the animal first swallows it's food, it is in the form of a coarse pellet which goes into the paunch which is the biggest of the four compartments. It is made softer there and goes into the reticulum. It is moulded here into "cuds" of convenient size. Later they are passed back up into the mouth by regurgi-tation. After they have been chewed, they are swallowed a second time, passing into the third stomach and then finally into the true stomach.

Cows, goats or sheep have no front teeth in the upper jaw. Instead the gums make up a tough pad.

1996 being the 25th anniversary of the founding of Lismore/Cappoquin Credit Union Ltd., throughout the year various activities were held to celebrate this event which culminated in us having a special day/night on Friday, October 18.

Throughout the day of October 18 both Lismore and Cappoquin offices were open to the public where light refreshments were served to all the visitors including many school children.

In the blessing Rev. Fr. Arthur P.P., Cappoquin per-formed the blessing of the Cappoquin Office and Frank Lynch, Vice-President, Irish League of Credit Unions declared the office officially open. This followed the blessing of the Lismore Office by Rev. Canon Nugent and again Frank Lynch declared the Lismore Office officially open.

Following this, special guests and members gathered in the Lismore Hotel for a social evening. A very pleasant meal was served by the Lismore Hotel. Our own Donal Kennefick acted as a very able M.C. for the night. He welcomed everybody including special guests and our friends from neighbouring Credit Unions and introduced the speakers - Frank Lynch, Vice-President, Irish League of Credit Unions, Kathleen Halpin, Chairperson, Chapter 10 and Bernard Leddy, Chairman, Lismore Town Commissioners. They all, in turn, praised the success of our Credit Union and wished us continued progress.

Our Credit Union was founded on 19th of February 1971. The idea of forming a Credit Union in Lismore, initially, came from the late Kieran Fenton as a result of him watching a documentary on television about Credit Unions. At that time Kieran was a very active member of the Lismore Town Commissioners and through them it was decided to invite the then Field Officer, a Mr. O'Crowley, of the Irish League of Credit Unions, to come to Lismore to discuss the possibility of forming a Credit Union.

As a result of this, a study group, which included people from every social class, was set up in October 1970 to learn the Credit Union Rules. During the study period the study group was given tremendous help and advice by the Field Officer and members of Tallow, Dungarvan and Carrick-on-Suir Credit Unions which were at that time well established. A few months after the formation of the study group the late Fr. Keating, was transferred as Curate to Lismore and joined the study group — he had an amount of experience of Credit Unions in Cahir and Clonmel.

Soon afterwards an application was made to start a Credit Union with the Irish League of Credit Unions and friendly societies. The application was successful.

The initial organisation

Our Chairman, Gerard meeting was held on Febru-Walsh, gave the following ary 12th, 1971 to elect the bership, a larger premises account of our Credit Union: first Board of 7 Directors. In was purchased in Main addition to this the Supervisory Committee of Paddy Vaughan, Tony Bolger (RIP) and Patsy Bransfield were appointed. On Friday, February 19th, 1971 the Board of Directors held their first meeting when the officers were decided: Chairman — Tom Doocey; Vice Chairman — Kieran Fenton (RIP); Hon. Secretary -Dermot O'Leary; Asst. Hon. Secretary - Rose Champion; Treasurer - Johnny Ryan; Asst. Treasurer — Paddy Lawton. The Credit Committee comprised of Rose Campion, Frank Geoghegan and Tommy Whelan (RIP).

On March 20th, 1971
"Lismore Credit Union
Ltd." opened to the public for business in rented of-fices and East Main Street, Lismore. The business growth in Lismore went from strength to strength and as a result of promotional work in Cappoquin many new members joined from the Cappoquin area. As a result of the business growth from the Cappoquin area, it was decided to rent and open an office in Cappoquin and at the A.G.M. in 1973 it was agreed that the name of the Credit Union be changed to "Lismore and Cappoquin Credit Union

In 1975 the first premises was purchased in Chapel Street, Lismore. In 1986 a premises was purchased in Barrack St., Cappoquin. In Street, Lismore.

On the 25th anniversary of our founding we pay tribute to the founder members of our Credit Union for their foresight and tremendous hard work. It must be gratifying for those members to now note that Credit Union membership is presently at 2,800 and growing continuously and that members continue to give freely of their time, working as tellers, promoters, etc., to ensure that the Credit Union continues to go from strength to strength. The assets of the Credit Union now stand at approx. £2,500,000.

Gerard then presented an inscribed pottery bowl, pro-duced locally, to the founder members or their spouses in appreciation of their services given so freely down the years. There was a special presentation made to Mrs. Patsy Bransfield being the longest active account holder in the Credit Union and also to the youngest member born closest to the foundation date i.e. Mark Leddy. The sad news of the passing of Liam, who was predeceased by his loving wife Eileen in August 1995, left a cloud of sadness in Ballyguiry and surrounding area with the loss of a well hu-moured, kind, warm-heart-ed, sensitive and caring man who was liked and loved by everyone who knew him.

The deceased, who was in his seventy-eighth year, was well known throughout the farming community. He was a highly respected, enterprising farmer all his life and took pride in his work and his farm. Raising the issue at last Monday's County Council meeting was Cllr. Con Casey who said it was not clear if water charges are to be retained, a fact which could put day's estimates meeting members in an awkward posi-

He subsequently urged that the Council write immediately to the Department of the Environment seeking clarification on the matter before Friday's meeting.

Acting County Secretary, Peter Carey however revealed that the Council has already written to the Environment Minister, Brendan Howlin and his Department and no reply had been received as of Monday.

County Manager, Donal Connolly said he intends to pursue the outstanding debt of £400,000 until such time as the Government makes a decision in relation to service charges. He stressed that the Council must work within the ambit that the water charges are still being enforced in 1997.

"If we want to improve and increase services as people demand, then the cost of providing them must come

from a Government grant or from the public," he stated. Mr. Connolly added that if the Government makes a decision to abolish water rates after the Council's estimates meeting, then the Environ-ment Minister would be obliged to pick up the tab in revenue loss to the Council in lieu of the consumers.

With regard to the upcoming court cases involving water charge defaulters, Mr. Connolly said that any possible objection that can be raised will be raised by the defaulters. However according to Mr. Clerkin, Council officials have 'no reason to think there will be any problem' in bringing the consumers to court.

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

subsequently requested additional information from the company - a request which was never fulfilled.

Last week, a senior spokesperson for the Council's Planning Department said that the wind farm applications have now been dropped.





### **Waterford Regional Hospital To Play Key Role In Tackling Cancer**

Waterford Regional Hospital will play a key role in tackling cancer," according to the Minister of State at the Department of Health, Brian O'Shea T.D.

Following the announcement of a set of initiatives in relation to cancer by his colleague the Minister for Health, to be implemented on a phased basis, Brian O'Shea confirmed that it is proposed to base the South Eastern Health Board's Regional Director of Cancer Services at the Waterford Hospital. The Regional service will be organised around Waterford Regional Hospital, which will also coordinate the work of the other hospitals in the region in the field of cancer.

Minister O'Shea emphasised that one of the main aims of the National Cancer Strategy, which was recently approved by Government is to eliminate the shortage of specialist oncology services

outside the Dublin area. This will include the appointment of a Consultant oncologist and support staff at Waterford Regional. A Consultant post in haematology, with support staff, will be ap-pointed as well as a Consultant Specialist in palliative care, with support staff. These specialist services, when in place, will do away with the need for people in the region to have to travel to Dublin or Cork for treatment", the Minister added. Mr. O'Shea also welcomed

the initiatives planned in the area of targeted national screening programmes for breast cancer and cervical

In concluding, the Minister of State stressed that the initiatives announced were designed with the needs of patients and their families in mind. He was confident that the strategy would ensure a patient focus in all aspects of cancer services.



# It's A Very **Good Time** To Lay

concerning the lawn, especially laying turves. Yes, I know that lawn turf can be laid any time up to the end of March, but I've always found they knit together so much better in the wetter winter days.

Prepare the site as carefully as you would if you were laying seed, even down to the raking of the surface to a fine tilth. As the new lawn is gong to be a permanent feature, it always pays to buy the very best turves you can afford. Good quality weedless turf is what you want.

There is a definite knack to laying down lawn turves: position them so that the cross-joints in one row don't come into line with the cross-joints in another.

Get your first row down and then, with the new one, don't start at the extreme edge of the site, but about six inches from it. This means, obviously, that each crossioint in the second row will be six inches farther along that the cross-knits in the first row.

With your third row, start at the very edge; the fourth row six inches in, and so on.

Because all your turves are the same size, there will be a six inch length projecting at the far end with each alternate row. Simply cut them off and use them for filling the gaps at the beginning of these rows.



If you have trouble in fitting the turves right close up to each other, don't worry. Fill in all the crevices with some fine soil and press it in firmly with the edge of a thin piece of board.

If there isn't any prospect of rain in the next couple of days, give the turves a reasonable watering in.

Now let's take a look at your established lawns. After all the summer wear and tear, it's more than likely the edges are looking very ragged. It isn't always practical to cut away enough of the turf to provide a neat line because that would possibly mean it would be well away from a neighbouring path or bed.

You can easily renew damaged lawn edges by taking off the turf in a foot-wide strip all down the lawn edge, and replace it with new turves. But before you lay the new turves, make sure the hard soil you have revealed is softened up by digging or, better still, by replacing with new soil to about a depth of four inches.

Another way you can repair ragged edges without buying new turves is to cut out the damaged edge in a neat square of lawn and turn the square round, relaying it with a straight edge along the existing lawn edge.

That'll mean your damaged edge is now inside your lawn and all you have to do is sprinkle it with some fine soil and it will soon heal itself by next spring so as not to be noticed.

Finally, don't forget to spike your lawn now, about four inches deep with a garden fork, or you and buy a special tool for the job. For large lawns you might want to consider hiring a spiked roller.

Mr. John Skehan, County Chairman ICMSA said that one of the most effective ways of enhancing the repu-tation of Irish beef as a quality product is to introduce the strictest possible controls on the importation of cattle from other countries.

Mr. Skehan said the EU should seriously consider establishing a special disease-free livestock sanctuary in Ireland.

Mr. Skehan concluded by saying: "The BSE calamity has highlighted the vulnerability on the entire European beef industry to a major disease outbreak. The establishment of a livestock sanctuary in Ireland, providing disease-free seed stock for the rest of Europe would result in a major economic benefit for Irish agriculture and would help to enhance the reputation of beef produced in the EU.

The meeting was followed by a beef promotion organ-ised by ICMSA PRO, Mr. Tom Hickey, who had beef burgers for all who attended the function.

NATURAL FARMING IS THE WAY FORWARD -ICMSA PRESIDENT

ICMSA President, Mr. Frank Allen, said the production of "elephant"-sized livestock must no longer be tolerated by the EU Com-

"It is time to revert to the more natural type of farming which results in the production of healthy food and supports the maximum number of farm families working on the land. Science in agriculture must move over and allow some room for mother nature to do her work," he said.

"We must have an end to both the era of the factory farm and the offering of incentives to farmers for producing "elephant" animals. Instead, rewards must be diverted to farmers who let nature take its course, by allowing their stock to grow and thrive in the natural way. Economists will have to learn there is no cheap way of producing good quality and natural foods."

To restore consumer confidence, Mr. Allen said a quality assurance system tracing the animal from birth to the kitchen table must be introduced as swiftly as possible. "I have no doubt that, with such a system in place, farmers will quickly discover which meat the consumer wants to eat and will adjust his enterprise to suit the consumer."

# Minister's Failure To Meet Area Aid **Payments Deadline Is Totally** Unacceptable - IFA

Chairman, Alex Heskin strongly criticised the failure by the Minister for Agriculture, Ivan Yates, to complete all arable aid payments by October 31 as promised in the Department's Charter of Rights.

Mr. Heskin said: "The reality is that the delay in making payments to grain growers in 1996 is unprecedented. Ever since the direct payment system was introduced for cereals in 1993, the vast majority of growers have been paid by October 31. This in spite of the much publicised 'new era' in making payments when the Department's Charter of Rights was launched in the Spring of 1995."

Mr. Heskin confirmed that he had written to the Minister requesting an immediate solution to the current pay-

# **Retention Of** Stamp Duty **Relief Vital**

— Says IFA Waterford IFA Farm Business Committee Chairman, Gerry Murphy has said that the retention of relief from stamp duty charges on purchases and gifts of land to young farmers is essential and forms a key element in IFA's 1997 Budget Submis-

sion. He said "stamp duty relief for young trained farmers was introduced in the 1994 Budget and provides two thirds relief from stamp duty on the transfer of farmland to trained farmers aged under 35 years. This means that the maximum stamp duty rate on an inter-family transfer can be reduced from

3% to just 1%.
"It was introduced originally for a period of just three years from the 7th January 1994 until the 31st December 1996. This means that the relief is due to run out at the end of December this year unless it is reinstated in the 1997 Budget.

"This important relief allows new entrants into farming retain as much scarce cash resources as possible for investment in their new business and help to secure their long term viability in farming. Its retention is a central IFA demand in the current negotiations with Government on a new social programme and also forms an important part of the IFA's submission in advance of the 1997 Budget," he added.

# **ICMSA Says Lamb Imports Hitting Incomes**

Eamon O'Rourke, Chairman of ICMSA Sheep Committee has said that the present trend in lamb imports into the EU was hitting the incomes of Irish producers and other sheep farmers in the Community.

Mr. O'Rourke said the sheepmeat import quota from Third Countries, which is in excess of 300,000 tonnes, is expected to be filled in the current year.

"What I find objectionable is that Third Country imports, in particular from New Zealand, appear to be targeting the Christmas and Easter periods, resulting in depressed prices for EU farmers during these periods,"

This problem could be resolved by dividing the quota into 12 equal amounts over the 12 months of the year, said Mr. O'Rourke. Such a system would help to stablise the market at home. Mr. O'Rourke called on the Minister to introduce this measure immediately.



Cleansing milks and lotions are ideal for removing dirt and make-up. They are probably most suited to younger skins as they are not as mois-turising as a cleansing cream. skin toner is a must. will help to remove any traces of oil left on the skin, it will also help to close the pores and stimulate the complexion. Facial scrubs should be used

to remove dead cells, to give a brighter complexion. They are gentle exfoliants. However, they should not be used daily as this may over-activate the skin. Once a week is sufficient, a young skin may only need to be exfoliated once a fortnight.

Finally to get a deep cleanse and help to draw out impuriand help to draw out impuri-ties a facial mask should be used regularly. ## **Jammy Dodgers**

### Roast Duck with apple

Q. About a month ago I had an illness which lasted for a week. I was vomiting for five days and my doctor gave me suppositories. I was and still am under the impression that these were used for piles. Can you tell me why I had to take suppositories?

A. Suppositories are prescribed to people for many different reasons other than piles or haemorrhoids. Because you were vomiting oral medication could not get beyond your stomach. Suppositories are also prescribed where there is evidence that oral preparations cause irritation to

rations cause irritation to the stomach. The degree of sensitivity to aral prepara-tions varies in different people. The use of supposi-tories here is a satisfactory way of coping with the

As with all foods, drugs have to go through the process of digestion. As they pass through the stomach, the gastric juices can render them useless. The advantage now to the doctor is to prescribe the drug in suppository form to drug in suppository form to the patient. Suppositories are often prescribed for piles and haemorrhoids but also help with constipation. They can also be used in the

helping of some forms of arthritis. Suppositories are absorbed into the blood stream, therefore they don't have to go into the stomach.

old days', we were never as fortunate as young hurlers and camogie players are nowadays who own at least two hurleys as indeed every player with pretensions and ambitions should. Forty or fifty years ago a lad was lucky to possess one hurley and demand for a second stick would have caused eyebrows to raise and provoked a short stinging sarcastic retort. Besides hurleys were expensive in those days, relative to money values and parents were reluctant to hand over the few shillings required to purchase a stick which mightn't even survive one day's combat. So whatever reservations we might have about the present day expense of providing hurleys for teams, it would be fair to say that the cost of a hurley in 1996 is still relatively cheap. The senior stick at £8 or £9 is still reasonable, bearing in mind the acute and perennial scarcity of ash, the difficulty and expense of locating a supply of suitable raw material, the cost of transport to the manufacturer and the long, slow, time-consuming process of providing a finished marketable product. Most hurling and camogie clubs have their own subsidy scheme which facilitates the purchase of two hurleys each for active members and ensured that generous encouragement is given to all to be properly equipped at the outset of the championship campaign. The younger players are, generally speaking, well catered for nowadays with many schools and clubs subsidising the hurley cost to them thus placing the acquisition of a stick within the rang of any young boy or

girl.

The player who loves the game of hurling loves his own hurley and treats it with care amounting to reverence. After a vigorous tackle in a match, just note how a young hurler will glance quickly at his stick to reassure himself that it has emerged unscathed. I remember that so attached to my hurley was I that nobody could loan it from me, not even my mother whom I loved dearly. You may have noticed that in the wild abandon and extravagance of All-Ireland victory celebrations, the players being hoisted on supporter's shoulders always retain a firm grip on their precious hurleys.

It's not easy to get a stick to suit you. Suitability isn't easily defined and has much to do with feel. Many players, adult players I mean, have an individual preference for some specific man-

ufacturers product. Once you find out which type of hurley best suits your needs then no other has the same appeal for you. The handle, the grip, the shape of boss, the length, the weight, the spring and the balance are the chief considerations when choosing a stick. It is a rare accomplishment to find your perfect camán and once you do, there is an anxiety to prolong its life as much as possible and to prepare another for the day when time and the rigours of the game take their toll of the first one. Nowadays too, there is no shortage of craftsmen skilled at repairing hurleys and at a fraction of the cost of a new one. So unless the hurley is broken straight across the handle or waist, its life and effectiveness can be restored. Moreover the repaired stick is even better than the original, most times.

Goalies should not need to buy a hurley very often. The one goalie's hurley should last a full season at least because it is not subjected to the stresses inherent in tackling outfield. I know many goalies who have been using the same hurley for a number of years. Trying to get a suitable goalie's hurley is no easy task especially at the resent day when the emphasis on the big boss tends to make the whole stick too heavy and unwieldy in many cases. The goalie whose hurley is too heavy (in fact any player whose hurley is too heavy) is at a huge disadvantage. He hasn't a chance of dealing speedily with the kind of situation which will always arise around goal where control and quickness are called for. Only a hurley which is virtually an extension of your arm, which can be used one-handed (and that's the acid test) will suffice in tight goalmouth situations. Quite apart from the cumbersome overweight hurley the other grievous mistake for a goalie is attempting to play with a stick which is not his own. The goalie who attempts to use a hurley which he is not used to is heading for disaster and if the game is a big one, he will rue his mistake for many a day subsequently.

Do you remember a Tipperary goalie named John Sheedy? It's over a dozen ears since he stood between the posts for the blue and gold. He was a good goalie but sadly many will remember him in the context of the 1984 Munster Hurling Final in Thurles. Tipperary were playing Cork and against all the confident predictions of a comfortable Cork victory, it was the Tipperary men who set and maintained a cracking pace so that, with a few minutes remaining, a Tipperary victory looked the likely outcome. The game turned on two incidents. Michael Doyle, in posses-sion, turned infield and when confronted by two Cork defenders essayed a handpass - to no one in particular. Denis Mulcahy gratefully accepted this piece of Premier county charity to drive out of defence well upfield. John Fenton's shot for a point was sailing over the bar when John Sheedy put up his hurley. The ball re-bounded from his stick out into the square, right into the path of the inrushing Seanie O'Leary who wasted no time and dispatched it to the net. That shock ended Tipperary's chance of glory.

Now the significant point about that score was not that it came from one goalkeeping mistake. The one mistake of a goalie is always recalled rather than the many outfield blunders anyway. It was that John Sheedy's hurley was one which he didn't regularly play with, one which he couldn't exercise full control with. John didn't play regularly in goals for his club (Portroe or Silvermines I think) and wasn't used to the big goalie's hurley which he had for that match. He was unable to control the high ball with either one or two hands and very likely held the stick tightly which ensured that the sliotar would rebound firmly from it. If he had been more familiar with the stick, he need only have slackened his grip allowing the sliotar to drop straight down into his waiting hand. This perfection is no trifle.

what 'deadens' the hard shot. Of course as with every single skill, it would need to have been practised again and again and again. Noel Sheehan was probably the best that I ever saw in that position (Ollie the most exciting) and Noel was an expert at dealing with this high ball. Noel used to move his wrists gripping the hurley backwards a fraction at the precise moment of impact with the ball to 'deaden' the sliotar. It needed great co-ordination and precision and didn't happen by accident. When I asked Noel how often he practised this piece of hurling sorcery, I wasn't too surprised with his reply. "Thousands of times," he said. Not dozens, not hundreds.

So you can see it was a big mistake for John Sheedy to use a virtually untried stick in such a major game. Stopping the ball after all was only one part of his job, controlling and clearing the other essential part. It is for this reason that I can never understand the merit of having two wide-bossed hurleys in the net behind the goalie for use in the event of the concession of a penalty. Usually the two defenders chosen to defend with the goalie take one each. Firstly there is no guarantee that the sticks will suit the user from the point of view of length (vital) and weight and balance. Secondly those using them would lack the experience with the new sticks which is bound to undermine their confidence. Small points really but it is the little things, the trifles which make perfection. And



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# Location Of Proposed

# Dump Still Unknown

A suitable location for a 150 to 200 acre super dump to cater for the combined waste of Waterford city and county has yet to be identified. That's according to County Manager Donal Connolly who told last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council that the location for the proposed £4.3m. landfill still remains unknown by the consultants John B. Barry & Partners Ltd.

It was originally expected that a number of possible sites would be identified by the consultants by last July. In the intervening period however, Mr. Connolly disclosed that the Government passed a Waste Management Bill which requires that the Council put together a comprehensive waste management plan. This

plan is expected to be before the Council in two to three months time, after which the search will resume for a central landfill site.

Locating such a huge acreage for what will most probably become a highly controversial issue will not be easy however.

be easy however.

Prerequisites for the dump, which will be in operation for 20 to 25 years, excludes all coastal and amenity areas, as well as water sources, etc. The search will no doubt prove an uphill battle for the local authorities involved. Wherever the super dump will be located, there are likely to be objections from neighbouring residents and communities in what will surely be a highly emotive and divisive issue.

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
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
