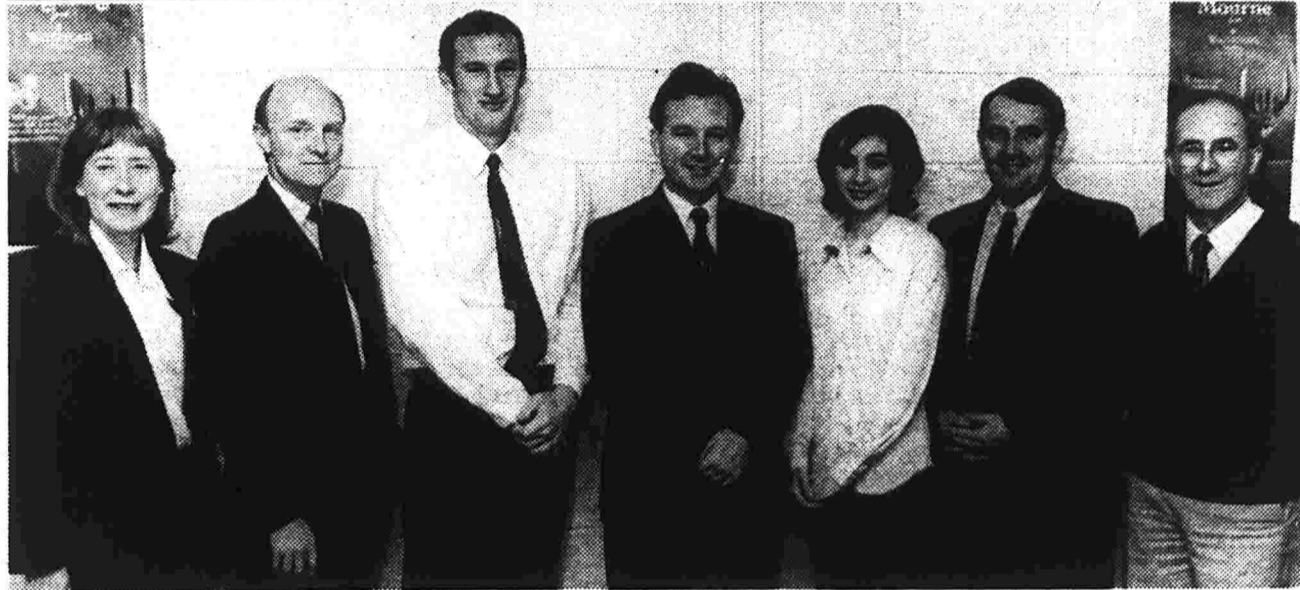

U.D.C. Members Vote £5 Increase In Water Charges

The current Government debate on the possible abolition of service charges and residential property tax failed to deter members of Dungarvan U.D.C. who succeeded in striking a rate for the urban area last Monday.

Next year Dungarvan householders will be obliged to pay £65 for domestic water, representing an increase of £5 on last year. This figure continues, however, to be the lowest service charge in the country. Meanwhile the charge for metered water increases from £1.72 to £1.80 per thousand gallons while the rate in the pound jumped up 4.61% from £32.50 to £34. The new charge was carried on a five-four vote supported by Cllrs. Austin Deasy, Paddy Power, Nuala Ryan, Damien Dillon and Austin Flynn.

Dispelling doubts expressed by some members over the Council's wisdom in discussing the water charge issue in light of the Government debate, County Manager Donal Connolly

disclosed that should the Government decide to abolish water charges, the Government would have to recoup the Council's subsequent losses.

Collecting Rent And Water Charges Together

Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly is to investigate the possibility of collecting water charges in tandem with the rent collection in Dungarvan next year.

The matter was raised at last week's meeting of Dungarvan UDC by Cllr. Damien Dillon who suggested that both charges should be collected together.

Mr. Connolly agreed that this system should be in operation and said he will look at the matter for next year.

LARGE ARREARS ON ACCOUNTS

According to a recent audit report on the accounts of the UDC prepared by Patrick J. Healy, Local Government Auditor, the collection yield on special water charges up to the end of last year is unsatisfactory. Large arrears have been allowed to accumulate on a number of accounts and Mr. Healy recommends that immediate action is required to correct this position.

As a result of the audit, Mr. Connolly told last week's meeting that steps have now been taken to rectify the situation.

Know Your Rights

QUESTION

I live with my sister in what was our family home. The house is in my name, valued at £80,000. We are both retired, single and we have a small amount of savings. I have willed the house to my sister. If I die before her will she have to pay Probate Tax, or Capital Acquisitions Tax?

ANSWER

Yes, she will have to pay both. If your estate amounts to more than £10,650 (it does), your sister will be liable to Probate Tax. Assets which do not pass under a deceased's will or intestacy are excluded from the Probate Tax. So, if you were to put the house in your joint names, and your savings in a joint account (unless they are willed to someone else), she would be exempt from Probate Tax.

But . . . putting the house in your joint names will make your sister liable to Gift Tax now. She would be obliged to make a return within four months of the date of benefit. (Capital Acquisitions Tax is Gift Tax and Inheritance Tax). The difference between Gift Tax and Inheritance Tax is that Gift Tax is 75% of the Inheritance Tax payable.

If you put the house in your joint names you are giving your sister half the value of the house i.e. £40,000. The first £500 of a gift received in a tax year is exempt from Gift Tax. Also there is a "threshold" below which you do not pay Capital Acquisitions Tax, depending on your relationship with the person — for brothers, sisters, nephews, nieces of the giver this is £24,340. Presuming she had received no other gifts, her tax liability would be on £39,500.

First £24,340 (Class B Threshold) = £nil
next £10,000 @ 20% = £2,000
balance £5,160 @ 30% = £1,548
= £3,548

Gift Tax is 75% of £3,548 = £2,661

If you put the house in joint names then if your sister predeceases you, you may be liable for Inheritance Tax on half the valuation of the house as above, i.e. her half, and vice versa.

However, where a brother or sister is aged 55 or over and has lived in the house for at least five years with the brother/sister from whom they have inherited the home the market value of the house may be reduced by 60% or £60,000 whichever is the lesser. If this was your situation, 60% of £40,000 = £24,000 so neither of you would be liable to CAT on the other's death as you do not exceed the £24,340 threshold now.

The Christmas Show begins on Saturday, November 30 and continues every day till Christmas Eve, open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. (including Sundays).

Inside the extended studio (pottery equipment is pushed aside to make way for Christmas), is filled to the rafters with beautiful Christmas gifts. There are now well over 100 Irish craft workers exhibiting at the show. Newcomers this year include Brigitte Turba from Kilkenny with some real fun jewellery made out of recycled toothbrushes. Paul Berg from Mayo shows his zany wooden clocks. Duff and Tisdall have architect de-

Oberg of Enniskerry are one of three candle makers now supplying the shop. Another newcomer is Graham Taylor from Newry with his very exciting range of educational toys and hand stitched books. Kiltrea Bridge of Enniscorthy have their pottery range on display. This includes bread crocks with hand turned wooden lids, cutlery drainers, plain and decorated flower pots. Some of the new Newbridge Cutlery range is one display, including jewellery, napkin rings and cutlery with hand turned wooden handles. Jerpoint Glass from south Kilkenny show their glass bowls, candle sticks, rectangular vases and beautiful glass Christmas tree decorations.

One of the biggest treats in the shop is now the knitwear section. A number of Ireland's leading knitwear designers are now supplying the Ardmore Pottery Shop. 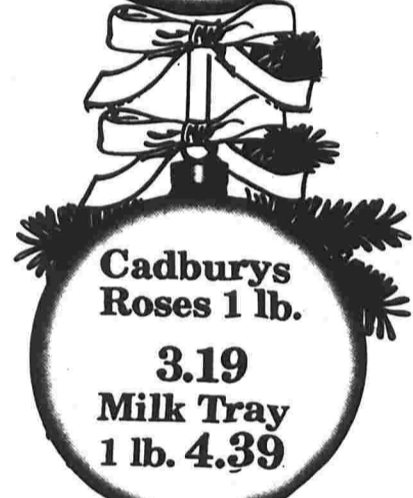
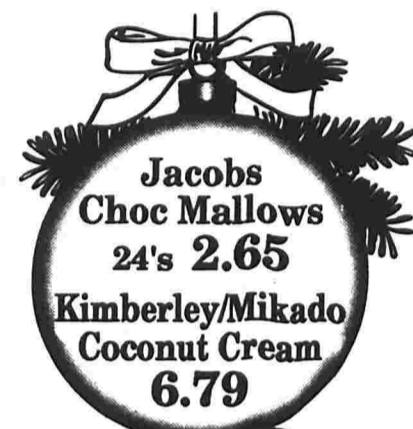
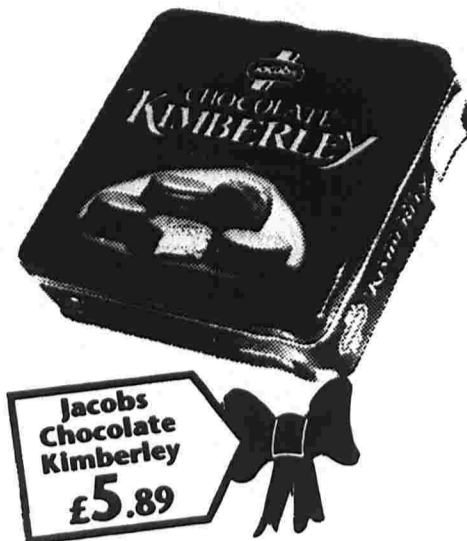

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YOU CAN'T ENJOY YOURSELF AT CHRISTMAS — BY ORDER!

Don't eat turkey, pudding or mince pies on Christmas Day. You would be breaking the law if you do.

For Christmas was abolished by Oliver Cromwell more than 300 years ago — and the laws he brought in exist to this day.

It was in 1644 that Cromwell decreed December 25 should cease to be a day for merrymaking and feasting.

As an example to the rest

of the country, Parliament was ordered to sit on Christmas Day and all shops or businesses were told to carry on as usual.

The traditional mince pies, boars heads, turkeys and mistletoe were officially banished.

Christmas pudding was described as "an abominable and idolatrous thing to be avoided by Christians," and a law was passed forbidding anybody

to make or eat it at Christmas. Offenders were liable to a fine or imprisonment — or both.

As it has never been repealed, it technically remains the law of the land. Two days before Christmas 1646, town criers paraded through the streets of London, reminding everybody that Christmas would not be celebrated and that all shops should remain open.

On Christmas morning,

armed soldiers patrolled the streets with orders to sniff out any smell of roasting.

Wherever they detected it, they were empowered to search kitchens, break into ovens and carry off any meat or game being cooked.

Riots broke out and in Ipswich and Oxford, a number of people were killed.

In Bury St. Edmunds, Suffolk, a group of apprentices threatened to set fire to any shop that opened on Christmas Day, putting its owner to death. Shops there stayed closed.

But, in Canterbury, the mayor announced that December 25 would not be a holiday and that the market would be open.

A group of armed men marched on his house, threw stones through his windows and set fire to his front door. Several people were seriously injured in the riot that followed.

On Christmas Eve, 1652, Cromwell had a proclamation nailed to the doors of all known dissident churches. It declared that "No observation shall be held of five and twentieth day, nor any solemnity in churches upon that day in respect thereof." John Evelyn, the diarist, recorded that on Christmas Day, 1653, there were no church services or public assemblies.

Four years later, he recorded attending a service that was interrupted by soldiers aiming loaded muskets at those about to receive Holy Communion.

In the same year, a number of clergymen were arrested and several put to death.

But the days of the Puritans were numbered. Cromwell died in 1658 and the monarchy was restored with the return of the exiled Charles II in May, 1659.

Christmas Day that year was one of unrestrained rejoicing and the king is said to have spent a fortune opening his London palace doors to anybody seeking free food and drink.

But it was years before the country as a whole got over the time the Puritans put their ban on Christmas.

Junior Encyclopaedia

Frogs and Toads

The common frog and toad seem to stick their tongues out a lot. They have to do this if they want to survive, for it is by poking their tongues out that they obtain food for themselves.

When their tongues are fully extended they are long and are coated with a sticky substance which makes them very efficient. When an insect they like to eat crosses their path, the tongue comes out and targets it.

The Natterjack toad lives in the south-west of Ireland on the heaths and among the sand dunes beside the sea. This particular type of toad is confined to this area. You will know by looking at it that it is not a frog because of its warty skin and the distinctive yellow line down its back. It is the only species of toad in Ireland.

We are all familiar with frog spawn which is laid in a mass of protective bubbly jelly on the surface of ponds in early spring. The spawn of the Natterjack differs in that it is deposited like a necklace wound around water plants. The circular black eggs shine inside the jelly like precious gems.

The Natterjack females can lay their eggs in an unsatisfactory site without

realising it. This site could be a small pool on high ground. These eggs are usually lost before they have a chance to hatch because of warm winds and sunshine.

If the Natterjack senses an enemy in the area, it arches its back towards its attacker to make itself appear much bigger than it actually is. Some predators are frightened away by this display and others know not to go near the toad because of poisonous glands in its skin. However, some birds such as seagulls and crows have found a way of eating the toad leaving the skin untouched.

While the mating season is in progress, the male Natterjack makes a lot of noise, distending its throat sac and croaking loudly. This is his way of attracting females.

During winter the Natterjacks bury themselves in the sand. You will see them usually during spring and summer. If you find one, do not handle it.

Deteriorating Conditions Pose Safety Risk At Dungarvan College

Rapidly deteriorating conditions at the near 60 year old Dungarvan Technical College at Wolfe Tone Road are posing considerable safety risks to staff and students alike.

According to one member of the teaching staff, Austin Flynn, some of the windows in the building have depreciated so much, that the panes

of glass are falling out.

Speaking at last week's meeting of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee, Cllr. Flynn warned that peoples lives are at risk and that he "could see an accident happening." Indeed in the last few weeks, Cllr. Flynn disclosed that a pane of glass had fallen from an upstairs window onto the schoolyard.

Cllr. Flynn's warning has

come on the heels of a staff meeting regarding the marked deterioration in the school. Teaching staff had previously tolerated the situation on the promise of a new college at Ringnasillogue. In view of the fact however that the existing college will be in operation for the next three years during the construction period, a decision was made to request the Department of Education for funding to bring the school up to a reasonable standard.

NOT UP TO STANDARD

Built in 1938 to cater for approximately 100 pupils, at that time the school contained seven classrooms which have not been updated since. Each term has seen an increase in enrolment figures leading to serious overcrowding and the addition of eleven pre-fabs.

Some of these pre-fabs are in a particularly deplorable condition, and are leaking and extremely cold during winter. According to a Fire Officers report on the school, prepared last July, the building does not comply with health and safety standards.

A member of the school's Board of Management, Cllr. Lar Hart stressed that windows and small repair jobs should be undertaken around the school as a matter of urgency.

Meanwhile, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan stated that there is no ventilation in the school, particularly the

cooking and metalwork room where none of the windows can be opened. The current conditions, he declared, are not acceptable to the students and the staff.

CEO Kieran Heffernan told members that the school's request for funding has been referred to a senior architect with the Department.

The estimated cost of a small amount of remedial works is currently being prepared by the school architect who will then forward this budget to the Department for sanction.

According to Cllr. Austin Flynn however, it is critically important that remedial work to the window be done immediately. "It can't wait for departmental sanction", he stressed.

TWO STOREY COLLEGE RECOMMENDED

Meanwhile, the up-to-date situation regarding the new technical college at Ringnasillogue was outlined to members at Monday's meeting. College architect Shay Cleary has recommended to the Department that a two storey design be used for the new college. Having compared a single storey proposal with a two storey design, Mr. Cleary believes the latter to be more economical.

Should his report be sanctioned by the Department, the project will then advance to stage three, i.e. a developed sketch scheme.

Deasy Criticises Long Delay For Driving Tests

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy, has strongly condemned the long delay for people who are waiting for driving tests. Speaking in the Dail recently, Deputy Deasy disclosed that there is now a delay of up to 19 weeks for driving tests and he asked the Minister for the Environment if the problem could be addressed immediately.

Minister of State at the Dept. of the Environment, Liz McManus replied that there was an unprecedented and unexpected increase in the level of applications for driving tests in the first half of this year. As a result of this increase, which has now tapered off, waiting times for driving test appointments have increased this year and the improved level of service which had been anticipated has not been achieved.

In order to deal with the backlog of applications, testing is now being carried out on Saturdays. Other measures, including the possibility of recruiting some additional testers on a temporary contract basis, are under active consideration.

The Minister added that applicants who indicate a need for an early test for reasons of employment or travel are continuing to be accommodated as far as possible; about one quarter of these are tested within 5 weeks of applying and none have to wait more than 9 weeks.

Such valuable coverage is indicative of the reception that this small project has received.

Ardmore's sandcastle building which was commissioned by Waterford County Council in co-operation with Ardmore Enterprise Co-op, was featured in the most recent publication of 'Plan', the Irish Architects magazine. It was the only other building featured apart from the winners of the Regional Awards for 1996.

Commenting on the great publicity received by the

Ardmore project, Mr. Dillon said that hopefully this kind of publicity will bring benefit to Ardmore in the form of curiosity seekers, tourists, etc. and will illustrate that even small civic type buildings have a very important role in the architecture of our towns and villages.

£21,000 Grant To Council For Waste Recycling Facilities

Brian O'Shea T.D., Minister of State, has given details of grants approved by the Minister for the Environment to local authorities for the provision of waste recycling facilities.

A grant of £21,000 has been allocated to Waterford County Council to provide 'Bring Sites'.

Minister O'Shea added that the grant is being approved under the Operational Programme for Environmental Services. The Programme will remain operational until the end of 1999 and further grants will be approved in due course.

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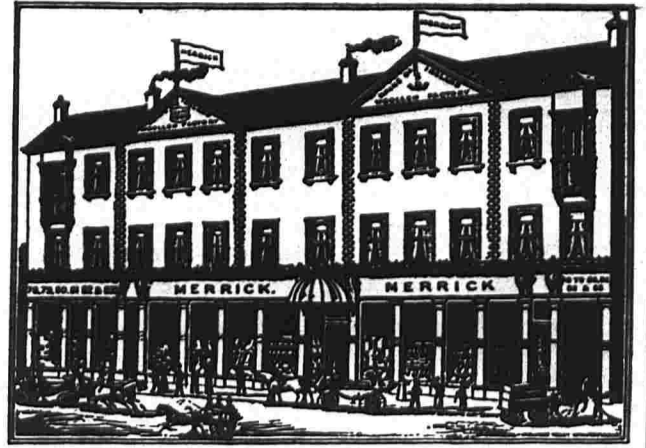
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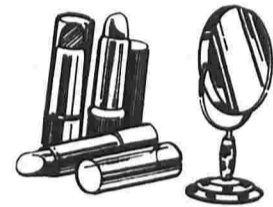


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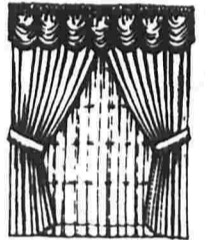

U.D.C. Members Vote £5 Increase In Water Charges

He stressed that as the law now stands, the Council's only method of raising revenue is through rates, charges and Government grants. Until such time as the Government changes this law, Mr. Connolly said it beholds local authorities to adopt their estimates.

The new charge of £65 for domestic water will bring an estimated income of £140,000 to Dungarvan U.D.C., an extra £15,000 on last year's figure.

This additional income will go towards the upgrading of the Town Hall (£10,000), improvements to the Council Machinery Yard (£5,000), surfacing right of ways (£10,000), £20,000 for the Quay wall and harbour studies and £10,000 towards water leakage detection systems etc.

THE MINIMUM REQUIRED

In Mr. Connolly's view, the estimate of expenses for 1997 is "the minimum required" to continue the im-

provements in the town to complement the major developments currently underway under the Urban Renewal Scheme. He said it is essential that the Council continue to improve the infrastructure and the general environment within the town and in this way make it an attractive location for investment in industry, services and tourism.

"The town clearly has major potential and it's up to the Urban Council to ensure that this potential is fully developed," he added.

Among the many major projects envisaged next year is the development of burial ground at Ringnasilloge for which £5,000 has been provided. A further sum of £10,000 has been set aside for additional public lighting while a massive £60,000 will go towards road upkeep.

"COSMETIC EXERCISE"

Reaffirming his strong opposition to water taxes, Cllr.

Tony Wright described the charge as double tax.

"Us passing a water charge is just a cosmetic exercise", he slammed, "I don't think it's going to be paid." He said the nationwide campaign for the total abolition of water tax is stronger than ever together with a demand for full amnesty for all those who have refused to pay their water charges.

"Those charges are dead and buried," he declared. Cllr. Wright's subsequent proposal for the exclusion of water charges from the Council's budget was seconded by Cllr. Lar Hart.

OVER 80% PAY CHARGES

Rejecting the claim that water tax is a double taxation, Mr. Connolly felt that if one adopted that attitude then E.S.B. bills and telephone bills etc. would also be deemed as a double tax.

The reality is that a cer-

tain amount of money is needed to run the country, explained Mr. Connolly adding that if water charges are abolished someone else has to take the burden.

"I don't think anyone could complain about £65 for water over 12 months," he stated. The Manager subsequently disclosed that 80.6% of water charges have been collected so far this year. Arrears which have accumulated over a number of years amount to £139,000 while over £3,000 has been struck off on outstanding water charge bills in the current year.

FIVE FOR - FOUR AGAINST

Supporting the Manager's proposals, Cllr. Austin Flynn said the majority of people in Dungarvan are happy with existing services and do not want to see them reduced. He warned that the Council cannot pull £140,000 worth of services away from the public and that members have no choice other than to do their job as elected representatives and run the town responsibly. Likewise Cllr. Nuala Ryan said the Council have to get money somewhere and with no funding forthcoming from central Government, the Council has no other option than to strike a rate.

Stating that water charges have been abused in the raising of finance however Cllr. Billy Kyne proposed that the water fee for 1997 be retained at last years level of £60. His proposal was seconded by Cllr. Michael O'Riordan.

A third and final proposal, this time calling for the adoption of estimates as presented by Mr. Connolly, was subsequently put forward by Cllr. Austin Deasy who described a £65 water charge as realistic and said he would go along with the Manager's proposals on the basis that the Council will get recoupment if the Government abolishes service charges. This proposal was seconded by Cllr. Damien Dillon.

When put to a vote, the proposal was carried on the slim majority of 5-4. Those who voted for the estimate of expenses were Cllrs. Nuala Ryan, Austin Flynn, Paddy Power, Damien Dillon and Austin Deasy while those who voted against were Cllrs. Michael O'Riordan, Tony Wright, Lar Hart and Billy Kyne.

Quay Apartment Complex Refused Permission

Dungarvan U.D.C. in June of this year to proceed with the demolition of a former dwelling house and grain store on the Quays, to be replaced by 28 luxury apartments with associated site and development works. The quayside property is owned by the local Moorings Post Development Company.

This decision however by the local Council was subsequently appealed to An Bord Pleanála by Dungarvan Museum Society who argued that the buildings in question comprise one of the best remaining examples of 19th century warehousing associated with the expansion and development of Dungarvan.

Since its foundation, Dungarvan Museum Society has advocated a conservation and re-use approach to buildings, a policy which was foremost in their objection to the proposed development.

Referring to the habitable house fronting onto Davitt's Quay, the Museum Society claimed that this structure was "quite unusually and possibly uniquely built onto

the front of the warehouse." They also stated that because of this building's proven structural strength and its good state of repair, it was therefore not necessary to demolish it in order to develop the site. The Society further argued that this building is quite capable of conversion in its present state to other uses.

CATALYST FOR DEVELOPMENT

Having obviously taken the Museum Society's objection very seriously, the planning authority has subsequently thwarted the developers plans. Dungarvan U.D.C., who were extremely supportive of the proposed apartment complex, said the project represented a means of achieving a significant new development fronting onto the Quays which could act also as a catalyst for development in the locality. The site on the Quay has lain in a derelict state for many years and will likely continue to do so as any possible development there would not qualify under the existing Urban Renewal Scheme which

runs out next July.

REASONS FOR REFUSAL

An Bord Pleanála outline three main reasons for refusing Archview Developments planning permission. Firstly they claim that the demolition of the buildings would interfere with the prospect of the Quays and the historic core of Dungarvan which is considered to be of special amenity value and special interest which it is necessary to preserve.

Secondly they submit that the proposed demolition of the grain store, which is included in the current Dungarvan Development Plan for "consideration for preservation" would be contrary to the proper planning and development of the area.

As a third reason for refusing the project permission, the planning authority cites overdevelopment of the site as a result of the scale and diversity of the project and a lack of adequate private amenity open space and parking provision to serve the needs of the development.

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TALLOW NOTES

TALLOW G.A.A. CLUB NOTES

The Late Late League Show — Winning an All Ireland is the ultimate honour for any player. Next in importance, most would agree, is the winning of a county championship with your club. The national league title is perhaps next in order of importance mostly because it is a national competition, and also demands consistency over a six month plus period of the toughest weather conditions. Those very demanding conditions of wind and mud, rain and hail and cold test the best teams and make success even more meritorious. So the team which emerges as league champions has a great feeling of achievement and satisfaction.

Mentioning the league reminds me of my good friend and team mate Tom Cheasty. I was delighted to learn that at long last he has received his league medal after a 33 year wait - thirty three because the National League of 1962 - 1963 wasn't completed until October 1963. No one man did more to carry Waterford to our only league victory than the indestructible Tom. Those petty patriots who used the infamous Ban in those days to administer selective justice must have rubbed their hands with glee when it became known that Tom had gone to a "foreign" dance in the Olympia Ballroom, Waterford. For perpetrating such a dastardly crime Tom received a six months suspension and, more cruel and spiteful and mean still, was never given his league medal, a medal which is undoubtedly the most attractive of all medals for national competition - gold with the crests of the four provinces in colour, adorning it. In keeping with the underhand furtive fashion in which the ban operated Tom still doesn't know the identity of the heroic spy who risked life and limb to witness his "foreign" dancing and who sent word, in informer fashion, to the G.A.A. authorities. However, thanks to Seamus O'Brien and Stephen Power belated justice was done a generation later, and Tom was presented with a medal which, as of right, was his.

That particular league campaign is one of which I have very clear recollection indeed, because we had to play and beat all of the best teams before bringing home a title, which Waterford had never previously won. We haven't won a league since and at that time, not only

had the winners to beat all-comers in Ireland, but the home winners were obliged to play New York in the final proper. I didn't play very many games because county champions at the time Erin's Own supplied the goalie Percy Flynn, but I certainly remember the games I was selected for, and those when I came on for Percy.

There was the game in Cork on a cold but sunny March day. In a Cork attack Ring shouldered Percy over the end line and when he (Percy) went down I started to take off my coat (there were no tracksuits in those days, nor any nonsense about warming up). Sure enough I was on, Waterford three points down and facing a low piercing sun and fresh breeze. As I was running across the field to take up position, we got a goal and followed this immediately with a soaring point from Tom Cheasty for the lead. Then the fun in our goalmouth started. Seldom can I remember being hit so often (nothing serious, all perfectly legitimate) as Cork encamped in our half striving to wipe out the deficit and regain the lead. Ring was the spearhead of most of these sorties as he tried, with typical Ring zeal to impose himself on the game. Austin Flynn, Tom Cunningham, Guinan and Martin Og Morrissey defended in exemplary fashion. I recall a high ball dropping into the square. It came in right on the line of the low sun whose piercing glare blinded me, as I tried to keep an eye on it. I put up my hand where I thought the ball should be, luckily it struck the palm of the outstretched hand, dropped to the ground before being scrambled away out of the danger zone, just as Ring made frontal contact with me. We got a free out and that escape served to lift our confidence and redouble our determination and concentration. So I enjoyed my five minutes of hectic action. And, most important, we won.

The home final in May against Tipperary was a splendid game. I got a very clear view of that because I was once again a sub. A few memories of that classic stand out. There was the breathless uninhibited endeavour between two well-matched sides, and the speed and intensity of exchanges as play swept with bewildering rapidity from end to end. Then there was the power of Larry Guinan's hurling as he marked the great Donie Nealon then at the height of his powers. In one shuddering shoulder to shoulder clash

Larry sent Donie hurtling back a good seven or eight paces, flattened. "That's the end of Nealon", I thought. Wrong, Donie only got to his feet, shook himself (he was an immensely strong fit chap for so small a player) and re-joined the fray with renewed vigour. Donie had a genuine admiration for Guinan. "Larry has a great body", was Donie's assessment of Guinan. Another incident of that final was unforgettable. Philly Grimes displayed a skill unmastered by any other hurler before or since, not even Ring or Mackey. As a ball was driven from midfield in towards the Tipperary goal Philly raced ahead, even ahead of the ball, and as it dropped behind him, he reached back his left hand and grasped it with his left hand behind his back, before sidestepping and driving it over the bar for as sweet a score as is every likely to be recorded.

I had a good view of that spectacular score because I was on the field, there were 10 minutes left and Waterford trailed the then All Ireland champions by four points. Of course, I was lucky to get on at all and was, in fact, instructed to tell Percy to come off? For the previous 15 minutes prior to my arrival on the field I could hear the wrangling going on among the selectors and on one occasion, could hear Pat Fanning's voice calling my name, a call I chose to ignore until some measure of agreement on the change was arrived at. Away with me around the perimeter to the Canal end. I trolled up to Percy and introduced myself with the words "Would you ever push over a bit Percy" at which point poor Percy left me to my own devices. The extraordinary feature of my ten minute stint was that I got no shot whatever to stop, there was one wide so I struck the ball once, for a puck out. The puck out had to be good, I thought because I might not get another. Giving it my best the ball came down just short of the Tipperary 21 yard line. The following morning John Hartigan amused me. We were going from Mass and John was discussing with customary enthusiasm the previous day's great win over traditional rivals Tipperary. "Tell me", said he "did you come on in the second half?" "I did, why do you ask?" "That puck out near the end", observed John "wasn't Percy's".

Despite that great victory in May we still had to meet New York later in Septem-

ber. New York fielded a very good team in those days and we faced fifteen good experienced hurlers in Croke Park, in what was a very close game which ended all square. That game obliged me to perform a skill which I never before or afterwards needed to use in an important game: the drop puck. A long ball from midfield was going to drop about 25 yards from goal (It's amazing how easily judged it is the precise spot where the ball should land). The backs had been drawn outfield so as this ball came in two New Yorkers, Pat Kirby (remember this handball star) and Micky Furlong came racing after it. It was not going to be possible for me to catch it and if I stopped it with the hurley one of those two would have tackled me leaving the other to strike the loose ball into an empty net. So running out I arrive just as the ball hits the ground and delivered a left-sided drop puck to midfield. Every two sided right-handed hurler finds the left side the easier for attempting a drop puck. With practice, a player will never mishit a drop puck on the backhand side which is far more difficult from the other side. I had done that like Noel Skeeahan, thousands of times in training so it was easy and it never even crossed my mind that I'd miss it.

Do you know that John Kerry O'Donnell the legendary New York supremo tried very hard at the after-match dinner to have the replay in New York. We were all tingling with excitement at that prospect but the team management were right to insist that the replay take place in Kilkenny. And so it came to pass. Almost 12 months after the launch of our league campaign, we brought it to a late late triumphant conclusion at Nowlan Park on a dark, damp late October Sunday 1963 in an exciting game which was for me probably my most satisfactory game.

U-13 Hurling — We began our campaign in the West Waterford U-13 hurling league for 1996 last Saturday morning, away to Abbey-side. Unfortunately the result was not a good one from a Tallow point of view. Right from the throw-in it was quite obvious that the boy's from Abbey-side were much bigger, stronger and more eager than our lads. And with conditions for a good game of hurling not being very favourable at this time of the year, the physical appearance of a team can have a big influence on the result.

However, the lads didn't give up without a battle. Having to play without our regular full-back, John Feeney (who was out sick) we had to switch around our defence to allow Aidan Kearney take over John's position (in which Aidan played extremely well - standing back from nothing and defending excellently). Ross Tobin then moved to wing-back instead of Aidan and he also did well here. Our whole defence was most definitely under more pressure in this game than any other we've played so far this year in Under 13. So it's back to the drawing board to see where we can improve before our next game which is probably next week-end away to Naomh Brid. Players will be notified at training - tonight

(Wednesday) at 8 p.m. and Friday evening at 4 p.m.

Training goes ahead as usual: - Tuesdays at 3.30 p.m. for U-8's and U-9's.

Wednesdays for the girls and Thursdays for the U-11's. Players must bring helmets to training sessions.

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Mushroom Growing Is Good Fun

Few people bother with cultivating mushrooms, and I've always wondered why. They are one of the simplest things to grow and, while the outdoor garden is fairly dormant throughout the winter months, mushroom growing indoors at this time of year is good fun.

If you've got a dark shed, cellar or garage or any similar building, so long as it is properly ventilated and an even temperature can be maintained, then you're in business. Remember, mushrooms don't like warm days or cold nights.

The other thing you'll need is a good supply of fresh stable manure, although you can always use other special mushroom fermenting materials, and I believe there are even proprietary brands available.

However, I've always used stable manure mixed with plenty of straw. At this time of the year you could always add some of the leaves that have long since dropped from the trees.

The secret of cultivating mushrooms is to make sure the fermentation material does its job efficiently and becomes hot and steamy.

Pile in a big heap under cover and leave it for about three or four days until it is thoroughly hot.

Right, then you turn it all over again, mixing it well up and leave it for another three to four days, repeating this process at least six times, by which time your manure or other fermentation material is getting really mellow, and any bits of straw in it are easily broken up by hand.

You are now ready to make your mushroom bed. Choose a good area of clean concrete if you can and stack your material on it, about 18 ins. high. Tread it down reasonably firmly.

Leave it for a couple of days, during which time it will heat up again and then begin to cool. When the temperature is about 80 degrees F (27 degrees C), it's time to plant your mushroom spawn.

You can buy this in various forms, bricks or cartons. Break it up into tiny pieces and press them into the fermentation material about 8 ins. or 9 ins. apart. Cover the bed with loose straw or mats and leave for about a week.

Take off the covering and you should see little white threads popping up through the bed. Now's the time to cover these threads with a thin layer of soil, about an inch thick.

Now you've simply got to wait for the mushrooms to appear; it could be two or three weeks or it may take a month or two. Be patient, they won't sprout up overnight.

Pull up the mushrooms as soon as they get to a good size — in any case before their undersides get really black. And fill in the holes left behind with soil or manure.



Gardai/Waterford Foods In Joint Initiative To Combat Crime

Gardai in the Waterford/Kilkenny District recently embarked on a major initiative to combat crime in the area in response to large quantities of illegal drugs which have been brought into the country via the coastline.

Similar in concept to Community Alert and Neighbourhood Watch, the new Coastal Watch Scheme encourages people living in coastal areas to assist the Gardai in preventing crime and the importation of drugs and other contraband into the community.

This new crime prevention initiative is being actively supported by the giant dairy company Waterford Foods plc., at whose headquarters in Dungarvan the scheme was formally launched last Thursday.

ASSISTANCE OF LOCAL PEOPLE

The help and local knowledge of people living in the coastal areas of Ring, Dungarvan, Stradbally, Kill, Tramore, Dunmore East, Passage East, Waterford and Ferrybank will be vital for the success of the scheme. Due to the length of coastline (approx. 80 miles in Waterford/Kilkenny) and the numerous landing points suitable for coming ashore, the Gardai alone cannot adequately cover the area. Most remote coastal areas are off the beaten track and provide ideal landing points for smugglers.

They have therefore sought the assistance of the public in the fight against the importation of drugs, weapons and other contraband. The people who know the area best are the ones who live, work or socialise within it and who would instantly recognise a strange person,

vehicle or unusual activity in their area.

In pursuit of the objectives of Coastal Watch, Gardai will now liaise on a frequent basis with key people in the aforementioned coastal areas. These people include residents along the coast or nearby, fishermen, boat owners, yachtsmen, lifeguards, cliff-sea rescue personnel, harbour masters, local postmen, farmers with land along the coast, rig workers, fishery officers, customs and excise officers, etc.

OVERALL CO-ORDINATOR

The overall Garda Co-ordinator of the Waterford/Kilkenny Divisional Coastal Watch Scheme is Inspector Michael Blake of Dungarvan Garda Station who will be responsible for receiving and processing all information emanating from participants to the scheme.

Speaking to the 'Dungarvan Leader', Inspector Blake said he is hopeful of public support for this worthwhile initiative.

He appealed to anyone who sees any suspicious or unauthorised activity, no matter how insignificant, to contact their local Garda Station.

CONFIDENTIAL PHONE LINE

Information cards on Coastal Watch will be distributed by Gardai to people targeted by the scheme. It will contain the name and telephone number of the local Garda co-ordinator. The name and telephone number of the nearest Garda Station operating on a 24 hours basis will also be included. People who have information and wish to remain anonymous may use the Garda Confidential Line on 1-800-666-111.

Garda members appointed

to liaise with locals are as follows — Sergeant P. Phelan (Ring), Sgt. J. Molloy (Dungarvan), Garda M. Ahern (Stradbally), Garda Halpin (Kill), Sgt. O. St. John (Tramore), Sgt. T. Bamburg (Dunmore East), Garda N. Lewis (Passage East), Detective Sgt. T. Butler (Waterford) and Sgt. P. O'Driscoll (Ferrybank).

Speaking on behalf of Waterford Foods plc who are embarking on this joint initiative with the Gardai, Chairman John Dowley said the group are very pleased to be involved in the scheme and he wished every success to the Gardai in its implementation.

"Waterford Foods have always represented the interest of the farming and rural community. The protection of that community from the scourge of illegal drugs must rank as a priority," he stated.

"In fact, Waterford farmers and other residents of our coastline are in a prime position to take the lead in the new Coastal Watch Scheme as only they know the true 'lie of the land' on our shores. In some ways they will be our first defence in the battle to maintain a drug-free coastline", Mr. Dowley added.

Hart Queries Clearing Of Debris By Council Workers

An incident in which four Urban Council employees and a 'scut' truck cleared debris from a private house in Congress Villas, was questioned by Cllr. Lar Hart at last week's meeting of Dungarvan UDC.

Cllr. Hart had previously raised the issue with Council officials at the October meeting of the Council but claimed that he had not yet received what he described as a satisfactory answer.

Responding to Cllr. Hart's inquiry, Town Engineer Raymond O'Dwyer who had since investigated the incident, stated that on delivering a wheelie bin to the house in question, a Council employee had noticed waste material in front of the

house and ordered the workers to clear it. The charge for this operation was £30, he added.

Refusing to accept Mr. O'Dwyer's explanation however, Cllr. Hart declared that there are lots of other people in similar situations who have waste material in front of their house, many of whom are Council tenants.

"£30 for four employees of the Council and a scut truck - I don't believe it", he retorted.

Bus Eireann Refuse Request For Knockanore/Youghal Bus

Waterford County Councillor Willie McDonnell has received the following reply from the District Manager of Bus Eireann, P. Crowley, with regard to his recent request that the Company provide transport from Knockanore to Youghal.

Mr. Crowley stated, "the majority of our rural services are very serious loss making and require a high degree of subsidiation from our more viable bus and coach routes. At present, due to the financial constraints in the company, it is not possible to introduce any new services unless they are economically viable.

"Because of the passenger potential offering", he continued, "it is unlikely that a new service from Knockanore to Youghal would be viable. In the circumstances I regret that my company in an effort to reduce losses and operate within the Government Subvention allocated, cannot accede to your request in this matter".

Cattle: MEAL FEEDING OF WEANLINGS

The target growth rate for weanlings would be of the order of 0.5 to 0.7 kg. per day, the higher figure for good continental cross male weanlings and those that are younger and lighter at weaning. This represents a gain in weight over the winter of 80 to 110 kg. per head. Heavy weanlings (over 280 kg.) fed excellent silage to appetite would achieve the target weight. However, most weanlings are fed on moderate quality silage (63-68% DMD) and meal supplementation is necessary to achieve targets. Indeed, Dr. Michael Drennan, Grange, recommends that all weanlings should get about 1 kg. of meal/day even on good silage because of the very attractive lightweight response to a low level of meal feeding. For suckled weanlings, it is certainly very worthwhile to feed meal for the first 2 months after housing while they are adapting to a high roughage diet. After that if silage is very good and animals are performing well, the meal can be reduced or withdrawn.

At Athenry, Dr. Tom Nolan feeds 2 kg. meal with good silage to continental cross weanlings until January 1 and then the meal to 1 kg./day. With moderate quality silage, the heavy weanlings should get at least 1 kg. meal/day and the light weanlings (under 220 kg.) 2 kg. meal/day. These meal rates need to be increased by 0.5 - 1.0 kg. when feeding low quality silage.

When weanlings are to be sold in spring, the above rates can be increased by 1 kg./day as the immediate additional gain can be cashed in at point of sale.

LICE

There is usually a build-up of lice about now on all stock, but infestation spreads more easily on housed cattle.

The pour-on treatments are the most convenient to use and will control lice for 6-8 weeks.

Dairying: CUBICLE USAGE

Cows sometimes refuse to lie in cubicles. It always annoys farmers to find cows lying in the passages, or along the feed barrier, or in some other dirty place. Such cows are very dirty for milking and it causes some extra mastitis, even though all cows that lie out of cubicles do not get mastitis.

It is good to clip cows around the time of housing. If this is going to be done, it is easier to do before the daggings are too numerous. Clipping will keep cows cleaner for milking. Farm Relief Service and private operators offer this service and farmers can do it themselves if they have a decent clippers and scissors.

COVERINGS

Once a cubicle is big enough, the type of cubicle division is not very important. A bare concrete floor is not comfortable. Bedding is excellent for encouraging reluctant cows to lie in properly. A light covering of any bedding material will keep the cubicle floor dry, but a couple of inches is necessary to provide good comfort. There are now a wide range of bedding materials used by farmers — chopped straw, ordinary straw, sawdust, shavings, turfmould, peat moss, cowmats and shredded waste paper. Cowmats are excellent where the house is dry and well ventilated, and the passages are kept clean, but they should not be installed in damp, dirty cowhouses. At £30-£35 each, they are probably just as cheap in the long term as any of the other materials.

Straw, particularly chopped straw, is probably the best bedding material, but there seems to be less and less of it used every year. Straw does not suit all slurry systems. Some farmers say that it makes slats a bit sticky and dirtier. The use of shredded waste paper is increasing and it is very satisfactory, but needs to be swept down when it gets wet.

HEIFERS:

Training heifers to use cubicles at the weaning stage is important. Any farmer who has not got a few small cubicles of around 6" x 3' or even less, should consider putting them in place. There are always less problems with cows lying out of cubicles where the weaning heifers had cubicles of their own rather than straw bedding or a slatted cattle pen.

Cubicles should be kept clean and should be swept down when necessary, perhaps twice daily or even more frequently. Slatted passages should be scraped, using a handscraper twice a day if the passage is not keeping itself clean. Burned lime, or whitewashing lime, keeps the cubicle floors very dry and it keeps mastitis at bay. This type of lime should be spread only lightly on top of mats or on whatever bedding material is used.

FARMERS SHOULD BE ALLOWED FEED THE WORLD'S HUNGRY

It's a sad reflection on Western society that Irish dairy farmers are facing the prospect of being forced to dump milk at a time when 800 million of the world's population are chronically under nourished said ICMSA President, Frank Allen.

"It's absolutely crazy that our dairy farmers are facing the threat of a record £33 million super-levy fine for over production of milk when 20% of the population of developing countries are hungry."

Mr. Allen said the World Food Summit which ended on Sunday, November 17 was a talking shop where people spoke about what should be done to feed the hungry rather than what will be done. "It's high time that the EU and politicians in the West decided to make a real commitment to the world's starving people, instead of imposing severe financial penalties on farmers for producing food in excess of rigid quotas," said Mr. Allen.

"At a time when this country is marking the 150th anniversary of the Great Irish Famine, our farmers are particularly outraged over the greed which is an inherent part of the Western political system.

"Irish farmers should be allowed to produce food to keep starving people alive. The current restrictions on production which prevent this happening leaves me with the inevitable conclusion that the lunatics have taken over the asylum.

ICMSA WELCOMES INCREASE IN BEEF PRICES

Nicholas Ryan, Chairman of ICMSA Livestock Committee, welcomed the increase in the price paid for beef. He said that 2p/lb increase is long overdue. U grade steers are now making 86p/lb while R grade steers are up to 84p/lb.

"This is a considerable improvement in prices which is long overdue. The price increase has resulted from a scarcity of cattle and an improved export market, both for live cattle and for beef", said Mr. Ryan.

Mr. Ryan said that ICMSA is calling for the introduction of a premium for live cattle exports in the Spring periods, similar to the present deseasonalisation premium. This would level the playing pitch between the live exported and beef processor.

ICMSA QUESTIONS STATEMENT ON MILK QUOTAS

In response to comments by Professor Seamus Sheehy on the speedy abolition of milk quotas, ICMSA President, Frank Allen said milk producers at the lower end of the quota scale need additional income right now to keep their farms viable, irrespective of the existence, or otherwise, of the quota regime. Mr. Allen said: "It is a fact that that average milk supplier producing 22,000 gallons of milk cannot meet family needs on £10,000 per annum. If quotas are abolished — accompanied by a fall in the price of milk — all milk producers' livelihoods would be at very

serious risk. Those 36,000 farmers with quotas under 40,000 gallons would have no real alternative to signing on for social welfare payments."

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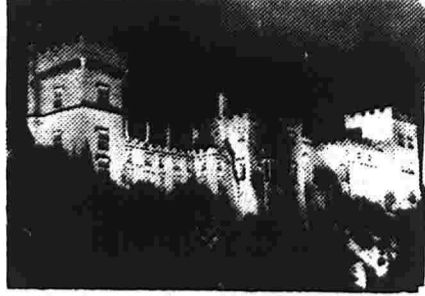

Work Programme Of Tidy Towns Committee

WILDLIFE

Part of the planting schedule outlined last week will enhance habitat and pollination facilities for various birds and insects that frequent the area. The T.T.C. have been active in pursuing a cleaner harbour in order to promote it as a pleasure boat and fishing destination.

In 1993 under the directive of the Conservation of Wild Bird E.C. Regulations The Harbour was designated as a Special Protection Area for wild birds. In order to observe this regulation the U.D.C. are proposing to eliminate all untreated discharges into the harbour by the construction of a sewerage treatment plant in Ballinacourty approximately two miles from the town.

The T.T.C. successfully appealed to the Department of the Marine against a licence application by a local consortium to establish a clam growing farm on Abbeyside beach. The project would have involved giving over several acres of the foreshore to private individuals and thus losing the public

use of this valuable asset. URBAN RENEWAL

At the present time apartment blocks and commercial units are being constructed on the quay itself. There are proposals for a hotel and apartment complex on the site of the Leather Factory under consideration at present by the U.D.C. It is an essential part of these plans that the whole quay front from the public toilets right through to the town park are upgraded to coincide with this development. It is envisaged that King John's Castle will be left free standing when all this development is complete and plans have been drawn up to have sympathetic street furniture, etc., sited in the surrounding area. It is also proposed to floodlight this historical feature. All this development will improve the visual impact of the harbour as viewed from Strandside South, the Pond and Stokes Field. This year the bollards on the Causeway have been restored and repaired. They had been engulfed by the hedging over the years but now this hedg-

ing has been pruned and will grow back even stronger and greener.

LITTER/TIDINESS

To begin their litter awareness campaign the T.T.C. made litter the theme of their float for the St. Patrick's Day Parade. This was very well received. A review of the cleaning and litter bin situation is being undertaken. The main culprits in our area appear to be take-aways, off licences and school-children. Meetings have taken place with school principals and business proprietors in order to get a cohesive response to the problem.

Keep Cool In The Heat

WHAT is worse than feeling hot and sticky in warm weather? More perspiration is attacked by bacteria. Personal hygiene is a must in warm weather.

Anti-perspirants are the most effective way of dealing with odour. They constrict the skins pores which prevents moisture from escaping. They also contain a deodorant which will keep you smelling fresh all day.

Deodorants unlike anti-perspirants disguise odours with a fresh smell. The most popular deodorants are creams or roll-ons, however if sharing a deodorant with anybody else an aerosol is proba-

bly the most hygienic. The body can become immune to deodorants, so it is worth changing brands occasionally. Deodorants should be applied to clean dry under arms a few minutes after washing.

It is not just heat that causes us to perspire. Fear, stress and vigorous exercise also cause this. Some people are more prone to heavy sweating. Showering regularly will prevent body odour, but

it is also advisable to cut down on hot, spicy foods, caffeine and tight clothes. Avoid baths which are too hot or too cold. If possible wear loose clothes which will not restrict your skin. If perspiring is a real problem always use an anti-perspirant rather than a deodorant, and wash regularly during the day, applying anti-perspirant after each wash.

Natural deodorants are becoming quite popular and are available in good health stores.

You can enjoy the heat and keep fresh all day, so don't let the sunny weather get you down.

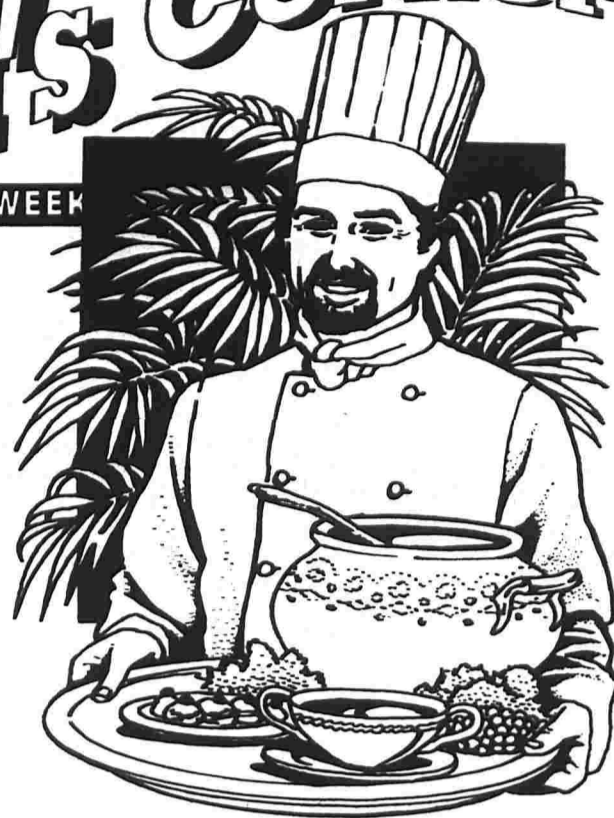

MENUS FOR THE WEEK

Souvlakia

Preparation: 10 minutes
Cooking: 20 minutes
Serves: 4

- 550g/1 1/4lb lean boneless lamb cut into 3.5cm/1 1/2in cubes
- 1 red onion, peeled and cut into small wedges
- 8 fresh bay leaves
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- grated rind and juice of 1/2 lemon
- GREEK SALAD
- 1/2 cucumber, cubed
- 4 tomatoes, roughly chopped
- 1 green pepper, seeded and sliced
- 200g/7oz feta cheese, cubed
- 100g/4oz black olives
- 4 tsp olive oil
- 1 tbsp wine vinegar
- shredded lettuce and lemon wedges to serve



METHOD: Preheat the grill to a medium setting. Thread the cubed lamb, onion wedges and bay leaves alternately on to 4 metal skewers. Place on a grill pan. Mix together the olive oil and lemon rind and juice and brush over the kebabs. Season with salt and pepper. Grill the kebabs for about 10 minutes each side until the lamb is tender, turning and basting frequently. Cook for longer if you prefer the meat well done. To make the Greek salad: Toss together the cucumber, tomatoes and green pepper in a salad bowl. Sprinkle the feta cheese and olives over the top. Mix together the oil and vinegar, season and pour over the salad. Place the souvlakia on a bed of shredded lettuce with lemon wedges to garnish and serve with the Greek salad.

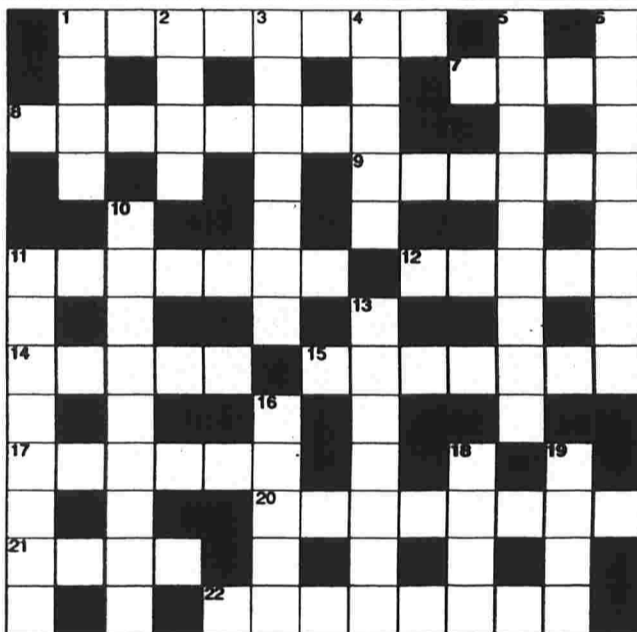

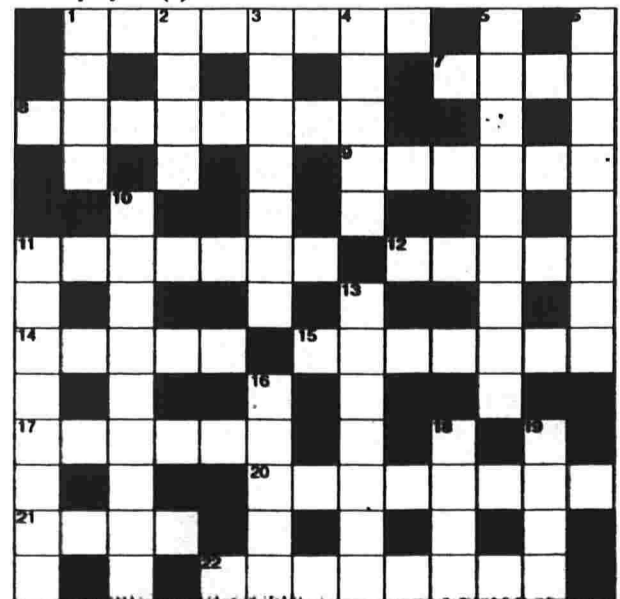

FAMILY health

Q. I am 24 and have always had bad periods. I went on the pill and this helped for a while, but I had to come off it as it caused high blood pressure. Now I am reduced again to sweats, dizziness and terrible pain. Please help me.

A. I would love to be able to give you an easy answer. There are no sure-fire solutions other than having a baby which nearly always cures period pains. I imagine you have tried all the cures that the chemist has to offer - if not ask for a pain killer which contains codeine which will help to relax the womb muscle. Another thing you could try is evening primrose capsules which may help to reduce the sensitivity of the womb. A lot of women feel that vigorous exercises such as skipping can have a massaging effect on the womb. If you cannot get anything to give you relief, you should go back to your doctor who will refer you to a gynaecologist.

Q. My baby is now six-weeks-old. My problem is that I have stretch marks on my stomach. Why do some women get them while others don't? Will they fade and how can I avoid them if I get pregnant again?

A. The good news is that most stretch marks do fade from their original red/purple to a whiter colour, but the bad news is that there is no effective way to avoid getting more. Most women get them during pregnancy, but young people may get them during puberty. Even the thinnest of young people get them, so it isn't just a question of the skin stretching or an increase in girth. Getting stretch marks while pregnant is most likely to do with hormone changes. A lot of people believe that rubbing moisturiser into the skin helps where stretch marks appeared or are likely to appear helps.

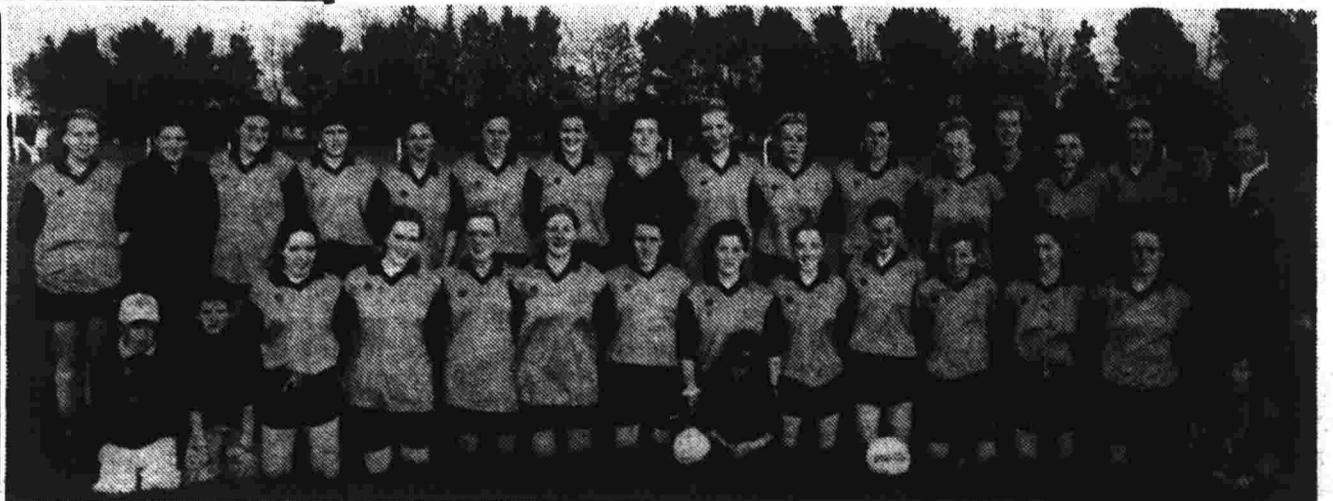

PRIMARY SCHOOLS G.A.A.

This week we are going to explore in depth at what sporting performance is all about. Engaging in competitive sport at any level involves a lot of self-discipline and soul-searching. Part of the reason for this is that, in the final analysis, the competitor is on his own, totally dependent on his inner resources that can be mobilised to cope with pain, fatigue or mental pressure. The difference between the champion and the also rans lies predominantly in their attitudes to events during competitions. This can be summed up in the following learning points:

- If you want to win, you have to really want to win even if it hurts.
- To succeed, you have to believe that no situation is beyond hope. Never give in until the final whistle!
- The focus for success lies in the present. Preoccupation with past or future performances can only lead to disap-

pointment in the present.
 ● You must recognise that most of the source of pressure comes from YOU. Once you learn to deal with this (e.g. through relaxation) everything comes much more easily.

● The winning attitude is one which places the responsibility for reactions to events on the player himself. Whatever happens during competition, it devolves on the player himself to find some solution for that.

! Taking this responsible attitude means taking control of what you can control and seeking help when you can't.

If jobs are not found for our players however, then they will have no option but to go where they know their talents will be paid for in dollars so let us ask ourselves what can we do to keep our future at home and do something about it now.

HURLING MUST NOT BE FORGOTTEN

Many of our players are very good hurlers and they will feel that we have as good a chance of winning the Junior hurling title as we do of winning a football title.

I believe that we have the talent to make a hurling team and many of our Senior players, combined with the emerging young talent, should at least give it a go this year so some thought must be given to the small ball side of things as I believe that the interest is there and where there is a will, there is a way.

LEAGUES A MUST

Having looked at the Intercounty calendar, the G.A.A. is in danger of losing its identity in Waterford if it doesn't do something for the ordinary bread and butter player who must have games to survive. It is imperative that proper Spring Leagues are organised and that the championships revert to a knockout basis with the league continuing for most of the season. The

top players have too many games and the ordinary players have too few games. A proper balance must be arrived at and in this respect only Bord na nOg appear to be organised with each grade at least having a number of organised games but the season must be structured so that the players have a practical playing season at least from March to September.

SYMPATHY

Once more this year a good friend has been taken from us with Paddy Power, Lissarrow going to his eternal reward. Our sincere sympathy is extended to all his family and friends on their great loss.

May he rest in peace.

CLUB CONSTITUTION

A new G.A.A. Constitution will now have to be adopted by all G.A.A. clubs at their A.G.M. to comply with general rule and this lengthy document is now in the hands of our members to read prior to Sunday's A.G.M.

Some interesting points will emerge with the Executive Committee having the right to accept or not those proposed and seconded for membership. Failure to pay by the prescribed date will deny the individual active participation rights but not social participation. The Executive will also have the power to take action against anyone in breach of the rules.

It will also have the right to select all sub-committee chairpersons with the Club Officers being ex-officio members of all sub-committees. This should give better control of finances and all club activities as reports from the various sub-committees would be on the main agenda each night as part of normal business.

A cancellation would mean that London would have to return for the refixture to Fraher Field and the visitors were in no mood for this kind of scenario, considering that they had already announced their displeasure at having to travel back to Ireland on next Sunday to play Tipperary.

This was not the only bit of drama that preceded the playing of the game and many people in the stand (about 50) must have wondered if they had come to the wrong venue when any of the two teams on the field were not wearing Waterford colours. Half an hour before the game the Waterford se-

lectors discovered that five or six jerseys were missing from the jersey case. The same jerseys had been worn by the under 16 team against Limerick on the previous weekend and while they had been laundered in the meantime, the missing ones had not been noted.

In the short time available to Joe Curran and Jim McGrath, it was not possible to get replacement colours, so with co-operation of the Brickey Club, a full set was obtained and with the permission of the referee, everything went O.K. in the end.

Waterford fielded as selected and London showed one

change from the programme. London won the toss and played with the wind in the first half.

PLAY

Play was slowed down by the awful underfoot conditions and the ball did not hop at any stage. Both teams had early misses and in the 7th minute after goalkeeper Ciaran Cullinane had saved at the expense of a '45', Senan Hehir, who was London's top scorer, sent over for the opener.

Noel Harrington made it two points for the visitors in the 9th minute and Waterford did not open their account until the 15th minute when Kieran Whelan sent over. Michael Downey, who was in brilliant form for Waterford, equalised from play in the 17th minute.

Mick Hesson had a London point in the 20th minute before a number of players combined in a splendid move that saw Michael Downey go through for the first of Waterford's two goals in the 22nd minute. Mick Hesson and M. Downey exchanged points and it was left to Paddy Kelly to kick over the last two points of the first half which saw London with six points as against 1-3 for Waterford.

AWFUL MISSES

Points by Michael Downey (2) and Stephen Cunningham in the second half were followed by two awful misses — one which denied us a goal. In the 42nd minute Kieran Whelan had his second point of the game and at this point the game looked to be going our way when a London attack resulted in Senan Hehir breaking through for a goal, which was to be their only score of the half, but which nevertheless sent a few shockwaves around the Waterford camp. It was now 1-7 to 1-6 and 15 minutes remaining. Michael Downey was again on target with points in the 47th and 55th minutes to extend the lead to three points before Oliver Costello kicked home the goal which sealed victory for the home team in the 59th minute.

Both teams deserve great credit for having endured the awful conditions and

after the game the London Chairman, John Lucey, told me that they had never encountered such conditions. He also told me that London had come here very confident of taking the points after running Offaly to 4 points in their last match.

Fraher Field was in excellent trim for the three games played there on Saturday afternoon, but obviously could not soak up the torrential rain which had fallen overnight and which had resulted in the cancellation of a number of league matches.

Death Of Michael O'Hehir

Described as the voice of Irish sport and the greatest of all broadcasters the great Michael O'Hehir died at a Dublin nursing home on Sunday night, just two weeks after being a guest of honour at a very special function held by the G.A.A. and the Racing Board to mark the launch of his autobiography at the Gresham Hotel, Dublin.

Liam Mulvihill, Director General, described him as the G.A.A.'s greatest salesman. Other personalities on the national and sporting scene hastened to pay Michael well deserved tributes when news of his death became known on Sunday night.

He began his career as a broadcaster back in 1938 when he was commissioned to broadcast the All Ireland football semi final between Galway and Monaghan on August 14. Waterford and Dublin met in the hurling All Ireland in 1938 and this was O'Hehir's first All Ireland final. In all he broadcast 99 finals in hurling and football, including replays and suffered a stroke before he could complete his one hundred broadcast of finals in 1985 when he was 64.

In the days before T.V. his name was a household word as his clear voice was heard in homes in every hamlet and village in Ireland when he brought his vivid descriptions of the games to hundreds of thousands of listeners.

Although never employed by the G.A.A., the Association owes him a debt that they will never be able to repay. He was the greatest and his memory will never be forgotten. May he rest in peace.
