From next January on, householders in Waterford county can expect to pay an extra £5 on their water charge bill (now totalling £150), which currently ranks as one of the highest charges being levied by any local authority in the country.

Meanwhile, county-based business owners face a whopping 7.7% increase in the commercial rates next year, bringing it to just over £39 in the £. The existing refuse charge of £2 per collection remains unaltered.

This new county rate was adopted at last Friday's annual estimates meeting of Waterford County Council.

Has the Government allowed people who return to work retain their Medical Card, and what are the con-

Yes. Arrangements have been agreed with the Chief Executive Officers of the Health Boards to enable people who have been unemployed (on the Live Register) for at least one year, to retain their Medical Cards for 3 years after entering employment, as announced in the budget. This measure is effective from the date of the budget.

Teagasc Dairy **Conference For** Dungarvan

Teagasc, as part of its joint programme with Waterford oods plc., is running a GATT Ready - Protein 350' conference on this Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan. The conference, one of a national series of six, will focus on quota policy, milk production costs, milk protein improvement and nutrition news from Moorepark Research Centre.

Announcing the conference series, Dermot McCarthy, Teagasc's Chief Dairy Adviser, said that cost control and protein improvement are the keys to maximising re-

turns from dairying.

Over the last 3 years alone, costs of milk production have jumped by 8p per gallon. Farmers must focus on where costs are increasing, or use the Teagasc ADFA programme to identify cost areas so as to im-

prove profit margins.
"There is £50 profit per cow to be achieved through protein improvement and a further £50 per cow to be Thursday 5th December at made through cost reductions on many farmers", added Mr. McCarthy.

Speakers on the night include local Teagasc representatives, Chris Miller, Waterford Foods plc., Martin Varley, ICOS and Seamus Fitzgerald, Teagasc Moorepark.

Teagasc will deal with farm management approaches to prepare for milk price reductions and other changes ahead. Moorepark researcher Dr. Seamus Fitzgerald will cover the most recent developments in nutrition and how they might apply to dairy cow feeding this winter/spring.

The meeting begins at 8 p.m. sharp. Admission is free and all are welcome.

Plans Of Beeches Council Estate On Public Display

Following recent discussions by members of Dun-garvan UDC regarding the planned Council housing development at the Beeches, O'Connell Street, the num-ber of houses for the site has now decreased from 16 to 15. This reduction arose from the need to facilitate a side access to the front terraced houses.

The matter was previously raised by Councillors who felt that the proposed terraced houses should have a side access to facilitate tenants with the delivery of domestic fuels, etc., rather than having to bring items through the house.

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

The Potter Wasp

This type of wasp grows up in a pot. The adult potter wasp is a small black narrow-walsted wasp with noticeable yellow markings.

with noticeable yellow man
It usually lives on heaths,
or moors, but may be seen
in gardens. When the
female is ready to lay her
eggs she builds small potlike nests on heather or
some other plant. She
builds one of these nests
for each egg that she lays.
The nests are made very
carefully from mild and are
unmistalcable. The female
potter produces several
juices which she mixes
with the mild to make it
easier to work with. The
small pots set quickly and
are resistant to all weathers.

When the wasp has finished making her pots she files off looking for hairless and epike-free caterpillars. She stings them, but does not kill them, then she takes them back to her pots one at a

time. She carries up to five cuterpillars to each pot and pushes them through the opening. Only now does she lay a single egg. She lays a to that it will dangle from a thread above the stunted caterpillars. She seals the entrance hote with a pellet of mud and moves on to the next one. When the larvae hatch, they reach down to eat the half-dead caterpillars. Only when the larvae feet they are strong enough, will they cut themselves free from the threads and move around among the wiggling worms. They will stay in their pots until next year when they emerge as wasps. These wasps look very

Dunmore East. In 1980 he was elevated to Parish Priest and served in Ballylooby from 1980-'87. Touraneena and The Nire was his last posting and in July of this year he retired due to ill health.

Fr. Michael was a quiet, private man who had a great sense of humour. In his youth he was an excellent boxer and loved the outdoor pursuit of shooting. I learned from a family member of his love for the wild west films. He was an authority on John Wayne films and the Western 'High Noon" was one of his favourites. Classical music was another favourite pastime and he loved his musical collection and was well versed in that field of talent.

We, too, like his parishioners in Touraneena and The Nire, mourn his passing from among us. We are granted comfort with the knowledge that Fr. Michael has taken his place with the Lord.

Prayers and rosary were recited by Very Rev. R. Liddane, P.P. at the hospital mortuary on Tuesday afternoon, after which the cortege left for Touraneena church where the funeral service was conducted by Most Rev. Dr. William Lee, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore and a full choir of clergy. A guard of honour was provided by the school children from Touraneena, while the church choir, accompanied by Therese Butler, provided the music.

Almost sixty clergy were present for the concelebrated Mass on Wednesday afternoon. Dr. Lee was chief celebrant, Very Rev. Mons. M. Olden and Very Rev. Canon Nugent were co-celebrants. Canon Nugent of Lismore was indeed a much valued friend of Fr. Michael's. The Lessons were read by Kathryn Heffernan (niece) and Bernard Power (nephew). Following Mass the funeral left for St. Mary's Cemetery, Ballygunner, where Fr. Michael was interred in the family

The curtains of eveningtime were drawing close when we bade our final goodbye to Fr. Michael. Rather than try to name the clergy present, I thought it more prudent to use the term choir of clergy. These were there in great numbers as well as representatives of all civic bodies and of course Fr. Michael's flock who had travelled from the various parishes where he spread and lived the good news.

- Applications for the Special Beef Premium will be allowed up to the 13th December, 1996.
- Producers who have already used up their three applications per stage (six in total for 10 month and 22 month) will be allowed to submit a fourth application in December.
- Ten month application in December animals born between 1st April 1995 and 30th April, 1996, are eligible. Twenty-two month applications in December
- mals born before 31st March, 1995 are eligible. Application forms are available from local Department of Agriculture offices.
- Producers applying on extra animals for Beef Premium in December should ensure that they do not breach stocking density limits for basic premiums or extensifi-

cation. ANIMAL REMEDIES RECORDS

The animal Remedies Regulations (1996) which came into law on August 1st, 1996 requires that a record is kept each time an animal remedy with a withdrawal period is administered to any food-producing animal. Tea-gasc now have a record book available, at a nominal cost of £1 per book, which will fulfil the requirements of the legislation.

The following details are recorded in the book:

- Name and quantity of animal remedy administered.
- Date of expiry of withdrawal period.
- Name of person who administered the animal remedy. Name of prescribing veterinary surgeon (if appropriate).

 Name of supplier of animal remedy.

Producers are required to retain veterinary prescriptions for a three year period. Most veterinary products will have a withdrawal period.

Animals should not be slaughtered or milk should not be used for human consumption before the prescribed drug withdrawal period has expired.

Commonly used products such as worm doses, fluke doses, all have withdrawal periods. Each time you use a wormer, you are obliged to record its use.

Important Studies To Be Undertaken On Dungarvan Harbour

As reported in last week's edition, a sum of £20,000 has been provided in Dun-garvan UDC's 1997 budget to finance a number of studies on the local harbour.

Last September the Commissioners of Irish Lights requested that the leading lights at Ballinacourty and the Lookout be extinguished because changes in the harbour mean the lights no longer indicate safe passage into and out of the harbour.

As a result, Waterford study by engineering consul-County Manager Donal Connolly has instructed that a hydrographic study of the harbour be carried out with a view to having the leading lights operational again at the earliest possible date.

With regard to the inner harbour which is in urgent need of attention, a recent survey of the quay walls by the Town Engineer found that several locations are in distress and a more detailed

tants is required.

The level of silting in the harbour is also a matter of concern and Mr. Connolly proposes to commission a study on sediment deposition in the harbour with a view to establishing the level of work required to improve the harbour for leisure craft presently using the harbour. Apart from the initial sum of £20,000, these studies will probably have to be funded over a number of years.

Road To Abbeyside Beach Resurfaced

The road beside the Abbeyside F.C. grounds at Dogleaf Park leading to Abbeyside beach has been resurfaced by Dungarvan UDC. This development has been warmly welcomed by residents in the area as the road was previously in a deplorable potholed condition.

Excavation Works At Dungarvan **Castle Now** Complete

According to the Minister for Arts, Culture and the Gaeltacht, Michael D. Higgins, extensive archaeologiexcavations Dungarvan Castle have recently been completed.

An analysis of these archaeological findings is now being carried out and it is intended to initiate a programme of conservation works as early as possible with a view to opening the castle to the public on a phased basis.

Minister Higgins was responding to a question raised in the Dail recently by Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy.

The Office of Public Works allocated £500,000 towards the refurbishment of Dungarvan Castle during the period 1994 to 1999 and County Manager Donal Connolly recently acquired two properties adjoining the castle on their behalf with a view to developing an amenity area under the Urban and Village Renewal Programme.

County Water Charges Up £5 As Rates Take A 7.7% Hike

Expenditure in the coming year is set at £19.75m., which, when offset against the estimated income of £17.92m. from government grants, etc., leaves a deficit of £1.8m., which will be borne by the new £39.06 rate in the £.

According to Mr. Connolly, the Council is now starting to write off its £4.3m. debt over the next ten years.

The dire financial straits in which the local authority now finds itself, said Mr. Connolly, was caused by the Council adopting inadequate estimates and overspending over the years. He said he has endeavoured to keep increased costs for next year to the very minimum, having pared the estimates to the bone.

His recommended £10 water charge increased however failed to receive the enthusiastic support of members.

Cllr. Willie McDonnell said the Council were told in 1995 that any further increases in water charges would be small. "It's very unfair that we are being asked to support a £10 increase and the public also feel it's unjust," he declared.

His sentiments were shared by Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson who said that while he appreciated that money is needed, members would be in an "awful position" if service charges are abolished and the Council includes increased water charges in its '97 budget. come of the current debate remains unknown. The Government, he said, would have to compensate all local authorities for their loss in revenue should service charges be abolished.

The proposal to delete water charges from the estimates was also supported by Clir. Lar Hart. However, when put to a vote, the motion was lost 18-3.

"EXORBITANT **INCREASE**"

Stating that it was very difficult to justify a commercial rate increase of 7.7% (roughly three times the present rate of inflation), Cllr. Billy Kyne said some small and medium sized businesses may not be able to finance what he termed was an 'exorbitant'

With water charges now entering the £150 bracket, Cllr. Kyne said the whole funding of local authorities has gone to the end of its

Of course we got chatting about hurling and making comparisons between today's games and those of yesteryear. He had that great St. Catherine's victory over Ballyhea, last year's Senior finalists and rejoiced senior. When I asked him To say we were sickened is about Senior hurling standards in Cork, his answer in watching St. Carthage's winning the Junior hurling title in standard of Junior hurling then was the equivalent of today's Senior standard. Would you dispute that ? The game has become faster but the skill level has dropped. Or could it be that our imagination tints the past in rosy shades !!

Back in the forties and fifties, club hurling was such Tallow in advance of the the injured, the linesmen fire the imagination. Those

great Mount Sion or Thurles Sarsfields or Glen Rovers or Rathnure of those days are unlikely to forget them. They were superb and served up some memorable club tournaments where the prizes were invariably suit lengths or gold watches. Huge crowds were attracted and the enthusiasm and atmosphere conspired to make these occasions unforgettable ones. Do we ever experience anything like this today? Thankfully we do in games as the Ballygunner/Wolfe Tones match. Yes that All-Ireland Club Championship is perhaps the most significant development in club affairs over the last 25 years. The surprise is that it took so long to give fitting recognition to the pre-eminence of the club. We are always being reminded of the club's position within the association, how it is the basic unit of the association, that club predated county, how the club, in fact, represented the County in earlier years etc. Then just 25 years ago in

1971 full official blessing was given to the inaugural national club competitions and Tadhg O'Connor had the honour of leading his club Roscrea to victory. Since then the provincial and All-Ireland club competitions have increased in interest and prestige so that now as the Thurles final confirmed, they attract support from areas well outside the confines of the competing teams. Isn't it mind-boggling to think that hurling and football games of such importance and attractiveness could be played in the depths of winter and produce a standard as high and in many cases higher than that of the more high profile summer Inter-county championship matches.

A.I.B. must be complimented on sponsorship of the national club championships. They undertook the support of these championships when it was neither fashionable nor profitable to do so and when their success was far from assured, A.I.B. and all sponsors deserve our gratitude and support. Those in club administrative positions know only too well the impact of sponsorship (national and local) which is now an integral part of club finance and without which most clubs would struggle to survive. Far too often sponsors are forgotten, overlooked or taken for granted. Let us pay tribute to them and express appreciation for such generous involvement

A. Get the children to wash their hands before going to nursery and ask the people in charge not to let them share towels or pillows. Impetigo is caused by becteris which get into the body through chapped areas, cuts or grazes. It is usually seen around the mouth and cheeks but may often occur on the hands and knees. It starts with a reddish patch, followed by blisters which discharge a yellow coloured fluid, yellow coloured fluid, spreading the infection on contact. This can be apread either by the children's skin either by the children's skin touching, or by contaminat-ing toys, towels, clothes and pillows. Crusts then form which are also contagious. Toddlers are susceptible to impetigo because they are in such close contact and

partly because their skin is very delicate. Treatment with antibiotics is successful because the rash is superli-cial. To help stop the infection, dry your daughter's face with tissues, keep her hands clean and change her pillow cases daily, until the rash has gone. If the other parents follow your example, it's much less likely to occur again.

A Good Time To Prune The Fruit Trees

A LOT of pruning and cutting back can be done this time of the year. Take apple trees, for instance.

Standard trees need only be thinned. Take out any crowded or crossing branches and that's about it. Cordon trees should be spur-pruned, that is, all the lateral growths are shortened back to three buds. Espaliertrained trees are treated similarly.

When it comes to bush trees, don't be so severe in your spur-pruning. Leaders, that is, the ends of the main branches, may be shortened back each year according to their vigour. If they're weak, I'd only remove half the growth made this year. If they're strong though, only a third need be cut out.

A few varieties of apple fruit on the extreme tips of the side shoots and not at the base of the shoots, so these should be pruned very lightly. Shorten only the very crowded and crossing shoots, and leave all the other growths untouched.

While you're doing all this, you might as well take the opportunity of removing any dead or broken branches that you come across. Saw them out cleanly.

Use a sharp knife or good secateurs for normal pruning and all cuts must be made cleanly.

Root-pruning may be tried where apple, pear, plum or cherry trees make very vigorous growth but no blossom. The work is best spread over two seasons.

In the first year - and now is a very good time to start — take out a trench to the full depth of the spade, half-way round the tree, and about 5 ft. away from the trunk. Sever any roots that are encountered. Fill in the trench,



and repeat the operation next winter on the remaining half-circle.

An alternative to root-pruning is bark-ringing. It's usuallystried when the trees aren't fruiting (although there may be several causes for non-fruiting), and especially where blossom is borne, but little fruit formed. You have to do it when the trees are in flower. Take out a strip of bark half-an-inch wide from half-way round the trunk of the tree.

Next year, the other half is done, but six inches above or below the first half-ring. Don't forget to cover the cuts with adhesive tape.

If you've any cherry trees, now's the time for pruning, although dessert cherries and cooking cherries need different approaches.

The latter group may be pruned now, and they include such varieties as Morello and Kentish Red.

Keep the space available well filled with healthy young shoots, permitting no overcrowding. The young growth usually needs a good deal of thinning, shoots having to be cut because they are too plentiful, because they cross others, or because they have assumed an awkward angle. Cut back all such shoots to two buds.
