Dungarvan Bas For New Business Development

Saturday, January 25th saw the launch of a new venture between Co. Waterford and Pembrokeshire,

Wales by Esben Poulsen, a senior EU commission official. A new company, Waterford in Business Ltd., has been formed to promote the business development, trading and networking venture between both areas.

This is part of three year Interreg II European funding initiative to stimulate cross border development between member states. It is promoted by Waterford Development Partnership in association with A.I.B. Bank.

The company will be based in Dungarvan and will be managed by Edmond Connolly. He has spent months meeting businesses and building up a network of contacts. He says "while Co. Waterford has a number of very successful larger indigenous

"Desperate Haven"

- Required Reading

It would be difficult to accept that there could be any new material, or any new 'angle' to be found on the Famine, so widely has it been covered both locally and nationally to date, but co-authors William Fraher, Bernadette Sheridan, Seosaimh O Loingsigh and Willie Whelan have presented the results of their lengthy and detailed work in a new, compelling and most informa-

"Desperate Haven", the new book by the four co-authors on the effects of the Famine in the Dungarvan Union, is a very welcome and worthwhile addition to the information available on the great catastrophe which befell the Irish people in the period 1845/50.

It is well researched, well indexed and beautifully illustrated 415 page work, which is sometimes chilling,

often sad, but always interesting.

Many of the names which are mentioned in the various aspects of the life of this part of mid Waterford are the same as those of people who live and work in our area today and it can be safely assumed that the ancestors of the people of the town and district were not spared the hardships and privations of the great hunger.

Many of the places mentioned are shown in illustrations and indeed, many of the buildings which saw such extremes of misery, poverty and suffering, can still be seen on the streets of Dungarvan today. The account is essentially that of the inmates of the Union Workhouse in Dungarvan and it makes very sorry reading indeed.

Allied to, and directly as a result of, the shortage of food and the resultant poor diet, cholera was rampant in the latter years of the Famine. The weekly report of the Cholera Hospital 29th, April to 10th, May 1849 shows

"That number of patients admitted was 220, all of whom has come from the Workhouse or its auxiliaries, with the exception of two who had come from Abbeyside. There were 137 patients in hospital at the end of the week, of whom 30 were convalescent.'

The following week the admissions to date had come to 358, of whom 166 had died. One account tells of six funerals in Abbeyside Church at the one time.

It seemed as if most of the large buildings of the town were taken over as refuges of one kind of another, auxiliary workhouses, fever hospital or other places of retreat, which gave only a minimum of succour to a population wracked by the most appalling afflictions.

The distress, both in Youghal and Dungarvan, is truly appalling in the streets; for without entering the houses, the miserable spectacle of haggard looks, crouching attitudes, sunken eyes and colourless lips and cheeks, unmistakably bespeaks the sufferings of the people.

Among the places which are still in existence and identifiable are Kiely's two stores at Quay Lane, Dee's house and Boyle's house in Blackpool (O'Connell Street), and the Fever Hospital in Strandside North.

This comprehensive study also gives in some detail the living conditions and the diet of 'the paupers' of the

The fever particularly spread at an alarming rate in the Dungarvan area and a diet of yellow meal was little defence against its insidious effects.

'Out of one house in the Old Parish, three persons (of the Lyons family) died in one fortnight — the father, the son and the mother, leaving after them six orphans who are also lying in fever.'

Authors William Fraher, Bernadette Sheridan, Seosaimh O Loingsigh and Willie Whelan have effectively captured the horror of that black era, encapsulated it within their impressive volume and it will remain there as a reminder and a tribute to one of the most shameful periods in the history of Europe.

The book deals also with the efforts of the Quakers in Ring which helped the population there to escape the worst ravages of the era, Very Rev. Dr. Jeremiah Halley, Parish Priest of Dungarvan and his relief schemes, and gives graphic and detailed accounts of the appalling conditions in the Workhouse and its auxiliary institutions where people were sheltered.

When you buy 'Desperate Haven' expect an enthralling read, but not one which will leave you filled with the milk of human kindness. A very necessary addition to the expanding Famine records.

Major Refurbishment Of Dungarvan Technical College

It was revealed this week that a total refurbishment programme of the nearly 60 year old Dungarvan Technical College at Wolfe Tone Road will cost in the region of £117,000 while an electrical overhaul of the building is estimated at £24,800 + VAT.

This badly needed repair project for the rapidly deteriorating school will now be put out to tender by the Co. Waterford V.E.C.

Concerns about safety risks to staff and students posed by the depreciating conditions at the school were previously raised among others by Cllr. Austin Flynn, a member of the school teaching staff. Cllr. Flynn had warned the V.E.C. that peoples lives were at risk and that he "could see an accident happening", particularly regarding the loose panes of glass in the buildings windows.

Over Christmas some repairs were carried out including a leaking roof in introduction of an extractor ly built at Quanns. in the metalwork room.

Speaking at last Monday's V.E.C. meeting, Cllr. Flynn said £140,000 or so is not a "lot of money to spend on such a substantial building" and added that the school will be an asset to the town, county and to the Department of Education in the long term.

Likewise V.E.C. Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne described the college as a prime site which will have many other uses when the new £1m plus college building is eventual-

Chief Executive Officer, Kieran Heffernan confirmed that the Wolfe Tone Road school will be needed by the V.T.O.S. students who are currently accommodated at the Presentation Convent, the Adult Education Course situated at the Courthouse and the Practice Firm Class housed in Kilrush etc.

Admitting that the expense incurred by the refurbishment programme "is a lot", Mr. Heffernan however said it shows how run down the building is.

Stories That Prove Man's Best Friend Is His Dog

Need a pal you can trust? Look no further than that scruffy picture of laziness dozing by the fire. A dog really is your best friend when the chips are down. It will go on being honest and faithful right through to the end — and beyond.

When the file on murder victim Dr. Helen Davidson was re-opened recently, 14 years after her death, police recalled that her pet terrier was still beside the body when it was discovered.

The dog Fancy had stood guard in the lonely Buckinhamshire wood for 24 hours.

Outside Edinburgh's Greyfriars Cemetery stands the statue of a dog known world-wide as Greyfriars Bobby.

Bobby, a Skye terrier, was the pet of a policeman called John Gray who died in 1858.

The day after the funeral Bobby was still beside the grave and had to be chased away, because animals were not allowed in the cemetery.

Stay it did — for 14 years. It would leave the graveside once a day, when a gun firing at Edinburgh Castle announced that it was 1 p.m.

Then Bobby would trot off to a restaurant where Gary had been a regular customer.

The owners would leave out food which the dog picked up and took back to the cemetery. The restaurateurs took care of Bobby when it became too infirm to continue its vigil. It died

in 1872.

In Japan, young couples have been meeting for years in the shadow of the statue of a dog outside Shibuya station, near Tokyo. It commemorates a faithful pet called Hachi-ko The dog's master was a university professor, and every evening it would wait at the station for his train to arrive. When the professor died in 1925, Hackio-ko kept vigil beside the coffin before the funeral.

After the ceremony, it went as usual to the station, waiting in vain. This it did every day for 10 years until it died of old age — right outside the station.

Railway staff had a whipround and put up a life-sized statue of the sad-eyed dog. It's still there to this day.

Another statue stands in Borgo San Lorenzo, near Flo rence, Italy. It is inscribed "Fido esemplo di fedelta" meaning "Fido, example of fidelity."

The story began when factory worker Carlo Soriani saved a mongrel from drown ing. He took it home and called it Fido.

The two became inseparable. Fido would accompany Carlo to the bus stop every morning and waited until he came home.

Then came World War Two
— and one evening Carlo
failed to return. He had been
killed in an air-raid.

But still Fido went to the bus stop every morning and waited there until evening for 13 years.

Fido became a local legend and the statue was erected during the dog's lifetime.

Farmers and shepherds in Derbyshire's Peak District still talk about a collie named Tip.

The dog and its master, 86year-old Joseph Tagg, of Yorkshire Bridge, Bamford, went missing late in 1953. During the bitter winter, hundreds of searchers combed the moors, which were 4ft. deep in snow, without suc-

Then in March, 1954, Mr. Tagg's body was found by two shepherds. Beside it crouched Tip, weak and emaciated. The collie had not left its master's side for 15 weeks, living off wild rabbits and birds.

One of Mr. Tagg's oldest friends said: 'This is the most amazing thing we have ever heard of. The story of Tip's faithfulness will be told for years.

Junior Encyclopaedia

How Did The Cave Men Make Their Tools?

Scientists say, Peking Man, a type of man that lived 300,000 years ago, was the first cave dweller. He live mainly by hunting.

Every man made his own tools. With a tool called a hammerstone he broke big pebbles until they were a size he could pick up. The tool that resulted was a crude chopper. One end of this was slightly sharpened to make a rough cutting edge. This tool could be used for digging, hacking, scraping and cutting.

Other common tools in use

Other common tools in use were crude hand axes. One end of this tool formed a heavy butt for clutching. The other end of the tool was chipped on both sides to a rounded or pointed tip. These hand axes were probably all-purpose tools, used for cracking nuts, digging up roots or for slicing up dead animals.

Neanderthal man, lived from about 150,000 to 30,000 years ago, was a proper cave dweller. Along hand. axes, Neanderthal man had flake tools. These were very well made with broad thin flakes of flint and had a very sharp edge. Some of these particular flake tools were points in the shape of rough triangles. These were probably used for skinning and cutting up dead animals. Other flake tools were side-scrapers having a curved edge on only one side.

The next period that followed was called the Upper Palaeolithic which was about 50,000 to 10,000 years ago. Blade tools appeared during this period of time. These were made from long, sharp flakes struck from cores of flint which were specially prepared. These blades were shaped into scrapers, chisel-like burins and drills. Other tools that were designed to do one particular job such as bone needles with eyes were used in sewing the skins of animals together.

Why Are Some Cliffs White?

The White Cliffs of Dover, which rise up from the sea are made up of white chalk, Chalk is a type of rock which consists of millions of shells of small, dead sea animals. These animals were made up of a single When they lived millions and millions of years ago, these tiny, minute creatures had a hard casing surrounding their body. As the years passed, the movement of the waves brought the shells of the dead animals together. These shells were covered with sand and the pressure of the sand and water gradually crushed and pressed them down. After a long period of time the chalk built up into the white rock cliffs that we see







Car Ploughs Into **Bungalow Fence For** The Seventh Time

For the seventh time in ten years, members of a Dungarvan family awoke in the early hours of Monday morning to a car ploughing into the fence fronting their bungalow home and partly demolishing it.

It's a horrible scenario John and Ann O'Brien and their young children have almost had to come to live

as they approach the O'Brien home at Ballinamuck on the main road leading to both Cappoquin and Clonmel.

This time it was a near miracle there wasn't a multiple loss of life. There were five occupants of the car and some of them had to be cut from the tangled wreck-age by firemen before three of the five were removed by ambulances to hospital.

The five, from South Tipperary, were members of a band which had played at a pub in Dungarvan on Sunday night. The trailer carrying their instruments was severed from the car on impact and ended up in a field.

An E.S.B. pole was also felled, one of the concrete pillars on the fence was knocked and driven down the road for a distance of 15 metres and power sockets were pulled from a wall of the O'Brien home.

John O'Brien, who said the impact was as though a bomb had gone off, was adamant only a miracle prevented an absolute tragedy and the loss of several lives.

"I again met the County Engineer, John O'Flynn and I appealed to him to do what was necessary to end what has become a personal nightmare for me and my family and for many other residents in the area", said Mr. O'Brien. "I was given a promise that larger warning signs will be erected but was told the bend cannot be removed or the road realigned because the Council hasn't the finance to do the

economy. We hope to address these issues".

The aim of this new initiative is to stimulate business development, trading and networking between Co. Waterford and Pem-brokeshire. The presence of Esben Poulsen from Brussels - he is responsible for all structural funding coming to Ireland - is noteworthy. As this is one of the first projects of its kind approved, the providers of funds are keen to see how it progresses. There is now a trend towards providing technical support and assistance as well as grants to business and this type of initiative is likely to be more prevalent in the future.

It is intended that Waterford in Business will work in parallel to the existing support agencies. This is vital to enable companies to get the full benefit from the range of support available. To date the venture has received the support and encouragement of Forbairt, SEBIC, the County Enterprise Board and FAS.

BRITISH WITHDRAWAL AS 'THE WAY TO PEACE'

A British withdrawal from Northern Ireland and the creation of a federal Ireland were called for at the 75th Anniversary Commemmoration of the famous Soloheadbeg Ambush on last weekend. This appeal came from John Hassett, a president of the Third Tipperary Brigade old I.R.A. Committee who gave the oration at the annual ceremony. Over 200 people attended on Sunday at the spot where Sean Treacy, Dan Breen and five other I.R.A. volunteers killed the R.I.C. men on January 21st 1919, this incident began the War of Independance. One War of Independance veteran, Jim Nolan from Rearcross was amongst the attendance.

The ceremony began with a procession led by the Sean Treacy Pipe Band of Moycarkey from Coffey's Forge to the site of the ambush. A decade of the rosary was recited, the Proclamation of 1916 was read by Elaine Cleary,

a relative of Sean Treacy. In his address, John Hassett said that strangely enough Soloheadbeg had been overlooked for many years in being remembered because of its location. He felt people had a responsibility to preserve places like this. He told the crowd that no one in their right senses could promote violence. There was no doubt that the root cause of violence in this country was the partition of the island. He believed the Irish people chose the gun only as a last resort when the result of the ballot box was ignored.

The British Government no longer has the power to solve the Irish problem he said. There had been a ceasefire for 17-18 months but regrettably little progress had been made. Everyone in the island knew, continued Mr. Hassett that if the British gave a declaration of intent to withdraw, politically and militarily from Ireland, that soon the extremists as well as the realists from both sides would sit down and talk. We want you to stop interfering. Please withdraw. He suggested that consideration should be given to the creating of a federal Ireland. He claimed that the Unionists population would have a more important role and greater powers than they enjoyed within the U.K. in many respects. The major priority of this nation at the moment was peace and that wouldn't be achieved until there was a justice for all people Unionist and Nationalist, he added...........



Helvick Head Lifeboat 1997

The welcome return of the lifeboat to the Helvick Head Station will occur on Wednesday next, February 5. On that day the R.N.L.I. will deliver an inshore lifeboat Atlantic 21-B Class to Helvick for on-site training. A sixweek period of training exercises will ensue to enable the crew to be totally proficient in their handling of any emergency situation.

After this training period the station will be on service and fully operational in mid March.

This will be the culmination of many years of planning especially by our Station Honorary Secretary, Mr. Ian Walsh, who has worked tirelessly with the R.N.L.I. in bringing the lifeboat back to the area..

BR. GREGORY O'FLYNN

MOUNT MELLERAY DECEMBER 19 1995

Paddy Flynn was born in Ballyporeen Co. Tipperary on December 4th 1926. His parents moved to Lismore where he was educated and reared. After school he worked in the local Creamery Co-Operative where he was noted for his devotion to the sweeping brush and general cleanliness of the surroundings. He devoted much of his free time to the Legion of Mary and as an officer of the organisation, made the visitation of the branch then active in the now defunct Mount Melleray Seminary.

Paddy Flynn entered Mount Melleray on August 15th 1957 and was clothed in February 1958. First profession followed on February 17th 1960. His life was noted for his great devotion to manual work, to the neglect of his own bodily needs. He spent two years helping on the farm at Glencairn and then returned to Mount Melleray where he was given responsibility for the herd and the farmyard. He never fully accepted EU regulations though he did carry them out. He was unable to comprehend why European bureaucrats should have so much power over the daily activities of farmers.

Br. Gregory was a great man of prayer. He was one of the staunchest supporters of the evening rosary. Br. Gregory was of very slight but wiry build and enjoyed good health until the onset of sciatica about halfway through his monastic life. He carried on his demanding regime in spite of this until the afternoon of February 15th 1995 when he complained of severe pains in his stomach. A perforated ulcer was diagnosed but Xray tests in hospital did not manifest anything. An operation was performed, successfully, but he died four or five hours later in the intensive care unit of the Bons Secours Hospital in Cork.

The above is taken from the 'Benedictine Yearbook 1997" and is of the life of Bro. Gregory Flynn formerly of New Street, Lismore who died on December 19th 1995.



How Bricks Can Be A Focal Point Of A Garden

Bricks, with a creative design, can become a major focal point of a garden. There are a wide variety available these days from your local builders merchants.

The difference in colours between bricks was traditionally dependent on the chemical and physical nature of the originating clay, shale or brick earth deposits in each local area. But with today's techniques and fast transport services, you have a wide choice of brick colours in almost any part of the country.

When planning to use bricks — whether it be for walls, patios, paths or building a barbecue, the types of brick and their uses should be understood.

FACING BRICKS

This type of brick should be used for any work that is

being done which creates a feature in its own right, where the look of the brick is integral to the overall design; for example, herringbone pattern paths.

These bricks are most pleasing to the eye, but generally have no special

GARDENING

physical properties other than appearance.

COMMON BRICKS

Common bricks are mostly used for "inside" work and are not consistent in colour. But they are useful for garden walls — if the wall is to be painted or rendered.

ENGINEERING BRICKS

Engineering bricks are particularly beneficial underground in the garden — where saturation might be a problem — as they have a defined high compressive strength and low absorption.

Once construction has started, any brickwork is very difficult to chaffige, so make sure that the right type of brick is chosen at the outset.

And, of course, you must make sure the frost resistant properties of the bricks are correct for the job.

Of interest to the gardener is the calcium silicate brick (sometimes known as flintlime or sandlime bricks). These are the bricks that are usually specified by architects because they are consistent in texture, colour and size, and have very subtle colours.

As a general guide, the stronger the calcium silicate bricks, the higher the frost resistance. This is not the same for clay bricks, where frost resistance is not related to compressive strength.

This may sound complicated, especially when added to the fact that the correct type of mortar must be used. But with the expert help of your local building merchant, a long-lasting and attractive garden feature can be produced.

Above all, remember that brick work must not be neglected as it can deteriorate rapidly if moisture starts to penetrate it. Builders merchants stock the required products needed to keep this deterioration at bay. Good luck.

Dairying COWS CALVING

Management around calving time is of long-term importance. The majority of cows calve safely, without any help and go on to produce lots of milk without any problems. But there are plenty of problems also. However, careful management can reduce these to a low level.

Cows that were not being fed meal before calving should not be fed their full quantity too soon after calving. It is safe to feed 4-5 lbs. on the day of calving and increase by about 1 lb. each day thereafter. This reduces the risk of digestive upsets and lameness. Where cows are being fed by a diet feeder, freshly calved cows should be left with the dry cows for a few days after calving.

MILK FEVER

Milk fever continues to be a serious problem in some herds, but much of this can be prevented. Dry cow minerals of Cal. Mag. during the dry period is sufficient to prevent it on some farms. On other farms this is not successful but 3 to 4 oral doses with limestone (four on the day of calving) is quite successful.

KETOSIS Cows that are expected to milk very well after calving will not do well on the feeding programme outlined above. These cows have a higher risk of Ketosis. The cause of this is the inability of the cow to eat enough during the first weeks after calving to match her requirements to produce the big volume of milk quickly after calving.

High yielders usually produce a high daily yield very quickly after calving. Ketosis is most common 3 to 6 weeks after calving and it can continue for many weeks if it occurs at all. There are many grades of it, some only slight and unseen, others severe with sickness. Consult your veterinary surgeon in relation to prevention and treatment. No matter how slight the degree of it may be, the cow will have suffered a long-term set-back.

High yielding cows should be treated better than others. They should be fed some meal in the weeks before calving, rising to 4 to 6 lbs. on the day of calving and then quickly increased to 14 to 16 lbs. Increase slowly after

that, if still more meal is being fed.

During the days of calving all cows should be well bedded, fed a bit of good quality hay and try to get them to drink as much as possible. It is good to put in-calf heifers through the milking parlour a few times before calving and feed them a bit of meal.

The normal level of udder edema or flagging needs no special attention. Severely flagged udders are a threat to the udder suspension in later life - milk them frequently in the first few days and massage the udder in an upward direction at the back.

The book was written by William Fraher, Bernie Sheridan, Donal Lynch and Willie Whelan. The guest speakers included Mr. Donal Connolly, County Manager; Mr. Donald Brady, County Librarian and Mr. Bill Callaghan of Litho Print. The book was officially launched by Mr. Des Cowman. Willie Fraher gave an interesting synopsis of the book illustrated with slides. The publication contains over 20 chapters on subjects such as the construction of Dungarvan workhouse, Abbeyside Fever Hospital, emigration, diet etc. The book is on sale at the Museum, Tourist Office and local bookshops.

RECENT

ARCHAEOLOGICAL DISCOVERIES

On Thursday last the Society held an illustrated talk by Mr. Dave Pollock, archaeologist on the recent excavations in Dungarvan Castle and surrounding area. The well attended talk was one of the most interesting recently held. Mr. Pollock gave an update on his findings at the castle. He detailed new discoveries such as the drawbridge, the layout of the hall within the Keep and the original curtain wall facing the quay. He then went on to detail the discovery of the town wall on Davitt's Quay and at the Leather Factory site. This is the first time that an archaeologist has had an opportunity to examine the walls in detail and it adds enormously to our knowledge of Dun-

garvan's town defences. NEW DISPLAYS AT MUSEUM

There are some new displays at the Museum. A small exhibition on Michael Collins and the Civil War period, Charles Smith, author of the History of Co. Waterford 1746 and a selection of some recent donations. An interesting addition to the Moresby display is a wooden board incised with the Moresby name which probably came from the ship's lifeboat - it is a remarkable survival.

Mountain Ewes

Mountains ewes are now coming under pressure and need to be monitored fairly regularly. Selection of thin ewes every two to three weeks for housing or feeding greatly reduces losses, but also results in less weak or dead lambs, less cases of ewes with no suck and generally far less ewes requiring individual attention after lambing. The Immediate requirements of thin ewes at this time is for energy and possibly some extra vitamins and minerals. Standard ewe rations at 16 to 18% protein are perfect. After an introductory period, feed up to 1 lb. per head per day. It is worth bearing in mind, as the feed bills mount, that every ewe kept alive will be worth at least £30 in premium and headage. **HOGGETS**

Last year's ewe lambs, kept as replacement stock, are a serious nuisance on many hill farms in February and March. They cannot go to the hill to compete with ewes for scarce feed and they should not be left on green land, which is where they probably have been since early winter. The best options are housing or confinement to fenced area of foothill or rough grazing where they can be fed.

Feeding concentrates to hoggets being kept for breeding has advantages far exceeding the immediate effect on the survivability and condition of the animals. It leaves them trained for life, so that when the need arises to offer concentrate feed during pressure situations in future, the ewe is much more likely to accept the offered sustenance.

In feeding hoggets, a training phase is often necessary. Continement in a yard or shed with access only to shred ded molassed beet pulp and water is the best method. They should be all eating within a few days.

The removal of hoggets from greenland immediately is crucial to early grass production or the lambing and postlambing period. Spreading of nitrogen on these areas as even as is physically possible is an absolute priority. It requires a little bit of an annual miracle to accommodate large flocks of mountain ewes on very small acreages for 2 or 3 months — building up as much grass as possible in advance is only common sense.

As the lambing season gets into full swing, the ICMSA has called for the introduction of a national dog identification scheme which, the association believes, would substantially reduce the incidence of attacks on sheep by stray dogs.

The Association has also demanded a substantial increase in the dog licence fee, a strengthening of the dog warden service and greater vigilance by local authorities in taking prosecutions against irresponsible dog owners.

The Association's National Sheep Committee Chairman, Mr. T. J. Nally, says ICMSA is to present its proposals to the Minister of the Environment at the earliest possible opportunity. "Our proposals, if acted on, would help in a very effective way to reduce the number of irresponsible dog owners, thereby leading to a reduction in the number of sheep flocks ravaged by

ICMSA CRITICISES DEPARTMENT OVER **DELAY IN PAYING HEADAGE AND PREMIA TO FARMERS**

Mr. Maurice Harvey, Chairman of ICMSA's Farm Services Committee, severely criticised the Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry for the delay in the payment of headage and pre-mia to farmers. "In many cases these delays are due to Area Aid problems, many of which are trivial and outside the control of the farmer", he said.

Mr. Harvey said that it was totally unacceptable that farmers, who were expecting headage payments last October, have yet to receive them. "Many farmers are depending on these payments to purchase feed and to pay off creditors. The delay is causing considerable hardship for cattle pro-

He added: "In the 'Charter of Rights for Farmers' the Department gave a commitment to pay headage to all eligible farmers by October 31st. In 1996, less than 45% of farmers had received their heading on October 31st."

Mr. Harvey called on the Department of Agriculture to immediately pay all outstanding payments for 1996 and to ensure that all farmers receive their payments on time this year.

Finished Cattle Supplies Are Tightening

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan has said that finished cattle supplies for the meat plants are tightening with prices of up to 89p-90p available.

Mr. Donovan said that the requirements to fill prefixed export refunds before the end of January and complete the 15,000 head intervention tender over the next one and a half weeks was

Budget Backs Commitment To Agriculture

"The Budget filled out details on a number of commitments to the agricultural sector in the recent Partnership 2000 agreement. We particularly welcome the provision of a 50% capital investment on necessary investment on pollution control facilities up to £20,000 investment." This was stated by Waterford IFA County Chairman, James Coughlan on an initial reaction to the

Mr. Coughlan said: "The budget contains important measures which will contribute to structural reform in agriculture. Firstly, the extension of stamp duty relief of transfers of agricultural land and buildings to young trained farmers for a further 2 years.

Secondly, the continuation of the general 25% stock relief and the special stock relief provisions for young farmers for a further 2 year

period to April 1999. And thirdly, the increase in the rate of agricultural relief on the transfer of agricultural property by gift or inheritance to 90%

"However, we are extremely disappointed that the Minister gave no indication in his budget speech that the Government would provide the 50% compensatory aid for the recent CAP support prices cuts arising from the green pound revaluation. The government policy of having an overvalued £IR against the ECU is clearly a penalty on the agri-food sector."

"IFA will be insisting that the government does not get off the hook on this issue. The Minister for Finance and the Minister for

Agriculture must make the necessary provision to pay this compensatory aid in the revised Book of Estimates following the budget."

Donovan **Demands** Payment Of £80m In Outstanding **Premiums**




HOUSEHOLD TIPS

Beauty basics

Facial Masks

Masks are a very important part of facial treatments. It is believed that in ancient times different types of mud and clay were applied to the skin to leave it softer and to heal blemishes. Nowadays facial masks are made from both natural and synthetic

products. They come in the form of paste, gel and powder. When they are applied to the face they must be left on for a little while to dry or set.

They are applied to the skin after cleansing and when they are removed from the face they take with them any impurities and dead cells which may have been on the skin.

Even though masks are said to be deep cleansing, blackheads and debris must be removed more thoroughly by a beauty therapist. Masks are usually used at the end of a facial treatment to help calm, soothe and hydrate the skin.

When using a mask at home it is important to make sure it is non toxic.

It should be smooth and spread over the face and neck easily. You must be able to remove the mask easily with damp cotton or sponges. When the mask is on, a tightening sensation should be felt. Once removed the skin should feel clean, refreshed, smooth and firm.

A beauty therapist or skin specialist is probably the best person to advise you on what type of mask to use at home. As all masks vary, you must choose one to suit your particular skin





The annual Co. Convention of Bord na nOg was held on Wednesday, January 15 in Lawlor's Hotel. It was well attended with many of the delegates contributing to many lively debates.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The most notable feature of this convention was the excellent balance sheet which was presented by Joe Cleary. Great credit is due to Joe who together with his many helpers returned a profit of over £3,000. A feat which is all the greater when you consider that the Bord was in debt to that amount. Joe worked extremely hard raising money through bucket collections, golden goal, programmes and ads. Anyway Joe could, he raised money all for the advancement of juvenile hurling in our county. It is a great pity that Bord na nOg has to run its finances on such a shoe-string budget when both Eastern and Western Boards returned such profits.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Bord na nOg Secretary Eddie O'Shea gave a very comprehensive report on the happenings for the year. He expressed disappointment with the results of our county under-14 and under-16 hurling and football teams particularly the fiasco which occurred with our under 16 football team where no member from our county winning team was included on the panel of players who went to Limerick for a coaching course. He again appealed to all clubs present to nominate at least one person to do a referee's course which is to take place in early February.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

All the officers were returned unopposed. The only position which fell vacant was that of P.R.O. Pat Moore resigned from this position because he said he was not able to give this position the time it warranted. Pat is again P.R.O. for Feile '97. A position which will take a lot of his time and what time is left is devoted to doing an excellent refereeing job. Following a nomination from the floor, Catherine Tuohy of Clonea and Rathgormack Clubs was elected. The 1997 Co. Bord Na nOg is as follows:

MOTIONS

Nine motions in all appeared on the convention agenda. Four of the motions by Ballyduff Club were referred to County Conven-

tion. A motion by the Brickey Club that the under-14 football championship be played under the under-12 new rules (2 plays) was ruled out of order because it was contrary to general rule. The motion which caused the most heated debate was moved by the Mount Sion Club. This motion was amended and unanimously passed. The motion which was finally passed reads as follows - that managers be appointed by County Bord na nOg which have been nominated by clubs to run the county under-14 and under-16 hurling teams. These managers be given the right to appoint 2 selectors. These managers be appointed not later than the 1st of April each year. The general consensus of the delegates present was that the under-14 and under-16 county teams were not preforming as well as they could. This fact was attributed to the fact that managers were not appointed on time and thus they could not build up the best panel of players. Because the panel were not together on time, they had not enough training done.

Dungarvan had a motion on the agenda which was again directly linked to the u-14 and u-16 teams that the full time coaching staff be invited to forward representatives for inclusion on a selection committee of county under 14 and under 16 hurling teams.

Ballygunner wanted selectors for the teams appointed not later than January 31. A fact which is not possible

this year but will be taken into consideration next year. A motion by Dungarvan that the format of the under 14 hurling championship of 1996 be retained for 1997 was passed. Also by Dungarvan that where activity involves participants of Bord na nOg jurisdiction - the selection of participants for such activity be the responsibility of Bord na nOg. A motion by Portlaw that Eastern Board select referees for county finals in Western venues and Western Board select referees for county finals in Eastern venues was reject-

CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS

Sean Whelan thanked all his fellow officers for their hard work. He was delighted with the turnabout in the Bord's finances. It has been a difficult enough year, the biggest controversy involving the under-16 football team. He assured all clubs present that that must never happen again. He congratulated Stephen Power and his various committees on their excellent work during Feile '96 and urged all clubs to strive for even greater glory if that were possible in 1997. He appealed to clubs not to become complacent. Finally he wished every club the best for 1997.

CONCLUSION

The convention concluded with the presentation of medals to the various winning clubs. All present were very enthused with the convention. All felt that a lot of issues had been resolved.

The question has been asked on many occasions recently, if our administration is running far behind time and if there is a need for change in order that we can keep pace with the vast majority of other counties.

Holding our first Divisional Board meetings in February and our first County Board meeting in the second half of the month means that here in Waterford we are off to a delayed start for the year. There is certainly something odd about the fact that

we will have played two rounds of the National Football League before our first County Board meeting of the year.

It is impossible to have things otherwise while we continue to hold our annual conventions in January rather than in December or even November as so many other counties do. Unfortunately, here we have too many clubs who are old fashioned in their attitude to things and too concerned about this traditional thing which ordains that you must

keep doing what your predecessors did. Now the chances are that we will be forced to change if proposals before Congress are accepted. These proposals will compel counties like Waterford to hold their conventions not later than December and it will compel provincial councils to bring forward their annual conventions. The Ard Stuirathoir too will have to have his annual report out with the counties, several weeks earlier than at pre-

The new general rule in ings shall automatically berelation to the composition of County Boards and which was passed by Congress in London last April is now in force and it will mean (as far as Waterford is concerned) that as and from the first meeting of the new County Board, County Handball, County primary schools and County secondary schools and Vocational schools will have an official representative with full voting rights, on the Board.

Rule 55 which deals with the setting up of the Boards, now reads "A County Committee shall consist of the officers, the Central and Provincial representatives (who shall be ex-officio members), other representatives of District committees or clubs as set out in Countv bve-laws.

They shall also have a representative of the following committees -

County Handball, County primary schools, County sec-ondary and Vocational schools. The County Committee shall hold office until the next annual convention. It shall be subject to the authority of the Provincial and Central Council. A member absent without just cause from three consecutive meetcome disqualified from membership of the Committee for the year. This shall also apply to sub-committees".

This will be seen as a welcome development for all school bodies as they may to their particular needs raised by one of their own members. It is rather strange that an important body like County Bord Na nOg does not have a repre-

G.A.A. NOTES

The recently held County Bord na Nog Convention was one of the best attended meetings of its kind for many years and with nine motions listed there was plenty of interesting debate.

Sean Whelan, County Chairman, presided and having bid the delegates welcome he urged them to continue with their efforts to promote the games at all underage levels and in the

Sean complimented everyone who had been involved in Feile Na Gael and said that the combination of effort by the organisers and the clubs made it the most successful hurling festival since it was first mooted over 25 years ago.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Bord Secretary, Eddie O'Shea, didn't pull any punches in this very comprehensive report to the meeting. He said "We came in for a lot of criticism over the past year. If we in Bord na nOg have to make a tough decision, then we will make that decision without fear or favour and may I add that we take no pleasure in suspending players or clubs, but if we do, then it should be kept within Bord na nOg.

I myself came in for a lot of unfair criticism regarding Peil fe 16. When they went to Limerick for a coaching course, the first I knew about it was when I read about it in the Dungarvan Leader. I found out about the Limerick Tournament in a telephone conversation with the Limerick secretary, regarding the Jim Power Tournament. I would appeal to everyone in future to get their facts right before taking their case to a higher authority. I also wish to point out that Divisional selectors are appointed each year and these are the people who should be in charge when it comes to county level. If adults wish to become involved, let them do so by all means, but in consultation with the Board officers. We are very fortunate that we rarely get a bill for expenses

FINANCE

from our selectors.'

Bord Treasurer, Joe Cleary, gave a detailed account of income and expenditure for the year and showed that from a debit balance of £2,548 at the end of 1995, the Bord ended 1996 with assets of £3,371. The production of match programmes, the holding of a bucket collection and a golden goal, were the main sources of income due to the hard work of a number of people on the Bord, but gate receipts were also increased. A sum of £4,000 was received from the adult County Board and £500 from each of the Adult Divisional

The County Chairman complimented both the secretary and treasurer on their respective submissions and he thanked everyone who had helped in the running of the affairs of the Bord throughout the year.

He spoke about the many things which could be done if finance was available. He said that a huge amount of money would be needed if the Bord were to make the degree of progress that is happening in so many other counties.

MOTIONS

The nine motions were moved and aroused considerable debate. As a result of a Dungarvan motion, the permanent coaching staff will in future be involved in the selection of representative teams. This was seen by many delegates as a major step forward.

The outgoing officers -Sean Whelan, chairman, Eddie O'Shea, secretary and Joe Cleary, treasurer, were all returned unop-

COMMENT

Having been involved for a time with Bord na nOg I have nothing but praise for the wonderful people who are doing an enormous amount of work in promoting our games at underage level in the county and usually on a shoe-string budget. With the kind of balance sheet presented this year and the turn around in finances, things would seem to be looking up and the Bord seem to be in a position to spend money in promoting the games and preparing our inter-county underage teams and the teams for the Tony Forrestal and Sonny Walsh Tournaments.

But at the same time and by comparison with most of the other counties in Munster we are still lagging far, far behind in the matter of promotion and organisa-

Limerick County Bord Na nOg are rated as being the third best off underage committee, behind Cork and Tipperary (in Munster) and at their county convention two weeks ago their treasurer presented a balance sheet having an income of £82,000 and £77,875. Their gate receipts were almost £7,000, they received over £9,000 in sponsorship and made over £5,000 in match programmes.

Among the equipment in a rented office they have a fax machine, photocopier and filing cabinets, etc. Having an amount of success at inter-county level, is a big help as everything rises with a rising tide and maybe our turn will come. But we certainly have an awful lot of ground to make up in trying to compete at underage level, with the likes of these counties.

Pressure On **Main Street** Development To Push Ahead

In view of the recent announcement that the July 31st deadline for the current Urban Renewal Scheme is to be extended by 1 year to July 31st 1998, Waterford County Manager, Donal Connolly has announced his intention to put "every pressure" on Irish Nationwide Building Society, (owners of the semi-derelict properties at Main Street, Dungarvan), and the potential developers of the site.

In order for the project to avail of the extra 12 months and to qualify for the many attractive tax incentives under the scheme, at least 15% of expenditure on it will have to be incurred by the end of next July.

As yet however, the proposed multi-million pound shopping/residential mall envisaged at the former Mulcahy and Ducey premises has remained on the drawing board and construction seems a long way

There is already increasing concern in Dungarvan about what is seen as a very serious delay in getting this vital project off the ground.

These concerns were expressed at last week's local U.D.C. meeting by Cllr. Damien Dillon who said he hoped the 1 year extension to the Renewal Scheme will give a boost to the Main Street project. "It's gone on long enough," he stated.
Meanwhile, Mr. Connolly

has confirmed that he has brought the new 12 month extension to the notice of all developers and property owners in the designated part of the town, and will now be putting pressure on all projects to "get moving". Welcoming the Urban Re-

newal extension as good news for Dungarvan, Cllr. Tony Wright said the Council must ensure that all dereliction in the urban area is cleared up before the scheme finally expires next
