Minister Announces Grant Aid For Cappoquin Company

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy, Austin Deasy welcomes the announcement by Minister Yates of 18 new jobs at Talley Foods Ltd., Cappoquin.
£181,500 from FEOGA and £73,000 in national grant aid. This grant aid will go



DEPUTY AUSTIN DEASY The Minister for Agriculture, Food and Forestry, Ivan Yates has announced that seven food projects have been awarded grant aid totalling £3.2m.

The projects cover the meat sector and include Talley Foods (Waterford) Ltd., T/A Cappoquin Pork & Bacon which is located on the industrial estate in Carrigeen.

Total investment in Talley Foods will amount to over £1/4m, made up of

£181,500 from FEOGA and £73,000 in national grant aid. This grant aid will go towards the expansion and development of pigmeat processing facilities and will result in the creation of 18 new jobs at the Cappoquin company.

Talley Foods were award-

ed grant aid under the FEOGA marketing and processing scheme for agriculture products. This scheme provides support for capital investment and is one of the measures included in the £641m Development Programme for the food industry.

"If we are to properly prepare for the special festivals which will be held through the course of the year, then we in Dungarvan Tourism and the various organising bodies must be well advanced in our preparations by now".

So stated Mrs. Nora Fahey, Treasurer of Dungarvan Tourism and long-term activist in Co. Waterford prospect of a record season is something to look for-

Some Cold Facts About Our Winter

Feeling cold? This current winter has been one of the worst on record.

But many people can remember worse. Like the Great Freeze of 1963, when we had the coldest winter of the century.

In that freeze-up, January and February averaged 24° F. — eight degrees of frost.

Grantown-on-Spey, Morayshire was the coldest spot in Britain, with 38 degrees of frost — colder than Moscow.

Beer froze and shattered

the bottles. Water pipes burst. Buses and lorries halted as their diesel oil froze.

In Paisley, Strathclyde, 20 men went on strike at a grocery store, agreeing to resume work only when the management offered them warm insoles for their shoes and hot soup.

On London, buses and railway engines were taken out of service as their diesel fuel turned to jelly (something that doesn't happen until there are 22 degrees of frost).

An unofficial record of 58 degrees of frost was recorded in the Cairgorms by two Glasgow geologists. The find was written in their diary. They died from the cold.

But hardy Siberians would shrug off such weather. They sometimes leave off their overcoats when the thermometer rises to a mere 40 degrees of frost.

In 1960, Russian scientists recorded the lowest air temperature on Earth in the Antarctic — minus 127° F.

Why is it important for a baby to burp?

Babies are hungry when they wake up for a feed and because of this they drink eagerly. As the baby feeds it gulps its food and takes in air. When the baby is put lying down, it will feel restless and uncomfortable if it has swallowed some wind. The reason for this is because the air has moved down in to the baby's tummy. This sometimes causes pain in the baby's

The Sour Smell Of Success


German pig-farmer Bruno Wagner struck it rich when he decided to search for a natural water supply for 600 animals on his land.

Udarás Reports Satisfactory Year For Waterford currently developing its production facilities for sports-Gaeltacht

results for 1996 published recently by Udarás Na Gaeltachta, the situation in the Gaeltacht overall showed an improvement on previous years. The jobs improvement in the Munster Gaeltachtaí mirrored the situation in the Gaeltacht generally where an overall nett gain of 604 full-time jobs was the highest recorded since the establishment of Udarás na Gaeltachta in 1980.

The employment level in the Waterford Gaeltacht of An Rinn and Seanaphobal remained steady last year.

According to the year end A total of 89 people are now in full-time employment in Udarás na Gaeltachta assisted industry in the county representing a slight in-crease on 1995's figure. The number of seasonal and part-time jobs in the Ring Gaeltacht increased by 23 to a total of 80.

THREATENED NURSE'S STRIKE

The South Eastern Health Board wishes to advise that Trade Unions representing nurses have indicated that they intend to engage in strike action with effect from 8 a.m. on Monday next 10th February 1997.

In the absence at this time of any indication from the Trade Unions involved of a willingness to withdraw the threatened strike action the South Eastern Health Board has commenced implementation of contingency plans.

The impact of the Unions actions will involve severe disruption, curtailment and deferral of certain services including non-emergency hospital admissions, day care services for the elderly, out-patient appointments, nursing services to persons with a mental handicap, community nursing services for patients with a mental illness.

In co-operation with the nursing staff a full Accident/Emergency, emergency community, emergency in-patient and essential services will be provided. A 999 service will be provided. However, in-patient enquiry services will be severely restricted and the general public are being asked to co-operate in restricting calls to essential calls.

Routine out-patient services and planned in-patient services are being cancelled. Patients who have received a letter cancelling their appointment and who are concerned or whose medical condition deteriorates are advised to contact their General Practitioner.

The South Eastern Health Board regrets the inconvenience and distress caused to patients and the general public and wishes to assure all that emergency and essential services will continue to be provided.

"To ask the Minister for Education the money, if any, being provided in the current year for the provision of a new Vocational School in Dungarvan, and if so, when work will commence.

Answer - At a meeting between the Department and the Co. Waterford VEC which took place on December 19, 1996, the VEC and its design team were asked to submit a developed sketch scheme in respect of the new school in Dungar-

When this has been received, the format of the project can be finalised and the VEC will be authorised

The following questions to proceed with the remaining stages of architectural design. Building work cannot begin until architectural planning has been satisfactorily completed.

ABBEYSIDE NATIONAL SCHOOL

"To ask the Minister for Education if monies are being provided in the current year for the provision of an extension of Scoil Mhuire national school, Abbeyside, and if so, when work will commence.'

Answer — Scoil Mhuire in Abbeyside, Dungarvan is one of a number of urgent projects I am considering for funding in the 1997 building programme. I will take a decision in the matter very shortly in the context of Budget '97 and it will be communicated to the school management.

ST. DECLAN'S COLLEGE

"To ask the Minister for Education the monies, if any, being provided in the current year for the provision of a permanent extension to St. Declan's Community College, Kilmacthomas, and if so, when work will commence.'

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said that he had the pleasure of knowing Derry Durand as a friend and neighbour for almost a quarter of a century and that they formed a friendship very early in life.

"Unfortunately", said Cllr. O'Riordan, "we very often form wrong opinions and adopt wrong attitudes to circumstances and conditions we do not understand. We are the ones who place limits on people, not themselves and it is clear that Derry was going to tolerate only those limits which he could not change.

County Manager, Donal Connolly joined in the good wishes and said that there is a greater recognition today of the need to provide full facilities that will enable people with disability to live as full a life as everyone else. "I can assure everyone here," he said, "that both Waterford County Council and Dungarvan Urban District Council will work towards having places accessible to everyone with disability.'


On behalf of the Irish Wheelchair Association, Chief Executive, Seamus Thompson extended congratulations to Derry "on his magnificent achievements."



Good Time To Get Soil In Good

February is a good time for artificially manuring selected plants and also the soil in your vegetable garden (in readiness for the seed-sowing rush next month).

If you've got any roses that are growing in heavy soil, fork in some bonemeal, 4 to 6 inches deep, according to the depth at which the roots run. I suggest you do this at the rate of 3 oz. to the square yard.

For wallflowers, forget-me-nots, polyanthus, sweet williams and Canterbury bells, fork in superphosphate among the plants, about 2 oz. to the square yard.

In any dahlia beds, where this year's dahlias are later to be planted, spread bonemeal, 4 oz. to the square yard, and fork in sulphate of potash at the rate of 1 1/2 oz. to the square yard. It wouldn't be a bad idea to lime

the rock-garden. Many rockgarden subjects require lime about every three years. It's an essential food to most rock and alpine plants and about this time of the year the lime will reach the roots just when they can make good use of it.



You can use ordinary slaked lime, but if you can get it crushed, mortar rubble or fine-ground limestone may also be used. Fork over the soil, dust the lime on it and stir into the surface.

The majority of plants that have whitish or grey foliage, whose leaves are woolly, or are edged or marked with white "beads" or spots, will benefit particularly from an application of lime. But remember, rhododendrons and azaleas are among the few subjects which must have *none.*

Finally, the vegetable garden. If you manured the ground well in the autumn, then just give the soil a dressing of lime now.

But don't use lime if you are just starting to dig in farmyard manure into the ground. If you can't get hold of any manure, then dead leaves or the rotted remains of a rubbish heap is fine.

If your supply of real manure is limited, then save it for the crops that are most likely to need it - peas, beans, celery and potatoes are better off without manure.

Before you do sow anything, it's always best to try to get a fine tilth, especially if you've got heavy, sticky soil.

You'll be surprised what you can do if you really put your mind to it. Dig in old leaves and ashes (even coal ash or heavy clay, so long as it's the fine dusty kind which you get from under the grate).

Or, if you can get it, fine brick dust for heavy clay.

The enjoyment and the benefit that the player of any game gets out of it is in direct relation to the amount of effort and skill that he puts into it, and this is even truer of scouting than it is of other games. Dungarvan Sailing Club was founded by an entrepreneurial band of local youths who saw no good reason why the waters of Dungarvan Bay should be the sole preserve of fisherman and swimmers. Their aim was to found a club which would promote the interests of sailing in the area. Ger Walsh, Joe Donovan and Maurice Kiely started the ball rolling with the following notice: "An effort is being made to form a sailing club for Dungarvan harbour and for this purpose a meeting of prospective members will be held in the town hall on Friday, 2nd August, 1946, at 8 p.m.

This notice was sent to over thirty people in July 1946, signed by the afore-mentioned "provisional committee." On Friday night eighteen people attended the meeting and so the "Dungarvan Harbour Boat Club" was born, its first officers being Mr. B. Mulcahy the first woman to circum-

Dungarvan Harbour Sail- (Commodore), Mr. A. R. navigate Ireland singlehand-Farrell (Vice-Commodore), their fiftieth anniversary Mr. M. Kiely (Hon. Secre-Treasurer), and a committee

The first club event was arranged for Sunday, August 15th; a six and a half mile race which was handicapped to allow for the variation in boats of the fleet. A grand total of four boats took part in that inaugural race -Maighread (B. Mulcahy), Maisie (M. & P. Kiely), Naomh Breandán (G. Walsh) and Jane Shore (J. V. Stuart) which started and finished on what is to this day called the Old Club Line between the old swimming pool and Abbeyside Church. The winner brought home the Mulcahy Cup, still raced for, fifty



Waterford is set to feature prominently on RTE television programmes in 1997. This welcome news was replayed at the weekend by Brian O'Shea T.D., Minister of State.

Mr. O'Shea said that the 1997 Eurosong final, which precedes the Eurovision Song Contest, will, for the first time, be staged in Waterford. This event has only been held outside Dublin twice in the last ten years. RTE are anxious to make full use of the new facilities available in the recently upgraded Waterford Institute of Technology.

The Minister also stated that 1997 will see the transmission of a major new film drama series — provisionally entitled "Making the Cut" - much of which is shot in

Waterford City.

Minister O'Shea added that the Waterford area will contime to feature regularly in Irish language, young peoples and sports programming.

Vice-Chairman of Masstock, Mr. Paddy McGuckian made a recent visit to the Dungarvan operation where he also viewed an F.H.S. upgrade to local farmer Billy O'Grady's premises at Ballygagin. As part of the EU regulations, dairy and milking parlours and food handling facilities must be clean, dust-free, verminproof, adequately ventilated and washable etc.

All F.H.S. upgrades are installed by a two man crew who are on strict quality and output targets each week. The majority of parlour upgrades require only two days working on site while the maximum amount of time for any full

COWS CALVING

Cows calving, getting up at night, calves to be fed and the days getting longer — it's spring time on a dairy farm. This is a good time. Good to be milking freshly calved cows instead of those giving a gallon or two.

Sometimes calves are left to suck cows for 2-3 days. This is okay, but the cows should be milked out properly each day. Meal-feeding should be increased gradually over 7-10 days. Cows do not eat very much silage around calving time and for a while afterwards, but this is normal.

There is always an odd cow that will not clean properly. This is normal — while it should be treated properly, it is of no great concern. If there are too many cows holding the cleanings, mineral deficiency is the likely cause.

It is normal for cows to have a discharge for some time after calving. If this continues for more than a fortnight or so, those with a white discharge that does not have a bad smell can be ignored. Those that have a smelly discharge should be treated by the vet, it might help the fertility later on.

SILAGE INTAKE

It is good to have cows eating as much silage as possible after calving. Some people might prefer to have them eating less silage so as to have enough for a hungry April, but this would be false economy.

Calved cows should be eating close to 100 lb. of silage every day.

The quality of the silage is, of course, the main thing that affects how much the cows will eat. If it is well preserved, they will like the taste and eat it well. If it appears to be well preserved and leafy, but they are not eating it well, it may be too acidic. Bread soda shaken on top of the silage will help if it is acidic, so will beet pulp nuts in the feed. Both of these will help them to eat more.

If it is leafy and soft, they can digest it quickly, and get it through their system quickly, and therefore eat more. If it is coarse and stemmy, it takes them longer to digest it, so they eat less.


A typical intake on stemmy or poorly preserved silage is 60-70 lb. — a big difference to the 100 lb. of good quality silage. The higher intake will give good milk yield, good protein % for the time of year, and set them up to milk well in the late spring and summer.

FIELD ACTIVITY

Crops have come through the winter very well and the avourable autumn has facilitated the release of soil nitrogen. There is no rush with the first N split until early March with the possible exception of frost damaged oat crops. Crops which received an aphicide should be adequately protected against BYDV.

ICMSA Are **Confident That Egyptian Trade** Will Re-Open

"The Egyptian trade for live cattle exports will reopen — it's just a matter of when." This was stated by ICMSA President, Mr. Frank Allen, following his meeting with the Egyptian Ambassador, Excellency, Hassan Salem, and his Second Secretary, Hossam Moharam.

NHURLERS

We have all heard the expression "he's a born hurler" and I'm not sure what precisely is meant by it. Taken literally the statement isn't true because at birth no person is predestined to be a hurler or footballer, a soccer or rugby player, a cricket or tennis player. Few would deny that parental influence is a major factor as a child's home environment has a positive or negative effect during those early formative years of a child's life. For some games, it is not too important that the player should start young but for camogie or hurling, the old Irish saying, "tosach maith leath na hoibre" is very apt indeed. With those games, a high degree of co-ordination is required so the younger the start the better so long as the caman is the correct size, small and short enough to allow little hands to control its use and facilitate the acquisition of a wristy stroke. Giving a young player a hurley at a tender age 4 or 5 promotes the development of his wrists and prepares him or her too for playing badminton and tennis later on. Every good hurler or camogie player can strike quickly, a trait which derives from that flexibility of wrist which cannot be cultivated if the player is introduced to the game too late. And too late means 10 or 11 or 12 years of age by which time suppleness of wrist is too difficult to achieve.

Many years previous to the Ger Power era, there was a very good young Tipperary hurler who became a shining star of Tipperary Minor hurling teams and Thurles C.B.S. teams of the forties. Many people found it extremely hard to either spell or pronounce his name because it wasn't Irish.

His name was Vilhelm Steiglitz. You see the Steiglitz family came to Thurles from Czechoslovakia and Steiglitz Snr. took up a position as a sugar cook in Thurles Beet Factory. Vilhelm grew up in what was then a hotbed of hurling and became an accomplished exponent of the game. You can best imagine yourself what the standard of Senior hurling in Czechoslovakia was like yet despite his origins, Vilhelm did his family proud on the hurling field. His usual position was right half forward and I have very clear remembrance of his low centre of gravity, his speed, strength, ball control and accuracy. With a name like his, Vilhelm fascinated us and then tormented us as we tried to come to terms with the bizarre notion of the "born hurler" from mid-



It has now settled down, thanks to the painkillers and antibiotics. Is this likely to happen to me again, and if so, is there anything I can do to stop it?

A. It is likely to happen again, although not certain. The problem is gallstones developing in the gall bladder. The function of the gall bladder is to store bile, which helps to dissolve the fat in-your food. The bile can have a tendency to slowly crystallise into stones that sometimes block the outlet duct. If this

happens, the bile stagnates and becomes septic causing inflammation, fever and severe abdominal téndemess. The antibiotics you were prescribed have settled your inflammation but has not dealt with your gallstones. Eliminating fatty foods from your diet may help, but removal of the stones is the only way to be sure, that it will not recur. In some cases they can be dissolved or pulverised but unfortunately with this treatment they often recur. The usual treatment is the removal of the gall bladder. Your own doctor will advise on the best course of action in your case, be guided by him/her.

Make-Up Tips For Mature Skin

Eyes And Lips

AS you get older heavy eyeshadow and bright colours are ageing, drawing too much attention to the eye area and any fine lines and wrinkles.

Before applying eye make-up check your If your eyebrows eyebrows. have faded, pencil them back in. Apply an eyebrow pencil in short strokes and soften the look with a cotton bud, so it doesn't appear too harsh. Alternatively go to a beauty salon and have a brow tint, this will give the brows a very natural look. Eyebrow tinting is inexpensive and the tint usually lasts for a

month to six weeks. When choosing eyebrows, go for natural colours such as browns and beiges. Be sure to blend the shadow well, don't leave any harsh lines. Instead of eyeliner, smudge some eyeshadow under the lower lashes with a cotton bud. Black mascara can look very harsh, so why not try a lighter shade such as brown, to give a more subtle, but

flattering appearance. Your lips should be defined with a lipliner. Outline your top lip first then the bottom making sure

not to drag the skin around the lips. Lipliner will help to emphasize the shape of your

lip as well as preventing your lipstick from bleeding. Strong lip colour is not advisable, subtle lipstick is much more flattering. A moisturising lipstick is a good choice, it helps to smooth dry lips as well as giving them a nice shine.

Always apply lipstick with a lip brush. For a long lasting effect, after applying your first coat of lipstick, blot with a tissue then re-apply.

No matter what age you

are, make-up which is chosen and applied correctly can take years off you. Why not give it a try?



HOUSEHOLD TIP

1. If you have too much liquid left after stewing apples, just sprinkle a dessert spoon of semolina over them while still on the heat. Allow to cool. The semolina takes on the apples' flavour, gives a good texture and makes a little go a long way.

2. When painting woodwork, mask the edges of the carpet or flooring with strips of sticky tape, then remove it straightaway, before the paint dries.

Vegetable Couscous

Preparation: 20 minutes Cooking: 20 minutes Serves: 4 350g/12oz couscous 3 tbsp oil

- 1 tsp sesame oil garlic clove, peeled and crushed 225g/8oz cherry tomatoes
- 1 red pepper, seeded and diced 175g/6oz baby sweetcom 225g/8oz button mushrooms, halved 6 spring onions, trimmed and sliced into
- 5cm/2in lengths thsp soy sauce tbsp sherry vinegar
- 1-2 thsp fresh chopped flat-leaf parsley crusty bread to serve (optional)

METHOD: Place the couscous in a bowl and pour cold water over, drain immediately through a fine-holed sleve and return to the bowl. Separate lightly with a fork and leave to stand for 20 minutes. Bring a large pan of water to the boil and line a metal colander with a double thickness of kitchen paper. Place the couscous in the lined colander and set over the pan of water. Cover and simmer for 20 minutes. Meanwhile, heat 2 thsp of the oil with all of the sesame oil in a large frying pan or wok until sizzling. Add the garlic, tomatoes, pepper, sweetcorn, mushrooms and onions and stir-fry quickly over a high heat for 3-4minutes. Stir in the soy sauce, vinegar and parsley and season to taste. Stir the steamed couscous and transfer to a warmed serving dish. Stir in the remaining oil and season well with salt and freshly ground black pepper. Pile the vegetable on top of the couscous and serve immediately with crusty bread, if liked.

Baked Apricot Sponge

Preparation: 10 mins Cooking: 35 mins Serves: 4

- Sponge: 6 oz (175g) butter 6 oz (175g) caster sugar
- 2 eggs, size 3 6 oz (175g) self-raising flour 1/2 tsp (2.5ml) ground ginger

"Wonka's" Brace Seals Victory FERRYBANK 1 DUNGARVAN 2



For the third time in its thirty years history Community Games returned to Wexford for its A.G.M. Delegates from the thirty-two counties assembled in the Talbot Hotel to review the years work, elect officers and adopt or amend motions to provide for a smoother running of the association.

The occasion provided a first ever for the movement. On Friday evening Mayor Dominic Kiernan provided a civic reception from the National Officers and Wexford officials in the municipal headquarters, present were members of the U.D.C. and these included some former Mayors who were great friends of the association down the years. Mayor Kiernan presented National President, George O'Toole, National Chairman Michael O'Grady and National Treasurer and County Chairperson, Margaret McDermott with mementos of the occasion while George reciprocated with a gift to the Mayor on behalf of the association.

On Saturday morning guests from the political, financial, commercial and sporting bodies of the country were present to congratulate the movement on its success to date, to land the voluntary efforts of the thousands of the committee workers, to promise support and encouragement to all in their efforts to make life more beneficial and meaningful for the multitudes of young people involved. Leading the speakers was Mr. Brendan Howlin, Minister for the Environment who expressed his admiration for the organisation which introduces young people to the activity of their choice, encourages the pursuit of healthy interests and enables them to discover their talents. They have given many painstaking hours to the task of coming up with the overall winner, and their task has not been an easy one given the array of talent from whom they have had to choose. The scheme truly is a fitting way to honour the memory of the late Garda Noctor - himself an outstandingly versatile sportsman in his day. Sadly he became a victim of the fatal Motor Neurone Disease, and despite fighting it with all the courage and bravery that were among the most notable of his many attributes, Pat finally suc-





Waterford's 1997 Hurling Prospects

If anyone had predicted 20 years ago that Offaly, Clare and Wexford would win successive All-Irelands in the mid-1990s, who would have taken them seri-

Now that the traditional script of hurling success is in the process of being rewritten, many in Waterford are thinking that our turn must come soon. However noone is going to give us an All-Ireland just because it is our turn. Offaly based their success on three All-Ireland Minor hurling winning teams in the late 1980s. Wexford and Clare were able to add inspired leadership and almost financial commitment to a sprinkling of good hurlers. As the advertisement says: "No-one said it was going to be easy".

Nevertheless Waterford's prospects right now are considerably better than this time last year. At that stage, the County team was already destined for relegation to Division Two of the National Hurling League. A fighting, if poorly-focused championship display against Tipperary helped reclaim some pride but once again left us as also-rans. The appointment of Gerald McCarthy and his management team rekindled interest and a reasonable and generally consistent level of performance was achieved in the Oireachtas and Waterford Crystal tournaments. Ballygunner's defeats of the Cork and Tipperary representatives in the club championship provided an additional boost.

Nevertheless there were still some reasons for disgulet. Ballygunner displayed a traditional Waterford failing in losing focus and concentration for the Munster Final and lost a title they should have been capable of winning. Had it not been for Paul Flynn's virtually one-man show, they would have been beaten out of sight. This, for me, was the greatest disappointment of the year.

Meanwhile in the one game in the Waterford Crystal tournament when Waterford had to deliver - against Tipperary - they gave their worst performance since Gerald McCarthy took over. The superior commitment of a very seasoned Tipperary outfit took many by surprise. I had expected that competition for places would, itself, generate a high level of commitment among the Waterford players: at the moment, I reckon that only five of them are certain of a first team place. The ominous suggestion has been made to me that the Tipperary lads are more prepared to fight for places because they believe that they can win an All-Ireland, whereas our players do not have the same belief. If this is true, then the Waterford management have a major task in raising their players' ambition levels.

I, myself, am of the belief that we now have a panel of players capable of winning an All-Ireland in the near future. The main task is to get the best out of this panel of players. Anyone not prepared to put in the kind of effort portrayed by Clare and Wexford should be ruthlessly discarded. The tournaments played before Christmas provided many good performances and some not so good but have given little indication as to what a settled team might look like.

I am concerned that we do not have good cover for Ray Barry in goal; it is a pity that Brendan Landers did not get a run in those pre-Christmas games. The smashing performances of the O'Sullivan twins were a highlight of those games but I still worry that they lack the physical strength required of championship hurling. Sean Cullinane's experience and strength re-

main, to my mind, a vital ingredient in the fullback line. Ger Harris was showing up well before being sidelined again by injury but James O'Connor certainly seized his opportunity to stake a claim for a place on the edge of the square. One wonders if Harris might be better deployed in the forward line; one wonders also if Damien Byrne can achieve a fitness level to match his great leadership abilities.

In Browne, Hartley and Frampton we have one of the best and most settled half-back lines in the country and one I would be loathe to change, despite Tom Feeney's good displays and the view expressed in some quarters that Browne might be moved to bolster up our creaking midfield. As regards the latter, we badly need a mix of styles with a mobile worker alongside someone able to take high balls. I would have looked to John Joe Ronayne or Michael Molumphy as having the potential to fill the midfield workhouse role but apparently neither of these is currently in the picture. However Paul Power now offers us a genuine alternative option. He was easily the most improved player in Waterford in 1996, although he failed badly when most needed in the Munster Club Final.

Johnny Brenner hinted at a return to his best form in the Waterford Crystal game against Kilkenny but since then has done nothing to justify a place on the team. If he could recapture his form of old, he would be unmatchable as a midfield player; but he can no longer trade on his past reputation alone. The other obvious midfield options are Tom Fives, who has been struggling to find consistency and Peter Queally whose commitment is second to none but whose use of the ball, in my view, is not up to top-class intercounty standard.

In the forward line, the return by Paul Flynn to something like his best form was one of the most encouraging features of 1996. Ken McGrath also is something of a scoring machine. Michael White and Dan Shanahan offer lots of additional scoring potential, if they can be developed properly. Indeed Waterford potentially have the greatest firing power of any Irish county. Unfortunately Billy O'Sullivan, for all his workrate and ability to gain possession, no longer offers much in the way of a scoring threat and this is something the team management are going to have to work on. Sean Daly remains our best option for full forward but his innate abilities have not been matched by consistent performance: here lies another key challenge for the management team.

Elsewhere Liam O'Connor's spectacular comeback against Clare flattered only to deceive. If he wants to be a genuine championship contender, he will have to lose an awful lot of weight (just as Anthony Daly of Clare did). Derek McGrath and Barry Walsh have been finding it difficult to make the transition from promising underage hurlers and will remain fringe players for the moment. Ger Harris may be able to make a go of the troublesome centre-forward position; however, if I had my way I would press Shane Ahearne back into senior inter-county action - he is still five years younger than George O'Connor and extremely fit.

All in all then we have something to look forward to this year. The new National Hurling League setup looks exciting and should give us a good springboard to launch a decent assault on the championship. We have a promising panel of talented players. The big question will be whether we have the management team to realise the commitment and focus which Wexford and Clare have shown are necessary to make the big breakthrough.

Bríd Ní Chriostóir R.I.P.

All her life she had been a G.A.A. activist and when she passed away peacefully on Saturday morning last, she took with her a fund of memories of events, great and small, good and bad, that were all a part of the history of the association in Waterford. Few people were more qualified to speak so authoratively on matters relating to our on-field activities than Brighdin (as she was known to her friends), as at them all she was a spectator and witness. She delighted in talking about the fortunes of Waterford and was always proud whenever we made the headlines on the playing fields.

She seldom, if ever, missed a game when the hurlers were playing and with her interest stretching back to the thirties, she might even have established something of a record in this respect. She talked about the 1938 All-Ireland as her first big disappointment but she felt that we more than made up for this 10 years later when she was present in Croke Park to cheer our seniors and minors to an historic double. She still treasured the programmes of both those years as she did the memorabilia from the fifties when going into mourning for our one point defeat against the 'Cats' in 1957. She was back and replay in 1959 and she was at headquarters in 1963 to see us score 6-8 and still lose the All-Ireland Final to Kilkenny.

She travelled in support of the County U-21 hurlers in 1974 and was a sad witness to our one point defeat, again by the 'Cats' at Sem-All-Ireland. I have happy memories of being in her company for almost every game played by a Waterford team in all grades since glorious 1992.

On the football side, she was not given the same opportunities for celebrating but nevertheless she was very much to the fore with her blue and white flag in 1957 at Walsh Park when the footballers made big headlines by beating Kerry. Waterford qualified for both Munster Finals in that year and Brighdin felt that she struck a blow for Waterford when she wrote to the Director of Broadcasting in Radio Éireann complaining that for the first time in 20 years neither of the Munster Finals were broadcast.

One of her proudest moments as a G.A.A. person was in 1984 when being presented with the Furlong Award for outstanding service to the association in Waterford. She was the first and so far the only lady to have been so honoured. Earlier the same County Board Chairin Croke Park for the draw man, James Tobin had appointed her as a member of the select committee charged with the responsibility of organising the centenary celebrations. Having been known as a G.A.A. personality in practically all parts of the County, it was no surprise that such a huge crowd turned out for her funeral on Sunday evening when her coffin, draped in the Club and County colours, was escorted by a sixty strong guard of honour by the members of the Dungarvan hurling and football clubs. For the final 500 yds. before St. Mary's Parish Church, the remains were borne by relays of clubmembers.

The attendance at the funeral included two former G.A.A. presidents in Pat Fanning and Paddy Buggy, as well as former Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, Dr. Michael Russell, all of whom were personal friends of Brighdin.

The Club did the honours again on Monday when, following Mass, the burial took place at Modeligo Cemetery. A guard of honour by the schoolchildren of Modeligo, where she had taught for 40 years, met the coffin on arrival and following the burial, an oration was delivered by former G.A.A. president, Pat Fanning who told his listeners that Brighdin had been a wonderful lady who was ever proud of her club and county and it was wonderful to find so many of her old friends and acquaintances of Waterford G.A.A. present to bid her farewell.

Bríd Ní Chriostóir was very much a legend in her lifetime and her death certainly spells the end of an era.

To her brother, James and the extended members of her family, we offer our very sincere sympathy.

Death Of Sean O Siochain

The passing of the well-known former Director General of the G.A.A. Sean O Siochain on Saturday last, spelt the end of an era in Association history as for all of 33 years he had served as an official in Croke Park, taking over from Padraigh O Caoimh in 1964, he having served for 20 years as assistant General Secretary. He retired and handed over to Liam O Maolvihill the present incumbent of the office in 1979.

The Cork born teacher who made his name as a player with Cork, Munster and with Dublin was a very charismatic figure and might as easily have made his living from acting and singing.

Apart from being a top administrator, he was a first class entertainer and was always delightful company.

His G.A.A. involvement was but one of the wide variety of interests and during his lifetime Sean hosted two popular Radio programmes 'Around The Fire' and 'Ireland Is Singing'

News of his death spread rapidly and tributes came from many quarters. Liam Mulvihill the present Director General described him as an icon of the G.A.A., an inspirational figure who had made an unquantifiable contribution to the development of the Association.

Massive Sponsorship In Limerick

The big issue between the Limerick County Board and Croke Park concerning the offer of £200,000 sponsorship by the Mid-Western Health Board is the big talking point in G.A.A. circles around the country at the moment.

The Health Board have offered the three-year deal for the display of the slogan "Drug Free - Cúl" on the Limerick jerseys. The Limerick County Board have been told that the guidelines on sponsorship do not state that such slogans can be used. Neither is there any rule which says they cannot be displayed. If it is alright for Guinness to advertise their product at headquarters during provincial and All-Ireland finals, there should be nothing wrong with a County Board taking money for helping an anti-drug campaign.

Limerick, probably because of their recent success, are doing very well out of sponsorship and in their balance sheet for 1996 and which was published last week, they received the sum of £70,000 for the year. 
