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Bishop William Lee Opens Lismore Community Centre

Last Friday was an historic milestone for the residents of Lismore town who witnessed a dream come true with the official opening of the new Lismore

Community Centre.

The £1/4m centre is located on a spacious 3-acre site which was donated free of charge to the local community in 1986 by Lismore Es-

tates, through the Duke of Devonshire.

Performing last Friday's ceremony was the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, Dr. William Lee who lauded the endeavours of Lismore G.A.A. Club - the driving force behind the community centre - and everyone else involved. It is indeed a credit to the hardworking

committee who took on this financial burden that today not one penny is now owing on the costly project. This fact was not lost on Bishop Lee who described the project as a "magnificent achievement".

Know Your Rights

I am a lone parent living in a private rented flat. I am working. I am on the housing list with my Local Authority but have very low points. Can I get assistance with purchasing a house of my own?

You should contact the Housing Department of your Local Authority and arrange to visit the Loans Section. There is a wide range of leaflets published by the Department of the Environment on housing which will be available there. In particular you should enquire into Local Authority loans and the Shared Ownership Mortgage. The Shared Ownership Mortgage is aimed at people on low incomes who could not afford to buy a house with an ordinary mortgage. As you are on the housing list you would be eligible for this. Once you have been approved in principal for shared ownership by the Local Authority you may select a new or existing house which the Local Authority purchases. You then arrange with the Local Authority to purchase a minimum of 40% share in the property (or more if you can afford it) and rent the remaining 60% from the Local Authority. You must be able to meet the repayments on the mortgage over 25 years and pay rent to the Local Authority for the remaining share. Transactions under the Shared Ownership Scheme are exempt from stamp duty. You should discuss with your Local Authority your particular financial situation, the costs to you of the Shared Ownership Scheme and how you might avail of it.

Both Oliver Coffey and Pat Coffey spoke on local is-sues in the Kilmacthomas area and wished both candidates well in the forthcoming election.



Deasy Seeks Extension Of Urban Renewal Scheme For Town Centre

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy has requested the Minister of State at the Dept. of the Environment, Liz McManus, for an extension of the Urban Renewal Scheme in Dungarvan to include the town centre.

In a recent letter to Minister McManus, Deputy Deasy stated that the scheme has been a considerable success todate and that the business community in Grattan Square, Bridge Street, the west side of Mary Street, the business section of O'Connell Street

and the north side of Parnell Street are all very anxious to have the scheme extended to cover these areas.

According to County Manager Donal Connolly however, the Minister will not make any decision on the matter until she has examined a report on the national performance of the present renewal scheme. Mr. Connolly said that if the scheme were to be extended to cover different areas, it would have to be based on action plans, drawn up by property owners or investors etc., dealing with these additional areas.

Colligan Woods For Pedestrians Only

In a recent edition of the 'Dungarvan Leader' we highlighted the reckless antics of a young go-karter in Colligan Woods which drew the attention of many of our readers who have also experienced similar encounters with mountain bikes, loose dogs and horses.

Colligan is a designated walk, enjoyed by a huge number of visitors throughout the year. Its scenic paths are frequently used by walkers, joggers, families, tourists and nature enthusiasts who are attracted by the peace and tranquility of the area.

Serious accidents however have been narrowly avoided in the woods as a results of irresponsible cyclists etc. using the pedestrian paths.

In recent weeks the gates at the back entrance to Colligan have been damaged by horses gaining entry.

Coillte policy clearly states that motor cars and especially motor bikes are not permitted and should be left in the car park. The use of bicycles, especially mountain bikes is not permitted either. While Coillte allows pony

trekking only in its forests under permit, it does not allow pony-trekking in areas frequented by pedestrians.

Following the opening of the community centre, the County and Western U-21 and Western Minor medals were presented as the celebrations continued long into the night.



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

The solar system is a group of planets and moons that orbit around the sun. The planets Mars, are called Mercury, Venus, Earth, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus, Neptune and Pluto and there are two recently discovered planets called Smiley and Karla.

There are also 60 moons which orbit the planets, and thousands of lumps of rock, called asteroids, which orbit the sun.

HOW OLD IS THE EARTH?


The earth and the rest of the solar system are about 4 billion years old.

Junior Encyclopaedia

Why are fertilisers used on farms?

FERTILISERS are used on farms to increase crop yields by ensuring that plants have the correct elements and nutrients to grow. Some of these include iron, magnesium, sulphur, calcium, phosphorus, nitrogen, hydrogen and oxygen. If soils are missing any of the above, the deficiency can be made good by the right fertiliser. Years and years ago before the introduction of fertilisers, people used to use manure from farmyards or in coastal regions

seaweed. The use of lime was added to prevent acidity in the soil. method did maintain the presence of chemical elements, but did little to improve soils already lacking in certain chemicals. You can get your soil analysed by experts and they will tell you if it is deficient in anything. Fertilisers alone do not guarantee a good crop, you still need to apply natural fertilisers manure.

How far can you see?

When you are at the sea, the line that separates the sky and sea is about two and a half miles away and you can see this. Because the earth is curved the horizon can appear farther away with every increase in height above sea level. From a height of 20 feet, you might on a clear day be able to see a distance of six miles. If you were on a 300 ft cliff, you could see for about 23 miles, while on top of a 3,500 ft mountain, you might have a view of about 165 miles. When you look up at the sky at night the moon is about 239,000 miles away and the stars are millions of miles away. .

Possible Phased Introduction Of 48 Hour Week Directive

Adverse reaction to the controversial 48-hour working week directive and warnings that jobs could be under threat in the construction, food and other processing industries has now resulted in proposals by the Department of Enterprise and Employment to phase the introduction of the directive over three years.

Workers will be permitted to work an average 60 hours a week in the first year of its implementation, 55 hours in the second and finally 48 hours a week thereafter.

One of the most significant pieces of employment legislation to be published in modern times, the Working Time Bill will have a serious impact on many local shift workers earnings such as employees of Waterford Foods and Waterford Glass etc. It introduces a maximum average working week of 48 hours, balanced out over four, six, or 12 months. The legislation will increase holidays to 20 days a year

by 1999 and lays down modate the demands of eleven hours rest per 24, a guaranteed 35 hours per week. Only workers paid an hourly rate will be covered

by the directive.
PROBLEM FOR NEXT GOVERNMENT

It is expected that the phased introduction of the directive will be enacted in Dáil Éireann in April or May although sources indicate that it will be impossible for this directive to be passed into law before the life of the present Dáil ends.

This means that following the general election, the incoming government will then have to deal with this highly contentious Bill.

Stemming from an EU Directive, the Bill will put Irish employment firmly in the context of European Law and philosophy on employment protection and will result in fundamental changes in basic working conditions.

Due to this EU commitment, it will prove difficult for any authority to accommany employer groups, in particular the farming particular the groups, within the framework of this directive

Nationally the ICTU supports the 48-hour working directive unequivocally while it is common knowledge that many individual unions are under severe pressure from their members. Process industries involving shift operaffected by the capping of working and earning patterns, particularly where critical costly production runs have to be maintained.

To allow the phasing of this directive, an agreed and signed procedure must be put in place which can only come about with the agreement of the workers and their trade union.



This Week In he Garden

Clip Back Ivy

lvy growing on walls should be cut back using shears. Clip off the leaves leaving the stems bare and brush them down with a stiff broom to get out the dead leaves and dirt.

The plant will look bare to start with but new leaves will quickly grow.

Sow Lettuces

Unless the weather is exceptionally bad or your garden is very cold, it will now be safe to sow your first lettuces out-

Sow the seeds very thinly in drills 10cm. deep and 30cm. apart.

Sow Cucumbers

Good cucumbers can be grown in warmed frames as well as in heated greenhouses and if you sow them now they will start to fruit in June.

To prepare the site spread a 15cm, layer of soil mixed with a third of its bulk of well rotted manure, and make a low mound of this compost on which to plant the cucumber

Put two cucumber seeds in the top of each mound — and if both of them germinate successfully, pull out the weaker

Sow Broad Beans

These can now be sown outdoors in an open and well-cultivated site. Sow the seeds 15cm. apart in drills 2.5cm. deep and 60cm. apart. The dwarf varieties can be grown closer.

Graft Apples and Pears

Apple and pear stocks that are well established and older trees that have been cut back are now ready for grafting.

Start Vines

It should now be warm enough to encourage vines to start their growth. Close the ventilation completely and spray them every morning with slightly warm water.

Plant Carnations

If you don't do it in the autumn, now is the time. Conditions are getting steadily more favourable and planting now should ensure successful growth in the weeks ahead.

A King For The Cabbage Patch

CABBAGE is an essential part of a winter's dlet — and to ensure your supply at the end of the year, you should be planting now.

Varieties like the January King 3 take 32 weeks to reach maturity, so it's no good leaving it until the weather gets better.

You should plant at fourweek intervals during the next two to three months to be sure cabbages are available throughout the winter.

Start with an outdoor seedbed and wait until the eedlings are 10-15cm. tall before transplanting to the cabbage patch.

Cabbages can be grown by a deep bed method, digging manure into the soil and raising its level by 15cm. to give extra nutrition.

The seedings should be set 30cm. apart and monitored for signs of root fly, which can prove extremely



destructive.

It attacks the roots of all brassicas — the family that includes brussels sprouts, cauliflowers and broccoli and recently transplanted seedlings are especially vulnerable

The main symptoms are blue tinged leaves which wilt. If you think you've got it, dig up one of the seedlings. If the roots are black and maggot infested, you should burn your plants to avoid future

Deasy Calls To Have August Included In Salmon Season

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy re-cently questioned the Minister of State at the Department of the Marine in the Dáil regarding the new regulations governing Salmon Net Fishing.
Deputy Deasy stated

"There is not general acceptance of the report which the Minister has recommended to the House. However it is appreciated he has taken measures which go some way towards meeting

fishermen's grievances. Can the Minister include the month of August in his provision to drift net fishermen, particularly on the South Coast? They depend on that month to make a living. It is useless to them if the weather is bad in June. The catching season has been reduced to alarmingly small proportions. It is not reasonable to expect people to make a living in the open sea in the type of weather conditions we have in June. Will the Minister include the month of August and arrange to draw up the management plan as quickly as possible so that people in different areas using different types of nets such as snap-nets, drift-nets and draft-nets can all be catered for ? One generalised system will not suffice.

Minister of State at the Dept. of the Marine, Eamonn Gilmore replied that he does not propose to extend the drift-net season into August. "The task force recommended that in the context of the introduction of a quota system, the season could be extended into August. The arrangements for the introduction of a quota system are already being prepared by the marine institute and the Department. However in advance of the introduction of a quota system, it would not be possible to extend the season into August. This is for good conservation reasons. The primary purpose of these regulations is to ensure that salmon stocks are conserved, they are allowed to escape to the rivers and that there is sufficiency of salmon available for the fishery, whether at sea, in estuaries or rivers.'

CATTLE: Suckler Cows

We are at the beginning of the calving season in most suckler herds and this is a crucial time when profitability can be determined for the rest of the year. Success means the turnout of a full crop of healthy calves. It is estimated that about half of all calf losses occur at birth and that nine out of ten calves that die at calving were alive at the start of calving.

Supervision

Around calving time, cows need regular supervision. In suckling, where the bigger continental breeds of bull are used, supervision is even more important than when the more traditional bull breeds were used in the past. Where AI is used, the expected calving date can be accurately determined but where a bull is run with cows, the expected starting date for calving may be all that is known.

The normal gestation length with non-Continental bulls is 280 days (i.e. nine months and nine days). Cows bred to Continental bulls carry for 5-6 days longer on average but it is not unusual for cows with Continental calves to carry for over 290 days. Cows at full term should be seen at least three times a day.

To help estimate calving date, watch for udder development (the teats stiffen in the 24 hours before calving), enlargement of the vulva and dropping of the pin bones. Cows on slats should be moved to calving boxes at this stage.

It is best to have the cow in the calving box about 36 hours before calving so that she has settled in the new environment. Once the cow shows first signs of calving, like restlessness, check every 2-3 hours but do not intrude too much at this stage.

John Mee at Moorepark says that cows may be left for 3-6 hours and heifers for longer once the first signs of calving appear (tail raised, intermittent lying and standing) before any intervention is required. If no progress is being made after that time, the experienced farmer could handle the cow to detect simple abnormalities such as a leg down.

Where things are normal, experience at Moorepark suggests that cows may be left for up to 2 hours and heifers up to 3 hours after the hooves appear before giving assistance. However many calvings will only be detected after the hooves have appeared so judgements will have to be made on the stage of calving, based on the temperature and dryness of the hooves etc.

Biestings

The first feed is the most important that the calf will take in its life. The first biestings is very rich in antibodies that protect the calf against disease and also contains a high level of fat, protein and minerals. An early feed of biestings is vital. The recommendation is that the calf gets 2 litres of biestings in about the first hour of life. Absorption of antibodies falls rapidly over time - from close to 100% at birth to close to 10% after 24 hours.

SILAGE QUALITY AWARDS

The silage quality of those who were presented with awards at last weeks Teagasc/IFI/Waterford Foods Silage Quality Awards seminar was very high. However adviser Brian Hilliard pointed out that the average DMD for first cut silage made in 1996 in Co. Waterford was 69%. This means that a lot of poor silage was made and that many people must improve their attention to detail in preparing for silage cutting.

Preparation starts now. If at all possible, graze the silage ground before April 1st. Your silage quality will be as much as 2-9% DMD better and you will get more grazed grass into your animals. For every 46 units of Urea N applied for first grazing on silage fields there will be 20-25 units left over for silage growth. Apply Nitrogen 8 weeks before the planned cutting date and do not apply any more than 80 units following grazing. If slurry is spread, allow 10 units of N per 1,000 gallons of slurry.

ICMSA Proposes Tourism Drive To Promote **Special Lands** Of Ireland

A tourism promotion campaign should be launched by Bord Fáilte to effectively market the thousands of visitor attractions to be found on the one million acres of Irish land which is about to be designated as protected areas under the EU Habitats Directive, ICMSA President, Frank Allen proposed recently.

Speaking at a farmer's meeting in Clogher, Clare-morris, Co. Mayo on Febru-ary 21st, Mr. Allen said owners of land designated as Special Areas of Conservation (SAC) should be offered incentives by the Government to create the infrastructure necessary to ensure that tourism revenue could be generated from the special features on such farms.

Mr. Allen added, "In many cases, the special flora and fauna and other attractions to be found on these lands have not been exploited for their tourism potential. Landowners have grave reservations about the limits imposed on traditional farming methods arising from these SAC designations. It would be a major boost to them if they were offered the grants necessary to promote the special features on their lands with a view to generating tourism revenue

Mr. Allen revealed that ICMSA was seeking a meeting with Tourism Minister, Enda Kenny T.D., in the hope of getting the Association's proposal implemented.

VAT Refund To Increase By 1/2% From March 1st

Waterford IFA Farm Business Committee Chairman, Gerry Murphy, has reminded farmers that the flat rate refund increase announced in the 1997 Budget is to take place Saturday next, March 1. The flat rate VAT refund is the mechanism used to compensate non-VAT registered farmers for VAT paid on their inputs. The increase of 1/2% announced in this year's budget amounts to £14m in a full tax year.

The full refund of 3.3% represents almost £100m. The refund is added to sales of milk and tillage crops. Prices for livestock are generally quoted VAT inclusive

Mr. Murphy called for the establishment of a farmer/government industry working group to ensure that the full value of the VAT refund was being passed back to non-VAT registered farmers in the sales price they receive for their produce.

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Mr. Tommy Keating



Sunday, February 23 was only in its infancy when ever popular and well known Tommy Keating passed peacefully away at St. Joseph's Hospital after a short duration of illness. A native of the Burgery, 'Dungarvan, Tommy, who was aged 86 years, was a most lovable character who always brightened up everybody's day. People like Tommy are a rarity and more's the pity. An optimist if ever there was one, Tommy possessed a jovial, outgoing personality. In truth he loved people and they took him to their hearts.

Son of the late Tommy (who died in 1933) and his mother Mary (died in 1968) he was a member of a family of four boys and two girls. It was in the Burgery that Tommy grew up with his sisters May, Peg, Biddy and Alice and his brother Jack who now resides in England, All were educated at Abbeyside N.S.

Having left school Tommy worked for a number of years as a dairy hand for Johnny Greene, a well known milk vendor and in 1933 he emigrated to England where he gained employment in hotels and as a barman. Five years later he returned home and derived a livelihood mainly from working the land and became a vegetable and fruit grower. He won acclaim for his strawberries and was regarded as an expert in their cultivation.

When the National Emergency was declared in 1939, Tommy immediately joined the local security force and spent a term of 18 years with the 13th Batt. F.C.A. During this time, he developed many wonderful friendships. In the very recent past, Tommy mourned the passing of his great friend Richie Walsh, no doubt both will share many a story, yarn and joke with the Lord. During his FCA career, Tommy reached the rank of sergeant and retired from the force about twenty years ago.

Part and parcel of the Abbeyside scene, Tommy was very much to the fore in all the projects and activitizing complicated insie

He often went on the pilgrimages to Knock, where himself and others sang their way to the Marian Shrine. He was a great lover of old time dancing and rarely missed a function where Mick Del and others of the big band performed. Set dancing was another item high on his agenda.

He was also a leading light in the many productions by St. Laurence's Players, Ballinroad. He thread the boards at Ballinroad, Lemybrien and Ardmore. He features in many of the stories and photographs in the recently launched "Hours of Gladness," a history of Ballinroad Hall. Having spent twelve years with the group, he often spoke of the wonderful fun and delight to

work with such a group.

For a period he was a breeder of Irish Wolfhounds and on one occasion took first prize at the Irish Dog Show in Dublin. Many people will remember Tommy cycling around Abbeyside with his faithful wolfhound by his side.

Cummins Calls For Sunday Voting

Waterford Fine Gael candidate, Cllr. Maurice Cummins has called for the 1997 General Election to be held on a Sunday instead of Thursday.

"From a quick analysis of General Election turnouts over the past seven elections. one thing is clear, fewer people are voting. The total number of people voting in this country is on a steady and persistent decline," declared Cllr. Cummins.

We seem to have a fixation with Thursday as the day for all our elections this must be ended. In 1977 76.3% of the electorate voted while in 1992 the last General Election only 68.4% turned out.

People have more free time on Sunday to participate in the electoral system than on any other day of the week. 
your baby's face and neck is permanent as you have possibly found out. The face is the most common place to be affected, also the neck and upper part of the body. It is a lot less common for the arms or legs to be marked. The capillaries which are below the skin are dilated and distorted and it is this which causes the 'stain'. Because of the area of the stain, skin grafting is not very satisfac-

tory. Laser treatment coagulates the blood vessels and in turn they are replaced by paler tissue. The whole stain cannot be treated at the same time, a little area is done whenever your specialist recommends it. The darker the stain, the more successful the laser treatment turns out. Laser treatment for this complaint can be done on children when they are four of five. Talk through all possibilities with your doctor, before he/she refers

you to a specialist.
Q. I had a difficult labour eighteen months ago, which resulted in a forceps delivery and an epidural. I've had almost constant backache since then and also a weak bladder. I would like to get pregnant again but am worried I will have to go through the same thing. What do you think?

A. Backache is very common both during and after pregnancy. It is due to not only the weight of the baby, but also to the hormones which soften the ligaments supporting the spine and pelvis to allow for the passage, through the birth canal of the baby. Epidural anaesthetic is occasionally associated with long-term backache. This may be partly due to the anaesthesia allowing you to lie in positions during labour which would otherwise be uncomfortable, causing injury to the spine. A difficult forceps delivery can weaken the ligaments supporting the bladder and uterus, resulting in urinary problems. I suggest you have a full specialist assessment so that appropriate measures can be taken to minimise the risk of any further damage in the

Beauty basics

BUYING healthy foods is important but how they are cooked is equally important.

Heat destroys some of the nutrients in food. The longer food is boiled the greater the loss of nourishment. To help to avoid loosing vitamins and minerals whilst cooking, cut down on the amount of water used, do not pre-soak vegetables and cook them until they are just done, do not over cook. If you save the cooking water it can be used to add to soups and casseroles as it will be rich in vitamins and minerals.

When cooking vegetables why not try steaming as this will help the vegetables to maintain as much of their vitamins and minerals as possible. Special steaming

containers are widely available, simply place the vegetables into the container over a pot of boiling water, and cover tightly with lid. The only disadvantage of steaming is that it does take longer than boiling.

Pressure cookers have become very popular in recent years and have proved to be a much better and faster way of cooking than boiling or steaming, with much less nutrient loss. You must be careful to cook your vegetables for just the right length of time, even a few seconds over the cooking time will spoil vegetables. Some pressure

cookers have automatic timers and pressure release, this will reduce the risk of

overcooking greatly.
Stir frying is a quick way of cooking vegetables. A wok is probably best to use, but if you don't have one a large frying pan will do just as well. Heat a small amount of oil in the wok and add freshly chopped vegetables. Stir the food quickly until cooked.



Meritorious Service Award For Dungarvan Badminton Club Member

Badminton Club, Jim Kiersey of Springfield, Dungarvan, was officially presented with a Meritorious Service Award from the International Badminton Federation at a recent function in Lisburn Racquets Club,

This award, which is in recognition of the worldwide promotion and active involvement in badminton was presented to Mr. Kiersey by David Evans, President of the Badminton Union of Ireland (BUI).

A native of Kilmac-thomas, Mr. Kiersey is a popular member of the Dungarvan Badminton Club with which he has been involved for the past 21 years. After a short time, he went on to represent the club at County level with the late Padraig de Burca.

As a measure of the esteem in which Mr. Kiersey is held by his fellow club members, over the years he has been elected as president, club captain, secretary, selector and committee member with the local club.

Mr. Kiersey's long association with badminton does not end there however. Earning the respect of his peers, Mr. Kiersey served as president, executive chairman, secretary, selector, county team manager, coach, league chairman and league secretary with the Waterford County Badminton Association.

During his 15 year period as representative to the Munster branch, Kiersey managed the Munster badminton team and held the position of treasurer, selector and representative to the Badminton Union of Ireland.

Another great title to his credit was Manager of the Irish u-18 team, a position which he held for 2 years over the 1987/'88 seasons.

During his successful career with the Badminton Union of Ireland which is a 32 county association, Mr. Kiersey acted as Chairman for 8 years from 1984, and was also elected president in 1988 for a 2 year term, Inter County Secretary (6 years) and member of the coaching committee (4 years). He retired from the Munster branch scene and the BUI in 1993 and was involved on a county level up to 1995.

Outside of badminton, Mr. Kiersey plays golf and tennis with local clubs in Dungarvan and played junior football and soccer with Kilmacthomas. He also played football for Mahon Rovers (Faha) when they won their first western title

and both hurling and football with Ballydurn/Newtown Minors.

Speaking to the 'Dungarvan Leader', Mr. Kiersey thanked the Dungarvan Badminton Club for the honour it has been for him to have represented them down through the years.

BY RACE LEADER

A HARD DAYS NIGHT

Ray McConnell from Tubrid, Cappoquin ran a 144 miles route from Dublin to Dungarvan last Thursday and Friday in 28 hrs. 45 mins. 17 secs. Behind these figures lies one of the greatest running endurance feats that we will encounter in our lifetime. Following extensive coverage on Radio 2FM and WLR FM Ray is a household name county and nationwide as his incredible endeavours attracted widespread interest.

Though covering the full distance on his own, the West Waterford A.C. clubman's opponents were many and varied. The remaining days of February threw the worst possible weather it could muster at him, twelve hours of darkness teamed up with the elements and his own judgment almost convinced him to withdraw when he was about seventy five miles into the run.

However the Cappoquin Chickens employee literally weathered the storm and clear skies and bright sunshine heralded his victorious entry to the Square, Dungarvan perhaps a sign from the elements that they had thrown in the towel and succumbed to the teak tough McConnell.

Ray's prize was no doubt in completing the trip but it must have also given him considerable pleasure to learn from early on in his run that the support of Gerry Ryan at 2FM had secured sponsorship from food chain Abra Kababra for both himself and his wife Sylvia to travel to the biggest ultra distance run of them all, the Sparta to Athens 153 miles event on Friday, September 26. It is richly deserved.

The Dublin to Dungarvan run came about originally from a comment by Gerry Ryan during one of his programmes that surely nobody could run one hundred miles. Ray's wife Sylvia latched on to this and with regular contact with 2FM the format for last week's run was organised includ-

ing a preview a week beforehand and constant reports on Ray's progress last
Thursday and Friday.
Sylvia's support for Ray's
endeavours over the years
has aided his career greatly.

Ultra distance runner Ray McConnell, the holder of three Irish endurance records left Donnybrook Dublin at 9.40 a.m. last Thursday morning frightened but excited about the task that lay ahead. Accompanying him in his support car were his wife Sylvia, his regular assistant on these runs Brian Coughlan from Aglish and James Veale, the chairman Waterford West A.C., the beneficiaries of Ray's fund raising efforts.

WINTER TEST RUN

Ray chose the route and date for his unique attempt to test his winter training in preparation for the Greek race, but little did he realise that he was going to be tested to the very limit of his human endurance. As Ray ran along Templeogue and Tallaght he realised the threat that was going to be posed by the weather. In these such runs Ray doesn't notice any effort until around the twenty five mile stage. Last Thursday morning Ray felt the going around ten miles. Despite this he remained on his schedule for fifty miles which was the covering of three miles every thirty minutes. He slowed slightly towards eighty miles which

was over half way on the route.

UNNATURAL ELEMENTS

For fifteen hours the forty seven years old McConnell ran against a gale force nine wind varied only by the torrential rain that beat down on him. Brian Coughlan and James Veale both ran some miles with Ray and they must have harboured inward fears of the eventual outcome of the attempt.

Two ultra runners from Dublin, Eddie Harrison and Maurice Mullins ran for two hours with Ray up to midnight and on the Gerry Ryan show the following morning Mullins said that he believed the run would be terminated at best before Clonmel. He stated that if it was an ordinary training run the plans would have been shelved for a better day. Ray's fitness stood to him as nothing less would have ensured his survival.

SUPER SUPPORT

The elements may have been against Ray but the whole country rose to the occasion and got behind him and his attempt. His support team witnessed widespread generosity on route but the main man was suffering heavily and at Urlingford around midnight he was on the point of throwing in the towel. It must be said that on a normal days weather Ray would have reached Dungarvan two hours earlier and he would have enjoyed his attempt much more.

Into the picture came one Paul Simson who drove Olivia O'Brien up to Urlingford to join the support team and Ray says he played a big part in getting him to continue the run. Also many of his Cappoquin Chicken colleagues travelled during the night to encourage him and as always his support team catered for all his needs at their three mile checkpoints.

SOUTH TIPP RESPOND

Ray tipped away during the night and despite a swollen right ankle and pains in the back of the legs from running against the wind, he was making good ground. There has always been a great tradition of running in South Tipperary and unheralded they arrived on the scene in cavalry like fashion. When Ray arrived in Ballynonty at 3.30 a.m. he was met by the Sean Healy led local athletic club who ran in relay with him and he later described this as one of the highlights of his run.

When he arrived in Ferthard he was met by Bernard Feery, Micheal and Sean McCormack and Neily Hale and they ran as far as Clonmel which was reached by 7.50 a.m. All these were people who despite work the following day left their beds to support a man they did not know but who shared the common bond of distance running.

BRILLIANT BALLYMAC'

The Irish international slowed dramatically after Clonmel but he says mentally he was at his strongest at any point during the run. No doubt the fact that he was on his last stage plus the fine morning with unfamiliar sunshine boosted-his

efforts. He also met up with Brenda O'Donoghue of 2FM who along with Gerry Ryan was genuinely interested in his unique attempt.

Tourists may be rare in the Nire Valley at this time of the year but this one received special treatment akin to a civic reception. The children of Ballymacarbry National School gave Ray a terrific reception and presented him with their collection of forty pounds towards his Greek fund. There would be no giving in now! Mrs. Bridget Ryan, Kilmanahan and Mrs. Martin Moore urged him on further and after being joined by Brendan Mernin for a few miles he teamed up with his West Waterford clubmates Anthony and Rebecca Harty, Colin Lyons, David O'Leary and Michael Roche.

Seeing Ray at the top of Colligan, it must be said that he was looking and running well with his now familiar smile and no fuss approach very much to the forefront. He got a peep of the sea at the top of Colligan and before one knew it he was tackling his last climb at Ballinamuck outside Dungarvan.

MISSION ACCOMPLISHED

At 2.25 p.m. Ray Mc-Connell ran into Grattan Square to the music of lone piper Michael Grant after completing a route where no one had gone before. He felt the effort was akin to running 180 miles and he was pleased that he had finished what he had set out to do and that he had done so without suffering an injury that would prevent him from continuing his training for Greece. His right ankle

was very swollen but by last Sunday it was returning to normal. On Monday morning he ran the four miles to work and this Sunday he intends participating in the Ballycotton ten miler. Next month he is considering running from Galway to Dublin. Ray was greeted in Dungarvan by an admiring crowd of well wishers, young and old alike, and he was officially welcomed back to the town by Cllr. Damien Dillon, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson was also in attendance. West Waterford A.C. made a presentation to Ray and his wife Sylvia was present with a bouquet of flow-

LASTING IMPRESSION

The goodwill by so many people towards his efforts left a lasting impression on Ray McConnell. For many years he has practiced his ultra distance running in obscurity and he is now happy that his sport is being recognised. As Ray says his is not a circus act. He and his colleagues are trained athletes who enjoy attempting and finishing runs of a very long distance.

Ray experienced many gestures of goodwill on his run like when Dungarvan veterinary surgeon Jim Byrne offered him a mars bar near Touraneena. At that stage he says one of the injections in Jim's bag would have tempted him more! When Ray was being interviewed at different stages he always gave a positive image and never complained though he was obviously hurting inside. He is a remarkable character, a true champion and an example to everyone involved in sport. Well done Ray Mc-Connell.



TALLOW G.A.A. CLUB NOTES

Tallow camogie club team of the fifties which appeared some years ago on local papers and it recalled for me days long gone when camogie in Tallow commanded as much attention as hurling and was organised on a pretty strong footing. Funds — isn't it ever thus — were depleted but the enthusiasm and sincerity of the young women overcame all obstacles to make this local team a match for many of the sides in the west. Sadly quite a few of the team have departed this valley of tears but it was easy to identify those still among us, whose youthful smiles betokened a time when respect and courtesy were esteemed and people provided most of their own recreation. Isn't it remarkable too

how traditions pass on from generation to generation.

Myra Ryan, for many years now Mrs. Tom Roche and farming at Knockraha, Kilwatermoy, is in the back row. Myra's sons Tomas and Frank are stalwart hurlers and footballers with Shamrocks and her nephews, Kieran, Ian, Frankie and Aidan shared in the glories of Tallow's best days. Babs Cronin, right in the middle of the front row, is easy to identify as Babs Mulcahy of Ballinaha whose husner forward of the sixties and afterwards as a hurley physician to whom all ailing hurleys were sent for repair.

The smiling figure of Biddy Morrisson dominates the middle of the back row. She was Biddy Hogan then and hadn't yet tied the knot with Jim Morrisson. Biddy's sister, the late Joan Hogan, stands near her. Michael Hogan, Joan's son, stood in goal for the Shamrocks over many years of faithful service. Barry Hogan, Joan's grandson is hurling with his father's team now and also maintaining the family Gaelic tradition are Michael, Martin and Thomas Ryan. Lena McCarthy, whom we all know as Lena Mangan, kneels in the front row. The McCarthy's of West Street were always great G.A.A. supporters and Lily, Mary and Jimmy, still reside in West Street even if emigration brought Cathy and Paddy to New York where Mary spent many of her early years. I have grateful remembrance of their hospitality and extreme kindness on the occasion of Mary and Cathy did their utmost to make us feel welcome during that formight.

Also in New York now is Mena Prendergast, West Street, still keeping in touch with home. She loved camogie, sure they all did, and her brother Michael, a speedy hurler of immense stamina, is also in New York where his hostelry is a home from home for any Waterford visitor. Tallow attracts them home occasionally but their firm roots in the big city down by the Hudson River generally only allow

them to keep in touch through the local paper.

Cora Pudwell is the fresh-faced young girl extreme left at
the back and by a strange coincidence (or maybe it's not that strange) on the other side, extreme right, is Michael Curley whom she was to marry later on. Sadly Michael is no longer with us but I personally have never forgotten Cora or himself for their unwavering support of Tallow Club when we needed funds to purchase our Gaelic Field. From their home in London came regular donations towards any of the projects organised to raise funds. Cora is nowadays living in Tallow having retired some years ago and we meet often after morning Mass. Camogie had a great appeal for Cora and even the fact that she was too young at the time of the photo to command a place on the team in no way dimmed her passion for the game because she made her services available to the club in other capacities such as helping to entertain the visiting team.

Training went on every week evening in Curley's field. As was customary in those days the duration of the session was governed by the length of the evening. Jimmy Cunningham was the trainer. Jimmy gave extraordinary service to Gaelic games over his lifetime. Despite a very full involvement with the G.A.A. club he still found time to help the girls enjoy themselves in the field. Jimmy's unselfish devotion to Gaelic affairs rubbed off on his son Eddie who has immersed himself in G.A.A. affairs, both administrative and practical, since he was a schoolboy.

A look at the hurleys used in those days is most revealing. The bas is quite small and narrow and the stick is pretty long, a bit too long I would have thought. Which leads me to think that players at that time were better ground strikers than their present day counterparts. The narrower and smaller the bas the better the stroke. A close look at D. J. Carey's stick would confirm why his stroke of a ball owes much to the compact striking surface. If you have ever seen the shinty used to play the Scottish equivalent of hurling you would notice how the weight is concentrated in a small of his with camogie until he dies.

Lately I came across once more an old photograph of the hitting area. And in shinty, of course, there is no lifting, handling or carrying. The curbed bas on those girls hurleys, with so much of the bas in contact with the ground, made it easier to strike on the ground. It was this very principle which prompted Fr. Bertie Troy, trainer of Cork's four-in-arow All Ireland champions, to encourage his players to acquire a hurley with a curved bas. That team's ability at ground hurling was well known.

In the fifties camogie flourished and there was the usual

rivalry between traditional areas.

Knockanore had a fine team physically well-endowed and with a commitment and spirit common to all teams from that area. Mick Neville, still hale and hearty, was a great admirer of their play and involved in the club. Their star player was the formidable Moll Murray whose leadership and drive inspired her team. Mick's catch-phrase rang out loud and clear: "face the ball Moll Murray." And face it she did and anything or anyone else on the opposition side.

Ring, Rinn O gCuanach, was a match for any other team. Their star players were the McGraths, with Biddy their leading light. I saw Biddy with Ring and also in the Waterband Mick gave fine service to Tallow first as a crafty corford colours. She was dynamic, an artist with the caman, strong, fleet of foot and most skillful. Her sons Carthach and Nioclas Og are in the tradition of Nioclas Snr. and Biddy, true Gaelic sportsmen and accomplished hurlers and footballers. Is dual athar agus mather diobh beirt.

Another player of that era who left a lasting impression was Biddy Nugent. So did Rose Lonergan of Cappoquin. Blonde bombshells whose speed of thought, hands and foot

took them through the tightest defences.

Lilian Howlett of Gaultier I can still picture in the Waterford strip or uniform as it was called in those, dim and distant days. She was a fine camogie player and such was her infatuation with the game that she continued to play up until some 10 years ago. She married Pat O'Sullivan of Ballygunner fame and their hurling family is well-known especially Ballygunner and Waterford stylist Billy O'Sullivan who has starred consistently for club and county over the last 15 years or more. His mother Lilian as well as his father Waterford hurlers visit to the Big Apple in 1960. Paddy, nurtured and supported Billy to become the classiest and most exciting forward that Waterford has produced over the last 30 years. He is a role model for our young players, scrupulously fair, fast, dedicated and effective.

Camogie suffered a decline in Tallow in the sixties with no team affiliated. Late 1969 saw an effort to revive the dormant club. A meeting was held in St. Patrick's Hall and what the gathering might have lacked in numbers was amply compensated for by their genuine enthusiasm. Josie Curley, Kitty McCarthy, Mary Curley and Nora McCarthy among others were determined to resuscitate the old Tallow Camogie Club. But the major influence in the revival of camogie in Tallow was John William McCarthy. John was the chairman and driving force and he supplied the leadership. Dances were held, cake sales organised, jumble sales and raffles run to finance club activities. John enlisted help, arranged training, purchased hurleys and gave every spare moment of time to the game. Progress was slow, so slow that in 1970 no team was fielded.

However persistence was rewarded and by 1972 not alone were Tallow back in business but they succeeded in reaching the county final. Ardkeen provided the opposition and after a keenly contested game Tallow emerged as champions. Tallow's team sheet contained names familiar to hurling followers. There were three McNamaras, Rose, Bernie and Bridget. Two Curley sisters Mary and Ann and their mother Mary. There was also Nora McCarthy, Mary Mangan, Ann Treacy, Bernie Curley, Sheila Tobin, Mary Tobin and Margaret O'Brien. Margaret, now school principal of Ard Scoil na nDeise, Dungarvan, was a player of quality representing Waterford in her favourite midfield position on many occasions. The Kilwinney girl is sister of Liam and their father Jamie gave fine service to the Tallow teams of the thirties. Margaret Murphy, June Lonergan, Dettie Hogan and Rene O'Leary were other fine performers.

Recent years have witnessed a gradual decline in Tallow's camogie fortunes. In latter years some of the girls who represented Tallow were Marion, Lisa and June Power, Veronica O'Keeffe, Mary O'Donoghue, Liz Ryan, Joan O'Neill, Mags O'Brien, Patricia O'Connor, Avril McSweeney and Caroline Connolly. It's time for an upturn in Tallow's fortunes. Whatever the future holds Tallow camogie will endure so long as John William's zest for the game survives.

This man of unquenchable optimism will pursue his dream of seeing Tallow up there with Lismore, Ardmore, Gaultier, Dungarvan and Portlaw and he will pursue that love affair

The games will be shown in their entirety and will include commentaries by the late Micheal O Hehir and others.

The innovation by the new station will give an invaluable opportunity for fans to watch once again the great Dublin/Kerry of the seventies, Seamus Darby's late winning goal in 1982, the controversial meeting of Dublin and Galway in 1983 and many more thrilling encounters.

In hurling the new programmes will give viewers a chance to see once again the thrilling Cork/Kilkenny games as well as the resurgence in hurling of counties such as Galway and Offaly.

The innovation marks the start of T. na G.'s interest in the broadcasting of gaelic games and the G.A.A. authorities will be hoping that it will see the start of a long and fruitful relationship. Up until now the station has been concentrating on broadcasting Spanish soccer.

COUNTY BOARD MEETING

The March meeting of the County Board will take place on Monday night next when some business left over from the first meeting will be disposed of. This includes the Dunhill club motion to change the method of affiliations and to revert to the system which obtained prior to 1989.

DIVISION 1

TRAMORE V. **GAULTIER (TRAMORE)**

Gaultier, who were involved in the senior county finals on successive years and losing to Rathgormack on both occasions, will be making another all-out bid to take their first ever senior title this year, and may kick off with a win here.

Tramore will be very difficult to beat, they having been involved in three minor football county finals and a couple of under-21 finals over the past four years. Forecast: Gaultier.

NIRE V. KILROSSANTY (BALLYMACARBRY)

It took the Nire two matches to overcome Kilrossanty in the autumn of last year in the championship, so on that basis there was little between them on form, but now the scene would appear to have changed as Kilrossanty have been considerably strengthened with the transfer of Darrell Donnelly from Dungarvan, Kieran Whelan from Bonmahon and Kevin Lonergan (county under-21 player) having transferred back from Faha. So if these additions are to mean anything, Kilrossanty must be strongly fancied here. Selection: Kilrossanty.

STRADBALLY V. KILL AT STRADBALLY

The home side should prove too strong for their younger opponents here. In last year's championships, Stradbally flattered only to deceive as they died out of the competition just when everything seemed to be going right for them.

Kill, without a doubt, are a team of the future, having climbed up the ladder from

junior and qualified for the knockout stages last year, but they many have to wait a while longer. Forecast: Stradbally.

DUNGARVAN V. RATHGORMACK AT **DUNGARVAN CLUB GROUNDS**

These teams provided us with some of the most exciting fare at the start of the nineties and history must devote space for the famous and memorable three-timer that took to decide who the titleholders were going to be.

Things have changed round in the in-between years and Rathgormack have proved themselves to be worthy champions in the past two seasons. Also they have come close to causing a major surprise in Munster.

Dungarvan are no longer the force they were in the early nineties and last year found it a struggle to remain in the top six teams. They have lost a number of players including Darrell Donnelly (Kilrossanty), Fergal Cunningham now working and playing in Dublin, Martin Sheehan (England), so it may take them a while to 'find their feet' and become strong challengers again. Forecast: Rathgormack.

DIVISION 2

RING V. SCLIABH gCUA IN RING

Playing their first match since graduating to senior status, Ring can fancy their chances of beating Sliabh gCua who are in their first game since being demoted down to intermediate grade. The Touraneena side made no secret of the fact and were quick to admit that they were out of their depth in the senior championship last season and were anxious to get down to their own level in order to rebuild their team and win their way back up later on.

Ring should do alright at senior level as well as doing alright here. Selection: Ring.

BONMAHON V. KILMACTHOMAS AT KILMAC'

When these sides clashed in the championship last year, Kilmacthomas had just a single point to spare after a hectic encounter that pro-duced some nice football in a fast flowing game. It was 0-12 to 1-8 at the end.

BALLINACOURTY V. BUTLERSTOWN AT ABBEYSIDE

These teams were in different groups last year, but in 1995 when they clashed at Leamybrien, Butlerstown shocked the hot favourites in a match that produced a nailbiting finish after a very mediocre 45 minutes of poor football

Last year Butlerstown let the other teams in their division know that they were in the senior championship on merit and wins against Kill, Kilmacthomas and one or two others were won on merit.

Ballinacourty, with a big-ger selection and a good record of underage success in recent years, should, if putting their game together, survive this tie at their home ground. Selection: Butler-

ST. SAVIOURS V. DE LA SALLE AT BALLYBEG

St. Saviours played some good games in the championship last year and one that I have in mind is their splendid display when losing by 2-8 to 1-9 against an in-form county champions Rathgormack team in an early round. 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
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
