heelie Bins To Be Extended To All Urban Areas In J

its way to Dungarvan in the near future following an announcement made by the local Council in the national press inviting tenders for the supply of 2,710 wheeled bins of varying sizes and a domestic refuse collection vehicle with automatic lifting equipment.

At present, 540 households in the urban area already use wheelie bins on the Wednesday refuse collection route encompassing Western Terrace, Cloneety, Silversprings, Lisfennel,

Congress Villas, Cathal Brugha Place and Kilrush.

Based on the success of this new system, the Council intend to extend the wheeled bin collection service throughout the entire

KNOW YOUR **RIGHTS**

QUESTION

I am working and paying my taxes. My wife has been seriously ill and we've had a lot of expenses on drugs and other health related expenses. Can I get tax relief in relation to those costs?

ANSWER

If you have paid tax last year, 5 April, 1996 to 6 April 1997 (no tax paid, no refund) you may get relief in relation to medical expenses.

It is important to have receipts in relation to any claim. If you haven't kept the receipts many chemists and GP's now can give an annual statement of expenditure to April 5 last so you should check this out. You should also resolve to have a fixed place where all medical expense receipts in a tax year are kept.

If you have been reimbursed in total by an insurance company (e.g. VHI) you cannot claim for that but if there was only partial payment then the balance can be claimed. Similarly, with drugs expenditure, if the Health Board has reimbursed you for expenditure in excess of £90 in a quarter, you can get a statement from the Health Board confirming your expenditure of £90 in that quarter.

Relief can be claimed for an individual provided that the expenses exceed £100 per annum, or for 2 or more persons, £200 per annum.

A claim form, Med. 1, is available from your tax office (Med. 2 should be completed by your dentist for nonroutine dental expenses.)

Allowable expenses are hospital charges, G.P., drugs, medical appliances, physiotherapy, orthoptic treatment, nursing home charges. Not allowable are routine dental, optical or maternity treatment.

Relief for medical expenses is given by way of repayment provided a Form P12 "return of income" has been made for the relevant year and any tax due paid.

In a survey of petrol prices that the official price conat filling stations in the Cork/Waterford area, carried out last January by the Director of Consumer Affairs, it was revealed that petrol prices in Dungarvan "are broadly in line" with the prices being charged in other towns.

The survey was carried out at the request of the Minister for Enterprise and Employment Richard Bruton following claims made by local Urban Councillor Lar Hart that petrol is almost 10p cheaper per litre in Waterford City than it is in Dungarvan.

Cllr. Hart had requested the U.D.C. to write to Minister Bruton with a view to investigating the price of petrol in Dungarvan.

Almost all flowers make seeds from which new plants grow.

A flower usually needs pollen from another flower of the same kind before it can make seeds. Pollen is sometimes carried from one flower to another by the wind or it can be carried by insects such

Insects are attracted to the flowers by their bright colours and settle on the flowers to search for the surgary liquid called nectar. As they do this, the pollen sticks to their bodies.

When the insect visits another flower, some of the pollen brushes off and fermade

Because plants cannot move about, they have developed ingenious ways to spread their seeds around.

The seeds of the sycamore, which are like little helicopters, and the downy 'parachutes' of thistles and dandelions are all blown around by the wind.

Animals can also help seeds travel. Some seeds are hidden inside tasty fruit - including berries and nuts - to attract animals to eat them. Then they pass through the animal's body and are often dropped a long distance from

Others have tiny hooks or burrs which catch on to the fur of a animal coat and travel with it to other places far away from the parent plants.

Did You Know?

Brightly coloured flowers are pollinated by insects, while dull flowers such as grass use the wind.

Poppy seeds are in a pod which looks like a pepperpot. When shaken by the wind or a passing animal the seeds scatter.

The Blood

Blood is a thick red fluid made up of plasma, red corpuscles, white corpuscles and platelets. It travels around the body via arteries, veins and capillaries. While travelling through the arteries it is bright red in colour as it is full of oxygen. In the veins it is a dark red colour as it contains carbondioxide. There are eleven pints of blood in the body of an adult.

The red corpuscles carry oxygen to all the tissues and organs of the body. The blood gets its colour from these. The white corpuscles are a defence against disease that enter the body. White corpus-cles may die in this process. They also help in the healing of wounds. Platelets are developed from white cells in the bone marrow and they help to clot the blood.

Some of the functions of the blood are to bring oxygen from the lungs and other nutritive matter to the tissues of the body; to carry waste products from our tissues to the organs responsible for excreting them; to distribute heat and keep the same temperature in all parts of the body; to fight germ infection with the aid of the white corpuscles and other anti-toxins which the body makes neutralise poisons.

Blood carries oxygen from the lungs, and nutritive matter from our organs of digestion to all parts of the body as mentioned above. Carbondioxide is carried to the lungs where the exchange of gases takes place. The exception to the rule is: the colour of blood in the arteries and veins is blood in 2 Pulmonary arteries is dark red and blood in 4 Pulmonary veins is bright



REMEMBERING OTHER DAYS



This week for our "Remembering Other Days" series we go back to the 1940's. The photograph was taken around 1947 and shows one of Kenneally's buses in Grattan Square, Dungarvan, after finishing the run from Aglish to the Old Boro. At that time Kenneally's Bus Service offered customers transport on routes that took in Aglish, Old Parish, Ring, Coolnasmear, Kilbrien, Bonmahon, Ballymacoda, Knockadoon and Youghal. Pictured in front of the bus are Mickey Clancy, conductor, Jackie Kenneally, driver, Pat Crolla, a visitor in the area, and Willie Grace, who was a driver of the post van which brought the mail from Waterford to Dungarvan at that time

Dungarvan Toastmasters News

Our toastmaster, guest greeter and timekeeper performed their duties well at our first Easter meeting. Credit is due to our President for encouragement of all members to participate in the club and with other toastmaster clubs.

Our speakers too must be complimented. What an important issue to highlight, i.e. the over-use of antibiotics. The overuse and abuse of the latter has created killer superbugs and the far from alarmist World Health Organisation has spoken of the disastrous consequences. There are many people using antibiotics just like aspirin in the Third World, where they are widely available and used unnecessarily for complaints like headaches and tooth decay. Alexander Fleming the discoverer of penicillin would be dismayed by its overuse.

Fire Service Battle Forest Blaze In Dromana

A serious forest fire was averted last Thursday as firefighters battled for 3 hours to control a blaze in Coillte owned land at Dromana, Cappoquin.

IS NEW HOSPITAL **NEARER?**

The major development of St. Joseph's Hospital in Clonmel took a step closer last week when the Design Brief, having been sanctioned by the Department of Health was sent to the South Eastern Health Board. This good news was given by Alderman Tom Ambrose (F.F.) M.C.C. a member of the Board who went on to say that the Outline Development Control Plan should be with the Board in May when the project should then go to tender. Work should begin in early 1998 and end in late 1999. When one considers that it took ten years to plan the Regional in Waterford and Clonmel just took 10 months, it is a remarkable achievement especially as this will be a state of the art hospital!!

Extra care had to be taken because one wrong placement of a building or a unit would seriously impede future development. St. Joseph's Hospital leaves a lot to be desired at the moment due to the fact that over the last 20 years there has been a difference of opinion as to where this new hospital should be located. During all this time new hospitals have been built in Waterford, Kilkenny and Wexford. When the issue of a new hospital for South Tipperary was raised, the question was where and this could not be answered. Complaints have been made recently about overcrowding at St. Josephs. There is always big demand for hospitalisation during the winter months and this is not unique to this hospital. This crowding has now eased off during the past weeks. Some G.P.'s and S.E.H.B. members are concerned about the image of St. Josephs being portrayed by some persons particularly in relation to M.R.S.A., an infection that may come from the bodies of elderly people especially after surgery. There is no hospital that hasn't had to close a ward because of this infection and to attribute it to St. Josephs alone is unfair. Clonmel, South Tipperary and North West Waterford will have a new hospital it can be proud of within three or four years. The planning stages have been completed in record time. This is the bottom line and people should count their blessings and have a little patience.

Wheelie Bins To Be Extended To All Urban **Areas In July**

Last November the Council carried out a survey of householders using wheelie bins in an attempt to gain comprehensive feedback. Overall the response proved very positive with 84% of those surveyed confirming their willingness to continue with the wheeled bin collection service.

The three main difficulties experienced by people were charge for service, access to property and size of bin. Varying bin sizes (i.e. 140 litre, 240 litre or 660 litre) will be made available in July according to each household's needs.

With regard to access difficulties, the Council has already looked into the possibility of alternative collection points such as right-of-ways etc. Indeed over the next 3 years, substantial improvement works will be carried out on many right-of-ways throughout

the town which would have the dual benefit of providing access for collection of wheeled bins. The areas to be targetted this year are Caseyville, Cathal Brugha/Caseyville and St. Patrick's Crescent/Cathal Brugha at a total cost of £14,500.

The brand new refuse lorry will replace the existing lorry which was hired by the U.D.C. from Waterford County Council.

Gone are the days of black plastic sacks, small shopping bags and unsuitable refuse containers. The advantages of the new wheeled service as stated by the Council are greater efficiency in collection, a safer working environment for their labour force and the provision of fully contained units free from attack by animals and birds. No doubt many residents will have their own minds made up

Green Party Lends Support To Anti-Mast Lobby

Brendan McCann, the Green Party candidate in the Waterford constituency has pledged his support to the Committee for a Microwave Mast Free Dungarvan who have strongly objected to the erection of a microwave transmitter by Telecom in the middle of the town.

In a recent letter to members of Dungarvan U.D.C., Mr. McCann said he was very concerned about reported statements made by Canadian electrical engineer, Professor Maria Stuchly who attended a special meeting of the local authority on April 14.

Professor Stuchly stated at this meeting that, on the basis of existing scientific data, there is no convincing evidence that exposure to microwave radiation from transmitter masts is harmful to our health.

"I believe Professor Stuchly was wrong to make such a claim at the present time because she knows only too well that far too little research has been con-

ducted into the effects of long term exposure to microwave radiation," declared Mr. McCann.

The Green Party candidate stressed that the Professor is an electrical engineer and not a professional biologist or medical researcher.

He hoped that the U.D.C. would not be mislead by Professor Stuchly's statement into believing that the proposed mast on the Waterford Foods 'silo' building is completely safe.

Ending the letter, Mr. Mc-Cann restated the Green Party's position on transmitter masts, namely that an independent regulatory body and rigorous guidelines for all microwave based television and communications systems be established.

Secondly, until such time as all the health risks associated with microwave radiation can be rigorously and independently established, no further transmitter masts be erected and those already in service be phased out.

LOOSE CUT GRASS NO LONGER A PROBLEM IN DUNGARVAN

Now that the grass-cutting season is here, gardening activities are again to the fore, not least for Dungarvan UDC, who have acres of public green spaces and parks to maintain in the growing period.

One particular problem

ing the past few years was the difficulty encountered with non-collected cut grass getting into people's homes and on freshly painted walls, etc.

In an effort to finally resolve this ongoing problem, the UDC have purchased a new tractor mower equipped included in the estimate of with collector for the urban area. South Eastern Health Board Child Care (Pre-School Services) Regulations 1996

The above regulations came into effect on the 31st December 1996.

Under the terms of the regulations: a "pre-school service" is defined as any pre-school/playgroup, day nursery, creche, day care or other similar service which caters for pre-school children including those grantaided by health boards.

A "pre-school child" is defined as a child who has not attained the age of six years and who is not attending a national school or a school providing an educational programme similar to a national school.

The following categories of pre-school services have been identified for the purpose of implementing the regulations:-

(i) Sessional Services

Sessional pre-school services mean the provision of:

- a service providing a planned programme to pre-

- a service of up to 3.5 hours per session.

(ii) Full Day Care

A full day care service means the provision of a structuraed day care service for children for more than 3.5 hours per day. Services such as those currently described as day nurseries and creches are included in this definition.

(III) Childminders

Childminders look after children in the childminder's own home. Only childminders caring for more than three children are covered by the provisions of these regulations.

(iv) Drop-in Centre

A drop-in centre refers to services provided in shopping centres, leisure centres or similar establishment which is provided as part of a customer/client service and where children are left for a short period of time while the parent or guardian is availing of a service or attending an event.

Certain exemptions from the Regulations are provided

- (a) the care of one of more pre-school children undertaken by a relative of the child or children or the spouse of such relative,
- (b) a person taking care or one or more pre-school children of the same family and no other such children (other than the person's own such children) in that person's home,

(c) a person taking care of not more than three preschool children of different families (other than that person's own such children) in that person's home.

Section 9 (1) of these regulations indicates that a person presently carrying on a pre-school service must notify the South Eastern Health Board in writing by the 30 June 1997 of their intention to continue to provide this service.

Any person intending to establish a pre-school service must notify the South Eastern Health Board in writing of their intention to do so.





This Week In The Garden

Thin Out Rose Growth

It is a good idea to examine your rose bushes and standards now and to pinch out any badly placed or overcrowded shoots. Any shoots growing inwards and therefore crowding the centre of the plant are the ones you should look to pinch out in particular as they will cause trouble later on in the year.

Watch Out For Greenfly

Greenfly is likely to make it's first appearance this month and you need to keep a look out for this pest, especially on the young growth of roses and fruit trees. It is relatively easy, if tackled now, to kill all the insects by spraying.

Thin and Stake Herbaceous Perennials

Do not allow your herbaceous perennials to retain all the growth they produce, you will achieve a much better display by thinning out the shoots a little this month.

Delphiniums and Michaelmas daisies in particular repay even a drastic thinning. Simply retain some of the sturdiest shoots and nip off the rest. Before the stems grow too long, place bamboo canes in position and loop the stems to these before they begin to flop about. It is best to have several canes per plant.

Thin Out Chrysanthemum Growths

During May Chrysanthemums will be making new growths - known as 'breaks.' You will have to decide how many you want per plant. The number retained depends on the type of chrysanthemum and the purpose for which you are growing it.

Exhibition Japanese Chrysanthemums grown for the biggest flowers possible have one shoot retained per plant. If prize winning is not the object, you may be satisfied to leave three stems per plant.

Earth Up Early Potatoes

As the earlier crops of potatoes push their shoots through the ground you need to draw more soil around them for protection. A few degrees of frost will injure

satile and forms the basis for so 'are large and have sprouts at many standard meals, it is hard both ends, cut them in half and to imagine what European diets were like before Sir Walter Raleigh returned from the New World with the humble white tuber or solanum tuberosum.

Since then it has formed a mainstay of the basic diet for Great Britain and Ireland and most of southern Europe.

Potatoes are a cool season crop, but neither plants nor tubers tolerate frost. They require a growing season of between 90 and 140 days.

They are divided into early, second early and main-crop groups. Potatoes need to be grown in an open frost-free site and main-crop potatoes need plenty of watering.

But if you have never tried it before, why not try planting a crop of early potatoes under plastic this year.

PREPARING SEED POTATOES

To prepare your seed potatoes, place them in a box or tray in a single layer with the end of the potato containing the most eyes uppermost. Store them in a light, frost-free place until the sprouts have grown to about 2cm. (¾ inch) in length.

dip each cut half in soot before planting. This protects them from soil-borne pests and dis-

PLANTING UNDER PLASTIC Large sheets of black plastic can be obtained from garden centres.

Prepare the soft in the usual way bearing in mind it is best to plant potatoes in soil that grew another crop the previous year.

Spread out the plastic sheet on top of the soil and anchor it by burying the edges.

Make a cross-shaped cut in the plastic where each potato0 is to be planted, then plant each potato about four inches deep in the soil under each cut.

HARVESTING

After about three months, your potatoes will be ready for harvesting. So if you plant them at the end of March they should be ready by the end of June.

When the time comes to harvest your potatoes, cut off the stem, pull back the plastic and your crop of new potatoes will be lying on the surface.

Remember, early potatoes should be harvested just before the flowers are due to open.

Melleray Scout Centre Runner-Up In Ford Conservation **Awards**

The Catholic Boy Scouts of Ireland's project to establish an Interactive Museum and Archive of Irish Scouting in the Mount Melleray Scout Centre, Cappoquin, was narrowly beaten in the Heritage category of the 1997 Ford Irish Conservation Awards Finals, held in the Library of the RDS in Dublin recently.

The project was singled out by the panel of judges to receive special praise and was presented with a diploma to mark the achievement of all those involved. It is hoped that this archive will enable the traditions and memories of a youth organisation that has served the young people of Ireland for 70 years to be preserved as a living heritage for future generations.

The National Award went to The Irish Genetic Resources Conservation Trust for its work in establishing a

seed bank of threatened native Irish flora.

The Mount Melleray Scout Centre aims to collect and preserve all materials relating to the history and traditions of the Catholic Boy Scouts of Ireland and in doing so create a permanent museum, and establish a living and relevant insight into the history of a youth organisation seen through the eyes of the Leaders as well as the young people who were and are presently its members. The first stage was to collect material and memories of those who have been long and established members of the Association (founded in 1927) and create a permanent use. The second phase is to catalogue this material and encourage all Units within the Association (430 countrywide, 35,000 members) to research and write the history of their own Unit which can be added to the collective whole. All of this material will then be put on computer for ease of reference and an Internet Web Page will be established to allow material to be accessed easily and also for material to be added.

An important part of this unique social history of the young people of Ireland is that young people are involved and see and enjoy the discovery of scouting in the past and present as a living heritage - the photographs of camp, the uniforms, badges and scout equipment, stories and adventures, and see their time in scouting as part of this ongoing history and tradition.



Health Clinics Resume In Coolnasmear

Health clinics with local GP, Dr. O'Donovan resumed in Coolnasmear on Friday, April 18, much to the delight of residents in the area, many of whom have had to travel 4 or 5 miles away to Seskinane, Touraneena, when the health clinic closed last December.

Welcoming the decision of the South Eastern Health Coolnasmear was Waterford County Councillor Oliver Coffey who tabled a notice of motion last December highlighting the problem.

Cllr. Coffey succeeded in bringing the matter to the attention of the Health Board and a house suitable for use as a clinic was eventually identified in the area.





SILAGE PIT REPAIRS

Many silage pits are in poor structural condition. Typical ailments are wide open joints, pebbles sticking up, no channels, potholes, cracks and effluent getting over the sides. These situations end up in prosecutions for some before the end of the summer.

The purpose of this short item is to encourage people to make their silage pits secure rather than to give full details about how to do the repairs. About half of the silage effluent will leak downwards through the floor if the joints are not filled. In the winter when the water table rises, some of this effluent will ooze back up through the joints giving a wet seeping floor.

Open joints, even if wide and rough, can be filled successfully with hot poured bitumen provided the joint faces are cut back with a concrete saw to a clean face and a primer is used before the bitumen.

My experience with cold poured bitumen such as roofing tar is that it comes out of the joint again within a year or so, it is brittle and it cracks.

Where a silage floor is basically sound, without potholes or soft areas, a variety of problems such as rough floors, open joints and small cracks can be covered by either -

1. A layer of strong sand and cement, preferably including an SBR additive and a cement/SBR mixture to wet the floor in front of the 1" layer as it is laid. Cover it with plastic for a week.

2. A new 4" - 5" floor laid on top of the old floor but separated from it by sand and polythene. It needs joints and should be covered with plastic for at least a week.

Potholes: If the existing floor contains potholes or soft areas where the slab is squeezing up and down, the foundation is soft and repairs such as 1 or 2 above are likely to be a waste of money. If a new slab is laid on top, it is likely that the new one will crack and break up also. The old floor and foundation should be dug out and a complete new silage pit installed using the Department specification.

Channels can be installed in existing floors by using a concrete saw, to cut a smooth edge and ensuring that there is 6" of strong concrete under the new channel. Silage effluent is more or less out of control if there is no joint at the front. Kerbs at the sides and back are as good as joints.

Aphid Alert: Aphid numbers have increased dramatically over the last week to 240/M2 from 60/M2. Consequently spring cereals are at high risk to infection by Barley Yellow Dwarf Virus. Yield losses of the order of 30% may be incurred due to BYDV. Trials by Teagasc Oakpark indicate control is best achieved by spraying a contact synthetic Pyrethroid Aphicide e.g. Cypersect, Decis, Sumi Alpha, Swat etc. at the 4 - 6 leaf stage of wheat, oats and barley.

Where cereals have been sprayed for Leatherjackets with Dursban, Clinch or Gammacol these products will also control Aphids.

Weeds: Ideally control weeds at the 3 - 6 leaf stage of the crop. Rates of herbicides may be reduced where the weed Spectrum is very susceptible to the chosen

N+ Trace Elements: Soil reserves of N are likely to be high this year because of low winter rainfall and high soil temperatures now. N top dress of spring barley should be completed at 1 - 3 leaf stage. Use maximum total N for malting barley of 70-90 Units/acre and feed barley 90-100 units where intensively cropped. The maximum N after ploughing grazed grass should be 40-50 units/acre. The main application of N to S. Wheat should be applied at tillering. Maximum total N should not exceed 110-130 units/acre on intensive tillage land. Do not use Urea under present dry conditions.

Trace Elements: Copper, zinc and maganese should be applied at the 3 - 5 leaf stage where a soil test indicates levels are low or where a positive deficiency is diagnosed. Magnesium may be applied where soil levels are low (less than 80 ppm). The inclusion of Mg when applying Zinc can improve performance.

If you have not done so and require assistance from Teagasc, please phone your local office immediately for an appointment. There is only a limited number of appointment times available at this stage.

Other issues include: (c) Capital allowance in respect of farm development work; (d) Application of the Family Income Supplement Scheme for farm families; (e) The treatment of expenditure of the acquisition of farm production quota for income tax purposes.

Other issues (c), (D) and (e) will be dealt with by Mr. Rory Quinn, T.D., Minister for Finance, Mr. Charles Mc-Creevy, T.D., F.F. spokesperson on finance, and Mr. Michael McDowell, T.D., P.D. spokesperson on finance.

The response from all public representatives will give a clear picture to farmers of ment of elected representa-tives to the farming community.
ICMSA CALLS FOR

RESOLUTION OF ANIMAL DRUG ISSUE

"Misguided claims that vets can only prescribe

Mr. O'Rourke said the purpose of the meeting should be to devise a proper code of practice on the operation of the new rules.

Dismayed Dairy Farmers Will Hold Minister Yates To **His Promise Of Aid For** Their Revaluation Losses

Waterford IFA Dairy Chairman, Michael Murphy (Tallow), has said that farmers had listened with extreme dismay to Minister for Agriculture Ivan Yates's glaring omission of their income plight in the aid package he announced on Wednesday, April 23. They will however hold him to his responsibility to deliver further national aid to off-set milk producers' revaluation losses.

"I am extremely disappointed that Minister Yates did not see fit to include dairy farmers and other farming sectors in the national aid package, which was designed to off-set the revaluation losses affecting milk, beef, cereal and sugar beet farmers," Mr. Murphy said.

"Dairy farmers' incomes have dropped by 30% over the last 12 months, half of which was a result the green £ revaluations. The loss per gallon of milk directly caused by revaluations amounts to 9p, and the EU aid forthcoming to



Safe Tractor Driving **Skills Course**

IFA President, John Donnelly has strongly welcomed the launch recently at IFA Headquarters of two important farm safety initiatives targeted at young people.

The first initiative is a safe tractor driving skills course targeted at 15 and 16 year olds. The course, developed by Teagasc and IFA, is available nationwide through the National Farm Relief Service. It provides intensive training of young people together with their parents in small groups.

The IFA President said: This valuable course will play a vital role in instilling in young people a thorough appreciation of the right way, and the safe way, to agricultural tractors on the farm at the outset of their career in farming."

The second programme is a Farm Safety Competition for Primary School children. Mr. Donnelly said that while IFA campaigns to increase safety awareness had helped

to reduce accidents and fatalities, the number of deaths and injuries on farms remained unacceptably

The fact that there have been five fatal accidents already in 1997 is alarming, especially given the improvements that have been achieved in recent years. Farm accidents involving young people are particularly tragic and every effort must be made to make young people more safety conscious, particularly around farm machinery."



Directional Signs **Needed At Abbeyside**

TELECOM GRANTED **PLANNING PERMISSION FOR DUNGARVAN**

MAST ANTI MAST CAMPAIGN ONLY BEGINNING

An order was signed last Monday by County Manager Donal Connolly granting full planning permission for five years to Telecom Eireann for a microwave mast in the centre of Dungarvan town.

As reported in last week's edition, despite strong public opposition and worries about possible health safety risks, it was general knowledge that Mr. Connolly had already made his mind up on the matter, a week prior to signing the order.

Attached to the permission are 10 conditions which Telecom are obliged to abide by. These conditions are made in the interests of orderly development, the protection of public health, visual amenity and aeronautical safety.

INDEPENDENT MONITORING

Following the construction of the mast on top of the Waterford Foods 'silo' building at Shandon, Telecom will be required by the local Council to have tests carried out by a mutually agreed independent body to ensure the mast complies with the relevant guideline limits for radiation levels. These tests will also take the output from other sources in the general area into account. The costs of these tests will be borne by Telecom and the findings will be issued directly to the local Council. No antennae, other than those detailed in the planning application will be placed on the new mast without the prior approval of Dungarvan U.D.C.

In addition to the initial independent testing, a system of independent monitoring of radiation levels will be established and undertaken periodically. All these monitoring records will be available for public inspection.

In the event of Telecom ceasing operations on the site, the antennae and mobile phone mast would be demolished and removed at the operators own expense unless the facility is disposed of to another suitably licensed operator.

The permission is limited to 5 years only at which time all antennae and support structures will be demolished and removed from the site unless Telecom receive permission to retain the facility.

This condition will enable the Council to review the operation of the facility in light of technological advances enabling the replacement of out-of-date technology with modern environmentally friendly designs where these have become available.

Another condition of the planning is that red light warning beacons be attached to the mast for aircraft

ANTI-CAMPAIGN ONLY BEGINNING


Although the order has been signed and sealed by the Urban Council, the Committee for a Microwave Mast Free Dungarvan say their campaign is only beginning to warm up.

In a press statement this week, the Committee claim hat the height of the microwave mast is not recorded on the application made by Telecom.

"The U.D.C. did not request the height of the mast from Telecom before making a decision to grant planning permission despite three separate written requests for this information since Christmas," stated committee member Colette O'Connell.

"For evil to flourish, all that is required is that good men do nothing," she quoted adding that it seems to the committee that the good people of Dungarvan have been too quiet for too long!!

day re-runs of past All Ireland finals that set me thinking about the seventies and eighties and how they compared then as good as or better than their counterparts now?

We are being forever forced to listen to the claim that standards of performance years ago were far superior to what the best of today's games have to offer; that the overall skill level was higher; that All Ireland finals in particular were far ahead of anything we have seen in the last decade.

The television evidence of the last two months gives food for thought. We had Limerick and Kilkenny in 1973 and 1974. The Cats were again involved in 1975 before Cork's three-in-a-row. Galway made a brave stand in 1979 with Joe McDonagh, now President of the G.A.A., leading them against Kilkenny. Joe played very steadily and had a good match, a great match when it is remembered that he had contracted tuberculosis shortly before the final and must have been in agony trying to cope with the pace of that game, played in very wet conditions. The final of 1980 saw Galway return to Croke Park on the first Sunday of September to take on Munster champions Limerick and emerge victorious. That game in particular, if it could be regarded as typical of that era, poses a few questions about hurling now and the game then.

Galway were worthy winners and care not one bit if I regard the opposition provided by the men in green as poor. I thought Limerick's hurling was far from what they displayed on the run up to the final. The simple reason why Galway celebrated afterwards was because they outscored the losers, which is how all victories are achieved. The Shannonsiders were riddled with weaknesses. They had two below average corner backs who must have greatly alarmed their fine full back Leonard Enright and never got out to the ball on a regular basis and didn't know how to tackle the man in possession. Consequently Bernie Forde and Noel Lane skinned them repeatedly and recorded most of their team's scores. A brother of the left full back operated at midfield and was only moderate. It was, however, in the forward line that the crucial weaknesses lay. Four of the six were outhurled leaving only Eamonn Cregan and Joe McKenna to supply the scoring threat. One of these four was at centre forward. He gripped the hurley wrongly and for all his athleticism achieved nothing all afternoon. He failed to score during the game, couldn't (and therefore didn't try to) strike one ball from his left side and was replaced in the second half. He was easy meat for the sturdy Sean Silke at centre back who dominated the half back line. How strange that the other three forwards could strike from the left side but definitely not from the right. Two of those were priests; not even the intervention of the Holy Spirit could have helped them. They were also weak and sided forward was small and quick but his marker was well aware of this handicap and knew every time exactly what he was going to do when he had the ball. In aggravation of the problem those four forwards never pulled on the ground, never varied the approach and switching them was a complete waste of time.

Eamonn Cregan was in startling contrast to those one-sided players. His striking from left and right was exemplary and his penalty struck

able spot on the Galway goal line — between Mick Connely the goalie and Joe Cooney on his left. Connelly, who played brilliantly, gripped the hurley with his left hand on top which meant that it was pointed to this right as he stood on the goal line. Cooney (brother of present day star Joe) had the orthodox righthand-on-top grip which pointed the hurley to his left. So when Eamonn saw the two hurleys pointing in opposite directions, he aimed his drive at the spot where no hurley intervened. As it happened both men, in an effort to save, moved their hurleys simultaneously but failed to cover the gap until the ball was already in the net. It is always better that the three defending the penalty should grip their hurleys in similar fashion. Coincidentally in the Leinster final of 1980 Padraig Horan's penalty for Offaly was placed between Ger Henderson and Noel Skehan, a left hander and a right hander who spoiled one another trying to swing the stick across to a ball which, although well struck, had nothing like the velocity of an Eddie Keher special.

Every midfielder should be good on a line ball, the sideline cut. That weak Limerick midfielder I have already alluded to, was only consistent to the extent that he missed every one he took! There is no real excuse for such lapses. The trainer should have monitored the practice of this skill during that long period of preparation before the big day, advised him and demonstrated to him how this free puck should be taken and ensured that he had regular practice before every championship game. The expert at sideline cuts owed nothing to chance for his success. Chaps like John Fenton, Cathal Casey and Joe McDonagh practiced every day without fail. There are three areas where these frees must be taken by the player in the immediate vicinity - corner back, wing back, midfield as well as the forward line where a midfielder usually takes the line ball. Not only points are possible from the line ball but goals. Those who remember it won't easily forget John Fenton's goal from the sideline puck in Limerick in the early eighties when Limerick provided the opposition or Paddy Kirwin of Offaly sending a line ball soaring up and over the bar from midfield in Croke Park in that some era to give Offaly a narrow win over Laois. Paddy, whom I got to know well on one of my visits to Birr where he demonstrated free taking, may have been one who for all his potential never put enough into training and who had a relaxed attitude to discipline but he certainly was a splendid artist with the hurley. Isn't that sad given that playing careers are with some notable exceptions, cruelly short.

Still pondering on 1980 do you remember the All Ireland football final between Kerry and Roscommon? I must confess that I had to winning that game until TnaG gave us another look at it. Some things about the match stick in the memory. There was Roscommon's sensational start to go 1-1 up after a couple of minutes. There was the gross misuse of the solo run by the same team. Every player felt impelled to embark on a run with the ball, even the defenders, and the subsequent distribution of the ball was very poor.

He then stood, shuffled his feet, toetapped, dithered to the point of confusion and just remained basically in the same place, making no progress. The other forwards performed all kinds of manoeuvres except shoot for a point, hence the miserable team total of 1-6, the individual match score of many a good player in similar matches. There was no incisiveness, no quick transfer of the ball of which we got one glimpse in the build up to that early goal. There was an absence of conviction.

> Who really surprised and disappointed me was Dermot Early. Dermot always exemplified throughout a distinguished career what was and is best in football and enjoyed the kind of reputation which would have seen him selected at midfield on any national team of that time. An excellent kicker of the ball, and fine fielder, Dermot misused possession to an alarming degree. He again and again gave the ball away mostly by using the drop-kick which is slower and notoriously inaccurate and for a man of his undoubted football ability he missed a few frees. Roscommon's free taking was only fair, generally speaking. Another surprise for me was Dermot's attempt at tackling. Unfailingly he gripped his opponent and held on to him giving away free after free. How dreadful to witness a good footballer resort to such a crude and expensive tactic. The poor refereeing helped neither team but Kerry's attacking flair and inventiveness just about earned them victory by a slim enough three point margin. Charlie Nelligan's great save from O'Connor's shot 10 minutes from the end and Egan's immense work rate tilted the balance in favour of the Kingdom after what was a rough over-physical

All of that happened almost 20 years ago and immediately prompts a comparison between the games now and the games then. Was there a higher standard then? Of fielding, kicking and passing in football and of tackling? Of striking the sliotar, of ground play, support play, of giving and receiving a pass in hurling? We're the games more sporting, faster more enjoyable? Well "ni lia duine na tuairim," so many people, so many opinions. I don't think that it can be denied that today's games are faster, that players are fitter but equally true it is that players of 20 or 30 or 40 years ago were more skilled at striking in hurling or kicking in football despite what the 1980 All Ireland finals showed. And let us not forget that the sliotars and footballs were far different in those days. Then, the football was of heavy leather which used to absorb all the moisture on a wet day. The sliotar, too, was much heavier and had a bigger rim which made striking more difficult. All equipment was less streamlined and far heavier than today's. Hurleys had more timber in them. Many players of 40 years ago, weren't aware of the necessity to have a hurley of the correct weight and length to suit individual tastes. I remember weighting all my hurleys and "doctoring" them failed to record a single score. The third left forgotten how near the men of the West came to ensure that each topped the scales at one pound five ounces. Boots differed greatly from today's footwear and were strong and heavy but far from comfortable.

So with the overall increase in fitness and the enormous investment in physiotherapists, dieticians, masseurs and medical support are we seeing better games now than those we watched then? Many would claim that time's nostalgic influence colours our recollections and blinds us to the excellence of today's exciting games. What do you think?

Being one of the elite group, whose names were household words at the time, Billy's name will, along with his colleagues, remain enshrined in our history for

a very long time to come.

His brothers Ambrose (he played in the Munster final), James and Tom were also among the top players in the county with Portlaw at that time. In our history making bid in 1948 when Billy was named on the programme as a Clonea player, he played at right corner forward and scored 1-1 of our total of 6-7 against Dublin (4-2).

Before and after the '48 final, Billy played many outstanding games with his clubs and county and after his retirement in the early fifties, he continued to support the county, travelling all over when they played games.

His only son, John, was Waterford's first All Star and he too gave outstanding service to the county, playing at full back in two Munster finals.

Billy is survived by his wife Nellie, son John and daughters Rosarie and Mary to whom we extend our very sincere sympathy.


Presuming that the Minor football team will not qualify, we are left with five further chances in the Munster Championships.

Motorcycle Collision At Cappoquin

same direction.

Twenty one year old mother of two, Elizabeth Allen of Shanbally, Cappoquin was walking with some family members and friends along the Melleray Road when the tragedy occurred.

She had already walked past her house by some 200 yards and was accompanying her friends part of the way home.

A collision subsequently took place on the left side of the road between herself and a motorcycle driven by 23 year old Maurice Corcoran, Sunlawn, Affane. Ms. Allen was struck and fatally injured by the bike. The motorcycle then went out of control and collided with a stone fence along the Melleray Road on the right hand side.

Both Elizabeth Allen and Maurice Corcoran died instantly.

A third person involved in the tragedy was a pillion passenger on the motorcycle

pedestrian, walking in the Anne Farrell, who is in her early 20's and lives at the Dane's Field, Cappoquin. She sustained serious injuries in the accident and was taken to Cork Regional Hospital where she is said to be in a comfortable condition.

> Sergeant Pat Norris of Lismore was the officer at the scene. He was accompanied by Dr. Pat Hill of Cappoquin, local parish priest Fr. Arthur and Fr. Rogers C.C.

> The bodies were removed to Waterford Regional Hospital where a post mortem was carried out on Saturday afternoon.

> Maurice Corcoran was an employee of Cappoquin Chickens Ltd. He was also member of the Affane/Cappoquin G.A.A.

> Ms. Allen was one of a family of seven and a single

parent of two infant children, the youngest of them just 3 months old. To their grief strickened

family and friends we extend our sincere sympathy.


