Know Your Rights

QUESTION

My grandfather died on January 1st last and I am the executor of his will. My grandfather was 75 years old at the time of his death and had been in receipt of a full Non-Contributory (means tested) Old Age Pension. When his will came to be read, it turned out that five years ago he had won £50,000 in a Prize Bond Draw. This fact had not been notified to the Department of Social Welfare. Is there money due back to the Department and how should I proceed at this stage?

ANSWER

The responsibilities of an executor where a person dies having been in receipt of a means tested payment are set out in Section 280 of the Social Welfare Consolidation Act of 1993. The procedure is as fol-

Within three months of the death, the executor of the will must notify the Department of Social Welfare of the intention to distribute the assets of the estate. Ideally, this notice should be to the Section which was making the payment to the individual concerned - in this case it would be the Non Contributory Old Age Pension payments section in Sligo but notification can be made to the local Social Welfare Office or to one of the principal offices in Dublin.

The Department then has three months to get back to the executor with confirmation that an overpayment has been made. If the Department gets back to the executor within that three months, the executor should await confirmation from the Department of the amount due to be repaid to the Department from the estate of the deceased. When that figure has been notified by the Department to the executor, the executor should arrange to have that amount repaid to the Department before proceeding to distribute the rest of the estate.

If, having been duly notified that a repayment is due to the Department, the executor goes ahead and distributes the estate anyway, then the Department of Social Welfare has six years to take whatever legal steps necessary to recoup the overpayment. In such a situation the Department would hold the executor personally liable for the repayment of any monies due to it. This is provided for in Section 41 of the Social Welfare Act of 1996.

The Underfunding Of Irish Primary **Education**

At a recent seminar in resources and funding were Clonea Strand Hotel, organised by the National Parents Council, the Catholic Primary School Management Association and the Irish Teachers Organisation, the severe lack of Government funding for Primary Education was described to the representative gathering. Michael O Sheadha, Lismore, Chairman of the Diocesan CPSMA, welcomed the main speakers Melwyn Godinho from NPC, Fr. Bergin, Thurles, Declan Kelleher, I.N.T.O., Brian O'Shea T.D. and General Election candidates Katherine Bulbulia and Dermot Kirwan.

Emphasising the importance of a firm foundation to ensure success at Second Level, Mr. Godinho said that

an absolute necessity. It is regrettable, he said, that we have now a two-tier system; some schools have a Parents Council ensuring that funds are provided, while many had no such group.

In thanking Mr. Godinho, Mr. O Sheadhla acknowledged the major contribution of parents to the success of

Primary Schools.
Brian O'Shea, himself a teacher, spoke of the Labour Party manifesto and a commitment to eliminating educational disadvantage. He said that what Education Minister Niamh Breathnach had done to improve Primary Education would be a platform for further improvements in funding when the Labour Party returns to power.

Declan Kelleher, who represents Waterford, Tipperary and Clare on the Executive of the INTO highlighted the disparity in Primary and Secondary funding. "This would not be tolerated in any other EU country", he said. He said that the £100,000 raised by parents groups in Co. Waterford last year went mainly into "nuts and bolts" while many schools did not have even minimum equipment. Twenty schools in Waterford still have no access to Remedial Education after thirty years of the scheme.

"Primary School is the only sector attended by all" said Katherine Bulbulia and she committed the Progressive Democrats to fair and transparent ways to allocate funds to schools. They money saved on the proposed Education Boards educate their pupils. could be channelled into Pri- Fr. Richard Doherty said mary Schools, she said.

while canvassing throughout Waterford he had become aware of the problem of underfunding in Primary Education. He mentioned especially the need for resources to support the Integration of Special Needs pupils and the arbitrary decision to reduce one school in the area to a one-teacher status. When the discussion was opened to the large attendance, Victor Mullins, Principal of Ardmore N.S., said that he and his staff were acutely aware of the effects of underfunding. It is particularly obvious now as the school is involved in a European Education Partnership with schools in Norway and Holland. He described us as the poor relation in pupil/teacher ratio, information technology, specialist teacher provision, substitute cover, care-taking. education resources and many other areas of provision.

Noel Brennan, Principal of St. John's School, Dungarvan, spoke of teachers commitment to keeping abreast of developments in education through in-service courses. It is very frustrating, he said, for teachers to be given all the latest ideas in education and then find they are expected to be as resourceful as ever and teach without the necessary equipment. Rosemary O'Riordan, a teacher and parent, said that every school is disadvantaged, both in urban and rural areas, to the extent that teachers find themselves spending their own money to

that apart from the huge Dermot Kirwan said that problem of lack of money to carry out maintenance works it is frustrating in the extreme when a Board is caught between the Department of Education and the Board of Works. "The parish is caught in the middle and has to pay bills while they make up their minds," he said. In closing the meeting, Michael O Sheaghdha thanked all speakers for their contributions and urged that we continue to lobby on the important issue of underfunding. He said that his partnership approach of parents, teachers and management was the path for the future.

SEHB set about finalising a development plan designed to meet immediate and future needs which have now resulted in the newly decorated and transformed Bal-

lyduff Health Centre. Speaking at the opening ceremony, SEHB Chairman Mr. Deering said; "those of you who knew the original building will, I am sure, agree that the transformation is startling".

After viewing the premises, Mr. Deering compli-mented all involved in its planning, design and construction. In particular, he complimented the technical services officer and his department, especially Elaine Hannon and Colm Walsh on the design format, E. O'Brien Ltd. building contractors and site support staff from Waterford Re-

gional Hospital. Mr. Deering revealed that the new health centre will accommodate the services of the GP and staff, the public health nurse, community welfare officer and area medical officer services.

"Our enhanced nursing and medical rooms will provide greater flexibility in providing services such as child development clinics, dressings, blood pressure checks, etc.",

said Mr. Deering.
"As part of a pilot development for physiotherapy ser-vices in the West Waterford area, it is also proposed to include Ballyduff Health Centre in the delivery of a GP accessed physiotherapy s ervice", Mr. Deering stated, adding that Ballyduff now has available to it a modern health facility to meet current and future needs.

On a final note, the Board chairman extended a special word of thanks to Dr. T.A. O'Donovan who recently retired from the general medical services having served the population of the Ballyduff area with distinction for many years.

FARMERS DEMAND STRAIGHT ANSWERS

By AISLING CONROY

While farmer shareholders of Waterford Foods may have a fair idea of which candidate will receive their number one vote on election day this Friday, there is still a huge amount of 'don't knows' when it comes to whether or not they'll vote in favour of the Avonmore Foods merger package.

A date for the crucial Special General Meeting of Waterford's 5,500 shareholders has not yet been finalised but is expected to take place in a matter of weeks coinciding with Avonmore's own Special General Meeting on the same day.

If 75% of those attending this meeting fail to give the Avonmore proposal their backing, then the £2.5 billion merger between the two dairy groups will collapse. The same scenario applies to the Special General Meeting of Avonmore shareholders. Alternatively if a 75% majority vote is recorded in favour of the merger, then a second meeting of shareholders will be held two weeks later at which another 3/4 majority is required for success.

The burning issue however for many undecided farmers which has yet to be addressed is what happens to the milk price after the year 2000 when the Avonmore/Waterford pledge on the payment of 3p above the average market milk price runs out.

runs out. REBEL FARMERS SAY NO

Suppliers and other interested parties in the hinterland of Waterford Foods plants in Dungarvan and Kilmeaden are still quite resistant to the merger with Avonmore Co-Op.

Over 250 rebel farmers calling themselves the Waterford Farmers Action Group (W.F.A.G.) have vowed to veto the merger after rejecting the deal as a sell-out and are now seeking the support of the company's employees.

ny's employees.

W.F.A.G. founder and one of the Directors of Waterford Co-Op John Cashman of Cappagh told the "Leader" that the group is now fighting for Dungarvan and farm families livelihoods.

"While the offer was gen-

"While the offer was generous to management, to the banking institutions, the pension funds and the stockbrokers", said Mr. Cashman, "it sadly omitted to recognise the future needs of the milk suppliers, nor did it include the mechanism by which the co-operative majority would control the plc. majority."

Mr. Cashman said that five other Co-Op board members have also vowed to reject the merger together with a huge number of farmers in the Kilmeaden area.

At present Mr. Cashman is organising opposition to the merger and will stage a meeting on Thursday night at 9 p.m. in the Park Hotel, Dungarvan to which frade union officials, workers and farmers are all invited to attend

W.F.A.G. is now advising all shareholders in Waterford Co-Operative Society to reject Avonmore's "incomplete offer" so that proper negotiations can take place.

According to Mr. Cashman who is a longtime critic of Waterford Foods management, rationalisation plans and job loss figures are already known to management.

"We want to knock the hell out of this merger", Mr. Cashman strongly declared. STRAIGHT TALKING

NEEDED

It is perhaps unfair to leave the burden of job cuts and rationalisation threats on the shoulders of farmer share-holders in the absence of any definite plans announced by management.

Surely the top executives must have some inkling of the likely consequences for Dungarvan and the county.

While the research and development laboratories at Shandon may be salvaged under the new super company, what will be the fate of the local milk powder facility and the company's head-quarters in Main Street.

For farmers however the choices are stark, particularly in light of reported proposals to dismantle the EU milk quota regime. The economic inevitability of the need for the merger between

the Dungarvan and Kilkenny firm is recognised by most Waterford suppliers. Deep rooted doubts still remain however. While market analysts view the proposed merger of Avonmore and Waterford Foods as a watershed in the developing Irish food industry, locals remain anxious about the effects of job losses on the community and the future for a oncebrilliant Co. Waterford company.

Nostalgic pride and co-operative loyalty are sentiments held by many shareholders who have enjoyed a solid relationship with Waterford over the years. Many farmers recognise that Avonmore is getting the largest milk food in Ireland and using Waterford's own resources to dilute farmers' involvement in the group.

Straight talking and frank answers are needed from those 'in the know' before the concerns of many are al-

KICK IN THE TEETH

ny's cost savings plan.
Jimmy Kelly of the Socialist Workers Party has stated that very little attention is being drawn to the fact that up to 300 people stand to lose their livelihoods.

Mr. Kelly encouraged workers at Waterford Foods to insist now before the merger goes through, that the company guarantee every job - taking industrial action if necessary to make clear that workers "will not simply be treated as statistics on the ledgers".

WORKERS IN DARK

Local Labour Councillor Billy Kyne has also voiced his criticism of how the merger deal unfolded in recent weeks.

Cllr. Kyne who was employed by Waterford Foods since 1966 said the national media fell "hook, line and sinker" for the tactics of Avonmore and Waterford's joint press conference in Dublin where, he claimed, every question was framed to accommodate positive developments and opportunities.

"It was unbelievable to see these journalists failing to raise critical questions of job loss, rationalisation or negative implications for the community as a result of the proposed merger," said Cllr. Kyne.

As a trade union representative with members in both Avonmore and Waterford Foods, Cllr. Kyne said he will be working together with all other unions to protect the interests of all employees and to maximise any opportunities that may lie ahead in such a challenging merger.

Cllr. Kyne stated that the merger cannot have been brought to where it is now without an assessment of the group's working operations.

"Yet nowhere in the many pages of their attractive press releases have they even indicated that jobs can be under threat," he declared.

Workers at local plant level who helped build up the industry are being left totally in the dark, said Cllr. Kyne, who added that it is in effect a black out of any clear information regarding company proposals or strategies.

"We're all realists," he added, "and workers in the dairy industry have seen the effects of rationalisation without any hand outs from Europe for many years."

"The economists in both companies are highlighting what they term as opportunity but conveniently fail to identify plants and jobs that, by any criteria, must be under threat".

Cllr. Kyne said he personally felt that workers in Waterford Foods cannot afford to be bought out by what he termed as the soft cell of media spin doctors but must stand up for themselves strongly on this occasion.

"For our community in Dungarvan and West Waterford the immediate impact must obviously be to the corporate headquarter status of Waterford Foods which in itself is a significant employer.

The coming weeks will see many meetings and press statements but workers want real answers to questions that affect their livelihoods.

Hopefully the prime ingredient of any company i.e. the workers, will now get full consideration enabling them to contribute significantly to the debate about their future from which, so far, they have been excluded from," he stated.

"The South East T.V. Deflector Association will be applying for a licence as soon as possible. However, on legal advice, it does not seem that Mr. Duke's recent statement about the licensing procedure will help in any may those members of the Association, or any deflector group, facing High Court Action on June 9th, three days after the general election.

"Going into an election, it is very annoying to have thousands of homes deprived (by High Court injunctions) of their normal tv enjoyment. It is difficult to understand the silence of some of the political parties, who seem for some reason, to be afraid to speak out about the unfairness of this entire situation.

"At the present time a deflector group, which has been providing multi channel choice for almost 20 years, can apply only now for an operating licence; and despite its efficient service over such a long period of time on a community basis, that group can have no certainty of obtaining a licence to continue that service.

"Despite enormous opposition and difficulties 20 years ago, it was only due to the determination of community deflector groups that rural Ireland got the multi channel tv service to which it was entitled, and I am proud of the fact that our association brought so much enjoyment at minimal cost to young and old in rural communities".

Minor League — Sunday, June 1st. Listowel v Lismore.





his Week In The Garden

Repot Auriculas

If you grow auriculas in pots now is the time to repot them. Shake the old soil from the roots and make certain these have no woolly aphid on them. If it is present, wash the roots in a solution of derris or HCH, then report either in 9 or 10 cm pots, reducing the size of the plants if necessary and using a compost of four parts of loam, one part of dried cow manure, one part of leaf mould and one part of mixed sand and crushed oyster shell. Pot firmly, water freely ad place in a frame or sheltered place outdoors. You can remove offsets with roots if you wish and pot them separately.

Divide Auriculas Polyanthuses and Primroses

These plants, growing in the open, may be lifted and divided if they are good selected varieties. With ordinary mixed strains it is better to raise a new stock each year from seed, as the old plants get weakened by attacks from greenfly, red spider mite and other pests.

Dig Early Potatoes

Potatoes planted at the end of February will probably be ready for digging. Lift one or two roots and see what kind of a crop there is. There is no point in waiting for the tubers to mature. So long as they are big enough to be used, lift them, but only as you actually need them. It is a mistake to dig too many early potatoes at once for they lose quality rapidly out of the ground.

Start To Thin Apples and Pears

You will now be able to see how many fruits have been formed on your apple and pear trees. It is no use leaving too many, as they will be misshapen, small and poor in quality. Usually one per spur is enough, and two should be regarded as the maximum. If there is more than this the weakest or least satisfactory will have to be removed, and you can begin to do this now, but do not complete the work yet, for there is usually a fairly heavy natural fall later in the

Baskets: A Sure Sign Of Summer

Nothing graces a terrace, porch or patio better than a hanging basket with a selection of summer flowers.

And a hanging basket in full bloom is a sure sign that summer has arrived.

Baskets can be hung from trees, beams, eaves and frames of all kinds. and many a country railway station has won a best-kept competition on the strength of its hanging baskets.

The great thing about hanging baskets is that they can be used to grow and display virtually any kind of flower, although geraniums, petunias, fuchsias and shamrock are among the more popular.

But if your baskets aren't ready yet, you'd better get a

move on. For best results, hanging baskets should be prepared in the spring, dressing your flowers with plenty of fem, climbing plant, moss and foliage.

Your basket should then be left in the greenhouse for about a month.

Then, when summer is here and all danger of frost is past, they can be hung in the sunshine or shade and you can lap up the praise as visitors express their admiration for your colourful hanging baskets.

But even if you did not plan ahead, there is still time to get a beautiful display prepared for the height of summer provided you pick reasonably mature plants.

Recommended plants include ivy-leafed geraniums, petunias, trailing lobelia, bedding begonias, nasturtiums, spider plant and bedding fuchsias - which grow up to three feet tall and make a particularly impressive centrepiece in a large basket.

Irish Soldiers Of The First Worl

In 1914, after forty years after one year or whenever of political agitation by the Irish Nationalist Party, home rule for Ireland was finally passed at Westminster. Weeks after the outbreak of World War 1, King George signed the bill into law, to come into effect

This is the story of one Dungarvan man who died in 1917 and received four military decorations including the highly prized Albert Medal.

BRAVEST OF THE BRAVE

Sergeant Michael Healy Am DCM MM&Bar

2nd Battalion Royal Munster Fusiliers

[By Allan Stanistreet]

It falls to very few people to be decorated for gallantry four times, and of the 571 men and women who received the rare decoration of the Albert Medal (now the George Cross, the Unit-ed Kingdom's "civilian" award for gallantry) Michael Healy is one of the only two such men.

Although Michael Healy's gallantry is mentioned in the Munster's Official History of World War One, we know very little about the man himself. He came from Dungarvan*. I think the one in County Waterford rather than the one in County Kilkenny, although before the outbreak of war in 1914, he moved to Pontardawe in South Wales, where he worked in one of the steel works. It was from here that he enlisted, probably in 1915.]] Certainly on the 24th of May 1915 he went to France.

It is at present unclear what Sergeant Healy was doing in the fifteen months between his arrival in France and his first award of the Military Medal. Few, if any, citations were published for award of the MM in World War One. No fewer than 115,000 awards were made during the war and it would have been administratively difficult, if not impossible, to chronicle all of them. Suffice it to say that Healy's was announced in the London Gazette of August 10th 1916. Next month, on 22nd September, he was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal, his citation reading:

"For conspicuous gal-lantry in stemming, with a few others, an enemy onrush with bombs and, subsequently, leading a counter attack, which succeeded in reaching the objective." According to the official history, his commanding officer witnessed this exploit personally. Healy received a Bar to MM in the London Gazette on October 22nd 1916; thus he was decorated three times in as many months.

Only five months later,

Michael Healy was to make the ultimate sacriand receive the highest decoration for gallantry not in the presence of an enemy". The London Gazette of January 4th 1918 carried the followaning nouncement: "The King been graciously

pleased to award the decoration of the Albert Medal in recognition of the gallant action of Sergeant Michael Healy, Royal Munster Fusiliers, in saving life in France, in March last, at the cost of his own life. The circumstances are as follows:

In Franc, on March 1st 1917, during bombing practice, a live bomb failed to clear the parapet and rolled back into the trench, which was occupied by the thrower, an officer and Sergeant Healy. All three men ran for shelter, but Sergeant Healy, fearing that the others would not reach shelter in time, ran back and picked up the bomb, which exploded and mortally wounded him. Sergeant Healy had previously performed other acts of distinguished gallantry, for which he has been awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal, the Military Medal and a Bar to the Military Medal."

Only the RSM Ring re-ceived four gallantry awards.

Sergeant Michael Healy died of his wounds on March 2nd 1917, and was laid to rest in Bray Military Cemetery, France, Plot 2, Row B, Grave 53. His mother was invited to Buckingham Palace to receive her son's Albert Medal and she was afterwards to say, "it was quite

about the food situation and hoped that I did not have to wait in queues.'

It is understood from a correspondent that Sergeant Healy's fine group of medals is still in family possession. One can only hope that they will remain so. Only three Irishmen received the Albert Medal and two of these were posthumous awards for the First World War. In its time the AL was not lightly

awarded and Michael Healy's great gallantry reflects much credit upon the man himself and his coun-

I am endeavouring to research the lives of all 571 Albert Medallists and I would very much appreciate any assistance which may be offered in the way of material or photographs of the recipients.



BREEDING SUCKLER COWS Breeding Suckler Cows

The peak breeding season for suckler cows is just beginning. A compact calving spread offers advantages in relation to herd management and in many cases extra money by having an even group of cattle for sale by target date.

Generally a wide calving spread indicates difficulty with getting cows in calf with a resulting long interval between calvings. The targets are a calving interval of about 365 days and a calving spread of about 8 weeks or to have 90% of your herd calving within an 8 week period.

Post Partum Interval

The length of time between calving and first heat is called the post partum interval. In order to achieve the above targets, it is necessary to have a short post partum interval. The average gestation length is about 285 days. In order to maintain a calving interval of 365 days, the cow must be back in calf within 80 days.

The average calving to first heat interval is estimated at 60 days for suckler cows. Assuming cows are detected and served or inseminated at first heat this leaves just one repeat by day 365 after the previous calving.

Conception rates to first heat are quite low (25% to 30%) and therefore a large number of cows will repeat if inseminated to first heat. In many cases the first heat is a silent heat and not detected. Ideally cows should be served or inseminated at second heat.

If cows can be brought into heat by day 35-40 after calving, they can be inseminated at second heat around day 60 and this leaves time for a repeat insemination around day 80 and still maintain a calving interval of 365 days. Two factors have a major influence on the interval between calving and first heat.

1. Cow condition. 2. Suckling effect. **Cow Condition**

Thin cows take much longer to return to heat post calving. The recommendation from Michael Diskin at Belclare is that cows should be at condition score 2.5 at calving (loin bones easily felt, but not sharp). Thin cows should not be allowed lose weight post calving, fat cows at condition score 3 or better can afford drop back to condition score 2.5 or slightly less but do not allow them to continue to lose weight during the breeding season. Suckling Effect

Research at Belclare also shows that removal of calves from the cows and allowing restricted suckling (once or twice a day) shortened the post partum interval by about 15 days. If calves are isolated from cows (out of sight) the interval to first heat was shortened by 24 days. Restricted suckling had the biggest effect on thin cows.

Heat Detection

About 50% suckler cows are bred to A.I. heat detection is therefore a crucial element in the success of the breeding programme. Cows should be carefully checked at least 3 times a day including early morning and late evening. Take time at each heat to check and look out for all the signs of heat. The signs of heat are less intense in suckling cows than in dairy cows and heifers.

To improve detection rates, run a few light steers with the suckler herd or use a young teaser (vasectomised) bull that may be castrated later. Strong bull calves before they have reached puberty are also useful for detecting cows in heat or about to come in heat. Tail painting is of limited use but may help in conjunction with steers or a teaser where the mounting activity is in-

SHEEP: Parasites

Lambs born in the first half of March are now 10 weeks old or so. They are now due for their second stomach worm dose if it hasn't already been given. This treatment will control any late Mematodirus infection but its major role is to inhibit the development of high infestation of pastures with the later stomach worm types such as Ostertagia and Trichostrongylus species. Hill Lambs

Early April born hill lambs are almost 2 months old now and are well due to a stomach worm dose. These flocks are often grazed very tightly on the same ground each year making Mematodirus a particular risk.

Hill flocks in general had an exceptionally good start to the season with ideal conditions at lambing. The main problem now is grass shortage - shifting dry ewes and ewes rearing single ewe lambs to the mountain as soon as possible while applying extra nitrogen to green land is more cost effective than meal/leeding, Aut out of

TAXATION OF FARM

FAMILIES

Personal Allowances — Farmers and other self-employed have lower total personal allowances compared to PAYE tax-payers. Farmers do not qualify for the additional £800 employee allowance which PAYE taxpayers receive. Therefore, a farm family has £1,600 less total personal allowances than a family where both spouses are employed taxed under PAYE. As a result, farm families are grossly discriminated against.

ICMSA proposals on in-come tax have two objectives — (1) Self-employed and PAYE tax payers should have the same personal allowances. This is to be achieved by abolishing the PAYE allowances and increasing the personal allowances by £800 and £1,600 for a single and married couple respectively. (2) - The emphasis on tax reform should be the exemption of low income families from income tax and a considerable reduction in the income tax burden on families with average incomes.

It is totally unacceptable to ICMSA that a farm family with £15,000 income, for example, pays £488 more income tax than a family tion (1982) recommended

with the same income where both spouses are taxed under PAYE. The basic personal allowance should be increased by £800 for a single person and £1600 for a married couple in conjunction with the abolition of the PAYE allowance.

This could be phased over a two year period, com-mencing in 1998. This adjustment in the tax code would not affect the income tax position of a two income family taxed under PAYE. However, it would remove a major source of discrimination against all the self-employed and furthermore it would improve the after tax income position of single income families.

The 26% tax band should be increased to at least £12,000 and £24,000 for a single person and a married couple respectively.

Background to the special PAYE allowance — In 1980 the Minister for finance provided a special employee allowance of £400 for each PAYE tax-payer because he claimed that self-employed tax-payers had an advantage of paying tax on a previous year basis. Farmers and other self-employed taxpayers now pay tax on a current year basis. In 1981, the PAYE allowance was increased to £600, to £700 in 1986 and to £800 in 1988. In the meantime the normal tax allowance for children has been abolished.

The Commission on Taxa-

that all tax-payers should get the same personal allowance when the basis of assessment are brought into line. As all tax-payers are now on a current year of assessment the recommendation of the Commission on Taxation should be acted upon. The Task Force on Small Business (1994) recommended that the PAYE allowance should be extended to all self-employed taxpayers and their spouses engaged in the family busi-

ness.
LOW INCOME FARM FAMILIES AND THE FAMILY INCOME SUPPLEMENT SCHEME

Farm families on low incomes with child dependents do not qualify for the Family Income Supplement Scheme (FIS) as currently designed. The recently launched National Anti-Poverty Strategy, by not extending FIS to farming families, completely fails to address the major issue of rural poverty.

PROPOSAL

The FIS scheme should be changed so that farm families on low incomes and with child dependents receive the full benefit of the FIS Scheme, similar to PAYE families on similar income levels. The problem of low family farm income has increased due to the cattle crisis and the major fall in milk price. Unfortunately, low family income, is a long-term problem which has not and will not be resolved by CAP payments alone.

Specifically, a high number of families with depen-dent children who are totally dependent on agri-culture are experiencing severe income problems and poverty. The ESRI, in their report "Poverty, Income and Welfare in Ireland," have identified farming families as households most likely to face poverty with the exception of the unemployed.

FAMILY FARM INCOME 1995

Over one quarter of all full-time farmers had family incomes of less than £10,000 in 1995.

Only a small minority (4.2%) of full-time farm families were in receipt of unemployment benefit/assistance. When all farms (full-time and part-time) are included, only about 12 per cent of farm households are in receipt of unemployment payments.

Taking account of the long-term and growing problem of low incomes in farming particularly for farm families with children, ICMSA again strongly proposes that the FIS be extended to farm families.

We believe that this is required in order to give effect to the principles of social equality as set out in Partnership 2000 and to focus income support on families with child dependents.

IFA Welcomes Resolution Of TB Testing Dispute

Waterford IFA Co. Chairman, James Coughlan, has said that the IFA welcomes the resolution of the difficulties over payments for contiguous TB herd testing.

Mr. Coughlan said that the announcement by the Department that farmers will not have to pay for contiguous testing within 10 months of paying for their last herd test, was in line with the spirit of the agreement between the Minister for Agri-culture and the farm organisations over the new TB scheme.

Mr. Coughlan said that under the agreement negotiated by the IFA, for 1998 and 1999 the Department will pay for all the advanced tests such as contiguous TB herd testing, six months TB check testing and other special TB check testing required by the District annual herd test.

Veterinary Officers where farmers have paid for their herd tests within the preceding ten months. The £2m cost of the testing will be covered by Brussels funding for TB eradication. Should the DVO decide that further herd tests are required later in the year, the first of any such tests will be paid for by the farmers concerned.

Mr. Coughlan added the Department of Agriculture has already agreed to pay for all contiguous Brucellosis herd testing required by the DVO's during 1997 to help stamp out the disease.

Mr. Coughlan stated that farmers who have already paid for their advanced TB herd testing during 1997 should be offered the option of a further free TB herd test later in the year to coincide with the normal time of their

IFA Says Farmers Should Demand 85p/kg For Wool

Waterford IFA Sheep is clean of all foreign mate-Committee Chairman, Harry Gray, has said that farmers should demand up to 85p.kg for quality wool and he accused wool buyers of a concerted drive to keep prices down to as low as 65p/kg to farmers.

Mr. Gray accused the wool buyers of attempting to set prices as low as 65p/kg. The major wool buyers have attempted to set prices artificially as low as 65p/kg but pressure particularly from Sherlock's in Navan has broken the price ring and up to 75p/kg is now freely available in the Meath area." He said there is no reason why prices in this order should not be available throughout the

country.
The Waterford IFA sheep farmer leader said that based on the last Bradford sale of Scottish wool on May 15, the Department of Agriculture has specified an Irish guide price for lowland

wool at 83p/kg.
Mr. Gray said that IFA and sheep farmers were not prepared to allow the wool market be manipulated negatively and prices to farmers held down artificially. 'Farmers should apply maximum pressure on their wool buyers for a price of up to 85p/kg."

The IFA man said it is critical that farmers only supply quality wool which has been shom in top class condition, rial and properly rolled and

Waterford IFA **Grain Chairman Dismayed At Level Of Cereal Imports**

Waterford IFA Grain Committee Chairman, Alex Heskin, has said he was "absolutely dismayed" at the enormous quantity of cereals imported by compounders and traders in 1996 in spite of exceptionally good harvests in both 1995 and 1996.

Mr. Heskin was responding to the May edition of the Cereals Association of Ireland market intelligence bulletin which indicated that cereal imports reached 363,000 tonnes in 1996 while exports only amounted to 90,000 tonnes. The Waterford Grain Chairman said "it is unacceptable to Irish grain growers and the Irish grain industry that 363,000 tonnes of cereals were imported in 1996 when over 2.1 million tonnes of native grain were produced last harvest. It is no wonder that the grain market was so sluggish for such a long period after the harvest?" משוני לודוכשוץ.

All You Need To Know About The Long-Necked Monster

The Diplodocus was one of the biggest dinosaurs ever to walk the earth.

Diplodocus looked extraordinary with its long neck and tail, and a head that was tiny, fitting its lifestyle perfectly.

It could reach up to feed at the tops of very tall trees, like conifers, that grew at the time. Its small head allowed it to browse amongst the vegetation, where few other dinosaurs could reach. This type of feeding needed a special type of neck - one that was strong, light and flexible, in

order to be raised and lowered eas- feeding grounds.

Having stripped one area bare of food, it would have ambled off with its companions in search of new

If Diplodocus was threatened by a meat eater, its only defence would have been its bulk, and its long, whiplike tail.

DID YOU KNOW?

Diplodocus had quite narrow feet in proportion to its body weight. It would have grazed on dry, firm ground where it would browse its way through conifer forests. It would probably have been part of a herd. The Diplodocus was 86 feet long and weighed 15 tons.

Giraffes are a little like Diplodocus, reaching up with their long necks to the tree tops to feed. However, they are unlike the dinosaur as the giraffe can chew its food and so does not need such a large belly. The Cucas plant would have formed part of the Diplodocus' diet.


Voodpecker

over 200 There are species of woodpeckers in the world. Most of them usually make nesting holes in trees each year, but this is not the only cause of the tapping you can hear in the woods. When woodpeckers want to attract a mate or to warn off other birds, he taps his bill on hollow branches. When woodpeckers hammer at trees, they do not hurt themselves, because their heads and neck are specially adapted to take the shock. The woodpeckers toes in most cases, are unusual - they have two toes pointing forward and two pointing back on each foot. This enables them to climb easily and cling on to tree trunks. The woodpeckers nails are strong and this helps them to stay upright when clinging to a tree. In the breeding season, woodpeckers make holes in the trunk of The male and trees.

female take turns in doing this - or they might just make a hole that is already there bigger. The chippings from the hollowed out tree fall into the hole and some of these form the lining of the nest. The eggs take about twelve days to hatch and when the chicks are born they are blind at first. When the parents want to feed the chicks, they hang upside down in the hole. They feed them by sticking their bill right down the chicks throats. When the chicks are older they will come up to the hole to be fed. After about a month or two the chicks leave the nest and not do ... return. Woodpeckers have long tongues which go right back into their heads, and not down their throats. When they are hammering wood they use their long tongues to catch insects and grubs.

lahel carefully. Before applying the lotion, rub away the dead skin over the wart with a pumice stone. This will give a better contact between the wart and the lotion which will kill it. Verrucae can often be treated with liquid nitrogen which also kills the wart. One application is usually enough to kill the verruca

but repeated applications may be necessary. Many G.P.'s now use liquid nitrogen in their surgeries to kill verrucae among other things.

Even without any treatment verruca will disappear usually in a couple of months. But if they are very painful or unsightly, they should be treated. Unfortunately they can recur even with treatment.

Q. I'm going to have a baby soon and I'm very frightened at thought of the labour pains. What are my

options for pain relief? A. Firstly there are breath-ing exercises that you will learn at the ante-natal classes. You will learn to breath in a certain way while you are having a contraction. You could also use Entonox or "gas and air", a mixture of nitrous oxide and oxygen. You breathe this mixture through a face mask while you are having a contraction

Recently available in some hospitals is the TENS machine. It works by blocking the pain signals coming along the nerves from the womb. There are pads strapped to the back and they're connected to a control box that you can keep in your pocket. As the pain increases you can increase the current from the TENS machine to block

the pain signals from reaching your brain. You can walk around during labour

walk around during labour while using the TENS. The pain relieving drug pethidine is quite widely used. It must be given by injection. If given too close to the baby's birth it may cause the baby breathing difficulties difficulties

Many hospitals now have epidural anaesthesia avail-able. An epidural is an injection of local anaes-thetic infected into the space around the spinal column through the back. It anaesthetises the nerves coming from the womb and lower body. With the traditional epidural you could not walk about. Recent refinements now mean that you can now have an epidural and move about as well. Best of luck.

It was a beautiful morning for travelling, cloudless and warm with the countryside bathed in bright sunshine. That picturesque road over the tortuous Vee never looked nicer with the beautiful red and purple of the rhododendron and fuchsia colouring the roadsides. From an early hour our supporters were on the move and we joined the first of the Eastern contingent at New Inn as the long line of cars, vans and buses snaked its slow way through Cashel before the pace quickened once more as we hit the main Dublin road. Flags, scarves, banners and ribbons proclaimed allegiance and commitment as eloquently as did the W and WD car registrations. As ever, past disappointments and a succession of false dawns failed to dampen the enthusiasm as we comforted ourselves with the knowledge that whatever about the sight of Cork and Tipperary jerseys the Shannonsiders green never held any terrors for us.

What a magnificent venue for hurling is Thurles. The atmosphere of tension, excitement and expectation at the Square and Hayes' Hotel is special. The pitch is superb and any good hurler just loves playing there with the sod so lively and true and the grass mown by hurling men to the ideal height for fast ground hurling. The preliminaries afford ample time to meet neighbour and friend. Mick Maher, great Tipperary full back of my time, was the first to welcome with outstretched hand. He even invited my two companions and myself into the Comhairle na Mumhan enclosure where we joined the day's dignitaries among whom were Bishop Lee and Noel Walsh, Chairman of the Munster Council. Mick was a power-

I've always believed that we would never have won the 1959 All Ireland if it were not for Pat. His organisation, attention to detail and inspired leadership made a major contribution

to the senior clash. We got the ideal start with Paul Foley goaling in the first minute and were still level eight minutes later but when the Limerick attack got a regular, supply of ball, their forwards, particularly full forward O'Brien and right full Ryan, were far too nippy and creative for our slower defenders. Those decisive goals were the result of incisive quick skill and proved the main difference in the end. We enjoyed a period of dominance in the second half which gave us much possession but failed with goal attempts time after time and only made a hero of Limerick's goalie Tournafulla lad Pat Horgan who had an outstanding game. Strange isn't that both intermediate and senior games should feature a similar Waterford urge in the second half to score goals even when points were there for the taking. All credit to Waterford who tried as hard towards the end as they did when still in the game with a realistic chance.

The senior game was a cracker, as fine a match as any follower of the game would wish to see. The tension and electric atmosphere even before the throw-in was palpable, so much so that players jostled at midfield in a determined effort to gain some psychological advantage. Peter Queally, who gave all he had throughout the game, would have fared better in that

throw-in if he had restrained the urge to tangle with Sean O'Neill as they awaited the referee's whistle. It is a mistake to get involved in any distraction at that juncture. Sean O'Neill surely remembered from last year's All Ireland when he paid dearly for his abrasive approach before Georgie O'Connor concentrating on the ball won the throw in and blow O'Neill out of the way thus getting the Limerick man off to a bad start from which he failed to recover.

"Change goalies and we'll play ye again, Waterford could be forgiven for suggesting. Alas the goal-keeper's mistake is always highlighted because it can be so expensive.

Seldom does anyone re-

member the series of mistakes leading up to the goal and the players culpable. Sean O'Neill beat his man for the umpteenth time and crossed for Barry Foley to get a touch on the ball be-fore his marker could prevent him. With a little luck (luck is an integral part of every game) that ball would have been saved or at worst. rebounded off the goalie's hurley over the bar rather than into the roof of the net. Limerick's goalie was very good but Albert Shanahan was also very lucky. Lucky because although beaten in the first half by Billy O'Sullivan's flick, Mike Nash was in precisely the right spot to tip the ball clear where it went to Stephen McDonagh

who gratefully swept the ball clear. A Waterford forward could so very easily have intercepted had he enjoyed the good fortune to be in the right spot. Late in the second half Shanahan distinguished himself by stopping some raspers and his backs were heroic in defying some fierce Waterford pressure. I can tell you that after saving two like that you would feel like issuing an invitation to all forwards in white and blue to send in a few more, so confident would you feel. Maybe you know the story about Napoleon Bonaparte trying to decide between two gen-erals for command of his army. Both were highly qualified experienced men and either man would be a good appointment. His advisors recommended Marshal Ney as the better choice, "Ah", Napoleon answered, "but is he lucky. Surely you know that a lucky general is better than a good one." Would that we had a few lucky generals in Thurles for our meeting with Limerick.

It is always easy in hindsight to rectify mistakes and to see where a different approach would yield better results if a second chance were offered. In Thurles it was always going to be a huge temptation to seek a goal at a time in the last 20 minutes when we were 10 or 11 points behind. Admittedly when a team is two points down with time up any team is justified in going for a goal if a scoring chance pre-

sents itself. But if time remains - and we had plenty of the ball in the last quarter and could have picked off another six points — it is al-ways good team management to keep the points flying over. While a team is scoring - and three points (three scores) are better for a team's moral than one goal - every player of the team right back to the goalie has reason to keep faith and redouble his efforts. To their immense credit Waterford did try mightily. On six different occasions we had point chances which were spurned in pursuit of that elusive goal. Perhaps Limerick would have prevailed anyway but who can deny that the impact of five scores at that critical stage of the match, five points, wouldn't inspire Waterford to lift their game another notch. It is very difficult to remain controlled and concentrated on securing points in the face of a big lead by the opposition. In the first All Ireland of Cork's successful three-in-a-row of the seventies Wexford led them by seven points at one stage in the first half. But the men in red kept their discipline and kept popping over the points until they were within two points of Wexford. Then just before half time came a Cork goal to send them into the lead which they never subsequently lost. Worth remembering for another day, another year. More next week.


