Councillor Slams 'Invasion' Of Whiting Ray Area

The Waterford County Council Councillor who hit the national headlines last year when he urged people to "have guns at the ready" to drive traveller families out of the county, has now attacked what he has described as an "invasion" of the scenic Whiting Bay area of Ardmore by a group of New Age Travellers.

Cllr. Paddy Kenneally told a meeting of the County Council in Dungarvan last Monday that the travellers have turned the Whiting Bay location into a virtual "no go" area, with access to the popular beach being denied to members of the general public.

Clir. Kenneally, speaking of whom he described as "this new type of tourist," said considerable damage has been caused through trespass and every landowner in the Whiting Bay area has been confronted with "a CONTINUED ON PAGE 5

Can We Win £1m Factory?

— County Manager Cautiously Optimistic

With a £1 million advance factory on offer to Co. Waterford from Irish Business Against Litter (IBAL) if over a twelve month period the County Council can reach a specific level of performance in a countywide anti-litter drive, County Manager Donal Connolly confirmed the impending appointment of a number of litter wardens at Monday's Council meeting.

In a report to the Council-

In a report to the Councillors, Mr. Connolly said the £1m. advance factory offer has been made by Irish Business Against Litter in consultation with the Indus-

trial Development Authority. An Taisce will draw up a set of performance indicators against which the antilitter effort of the County Council will be measured at the end of a twelve month period. "If our performance measures up to the satisfaction of the IBAL and An Taisce then the £1m. factory will be located at an agreed location within the county," Mr. Connolly said.

The Manager confirmed his intention to appoint a number of litter wardens in the near future but hadn't decided yet whether these CONTINUED ON PAGE 5

The book was launched at her son David's residence in Kilinney, Dublin on May 11th where over eighty invited relatives and friends enjoyed a social evening.

Compiled mainly for the benefit of her two grandchildren, the book is the brainchild of Peggy's son Cliff.

Born in 1920 in Carrignagour, near Lismore, Peggy grew up on the family farm. She attended primary school at Glengarra and Modeligo N.S. and was also a student at the Presentation Convent School in Lismore. Her brother John Prendergast and sister-in-law May continue to run the family farm at Carrignagour while her sister Una is a nun with the Good Shepherd Sisters and her brother Patrick Jnr. lives on the outskirts of Dublin.

From 1973 to 1992 Peggy penned over 100 articles which were published primarily in national newspapers. She also appeared on The Late Late Show and other T.V. programmes to speak on a number of issues such as alcoholism, single parents and mother/daughter relationships.

"Telling Summer Sins At Mount Melleray" deals with a wide range of subjects, some amusing and others provocative.

High Radon Gas Levels In South East

Very high levels of radon gas, a naturally occurring radioactive gas, have been discovered in the south east. A new study, undertaken by the Radiological Protection Institute of Ireland (RPII) examined radon levels in a sample of houses in 14 counties including Waterford.

According to the survey, most of the counties covered have areas in which houses have more than a 10% chance of having unacceptable levels of radon, although the study showed that in many parts of the South East, the risk is 20% or higher.

Radon Gas, which can cause lung cancer, can build up under houses and becomes a health danger if it is not ventilated.

Radon checks are carried out on dwellings by RPII at a cost of £15 and they can be contacted on Freefone Radon 1800 300 600.

A grant of up to £800 will be available from next January to help householders meet the cost of recommended structural changes to reduce the levels of exposure.

These cost on average between £1,000 and £1,500 and involve the fitting of a sump beneath the ground-floor or a membrane across the floor.

New Food Programme In West Waterford

A 'Good Food Tree for West Waterford' encompassing a number of quality eating establishments will be launched on June 16 in the Ballyrafter House Hotel, Lismore.

The purpose of establishing the West Waterford Good Food Tree is to:

l promote of quality of Eating Establishments in West Waterford l improve the quality of existing eating establishments in West Waterford

l to encourage the use of local fresh produce in restaurants menus.

Waterford Development Partnership with the support of An Bord Bia, co-ordinated the project. Georgina Campbell, Chairman, Irish Food Writers Guild was appointed to carry out the assessments.

The assessment of each premises involved a detailed evaluation against a testing list of standards such as fresh food presentation, quality of the meal and value for money. The choice and balance of the menu, standards of service and facilities were also taken into consideration.

In line with this programme the Partnership will now be in a position to provide financial assistance for the upgrading of restaurants.

Training needs identified as a result of the assessments will be addressed through training programmes such as Customer Care, Food & Wine courses, etc.

This assessment process will be continued on an annual basis.

On June 16 members of the Good Food Tree will be presented with a plaque to be displayed in their premises which identifies them as a member of the West Waterford Good Food Tree.

This proposal will be piloted in West Waterford and if it is successful the project is to be extended County wide.

A comprehensive guide to good eating in West Waterford has just been published to introduce people to some of the culinary delights in the West Waterford area. This guide also features traditional house specialities.

Junior Encyclopaedia

Flamingoes

THERE are a lot of different species of flamingoes. They live in large groups where the water is shallow and salty. Their necks and legs are very long in comparison with their bodies. Flamingoes are so large that if they want to fly they need a lot of space to take off. The whole flock usually takes off together as it is very difficult for one because of them being crowded so close together. A flock of flamingoes can easily be frightened away by lowflying aeroplanes. Colonies are often situated near airports as the land is flat. The colony is often deserted for this reason. When flamingoes fly - they travel in long lines with their necks and legs stretched out straight. As they fly, they make honking noises. Flamingoes usually stay in pairs, eating and sleeping together. The male is usually bigger than the female. When they want to eat, they turn their heads upside down in the shallow water. Flamingoes like small plants, tiny water animals and sometimes baby fishes. They cannot swallow anything bigger because of their big tongues and narrow throats. Flamingoes are able to stand on muddy shores with the help of their webbed feet. When it eats it traps food in a sort of comb in its beak and when it drinks it moves its head from side to side and sucks in water. The pair build their island nest in shallow water. They sit and, with the help of their beaks scoop mud and stones under them to make a mound. The birds make a hollow on top of the mound just big enough to protect the egg. The adult flamingoes take it in turns to sit on their one egg. They can fold their less right under their bodies while sitting on the nest. If it rains, the flamingo spreads its wings over the nest to stop it from being washed away. The chick hatches after about a month. The chick sits under the parent's wing looking out. His bill is straight at first. The chick gets its food from its parent. Chicks are grey at first but it turns pink later due to a chemical in their food. When the young leave the nest, they make flocks of their own, but they still get food from their parents. The chicks' bills slowly grows and they start to feed themselves.

desperate situation."
The outspoken FF Councillor said the traveller group he is referring to ap-pear to be affluent with their English registered motor vehicles. "They have literally taken over the Whiting Bay area," he added.

The Co. Manager, Donal Connolly said he is aware of the situation and they had visited the group in question. "I understand they are preparing to move on," Mr. Connolly said. The Chairman, Cllr. Gary

O'Halloran said that until they have a proper housing programme for travellers they will never solve the problem.

However, Cllr. Billy Kyne supported Cllr. Kenneally FRONT PAGE

and said they are now having small communities around the county being swamped by invasions of travellers who don't come under the traditional "traveller" category. And while accepting that the Council must do all it reasonably can to house those that want housing, it also has to be a two-way process. "The patience of the general community is being broken when they are faced with these type of invasions," said Clir. Kyne.

Cllr. Austin Flynn supported his colleague and said that while the Council is striving to do what it can

to house traveller families, huge numbers of them want everything for nothing.

Cllr. Flynn said these travellers aren't prepared to put one penny into the kitty in return but they are prepared to encroach onto beaches, set up home on the roadside, and then move on, leaving a mess behind.

Cllr. O'Halloran however said that he had tried to gain access for traveller children to a number of key services, including education, and he had found it to be "very slow." It wasn't easy, he said, to breach the cycle these children have been put into because they are not getting the assistance they should.

Cllr. Fahey Claims **Bye-Laws**

Members of Waterford Council are standing steadfast in their determination not to introduce new casual trading bye-laws that could effectively put a number of long serving casual traders countywide out of business, literally overnight.

Waterford County Manager, Donal Connolly has listed nine different locations on the national primary route where, he says, casual trading is being illegally carried on for some time. And now legal advice to the Council has warned that in the event of accidents at any of these locations there could be public liability problems for the Council.

Among the most prominent locations are Tarrs Bridge outside Dungarvan and on the Waterford side of Youghal Bridge, where the traders involved have been operating their respective roadside businesses for a long time. In the case of the Tarrs Bridge operator it is eighteen years, and council-lors are adamant that any new casual trading bye-laws that would put such people out of business should not be introduced by the local authority.

However, the Co. Manager suggested to Monday's Council meeting that they should at least put the proposed bye-laws on public display for two months and invite representations on them from the people. "In the meantime," said Mr. Connolly, "we will try and work out some solution to the problems relating to the long time operators at Tarrs

Cllr. Jackie Fahey said they shouldn't be in any hurry to take people's livelihoods away, and in essence that's what the introduction of the proposed bye-laws will be doing.

He said the man operating outside Dungarvan for the last eighteen years had done so in complete safety, and in all that time there hadn't even been a semblance of an accident at the location. He supported a proposal by Clir. Michael Queally that they defer any decision on bye-laws for two months until further discussions have taken place between the Council and the

Bridge and Youghal existing casual traders Bridge."

When it was unanimously agreed to defer a decision on the bye-laws for a further two months the Manager said the Councillors were only putting off the day be-cause ultimately a decision will have to be made.

"Some order will have to be put into the operating of casual trading in a safe and proper way throughout the county,' the Manager

Cllr. Billy Kyne however insisted that it is still feasible for the Manager to enter into discussions with the traders concerned. In that promise might be reached, he said. way some acceptable com-

will be new staff appointments or whether the duties involved will be incorporated among existing Council staff.

"If we are to succeed and win our £1m. advance factory then the litter laws will require stringent enforcement as well as action against people who don's comply with the litter laws,' Mr. Connolly added.

Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson welcomed the new anti-litter drive and expressed the hope that if the £1m. advance is "on" that a decision

will then be made to locate it in the Cappoquin, Lismore, Tallow area of the county where there is an urgent need for such a facili-

Cllr. Nora Flynn agreed and said she fully supported the proposed appointment of litter wardens. "Only in that way can our targets and objectives be realised," she

Cllr. Dan Cowman also supported litter wardens, but wondered what they are going to do about jackdaws

and crows swooping on the litter bins. "At 7.30 this morning in Tramore these birds had emptied every litter bin in the resort," he said.

The Manager expressed cautious optimism that they can "win" the £1m advance factory if everyone plays a part in the anti-litter drive. He praised the large number of community groups who are doing a great job around the county and pledged that the Council will work "hand in hand" with them.

lia (PD) was eliminated after the 4th count having collected only 3,083 votes. Just 2 hours into the 13-hour count, party supporters were already conceding defeat. Ms. Bulbulia, a former FG Senator, declined to say if she would contest another election for the party.

Outgoing FG Deputy

Outgoing FG Deputy Austin Deasy, a former Minister for Agriculture who has been 20 years in the Dáil, scored the highest number of first preference votes and was elected to the 1st seat on the 7th count.

Fiama Fáil Deputy Martin Cullen, who successfully contested the 1992 election as a member of the PD's, was elected without even reaching the 8,960 quota while sitting FF T.D. Brendan Kenneally successfully held onto his seat with the second highest number of first preference votes.

It was a disappointing election for Community T.V. candidate Dermot Kirwan but his first preference share of 2,946 spoke volumes of the depth of feeling held by many aggrieved voters currently without the deflector service around the county.

Whether a new Government can be formed may not become clear for some weeks, when the Dáil resumes to elect a new Taoiseach on June 26th.

This week has seen intensive rounds of lobbying of the newly elected T.D.'s. It

is possible that the Dáil will adjourn to allow more time for discussion between FF, the PD's and Independent Deputies as happened in 1989.

Eliminated in the 8th count on 5,562 votes, Waterford County Councillor Ollie Wilkinson garnered tremendous support in West Waterford. As a result of his excellent first time showing, Cllr. Wilkinson may be in line for a seat in the Seanad, a position he would undoubtedly accept with open arms.

Meanwhile Martin Cullen has been hotly tipped for a Cabinet post - possibly at the Department of the Marine, although his colleague Brendan Kenneally has also confirmed that he will be available for any position on offer.

It has also been speculated that the incoming Taoiseach Bertie Ahearn may offer the post of Ceann Comhairle to Deputy Austin Deasy in order to strengthen his voting position in the Dáil.

The Fine Gael Deputy however has ruled out any such deal and said no approach had been made to him. If offered the position Mr. Deasy said it would be an "out and out non-starter."

"It would be seen correctly as me being highly disloyal to my own party. I want to scotch the very notion of it at this stage," Deputy Deasy added.

For now however the post mortems continue among Labour party supporters. O'Shea's tense election last Saturday was a far cry from 1992 when he headed the poll with a massive 11,235 votes - a surplus of over 2,500 votes in the first count.

The final state of the parties in the 28th Dáil will be Fianna Fáil 77, Fine Gael 54, Labour 17, Progressive Democrats 4, Democratic Left 4, Greens 2, Sinn Féin 1 and Independents 7.

The percentage changes in first preference votes in the Waterford constituency are FF 35.8% (+7.4%), FG 24.6% (+2.5%), Labour 11.8% (-14.3%), PD 6.5% (-2.8%), GP 1.8% (+1.8%).

I.F.A. President John Donnelly said the Irish dairy and food industries are facing immense future challenges as the GATT agreement erodes EU supports for dairy products. He said milk price and the price of other farm commodities because of greater world competition would inevitably come under pressure. He added that a strong, farmer-controlled Irish agri-business was essential to secure the long term future for farm families.
"It is vital that the struc-

ture of the dairy industry be properly consolidated to realise the savings and re-investment needed to allow the continued payment of the highest possible milk price in the long interest of dairy farmers," Mr. Donnelly said.

He added that now that the farmer controlled boards of Avonmore and Waterford had agreed the terms of the merger, I.F.A. supported their decision and believed the proposed merger would result in a strong processing industry with the necessary resources to successfully penetrate into international

Mr. Walsh explained that the merger provides a unique opportunity to create a world leading dairy company which is both Irish and farmer controlled. It will have the valuable resources to provide both enhanced milk process and growth prospects in the longer term. in addition Mr. Walsh felt the proposal fairly values the Waterford group and provides equality of representation which reflects the spirit of partnership that is the hallmark of this propos-

NO RUSH TO AXE JOBS The Chief Executive des-

ignate of the proposed giant food company, Pat O'Neill Avonmore Chief Executive has stated that there are no immediate plans to dispose of assets or to lay off large numbers of staff.

He acknowledged that the efficiencies which would be achieved by the newly merged entity would have an impact on employee numbers but said the shape of the new business would influence manning levels over time.

"When Avonmore acquired the Rooskey pig pro-cessing business in 1989, there were 290 people employed. There were job losses initially after we took over but following implementation of our development plans, there are 430 people working there now," said Mr. O'Neill.

The two companies combined would employ ap-11,000 worldwide.

UNIONS AGREE JOINT STRATEGY

Union Shop Stewards and Officials representing the employees of Waterford Foods and Avonmore met last Friday to review developments in the proposed £337m merger of the two companies.

At the meeting, represen-tatives of the ATGWU, SIPTU (acting on behalf of the AEEU and the TEEU) agreed on a joint strategy to deal with the likely implications for the workforces of both dairy groups should the merger be agreed.

The meeting confirmed the view of the employees that there had been little or no consideration or concern for their interests in the processing of the merger proposal todate.

The unions have now determined to act collectively in defence of their members jobs and terms and conditions of employment in the event of the merger receiving the backing of shareholders.

The primary objectives of the unions involved will be to secure advance agreement from Avonmore and Waterford providing for -

- The continuation of a policy of no compulsory redundancies
- Improved terms for voluntary redundancies
- Guarantees on pay and terms and conditions of em-
- Implementation of the terms of Partnership 2000 including employee involvement and participation together with a provision for the workforce to share in the financial benefits of the merger.

In a statement issued on behalf of all four unions, they pledged to act in solidarity in opposing any attempt by the new company to impose change without agreement or to recoup the costs of the merger and produce increased profits at the expense of employees.

This week we conclude the information regarding the election and constitution of the forthcoming Parish Pastoral Council, reminding you once again if you have any problems or difficulties please have a talk with Fr. James Denmead, C.C., Four-Mile-Water/Newcastle.

Committees of the Council — 1. — The Council will set up, from among its members, committees to deal with special areas of parish life.

2. — The council will be obliged to set up the following committees, but may set up others which may be considered necessary from time to time.

(a) — Committee for Liturgy; involving the laity in the community worship; selecting and training readers at Mass and other services; encouragement of music and choir activities; suggesting special forms of worship for particular seasons and feast days; advising as to times of Masses.

(b) — Committee of lay apostolate; helping co-ordinate and encourage existing parish organisations; suggesting new organisations that might be introduced; encouraging youth activity in the parish; having special regard for the old and the sick; relating to newcomers to the parish, a welcoming committee.

(c) — Committee of Finances: having an overview of parish finances; making decisions concerning the collection of necessary monies; establishing priorities as to

This week we conclude the information the expenditure of parish monies; arranging and publishing parish accounts.

(d) — Committee for Parish Property: Supervising parish property and buildings; making decisions as to their needs and upkeep.

(e) — Committee for Communications: Keeping the parish well informed as to parish hopes and needs; canvassing, perhaps through occasional questionnaires, the views of the people on every aspect of parish life; issuing occasional news sheets informing those at home and away of parish activities; actively encouraging Catholic reading (newspapers, pamphlets, perhaps a parish library); establishing good relations with boards of managements of the schools in the parish; encouraging parental involvement in the religious education of the children.

(f) — Committee for Youth Affairs: responsible for identifying the spiritual and recreational needs of the youth of the parish.

3. — There will be at least two members of the parish council on each committee, but the committee may co-opt members of the parish whose expertise would be helpful in performing the task.

4. — Each committee will elect from its members a chairperson and secretary.

5. — The committee will submit regular reports to the Parish Council. The committees recommendations will have no binding force until they receive the approval of the Parish Council.

Kehoe, who was an umpire, took special pleasure ever afterwards in recounting the manner in which he had been roundly denounced by an Abbeyside supporter who ended by declaring - "You know nothing

Council Demands Investigation Of Multi-Channel r.V. Service

to land on the desk of the Minister for Communications in the Government will be one from Waterford County Council for an indepth investigation into the entire multi-channel television service being provided by the Irish Multi-Channel Company in parts of the West Waterford region.

Political party affiliations were set aside this week at a meeting of the Council when Fine Gael's Cllr. Nora Flynn voiced scathing criticism of the present multichannel service being provided by the company in different areas of the West Waterford region.

By way of notice of motion, the Cappoquin based Councillor called for the new Communications Minister to initiate an investiga-

tion into the quality of the service and reception and the charges being demanded of customers.

Cllr. Flynn said just one word would describe the existing service being provided by the Irish Multi-Channel in West Waterford - "de-plorable". The cost too, she said, is "enormous".

She claimed that the reception and general service in her region is "inferior" to what people are getting in other areas served by the cable system. "The people of West Waterford are paying more than enough for what is essential a deplorable service," she said.

Cllr. Flynn said that as a matter of urgency, the Council should demand that the incoming Minister for Communications initiate a fullscale investigation into the multi-channel situation in the western end of the

county. Cllr. Paddy Kenneally (FF) supported his colleague and said he had received numerous complaints about the service from angry and very disgruntled customers.

Ironically while the voters of Donegal South West gave a thumping mandate to Community Deflector candidate Tom Gildea by electing him to the new Dáil, their Waterford counterparts failed to deliver on the candidature of another Community T.V. candidate, Dermot Kirwan who is Managing Director of the South East Community Deflector Association.

He polled a disappointing 2,946 first preferences and was eventually eliminated on the 5th count.

Second Motor Tax Office Needed

Waterford County Council Motor Taxation Office be established in the rapidly expanding seaside resort of Tramore, was made this week by local Fine Gael County Councillor Con

Cllr. Casey pointed out that in Donegal the County Council has set up a range of services around the county and he believed Waterford should consider doing something similar. "The provision of a motor taxation office in Tramore is a facility that should definitely be considered," he added.

County Manager Donal Connolly said it is something he is presently looking at. If motor taxation becomes computerised - which

A demand that a second it is expected to become within 2 years - then he would most definitely consider having an office in Tramore.

Cllr. Con Casey warned that the Post Office is "lobbying" for the motor taxation business, while Cllr. Billy Kyne said he wouldn't like to see it ending up with that body.

The Manager said they are looking at every possible way they can to make the motor taxation service "customer friendly". Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson urged

that Lismore should also be considered as a central location for a motor taxation office if the decentralisation of the service is to be considered



This Week In The Garden

Prune Flower Shrubs

Any shrubs that flowered during May or early June can be pruned, but this is not to say that pruning is always necessary. Much depends on the purpose for which the shrub is being grown and the amount of space that you can spare for it.

Take Pink Pipings

Now is the time to propagate pinks by cuttings. Select healthy looking, non-flowering shoots 10 to 13 cm long and pull them out at a joint. This is known as taking a 'piping'. Insert these pipings firmly, 5 cm deep and about 10 cm apart each way, in sandy soil, preferably in a frame, but failing this in a shady border outdoors and keep well watered. They should be well rooted and ready for planting out by the end of September.

Sow French Beans

Make a sowing of French beans in a sheltered place outdoors. Sow the seeds singly about 15 cm apart in drills 5 cm deep. An economical method is to have two drills about 23 to 30 cm apart, then an alleyway about 75 cm wide, then another couple of rows and so on.

Stop Cutting Asparagus

It is most unwise to cut asparagus after the third week in June. Allow the plants to make foliage now so that new crowns may be formed for next year. Give the bed a small dressing of any good compound fertiliser.

Spray Apples Against Codling Moth

If in previous years grubs have been found feeding inside apples during July and August it is probable that the codling moth is responsible, and steps should be taken now to prevent further damage. Spray all apple trees at once with derris carbaryl, fenitrothion or malathion making sure that the fruitlets are covered. It would be a good idea to spray again in about 3 weeks time to catch any later-hatching grubs. This pest is easily confused with apple sawfly.

Hosta Gives Life To Shady Spots

SHADY borders can be a bit of a struggle for even the most green-fingered gardener.

You can choose carefully from the nursery or garden centre and try to bring a spot of color — but even with "shade" plants, often the results are at best disappointing.

Many gardeners end up abandoning the patch as "too difficult" and accepting that it is never going to be a stunning attraction — opting instead to focus their attention on the sunnier spots.

But you can use shady areas to your advantage by choosing specialist plants such as hostas.

They thrive in those dark and damp areas nothing else likes, beneath trees and in the shadow of the house or fence.

And their foliage —variegated or in an array of shades of

green — offers a refreshing alternative to bright flower borders on a hot, sticky summer day. Hostas — also known as plantain lilies — come in hun-

dreds of varieties.

For maximum effect a selection planted together can

offer a spectacular display.

Typically they will grow to around two feet in height and spread, disappearing beneath the ground in winter and emerging in larger clumps during mid to late spring.

During August many varieties produce a stem of white or lilac coloured, funnel-shaped flowers. But the real attraction is the abundance of beautiful foliage that remains throughout the summer.

Little maintenance is needed — apart from fending off the slugs which can be very harmful — and few weeds will penetrate the dense sea of leaves.

Mr. Jack McCarthy



Jack McCarthy, Allen Street, one of Cappoquin's grand old gentlemen, died peacefully on Saturday, May 31. Jack was in his 96th year and had been cared for during the last six months of his life by the wonderful staff of Padre Pio Rest Home, Capoquin. Although totally blind in his last years, Jack bore that terrible affliction with the same calm dignity and Christian conviction which had epitomised his entire life.

Jack was first and foremost a teacher. "The Professor" taught Latin, Greek, English, Geography and History at Mount Melleray for forty-five years in all with a period at St. Anne's, Cappoquin after his retirement. It was a source of great pleasure to him that all his children followed him into teaching as well.

Jack was proud of all his former students. He particularly enjoyed a chat with the many Melleray old boys who called to see him from time to time from as far afield as South America., Hong Kong, Africa and Australia. Amazingly, even in his final years of darkness he seemed to remember them all.

Jack McCarthy was also a sportsman of great versatili-ty. He was a founding member of Cappoquin Hurling Club and played football too. He played cricket for Lismore and was a past captain of Dungarvan Golf Club. He played both tennis and badminton as well as billiards and snooker. He gave many years of service to the rowing club and was instrumental in the introduction of road bowling to Cappoquin.

Jack's love of sport brought him to countless race meetings, regattas, GAA games and cricket test matches over the years. He particularly loved athletics and often recalled going to the London Olympics in 1948 with his friend Danny McGrath to see his hero Emil Zatopek win gold. Over decades of judging and coaching athletics, Jack also came to number great Olympic champions Pat O'Callaghan and Peter O'Connor among his friends.

Above all else, Jack Mc-Carthy was a great Cappo-quin man. He was deeply involved in the development of the local GAA field and in the fund-raising for the church renovation work in the 1960's. He served in the Local Defence Force during World War 11 and later as a local Civil Defence Instructor. Furthermore, many Cappoquin householders owe Jack a huge debt of gratitude for the work done by him and others like him in 'Colta" to rid the town of the scourge of ground rents.

127 COMPLAINTS FROM COUNTY TO OMBUDSMAN

Ombudsman, Kevin Murphy, published his third annual report last week in which he provides a summary of the year's work and describes a number of individual cases.

During 1996 he received a total of 127 complaints from individuals in Co. Waterford 39 of which were outside his jurisdiction.

The highest number of complaints in the county concerned the civil service with 24 cases involving Social Welfare, three against the Revenue Commissioners and the Dept. of Agriculture and four complaints against the Department of Education and other civil service departments.

Phirty three complaints

the county while ten people in the county made complaints against the health boards.

Telecom Eireann was the subject of five complaints by aggrieved Co. Waterford residents and 2 cases concerned An Post.

Of the 71 cases finalised in 1996, fourteen were resolved and in 14 cases assistance was provided. A total of 26 cases in Co. Waterford was not upheld and a further 17 cases were either discontinued or withdrawn by the complainant.

While individual cases pertaining to Co. Waterford were not included in the Ombudsman's report, one interesting case involved a farmer who complained that, without seeking permission,

widened the road at a bend by cutting into his land by a number of feet. The Council had removed some of the soil and rock and dumped a considerable amount of it on his land destroying terraced paths used by sheep. The cost incurred in carrying out this work was £1,000 which the Council charged the complainant. The Ombudsman's examination showed that the Council's roads department had made no effort to find out who owned the land nor did it serve a notice on the farmer under the Roads Act. Eventually the Council agreed to withdraw the charge of £1,000 for works done and to pay compensation of £1,500 to e farmer.

Waterford Family Farm Award

The search is on for the best run family farm in County Waterford, with the staging of the annual Family Farm Environment, Conservation and Safety Award Competition organised by Waterford ICMSA and Teagasc.

Up for grabs are a specially inscribed trophy and a cash prize of £500. This is the sixth year of the highly successful competition which is promoted by Waterford ICMSA and Teagasc.

GRASSLAND

Graze Quality Grass

High quality grass is essential to maintain high milk yield and high weight gains in cattle (1 kg. per day) and calves. June is a very hard month to maintain the quality of grass. Even with good management June/July grass is 4-6 DMD units lower than April/May grass but with poor management in May, grass in June will have a stemmy "butt" and go to seed. Once animals are asked to graze that material performance will decrease.

Therefore if grass is too strong on the next paddock being grazed and grass is plentiful on subsequent paddocks, then you skip one or two of the strong paddocks and graze the next quality paddock. Cut and bag these strong paddocks as you meet them in rotation. This advice goes for cows and cattle. But make absolutely certain (by walking them) that there is adequate grass on the paddocks you will be grazing in 9 to 11 days time. If they are light you are likely to be short of grass in 2 weeks time and that will not look too good for you having gone to the expense of cutting and bagging and then having to feed it back to animals.

To Top Or Not?

Many farmers are under-stocked while others undergraze resulting in a lot of tall grass area in paddocks. In a 21 day rotation, most (at least 2) of the leaves left after grazing will die and be replaced by new leaves before the next grazing. In itself, this is wasteful but worse still it encourages stem which has poor feeding value and when grazed or topped later in the year leaves the swarth thinner. A lot of nitrogen put on to fields where the tall grass area is increasing from one grazing to the next is wasted because the grass is not being grazed.

Therefore topping can be justified in the above circumstances. There is a milk yield response on moderately stocked farms to topping. Set the topper low 2.5 to 3 inches, otherwise it is a waste of time. We have to recognise it as another mechanical chore which results in extra cost and labour.

SHEEP

Weaning

March born lambs should be weaned within the next couple of weeks - 12-14 weeks old is probably the best age. Select any lambs fit for sale before weaning takes place as some setback is inevitable and further disposals will not usually take place for 3-4 weeks. Separate the remaining lambs from the ewes and if at all possible, transfer them to clean grazing or aftergrass. Dose against stomach worms and cobalt. This is the most effective worm treatment of the entire year provided that clean grazing is available.

Ewes should be confined to bare pasture or housed as far as possible away from their lambs. If housing, provide hay and water. Straw, at least initially after weaning is not recommended, the sudden switch from nutritious grass to poor quality straw can cause metabolic upsets and deaths. It is not humane to leave ewes without water to encourage drying off. Milking should not be necessary but individual ewes which appear very full can be drawn sufficiently to relieve the pressure on a couple of occasions.

Within 3 days of weaning, all ewes should be checked for signs of mastitis as part of next year's flock selection process. Dry quarters and lumpy udders which are perfectly obvious now can be a lot more difficult to detect in September.

Grassland

Weaned lambs need access to liberal supplies of grass if maximum thrive is the objective. Significant growth responses are obtained up to 9-10 cms or about 4 inches. This is roughly double the sward height target for ewes in early and mid lactation. A significant clover content will boost performance even more. MEETING OF SOUTH EAST REGIONAL COMMITTEE

A meeting of the South East Regional Committee of ICMSA was held in Hotel Kilkenny on Wednesday, June 3 last. This committee included representatives from counties Wexford, Waterford, Kilkenny, Laois, Kildare, Wicklow and Carlow.

ICMSA CALLS FOR PAYMENT OF SECOND INSTALMENT OF EWE PREMIUM IN JUNE

Mr. T. J. Nally, Chairman of ICMSA's Sheep Committee, called on the Minister for Agriculture to pay the first two instalments of the 1997 Ewe Premium in June. Mr. Nally said he was disappointed with the Ministers statement which indicated that the second instalment would not be paid in June but later in the year. In 1994 and 1995 the first two instalments were paid in June. In 1996 the second instalment was delayed due to budgetary pressures resulting from the BSE crisis. Mr. Nally said that in 1997, there is no reason to delay the payments of the second instalment and he called on the Minister to ensure that sheep farmers receive the second instalment in June.

Mr. Nally also expressed concern regarding the calculation of ewe premium, which does not adequately protect Irish sheep farmers. The current calculation is based on the average EU price. As Irish lamb prices are normally amongst the lowest in the EU, a premium based on the aver-

age EU price does not adequately support sheep farmers, Mr. Nally said. This policy flaw needs to be addressed to ensure that sheep farmers have a viable future. Mr. Nally said, and he called on the Minister to ensure that the necessary adjustments are

IFA Win Concession On Headage Forms For **Un-Tagged** Animal

Waterford IFA Chairman, James Coughlan has said that the IFA has got concession from the Department of Agriculture to enable farmers to apply for cattle headage on eligible cattle that have not yet been officially ear-tagged.

Mr. Coughlan said that this concession is necessary given the fact that in some regions of the country farmers are still awaiting their full supply of tags for calves born on their farms during 1997. Farmers are advised to send in their normal cattle headage forms and to accompany it with a letter stating the number of untagged cattle specifying the tag number of the dam, the breed of the calf and the sex of the animal.

Waterford IFA Chairman said that no farmer must suffer a penalty as a result of problems associated with tags.

Murphy **Welcomes EU** Milk Promotional **Funds**

Waterford IFA Dairy Chairman, Michael Murphy (Tallow) has welcomed the adoption by the EU Commission on proposal by Commissioner Fischler of 16 action programmes in different member states to promote the consumption of milk and dairy products within the European Union.

Farmers Encouraged To Reduce Risk Of Skin Cancer

IFA President John Donnelly has encouraged farmers to take special care while farming in the sun during the summer months. The President was speaking at the launch of the Irish Farmers' Association's Sun Campaign 1997 - "Sun On the Farm, a Burning Issue" in conjunction with the Irish Cancer Society.

Mr. Donnelly said "the aim of this campaign is to raise, particularly among farm families, of the need to take care in the sun. Farmers have a much higher incidence of skin cancer than the general population. Because the bulk of farmers' time is spent working outdoors, they are vulnerable both to the long term and short-term effects of the sun's

Skin cancer is the most common cancer in Ireland with approx. 7000 new cases every year. One in seven men and one in nine women develop skin cancer. However, it can be avoided. The "1997 Sun Smart Campaign" encourages farmers and their families to keep covered while working outside. Wearing a hat and a long sleeved shirt will go a long way towards minimising their risks of developing skin cancer. The Cancer Society also recommends that farmers try to plan their day and work

The IFA leader said the Irish Farmers' Association is pleased to be associated with the excellent work of the Irish Cancer Society in helping the farming commu-nity avoid the risks of skin cancer.





Q.I have plaques of psoriasis on my scalp. I use lotions the doctor gave me but they're messy and make my hair very greasy. Is there anything I can do to make my hair less greasy while still help-

ing my psoriasis?

A. The lotions your doctor prescribed for you will clear the plaques from your scalp. The lotion should be left on the scalp for five to six minutes. Lotions used for severe psoriasis must be used every night, left on for more than eight hours and then washed off with a tar

shampoo. If you use hot water the greasy compounds will dissolve easier - the shampoo may have to be applied twice. After washing the scales and plaques will be loose and may be combed out gently, although the lotions are messy if you use them diligently the plaques will disappear in about three

weeks. Unfortunately the psoriasis may recur, however, weekly applica-tions of the lotions will help keep the scalp controlled.

Q. My son had a very itchy rash recently. My doctor said it was scabies and prescribed a lotion that he rubbed all over himself. He's now

fine but I'm so afraid the rest of the family will get it. How can I prevent this happening?


A. Scabies is a transmissible parasitic skin infection which causes intense itching. It is caused by the mite sarcoptes scabiei. The female mite burrows into

the upper layer of the skin and lays eggs in the burrow. Scabies causes an intense itch, worse in bed at night -the heat of the bed causes hatched larvae to become more active and this makes the itch worse. The burrows can be seen in the finger webs and on the front of the wrists. Transmission is by skin to

skin contact and also by sexual contact. Your doctor will recommend a good lotion for your son and the whole family should be

treated too. Follow the instructions on the label very carefully. It sounds like a terrible task to treat the whole family but it is done quite quickly and easily. Having applied the lotion exactly as instructed, the mites will be killed but the itch may persist for up to two weeks. Your doctor will recommend an antihista-mine to reduce the itch. Any infection present in the burrows often clear sponta-neously when the scabies is

2 kg/4lb free-range chicken 1/2 lemon

4 branches fresh tarragon 60g/2oz unsalted butter salt and pepper 60ml/2fl oz vermouth, or small glass of dry white wine 300 ml/½pt Creme fraiche or

double cream lemon juice

METHOD

• Rub the skin of the chicken all over with the half lemon. Stuff the spent lemon half into the stomach cavity along with 3 branches of tarragon.



Four Waterford Beaches **Awarded Blue Flags**

"Call us if there is a problem" was the message today from An Taisce and Irish Local Authorities as Blue Flags were awarded to beaches throughout the country which achieved the standard required for the prestigious award.

The aim is to maintain the highest possible standards on Irish beaches in this the 10th anniversary year of the awards. To achieve this, the public is being asked to join in by calling An Taisce's Blue Flag office or Waterford County Council with any observations or complaints they may have.

An Taisce are very pleased to announce that in this 10th anniversary year, the number of flags awarded to Ire-land was the highest to date. A total of 70 Blue Flags for beaches and 3 Blue flags for marinas were awarded out of a total of 90 applications for beaches and 4 applications for marinas. This is primarily due to improved compliance with the strict water quality criteria required for the Blue Flag award.

Waterford was awarded 4 flags this year with Ardmore, not having held a flag since 1994, coming back into compliance with water quality criteria. The Carousel Slip Tramore,

which is part of Tramore beach, was entered but not forwarded by the National Jury due to the proximity of the dump to the beach. The three other successful beaches are Clonea, Bonmahon and Counsellors Strand, Dunmore East.

Where the Blue Flag flies visitors can expect clean bathing water, litter management, toilet facilities, life-saving and first aid equipment and the separation of different recreational activities from each other and from sensitive natural areas, as well as environmental education and activities. The Blue Flag requirements are designed to ensure that the beach can

manage whatever number of users it has, whether urban and crowded or remote and peaceful so that it stays clean and healthy.

During the 1997 season all Blue Flag beaches will undergo rigorous tests for water quality. Fortnightly water samples will be analysed for total, faecal coland iform faecal streptococci and physical and chemical parameters will also be assessed. In addition inflows affecting the bathing area will be monitored. The public can then be assured that they can swim and play on the beaches which pass these tests without worrying about the quality of the water.





THE LATE JACK **McCARTHY**

A Tribute By Dungarvan Golf Club

It is with sincere regret that we record the death of Jack McCarthy, Allen Street, Cappoquin which occurred on Saturday, May 31st 1997.

A teacher by profession, he was on the staff of Mount Melleray Secondary School until his retirement. He was captain of our club in 1950 at our course in Ballinacourty.

A gentleman by nature and indeed it was a pleasure to be in his company either on or off the golf course. An elegant striker of the golf ball with equipment that was far below today's technology, nevertheless with his Elvery's purchased clubs he won many a prize and notably the Captain's Prize in 1948.

We quote from an article he wrote for the publication "50 Golden Years In Ballinacourty" -

"To play the game, I bought all my clubs and golf bag at Elvery's in Cork at a time when every pound was worth 20 shillings and every shilling was worth 12p. I paid 21 shillings each for 2 woods, 15 shillings for the long irons and 12/6 for the short irons. An excellent ball called "Blue Flash" cost only 1/3p but if you wanted one of superior quality such as the "Dunlop 65" or "Topflite" the cost was 2/6".

He also refers to the hazards of travel brought on by World War II and I quote "If I wished to continue playing golf, I had no option but to sling the bag of clubs across my back and set out on a bicycle for Ballinacourty - a return trip of thirty miles (30) from Cappoquin. I'm sure many people in Dungarvan must have thought me a bit daft when they saw me cycling through the town. But a locker soon became vacated and I was very happy to put the clubs into it. Those were the days!!

In the early 1950's he acquired a motorcar and each Sunday he provided a taxi service from the Square, Dungarvan to Ballinacourty for 'four budding golfers'. Jack continued to play until the 1970's when osteoarthritis forced him to give up the game. He did continue to keep in touch with the club and he attended for a group photo of club officers in 1991 in Ballinacourty, alas, he never played golf in Knocknagranagh (our new course). May he rest in peace.

At the prize giving of the Captain's Prize on Sunday, June 1st a tribute was paid to Jack by our Captain Des Baumann and a one minute silence was observed in his honour.



SMITHKLINE BEECHAM CUNNIGAR RUN

"The Issues Of The Conyngar"

One of the earliest references to the Cunnigar where the 5th annual Ras na Rinne takes place this Saturday at 8 p.m. appears in the Sheriff's accounts for the honor of Dungarvan 1262-1263. It refers to a rent of one pound "of the issues of the Conyngar.

A document of 1537 presented to the Royal Commission by the tenants and burgesses of Dungarvan noted that "a certain lande and a warreyn of conyes, called Congard Pointe, is withholden by the said Gerald FitzJohn, containing in length three quarters of a mile and in bredthe one bowshot, well replenished with conves.

In 1809 a Welshman Lewis W. Dillwyn, a botanist and naturalist visited Dungarvan. In his diary he described a visit to the Cunnigar. "Monday, July 10, I rose this morning at six and employed myself till breakfast in laying out my plants etc. Soon after ten we took a boat and crossed the river to the island called Conygare on which Gladio-lus Commun's is in Gough's Camden said to grow but tho' we hunted over every part of the island we saw nothing like Gladiolus nor any other plant which can be considered at all rare except Juncus Acutus, Viola Lutea Divisa. Mr. Leach found a single shell of Venus Pophia and Mactra Lutraria was extremely abundant about high water mark."

In 1861 John R. Dower purchased the Cunnigar at the sale of the Duke of Devonshire's Dungarvan land for £910 on behalf of Dungarvan Town Commission-However Commissioners refused to take the land and Dower was left with in in his hands. In 1912 his son offered it to the Commissioners for the same price. The land contained 44 acres and eight perches.

In 1916 the tenant Bridget Mahony put up for sale her interest in the lands, "the tenant and her late husband Lawrence Walsh insisted on parties frequenting the Cunnigar paying a toll for some years past. They furthermore obstructed fisherman and others from Ballinagoul who had a right of way along those Cunnigar lands."

There was a plan to build a bridge to the Cunnigar and reclaim Western Bay. The idea was first suggested in the late 1820's and in 1926 Dungarvan U.D.C. were asking the local Government Department to sanction the payment of £20,000



promised by the British Government for construction of the Cunnigar Bridge. However the money was never granted to Dungarvan. Part of the scheme, the reclamation of Western Bay was still being discussed in the 1950's.

THE **CUNNIGAR** RACES

The Cunnigar was also used on occasions for horse racing. "The Waterford News" of 1910 carried a report on one of these races. The first race had three horses, M. Ryan's "Full Back", M. Sinnott's "Miss Anne" and F. Stephen"s "Tommy". The judge, James Hayes declared the race void as none of the horses had run the entire course.

The second race was for farmer's horses — M. O'Brien's "Crookstown", M. McGrath's "Le Neve", J. Christopher's "Harmony Hall" and N. Moloney's "Lisfennell. Crookstown was the winner. The third race was won by M. Sinnott's "Miss Annie".

The fourth race was an open pony race with nine entries. M. Costen's "Little Nell", M. O'Brien's "May Boy", James Barrett's "Miss Florin", William Ryan's "Little Jim", J. J. Harty's "Gay Lass", N. Veale's "A.B.C.", E. Dunphy's "Little Pickininny", T. Sinnott's "Miss Olive" and P. Ryan's "Topsy". The race was won by Miss Olive.

The article ends with the following comment: 'Though the day's racing following was a grand experience yet very many longed for the old Killossera course where the arrangements are not restricted by the tide. Had the meeting been held at Killossera we have no doubt but there would have been an exceptionally large attendance.

In 1922 a golf course was laid out on the Cunnigar and a golf pavilion constructed. Players were brought by boat from the Lookout by John Duggan or "The Lord" as he was popularly called. The golf club moved to Clonea in 1929.

THE **CUNNIGAR** IN VERSE

The Cunnigar is the subject of this excellent example of Pilib O Dugáin's poetry. It was written in

1. — The ebb and flow of changing tide exposes sand and Cunnigar side and Western Bay is left unclad where mud has formed from clay and sod.

2. — And yet when it is mantled bright in shimmering specks on water's light, the golden ripples shining through are glistening rays of friends like you.

3. - And Cunnigar which pierces sea, its outline clear of greenery, among those teeming grasses tall you sway and frolic with us all.

4. — With every tide, the ebb and flow, with every seed that there may grow, vou're with us in our seaside scene, a sparkling ray, a blade so green.

5. - But seed is blown to distant field, so you must go where'er the need to permeate with sun's warm glow, through waters fresh that ebb and flow.

6. — The sands at Cunnigar are sod and mud and clay transformed by God who made all life to ebb and flow so may he bless you as he go.

RAS NA RINNE

Over the years distance runners have used the Cunnigar for training. The first connection with it at an organised level was in 1993 when the first annual Ras Na Rinne was staged. The event started outside the Garda Station, descended the hill at Mweelnahorna, headed for the point of the Cunnigar via the beach and returned by the back route up Mweelnahorna and finishing where the race started. The inaugural winner was local runner Gerry Cantwell from Helvick with Denis McCarthy, Ballynoe second and Alan Fox, Kilmacow, third. The same race route has been used since and it has been described as the toughest yet the most enjoyable and novel race on the local running calendar.

COURSE RECORD

The Cunnigar race has been won by four different runners. Kieran Maher won it in 1994, James Sullivan won in 1995 when many of the runners went astray and ended up running up the sand hill. This is part of the attractiveness of the event! The grass at the rear of the Cunnigar was particularly high that year and the path wasn't visible.

The fastest runner to win the Cunnigar is Philip Harty (West Waterford A.C.) who ran a flier last year to win at his ease in the time of 30 mins. 10 secs. Philip was in a class of his own that night and it was one of the best races he ever ran. It's a mark that could last for many years. The ladies record is held by Liz Bullen at 38.34.

This year's Rás na Rinne will be held this Saturday at 8 p.m. It's the third race in the Ger Wyley Sports Summer Series and it is being generously sponsored by local company SmithKline Beecham. The winner of the race will receive the perpetual 'Duais Uí Dhroma' trophy presented by Seamus O Droma and there will be prizes for the first three men, the first over 40, 45, 50, 55 and junior men, the first five ladies and the fist three graded teams of five runners as well as numerous spot prizes.

The entries will be taken at Halla an Phobail (by kind permission) from 7 p.m. on-

wards where changing facilities will also be available. The presentation of prizes takes place in Mooneys who always sponsor a number of prizes and this will be followed by a social evening in their premises.

TALLOW G.A.A. CLUB NOTES

THURLES TRAVAIL

I was remarking last week on how despondent most people were last year following our defeat by Tipperary in Waterford when, despite only three points separating the teams, we gave scarcely a glimmer of hope except for the displays of Frampton and Hartley and the exciting promise of Ken McGrath. Following the final whistle in Thurles three weeks ago my first reaction was, of course, of disappointment. As Pat Fanning was accustomed to saying to us after gallant defeat "there is no virtue in defeat." In the context of that time he was quite correct in his efforts to compel us to aim high to regard victory as the only worthwhile objective and to reject any sense of satisfaction with putting up a good show or being content with moral victories. Pat, as I have stated already, was the catalyst who transformed a bunch of underachievers in 1957 whose impact over the next decade would earn respect and admiration for our county throughout the land and make it a time when it was good to be a native of County Waterford.

Waterford followers left Fermoy in 1956 having witnessed their team taste bitter defeat in the championship at the hands of Cork. Many, I'm sure, had the deja vu feeling and succumbed to pessimism but many more, those who could make a detached analysis of the display, saw the latent potential of Frankie Walsh, Martin Og, Grimes and Power, John Kiely and Donal Whelan, Tom Cheasty, John Barron and Austin Flynn. They knew that we had men quite capable of competing with the best that any other county could offer. It is history now how faith in those men was rewarded as a new era of Waterford hurling was about to be ushered in.

The more I reflect on the Thurles match the more optimistic I become. Like the majority of our followers I was hoping for a good display with perhaps an outside chance of victory if Limerick played poorly and Waterford reached their best. As it transpired the Shannonsiders were at the top of their form setting a killing pace from the throw-in, a pace which Waterford soon matched and maintained for the rest of the game. Limerick's clear intent was to blow away any possible Waterford challenge and establish a dominance which would make the second half a mere formality. The frantic pace of the first 15 minutes was far faster than anything Tipperary produced against us last year and much faster than what we saw even in last year's All Ireland. It is a tribute to those who prepared the team that the Decie lads adjusted so quickly to the pace.

If our reading of play had been sharper our full back line would have dashed out in front of their opponents far more often and not arrive as they did, second, which is last. That failure to read the play in the first half got us into many difficulties. The two Limerick goals came from crosses which stemmed from their forwards beating our backs to the incoming ball.

In the second half Sean Cullinane played very well indeed by playing his opponent from the front and beating him to the ball every time. This is what Eddie O'Connor of Kilkenny does so well when on song. The full back line is one area of the field in need of improvement which will come with a more positive attitude.

As well as a high level of fitness our team also possessed great spirit. Few teams could have survived the concession of those two goals with morale still intact. They were enough to benumb the most experienced side. Not once in the hour did the heads drop. After Limerick's opening blitz we fought back to be only one point in arrears after 14 minutes before the first of Limerick's goals sickened us. Then came a misfortune when Billy O'Sullivan's flick towards the empty net was stopped by Mick Nash before the second shattering blow, a goal, and two more Limerick points sent them into a ten point lead. Not for a moment did the Waterford effort slacken and when Paul Flynn goaled and we forced a 65 it was indicative of our firm belief in ourselves. Behind by eight points at half time Waterford restarted in whirlwind fashion and within five minutes had reduced the lead to five points, the result of fine approach play and accurate finish. Sensing danger Limerick brought on Ciaran Carey who drove them forward and inspired them to score six unanswered points. Surely Waterford would now hoist the white flag? Not a bit of it. During the final seventeen minutes of this splendid game Limerick didn't record a single score while Waterford pointed five times, had at least six efforts for a goal saved and fought like a team only two points in arrears. The team imbued with that spirit gives great hope for the future.

Apart from goalkeeping weaknesses goals come invariably from the ability of players to capitalise on defensive ses and lucky breaks. Before he left the management of the Tipperary hurling team Babs Keating often bemoaned their inability to score goals. "We need to score goals", he was quoted as saying. In that respect he was, I think, quite wrong because against a good defence any team which sets out to win a match with a concentration on goalscoring uppermost in their mind is putting the emphasis in the wrong place. Good teams have the ability to score points and we need go back no further than Thurles three weeks ago to see for ourselves how Limerick's winning score was compiled. Not once did they make a conscious effort to work a goal. The two goals came from our mistakes and their alertness. When danger threatened after their lead had been reduced to five points in the second half, they launched a series of attacks with one aim - to score points. And they got six of them. Before the end we had missed points from frees and had scorned other opportunities in a desperate effort to get a goal or two. It takes disciplined single-mindedness to adhere to a game plan irrespective of the pressure to try for a goal at a time when a fair bit of leeway has to be made up. It should never be overlooked that a good points total is indicative of good forward and midfield play.

Billy O'Sullivan's great display and Paul Flynn's fine contribution confirmed my conviction that they play best the nearer they are to goal. Billy has two major assets for corner forward - quickness and skill from right and left. Paul has speed of hand and foot and poses a threat to any defence every time he gains possession. I would be far happier to see him roll-lifting the ball for frees. He missed some in Thurles because the jab-lift wasn't quite right and when taking a 65 in the first half both feet were aligned left of the goal and that is precisely where his shot went, left and wide. The jab-lift is ideal for a penalty (D.J. Carey always uses it). Admittedly there are some very good free takers who jab the ball such as Johnny Dooley and Tom Delaney but that style is better suited to the long free out of defence. Even then the taker doesn't always make proper contact if the ball is not jabbed up to the height which allows the striker to turn his shoulders and contact the ball square. James O'Connor is quite a good striker but some of his jab-lifts necessitate a hurried

stroke with the hurley in an open position resulting in backspin and loss of distance.

Waterford face an exciting future. Average age of 24 with some more young vigorous back up like Ger Harris waiting for an opportunity to strut his stuff. This league realised one of their targets. They are now in Div. One where Cork, Dublin and themselves will next time out be competing with faster, fitter opposition from Tipperary, Kilkenny, Limerick and Galway which will oblige them to adjust to first division pace with all of its benefits for next year's championship. We defeated Antrim last Sunday week to clinch promotion. Of course we weren't properly focused which is very understandable when your team takes on at home a team whose credentials aren't calculated to strike fear into the heart or send the pulse racing. Still they must be accorded respect which Waterford did from the throw-in but two early goals soon duled the appetite for work. When we led 4-10 to 2-4 there was an enticement to take the foot off the pedal and, of course, when that happens it can be so difficult to refocus on the iob afterwards.

One disappointment for me in the team selection was the placing of Peter Queally at centre forward and of Ken McGrath on the wing. Peter's qualities suit midfield or half back while Ken, to my mind, has all the attributes needed to make a good centre forward. Besides I don't know any other player of the panel of 24 who could do nearly as well in the position as McGrath. There is no greater boost to ones confidence than selection in the same position, game after game with the chance to settle and feel at ease with one's surroundings. As it turned out Peter (with Tom Feeney) was injured and didn't field.

It is time now that the main elements of the team showed continuity. Switching players during a game can have an unsettling effect. A player struggling to establish himself may react negatively to a change of position and his self confidence take a plunge. His interpretation of the move might be that he wasn't performing and results in putting pressure on him. Once a player is pressurised in this fashion there is every danger that the tension created will inhibit him from doing himself justice. I like to think that players do best when they are aware before hand of a possible change of position. Limerick over the last two years have repeatedly switched Ciaran Carey and Mike Houlihan to the satisfaction of both and to their teams benefit. I'm not saying at all that players should never be switched but I'd rather an experienced performer than one whose fixity of tenure was in doubt and would hope to have players mentally prepared for a possible resiting in another area of the field. That magical but fragile ingredient, confidence, must be nurtured at all times, if possible. More next week.

What 'enough' would be, is difficult to fathom, but having every single club in every county sending a message of sympathy and support to the Bellaghy Club, to show that they are standing solidly behind the people of the North who are keeping the games alive up there under very trying circumstances and even the threat of death, might go some way towards fulfilling our obligations in this matter.


