KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

I am working at present but am reaching retirement age. I want to know if I will qualify for a Contributory Old Age Pension.

People often want to enquire, in advance of reaching pension age, about their pension entitlements, whether their record to-date is adequate, etc. If a person writes in, the Department will provide this information.

Of course if a person has reached pension age or is within three months of pension age, he/she should simply apply for the pension.

To make an enquiry, write to Correspondence Section, Pension Service Office, College Road, Sligo, giving the following details:

- Name
- Maiden name if married woman.
- Present address
- Date of birth
- -Old (pre-1979) National Insurance number (if this is not known, give the address at the time the person first started work).
- RSI number
- Periods of insurable employment since 1953.
- Periods of insurable employment in other EU coun-
- Periods of insurable employment in countries with which Ireland has Bilateral Social Security Agreements. Bilateral Agreements are in operation with the following countries: Australia, Canada, New Zealand, Quebec and United States.

NOTE - Periods of residence/insurance in Australia, Canada and Quebec can be combined with Irish insur-

This simply made speedboat with its racing crew will make waves in a pond or swimming pool, or even in the bath.


Powered by Balloon, the boat will streak across the water as if jet propelled.



Report On 'Jenalisa' Sinking Due September

A report on the results ing vessel 'Jenalisa' off of the inquiry into the Dunmore East in February tragic sinking of the fish-last year is expected to be That's according to the

That's according to the Minister for the Marine, Dr. Michael Woods, who was responding to a query raised in the Dáil recently by Waterford Deputy, Austin

Deasy.
Dr. Woods said the wreck of the 'Jenalisa' was raised to progress the investigation into its sinking. As well as carrying out a number of tests and experiments, the Dept.'s marine survey office recently completed a stability assessment of the vessel to establish how the accident happened.

Expressing his disappointment at the extent of the delay in publishing a report of the investigation, Dr. Woods said he appreciates that uncertainty about what happened their loved ones adds very much to the trauma of loss for the families of the three bereaved fishermen.

Further to a request made by Deputy Deasy, the Minister agreed to arrange for a senior official of his Department to speak with the families and inform them of the situation.



Rock Garden A Blaze Of Colour

If you have a sunny south-facing slope in your garden on which little will grow, why not turn it into a rock garden?

A rockery can make an attractive feature in any garden and in the summer what might otherwise have been unsightly waste ground can come alive with a blaze of colour.

Earlier this century it was fashionable to build a rock garden adjoining the house but this went out of style as it caused walls to become damp and encouraged insects into the building.

So for the past thirty years it has been fashionable to create

a rockery in a corner of the garden.
It is essential your rock garden should have a southern exposure where it will catch plenty of sunlight.

PLANNING YOUR ROCK GARDEN

Where possible choose a naturally sloping site that will provide good drainage. A series of rocky outcrops with gullies running between is highly effective and a rock garden can even be designed around an elevated pond with steps leading up to the water. A footpath in your rock garden is always an interesting feature.

Careful placing of rocks at the construction stage will provide a wide range of planting areas and rocky niches to meet the needs of many different alpine plants.

CREATING A ROCKERY

After you have dug over the site, put a six inch layer of rub-ble all over the area to form a mound and improve drainage. Cover the mound with inverted turves to prevent soil being washed down into it. You can then cover the upturned turves with a nine inch layer of top soil.

You can design your rock garden at several different levels with each tier containing different features.

Use a spade to dig out hollows for each large piece of stone to make them more stable when placed in position. Ensure your large stones are well supported, wedging them with smaller stones underneath. It is important stones are firmly in place and don't move when you step on them.

Infil between the stones with good quality soil, making sure at least a third of each rock is buried beneath the soil. Add a layer of specially prepared compost to the soil, making sure areas between the rocks are well covered. The compost should consist of equal parts of loam, garden compost and sharp sand

or grit.
The garden, once completed, should look as natural as possible. It should also provide a variety of levels and aspects to suit different types of plant.

PLANTING

Alpines and rock plants are almost always purchased as pot plants and may be planted at any time of the year. It is best not to plant them when the ground is wet or frozen or during very warm and dry periods.

Water the plants thoroughly before planting and allow them

to drain. Slide each plant carefully out of its pot and loosen the root ball before planting. Make a hole in the soil with a trowel, making sure it is big enough to accommodate the roots. The plant should sit with its collar just above the surface of the soil. You may need to take extra care when planting in crevices and it is sometimes better to plant during the construction stage.

ROUTINE CARE

Even when your alpines and rock plants are established, it is essential to care for them. They must be kept free from weeds but will not need feeding for some years. Rock garden plants do not normally need more watering than is provided by average rainfall. In droughts, however, the area should be thoroughly soaked. Never water in frosty conditions or during the heat of the day. Early morning or late evening is always the best time to water.

Health Board Refutes Claim Of High Cancer Rate In Dungarvan

A recent claim made by Dungarvan Urban Council-lor, Lar Hart, that there has been a substantial increase in the number of cancer cases in the locality in recent years has been emphatically rejected by the South Eastern Health Board.

Cllr. Hart, who is also red range", although for Chairman of Waterford males it was somewhat less. County Council, had previously called for a full scale investigation into the matter by the health board after he was 'reliably informed' of the alleged situation.

"There is considerable concern among the community, " Cllr. Hart told a recent meeting of the UDC.

The health board's rejection of the claim has been backed up by statistical data, and in a letter to the UDC, Dr. Paul Gannon of the S.E.H.B. has confirmed that there is no reported increase in cancer in the Dungarvan area in the most recent data analyzed by the National Cancer Registry in 1994.

"Cancer deaths now account for approximately one-fifth of deaths annually in Ireland and are made up of many different cancers with different causes,"Dr.

Gannon stated in his letter to number of new cases of can-Dungarvan Town Clerk, Ray Moloney.

In documentation supplied by the health board to the UDC, it was disclosed that the number of cancer incidences in the Dungarvan area are within the "expect-

The health board report disclosed that in 1994 the

cer in the Dungarvan area was 74 - nine less than the expected figure, based on national incidence figures. The report concluded that approximately 50 of these new cases will be treated and recover.

The findings of the health board have been welcomed by the UDC members. UDC chairman Cllr. Austin Flynn

said the findings will dispel the understandable concerns that existed following recent claims in the public do-

Cllr. Hart said he believed it was right and proper to publicly raise the matter. The response to it by the health board, he said, had been swift and positive, and like evervone else he too welcomed the findings.

Deasy Denied Extension To Salmon Season

The Minister for the Marine has refused a request made by Waterford Fine Gael Deputy, Austin Deasy to extend the salmon season to 15 August for net fishermen in view of the inclement weather conditions during the month of June.

Speaking in the Dáil, Deputy Deasy said the atro-cious weather during June, which was the worst on record, had seriously curtailed drift netting for salmon.

Allowed to operate in June and July only, the wet, cold and windy June conditions meant that draft net salmon fishermen had their fishing

confined to July only.

Minister for the Marine, Dr. Michael Woods, said that extensions have not been granted to the draft net salmon season since 1978.

Based on the poor state of salmon stocks generally and reports from the Marine Institute on fishing activity during the commercial salmon season to-date this proved this year."

year, Minister Woods said he did not consider that there is a case for granting extensions to the current drift net season beyond 31

July.
"I accept that weather has not been suitable but according to scientific information, it is not the weather but the stocks which are causing the problem," said the Minister, "especially given the use of monofilament nets and new methods of fishing which were ap-

The new unit will eventually be linked to the main hospital building by a glazed corridor link. When finally completed, stage by stage, the new building will

The first stage of an over- house an impressive 108 volving 22 new beds. The bed nursing and rehabilitation unit to replace the existing St. Joseph's geriatric facility. Four 6 bed wards and three single bedrooms make up the present 27 bed facility.

Speaking to the 'Dungarvan Leader', Waterford County Councillor, Billy Kyne revealed that significant progress has been made in securing the second phase of the hospital project.

A member of the South Eastern Health Board, Cllr. Kyne said the original project team have now been granted permission to prepare plans for the second to prepare plans for the second stage in-

plans will subsequently be submitted to the Department of Health and it is expected that approval will be granted in 1998 for capital programme expenditure.

Similar to the first stage of the development, the second stage is again at an estimated cost of over £1m. In an interview with the 'Leader' Cllr. Kyne commented on the obvious advantages of retaining the original project and building teams which would save time and money if an immediate move can be made on to the second hospital phase.

"I have been encouraged

said Cllr. Kyne, "but everyone in Waterford who can move this second phase along must give their full backing if we are to be suc-cessful."

Referring to the 'Celtic Tiger' scenario of the late 1990's, Cllr. Kyne said he has lobbied the new Dept. administration as he believes that a new Dungarvan hospital is fully justified and badly needed in our

buoyant economy.
"The local commitment of the health board to staff and patients," he added, "needs and deserves a national delivery of the second phase 22 bed extension".

The enhanced 'yes' vote devastated Waterford merger opponents who had hoped that a small turnout would allow them to secure the 26% minority required to scuttle the deal.

Prior to Friday's 12.00 noon meeting, the anti-mergerites again mounted a last ditch campaign, handing out leaflets to farmers entering the meeting and using a PA system to broadcast their concerns.

As hundreds of farmers applauded the final outcome of the vote announced by Co-Op Chairman, John Dowley, the 'no' voters were gracious in their defeat.

John Cashman, a promi-(WFAG) congratulated the company's management on getting the result they had set out to get. However he said the vote did not change one iota the reservations held by himself and others about the merger agreement. They would now be endeavouring to ensure that the objectives as set out by the pro-merger people would be honoured in every way.

Another dissent voice,

Michael Queally, member of Waterford County Council, said that while he accepted the result, he hoped it would work better than he and his supporters anticipate it will.

ford merger. MERGER SUBJECT TO **APPROVAL**

The huge merger process of the two companies is expected to be completed by September 1st although this could be delayed by a month if the matter is referred to the Competition Authority by the Department of Enterprise and Employment who will be considering the merger under the Irish Merger Act.

The authority could recommend that the Minister accept or reject the merger subject to certain conditions and may examine the combined group's position in the Dublin market where AWG's share has been estimated at up to 70%.

CUT BACKS EXPECTED As the fourth largest dairy group in the world, AWG is expected to cut costs by £20 million in the current year.

These savings will be achieved by rationalising the milk collection system, better use of plant facilities and a lower number of employees. Some market sources estimate that up to 500 jobs could be axed throughout the merged entity's businesses in Ireland, U.K. and U.S. opera-

Both companies however have confirmed that they will operate a policy of no compulsory redundancies and will bring about change through the use of the normal negotiating machinery.

Further talks between the management and unions are expected to take place shortly. Commenting on the weeks and months ahead, Avonmore boss Mr. O'Neill, who will head up the new entity until his retirement in 2 to 3 years time, said work will begin immediately to knit the businesses together and create a unitary state at management farmer and employee level. This process could take 12-18 months.

He added that the companies will now be assessing their markets and their presence in them and will start to target acquisitions in the U.S. and Britain within about 18 months.

It is predicted that the new company will be listed on the stock market in September and shares are initially expected to do well.

At present the food companies shares reflect market approval of the merger with Avonmore up 10p in the last week to 310p and Waterford gaining 12p to close at 177p.

CHAMBER VOICES

CONCERN

Reflecting the concern of the local community, the Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce has offered a cautious welcome to the merger.

Like many businesses in the town, the Chamber has serious concerns relating to the future of the existing operations at the Dungarvan plant and its back-up management resources.

"It is imperative that the board of this new company (AWG) recognise and acknowledge the substantial contribution that the town of Dungarvan has made to the success of Waterford Co-Op and subsequently to Water-ford Foods plc.," stated the Chamber.

To this effect, the Chamber has sent a request to AWG boss, Pat O'Neill seeking an urgent meeting with him to discuss the future of the Dungarvan facility.

The Chamber said it wished to emphasise to the new board that the merger should be seen as an opportunity for expansion of its Dungarvan operations.

We wish to see no reduction in the existing processing capacity, rather we would envisage a potential increase rather than a diminution in existing staff levels," the Chamber declared.

Voicing the concerns of the majority of Dungarvan residents, the Chamber claimed that any potential reduction in staffing levels would have a far reaching knock-on effect in many areas of commercial life in Dungarvan such as the service industry, consumer purchasing power, property prices etc.

In conclusion, the Chamber said it would wish to be given the opportunity to work closely with the new company in determining the future for Dungarvan.





Dairy **MILKING MACHINES**

Many farmers change their liners at the beginning of the milking season. If this is the case, then it is time to change them again.

In these times of cutting costs, it may be tempting not to bother with this for another while. However, it is worth noting that good liners that are on the Moorepark list of recommended liners, combined with heavy clusters, have been a big success in reducing mastitis and lowering

It is good to change all the lines at the same time. Then there is no confusion and none will be missed.

Teagasc Survey Of Farm Safety

A National Teagasc Farm Survey was completed in February 1997. The following are some of the survey

Approximately 2,000 farm accidents giving rise to personal injury now occur on farms each year. This represents a 50 per cent reduction of the 1991 survey

Specialist dairying and tillage farms no account for a higher proportion of farm accidents. Thirteen per cent of farms (1 in 8) in these categories have accidents.

Tractors and machinery (36%, livestock (23%) and trips and falls (18%) account for over three quarters of farm accidents.

Three quarters of accidents involved the farm operator with an additional 13 per cent of accidents involving another adult member of the family.

Children still account for an unacceptably high level of serious injuries (8%).

The severity of individual farm accidents has increased since 1991 with 42% of accidents giving rise to a hospital stay.

Only 25 per cent of farmers stated they had specifically incorporated safety measures into their farming routines in the previous five years.

Set Aside Management

Where green cover has been established, it must be cut at least once during the period July 15 to August 15 in order to leave a covering of 10cm. (4 inches) or

The cutting must be left on the land, and turning or baling of the cuttings is not permitted.

Where it is intended to cut silage on set aside in September, apply 70-80 units of Nitrogen per acre or, where grazing is intended, apply 30-40 units per acre. Remember that the silage or grazing can only be used by your own stock.

Ploughing set aside to prepare for a 1998 crop is allowed from July 15 onwards, provided the crop is not harvested before May 15, 1998.

AgriTourism **Grant Structure**

A further tranche of investment under the Agri-Tourism scheme which is part of the Operational Programme for Agriculture, Rural Development and Forestry 1994 - 1999 has been announced. It is hoped that the £4m EU grant will stimulate £15m of investment. Conditions remain almost the same as the previous scheme with grant aid of 50% for leisure facilities and 20% for accommodation with a maximum investment of £50,00 for an individual. The sting in the tail for accommodation is that the grant limit is determined by the investment in the leisure activity. The clause of 50% of eligible investment 'on farm' still holds. A farmer is defined as someone gaining 25% of income from farming. A group comprises of two or more farmers or a farmer with rural dwellers. Investment ceiling for a group is £250,000.

Speaking at the launch of the leaflet this week, Professor Mike Gibney of Nu-triscan Ltd., Trinity College, said "Women need almost one and a half times the daily iron requirement of men, their recommended daily allowance, RDA, is 14mg. per day, compared to

"The mineral iron is vital for healthy blood and normal growth and develop-ment. Low intakes can lead to iron deficiency anaemia. Symptoms of anaemia, even when mild, include lethargy and poor work perfor-

mance," he added.
Simple steps on how to increase your daily intake of iron are outlined in the leaflet. Iron should be consumed in its most absorbable form in order to achieve your recommended daily allowance.

best sources of easily absorbed iron - it can be absorbed up to seven times more easily than iron from vegetables and cereals. Meat also helps to boost the absorption of iron from these foods when eaten at the same time.

The Farm Family chairperson said that women between the relevant ages should be aware of the advice given by Professor Gibney and also avail of the leaflets which are available by calling 1800-845-678.

ICMSA Says Changes Will Be Made In Santer **Package**

ICMSA President, Frank Allen said that changes will have to be made in the so-called Santer Package to ensure that Ireland's farmers receive adequate rewards for their labour.

Speaking in Brussels after a series of meetings with EU officials and Irish MEPs, Mr. Allen said the document "Agenda 2000" - which sets out the future proposed strategy by the EU in relation to matters such as structural funding and agriculture supports to member states - was not a definitive document.

"Agenda 2000 is a framework document which forms a starting point for a wide range of discussions and lobbying to take place before anything final is agreed in relation to structural funding for member states or changes in the agriculture supports structure."

Mr. Allen said ICMSA will be putting its own proposal to the European Commission to secure the introduction of policies which provides a bright future for farming and rural communities and which discriminates in favour of those most in need.

Waterford IFA Chairman Says **Urgent Government Action Required**

Waterford IFA Chairman, James Coughlan said that urgent Government action was now required to resolve the ferry access problem for the important £60m EU live export trade.

Mr. Coughlan said: "Unless there is immediate progress made in compelling Pandoro to carry all livestock on their ships out of Irish ports, then the govern-ment must provide alternative ferry arrangements without delay."

He said it is the clear responsibility of the government to guarantee both

farmers and exporters "our fundamental right of access to the EU single market."

The IFA Chairman said that "there was a real urgency at farm level to have this ssue resolved before the autumn weanling sales begin in August.'

Mr. Coughlan said that IFA will be raising this matter with both the Taoiseach and Tanaiste early next week. "Farmers are now demanding that our right of access to the single market be secured and guaranteed by the gov-ernment."

ICMSA SEEKS FARMER REPRESENTATIVES ON **BOARD OF FOOD SAFETY AUTHORITY**

ICMSA President, Frank Allen, has written to the Minister for Health, Brian Cowen, pointing out the need to have farmer representatives on the Board of the Food Safety Authority.

Mr. Allen has requested a meeting with the Minister "to put the case of having farmer representatives on the

Mr. Allen said ICMSA is committed to food safety and has promoted wholesome and healthy food at every opportunity.

"I have pointed out to the Minister that failing to have farmer representatives on the Board will mean the farm organisations will not be aware of the thinking of the Food Safety Authority and will not be aware of the reasons behind some of the decisions made by the Board.

The Minister has been made aware of my view that it is not going to be an efficient arrangement if the farm organisations have to meet with the Food Safety Authority to clarify decisions made by the Board. It would be much more efficient if farmer representatives were appointed to the Board," said the ICMSA President.

ICMSA HIGHLIGHTS APPEAL SYSTEM FOR LAND DESIGNATIONS

Maurice Harvey, Chairman of ICMSA's Farm Services Committee reminded farmers that the deadline for the submission of appeals against land designated as Special Areas of Conservation (SAC) and Special Protection Areas (SPA) is 30 July, 1997.

Mr. Harvey said the appeal system was open to farmers who contend that their land, or part of their land, should not be designated under these headings. Farmers could also appeal of they felt that their land, or part of their land, should be designated as a SAC or a SPA. ICMSA Farm Services Committee Chairman said farmers with problems on this issue should first approach the local wildlife ranger to see if matters can be resolved. If unsuccessful, the landowner can approach the District Officer of the National Parks and Wildlife Service or this Service's head office in Dublin.

Ultimately, if failing to get satisfaction by going through this process the landowner can lodge a formal appeal which s/he must do before today 30 July, 1997.

Narrow Escape For Dungarvan Soldier In U.S.

narrow escape in America recently when he suffered a life-threatening laceration from a circular saw.

Fergus Duggan, son of Martin Duggan, Spring Marquis, Dungarvan is currently recovering and undergoing physical therapy in a top U.S. hospital.

A combat engineer with the U.S. marines, Fergus was injured across his abdomen and thigh while he was doing woodwork with a circular saw during the reconstruction of horse stables at the Laurel Bay military housing area.

Fergus joined the Marines in December 1993. He has one brother Paul (Chicago) and two sisters Catherine (London) and Ursula Donovan (Dungarvan).

According to a report on the incident in the "Tri-Command Tribune", only quick thinking and rapid re-

local Residents Association.

sponse by marines and sailors from the air station succeeded in saving Fergus' life.

SSgt. Kenneth Gibson who played an important role in the rescue, said that when he ran over to LCpl. Duggan, "he was standing there with his hands up and blood was down to his elbows".

Also on the scene was fellow combat engineer LCpl. Corey Robison who said they immediately laid Duggan down until rescue personnel arrived.

"I thought we were in trouble seeing all the blood that was being lost," he said.

Military policemen, air station emergency medical technicians, the local fire department and the Beauford County Emergency Medical Service were quickly on the scene. Robison and Gibson both continued to apply pressure on the wound and talked to Fergus to keep him

When medical personnel arrived, they put mass trousers on the injured marine, which are designed to place pressure on the lower extremities to pump blood to the upper extremities. As is generally the case with this type of traumatic accident, Fergus was in shock and had to be calmed down.

HM2 Russell Scott, who was the first emergency medical technician on the scene, gave a great deal of credit to the Marines Gibson and Robison who were there first with Fergus.

"If it weren't for the marines and firemen the accident would have been fatal," he stated.

LCpl. Robison who knows Fergus on a personal level said that after the doctors told them he was going to be fine, he felt a lot better.

"He's a friend and we work with him," he said, 'he's one of us so it felt good to know that he's still going to be around with us."

BALLINACOURTY LIFEBOAT SERVICE

The three lifeboats which operated from Ballinacourty were "Christopher Ludlow" "William' Dunville", and "Christopher Ludlow 2nd". These were operating from 1863 - 1899. The lifeboat was moved to Ballinacourty from Helvic in 1863.



Q. I'm very worried about my dad. He smokes 20 cigarettes a day, at least. His breath always smells horrible and his clothes smell of smoke too. I did some sums the other day and I reckon that he spends about a thousand pounds a year on ciga-rettes. We have tried to persuade him to give them up but with no success, maybe you could say something in your column to make him see sense. As you point out, ciga-

rette smoking is an expen-sive habit and this alone is a very good reason for quitting

smolding. Cigarette smoking also has a bad effect on the smokers general health and on the health of those around them. In Ireland 7,000 people die each year from smoking related diseases. This is 10 times more than the number killed each year in road accidents. About a quarter of all regular smokers are killed prema-

turely by their smoking, losing on average 10-15 years of potential life. Smoking causes three major diseases lung cancer, heart disease and chronic lung bronchitis and emphysema 90% of lung cancer deaths are due smoking, 25% of deaths from heart disease, and about 75% of deaths from bronchitis and emphy-

A woman who sema. smokes while she is preg-nant is at increased risk of miscarriage, of having a stillborn or low birthweight baby Smokers are more likely to have peptic ulcers and their ulcers respond poorly to treatment. Peripheral vascular disease, narrowing and blockage of arteries of the arms and mainly the legs, resulting in gangarene of part of the limb and maybe even amputation of the limb, is more common in smokers People who smoke cough more, get more chest infec-

tions than non-smokers and are more likely to suffer from shortness of breath. Passive smokers, that is non-smokers who are exposed to smoke from other people's cigarettes, have at least 35% increased risk of lung cancer, and also heart and other lung problems. Young children living with smokers suffer from an increased number of lung problems, for examples colds and asthma, when compared to children living in non-smoking households. There is a very good booklet

called "Health and information on smoking," available from, The Health promotion Unit, Dept. of Health, Hawkins House, Dublin 2.

Q. My mother got an attack of shingles recently. She had a terrible time, the rash was very painful and it got infected. Her doctor prescribed some medica-tion for her and it helped her rash a little, however it hurt her bank balance more, as it was very expensive. We'll get over that but she is now worried that her grandchildren will get shingles from her. Could you also explain about shingles as she is uncertain as to what exactly it is?

The virus that causes shingles is the same virus that causes chickenpox in children. After an attack of

chickenpox in childhood the virus lies dormant in the nerve cells of the body. Shingles occur when this virus, Varicella Zoster, is reactivated and affects one or more nerves and the area they supply. This reactivat-ing is often triggered by stress, getting older, being run down, physical trauma and illhealth. Shingles start with a painful burning sensation along the path of the affected nerve and a mild flu like illness. After approxi-mately a week a blistering rash appears on the affected area, this is usually the trunk but any part of the body may be involved. Clusters of new blisters will appear for about another week. Then over the following few weeks the blisters will scab over and heal. Occasionally the affected area may remain painful even after the rash has cleared up. This is known as postherpetic neuralgia and may last for some months. Visual and hearing problems may also occur but this only happens whenever shingles affect the face especially near the eye.

Your mothers grandchildren may become infected with the virus if they come into direct contact with the rash. If they haven't had it already, they will get an attack of chickenpox. Any child in good health who has had chickenpox will be fine



Chef's corner Mini Breakfast Danishes

Preparation: 40 minutes + proving: Cooking: 15-20 minutes

Makes: 16 2 (280g/10oz) packets bread and pizza base mix 4 tbsp sugar 50g/2oz butter, melted 410ml/14fl oz milk, warmed 1 (425g/15oz) can apricot halves, drained 6 tbsp strawberry jam, warmed

3 tbsp flaked almonds

1 egg, size 3, beaten

3 tbsp honey, warmed

6 tbsp apriicot jam, warmed and

METHOD: Place the bread and pizza base mixes in a bowl and stir in the sugar. Add the butter and milk and beat together to form a dough. Turn out on to a floured surface and knead for 5 minutes. Preheat the oven to 220"C/425"F/Gas mark 7. Divide dough into 16 pieces and roll out each to a 7.5cm/3in square to make the following: Apricot fans: Make a cut from each corner almost to the centre, then lift alternate corner pieces to the centre. Place an apricot half in the centre. Square twists: Make a cut 6mm//in from edge around inside of square, leaving 2 opposite corners uncut.Dampen edges with water then lift cut corners and cross to overlap at uncut corners. Place an Place apricot half or a little straw-

berry jam and a few laked almonds in the centre. Turnovers: Cut slits on half the square, fill other half with an apricot or strawberry jam. Dampen edges and fold over. edges and told over.

Diamonds: Place 2 apricot halves or some strawberry jam and a few flaked almonds in the centre. Bring 2 oppositge corners together and gently press to seal. Put Danishes on 2-3 baking sheets. Leave in a warm place for 45 minutes until almost doubled in size. Glaze with beaten egg. Bake for 15-20 minutes until golden. Glaze with honey while warm.





ICMSA Secures Commitment In Brussels For Family Farms

Speaking in Brussels following the conclusion of two days of intensive lobbying by the ICMSA, the Association's President, Frank Allen, said he had received a commitment from European Commission officials that further reform of the Common Agricultural Policy would not damage the family farm type structure operating in Ireland.

Mr. Allen said: "We raised our concerns in a number of meetings we had with members of Agriculture Commissioner, Franz Fischler's Cabinet regarding the anticipated impact which reductions of structural funding and further reform of Common Agricultural Policy will have on rural communities and farm families.

"The officials have given ICMSA a firm commitment that support of rural communities and the preservation of the family farms which we have in Ireland are guaranteed under the proposed reforms which the EU must undertake between the years 2000 and 2006."

Mr. Allen added: "The officials attempted to assure the ICMSA that Ireland's farmers will continue to receive just rewards for their labour. ICMSA stressed the need for gradual reform of the agriculture supports structure and was informed that a European model of farming would be maintained and there would be no headlong rush to adopt the highly intensive and free market type of agriculture policy like that operating in New Zealand.'

"ICMSA has made it clear that the Association will vehemently resist the proposed reforms if they would cause a reduction in farmers incomes or if they failed to incorporate a clear and effective strategy for creating enterprise in rural communities."

Cappoquin Man Wins **Irish Senior Title**



LLOW G.A.A. CLUB NOTES

UNDER-21 HURLING THOUGHTS

It is over a fortnight now since our one remaining county team, our under-21 side, made an inglorious exit from the Munster Championship at Thurles. There was a big representation from Waterford at the match. They travelled in strength, in confident expectation of not alone a good performance but perhaps even eventual victory. Hadn't Waterford minors performed pretty well over the last 4 years, apart that is from the Munster finals of last year and 1995 when good Cork and Tipperary teams put our performances in perspective. Those two finals underlined our lack of ability to perform basic skill quickly or with any consistency and yet had we not beaten what was essentially the same Tipperary team 3 years ago? Having mastered them in 1994, we should be well able for them now. What in heaven's name has happened to us, to them, in the meantime that there should now be such a huge disparity in scoring between us.

We have only to cast our minds back to the Munster minor final of last year, when our opponents were also the blue and gold. The simplicity, pace, power and craft of their hurling was in a different league to ours. Last year's All-Ireland winning team from Tipperary supplied this vear's under-21 team with three of its stars - Eugene O'Neill fulcrum of their attack, John Carroll at midfield and Michael Kennedy at centre-forward. For lads of 19, those three were as exciting a trio as I've seen for quite some time and left an indelible impression on the scoreboard and on the game. O'Neill is an exceptional talent and will continue to amass scores against any opposition but sure didn't we know about him since last year. We were well aware of his style and capabilities but it appeared that we devised no means of tackling and limiting him.

Victor O'Shea was the man deputed to mark him. Victor is a good promising hurler who played very well for our minors at centre-back in Fermoy this year even though he is inclined to be easily drawn out of the centre thus leaving a clear pathway to goal which fast forwards can exploit. He is definitely not a wise choice full-back. Experience in full-back play is essential for the position because without experience, confidence is in short supply. Pulling on the airborne ball is a risky strategy for a full-back unless he is built in the Pat Hartigan mould and the player without enough confidence in his own inability is reluctant to play his opponent from the front, vital where O'Neill was concerned. The half-back who allows the half forward away in a run without chasing him speedily is failing in his duty. Far too often did we see this happening. That unmarked unpressurised forward upsets the whole defence, every one of the backs plus the goalie. Tipperary's half forwards didn't dominate the scoring but contributed handsomely in the build up to scores and have great potential. I saw Andy Moloney two years ago in the Tipperary Under-21 Championship match Cahir v Fr. Sheehy's, Clogheen. Until he retired injured after 20 mins, this big strong talented lad was outstanding and central to all that his team were achieving. Tipperary senior selectors have come to recognise his talent and he has already played in the league. Although out of position, Liam Cahill is a great forward and so is Phil Dwyer so the Tipperary half line of attack was a potent unit. As a consequence our half-back line was under continuous pressure because of the supply of ball emanating from midfield and the Tipperary half-back line.

Our midfield was a major disappointment. Our hurling was never simple and direct and quick. The curse of the present day game - picking and handling, running and trying to strike or pass, all from the Cyril Farrell School of Excellence - seemed to be our only approach. And this criticism applies to all Waterford teams from under-14 to

senior. The double on the ball is scorned. Why ? That is John had a most productive and rewarding hour. I was one question easy to answer. It is never practised properly. You play as you train. We have club training week after week where no priority is given to this skill and there are many coaches, far too many who encourage hanging on to the ball, solo running and passing to the virtual exclusion of ground hurling. "Go !!" "Take them on !!" are the battle cries of the jennet express brigade. Not, of course, that a player should never solo or break past his marker. There are occasions when such tactics are to be recommended but my objection is to what I see as a deliberate over-emphasis on one tactic, a tactic which is the only one employed making the opposition's task so very much easier because the marker knows what to ex-

It was unfair to the player himself and a disservice to his team to place David Bennett at full forward when he wasn't going to get low quick ball in to him, the kind of ball which results from quick whipping on the ground in the midfield and half forward areas. This was David's only hope of securing possession and escaping the clutches of Shelley, Tipperary's shining defensive star in the Munster Senior Final against Clare.

David is a good hurler of excellent skill whose talents are better employed on the wing. He hadn't the slightest chance, the way Waterford played, against the abrasive Shelley. Wouldn't a switch between Shanahan and Bennett have benefitted both and their team ? Significantly U.C.C. selectors position David in the half-forward line for the college and he has been scoring freely.

Dan Shanahan is blessed with fine physique, always was since he first caught a hurley but he always tries to grasp the ball in his left hand and when he does and at this level you can't guarantee that your marker is a moron or an innocent abroad who will stand admiringly as you catch the sliotar every time - he always turns left before striking. There is no variation, it is wholely predictable. The problem really stems from his advantage in height, weight and strength throughout his early career. He was bigger than all others and could put up his hand unhindered every time. So of course he never needed to strike the ball on the ground or to develop his right side or to vary his play as all good adult forwards must when they reach inter county level. He is young, ambitious I'm sure and willing to respond to effective coaching. He needs proper direction to enable him develop into a potent forward and when next year's championship comes around, he can, if he so wishes, be a serious scoring threat to any team. Who is going to motivate him to think about his game and work on his weaknesses?

I met Willie John Daly last week. It was so refreshing to meet the Carrigtwohill man with the zest for life. He is now in his 72nd year and all the vigour and enthusiasm which characterised him are still undiminished. A most animated and interesting conversationalist, Willie John has a great interest in and knowledge of hurling, not just Cork hurling but club and inter county hurling at a national level. Chatting with him is a stimulating and rewarding experience. He doesn't hide his great admiration for the brand of hurling played by Waterford teams at their best. To be honest what appeals to me most about Willie John is his conviction, which I share, about direct, quick economical striking which good teams possess. Even in his day, the forties and fifties, a solo run wasn't scorned when it seemed the correct option but every member of his Carrigtwohill and Cork teams could strike the ball well in the air or on the ground no matter what the circumstance.

In 1952 All-Ireland Senior Hurling Final with Cork, Willie

right in line with one of his points struck from the left wing. It was a shot from his left side, under pressure. Now most right-handed strikers have difficulty avoiding a slice on a strike from that side. Willie John's soaring points from a spot near the sideline on the 50 yard line that day was like a shot from a rifle. He recorded points from his right too and on one occasion when he failed to find Ring with a pass after rounding his man, he solved forward to the 21 before striking off the stick over the bar. I remember him whipping on the ground, left and right and doubling in the air with such ease and grace and effectiveness that he made it seem the easiest thing in the world. And it was, too, for Willie John whose training every evening - that's right, every evening, it is the only way to acquire his level of skill - consisted of practising a wide variety of skills with a preponderance of first time striking. "Do you know," said Willie John, "what Timmy Ryan, the Limerick midfielder said when he was asked by an interviewer about his game plan?" This was the incomparable Timmy, prince of midfielders during the thirties and forties, a man rarely mastered in that position. I never forgot Timmy's answer and reminded myself of what he said every time I took the field. His answer, like his hurling, was simple and direct: "when a ball came in the air, I doubled on it and when it was on the ground I whipped on it. In that way I was never in trouble." How absolutely and stunningly simple. He was "never in trouble" because the ball was gone in to his forwards. No hardships were imposed on his body nor did he slow up play.

What is the relevance of Willie John's story about Timmy Ryan? Why, of course, that the modern craze to catch everything in the air can be stymied by well-drilled opposition as can a policy of lifting, handling, running and attempting to strike under pressure. A midfielder should be an accomplished ground striker and be a competent doubler of the air ball. Not, as some might think, that the midfielder should stand under it waiting for the ball to drop. That's quite useless. The good hurler, whatever his position, will never wait for the ball, he will always go for it whether he is stopping it or doubling on it. As Ring stood under the dropping ball, he waited until the last second before moving forward, jumping in the air and making a high, short, wristy swing which had the effect of slicing the ball. This imparted spin and made it difficult for the goalkeeper to stop. One of Cork's goals in Thurles in 1961 in their Munster hurling semi-final game against Waterford came from Ring's aerial pull on the edge of the square. It ended Waterford's chance of victory and promptly obliged the selectors to justify their existence by replacing the goalie!!

I can't remember either of Waterford's midfielders or either wing forward of our under-21 team pulling properly on the ground in that Thurles game. Did they do it in training? This team, remember, held out our greatest prospect of success in 1997 and have been planning since before Christmas last. Do the selectors understand the value of this simple direct style, a style for which former Waterford teams were renowned and which struck a responsive chord in the heart of Willie John Daly and all others who cherish good hurling. Has any other effort been made to analyse our games and learn a little each time ? Do you think we must endure a further chapter of failed opportunities next year ? Does anyone care as year follows year while our wonderful loyal band of supporters travel far and wide in support of teams which, apparently, over many years haven't been properly prepared? Who is going to do something to address this major problem and when?
