Gardaí Launch Major

Operation Lifesaver, dedicated to the reduction of deaths and serious injuries on the road, was launched in the Waterford/Kilkenny Garda Division by Chief Superintendent Sean O'Halloran yesterday.

The scheme, which was first launched in mid July as a pilot project in the Louth-Meath Garda Division, is now expected to be extended to the rest of the country and will last initially for 6 months.

According to Inspector Michael Blake of Dungarvan Garda Station, Operation Lifesaver will put a greater emphasis on speed traps and check points throughout the county.

The Waterford/Kilkenny

division will be assigned a covert Gatso van which will operate full-time in both counties. Benefitting from the latest in technology, gardaí in the van will be able to record and photograph cars involved in various traffic infringements such as speeding, dangerous driving, drunk driving and careless driving etc. The Gatso van will be located off the road undetected by motorists. The van's hi-tech equipment will record the

car registration number and the registered owner of the vehicle will subsequently be contacted.

Inspector Blake stressed that the new Operation Lifesaver scheme will bring home to people the message

that speeding and dangerous driving etc. are the main cause of serious and fatal accidents.

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Easy-To-Make aug

Make this clown face using a paper plate. Try decorating the plate with different scrap materials to create other types of faces, for example, a chef, plrate, bandit - or even a burglar.

What you need: Wool, Scissors, Paperclip, Paper plate, Plastic lid, Paints and paintbrushes, Tinfoil tray (if you haven't a paper plate you can cut out a card circle instead).

The mask should fit over

your face. To make eye holes, look in a mirror and measure the distance between your eyes with a ruler.

Where is the Village of Oberammergau?

It is a small village in the Bavarian Alps near the border of Austria and Germany. During the winter of 1632 the village was struck by the Black Plague, which spread right through Europe. Oberammergau had a small population and one in every eight was dead by the following summer.

During those years there were elders in the village and they called anybody who could walk to the church to come and to make a solemn vow:"A solemn promise to devote one year in 10 to the preparation and presentation of the tragedy of our Lord's Passion to keep the Christian principle of the redemption of the world before men for all time.

No more deaths occurred in the village from the plague, so the villagers believed God had heard their vow.

Since then, except in wartime, the village people of Oberammergau have presented their passion play every 10 years. The first performance, in 1634, took place in the church. Today there is a huge theatre which seats 6,000 people and has room on the stage for crowd scenes with 500 actors. There are 600 parts in the play and only native-born villagers may be selected. Over a year before the performance the selection of the principal actors takes place by ballot. The rehearsals then begin in May for the first performance in May of the following year. Oberammergau is well known for The Passion Play and thousands travel long distances to see the eight-hour

The play is divided up into episodes. These episodes are introduced by the Passion chorus which consists of 50 singers. The whole community gets involved in the play in

a completely medieval way.



Avonmore Drops 135 Suppliers As Integration **Talks Continue**

Just over a week after their £2.5 billion merger with Dungarvan dairy giant Waterford Foods, the Kilkenny milk cats, Avonmore has confirmed that they are to drop 135 firms from their supply network

will be notified over the next few days of their delisting, a move linked to purchasing and credit control procedures.

Meanwhile, it is now looking more likely that the new Avonmore/Waterford super group may be ordered to sell part of their 80%plus controlling share of the lucrative Dublin liquid milk market by competition authorities. Under the Irish Merger Act, the competition authority are currently examining the combined group's position in the Dublin market and may recommend that the Minister for Enterprise and Employment accept the merger subject to certain condi-

Avonmore's most recent delisting move has sparked fears that the firm has al-

Suppliers to Avonmore ready started delivering on its rationalisation targets.

A spokesman for Avonmore however insisted that the de-listing decision was not linked to their merger with Waterford and was taken solely by their purchasing department in a routine review of their creditor ledger. The bulk of the 135 delisted firms do little or no business with Avonmore and are based all over the country.

The management of both groups have already initiated intense negotiations aimed at slashing costs within the newly formed entity. It is reckoned that the accounts of the AWG Group will deliver annual savings of over £20 million.

The next four weeks will see more rounds of integration talks and it is anticipated that the stock market

regulations resulting from the merger will be completed by mid September when the new corporate identity of Avonmore/Waterford becomes fully operational. Savings of £20m a year

means fewer jobs in the short term, not just on the factory floor and delivery lorries but also non-key per-

sonnel in junior and middle management.

While both Avonmore and Waterford have committed themselves to only voluntary redundancies and retirements, it is expected that the bulk of the 500 to 700 jobs will be axed within the next 18 months. The staff cuts will be located in the Group's U.K., European and U.S. holdings.

The main trade unions within the AWG have

warned that they want full consultation on all job cut proposals. SIPTU and the ATGWU have asked for a commitment to maintain the maximum level of employment throughout the Group.

Likewise the Dairy Executive Association has warned that junior and middle management officials within both operations should not suffer the bulk of the predicted jobs cuts.

Much speculation remains about which executives from each company will make up the new management team. The prestige of having the headquarters of the fourth largest food company in Europe falls to Kilkenny and already an extension to Avonmore's impressive head office on Kilkenny's ring road is a re-

The future of Waterford Foods operations in Dungarvan still remains unclear however.

Waterford officials have warned that, under stock market regulations, they cannot comment on specific plans for the merged company until all formal alliance agreements have been concluded.

ON INCREASE

Speaking to the "Dungar-van Leader", Chief Supt. O'Halloran revealed that there were 20 fatal accidents Waterford/Kilkenny division last year. This year there has already been 8 fatal traffic accidents in the district. Two-thirds of last year's fatal accidents were drink related where the average amount of alcohol consumed by drivers was three times the legal limit.

Arrests made by Gardaí for drink driving are up by 50% on the corresponding £50 SPEEDING **FINES**

Another area in which gardaí in the Waterford/Kilkenny divithe sion have been extremely active in recent years is

speeding.
The Chief Supt. revealed that on average, 4,500 motorists are prosecuted for speeding each year in the division while 5,000 notices have been issued to drivers under the on the spot fine system in place since last December.

The two other main areas addressed by Operation Lifesaver are the wearing of seat belts by all occupants

of a car and dangerous/careless driving such as dangerous overtaking, driving a dangerously defective vehicle etc.

With the aid of the new Gatso van, gardaí will be able to monitor driver behaviour. The Gatso van will operate in tandem with the usual radar speed guns, check points and speed traps. As a further measure Chief Supt. O'Halloran said they are currently looking at the possibility of static cam-

RESULTS SO FAR

During the first two weeks of its operation in the Louth-Meath division, 500

on the spot fines for speeding were given out by gardaí. Law breaking motorists are given a specific time frame in which to pay the fine. If they fail to do so, they face court action and a much heftier bill. Figures for the pilot scheme indicate that there were 250 prosecutions for the non-wearing of seat belts and 47 prosecutions for dangerous driving. During the same period, 800 drivers were cautioned for minor traffic infringements.

Operation Lifesaver is being carried out in partnership with the National Roads Authority, the National Safety Council, local authorities and the AA.

U.D.C. Asked To Fork Out £5,000 For Christmas Lights

Already looking ahead to Christmas, the Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce and Industry have asked the local Urban Council to make a contribution of £5,000 towards the cost of the town's elaborate Christmas lights this year.

Just five years ago, the Chamber of Commerce were involved in the purchase of a new festive lighting system costing over £55,000 which made a vast improvement to the Christmas image of the town during this important trading season.

The expensive lights however incur maintenance costs of between £8,000 and £9,000 each year which todate, has been financed through a voluntary subscription system involving the local business community.

A shortfall of more than £10,000 now exists, and the Chamber believes it is time that the local authority came forward with a financial contribution.

Mr. Holohan, said the group considers its request to be "fully justified" and in the best interests of the entire community.

tire community.

In his letter Mr. Holohan pointed out that the Chamber is not setting a precedent in asking the UDC to make a financial contribution.

"It has become well established in many towns and cities in recent years that the local authority bears some, if not all, of the costs associated with festive lighting campaigns", he added.

The Chamber's application for funding is currently being considered by the Urban Council.



French Sacred Music In Lismore Cathedral

The third and final lunchtime recital in St. Carthage's Cathedral, Lismore on Thursday, August 14 undoubtedly offers the most exciting programme in the series of these recitals. It focuses on French sacred music of the twentieth century, to be performed by St. Carthage's Singers and cathedral organist Dr. Jan Van Putten.

When it comes to twentieth century organ and choral music, probably no country equals France in the number and the quality of organists who were also prolific composers. Inspired by their great predecessor Cesar Franck and the colourful organs built by Aristide Cavaille-Coll, they showed great skill and imagination and generated compositions of the highest quality that became famous throughout the world.

Many of them were born in the first decade of this century and held lifelong posts as organist in the leading churches of Paris. At the same time it seems as if they form the end of a generation, having exhausted all resources of the romantic and post-romantic French organ tradition.

The programme for the recital of August 14 includes works by Louis Vierne (b. 1870, organist of St. Sulpice and Notre Dame), Marcel Dupre (b. 1886, organist of St. Sulpice), Maurice Durufle (b. 1902, organist of St. Etienne-Du-Mont), Jean Langlais (b. 1907, organist of Ste Clothidle), Oliver Messiaen (b. 1908, organist of La Trinite) and Jehan Alain who was born in 1911, had a short career as composer and organist of St. Nicolas de Maisons Lafitte and was killed on the battlefield near Saumur in June

St. Carthage's Singers will perform Ubi Caritas by Maurice Durufle and three Latin Psalms with their antiphons in connection with three organ improvisations from the Vespers for the Blessed Virgin by Marcel Dupre. The other works are Litanies by Jehan Alain, Choral by Louis Vierne, Prayer of Christ ascending to his Father from L'Ascension by Oliver Messiaen and, finally, Acclamations from the Suite Gregorienne by Jean Langlais.

The recital begins at 12.45 p.m. and will last approximately 50 minutes. Entrance is free, all are welcome.

LIAM LYNCH COMMEMORATION

Last year the Liam Lynch Memorial on the Knockmealdown Mountains overlooking Newcastle was the scene of the historic unveiling of four statues of wolfhounds cast in bronze by artist Pauline O'Connor. This time though not to unveil yet another addition to the monument but to remember that great Irishman General Liam Lynch and his contribution to Irish Nationalism.





A Tradition Of Border Colour



Hardy border plant: Geranium Ballerina will thrive in most reasonable soils.

Geraniums and pelargoniums are so closely linked that at one time botanists grouped them together.

But though they have been cross-bred over the years, there are still marked differences.

The geranium - which draws its name from the Greek geranos - has regular flowers with petals equal in size and a straight seed pod, like a crane's bill.

Most geraniums come from the northern hemisphere and are hardy when grown outdoors in Ireland - surviving the toughest winters.

The pelargonium by contrast has irregular shaped flowers, with two upper petals frequently overlapping and three often smaller lower petals. The seed capsule is beaked, splitting into segments when ripe.

They tend to be more fleshy in stem and leaf and while geraniums are often used as border plants, pelargoniums are more frequently found protected in pots.

Native to South America, Madagascar and Arabia, almost all pelargoniums are tender and need the protection of a greenhouse in winter.

Both pelargonium and geranium come in hundreds if not thousands of different hybrids and varieties - all making a wonderful, colourful addition to a garden, patio or hanging basket that lasts the summer through.

PROPAGATION

Most geraniums and pelargoniums reproduce quite happily through cuttings which should be taken in August and early September.

You should choose young shoots or around 10cm long that are not carrying flowers.

Cut them cleanly, just below the joint - and stick the cuttings into a pot filled with a sandy compost, moist but well

Shaded from direct sunlight, the cuttings will root very quickly and can later be potted separately and kept under glass through the winter.

Seed sown under glass in January or February will give flowering-size plants for bedding out in early June.

For pelargoniums the temperature needs to be maintained at around 18C, and either peat or loam-based compost can be used.

CHOOSING VARIETIES

It is possible to select pelargonium varieties which, even when raised from seed, will give spectacular bedding flowers all in one colour. These include Mustang (brilliant scarlet), Picasso (purple carmine) and Sundance (orange-scarlet).

There are 400 species of true geraniums and most will succeed in any reasonable soil.

They have been cultivated in Irish gardens for centuries and were recorded as early as Shakespeare's day - and were used to cure piles and dysentery.

Sizes and colour vary tremendously. Varieties such as G. cinereum (pink) grow in humps of no more than six inches and are ideal for a rockery, while others such as G. pratense "Mrs. Kendall Clarke" grow to three foot with violet-blue flowers

FEAST OF ST. DECLAN

Reports in the local papers of celebrations to mark the feast of St. Declan of the Decie indicate a strong tradition still exists amongst a large group of people. Ardmore is the centre most closely associated with St. Declan. It has the physical signs of an early Christian community and thankfully the people have kept the oral tradition alive.

The Saint's birthplace in Dromroe, Cappoquin has not been preserved to the same extent. It escaped total destruction in 1881 only through the intercession of

the Very Rev. Fr. F. O'Brien P.P., V.G., M.R.I.A., P.P. Cappoquin 1881 to 1892. It was at that time considered a piece of waste ground which would be more usefully employed as part of the adjoining farm. It is likely that the site was reduced in size at that time from occupying the entire field to the small piece which encloses the church site and the graveyard. An archaeological study of the area could still reveal the full extent of the site as it might have been in the 3rd century. The site predates

St. Patrick and Mochuda and has a strong connection with Seemochuda, Ballysaggart.

St. Declan's father, Erc is mentioned on an Ogham stone found in Seemochuda and now in the care of University College Cork. Erc was not a common name and only a few rare mentions of it appear altogether.

"Religin Deglan" stands

in an area known as "Mag Sciat Campum Scuiti" or the plain of the shields, in the camp of the Scots by the Bollandists. The Scots are the tribe of Gaels who landed in Ireland from Spain in perhaps 1620 - 1036 B.C. Their Queen "Scotia" died shortly after arriving and is buried in Scotia's Glen, Co. Kerry. The shields would have been used by the Scots for training soldiers. They supplied large numbers of mercenaries to other clans in Ireland and abroad and to protect their own territories in Ireland, Scotland and Wales. The name Scotland is directly related to Queen Scotia, Scotia's land and it's inhabitants were known as Scots, the Picts knew them as Scuits or dark skinned.

To fully explore the importance of this site to the early history of Ireland and it's undoubted claim to be the cradle of Christianity, with the

birth of St. Declan in this country, a serious attempt is being made to raise the profile of the area. Efforts of the locals so far have seen the site brought back from the brink of obscurity once again. Mass has become an annual event on the Saint's feast day, care and maintenance of the site is ongoing, grass cutting, fencing, putting up information leaflets etc. The preservation and investigation of the site is important for Christians but it is equally important to our understanding of our Gaelic/Celtic background.

For those who would like to take part in supporting the local effort, a memorial role is being opened. The names of those entered will be remembered in a special way at the annual Mass in Religin Deglan. St. Declan is the patron saint of the county of Waterford and it is hoped that people from all parts of the county will want to see the birthplace of their patron saint and king of the tribe which gives its name to the Decie, raised from relative obscurity to a central part of their Celtic Christian heritage. Sucklers **LOOKING AHEAD**

To keep suckled calves thriving as their feed supply changes progressively from milk to grass, allow them to creep graze on good grass from early August.

This will reduce the need to feed concentrates as grass and also make calves more independent of their dams, resulting in less stress at weaning.

Plan for late autumn grazing. Identify the fields that will be closed up first and those that can be grazed in November/December.

Silage fields that are grazed first in spring should be closed by November.

Fields that will be grazed last in autumn should be grazed bare in August.

Apply one to 1.5 bags CAN per acre and close for five to six weeks.

Grassland Reseeding

Modern perennial ryegrass varieties are capable of producing 100 tonnes of fresh grass per hectare per year. It is good policy to reseed at least 10 per cent of your grassland each year. Grass growing conditions are particularly good this year so it may be possible to reseed even more.

- High Grass Yields With a Long Growing Season.

ASSESS THE PASTURES NOW

Assess the sward in at least 10 different areas of the field. Examine an area of 0.2 to 0.3 M3 (2-3 ft2) at each point.

CHECK FOR-

- Percentage Open space
- Percentage Of Ryegrass/White Clover
- Percentage Of Old Grasses Bent, etc.
- Percentage Of Weeds, docks.

If the percentage of Ryegrass is low (30 per cent) with plenty of bare patches and weeds, then reseeding is necessary.

PREPARATION OF RESEEDING

Existing vegetation should be killed off with a Glyphosa type spray, especially if bent is present.

This spray can be applied five to six days before silage cutting, but cutting needs to go ahead as planned.

Alternatively, the sward can be left to green-up to 10cm before spraying. It can be grazed about a week later or else the decayed vegetation should be cut off before cultivation begins.

DO-

- Allow escape routes for wildlife by harvesting in sections rather than working in from the field edges this also applies to silage cutting.
- Maintenance work in the farmyard including painting and repairs to old buildings.
- Repair stone walls and other such features around the farm.

- Burn straw or stubbles.
- Dump sheep dip or allow into soakpit. It should be landspread and may be mixed with slurry to accelerate decomposition.
- Take ivy off trees unless it lends the tree liable to windblow.
- Seal off the fabric of walls.

PROPOSED MILK PRICE CUTS REJECTED

The dairy proposals in the Santer Package could result in Irish farmers suffering the biggest cut in price and income while compensation premiums may be limited.

This was stated by Tommy Cooke, Chairman ICMSA Dairy Committee following a series of meetings in Brussels. Mr. Cooke said that there has been a considerable amount of confused thinking in Ireland about the future milk quota and EU milk price supports.

Mr. Cooke said that Ire-

land should reject the proposed 10 per cent cut in milk price supports. "I see no reason why the present price supports can't be maintained. If cuts are introduced the reality is that export refunds will be the first to be hit and this will reduce the market returns for butter and SMP in particular. The brunt of these cuts would be carried by Irish dairy farmers.'

Mr. Cooke confirmed that the EU Commission had accepted that the "world price" for dairy products did not exist as such as very little products were traded internationally. This being the case,

why are the EU attempting to lower price support?

At least the Santer proposals have removed the uncertainty about quota beyond 2000. The vast majority of dairy farmers will be pleased that the quota will last until at least 2006. "I am convinced that greater flexibility must now be applied to the quota system which will be central to milk production over the next 10

years.
"ICMSA has, for example, made proposals for longterm leasing without land and averaging of fat levels

EXPORTERS LEGAL CHALLENGE SUPPORTED BY **ICMSA**

Frank Allen, President of the ICMSA, supported the moves by the representatives of Livestock Exporters to seek an injunction preventing Pandoro from suddenly cutting off shipping facilities. Mr. Allen urged that livestock producers and the marts should involve themselves in assisting the fund-ing of the legal challenges. People with direct interests in the live export of cattle should contribute, he said.

Mr. Allen challenged the

Coughlan Says **Minister Walsh Must Abolish** Excessive Penalties On **Premium And** Headage **Payments**

the extreme that a farmer not fully aware of all the detailed rules on premium and headage should be denied his total income for a two year period, because he makes a simple unintentional error on his application to the Department of Agriculture according to Waterford Chairman, James Coughlan.

Calling on the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh, to launch a major campaign in Brussels to have the EU penalties associated with errors under the various premium and headage schemes overturned, Mr. Coughlan said that genuine farmers who make unintentional errors are being handed down penalties as if they were criminals.

"Denying an elderly farmer his entitlements to direct payments for a two year period because he made a simple error on his application is

It is an abuse of power in an abuse of power and excessive in the extreme.

Mr. Coughlan said that the penalties in place are excessive and violate the basic rights of applicant farmers. They are completely out of proportion with the majority of problems that emerge on applications in practice.'

To illustrate the excessive nature of penalties, the Waterford IFA Chairman quoted the example of a farmer who fails to meet the area aid application deadline resulting in a total denial of any premium and headage payments for a full year. "This is equivalent to denying a worker his wages for a full year because he turns up late for work one morning.'

Mr. Coughlan said that Minister Walsh should immediately force this subject on to the agenda in Brussels and have the necessary changes introduced before the 1997 payments begin this autumn.

Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman, Michael Murphy (Tallow) has said small and medium-sized dairy farmers who do not milk-record may lose out considerably on a range of benefits. Not only do they not have access to the production management informilk mation which recording would give them, but they also lose out in terms of premia payments.

"Dairy farmers who milk record have found out for themselves that they can improve significantly the qualof their milk by

monitoring individual cows, while gaining vital information to help them maximise yields and plan production," Mr. Murphy said.

May Lose Out

'Also, many dairy farmers with good milk yields who do not milk-record are losing out in terms of premia payments such as special beef premia, suckler cow and extensification premia. This is because their dairyrelated stocking density is calculated by dividing their quota by the national average yield of 897 gallons, instead of their actual yield," he explained.

"As a result, they may be left with a far higher stocking density than they really have, and may lose hundreds of pounds in various premia payments," he said.

"Small, efficient dairy farmers could therefore gain greatly from getting involved in milk recording, and should consider this option quite seriously. In addito the immense benefits on production management, the milk producability to claim additional premia would in most cases at least cover the cost of milk recording," he

We also emphasise the need to get sound professional advice on the tax consequences of finance leases before entering a leasing agreement. Starting a lease agreement early in the accounting year is another key advice note and above all do not disregard negative option letters, which if unanswered, will mean that you wish to terminate the lease agreement. Termination in this way could have hefty tax conse-

The guide includes examples of the workings of the tax capital system and the lending security implications of term loans over hire purchase and leasing.

On Thursday, July 17, Brendan Brennan answered the final curtain call of life at St. Vincent's Private Hospital, Elm Park, Dublin, where he had been a patient for a relatively short time. A native of Carnew in the Garden County, Brendan, who was aged 69 years, received his formal education at Carnew NS, Rochestown College in Cork and continued his further studies at Bolton Steet Technical College, Dublin.

A quantity surveyor by profession, Brendan's services, counsel and advice were sought widely. An expert in his field, his reputation and diligence to detail won him much praise and many admirers. He took a great pride in his work, his efforts were always spoken of with the highest acclaim. A man of exemplary character and first rate ability, we are the poorer for his pass-

Son of the late Thomas, T.D., and Sally Brennan, Brendan grew up in a politically oriented household. where love of one's God. Church and country were so important. From an carly age he took a deep interest in Irish history. He quickly realised the importance of 1798 and the Ferian Rising of 1867 in the struggle for Irish freedom and independence. He was an avid reader and collected books, papers of the day, journals, postcards and other historical artefacts.

On a number of occasions he displayed publicly some of this memorabalia at the request of Conradh na Gaelilge, Gaelscoileanna éagsúla agus freisin Dáil na Mumhan. He always attended the Liam Lynch Commemoration and the Liam Mellows Remembrance in Castletown. A valued mem-ber of the 1798 bicentenary commemoration committee, Brendan's infectious enthusiasm for the challenge on hand was a source of great encouragement to those around him



it is increasingly common to wake up at some stage of the night. Don't worry if you can't get to sleep or if you wake up during the night. Here are some tips that may

help you.

1. Take some exercise, especially in the afternoon or early evening. Make a short walk part of your daily routine and you will be surprised how much more relaxed you will feel at bedtime.

2. Try to establish a regular routine before going to bed as it trains the mind to recognise that once in bed it's time to sleep.

3. A warm milky drink at bedtime is relaxing and can help you sleep more soundly.

4. Catnapping during the day is not a good idea. Your body only needs a certain amount of sleep during the day and if you catnap then you may not sleep through the night.

5. If you do wake early, don't lie in bed worrying about it. Very early morning can often be the best time of the day, especially in summer-

Oily Skin

Oily skin can often begin at puberty and is caused by a number of different factors. Over secretion of oil from the sebaceous glands, incorrect cleansing, skin hygiene and incorrect diet may all cause oily skin. However, too much oil and grease in the diet does not always worsen or cause oily skin. It can also be linked with medical problems; in such cases a visit to the doctor is essential.

Oily skin has open pores, is discoloured and sallow. Its surface often resembles the skin of an orange and will feel thicker than dry or normal skins. It has a shiny surface with a tendency to blackheads and it is coarse to look at and to feel. Oily skin is more prone to pimples and blemishes but tends to be less prone to wrinkles and fine lines than dry skin. However, when lines and wrinkles do occur they are deeper and

cystitis and they are making my life a misery. When I have to pass water it is agony. I have taken numerous courses of antibiotics which only work for a short while; then I'm back to square one. Is there anything I can do to lessen the frequency and severity of these attacks? My doctor told me that I need to see a specialist in order to find a reason for the attacks.

A. Cystitis is due to an

inflammation of the bladder and causes, as you describe so well, a burning sensation when you pass water. The bladder inflammation also makes you want to pass water more frequently even though you may not pass very much.
Because of the inflammation the bladder and its
outlet pipe, the urethra,
may bleed slightly and you may find blood on the toiletpaper or in the toiletbowl. At least half of all women will suffer an attack of cystitis once or more in their lives. Some women will suffer repeated attacks.

To reduce the frequency of the attacks the following advice may be of some help; 1. Drink at least two litres of water every day to main-tain a good flow of urine and to flush through the kidneys and bladder. Empty your bladder frequently, at least six times bladder daily, so that doesn't bacteria get a chance to grow and cause an attack of cystitis.

2. Wash the perineum or "underneath" morning and evening and always after passing a bowel motion. It would be wise to keep a special flannel for this. Don't use soap to wash, just cool water. After a bowel motion or passing water wipe yourself from front to back.

3. If you have noticed that your symptoms are related to sexual intercourse, it may help if both partners wash with plain cool water before intercourse. Empty your bladder within 15 minutes of intercourse.

lf you do get another attack of cystitis then drink half a pint of water every 20 minutes. Each hour for three hours take a level teaspoon of bicarbonate of soda. Keep warm and rest. Be sure to visit your doctor as you may need a course of antibiotics.

Your doctor has suggested that you see a specialist and I agree with him. The specialist will carry out tests to see if there is any evidence of kidney damage or any abnormality which makes you vulnerable to attacks of cystitis.

Chef's corner Brunch Loaf

Preparation: 15 mins Cooking: 25 mins Serves: 6

Scone: 350g/12 oz self-raising flour 11/2 tsp baking powder 50g/2 oz butter, cubed 2 tbsp fresh chopped chives 240ml/8 fl oz milk beaten egg to glaze Filling: 175g/6 oz rashers smoked streaky bacon, rinded 4 eggs, size 3 75ml/3 fl oz single cream or 1 tsp smooth mustard 25g/1 oz butter

Preheat oven 230°C/450°F/Gas mark 8. In a large bowl, sift the flour, baking powder and 1/2 tsp salt. Rub in the butter until the mixture resembles breadcrumbs. Stir the chives into the flour, then gradually mix in the milk to form a soft dough. Turn out on to a lightly floured surface and knead until smooth. Shape the dough to a 20cm/8in circle, flattening it with the ball of your hand. Lift on to a large baking sheet. Using a sharp knife, score the scone into quarters and brush with beaten egg to glaze. Bake in the preheated oven for 25 minutes until well risen until smooth. knead minutes until well risen and golden brown. For the filling, grill the bacon until Drain on just crisp.

WORLD ATHLETICS CHAMPIONSHIPS

Sonia O'Sullivan -A Gutsy Lady

Precious little has gone right for Sonia O'Sullivan in her world of athletics in the past year. Her Atlanta Olympics were a nightmare and despite her best efforts, her career looked to be on a downward slope especially following a below par performance in Sheffield some weeks back.

The announcement that she was going to compete in both the 1500 and 5000m races at the current World Championships in Athens was met with some surprise to say the least. Many would say that if she experienced another Olympictype disaster, she would be setting herself up for a fur-

ther fall from which she might not recover.

She is obviously determined to prove herself once again at the highest level and her performances in the heat (Saturday) and semifinal (Sunday) of the 1500m shows she possesses rare determination. Whether she does well or not in the final of the 1500m (last Tuesday), she has come a long way in the past few days for which she deserves great credit.

FAVOURITES OUT

The favourites for the 1500m title Kelly Holmes (Great Britain) and Mastakova (Russia) failed to

make it to the final through injury and the title race was rated as wide open with Sonia O'Sullivan now coming more and more into the picture. Ireland's other representative, Sinead Delahunty was unlucky to lose out on a place in the final by .6 of a second. She recorded a best time of 4 mins. 7 secs. for the distance when finishing just outside the automatic qualifying places in her semi-final.

In the Javelin competition Terry McHugh finished 15th of 40 competitors in the qualifying round but despite a fine throw of 77.96m, he failed to qualify for the final round. An athlete of many years ago once told us that one of the greatest aids in the promotion of athletics in bygone years was the inclusion of handicap events at sports meetings throughout the country. The best sprinter for example

best sprinter, for example, began from scratch which was the starting line and the other runners, depending on their ability, received a 5 yard, 10 yard or some other lead. This system made the best runner fight for his win and it also gave all the other runners a decent chance of

winning the race.


SECOND HALF


