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Machine Destroyed In Fire At Dungaryan

Crystal Plant

A blaze at the Waterford Crystal factory at Springmount, Dungarvan last Thursday morning completely destroyed a glass 'wash' machine, causing serious smoke damage to the wash room area.

The Dungarvan plant was on annual shut down and only fifty employees were present when the fire broke out at around 6.45 a.m. Fortunately no one was injured.

Smoke from the fire was spotted by a security guard who immediately contacted the fire brigade and initiated safety procedures such as the sprinkler system and automatic door shut to keep the fire under control.

It is thought that an electrical fault may have caused the blaze which spread to packaging boxes and paper.

Dungarvan Fire Station were loudly praised for their prompt response and speedy arrival on the scene. Three units from the local station including the hydraulic platform were quickly in control of the fire.

New 77 Acre Industrial Park For Co. Waterford

news on the jobs front last week with the announce-ment that the IDA are to create a multi million pound high-technology industrial park at Butlerstown on the outskirts of Waterford city.

At a special Waterford County Council meeting held recently in Dungarvan, members unanimously approved a variation of the County Development Plan which rezones 77 acres of agricultural land to 'industrial', thereby enabling the IDA to lodge a planning application with the local authority for the development of the park.

Negotiations have already taken place between the IDA and the landowner and an agreement has been reached on the sale of the land at Butlerstown.

It is the intention of the IDA to develop the 77 acre site into one of the biggest high tech industrial parks in the country, benefitting both the city and the county in terms of enhanced employment prospects.

County Manager Donal Connolly said the develop-ment of the proposed hightech industrial park would

both the city and county.

The land, he indicated, would be serviced by the approach roads network planned for the proposed second river crossing in Waterford city. Mr. Connolly said he was satisfied that a sufficient green belt of agri-cultural land will remain in the area after the rezoning of the 77 acres.

Proposing the draft variation of the County Development Plan, Cllr. Pat Leahy described the development of the industrial park as an "excellent proposal", which

Waterford County Council has initiated the first steps towards the compulsory acquisition of land in connection with proposed major road improvement works on the main Cork-Waterford N25 route near the village of Kilmacthomas.

The Council has sought a road improvement pro-Compulsory Purchase Order from the Minister for the Environment that will enable the local authority to acquire varying areas of agricultural land including a small stretch of an abandoned railway line. a disused quarry, a number of private entrances to and several dwellings. stretches of public roadway. The programme also calls for the abandonment of up to seven public rights of way, returning them to agricultural use. If there are objections to that proposal the Minister will then be obliged to hold a public local inquiry before adjudicating on the matter. Any objections in this regard must be lodged with the Minister before September 12th.

Try making this television — fitted with a scroll which you can turn to make images move across the screen.

What you need: Cereal box, Egg box cut into segments, Two kitchen-roll tubes, Sellotape and glue, Paper, Cocktail sticks, Comics or magazines.

- Cut the back off the cardboard box, leaving the front, top, bottom and sides. Flatten it out and mark lines 2cm in from the outer edges of each side.
- Use two kitchen roll tubes to make the scroll. Put the edge of one of the tubes in each corner formed where your lines cross. Trace around it and cut the circles out.
- 3. Cut out the pictures you want to appear on screen

from comics or magazines. Draw the shape of a screen on the front of the box, and cut it out.

4. — To make the scroll, you need a long strip of paper which fits in your television. Glue the pictures along the strip of paper. Roll the strip around the cardboard tubes. Stick the ends to the rolls with tape.

Fit the scroll inside the TV, pushing the ends of the tubes



through the round holes.

 Make an aerial by pushing cocktail sticks into a segment of an egg box. Make dials from two more segments. Twist the tube to make your pictures move across the screen.

Why Do Penguins Have Small, Stiff Wings?

Most birds use their wings for flying, but penguins use theirs as paddles for swimming. The penguins spend most of their lives on the sea and find their food there. Many birds can swim and fly, but no other bird can swim as well as the penguin. Penguins have bones, muscles and organs very like those of flying birds, so it is assumed that their ancestors must have been able to fly. It is also assumed that they lost the power of flight while learning to swim faster and dive deeper in search of food. All this must have happened millions of years ago because 25,000,000 years ago the penguins were very much like the species today.

The penguin's feathers are short and grow all over the body leaving no bare spots unprotected from cold air and water. The feathers of the paddle-like wing are small and stiff, with broad flat shafts. On the back edge of the wing are rows of many short feathers with strong shafts.

The bones of the wing are flat, thus allowing the wing to be thin and streamlined yet strong enough to push the bird through the water. The shape is very much like that of the flipper of a seal. The penguin paddle is stiffer because some of the bones have grown together, although it is thinner than the wing of a flying bird.

The breast muscles are large and powerful like those of another bird, but the muscles in the wings are small.

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



Co. Enterprise Board Announces Assistance

Programme For Autumn

The County Enterprise Board has had a busy year so far with £241,900 allocated in direct grant aid to small enterprise. The immediate creation of 48 fulltime jobs is very satisfactory, particularly as it is the result of a relatively low cost per job of just over £5,000. It is also worth noting that this core figure of 48 does not reflect the potential of these small companies to realise further jobs as they become more established.

Quite apart from the assistance given in capital, employment and feasibility grants, over 50 companies have taken advantage of a range of management development programmes which have been run over this period. Having just completed the Compass Marketing Programme - a practical marketing course run one evening a week over an eight week period, Rosemary Walsh of Bonmahon Joinery had this to say -

"the course gave a great insight into the practical side of marketing. The trainer Siobhan O'Dwyer was excellent. Conor Gilligan of Passage East Ferries claims that "the programme was very helpful, going in detail through issues like pricing, distribution and getting the most out of advertising." Conor is now looking forward to taking part in the follow-up programme in the Autumn where Siobhan will work with each company individually to develop and help implement their marketing plans.

A second programme which may be of interest to

entrepreneurs is our small business management development programme. This programme is designed to be flexible and is built around one to one consulting. The aim is to work on areas like Profitability, Financial Control, Cash Management, Marketing and Long Term Planning. Essentially to assist companies move to the next stage of development. This programme is run twice a year with the first just drawing to a close for 10 companies.

The second round of placements to this programme are taking place now for the coming Autumn. The total value to your company is £2,000 with 90% subsidised by the County Enterprise Board.

A third initiative is the Tourism Enterprise Development Programme. The purpose of it is to help people in the industry to assess capital requirements of their business, identify sources of finance, carry out research and planning with profes-sional advice, develop a soundly based market driven business plan and develop the skills needed to set up and sustain a viable business. Participants who successfully completed this programme will qualify for the CERT Certificate in Enterprise Management. The course is also starting in September and is subsidised by the County Enterprise Board.

Other initiatives starting in the Autumn which may be of interest are mentioned briefly here.

Export Development Programme - for companies







Beauty Wants To Be Left Alone

IT'S a delicate beauty that doesn't like to be messed with.

Despite its vigorous and healthy appearance, the peony is a sulky plant that hates to be disturbed.

The trouble is they do outgrow their spot in the garden - and September is the month to move them.

But if you have a peony you feel should be shifted, do so at your peril.

At best it may take a couple of years before it flowers again. At worst you can

say farewell to those glorious blooms forever.

If you have to move a peony, hoe a couple of good handfuls of bone meal into the square metre of topsoil around them.

When spring comes give the plant a mulch of well-rotted manure, watering in dry spells.

The peony may be slow to recover but it is believed to have excellent healing powers for human aliments and is used in Chinese medicine.

Most peonles are herbaceous perennials apart from four species (including P. delavayi pictured) which grow into woody shrubs up to six feet high.

The plant was first discovered in China but was only brought under cultivation in Europe at the start of this century.

Most peonles grow well in sheltered spots, shaded from early morning sun. The site should be will-prepared with manure - and once planted, the peony will thank you for leav-Ing it undistrubed for 20 years or more.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

PRUNE HYDRANGEAS

Most hydrangeas will have finished flowering and will benefit from a little pruning. Cut off each faded flower truss as far back as the first plump looking growth bud and remove any thin, weakly looking stems. Of course, if some of the branches are still producing good blooms leave these unpruned.

LIFT SPRING SOWN ONIONS

Onlons sown in January under glass and March outdoors should have completed their growth, and there is no point in leaving them in the ground any longer. Lift them carefully with a fork and spread them out on the surface to dry. After a few days shake any soil from the bulbs and store them, either on shelves or in shallow boxes in a dry, frost proof shed or room - or strung together in ropes. SOW ONIONS

has been well cultivated, but not recently manured. LIFT SECOND EARLY POTATOES AS REQUIRED

This is the time to sow onlons, both for use as small salad-

ing in the spring and to provide early bulbs before the spring

sown crop. Select a fairly sheltereed place and ground that

When you come to the end of the first early potatoes make a start on the second early or mid-season varieties, but only lift a few roots at a time as you need them.

THIN VEGETABLE SEEDLINGS

Thin out seedlings of lettuce, spinach and other sowings made in July.

FFFD AND TRAIN TOMATOES

As soon as outdoor plants have made four trusses of flowers, stop them from growing by plnching out the tips of the main stems.

EARTH-UP MAINCROP CELERY

It is time to begin to earth up the maincrop celery. The process is exactly as for early celery except with these bigger plants more soil will be required. Draw the stems together with raffia or string before starting, so you have both hands free to work soil around the plants.

Waterford Faces First Test Of Its Litter Campaign In Bid To Win £1m Prize

Trust for Ireland is to conduct the first of three litter surveys in County Waterford as part of the independent monitoring service it has undertaken on behalf of the Irish Business Against Litter Organisation (IBA). The survey will give the first indications of how Waterford County is progressing in its drive to become litter-free. If successful, the County will be rewarded by IBAL with a £1m ready-tolet advance factory.

An Taisce, which already has a national monitoring responsibility under the Blue Flag beach monitoring scheme, has been commissioned by IBAL to evaluate and monitor the level of litter in County Waterford during the campaign period.

As part of the stringent evaluation criteria, An Taisce intends to conduct three outdoor litter surveys of Waterford City and County during the period May 1997 - April 1998. A number of representative locations throughout the County have been chosen which include Waterford City, a selection of towns and villages, rural areas, non-coastal tourist locations and popular beaches. Trained surveyors will allo-

An Taisce, The National rust for Ireland is to conuct the first of three litter urveys in County Water-ord as part of the indepenent monitoring service it as undertaken on behalf of cate each survey site with a Cleanliness Grade which will be rated with a point system. On completion of each location survey, a County Cleanliness Rating will be ascertained.

The results of this survey will be a crucial adjudicator in determining the success of Waterford County Council and Corporation's Litter Action Plan and Environmental Campaign for the County.

In May of this year IBAL challenged the City and County of Waterford to become litter free within 12 months. If the challenge is met, IBAL have offered to donate a £1m advance factory to County Waterford which will have the potential to generate substantial jobs for the area. Waterford will also be in a unique position to market itself as Ireland's first and only litter-free county.

The Waterford County Manager, Mr. Donal Connolly and Waterford City Manager, Mr. Eddie Breen are responsible for overseeing the county litter action plan.

The plan, outlined at the Dungarvan Press Conference in May involves a comprehensive range of anti-litter measures including the introduction of specific bye-laws to introduce more effective litter controls and the establishment of a Litter Control Office in Waterford to co-ordinate the campaign throughout the county.

The Chairman of IBAL, Mr. Tom Cavanagh said that Waterford was selected for this initiative because of the local authorities' clear commitment to litter prevention and hoped it would be the first of many counties to tackle litter in a meaningful manner by linking it directly to the future well-being of their community and local economy.

"We were impressed with the existing structures in place at local authority level to tackle litter and the fact that people like Donal Connolly and Eddie Breen have already gone some way down the road in putting litter at the top of the agenda," Mr. Cavanagh said.

"We in IBAL sincerely hope that Waterford does succeed in becoming litter free. The prize is a great one but the challenge is very considerable indeed," he added.

Irish Sport Horse Industry Has Bright Future

As the Kerrygold International Horse Show in the RDS took place last week, Waterford IFA Horse Committee Chairperson, Anne Waistell, said the competition in the sport horse industry continues to increase.

Ms. Waistell stated the coordinated plan of improving the quality of Irish sport horses is now paying dividends. The astute use of EU structural funds for the sport horse industry under the aegis of the Irish Horse Board is increasing the inter-national demand for athletic Irish horses with good conformation and renowned temperament. The schemes being financed by the structural funds include the quality brood mare incentive scheme and the stallion performance and progeny testing programmes. Our best mares and stallions are now being retained in Ireland for breeding to guarantee a bright future for the industry.

Ms. Waistell said there is, however, an urgent need to invest further resources in the training of young riders to compete in international events and also for the breaking and training of young horses over a 10 week period by exports to add value to the horses before they are offered for sale.

Ms. Waistell added the Kerrygold International Horse Show is the premier event for promotion of Irish sport horses and ponies throughout the world.


MIXED SOCCER LEAGUE

Family health

Q. My friend's baby was found dead in her cot a few months ago. A post-mortem didn't find any cause, with the result that it has been called a cot death. My problem is that I am due to deliver my baby shortly and I am terrified. Have you any hints or tips about what I can do to reduce my chances of losing my baby to cot death?

A. Cot death is the sudden

and unexpected death of an apparently normal and healthy baby. Occasionally a post-mortem will show a reason for the baby's death,

for example an unrecognised infection or abnor mality, or a severe heart defect, with cot death nothing abnormal is found.

Fortunately it is reasonably rare. Most cot deaths occur in the first year of life between one and five months. No-one knows what causes cot death and so there is no certain way of preventing it. But by taking some simple precautions you can reduce the risk of it occurring.

Firstly, place the baby on her back or side when putting her down for a sleep. If you are putting her on her side then stretch the underneath arm out to stop her rolling on to her tummy. NEVER put a baby to sleep

on her tummy except on medical advice. When the baby learns to roll herself she will find her own sleep-ing position. There is nothher if she prefers sleeping on her tummy.

Thirdly, don't smoke near the baby. Better still, don't

Secondly, keep the baby warm not hot. The baby's room should be comfortable, or stifling. To check how hot the baby is, place a hand on her tummy, it should feel warm, not hot a temperature take come of temperature, take some of the bedding and clothes off. If you are worried call your doctor. Do not use a duvet or baby nest indoors as the baby can get too hot in these. When indoors, the baby's outdoor clothing should be removed.

Preparation: 25 minutes + Chilling Cooking: 45 minutes Serves: 6

225g/8 oz puff pastry, thawed if frozen 100g/4 oz caster sugar juice of 1 orange 450g/1 lb no-need-to-soak dried prunes

1 cinnamon stick, broken in

50g/2 oz blanched almonds 2 tbsp clear honey beaten egg for glazing orange zest to decorate yoghurt or cream sprinkled with cinnamon to serve

Roll out the pastry on a floured surface to a 15 x 25cm/6 x 10in rectangle. Cut a 2.5cm/1in border. Lift out the inner rectangle and roll to the same size as the border. Lift whole rectangle onto a baking sheet. Brush the edges with water. Gently lift and place the border on top. Chill for 30 minutes.

Preheat oven to 220°C/425°F/Gas mark 7. oven Meanwhile, put 75g/3 oz of the sugar into a pan with the orange juice and 150ml/1/pt water. Heat gently to dissolve the sugar. Add the prunes and cinnamon and simmer gently for 20 minutes until the prunes are plump. Stir in the almonds and honey. Leave until cold. Using a sharp knife, score a criscross pattern on the border of the pastry rectangle and brush with the beaten egg. Sprinkle beaten egg. Sprinkle border with remaining sugar. Bake the pastry for 15-20 minutes until well risen and golden brown. Leave until cold. To assemble, place the pastry case on a serving board and spoon in the prune mixture (discard the cinnamon sticks). Decorate with the orange zest and serve with yoghurt or cream sprinkled with cinnamon.

Mushroom, Leek and Potato Bake

4 tosp olive oil

1 onion, peeled and chopped 1 garlic clove, crushed

(397g/14 oz) can chopped tomatoes tbsp fresh chopped oregano or 1 tsp dried

175g/6 oz flat mushrooms, wiped and thickly sliced 3 medium leeks, washed and thickly sliced

900g/2 lb potatoes, peeled and thinly sliced 100g/4 oz feta cheese, crumbled 50g/2 oz butter

Method: Butter a large ovenproof casserole. Heat 1 tbsp oil in a pan and add the garlic and onion. Cook for 3 minutes until softened. Add the tomatoes and simmer for 10 minutes. Stir in the oregano. Season. Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas mark 6. Heat the remaining oil in a frying pan and saute the mushrooms until lightly browned. Cook the leeks in boiling salted

water for 5 minutes until tender. Drain. Line the casserole with a layer of sliced potatoes. Top with the leeks and mushrooms. Season then top with another layer of potatoes. Mix the feta cheese with the tomato sauce and spread on top of the potatoes. Finish with a neat

layer of overlapping potato slices. Dot potato slices. with butter and bake for 45-60 minutes, until golden brown.

MANIC MONDAY - Monday, August 4th (Day 3) -

A day of discontent saw Australia's Cathy Freeman writing herself into the history books. She had already earned one milestone by becoming the first Aborigine to win a world title. Freeman only did it though by edging out Jamaican Sandie Richards and Jearl Miles-Clark of the United States (49.77, 49.79 and 49.90 respectively) in a close finish and celebrated by waving both the Australian and Aborigine flags. Her joy was shared by Stephane Diagana of France. Unlucky with injuries, he missed last year's Olympics but made up for it by winning the 400m Hurdles title beating promising South African youngster Llewylen Herbert

Having almost slipped up earlier in the first round heats, Michael Johnson had no problems in qualifying for the 400m final - back on course for gold and one of a record four Americans in the decider. Despite being bettered by Britain's Denise Lewis in the later events, Sabine Braun did more than enough to bring another world crown back to Germany. Both Olympic champion Charles Austin and Ireland's Mark Mandy failed to qualify for the men's high jump final but David Matthews did have a lot to shout about by finishing 2nd in the 800m heats.

Overall it wasn't a happy day. Ireland's Niall Bruton failed to qualify for the 1500m final and immediately afterwards complained heavily about the level of grants using loads of interesting words and all live on television. These R.T.E. post-race interviews are almost like the "Rocky Horror show" or "TFI Friday" by now - anything can happen. And usually does. Having suffered the ultimate transport nightmare in Atlanta last year, the world's best now find themselves in the European chaos capital. There's even a scheme in Athens where only even registered cars are allowed on the streets on even-numbered days and odd-numbered cars the rest. That hasn't gone down too well, neither has the IAAF's decision to cut bars on drug cheats in half and as for all those empty seats

SUSAN SHINES BUT SONIA SLUMPS

- Tuesday, August 5th (Day 4) -

You've got to be up early in the morning to catch Susan Smith - 6.30 a.m. in fact. But for any early risers, it was more than worth it. The Waterford athlete shattered her Irish record to finish 2nd in her 400m Hurdles heat behind Kim Batten of the U.S. and this after leading for most of the race. Coming in just behind the defending World champion, Smith clocked up 54.61, a full half second inside her previous best. In fact going into last year 58.31 was her best time. Overall a terrific start for the Atlanta based hurdler.

"I just felt great. Every hurdle was spot on, I came off the 8th hurdle ahead of Kim Batten which is kind of a dream. I want to be in that final. I want to be there."

Sonia O'Sullivan had made it there, qualifying for the 1500m final sensibly in 4th place in her heat without stretching herself and with Svetlana Masterkova and Kelly Holmes falling to injury and poor form, things were looking good for the Cobh athlete. But controver-

val produced quite a lot of unexpected surprises with 300m to go. Nineteen year old Swiss Annita Weyer- 1991, could only finish 4th behind Fermin Cacho of the shock failure of favourites allowing a new genera- mann, in her first World Games, pushed her way between American Regina Jacobs and Swede Malin Ewerlov, Jacobs was forced outside in front of O'Sullivan who stumbled and tugged on Jacobs' vest. The American broke clear with 200m left, too early as it turned out as Portugeuse Carla Sacremento surged through in the last 50 to win. Two years ago that would have been O'Sullivan. She was 3rd with those same 50m remaining but went backwards. That determined famous late kick of hers is now gone. Jacobs finished 2nd with Weyermann 3rd. A deaccelerating O'Sullivan pulled up and finished 8th. That should have been that but Jacobs wasn't happy and pushed the Corkonian as they were walking off the track. Battle-hardened reporter Tony O'Donoghue (from now on to be known as Trackside Tony) was right there. What Sonia was saying was totally laudable, then went and ruined her argument when the Swiss Miss passed: "It's a bit ridiculous. It's a sport at the end of the day and people are going to start acting like that then I mean ... (points finger) It was her fault !! She should have been disqualified !!" Over on the B.B.C., a calmer Dave Moorcroft was in total agreement. "I think she's dead lucky. That was way beyond normal aggression," he said of Weyermann.

Jacobs herself was in similar mood to O'Sullivan who she blamed for everything. "Obviously I was angry that she did that. In the moment I felt it was very intentional. I'm on the medals stand and she's not so ne-ne-nene-neh!!" More juvenile than a 6 year old's sack race.

Britain's Steve Backley claimed silver with his final throw, knocking room-mate Mick Hill out of the medals. It must have been fun when Backley got home that night.

Of the other Irish, Peter Coughlan was 6th in the 110m Hurdles with David Matthews 8th in his 800m second round heat.

SUSAN SHINES AGAIN

Wednesday, August 5th (Day 5) -

By virtue of finishing 2nd in yesterday's first round with the 4th fastest time, Susan Smith found herself in lane three in today's 400m Hurdles Semi-Final and again the best athlete to come out of Waterford since John Treacy didn't disappoint.

Second fastest out of the blocks, she was first to rise at the first hurdle and increased her pace just past halfway. It was this kick, developed during her 400m flat running, which put her 3rd into the finishing straight. Kim Batten took the semi-final honours in 53.67 secs., Ukranian Tatyana Tereshchuck came in 2nd with Debbie Paris of Jamaica pipping Susan for 3rd though they were both credited with 54.72. Though she was laid out with exhaustion in the tunnel - a training tip picked up from her father - she got up immediately to speak to the press afterwards, a nice touch as not many would do this. "I've had a lot of things set me back this year, I pulled my hamstring, I was out for a little while. I never didn't think I could do this. After all my year, only two hundredths of a second outside the setbacks, I did it like I knew I could," was her immediate reaction to qualifying for the final. Quite simply a magnificent achievement for the 27 year old.

IT DOESN'T RAIN

- Thursday, August 7th (Day 6) -

Things just keep getting worse for beleagured Sonia O'Sullivan. After Tuesday's 1500m final, she was in need of a pick-me-up. The 5000m was the event in which the Cobh runner won gold at the 1995 World Championships - it was the first running of the distance and so she became the first World Champion of the 5000m.

The first semi-final went to Gabriela Szabo of Romania in 15:26.63. It was a speedy semi as most of the entrants were bunched together and when Valerie Vaughan crossed the line 30 secs. after Szabo, she claimed 14th spot. And so to the second semi-final. The first six and the three fastest losers to go through. Fernando Ribeiro of Portugal set a brisk pace throughout with the field stretching out as a result. Chasing the runners-up of '95 was a group of five, with O'Sullivan trailing behind in 9th and nowhere. Ribeiro, having run in the 10000m twice already, took it easy for the last couple of laps coming home in 15:27.32. The main attacking bunch stayed together and came in together. Those were the six qualifiers. The focus now was on the time of the 9th athlete in the first semi-final 15:36.16 belonging to Australian Karen Anderson.

O'Sullivan stormed forward in the last lap crossing the line in 7th. The time was all-important. 15:40.82 four seconds too slow. Her championships were over. "I did a lot of hard work and I did it because I love it. I accept there is something wrong. I just don't know what it is," was the former champion's post-race reac-

The consensus is that she has run herself into the ground. In a bid to get race-fit, she has done too much and gone too far. It looks that way. She has reportedly increased her training far beyond the call of duty since Atlanta and is suffering as a result.

SEVENTH HEAVEN

- Friday, August 8th (Day 7) -

The last two runnings of the women's 400m Hurdles Final had produced world records for Sally Gunnell in 1993 and Kim Batten in 1995. The final of 1997 was Susan Smith's stage. On the turn into the final straight, Deon Hemmings of Jamaica was shading it from world record holder Batten with the Waterfordian in joint 4th alongside Nezha Bidouane of Morocco. Hemmings, the Olympic champion, cleared the final hurdle comfortably in the lead but as soon as Bidouane had taken out Batten, her sights were firmly on gold. The Moroccan edged ahead 5m from home to claim an unlikely and quite fantastic world crown in another new African record of 52.97. Hemmings was in 2nd with Batten 3rd and Susan Smith in her first World Championship Final finished 7th. Her time of 55.25, though her slowest of the Games, was still inside her pre-Championship personal best with Smith once more breaking the pain barrier.

"Before I came here, my season's best was 55.26 so I even bettered that. I'm thrilled. I ran three good races. I really am very proud of what I did. I hope next year

at the Europeans I will be in contention."

From an Irish point of view, Susan Smith has provided the feel-good factor in these championships and has another big date on August 14th when she marries American law student Ryan Walsh in Waterford. They met at college in the States.

Triple jump world record holder Jonathan Edwards won Britain their 4th silver medal with a leap of 17.69, 16cm short of Cuban Yoelvis Quesada. It's only the second time that a country has executed a clean sweep of all the men's jumping titles; the U.S.A. did it in 1991 with Carl Lewis, Kenny Harrison and Charles Austin. In the 200m finals, Zhanna Pintuzevich of the Ukraine and Trinidad's Ato Boldon found that their time had finally arrived. Pintuzevich, pipped by Marion Jones in the 100m, clocked up 22.32 with Boldon's time of victory 20.04.

The smiling Wilson Kipketer, originally from Kenya but now running for Denmark, retained his 800m crown and immediately set his sights on the world record of 1:41.73 - shared by himself and Sebastian

Ireland's Mark Carroll meanwhile finished 14th in his 5000m semi-final.

JAPANESE WIN AS HISTORY REPEATED

- Saturday, August 9th (Day 8) -

In 490 B.C. the Athenian army defeated the huge Persian army in a major bloody battle. To announce the Athenians' victory, one of the soldiers, Pheidippides was sent back to Athens to spread the word. Running the 24 miles or so, he informed the Athens Council of what had happened, collapsed of exhaustion and died. In honour of this and in memory of the battle that Championships will provide more joy.

Games began at Marathon and passed the Tomb of the Marathon Warriors, Hiromi Sukuzi of Japan earned an emphatic victory by storming home in a course record of 2 hours 29 mins. 48 secs. Defending champion Manuela Machade of Portugal finished second with third position falling to Lidia Simon of Romania who had got physically sick during the race having drank something that disagreed with them. With a terrific performance in 23rd was S4C newsreader Angharad Mair. Her third marathon lasted 2 hours, 42 mins. Well done and nos dach.

The Sonia-less Women's 5000m Final was won by 21 ear old Romania sensation Gabriella Szabo, pipping Italian Roberta Brunet and Fernando Ribeiro of Portugal in a tight finish. Long time leader Paula Radcliffe came in 4th.

Third in the Barcelona Olympics, Ana Quirot was lucky to escape with her life when a kerosene cooker at her home exploded, causing her potentially fatal burns. While fighting for her life in hospital, she gave birth prematurely to a daughter who survived just one week. Her comeback began when she promised one of her hospital visitors, Fidel Castro that she would run again for Cuba. Quirot retained her 800m title in Athens in emphatic style, overtaking Mozambique's Maria Mutola in the final straight. Mutola didn't even get second being edged down to third by Russian Yelena Afanasyeva.

The home support during these Games has been terrific. The latest Greek to be cheered on was Niki Xanthou in the Women's Long Jump, though lamentably her nearest rivals were all jeered. Xanthou finished second to Lyudmila Galkina of Russia. In the mens 4 x 100m Relay, the U.S.A. dropped out because of a poor baton change in the quarter-finals, just as they did in Gothenburg. Ireland meanwhile notched up a new national record of 39.46 finishing 7th.

BUBKA STILL ON A HIGH

- Sunday, August 10th (Day 9) -

The championships ended without the hoped-for World Record which would have earned £100,000 for whoever broke a record.

Sergei Bubka is still top of the world, winning his 6th Pole Vault world title. In fact he has collected all the pole vault world titles which have been contested -6.01m the latest championship winning vault.

Daniel Komen is the newest Kenyan sensation taking the 5000m title in 13:07.38. Khalid Boulami was 2 secs. back in runner-up spot. The only non-African to win this world title is Eamonn Coughlan, back in Helsinki in 1983.

Another drugs shock saw Russian Olimpiada Ivanova stripped of her 10000m walk silver medal. She tested positive for Stanozl.

The United States were tested all the way by Britain in a thrilling 4 x 400m Relay Final pipping them by eighteen hundredths of a second 2:56.47 to 2:56.65.

Though they won no golds, it was a good day for Britain who earned a bronze in the mens 4 x 100m behind Canada and Nigeria.

For Ireland, it's the first summer since 1991 in which medals have not been won but with Susan Smith covering herself in glory, perhaps the 1998 European



A TALE OF TWO MANAGERS

take full advantage of any situation where their craft and pride and self belief are tested. Last Sunday fortnight was the latest example of what they can do when dire straits left them nine points adrift of Galway at half time with just 35 minutes left to salvage the last of the Cats' nine lives. I don't know what their manager Nicky Brennan said to them at half time or how precisely he utilised those precious 10 minutes. Certainly he wasted no time uttering inane cliches about his team having as many bones in their bodies as the Galway lads, nor did he call for more use of ash. I rather fancy that he was calm and positive pointing out that they hadn't played badly but needed to up the tempo, that they didn't deserve to be nine points in arrears. He surely stressed the need to attack the ball in every area of the field in a more determined focused fashion from the restart, point every opportunity, that there was no need for anxiety or panic as they had 35 wind-assisted minutes to do it. They got a reminder that this game offered neither team a back door, that all the training, all the hard work ideally prepared them for this moment of truth when their match practice would see them through against a team sipping its first taste of 1997 hurling.

I know Nicky Brennan for many years and his Kerry wife Mairead who live in Conahy. He is a very genuine chap with high standards in his professional life as an executive of Avonmore Creameries and his uprightness in his dealings with people. He has brought those qualities of honesty and sincerity to the position of manager of the Kilkenny senior hurling team and his integrity is unquestioned. We know how insistent he is on discipline and how he suffers fools neither gladly nor patiently.

What surprised me this year was how long it took him to settle his team. His indecision about the goalkeeper is still unresolved and Ronan in my view is not a better choice than Dermody. Pat O'Neill at full back always seemed to be to be a case of wishful thinking, or trying to make a square peg fit into a round hole. Perhaps he thought when throwing the no. 3 jersey to Pat that a good hurler can play anywhere. But then Pat O'Neill has always played centre back, all his hurling days since I first laid eyes on him as a 12 year old with Gowran. I remember a great game in the county under 12 championship between Graigue/Ballycallan and Gowran. O'Neill at centre back marking Ronan with the sparks flying. D. J. Carey was there too, in the Gowran jersey but at that stage Ronan was the star attraction, the main source of scores, and at the same time very egocentric with an attitude problem. Even in those early years Pat seemed to have the physical requirements

Kilkenny nor my envy of their ability to recall any jersey on him but no. 6. Pat is still comparatively young and may one day be the man who will stand in front of the goalie at the edge of the square but not yet. Luckily for Nicky Brennan Pat was in his old familiar position against Galway whose big strong centre forward wasn't allowed to dictate matters after the early exchanges. Of course the movements of the Galway centre forward, whose main play was to try catching the air ball, were greatly curtailed in the second half.

> Nicky Brennan learned from the Leinster final experience of the necessity to select only fit players. In the Leinster decider John Power was at centre forward still not fully recovered from the affects of a hamstring injury. Any player who experiences pulling a hamstring muscle knows how extremely difficult is it to quantify the healing time and it is so easy for a player's strong desire to play to overcome any reluctance to jeopardise his team's chances by fielding out in a less-than-match-fit condition. There are too many examples of allowing the heart to rule the head in this matter and a short time ago on T na G we watched one of the great Kerry/Dublin All Irelands where a Dublin player's foolish decision to play cost his side dearly. I refer to Kevin Moran who despite pulling a hamstring some days before the final strapped up his thigh and took his place at centre back. Dublin did very well over the first quarter of the game but the immobility of Moran when it came to covering and chasing his marker, Ogie Moran, led to the concession of one goal and was a significant factor in the exchanges which led to the infamous Mikey Sheehy chipped goal from the close in free. Kevin Moran struggled painfully to get back to a through ball and Paddy Mullins knowing that Kevin wouldn't reach the ball in time, dashed out to save but clashed (for the second time that afternoon) with Ger Power. You know the rest. Kevin Heffernan erred in fielding the unfit Moran. Had a fit man worn the no. 6 shirt, and Fran Ryder was a worthy choice for it, perhaps the game would have gone differently and Dublin emerged victorious. An unfit man in a vital position, centre back and centre forward, are key areas - hamstrings (if you'll pardon the pun) the whole team.

> Bringing on John Power in Thurles was more positive than selecting an unfit Power for the Wexford match and having to take the negative step of withdrawing him after 35 minutes or less. Of course it very much depends on the type of injury. A small niggling injury, to a finger or hand for instance, in no way inhibits the otherwise fit player. The muscle or ligament injury is slow. Injuries such as a slipped disc are fine in a very short time once an expert in that field deals with them. In 1963 I was crippled completely and unexpectedly by

There is no hiding my admiration for for the full back position but not once do I disc trouble and visited Jimmy Heffernan at his home in Drangan outside Fethard, Co. Tipperary. Going up to him I was bent over and in pain. After a few moments of manipulation by Jimmy's gifted hands I could stand perfectly straight and he promised me that the pain would disappear in two days. That was Tuesday and Waterford had a tournament game with Cork at Buttevant on the following Sunday. "Do you think could I play next Sunday "Oh yes, but don't go crashing into any forwards or you could unsettle the disc again". Well of all days I never had such a busy time because Waterford had a very weakened team. Not that I took the initiative against red-jerseyed forwards. Rather was it that they came in waves to visit me bumping and thumping and occasionally flattening. Nothing vicious or mean-spirited, just the inevitable consequences of a poor defence and all most enjoyable. From which you will rightly deduct that I had one of my better outings. Better still the disc never moved.

> Cyril Farrell has worked tirelessly for Galway hurling over very many years and without him the All Ireland victories of 1987 and 1988 might not have been a reality. A very personable fellow, Cyril is infectiously enthusiastic about hurling, Galway hurling in particular. His pride in his native county is very clear. Once more after a few years absence he is again in charge of the Galway senior hurling team and his record in the role entitles us to expect that Galway will be a major player in the All Ireland stakes over the next few

My friendship with him, however, will never inhibit me from expressing a wholesome disenchantment with his hurling philosophy. I just don't agree with Cyril's obsession with the possession game, nor with his strong emphasis on handling to the almost total exclusion of simpler more direct hurling. Cyril's theory is that you control the game more effectively if you get the ball in hand and only play it to pass or score. Hence the proliferation of Galway solo runs. Which would be fine if it were possible to guarantee opposition devoid of pace, guile or craft. Intelligent opponents with a coach committed to a more varied type of play can cope with that one-dimensional approach and so the 1986 and 1990 Cork teams overcame talented Galway teams who failed to match their scoring rate. Despite their great speed and ball carrying ability Galway's shooting was sub-standard. Joe Cooney's non stop running in 1990 wrecked Jim Cashman but for all his massive superiority in the first half Joe never gave Galway a lead commensurate with it. For the second half, and in the final 15 minutes in particular, Joe looked completely burned out, at a time when he might profitably have run at the Cork

backs (the Cork forwards did this to the Galway defence over the closing period) and secured winning scores. Galway had one very direct forward, Noel Lane, who would have capitalised on early low ball. Instead he had to endure the role of spectator for much of the game while Cooney, Naughton, McGrath and Cunningham and Eanna Ryan ran and ran expending massive amounts of energy and missing more

scores than they got.

In 1990 too Farrell dropped Conor Hayes figuring that Jimmy Barry Murphy would expose the full back so he placed Sylvie Linnane at full back, a position Sylvie hadn't filled before for his county. The experiment failed because Sylvie didn't strike the ball once in the 70 minutes, got possession on one occasion and had room only to kick the ball clear. He adopted a negative role all that afternoon and, for such a good hurler, did nothing for his team, nor derived any enjoyment from the game. Cyril hasn't changed. This year he dropped Tom Helebert, right full back and current All Star, the outstanding defender in last year's semi final, a man for the big occasion. He put last year's successful full back Brian Feeney in the left full position and gave the full back jersey to Willie Burke. So he had what was virtually a new full back line which put pressure on the half back line in front and the goalie behind. Padraic Kelly was omitted from the half back line. When the polished constructive attack-minded Kelly came on in the second half he made a big difference.

Of course, it was unfortunate for Cyril that he had no meaningful championship match to discover his mistakes and also that he had no second chance such as Kilkenny had. All he had was a charade dignified by the description Connacht final which cost him his main target man, Joe Rabbitte the victim of a harsh assault by a player whose subsequent one year suspension was totally inadequate.

Bringing on a clearly unfit Michael Coleman seriously lacking match practice was a bad decision. It was not that Michael did not try, of course he did and always does. Rather was it a case of the weak flesh failing to match the ever-willing spirit. He reminded me of John Power in the Leinster final, more shadow than substance. Cyril should have learned from Nicky's mistake. Nicky Brennan proved himself the more astute manager. This time. How I wish for Galway's sake that Cyril would promote a more expansive game, give a greater share of training time to shooting practice and the simple basic skills and get a better mix of those skills rather than an over emphasis on running. Perhaps he will and then with the abundance of fine young talent at his disposal the West will indeed be awake once more. Is maith an scealai an
