## Three Car Collision At Coolagh Road

A three car collision in which a female motorist was injured occurred shortly before 5 p.m. last Monday at Coolagh Road, Dungarvan. The woman, who hails from Cork, was driving in the Cork direction in the vicinity of the Dungarvan by-pass road when she collided with an Austrian motorist. Her car subsequently overturned and slid along the road for a

few hundred yards glancing off a third car which was driven by a motorist from Northern Ireland.

Dungarvan Gardaí reported that the accident occurred as a result of an error on behalf of one of the drivers. According to Des O'Brien, Assistant County Chief Fire Officer, a specialist rescue vehicle and a fire unit from Dungarvan Fire Station were sum-

moned to the scene at around 4.45 p.m. In a mere 6 mins. they had arrived at the scene of the accident where they found the female motorist trapped and the roof of the car slightly collapsed. Fire officers promptly released the driver by cutting her safety belt and she was immediately taken by ambulance to Cork Regional Hospital.

Dr. David O'Mahony and

a number of Gardaí were also on the scene. Commenting on the injured woman's condition, Mr. O'Brien said her injuries were greatly reduced by wearing a safety belt.

He complimented all the emergency service personnel involved in the accident on a "good, efficient job" which led to the quick removal of the casualty to hospital.

# Parents, Your Children Are Going Back To School

With the start of a new school year the roads undergo a transformation overnight. There will be marked increases in vehicular, pedestrian, and cyclist traffic. The National Safety Council is appealing to everybody to remember that taking care saves lives.

### WALKING TO SCHOOL

★ Children under 7 should not cross roads on their own. They cannot decide how far away a car is or how fast it is going. They should be taken to school by an adult. Other primary school children are too young to take on this responsibility.

★ Choose a safe route to school and keep a hold of your child's hand — children of this age act very quickly.

★ The best person to teach your child to cross the road safely is you — so show by example. Choose safe places to cross and explain why to your child.

★ Children walking on country roads should wear reflective armbands.

### TRAVELLING BY BUS

■ Teach your child to take special care when getting on or off public transport.

■ While waiting for a bus, teach them to stand well in on the footpath or grass verge.

■ Before crossing the road they should wait until the bus has moved off and they can see clearly in both directions.

### CYCLING

◆ A bicycle is not a toy and a cyclist is very vulnerable. Think twice before allowing your child to cycle to school. No child under the age of twelve should be allowed to cycle in any sort of traffic.

◆ Ensure that your child thoroughly understands the Rules of the Road, can look behind without wobbling while cycling and can give the appropriate hand signals.

◆ Make sure your child is highly visible, a reflective belt, bright clothes. The higher the visibility, the lower the risk.

◆ Head injury is the cause

of the majority of cyclist fatalities. This risk can be greatly reduced by wearing a cycle helmet — so it makes sense for your child to wear one.

### DRIVING YOUR CHILD TO SCHOOL

□ Children should sit in

the back seat and each should have his/her own safety restraint. Ensure that they cannot open doors or windows.

□ Set down and collect your children on the school side of the road whenever possible. Never park opposite and call your child across.

□ Do not park within 20 yards of the school entrance. Because of their small size children cannot see and cannot be seen if parked cars are in the way.

# Set Up An Aquarium

**AQUARIUMS** come in a range of designs and types. Usually they are made of glass or perspex.

Whichever type you buy, remember that an aquarium full of water and gravel will be very heavy. You must support your aquarium with a firm solid base. The best size for a first aquarium is 45cm

long, 30cm wide and 30cm deep. Avoid overcrowding your fish. It is very important not to overstock your aquarium. Like all living creatures, fish need oxygen to live. Fish draw water into their mouths and take oxygen from the water as it passes through their gills.

If you overstock your aquarium then there will not be enough oxygen in the water for all of them, and your fish may suffocate and die. You should never touch your fish with your hands, just in case you damage their delicate fins and scales.

The best place for your Aquarium is away from direct sunlight or a room heater. Aerating your tank with an air pump is a good idea but should not be used as an excuse to overstock.

Air pumps do not force oxygen into the water as some people think. Pumps create mild turbulence (bubbles) on top of the water which increases the surface area and therefore lets more oxygen be absorbed.

Also, the pump helps to circulate the water so that oxygen-rich water reaches the bottom of the tank.

Filters help to keep the water in the tank clean. Most filters are simple plastic boxes filled with filter media.

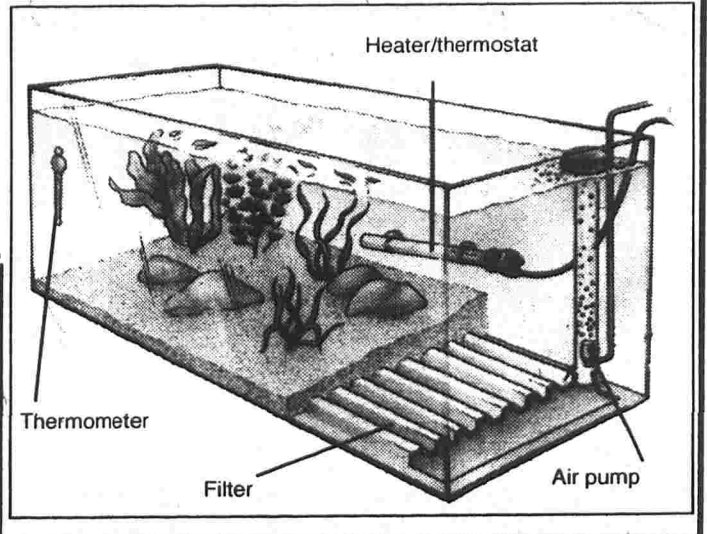
Water circulates through this by means of air from the air pump. Waste floating in the water is trapped in the filter medium and clean water returns to the tank.

Heating the tank is easy if you use a good quality heater and thermostat which you can buy from your local aquarist. Check the tem-

perature on your thermometer and the setting of your thermostat regularly to make sure your tropical fish are not getting too chilly or too overheated.

Keep a proper aquarium cover over your tank. This keeps the temperature up and stops dust and dirt getting in.

You can also have lighting in the cover. It is easy to light your aquarium using either a sixty-watt bulb or a fluorescent tube. Bulbs heat the tank whereas fluorescent tubes give off a cold light.

#### When Do Animals Become Mutants?

Animals are said to be mutants when they show characteristics that are different from the rest of their species. Mutations occur when alterations occur in the reproductive cells.

In nature these changes take place spontaneously and no one knows when they will happen. These changes are rare and little is known about the cause beyond the fact that the longer an animal takes to breed, the less likely it is to give birth to deformed offspring.

# County Enterprise Board Announces Assistance Programme For Autumn '97

The County Enterprise Board has had a busy year with £241,900 allocated in direct grant aid to small enterprise.

Quite apart from the assistance given in capital, employment and feasibility grants, over 50 companies have taken advantage of a range of management development programmes which have been run over this period. Having just completed the 'Compass' Marketing

Programme — a practical marketing course run one evening a week over an eight week period, Rosemary Walsh of Bonmahon Joinery had this to say: "the course was a great insight into the practical side of marketing, the trainer, Siobhan O'Brien, was excellent." Conor Gilligan of Passage East Ferries says that "the programme was very helpful, going in detail through issues like pricing, distribution and get-

ting the most out of advertising." They are now looking forward to taking part in the follow-up programme in the Autumn, where Siobhan will work with each company individually to develop and help implement their marketing plans.

A second programme which may be of interest of entrepreneurs is our small business management development programme. This programme is designed to be flexible and is built around one to one consulting. The aim is to work on areas like Profitability, Financial Control, Cash Management, Marketing and Long Term Planning. Essentially, to assist companies move to the next stage of development. This programme is run twice a year, with the first just drawing to a close for 10 companies.

The second round of placements to this programme are taking place now for the coming Autumn. The total value to your company is £2,000, with 90% subsidised by the County Enterprise Board.

A third initiative is the Tourism Enterprise Programme. The purpose of it is to help people in the industry to assess capital requirements of their business, identify sources of finance, carry out research and planning with professional advice, develop a soundly based, market

driven business plan and develop the skills needed to set up and sustain a viable business. Participants who successfully complete this programme will qualify for the CERT Certificate in Enterprise Management. The course is also starting in September and is subsidised by the County Enterprise Board.

Other initiatives starting in the autumn which may be of interest are mentioned briefly here.

Export Development Programme — for companies who want assistance to move into export markets.

Start Your Own Business Programme — for those with ideas who want to move onto the next step.

Support For Exhibition & Fair Attendance — list of exhibitions taking place internationally is available from the Board (subject to approval).

Business Planning — the Board also assists those with business ideas to develop a thorough business plan.

Service Sector Programme — a step by step programme of finance and marketing skills workshops and one to one counselling for the owners of service business.

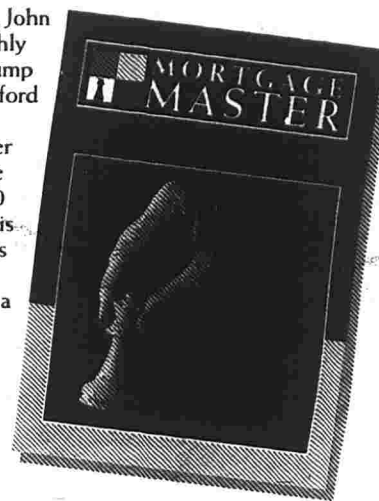

### Abbeyside Beach

Recently Dungarvan Urban District Council announced that it would be employing two students under the student holiday scheme to ensure that Abbeyside Beach and Quann's would be litter free for the summer period. They are also to undertake some environmental work such as painting around pumps in the Urban area.

I walked Abbeyside beach on Saturday and Monday last and I must state that the beach has never been worse litter wise. Entering the beach from 'Stokes Field' one is confronted by a supermarket trolley and quite an amount of litter. The area at the bottom of the steps from the graveyard is littered with beer cans, plastic bottles, all many varieties of paper wrapping. As I continued my walk I discovered cardboard boxes and crisp bags here and there. The area at the beginning of the stone wall was particularly bad with a huge number of beer cans thrown everywhere. The last 90 yards of my walk to the end of the stone wall was the cleanest section as regards litter and was the only really sandy area of the beach. The remainder of the beach is stoney and covered with seaweed due to tidal factors which cannot be helped. This may change in the future and in the meantime it would not be too much to expect that Abbeyside beach be kept litter free.

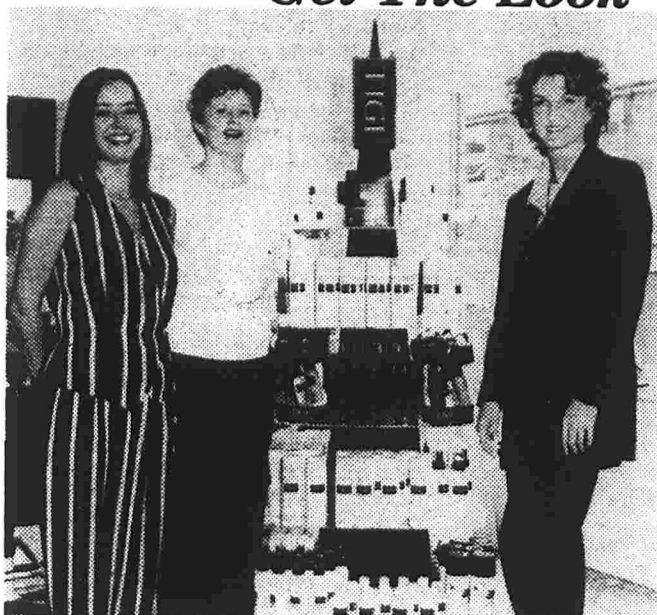

## Minister Opens Famine Exhibition At Dungarvan Museum

On Friday, August 8, Dungarvan Museum Society marked the end of its Famine Commemoration with the opening of an exhibition titled: The Famine in Dungarvan Union and west Waterford. The official opening was performed by Martin Cullen, Minister of State at the Dept. of Finance. Mr. Cullen stated that he was delighted to be asked to open the exhibition and paid tribute to the Museum Society for the impressive Famine Programme undertaken over the last three years. He was most impressed with the Society's recent book *Desperate Haven*. Mr. Cullen said that it was an important historical record of the period and will be of interest to locals, students and visitors.

Tony Fitzgerald, President of the Society, welcomed the Minister, guests and museum society members. He recalled the ambitious programme of Famine events which the Society had undertaken, culminating in the publication of *Desperate Haven* and the present exhibition. Mr. Fitzgerald thanked those who prepared the exhibition: William Fraher, exhibition co-ordinator and the FÁS participants, Bernie Sheridan, Donal O Loinsigh and Aggie Flanagan.

Also thanked were Fr. Michael Ryan, P.P., Sean and Sile Murphy, Waterford Co. Library, Dungarvan Library, The Park Hotel and

Waterford Foods.

The president stated that more exhibitions could be mounted but lack of space prevented this. In conclusion the president sent the best wishes of the Museum Society to Mrs. Joan Baily who was unable to attend due to illness.

The noted historian Julian Walton also addressed the gathering. He congratulated the society on the Famine Commemoration and stated that the people of Waterford could be proud of the manner in which the famine was commemorated over the last three years. He referred to the Society's book *Desperate Haven*, *The Famine in Waterford*, edited by Donald Brady and Des Cowman, *The Comeraghs*, *Famine Eviction and Revolution* by Sean and Sile Murphy, and the Famine Edition of *Decies*.

The exhibition covers subjects such as the construction of Dungarvan Workhouse, Abbeyside Fever Hospital, Famine Graveyards, Emigration, the Ring Fishing Industry, etc. Exhibits include Board of Guardian Minute Books for Dungarvan, Lismore and Kilmacthomas and the communion pyx used by Father Halley during the Famine. The exhibition is open Monday to Friday, 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. and also on Sunday 24 and 31 August from 2.30 p.m. to 5 p.m.

## PRIEST CELEBRATES GOLDEN JUBILEE

Congratulations are extended to Very Rev. Patrick Canon Delaney, Keetley, Leeds, who has spent the last fifty years in God's service. Fr. Paddy, as a young boy, attended (walked to and from) National School in Crough, Goatbridge where his father Master Delaney was head master. He then went over the famous Knockmealdowns to attend secondary school in Mount Melleray from where he went to All Hallows, Dublin to study for the priesthood.

Fr. Patrick Delaney was ordained in All Hallows College on June 22nd 1947 and celebrated his first Mass in Ballybacon Church on June 23rd the Feast of Saint Etheldreda (Abbess) where he was baptised, made his First Confession, received his First Communion and his Confirmation. His first Mass was attended by family, relations and the general public, who made their way walking (majority), horse and trap or on their bike. Fifty years later there was no horse or trap, no they all arrived by motor car to remark on one of the many changes in Ballybacon. After his ordination, Fr. Paddy was appointed to the Diocese of Leeds and he has spent the last twenty one years in the parish of Keetley in the Diocese.

It speaks for itself when some sixteen young members of the Keetley Parish made their way to Fr. Paddy's Golden Jubilee Celebrations in Ballybacon. Fr. Paddy offered Mass at Ballybacon Church on Friday evening, July 25, the Feast of Saint James (Apos-

tle) and the chief-concelebrants were Rev. Fr. William Callahan P.P., Ardfinnan, Grange, Ballybacon, Rev. Fr. Richard O'Doherty P.P., Abbeyside, Ballinroad, Garbanane.

An interesting feature of this unique country parish is the number of priests, nuns and brothers who have served, not only in the Diocese of Waterford and Lismore, but in the Lord's vineyards throughout the world. All would have been past pupils of Crough National School. To mention some of the priests, Rev. Canon Peter Meskill P.P., Fourmilewater, Rev. Fr. Richard Meskill P.P. Clonea-Power/Rathgormack, Fr. 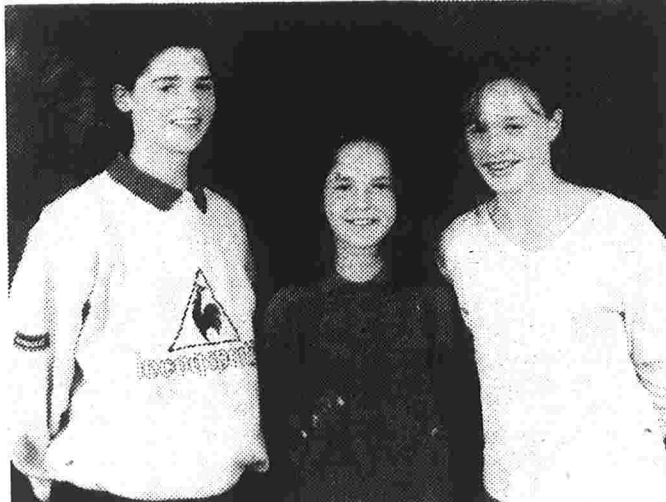



# This Week In The Garden

**Ripen Off Onions**

Onions from January and March sowings will now be approaching ripeness and you can hasten this by bending over the leaves just above the neck of each bulb.

**Pot Winter Flowering Begonias**

If you were able to root cuttings of winter flowering begonias in late winter the plants should now be about ready for potting on into their flowering pots.

**Cut Back Violas And Pansies For Propagation**

It is an excellent idea to cut back a few plants of any good violas and pansies you may have with a view to encouraging basal growth which will provide cuttings next month. Scissor off the present flowering shoots to within 2/5cm of the roots. Then scatter a little fine soil mixed with sand and sifted leaf mould over the plants.

**Sow Cyclamen**

It is possible to raise cyclamen from seed sown very early in the year and flower the plants the following winter, but the best results are obtained by sowing about the middle of August and keeping the seedlings growing steadily, throughout the following autumn, winter, spring and summer, so they make fine big corms for flowering the following autumn and winter.

**Take Pelargonium Cuttings**

You can take cuttings of both zonal and ivy-leaved bedding pelargoniums (geraniums) at any time during August. Choose shoots, 10 to 13cm long, that are not carrying flowers. sever them cleanly just below a joint and insert the cuttings around the edge of well drained pots filled with sandy compost. The cuttings will root quickly if you stand them in a frame and shade them from direct sunshine, but they can also be rooted in any reasonably sheltered place indoors or out.

**Continue To Remove Faded Flowers and Runners**

Throughout August continue to remove faded flowers from roses and bedding and herbaceous plants.

## Garden Birds "Disappearing"

Ireland's favourite garden birds are vanishing fast — and slug pellets are partly to blame.

The Song Thrush was once a common site, cracking open snails on the garden path.

But over the past 30 years numbers have fallen by 65 per cent — about four million birds.

Now across Britain as few as two million remain, according to the British Trust for Ornithology.

The trust believes they are starving to death before they grow to adulthood because pesticides are killing their staple diet of worms, snails and slugs.

Experts studied 90,000 Song Thrushes ringed since the 1960s and found that fewer are growing to maturity today than three decades ago.

If gardeners are partly to blame, the trust claims farmers are far more so.

The drop in numbers is much less marked in Scotland where the land is less intensively farmed and use of pesticides is less widespread.

## DAIRYING

### Autumn Grass

With high soil temperatures and plenty of soil moisture, grass growth continues to be exceptionally high. This allows an excellent opportunity to build up grass for the autumn. On highly stocked farms spread 40 - 50 units N per acre now. Where rotation length is being lengthened to around 35 days or longer it is important to have enough Nitrogen to keep the crop growing.

There is huge potential on many dairy farms of allowing grazed grass to make up a large proportion of the diet in the months September to December. This grass can be produced very cheaply but it can only be fully exploited if the milk quota is properly managed over the whole year. In a spring calving herd, adequate amounts of autumn grass can support a milk yield of 3.8 gallons in September, 3.1 gallons in October and 2.7 gallons in November.

Where adequate grass is not available and there are no quota worries, it can pay to supplement with 2 kgs. of concentrates from late September onwards.

### ACID TREATED BARLEY

For farmers thinking of fattening cattle this winter or indeed for farmers who feed concentrate to any type of stock over the winter, barley off the combine at around £70/tonne seems very attractive. Barley is an excellent source of energy and should form the back bone of whatever ration is being made up. Acid treated barley does not require any special storage facilities - just a dry shed. Treating grain at 20% moisture for 6 months storage will cost about £5/t for the acid. The following table gives a guideline to the amount of propionic acid to use for 6 months storage.

Cereal Moisture Content - 18, 20, 22, 24, 26. Gallons/Tonne - 1.2, 1.4, 1.6, 1.8, 2.1.

Acid treated barley rolls very well and is very palatable for livestock. Propionic acid is marketed as Propcorn by Interchem or Luprosil by BASF.

## TILLAGE

### Picking Up Lodged Crops

The recent bad weather has resulted in the lodging of many crops and this can make them very difficult to harvest. Losses can be kept to a minimum if the following points are attended to -

### Header Flootation

This should be set to allow the header to operate close to or on the ground while exerting minimum ground pressure.

### Reel

Tine angle and reel position should be carefully set to pick up laid crops.

### Lifters

The fitting of crop lifters will usually assist in getting a laid crop into the combine without bull dozing the soil.

### Knife

The knife cutting system must be maintained in top condition to handle laid crops.

### Whole Crop Silage

Wheat is normally used for whole crop silage but both barley and oats can also be ensiled in this manner. For some crops this harvest, whole crop cereal silage may be the best way of salvaging the crop. If the crop is about 4 weeks from harvest, then fermented whole crop silage can be made. If crop is about 2 weeks from harvest (grain at the hard cheese stage) then Urea treated whole crop silage is the only option. About 15 - 25 kg. of Urea is applied per tonne of fresh crop. Urea needs some moisture to work so the crop should not be too dry.

### Set Aside

The Department of Agriculture indicate that the set aside requirements and regulations will be largely similar to those which applied in 1997.

# FARMING LEADER

## Co. Waterford ICMSA News

### BI-MONTHLY MEETING

The County Waterford executive of ICMSA held their bi-monthly meeting in Lawlor's Hotel recently.

Mr. Pat O'Rourke, Deputy President of ICMSA, attended this meeting. He gave a very informative talk on the Santer proposal and outlined the ICMSA view on all relevant issues.

John Skehan, County Chairman, and member of ICMSA National Tax Committee, gave a report on a recent tax committee meeting and said ICMSA will be submitting their pre-budget proposal for the Autumn budget.

He went on to thank all members of the County Executive who helped at the Dungarvan Show where ICMSA had a stand.

He also thanked Hibernian Insurance personnel for their

information to farmers at the show in Dungarvan and advised farmers to get a quote from Hibernian when their insurances are up for renewal. "This", he said, "will determine whether Hibernian are competitive or not".

Other items discussed at this executive meeting included — animal disease, taxation, 20p subsidy per gallon for milk purchased through the restructuring scheme, and the ICMSA/Teagasc Family Farm Award.

### POLLUTION CONTROL & DAIRY HYGIENE GRANTS SCHEMES

ICMSA President, Mr. Frank Allen demanded to know the reason for the delay in reintroducing the Pollution Control and Dairy Hygiene Grants Schemes.

At a meeting in Cork, before the election, the present Taoiseach and the present

Minister for Agriculture gave ICMSA a solemn commitment that, on return to Government, they would immediately reintroduce the Pollution Control and Dairy Hygiene Grant Schemes.

Mr. Allen continued: "We cannot continue to wait and wait for the schemes. The Minister must bring them back immediately. "The mid-term review of structural funds has now been completed — this removes the last excuse the Minister had for the delay in bringing back the schemes. Some farmers are being put under pressure by the County Councils to upgrade their pollution control facilities. If a farmer starts work now without being given grant approval, then he/she will not qualify for a grant when the grants scheme is reintroduced. Farmers need the grants scheme reintroduced

now so that they can get on with doing the necessary work.

"Irish dairy products compete very successfully on European and World markets. The nature of the competition we face demands that we must continue to stay ahead of our competitors. The Dairy Hygiene Grants Scheme is designed to upgrade our facilities to meet the market challenges of the future. The return of the Dairy Hygiene Grants Scheme is essential to keep small and medium sized dairy farmers in business into the next century.

"Farmers want to invest in their future — now let us see the Government investing with farmers to secure all our future," he said.

The ICMSA President warned the Government that ICMSA will not accept a situation where the grants scheme is not reintroduced. It is time to set a day and date so that farmers know where they stand.

### BRUCELLOSIS

ICMSA President, Frank Allen, welcomed the Minister's statement on the new measures to deal with brucellosis.

Mr. Allen said that it was essential that an effective awareness/education programme for farmers was put in place. The prevention and containment of brucellosis is very much related to good management practice at farm level.

"The promise that detailed epidemiological investigations will be carried out by Department veterinary inspectors into brucellosis breakdown is very welcome. Unfortunately, we have received such promises in the past and very little has happened. I wonder if the Department have the resources and the determination to pursue proper investigations into brucellosis breakdowns. I hope I am proved wrong," Mr. Allen said.

"The Minister has failed to come up with any detailed proposals as regards the management of the scheme. The Department must manage the brucellosis scheme in an effective manner, thus ensuring that reactors are removed promptly, and that neighbouring herdowners are notified immediately, and generally ensuring that every aspect of the scheme is effectively implemented in a reasonable way. Good management by the Department is an essential tool in the eradication of brucellosis.

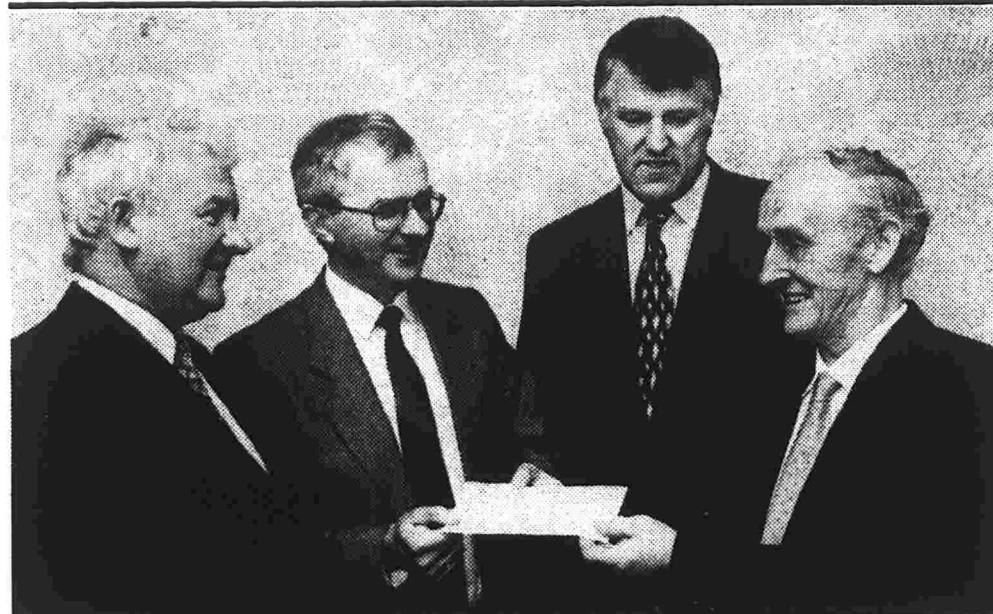

## IFA Criticise Suspension Of Young Farmers Installation Scheme

Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman, Mossie O'Connor has said the Government was being short-sighted in its decision to suspend the Young Farmer Installation Aid Scheme which up until now had made a significant contribution to the restructuring of Irish farming.

Mr. O'Connor said the Government has reneged on its pre-election commitment to support the establishment of

young farmers by its announcement yesterday to suspend the Scheme. "The uptake this year by young farmers has doubled since last year and is a measure of the success of the scheme in assisting the transfer of ownership of farms to younger people. It is a valuable element of an overall strategy to improve the age structure of Irish farming at a time when 44% of farmers are over 55 years of age."

The Waterford Rural Devel-

opment Chairman called on the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh, to secure an additional £10 million which, according to the Monitoring Committee of the Operational Programme, would allow for the continuation of the Installation Aid Scheme. He said it is unacceptable that the Minister is turning his back on young farmers and ignoring the commitment set out in its Programme for Government.

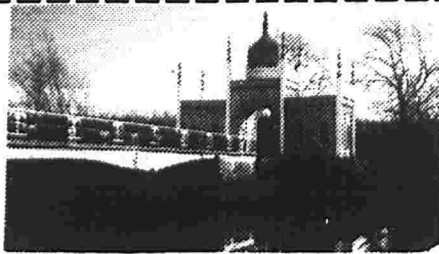

# Family health

**Q.** My dad was very ill recently. The doctor said that he had bronchitis and that smoking cigarettes was to blame because they had damaged his lungs. He also said that my dad would have to give up smoking or he would cause further damage to his lungs. My dad has coughed in the morning for as long as I can remember. The doctor said that this was also due to smoking. Last year my little sister and I had bronchitis and we were very sick. But we don't smoke, so how did we get it?

**A.** There are two types of bron-

chitis, the acute type that comes on suddenly, affects normal lungs and you are very sick with, and the chronic type, where a person has a cough which produces phlegm for three months of the year for at least two years. What you and your sister had was acute bronchitis. Your dad has chronic bronchitis because he has damaged his lungs from smok-

ing, causing him to produce phlegm and cough all the time and leaving him more vulnerable to getting infections in his chest, which will lead on to an attack of acute or chronic bronchitis. Acute bronchitis is usually caused by a bug, either a bacteria or a virus. Chronic bronchitis is usually caused by smoking; it used to be common in miners and those who

worked with asbestos but with better protection in the form of facemasks is much less common nowadays. While you cannot catch chronic bronchitis from your dad, you might catch whatever infection he may have if his chest is bad. You can prevent yourself from getting chronic bronchitis in future by never smoking. Antibiotics clear up an attack of acute bronchitis but they will not help chronic bronchitis. The only way to help chronic bronchitis is to give up smoking.

**Q.** The 'strawberry' you describe is a collection of blood vessels, which are not present at birth and only show themselves as they grow. These marks increase in size for about six months and then they begin to shrink and flatten and become paler. While they are growing they are raised above the skin surface, are a reddish-purplish colour and feel a little thickened at the edges. By the time your daughter is eight years old you will scarcely see where she had the strawberry. As it's on her forehead you should leave it alone as it will disappear in time. If it becomes very embarrassing for your daughter then she should wear her hair in a style with a fringe. Strawberries are rarely removed surgically and only then if they are going to cause a major cosmetic problem, for example if they are on the tip of the nose or around the eye. If surgery is required it is usually done while the mark is tiny before it grows.

monthly cycle. The morning after pill consists of four pills containing hormones similar to the oral contraceptive pill. The first two must be taken within 72 hours of unprotected sex. The other two tablets are taken exactly 12 hours later. These tablets may cause a feeling of nausea and breast tenderness which will pass in about 24 hours. The morning after pill works by delaying the egg release, that is ovulation, by altering the lining of the womb so that the egg, if it is fertilised, cannot attach itself to the wall of the womb and will pass unnoticed out of the body, by slowing down the passage of the egg through the fallopian tube. The failure rate of the morning-after pill is less than 5%. However, there is a greater risk of failure the closer the unprotected sexual intercourse takes place to ovulation, release of the egg from the ovary. There are a number of women for whom the morning after pill is not suitable, including anyone with a history of clots or of ectopic pregnancy, that is pregnancy or those breast feeding. Should the morning after pill fail and pregnancy occur then the risk of the foetus developing any abnormalities is believed to be extremely small. After taking the morning after pill, the next period is usually on time or even a little early, occasionally it can be two to six days late. It is important that you attend your doctor three to four weeks later for a check-up and to plan contraception. While waiting for your check-up either abstain from sexual intercourse or insist on condoms.

## Chef's corner Summer Shepherd's Pie

Preparation: 15 minutes  
Cooking: 45 minutes  
Serves: 4

- 700g/1 1/2 lb minced lamb  
1 onion, peeled and finely chopped  
2 carrots, peeled and sliced diagonally  
2 tsp plain flour  
150ml/1/4 pt hot lamb stock  
1 tsp Worcestershire sauce  
1 tsp tomato puree  
1 bay leaf  
100g/4 oz frozen petit pois  
2 tbsp fresh chopped mint  
450g/1 lb new potatoes, scrubbed  
50g/2 oz butter, melted

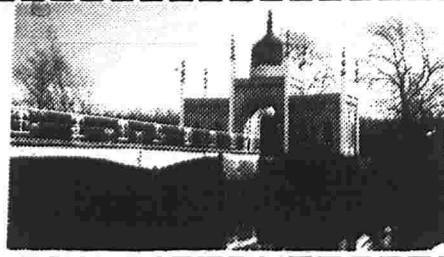
**METHOD:** Place the mince in a large microwaveproof bowl and cook on high (100%) for 8 minutes, stirring twice. Stir in the onion, carrots and flour. Cook on high for a further 2 minutes. Mix the stock with the Worcestershire sauce, tomato puree, bay leaf and seasoning. Add to the meat mixture and stir well to combine. Cook on high for 10-12 minutes, until the mixture thickens and the meat is tender. Stir in the petit pois and mint. Allow to stand for 8 minutes. Place the potatoes in a large microwaveproof bowl

and cover with boiling water. Cook on high for 8 minutes until just tender, stirring once. Drain potatoes and leave to cool slightly before slicing. Preheat the grill. Spoon the mince mixture into a shallow heatproof dish and top with sliced potatoes. Brush with the butter and grill until just golden. Serve.

# Family health

**Q.** My dad was very ill recently. The doctor said that he had bronchitis and that smoking cigarettes was to blame because they had damaged his lungs. He also said that my dad would have to give up smoking or he would cause further damage to his lungs. My dad has coughed in the morning for as long as I can remember. The doctor said that this was also due to smoking. Last year my little sister and I had bronchitis and we were very sick. But we don't smoke, so how did we get it?

**A.** There are two types of bron-

chitis, the acute type that comes on suddenly, affects normal lungs and you are very sick with, and the chronic type, where a person has a cough which produces phlegm for three months of the year for at least two years. What you and your sister had was acute bronchitis. Your dad has chronic bronchitis because he has damaged his lungs from smok-

ing, causing him to produce phlegm and cough all the time and leaving him more vulnerable to getting infections in his chest, which will lead on to an attack of acute or chronic bronchitis. Acute bronchitis is usually caused by a bug, either a bacteria or a virus. Chronic bronchitis is usually caused by smoking; it used to be common in miners and those who

worked with asbestos but with better protection in the form of facemasks is much less common nowadays. While you cannot catch chronic bronchitis from your dad, you might catch whatever infection he may have if his chest is bad. You can prevent yourself from getting chronic bronchitis in future by never smoking. Antibiotics clear up an attack of acute bronchitis but they will not help chronic bronchitis. The only way to help chronic bronchitis is to give up smoking.

**Q.** I recently gave birth to a baby girl and she's lovely. However I am concerned about a little red bump that she has on her forehead. My public health nurse told me it was a 'strawberry', that it would go away and not to worry about it. But, I am afraid that it won't go away or that it might turn cancer-

ous.

**A.** The 'strawberry' you describe is a collection of blood vessels, which are not present at birth and only show themselves as they grow. These marks increase in size for about six months and then they begin to shrink and flatten and become paler. While they are growing they are raised above the skin surface, are a reddish-purplish colour and feel a little thickened at the edges. By the time your daughter is eight years old you will scarcely see where she had the strawberry. As it's on her forehead you should leave it alone as it will disappear in time. If it becomes very embarrassing for your daughter then she should wear her hair in a style with a fringe. Strawberries are rarely removed surgically and only then if they are going to cause a major cosmetic problem, for example if they are on the tip of the nose or around the eye. If surgery is required it is usually done while the mark is tiny before it grows.

**Q.** I had unprotected sex with my boyfriend a few days ago. My friend got the morning after pill from her doctor last year when she had unprotected sex with her boyfriend. Will I still be able to get it? How can I be sure I'm not pregnant?

**A.** The morning after pill is prescribed for women when there is a risk of pregnancy occurring. It must be taken within 72 (three days) of unprotected intercourse in order to be effective. It is only suitable for one episode of unprotected sexual intercourse in each

monthly cycle. The morning after pill consists of four pills containing hormones similar to the oral contraceptive pill. The first two must be taken within 72 hours of unprotected sex. The other two tablets are taken exactly 12 hours later. These tablets may cause a feeling of nausea and breast tenderness which will pass in about 24 hours.

The morning after pill works by delaying the egg release, that is ovulation, by altering the lining of the womb so that the egg, if it is fertilised, cannot attach itself to the wall of the womb and will pass unnoticed out of the body, by slowing down the passage of the egg through the fallopian tube. The failure rate of the morning-after pill is less than 5%. However, there is a greater risk of failure the closer the unprotected sexual intercourse takes place to ovulation, release of the egg from the ovary.

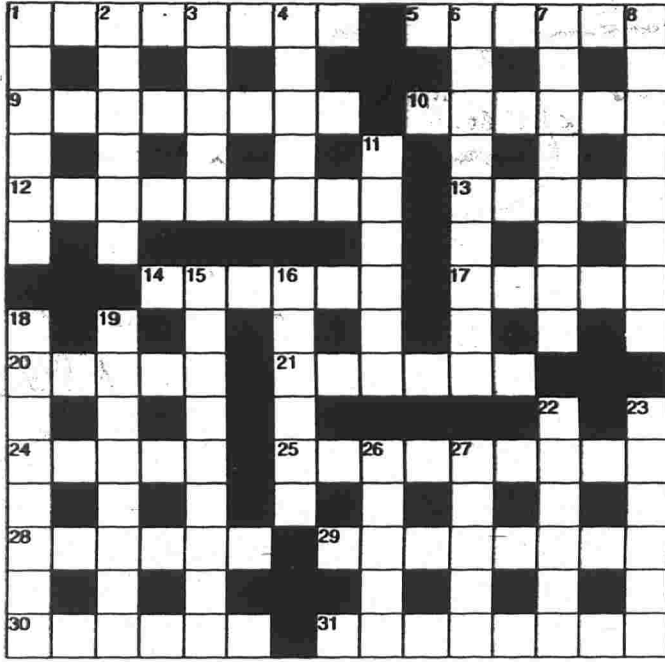

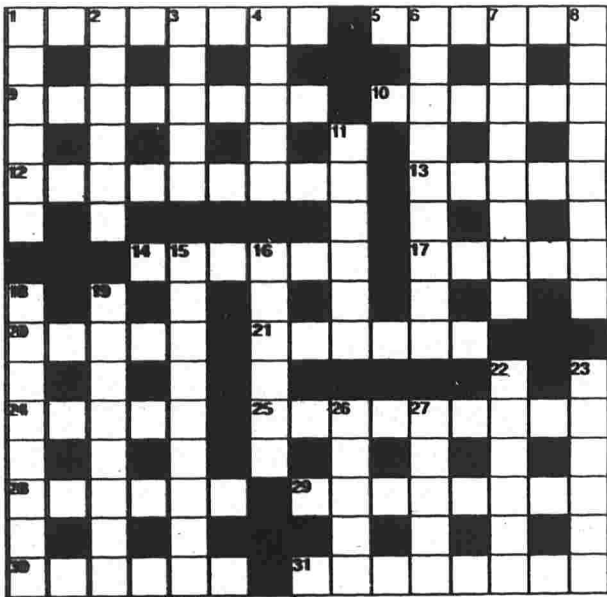

- If you prefer your joint of beef eaten cold it will carve better if left to stand for 10 minutes after removing it from the oven.
- To take fruit stain off carpets, absorb any surplus liquid with a cloth and treat with a carpet shampoo.
- To remove lipstick off a garment, rub petroleum jelly or glycerine into the stain, clean off with warm water, then wash as usual.
- To remove petroleum jelly off a garment, rub washing-up liquid into the stain, then wash.
- If your raisins have gone hard while being stored, put them in a colander over a pan of nearly boiling water and leave for a few minutes. They will soon turn plump and juicy

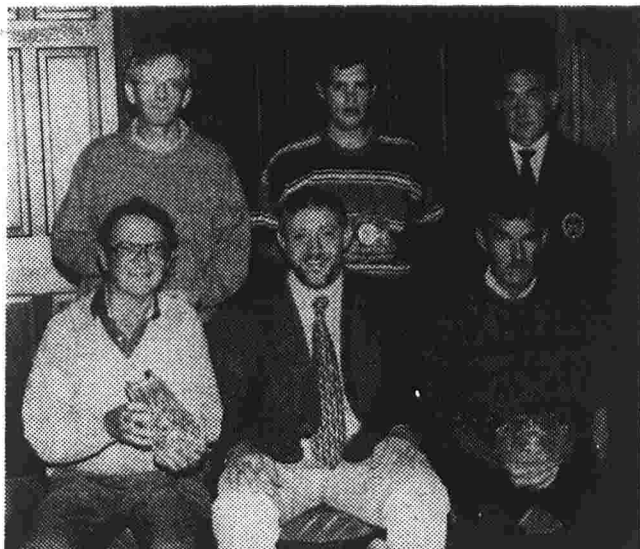

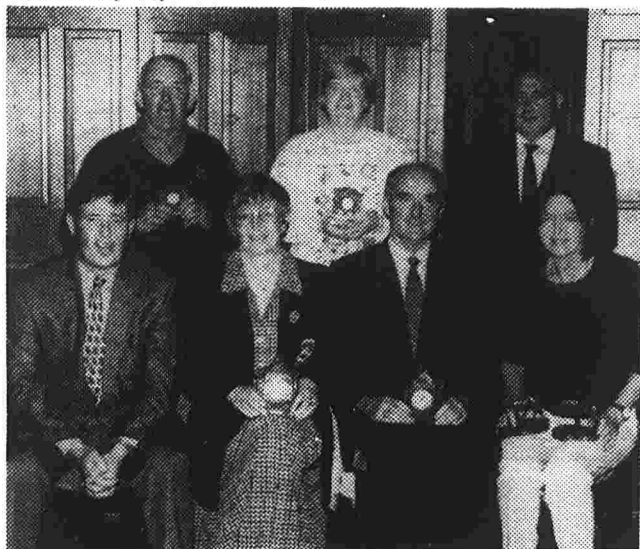

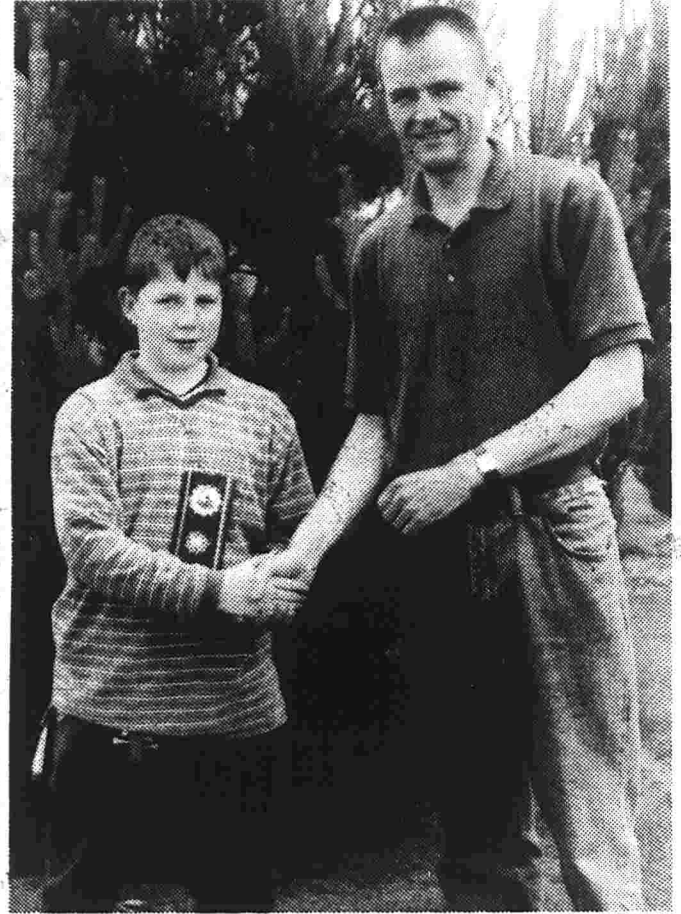

# Sullivan Retains Cup In Sunny Tramore

What a difference a week can make. On the bank holiday Monday torrential rain threatened the staging of the Ballymacarby road race. Six days later the sizzling sunshine and humid conditions on the Waterford to Tramore road tested the eighty-one strong field to their very limits as they raced the 7.5 miles trip in the 28th annual Paddy Flanagan Road Race.

This, the seventh race in the West Waterford Athletic Club's Ger Wyley Sports Summer Series was always going to be a tough affair, it being the largest race so far. However, the runners had to cope with even a tougher factor when unprecedented running temperatures this season and high humidity levels bore down on the athletes as they made their way from Waterford.

Some of the runners paid the penalty for going too fast in the earlier stages of the race with the leading group not escaping either as the first mile pace of just under five minutes slowed substantially during the run.

**SULLIVAN DIGS DEEP**  
The event soon developed into a three man race with the holder James Sullivan tucked in behind the 1995 winner Pat Heffernan (St. Catherines, Tipperary) and a very comfortable looking Pat Byrne (Gowran, Co. Kilkenny). The race took an unexpected turn after the five miles mark when the favourite James Sullivan was dropped off the pace and he fell fifty metres behind.

After going through a bad patch, the Waterford champion regained his composure and within the last mile he made contact again and went on to win by a hundred me-

tres in 39 mins. and 15 secs. Sullivan showed his true character here as he managed to come back at and beat Pat Heffernan who is a teak tough competitor and a former National Marathon champion. The Kilkenny man, Pat Byrne, also ran well to finish just a further six seconds in arrears in third position.

**LADIES RACE**

The perennial ladies winner of the race, Catherine Hennessy from New Ross once again came up trumps with a fine victory in a time of 48 minutes and 22 seconds in 37th position overall. Catherine, who was second in the recent Vets World Championships in South Africa, was followed home by Geraldine Guiry (Waterford), Jackie Stamp (Kilmore) and Hillary Collins (Coolquill). A total of ten ladies completed the course from Waterford.

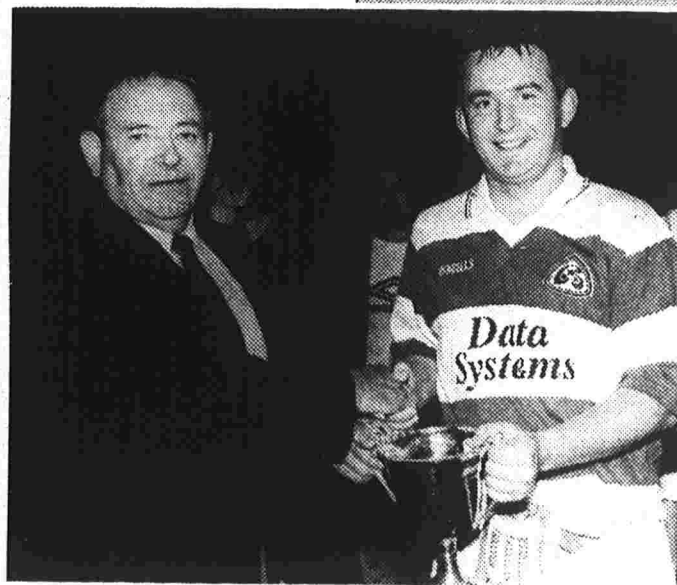

Last year in a thrilling county final they were defeated by Ballygunner on a 3-14 to 1-14 scoreline. Earlier in the quarter final stage, Ballygunner were decidedly lucky to survive against Roanmore who pushed the champions to the brink before losing on a 2-14 to 1-15 scoreline.

Roanmore are a bit different from most of the other leading club teams in that they don't have players on the county senior hurling panel. As far as I can recall, they didn't have a player wearing the county shirt in the league or championship this year. They depend entirely on team work rather than on 'star performers' and they have brought this to a fairly high degree of excellence.

They were understrength when beating St. Saviours by 0-15 to 0-11 in the first round, but will be at full strength on Sunday and will be all out to topple the favourites. Lismore, having been given a rude awakening by De La Salle, will take no chances in this one and will go completely all out from the start. A championship defeat in the wake of the dismissal from the league, would be a shattering experience for Lismore. I don't expect this to happen if they all play to form. Their galaxy of stars will include several players from senior to minor county panelists and if they shine on the night, they will be in the draw for the semi finals which will be made after the final whistle.

County goalkeeper Brendan Landers will be the Lismore 'keeper and outside him will be Michael O'Sullivan, Dave Barry and A. Whelan with Brendan Crowley, Seamus Prendergast and

Mark O'Sullivan in the half line of defence. James O'Connor with Sean 'Growler' Daly are the likely centre field pairing and up front the shape of their attack will depend on the positioning of Kieran O'Gorman, Paul Prendergast, Dan Shanahan, Barney Prendergast, Dave and Eoin Bennett, Paul Quinn, etc. That was the original line out for the De La Salle game but which was moved quite a bit during the match. Anyway, they are more or less the personnel who will be trying to bring them into the semi final.

## OVERALL VIEW

It is not outside the realms of possibility that all four Eastern teams will qualify for the semi finals.

## JUNIOR HURLING 'B' SEMI FINALS

Both the semi finals in this divisional championship will be played on Sunday afternoon at 2 p.m. At Fraher Field the Seana Phobal, who won this championship two years ago, will clash with Abbeyside. The hurling records and reputations of the respective clubs might suggest that Abbeyside will win this test, but remembering that Abbeyside will be fielding their third hurling side here, the game should be a very open affair.

## JUNIOR FOOTBALL 'B' SEMI FINAL

The semi final of this championship between the Nire and Kilrossanty will take place at Colligan, also on Sunday afternoon at 2 p.m. Kilrossanty will be slight favourites to avenge the defeat of their seniors by the same opposition two weeks ago.

All the games with a 2 p.m. start are being timed to avoid a clash with the attractive Kerry v. Cavan All Ireland semi final, which is being televised.

## HURLING LEAGUE FINAL

The clash between Shamrocks and Cappoquin in the final of the Division 1 hurling league is certain to attract

a big attendance to Lismore on Sunday. The recent meeting of the clubs in the intermediate championship was hailed as the best game in this grade to be played this year. Even though Cappoquin are now out of the championship, they will welcome this opportunity to reverse the disappointing result of their meeting in the championship, when Shamrocks came with a late surge to snatch a late victory.
