death of their 21 year old son in a drowning tragedy in the Canary Islands successfully obtained an exhuma tion order for a full medical investigation by experts. State Pathologist Dr. John Harbison carried out a post mortem examination last Friday night on the remains of Garry Walton, The Lodge, Cahernaleague, Ballina mult who it was claimed lost his life when he fell overboard on a cruise boat in Teneriffe last November while on holiday.

Forensic experts from the Garda Technical Bureau were present when the deceased's body was exhume on Friday last at St. Mary's Cemetery, Tourancena and taken to the Regional Hospital, Waterford. The de-

ed's parents, Bobby and Catherine Walton have been unhappy about the circumstances of their son's death and the inquest carried out by the Spanish authorities. A verdict of accidental death was returned at the inquest and the body was flown home and interred in St. Mary's Cemetery, Touraneena on November 17th.

Garry was one of family of four, two girls and two boys, and his death was received in the area last year with feelings of profound shock and sorrow.

The deceased's father and other members of his family have travelled to the Canaries on several occasions to investigate. The order to exhume the body was granted by the Minister for Justice, John O'Donoghue to the Coroner for West CONTINUED ON PAGE 3

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# Helvick Lifeboat To The Rescue

ARE BROUGHT TO SAFETY

On Saturday last, August 30, at approximately 5.30 p.m., the Helvick Head Lifeboat was called to the assistance of five teenage girls, who were reported to be stranded at a local cove called Faill an Staicín. The five girls had gone to the spot earlier and were cut off by the incoming tide.

The Helvick-based Atlantic class Inshore Lifeboat with its crew of three, was launched immediately and approached the girls from the sea. It was not desirable to allow the girls to wait for the tide to recede and climb back up the cliff. This was considered too dangerous given the rocky ascent and the oncoming darkness. The area is known locally for its rocky shoreline and has been the scene of tragedy in the past. It took some time for the crew to manouevre the lifeboat in between the rocks and effect a rescue. Although the weather was fine, there were waves breaking on the shore which made access more difficult.

Happily, all five were taken on board the lifeboat and brought safely to Helvick harbour by 7.30 p.m. where they were reunited with their families.

# Extra Funding To Cut Hospital Waiting Lists

An additional grant of £482,909 has been secured for the South Eastern Health Board area under the Government's Waiting List Initiative for hospitals.

Welcoming the securing of additional funding for hospitals in the region, the Minister of State, Martin Cullen T.D. said that "the extra money represents a clear indication of the Government's commitment to cut hospital waiting lists in the South East and throughout the country."

The expenditure is part of a national package of £8 million which is being made available by the Department of Health to tackle waiting lists.

The range of activities perary.

which will be carried out under the initiative will be in addition to the 'baseline' workload of the hospitals involved and will allow the hospitals to carry out further work to reduce waiting lists for treatment. The funding will enable more procedures to be carried out and further improve access to services.

In addition, under a separate initiative, the Department of Health is also providing an additional £110,000 for the development of services for people with sensory and physical disabilities in the South Eastern Health Board Area. This includes additional funding for centres in Waterford, Kilkenny and Tipperary.

Last Sunday the country awoke to the tragic news of the death of Diana, Princess of Wales.

The highly popular and much loved Princess died in a French hospital following a high speed car crash in Paris which also claimed the lives of her close friend Dodi Fayed and their chauffeur.


Doctors battled for hours to save the life of the 36 year old Princess. She died of cardiac arrest at 0200

Beloved by millions around the world for her support and involvement in charitable work, Diana was a leading humanitarian in AIDS work, leprosy, the anti landmine campaign and a huge host of other charitable

Her death has been greeted with an unparalleled outburst of grief and dismay, both at home and abroad with politicians reflecting the anguish of millions.

## **Local Priest Urges** Massgoers To Boycott **Tabloids**

PRINCESS GAVE HIM MORAL SUPPORT



Dungarvan curate, Fr. Michael Kennedy, who broke the controversial Dungarvan AIDS story in 1995, said the Princess of Wales telephoned him personally to lend her moral support in the face of the "hounding" he was receiving from sec-tions of the tabloid press two

Speaking from the pulpit at last Sunday's Mass in St. Mary's Parish Church, Fr. Kennedy urged Massgoers to go out and boycott the tabloid newspapers for at garvan priest had claimed

The Gospel of the day and the theme of Fr. Kennedy's Sunday sermon was the story of how Jesus described the scribes and leaders of the church as hypocrites.

Fr. Kennedy spoke of the tragic local deaths of Paul Hickey, Kilbrien and Tom Whelan of Kilnafrehan and the pain and grief experienced by their families and friends.

He said that everyone must also feel a sense of terrible loss at the shocking news of the death earlier that morning of Princess Diana.

Fr. Kennedy then told his congregation that in the days following the Dungarvan AIDS story, he received a personal telephone call late one night from the Princess of Wales. She gave him her full support and said she knew what he was going through because of the constant media 'hounding'.

The Princess told Fr. Kennedy not to allow the media to destroy him and to trust only the genuine reporters covering the story.

Continuing his off the pul-pit sermon, Fr. Kennedy said Diana's death was a sad loss for everyone.

Referring back to how Jesus called the scribes hypocrites, Fr. Kennedy urged Massgoers to boycott the tabloid newspapers for at least a week or two.

"That," he said, "would be a sign of the greatest respect all of us have for the Princess of Wales."

#### **DEEP PRAISE FOR PRINCESS**

In a later interview with the "Dungarvan Leader", Fr. Kennedy said he was de-lighted that the Princess had taken time out to telephone him personally, adding: That is the type of person

He found her to be a very warm person and her gesture in calling him showed her true compassion.
In the 5 to 8 minute phone

conversation, Fr. Kennedy said the Princess told him that she had lived her life hounded by sections of the media as well, making her life a daily hell.

Sunday had taken his advice to boycott tabloid newspapers as a mark of respect, Fr. Kennedy said that only a few people had actually bought

such papers after Mass.
With regard to the controversial AIDS story, Fr. Kennedy said the Princess had felt that the real story was being twisted and dis-torted by some sections of the media.

In September '95, the Dun-



Fr. Kennedy praised the Princess for giving so much to charitable causes during her life and said she had broken the stigma associated with HIV and AIDS.

Fr. Kennedy disclosed that in his own case when the Aids story attracted worldwide publicity, some reporters gained access to his private telephone account and itemised it. They had subsequently telephoned each phone number which appeared on the account during that period.

Condemning the tabloid press for entering into the private lives of genuine people, Fr. Kennedy said that such sections of the media are there for entertainment and in competing with t.v., they chase juicy stories and 'nitty gritty' scandals behind closed doors.

Yet, he added, so many people go out and buy them. Fr. Kennedy said he would support the enacting of a Priife a daily hell.

ARRANGED Buckingham Palace have decreed that Princess Diana will have 'a unique funeral for a unique person.' She will be honoured at a


funeral service on Saturday in Westminster Abbey and her body will then be taken to her Spencer family's estate for a private funeral.

# How Kite-Flying First Started - More Than 2,500 Years Ago

Since the first Chinese kites soared into the air 2,500 years ago, kites have captured the imagina-

Today kite flying is enjoying a new phase of popularity. Stunt flying is a fast growing activity enhanced by the imaginative designs of the kites themselves.

Kite flying is the perfect 'green' hobby. It can be practised by anyone, young or old, in the town or countryside.

The story of kites begins in the Far East. The

earliest kites were often bird-shaped.

Kites spread to the west with travelling traders. The precise origins of kites are lost in legend, but the first recorded reference comes from china in about 5000 BC, when a craftsman built a wooden bird kite.

The early Chinese kites were magnificent constructions of slik and bamboo, but with the introduction of cheap paper around the second century AD, the kite became more widely available.

in the Far East, kite-flying formed a central role in ceremonles to celebrate the birth of a child, as well as festivals to invoke good weather or rich harvests.

Kites also have a military history. Around 200 BC a Chinese general used a kite to judge the distance between his forces and the walls of an enemy castle, so he could dig a tunnel of the correct length.



# Where Are The Largest Animals Found?

The largest living animals are the blue whales. They are found in most parts of the world from the polar caps to the Equator. Those who live in the colder seas normally migrate to warmer waters for the duration of the winter. Their measurements are almost beyond belief! A blue whale can weigh more than 200 tons and some have been found to measure over 100 feet in length. The tongue alone in a female whale found in Antarctica can weigh over four tons.

In the 1930's it was estimated that there were nearly 40,000 blue whales in the world, yet by the 1960's it thought that there were fewer than 1,000 alive. The reason for this was that they became popular victims for the misdirected efforts of over-enthusiastic hunters.

# Driver Killed In Collision With Combine

The West Waterford community of Ballinamult was in deep mourning last Saturday with the news of the tragic death of Paul Hickey late of Kilbrien following a traffic accident.

The United Farmers Association have demanded a formal place at all State and EU agri-negotiations and have warned that they will not be 'snubbed' by the main farm organisations.

U.F.A. National President Michael O'Callaghan claimed that the U.F.A. is the voice of the small farmer. The current proposals by the EU for the reform of the Common Agriculture Policy (CAP) will have a greater impact on the small farmers we represent than any other group in the agrisector. He expressed concern at the fact that the Association depends largely on courtesy and kindness from the Department of Agriculture and the Government to include them in the talks process. "Minister Joe Walsh, like Minister Ivan Yates before him, has been very generous in his time to the U.F.A.," Mr. Callaghan declared, "but we should not have to depend on the kindness and generosity of the Government of the day to be included." He warned that the U.F.A. will not tolerate being snubbed or kept out of official policy negotiations by any other farm organisation. Our members are the forgotten people of the farming sector. We won't tolerate this being repeated under the upcoming C.A.P.

Five people were transported to Waterford Regional Hospital last Thursday evening following a traffic accident near Houlihan's The Pike, Dungarvan.


The accident occurred at around 6.30 p.m. and involved a male driver from Dungarvan who was travelling in the Dungarvan direction and a driver from outside the county who was travelling from the Military road.

Fortunately, none of the five people involved in the crash sustained serious injuries.

Assistant County Chief Fire Officer Des O'Brien reported that a specialist rescue vehicle and a fire unit from Dungarvan Fire Station arrived on the scene at approximately 6.53 p.m. One of the car doors was stuck and fire officers had to prise it open. The reason for the time difference, he said, is that sometimes, members of the public forget to call the fire brigade in their haste to contact an ambulance.

At the time of the accident, the Dungarvan Fire Service were also called to two separate incidents in Grattan Square. At 6.26 p.m. they attended a cooker fire at a premises in the Square, while four minutes later they were informed of smoke at a different premises in the Square which proved to be a false alarm with good intentions.

Mr. O'Brien paid tribute to the voluntary fire officers who turned up in great numbers for all three calls.







# Cabbage Patch Is Just The Kiddy

The versatile cabbage is the most common and popular of all green vegetables. Cabbage leaves can be cooked or eaten raw when sliced in salads. Some varieties of cabbage can be pickled and some types of winter cabbage can be stored.

Most cabbages are grown as annuals. They grow best at 15 to 20 degrees centigrade and they should not be planted in temperatures above 25 degrees. The hardiest plants may survive temperatures as low as minus 10 degrees centigrade for short periods. Cabbages are not normally grown under cover.

To grow well, cabbages need soil that is fertile, moisture retentive and humus-rich with a pH level above 6. Spring, summer and fresh winter crops need very high nitrogen levels.

# This Week In The Garden

**Sow Hardy Annuals** 

Some of the hardy annuals can be sown outdoors now which will stand the winter and flower in May and June next year. Sow them thinly where they are to flower and cover lightly with soil. Thin the seedlings out to 8 or 10 cms apart as soon as they can be handled, but leave any further thinning until March or April. Among the best varieties for sowing now are alyssum, calendula, candytuft, clarkia, cornflower, godetia, larkspur and cardinal poppies.

## Sow Annuals For The Greenhouse

Many annuals make excellent pot plants for the cool greenhouse. If sown now they will start to flower in early spring and continue until May. Sow thinly in well drained seed trays and germinate in your unheated greenhouse or frame.

#### Plant Anemones

Make a first planting of anemones. If these are put in in successional batches, it is possible to extend the flowering season. The tubers should be planted 8 cm deep and 15 cm apart.

#### **Pot Up More Freeslas**

Make a potting of freesia corms. If these are placed in a frame and are protected from frost with lights, but no attempt is made to force them, they can be introduced to the warm greenhouse a few at a time from November onwards and will supply a succession of flowers in winter and early spring.

#### Pot On Primulas and Calceolarias

There may be quite a lot of potting on to be done if growth during August was fairly good. Greenhouse primulas from the April sowing should be about ready for their final pots, while the June sown primulas are also likely to need potting singly into 8 cm pots of John Innes potting compost No. 1.

#### Pot Hippeastrums

Pot specially prepared Christmas flowering hippeastrums, one bulb in a 10-13 cm pot of John Innes potting compost No. 1 or a peat-based equivalent and put the pots in a light room or greenhouse.

CHAMBER TO PROVIDE LOCAL **EMPLOYMENT** SERVICES

Waterford Development Partnership operate a number of LES projects throughout the county whose function it is to offer advice and assistance to individuals who are currently unemployed but who gen-

uinely seek employment. Under this scheme a number of project co-ordinators dispersed throughout the county are busy compiling a comprehensive database of prospective employees (age, sex, educational qualifications etc.) with a view to matching these persons with prospective employer requirements.

worked very well but Waterford Development Partnership has identified the need for a similar service to be made available to employers, Kieran Eaton (Project Manager) approached the Chamber of Commerce with a view to establishing such a scheme. The Chamber drafted a detailed plan on how this service would be provided in an efficient and effective manner and submitted a tender to oversee its implementation based upon this plan. We are delighted to announce that we have been successful in our endeavours and that as and from last Monday, September 1st this service will be made free of charge to all existing and prospective employers in

the County.

The principal function of the Chamber within this project will be to compile a detailed and comprehensive database of all employers in the county and to disseminate information to these employers on what schemes are currently in place which might enable them to expand their employment levels in a cost effective manner. It is our intention to further expand this service by identifying any shortfalls which exist (from an employers point of view) in training/educational facilities currently being provided. We would hope to build upon the good working relationship which we presently enjoy with the local V.E.C. and other training bodies with a view to meeting these requirements.

#### CEREALS

A very significant proportion of the crop in Co. Waterford remains to be harvested. Crops have been decimated by the weather and every opportunity must be taken to salvage as much grain as possible. Harvest crops up to 25/26% moisture at any opportunity. Many crops are now sprouting and unfortunately there is nothing can be done about it.

#### SETASIDE

GRASS

September 1st marked the end of the core setaside period. This means growers are now permitted to graze the setaside with their own animals or are allowed to harvest hay or silage for use on their own farms. Cuttings remaining after a topping which took place before September 1st should not be harvested. In the case of land coming out of setaside, growers are free to do as they please.

#### SAVE ON WINTER FEED COSTS

Barley at £70 per tonne off the combine is good value. It can be stored easily with Propionic Acid costing £5 - £7 per tonne depending on moisture content. Anyone fattening cattle should seriously consider this option because the money isn't in wintering to justify higher meal costs per tonne. Barley on its own is good enough to fatten cattle.

Get your silage analysed so that you can best plan your winter feed programme. Calculate the kgs of dry matter in your pit because cows will require about 8 -10 kgs. of dry matter per day.

The more grass you have from now in the cheaper it will be to feed cows and cattle for the next 3 months. Grass is three times cheaper than silage.

It is a lot easier to manage animals on grass.

\* They undoubtedly will be healthier.

#### Nitrogen Makes Grass Grow Better

1 kg. of Nitrogen (costing 40p) grows 10 kg. of grass DM (worth £1.50 milk). The amount of grass grown decreases as the weather gets older. Apply 20 - 40 units of N up to September 10th on cold farms and up to September 20th on light, dry farms. Allow the rotation to drift out to 35 to 45 days. Be careful if the growth rate is very good because the amount of grass cover at 40 days will result in leaves rotting. Remember "grass grows grass" therefore keep the rotat on reasonably long so as to grow more grass at a time when grass growth is decreasing.

\* From August 1st hedge maintenance can be done on REPS farms. Ideally you should wait until January or early February to cut hedges.

\* If you didn't cut hedges outlined in your plan in Spring, you should do them now before an inspection.

Make sure your slurry tanks are half empty. Beware of silage effluent or yard washings refilling your tanks.

If you are spraying a herbicide (e.g. Paraquat) on stubble ground, make sure you don't spray into the hedge bottoms.

Nitrogen - Check your records to see if you have scope to spread. The cut off date for spreading on grassland is mid September.

INVESTING IN THE

FARM BUSINESS

Farm Grants - The absence of farm grants and the unfavourable tax treatment of on-farm investment have created the most anti-farm business climate ever. Most of the investment now required is related to environmental protection and new standards and as such will not yield an increased income to the farm family. The investment required cannot be funded from declining farm incomes. It is essential that the Control of Farmyard Pollution and the Dairy Hygiene Improvement Scheme are re-introadequate with

funding as a matter of prior-

Capital allowances for pollution control, improved dairy facilities and animal welfare — The restriction on capital allowances is severely affecting farmers who have recently or who are currently undertaking on-farm development work to control pollution, to upgrade their facilities to comply with the EU milk hygiene regulations, or to meet new animal welfare regulations.

**ICMSA PROPOSALS** 

1 — ICMSA is proposing that a special accelerated capital allowance of up to 100 per cent (free depreciation) be provided for onfarm investment, for upgrading farm facilities and to comply with the pro-vision of the EU Regulations on milk hygiene,

animal welfare and pollution control.

2 — The special capital allowance should apply to expenditure on plant and equipment, farm buildings and facilities undertaken to meet the requirements of Irish and EU regulations.

Expenditure on Milk Quotas - Expenditure on the purchase of additional quota is not allowable as an expense for income tax purposes. Milk quotas are treated as part of the capital of the farm for tax purpos-

ICMSA Proposals Expenditure on the purchase of milk quotas should be allowed as a deductible expense for income tax purposes, under the following conditions:

1 - The quota was purchased through a Milk Restructuring Quota Scheme approved by the Minister for Agriculture and Food.

2 - In the event of the farmer disposing of his milk quota within a certain period any tax relief obtained under the proposed provision would be clawed hack.

3 - The farmers should have the option to use up to 100 per cent of the expenditure as deductible expense for the year of purchase. Any remaining amount to be used in the following year or years.

# Keenan In Association With IFA To **Hold On-Farm Demonstration** Of Home **Mixing Of** Rations

With greater emphasis now being placed by livestock and dairy farmers on reducing feed costs, Keenan in association with IFA, are to hold a countrywide series of on-farm demonstrations on formulating minimum cost rations for cows and livestock this winter.

With cereals this harvest never better value since the mid 1970's Keenan's point out that good quality rations can now be formulated from £110/£.

In Co. Waterford, the onfarm demonstration will take place on the farm of Mr. Milo Murphy, Reisk, Dunhill at 2 p.m. on Friday, September 5.

The on-farm demonstration will examine minimum cost rations and will provide information on how to maximise native cereals in dairy and beef rations. Advice on optimum feeding levels and the incorporation of straw in rations will also be available. # isastrous Harvest

CEREAL AID PAYMENTS NEEDED URGENTLY SAYS COUGHLAN

Commenting after a meeting with Junior Minister for Finance, Martin Cullen last Saturday, August 30th on the farms of Pat Cummins and Evan Walsh, Kilmacthomas Waterford I.F.A. County Chairman James Coughlan said that the torrential rain that prevailed for most of August has created an absolute nightmare for the County's grain

He said that the recent rainfall has been the final nail in the coffin for many grain farmers this year. Crops have been absolutely destroyed with little hope of salvaging anything. Continuing, he said that what little crop has been harvested, moisture readings are in the mid 30's which carry very severe moisture penalties.

Commenting Junior Minister for Finance, Martin Cullen said that he was quite surprised and shocked with the level of damage that has been done and he assured growers that he would look into the situation and report back to the growers at the Executive's meeting next Tuesday

night.
Waterford I.F.A. Grain Chairman, Alex Heskin commented that the I.F.A. Grain Committee has called on Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to make arrangements to have all cereal aid payments paid immediately and not in October as many cereal growers are undergoing serious cash-flow shortages.

Finally the Waterford I.F.A. leader said that with the current worsening weather conditions, grain prices are at an all time low and poor straw prices, some level of compensation must be made available to grain growers to keep them in business.

# **Meeting With** Egyptian **Ambassador Confirms Need For** Walsh To Visit Egypt

Following a meeting re-cently with the Egyptian Ambassador to Ireland, His Excellency Hassan Salem, the IFA President, John Donnelly said it was essential that the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh immediately visit Egypt to re-solve any outstanding issues in elation to re-opening the £150 million live cattle trade.

Commenting, Waterford IFA Chairman, James Coughlan said "It is imperative now that Minister Walsh immediately travels to Cairo, and concludes the negotiations in respect of the political direction agreed between Ireland and Egypt last June to re-open the live export trade.

The Waterford IFA leader said the Ambassador expressed optimism regarding the present negotiations and is working to facilitate the earliest possible re-opening of the live cattle market. "We now need the political impetus of a Ministerial visit to get the trade restart-ed without delay," Mr.

Coughlan said. With the major Autumn cattle disposal period fast approaching, Mr. Coughlan stressed the need to re-open the live cattle trade sooner rather than later.

He again pointed out the importance of the Egyptian market in providing a stable Autumn cattle trade and competitive prices for live-stock farmers.

# **Donovan Says Access To EU Live Cattle Market Depends On Government Action**

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman Maurice Donovan has said that access to EU Single Market for live cattle is totally dependent upon positive subvention by Agriculture Minister Joe Walsh and the Government, Mr. Donovan said IFA has put a number of proposals and options to the Department of Agriculture in respect of an alternative freight ferry service and it is now up to Minister Walsh to actively pursue these and fulfill the Government's promise guarantee-ing access to the EU Single Market for exporters and farmers.

Mr. Donovan said that time was fast running out for Minister Walsh and the Government on the live cattle trade. "The weanling sales will be in full swing in the second week of September and farmers will not tolerate a situation where they are being denied access to the highest price market on the Continent.

The Waterford IFA Livestock Leader said that Minister Walsh is well aware of the severe problems on ac-cess to the EU Market for a long time. "Farmers are now demanding delivery from Minister Walsh on his commitment that in office, he would make sure the Government would guarantee an alternative ferry service which would carry live-

# Value Of Straw Burning Should Form Basis For Straw Sales

"The value of straw burning in terms of subsequent crop fertility and disease control should form the basis for all straw sales", according to Waterford IFA Grain Chairman Alex Heskin.

"Straw burning according to Teagasc is worth £20 - £23/ac. Bearing this in mind £20 - £23/ac should form the base line for all straw sales in surplus straw areas. This is roughly equivalent to over £4 per 4x4 round bale or over 40p per small square bale. Higher prices are nevertheless being paid, particularly in straw deficit areas."

The Waterford Grain Chairman pointed out that "straw

will not be as plentiful as originally expected as straw yields are lower this harvest. Large quantities of straw are lying out in the fields due to the current bad weather conditions. The likelihood of some of these grops syer being

# Family health

Q. My husband is 63 years of age and recently he has been getting out of bed five or six times during the night to pass water. He finds this very frustrating as it inter-rupts his sleep and and although he has to rush to the bathroom he ses only a little water very slowly. He is worried about this and is embarrassed to visit our local doctor who is a lady. A. From your description it

seems that your husband may have a problem with an enlarged prostate gland.

This gland is situated just below the bladder and the outlet from the bladder, the urethra, passes through the middle of the gland. As men get older the prostate enlarges, especially the part of the gland that immediately surrounds the urethra. As the prostate enlarges it also pushes upwards into the bladder itself. This

growth interferes with the ability of the muscles at the bladder outlet to control the outflow of urine as effi-ciently as normal. This causes problems like having to pass water very frequently, especially at night. Passing small quantities of water, difficulties in starting the flow of urine, a poor or stop-start type of

stream, dribbling at the end of urination and occasion-ally blood in the urine, although this can have other causes. As the overgrowth of the prostate continues, pockets are formed between the bladder and the prostate and urine is retained in the bladder after urination instead as being passed as normal. The continuing overgrowth means these pockets of urine will get bigger and cause the bladder to stretch and increase der to stretch and increase in size slowly over many months. This is a painless happening. However this gradual build-up of urine and bladder stretching eventually causes damage to the kidneys resulting in renal (kidney) failure which is a life-threatening condi-tion. Sometimes the bladder will suddenly stop being able to empty and the urine

HAIR REMOVAL

WAXING has become very popular in recent years. It is a quick and easy way of remov-ing large amounts of hair with little discomfort. Leg waxing, under arm and bikini waxing are most popular. But waxing can also be done on the facial

area and eyebrows. Warm or cool wax is usually used on large areas such as the legs. A very thin layer of applied to the leg with a spatula in the direction of the hair growth. Then a fabric or paper strip is placed over the wax and rubbed so that the wax sticks to it. The fabric is then pulled up against the direction of hair growth and the hairs come with it. Usually after waxing an antiseptic soothing lotion is applied. The skin may appear red and blotchy for a few hours, so it is important not to put any body lotions on or have a hot bath until the

following day.
Bikini line, under arm and eyebrow waxing can be done in the same way. Sometimes hot wax is used on these areas. Hot wax is applied the same as warm wax only there is no need to use a fabric strip to remove the wax. The hot wax is simply allowed to cool and it is then pulled off against the direction of the hair growth. Allergies rarely occur from using wax. The regrowth of hair after waxing usually fine ended and

s usually fine ended and feels soft in texture.
Waxing is relatively low in cost and is done in most beauty salons. It is an easy way of removing large amounts of hair quickly. atong on saturday mgm.

and will constantly be added to by the kidneys constantly. This is known as acute retention and is a very painful condition. Urine that is retained in the bladder after emptying is likely to become infected, causing pain when water is passed. A urinary infection may also cause acute retention. It is important that your husband visit a doctor and get this problem seen to. Your own doctor will not be embarrassed by your husbands problem; it's nothing she hasn't seen before. Neither should he be.

Q. I am ten weeks preg-nant. I have been reading a lot lately about a bacteria called Listeria. It seems that it is highly dangerous to pregnant ladies and their babies. How can I avoid this bacteria? Will my baby be harmed if I am unfortunate enough to pick it

up? A. The bacteria that you have read about is called Listeria monocytogenes and it causes a disease called listeriosis. As you have read, you are among the group of people most at risk from catching listeriosis. Other people in that group would be the elderly who are debilitated and anyone whose resistance to infection is reduced, for example patients with AIDS, patients having chemotherapy or those on steroids. The Listeria bacteria can cause a flu-like illness, meningitis or miscarriage. Listeria is transmitted usually in food and is destroyed by cooking or by heat treatment. It can also be present in raw foods or foods that have not been cooked properly. It can also be spread from one food to another in the fridge if correct storage procedures are not followed. This can happen because the Listeria bacterium is resistant to cold temperatures and can grow in the fridge. Listeria is transmitted through the following foods: unpas-teurised milk and unpasteurised milk products; soft cheeses and blue veined

meats, poultry and pates; raw vegetables and sea foods. To avoid infection the following precautions should be taken; always buy food from a reliable source and check the best before and sell by dates. Avoid soft-ripened cheeses and pates and if they are in the fridge they should be wrapped and stored sepa-rately. Always wash raw fruit and vegetables well before eating. Always make sure than when you are heating up leftover food, convenience foods or readyto-eat poultry that the food is piping hot and throw away any food that you have reheated more than Cooked food that is not eaten straight away should be cooled as rapidly as possible and then stored in a refrigerator. Cooked and raw foods should never be stored close together as this will encourage the transmission of Listeria from the raw food to the cooked food, cooked foods should be placed on a higher shelf than the raw food. Be sure that your fridge is working properly and that it is keeping the food really cold. Pasteurise or boil all milk. When using the microwave follow the manufacturers' instructions about standing times to make sure that the food reaches an even temperature before it's eaten and if your microwave doesn't have a turntable then you should stir food to make sure that it cooks evenly. The damage your baby will suffer depends on how far along in your pregnancy you are when you pick up Listeriosis. As I mentioned above, Listeria can cause miscarriage; this happens if you get Listeriosis in early pregnancy or if you are very ill with the disease. If you pick up Listeriosis in late pregnancy then the baby could be born with the disease. In new-born babies Listeriosis is a very serious disease and can kill. Careful attention to food hygiene and preparation will prevent this happening.



# Chef's corner

Blackcurrant Cheesecakes

Preparation: 10 minutes + cooling Cooking: 5 minutes Serves 6

350g/12 oz cottage cheese 100g/4 oz cream cheese 50g/2 oz caster sugar grated rind and juice of 1 lemon

2 tsp powdered gelatine 150ml/1/4ot double cream 1 (214g/7'/2 oz) can blackcurrants in fruit juice

tsp comflour 1tbsp caster sugar sprigs of mint to decorate shortbread fingers to serve METHOD: Press cottage cheese through a fine-holed sieve into a bowl. Beat in cream cheese, sugar and lemon rind and juice. Place 2 tbsp water in a small bowl. Sprinkle the gelatine over

Place bowl in a pan of hot water and leave until gela-tine dissolves. Cool slightly, then beat into the cheese mixture. Whip cream until it holds soft peaks. Carefully fold into the cheese mixture. Divide mixture between 6 small ramekin dishes until set. Strain the blackcurrants, reserving the fruit juice. In a small pan, blend a little of the juice with the cornflour. Add the remain-ing juice and 1 the caster sugar. Cook, stirring, for 2 minutes until thickened. Allow to cool for 15 minutes. Spoon the blackcurrants over the cheesecakes. Cover with the thickened syrup. Chill until ready to serve.

Decorate with mint and
serve with shortbread fingers.



Donegal, Enniscrone, Connemara, all of which are links courses but some of Eddie's finest works are parkland like Malahide and of course West Waterford which was his 100th creation.

At the unveiling ceremony, the captain Billy Nugent welcomed everyone to this auspicious occasion. He introduced Mr. Bernie Hynes who spoke on behalf of the Golfing Union of Ireland. He recalled seeing Eddie

playing in the 1940's when he was in such awe of the man that he received his autograph. He later worked with Eddie when he designed Carrick-On-Suir Golf Club.

The Club Honorary Secretary Pat Murphy spoke on behalf of West Waterford Golf Club and his association with the great man in a very fitting and moving trib-ute which finished up with

the following -Eddie Hackett gave his life to golf and no Irishman has left no greater legacy to the game. A caring, kindly man, he will be remembered with great affection by all who are privileged to know and work with him. 




