Summer Flood Dan Bill Over £163,000 Global warming wreaked its own peculiar a week. Bases on Co. Waterford over the summer. These were some of the months of the control of the control over the summer.

Global warming wreaked its own peculiar havoc on Co. Waterford over the summer bringing unprecedented rainfall, flash flooding and freak storms.

The total bill of damage caused to roads around the county over the past few months amounts to over £163,000. One particular roadway in Kilmacthomas was entirely washed away and had to be reconstructed by County Council outdoor staff who were on holidays at the start of August when the heavy rain occurred.

Torrents of running water ran for miles along road sides tearing away the road surface while Kilrossanty National School was found to be flooded also at the height of the summer. All over the county and indeed the South East cereal farmers have called for Government aid in light of the disastrous season.

Fishermen in the county have also asked that a financial package be put together to compensate them for their substantial loss in income. Last Monday was the first day that many fishermen took to the sea in over

These were some of the problems highlighted by members of Waterford County Council this month when they reconvened in Dungarvan after the summer recess.

Many members paid tribute to the County Engineer, John O'Flynn and outdoor staff for their work on the roads during the worst of the weather.

Mr. O'Flynn revealed that £18,000 worth of damage was caused by the unprece-

dented rainfall in the Ardmore area, £48,000 of damage was caused in Lismore while the worst hit area was Kilmacthomas where a massive £97,000 of damage was caused by storms.

Cllr. Willie McDonnell

asked if the Council had discontinued its policy of opening inlets which, he said, would have greatly alleviated the flood damage to roads. Mr. O'Flynn however said it was a question of the Council not having the man-CONTINUED ON PAGE 31

AWG Asked To Clarify Position On New Waste Water Plant

Waterford County Councillor Billy Kyne has called on the new conglomerate Avonmore Waterford Group (AWG) to give a clear public statement regarding their future involvement in the proposed waste water treatment plant for Dungarvan and environs.

Prior to the merger, Waterford Foods pledged a contribution of £5m towards the development of the proposed multi million pound plant at Ballinacourty in partnership with the County Council.

Their recent £2.5 billion merger with Kilkenny neighbours Avonmore Foods however cast a doubt over their future involvement in this local project.

Speaking at last Monday's meeting of the County Council, Cllr. Kyne said the treatment plant would copperfasten employment in the area, help attract new industry, protect existing blue flag beaches and expand tourist facilities.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

I am on the Farm Retirement Scheme and last year there was a deduction for PRSI on my pay slip. This year there is no deduction, why is that? ANSWER

The deduction you refer to was not for PRSI but the Levies - Health 1.25%, Youth and Training 1%, which were payable on all income over £188 a week. The threshold was increased to £197 in the 1997 Budget and came into effect on April 6th.

As you are retired you no longer pay PRSI. If you were paying Class S PRSI prior to going on the scheme you should apply to become a Voluntary Contributor, £215 per annum, in order to protect your entitlement to the Contributory Old Age Pension. You should contact your local Social Welfare Office.

The Aeroplane he Kites That Hel

The first kites in Europe were windsocks flown during Roman times.

Kites as we know them were introduced to the West in the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries by Dutch, Portuguese and English merchants trading in Far Eastern countries.

Among the earliest records of kites in Europe is a description dated 1589, by a man named Della Porta, of a rectangular kite from China, which could be used for lifting lanterns, fireworks or an-

By the early eighteenth century, kites were widespread in Europe, but mainly as a chil-

In France, kite flying became an obsession and in 1738 it was banned because of riots and bird's. crop damage.

Kites were also the inspiration behind the world's first aeroplanes. It began in 1804 when Sir George Cayley built a model glider that included a kite as its main wing. He went on to

build a glider that flew his coachman across a valley — the first recorded glider flight.

At the end of the last century a German, Otto Lilienthal built a kite with a wing shape like a

It led to the design of a biplane hang-glider which helped in the experiments of the Wright brothers in America. They made biplane kites and larger gliders, leading to the first aeroplane in December 1903.

The highest a single kite has ever flown is 12,471 feet — one third of the height of a passenger jet — in the USA in 1898.

The highest a string of kites has flown is 31,955 feet - in Germany in 1919.

Where Do Butterflies Go When It Rains?

flowers or stalks of grass. They hang with their heads downwards and their wings folded together over their backs. When the wings are closed it is very difficult to see the butterfly because the undersides have pale colours and faint patterns.

There are up to 10,000 known species of batterfly. They are all different sizes, ranging from less than an inch to the swallow-tails which live in north Australia and the the swallow-tails which live in north Australia and the Pacific Islands and have a wing span of 10 inches. The majority of female butterflies have less colourful wings than the males of the same species. The female lays between 100 and 3,000 eggs according to the species. She lays them on a plant which will feed the caterpillars when they emerge from the eggs.

From the egg to butterfly, the caterpillar goes through a stage. It becomes a chrysalis from which a grown butterfly emerges. The butterfly may only live a few weeks, but some butterflies hibernate.

ome butterflies hibernate.

Butterflies like to eat the nectar of plants and sweet juices. They get the juices from over-ripe or rotting fruit. The food provides energy for them to fly but is not used for body-building. Any growth that takes place in the butterfly's life occurs at the caterpillar stage.



Dungarvan's Refuse Collection Gets A Lift

On Friday, September 5th Dungarvan Urban District Council took delivery of a new Refuse Collection Vehicle from Manvik Plant Ltd., Dublin. This new high tech vehicle, which is equipped with special lifting gear, will enable the Urban Council to fully implement the wheeled bin collection system throughout the entire urban area.

The Council expects to extend the system on a phased basis introducing the new collection arrangements on one new route each week until all areas are covered. The first route to be introduced is the Monday route which covers areas such as Mitchel Street, Shandon, Boreenatra, The Lookout, Childers Estate and Kilrush Park. The U.D.C. anticipates introducing the system on this route on Monday, September 22nd followed by the Tuesday route on Tuesday, September 30th, the Thursday route on Thursday, October 9th and the Friday route on Friday, October 17th.

Information flyers which include wheeled bin order forms are currently being distributed by An Post to every household and business premises in the urban area. Order forms are also available from the following outlets -

Danny's Centra and Mulcahy's Spar, Abbeyside;

Florries; Dungarvan Nissan, Yougha! Road; Campus, Kilrush; Post Office, Dungarvan; Waterford County Council Offices and the Town Hall. Completed order forms coupled with payment should be forwarded to the Town Hall as soon as possible to facilitate delivery of bins by the Council staff in time for commencement of the new collection arrangements. Domestic bins which come in two sizes, 140L and 240L, may be viewed at the Town Hall, Dungarvan while the 660L commercial bin may be viewed at the U.D.C. Yard, Shandon. For further details regarding prices of bins and methods of payment see the advert. in this issue and the official order form.

Negotiations have been successfully concluded with the A.T.G.W.U. representatives and the Refuse Crew. The operators have expressed their satisfaction with the new system which will greatly improve their

working conditions.

The wheeled bin collection system is already operating successfully throughout Co. Waterford and many other areas, both urban and rural throughout Ireland. Dungarvan U.D.C. is confident that the new system will greatly improve the overall appearance of Dungarvan town and its environs by eliminating the litter caused by poorly pre-sented domestic and commercial waste. Waterford Half Way To Becoming Ireland's First Litter Free County

By AISLING CONROY

Cigarette butts and chewing gum could cause Water-ford County to lose their prize of a £1m advance factory which will be donated by Irish Business Against Litter (IBAL) if the county becomes litter free by May 1998. A high incidence of this form of littering was observed at most locations monitored by An Taisce during their recent initial litter survey of the county. How this problem is tackled over the next few months could be crucial to Waterford's aspiration to become Ireland's first litter free

county.

An Taisce carried out a litter survey in Co. Waterford during the week August 11th - August 14th. Sixty sites in twelve different locations throughout the county were visited by the survey team. Waterford County Council were unaware that this Litter Survey was scheduled to be under-

They were also unaware of The town of Lismore was this week that the Council the exact locations which were to be monitored by the litter survey team.

An Taisce's preliminary findings for this initial Litter Survey indicated that Waterford is in a very good posi-tion to achieve litter free status by May 1998. Each survey site visited was graded with a Cleanliness Grade.

The results of the initial survey showed 53.3% of the sites monitored by the litter survey team were in Grade A - complete absence of litter: 30% were Grade B - scattered small amounts of litter; 16.7% were Grade C - small accumulations of litter and none of the sites surveyed had significant accumulations of litter.

This means that Waterford County is more than half way there towards meeting its goal of becoming litter free by May 1998. It is most impressive that Grade D (Significant Accumulations of Litter) was not recorded at taken during this period. any of the sites surveyed. er, Donal Connolly revealed

rated by An Taisce's Litter Inspectors as top of the Cleanliness Grade. The six sites inspected throughout Lismore were each awarded Grade A. Kilmacthomas followed very closely by Dungarvan were rated at the lowest end of the Cleanliness Grades. Tramore, Ardmore, Kilmeaden and Portlaw all featured as joint third at the lower end of the Cleanliness Grade.

As part of their Litter Action strategy, Waterford County Council have taken the initiative of establishing a Litter Control Office which will co-ordinate their Litter Action Plan. As an innovative feature of this strategy, the County Manager has written personally to each employee of Waterford County Council appealing to them to play their part in making County Waterford the first litter free county in Ireland.

Waterford County Manag-

will appoint two litter wardens, one for the west of the county and one for the east, over the coming weeks. Describing the campaign so far as encouraging, Mr. Connolly said the local authorities have a lot of work to do. "It won't be easy," he warned, adding that Waterford can only win the £1 advance factory if every single town and village in the county responds to the challenge and gets thoroughly involved in the campaign.

Meanwhile the first annual County Environment Awards will be presented at an awards ceremony in the Park Hotel, Dungarvan on September 24th. Awards will be presented to the best town/village in the Tidy Towns Competition, best environmental project, best burial ground, best school and many others. An Taisce will also attend the awards night to present the full results of their initial litter sur-

vey of the county.





This Week In The Garden

Prune Rambler Roses

Most rambler roses will have finished flowering and may be pruned. If they have made a great deal of new growth, much of it from near ground level, you can cut out all the old canes that have just borne flowers.

But if there is not much young wood you will have to keep the best of the old and simply remove that which is obviously worn out or diseased. If you have to do this you must be careful to cut back all faded flower trusses, together with any heps they may be bearing.

Weeping standard roses are pruned at the same time and in a similar manner. After pruning, train the long shoots round the umbrella shaped training frames, which should be securely fastened to the stakes supporting the plants.

Lift Main Crop Carrots

Lift the main crop carrots sown in April. If they are left in the ground any longer the roots might crack. Dig them up carefully with a fork, cut off the tops and store the roots in a heap in the shed or cellar, or other frost-proof place. They will keep better and be less likely to shrivel if they are covered with sand or sifted ashes.

Lift Main Crop Beetroot

The main crop of long beetroot sown in May should be lifted and stored at about this time. Twist off the tops without injuring the skin of the beetroot in any way and store them in a cool

Prune Loganberries

By now loganberries will have finished fruiting and they should be pruned as soon as possible. Simply cut out to the base of the plant all canes that have just borne fruit and train the young canes to the wires in their place.

Continue To Pick Apples and Pears

Keep a close eye on apples and pears and continue to pick them as soon as they are ripe. With certain varieties of pear, such as Beurre Hardy it is even advisable to pick a little before they are ripe and to complete the ripening process in a dry, fairly warm shed or room.

The Promise of a Rose Garden

But it was the Romans themselves who transformed the rose from a wild flower into a cultivated garden plant.

So it is little wonder that, after being cultivated for more than 2,000 years, there are now thousands of types to choose from. When planning your rose garden, therefore, you have almost unlimited options as to types and colours of roses.

The rose is a very hardy flower and in Ireland most varieties can be relied upon to bloom for about nine months of the year - from May or June right through to the following January. There is nothing unusual about having a Christmas Rose in your garden in December.

PLANNING YOUR ROSE GARDEN

A rose garden can be as big or as small as you wish, but a traditional version would include climbers and ramblers gracing an arbour, a pergola, a trellis or an ornamental arch along with other varieties in shaped and designed flower beds or contain-

First decide how you want your rose garden to look and draw it out on paper. You can revise your drawing until you have the design you want. Once you have settled upon a design make sure your scale measurements are accurate.

PREPARING THE GARDEN

Dig the earth thoroughly before building structures in your rose garden. After the soil has been well dug, add plenty of natural fertiliser. Horse manure is still the best for a good rose garden. Once the soil has been prepared you can build any structures or lay any paths you will need. Make sure your structures are solid, well-bedded and capable of withstanding the onslaught of all kinds of weather including storms and high winds.

ROUTINE CARE

You should always keep your roses well fertilised, free from weeds and spray them regularly to kill any pests. They also need plenty of water for healthy growth.

DAIRYING

Quota Position

Establish the milk quota position for your herd on September 1.Take into consideration what the potential of the herd until drying off time is and the calving pattern in the Spring of 1998.

Having established whether you are under, over or on quota, you must then decide whether you will introduce meal feeding or whether you need to dry off some cows early.

Meal Feeding

- ★ Economic response again from late September.
- ★ Trials at Moorepark show a response of 0.4 gl of milk when cow received 2 kgs concentrate i.e. 1 kg of milk for 1 kg of meal.
- * Response very dependent on grass quality supply and the dry matter content.
- ★ Cows on low dry matter grass (12 13%) and dropping yields too quickly (quarter to half gl/week), meal feeding should commence immediately if on quota or pushing to fill quota.
- * It pays to feed meals in the Autumn if under quota. Response is 0.41 gls of milk for 2 kgs concentrate i.e. a kg milk for a kg of meal.
- ★ Energy is all that is needed, fibrous feeds give a better response i.e. pulp, citrus, overall protein should be 10-14%.
- ★ Buying meals in the Autumn, be careful with the price particularly since most Autumn milk is leased milk which is costing you a minimum 27p/gallon. Assume net price of 80p/gallon over the period if such is the case.
- * Body condition, particularly of 1st calvers, needs to be kept under review.

Suckler Calves

Aim for the highest possible gain (1 kg plus/day) at lowest cost until weaning. Milk and grass are the cheapest feeds for suckler calves.

I Let calves creep graze ahead of the cows. A simple creep gate (18-20" adjustable opening) or electrified barrier across an open gateway will allow calves creep ahead.

I Milk yields are declining but good grass management will prevent a rapid fall.

Creep Feeding

The economics of meal feeding will depend on grass supply.

Grass Supply Response Meal Cost/kg gl Margin over Meal

Plentiful Poor 112p -2p +54p Scarce Good 56p Meal feeding is justified for all calves as grass gets

Bull calves are worth much more per kg than heifer calves. They will leave a higher margin on meal feed-

Creep feeders can lead to uneven intake and wasteful consumption. Big calves will do better at the expense of smaller calves. Trough feeding will give greater control and more uniform intakes.

Home mixed rations based on cereals, or pulp are good value. Protein are mineral supplementation are not critical if daily intake is less than 1.5 kg.

TILLAGE

Up to last weekend approximately 50% of the cereal crops in the county remained to be harvested. Crops worst affected by the weather are Spring and Winter Oats, Spring Wheat and Malting Barley.

Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Joe Walsh T.D., visited the Kilmacthomas area last Friday to see for himself some of the worst hit crops and he also spoke to farmers in the area about the difficulties that they are experiencing.

Teagasc is also to undertake an evaluation of the damage and report to him within the next two weeks.

If each of the 130,000 breeding herd owners are to order and pay individually, ICMSA information is that the cost of this system would be 60 per cent higher than with the centralised payment system.

James Coughlan, has criticised the Government for reneging on a pre election commitment to IFA that they would continue to support the Young Farmer Installation Scheme.

Mr. Coughlan said that the recent decision by the Government to scrap the Young Farmer Installation Scheme was a slap in the face to young farmers who are contemplating taking up agriculture as a viable career option. The installation

Waterford IFA Chairman, scheme which is worth £5,600 is a key element in meeting the high cost of transfers of farms from the older generation to the younger generation.

The Waterford IFA Chairman called on the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh, to reverse the decision to scrap the installation scheme which has benefitted up to 1,000 young farmers annually and it has been a key instrument in the restructuring of Irish agriculture.

said that the problem of young farmers is also compounded by the enlargement requirement under the Early Retirement Scheme, This condition is placing a huge burden on young farmers who have either to purchase or lease land at inflated prices in order to meet the 10% enlargement requirement under the Early Retirement Scheme.

Mr. Coughlan called on the Government to make a case to Brussels to scrap the en-Continuing Mr. Coughlan largement clause so that

young farmers are not placed at competitive disadvantage to meet qualifying criteria for the Early Retirement Scheme for farmers who are between the ages of 55 and 66 years of age.

ICMSA Warning On Making Farmers "Caretakers" Of The Countryside

Young people wishing to pursue farming as a way of life are being increasingly frustrated by Government and EU policies, ICMSA President Frank Allen has stated.

Speaking after presenting Teagasc Certificates in Farming to a group of young farmers in the Teagasc Centre in Kilmallock, Co. Limerick, Mr. Allen criticised the recent suspension by the Minister for Agriculture and Food Joe Walsh, T.D., of the £5,600 grant payable under the Installation Aid Scheme to help defray the heavy investment required by young enterprise.

Other major obstacles in the way of young people who wanted to pursue a career in farming were the astronomical price of land and the crazy EU stipulation that a young person taking over a holding from someone who has opted for the Farmer Early Retirement Scheme must go to the expense of expanding the farm by acquiring additional land.

The policy makers have the hypocrisy to put these major hurdles in the way of young people wishing to enter farming while they cry crocodile tears over the flow

people to set up a farming of population from rural areas to towns and cities,' said Mr. Allen.

Urgent Measures Vital To Protect Livelihoods Of Grain Growers

Speaking at a press conference in Dublin recently on the harvest crisis, IFA President, John Donnelly said that Irish growers are faced with weather related losses of over £30m as a result of poor yields, unharvestable crops, high moistures and additional harvesting costs unless there is an immediate improvement in weather conditions. "This is the most difficult harvest in two decades with 50% of the national crop (150,000 hectares) still in the fields. For this reason it is imperative that a number of important measures are taken immediately to protect the livelihood of 17,000 grain growers

With grain prices already at a twenty year low, crops are now being hammered by relentless wind and rain, and losses are mounting by the day. Virtually all grain growers will see their incomes slashed this year and some farm families, with near total harvest losses, will be pushed to the brink."

The IFA President pointed out that at its meeting with Agriculture Minister, Joe Walsh, on Tuesday, Sept. 2, IFA requested Government delivery on a number of

1. — All area aid payments to be paid by September 30. This will require the Government securing permission from Brussels to bring forward the payments.

Government to match £ for £EU revaluation aid. as provided for under EU regulations. This will cost £3m and should be paid together with other outstanding revaluation aid by September 30.

3. — Teagasc to immediately assess weather losses of all affected crops (cereals, potatoes, vegetables) on the worst affected farms with a view to the Government taking all necessary measures to protect the future viability of those farming businesses worst affected.


4. — Teagasc to prepare a special report by November 1 on "reducing the costs of inputs in cereals in 1998." This will involve publishing details of research in Oak Park on low input output trials as well as providing advice on land rental prices and specific information on cost effective ways of reducing agri-chemical inputs and machinery costs.

5. — A joint Department of Agriculture/IFA request to the lending institutions for a special package for grain growers and tillage farmers in response to the weath-

The IFA President said that the banks will have to take into consideration present harvest prices and "the implications which this will have on growers repayment capacity post harvest."

In view of grain growers diminished repayment capacity it is important that loans are restructured without penalties and that special loan interest packages are available to growers for the coming season.

The IFA Grain Chairman John O'Mahony formally complained to the Government that Irish grain merchants were exploiting grain growers at their time of greatest difficulty and called on the Government to investigate current grain pricing and publish a full report within 10 days.

Family health

Q. I had unprotected sex with my boyfriend a few days ago. My friend got the morning after pill from her doctor last year when she had unprotected sex with her boyfriend. Will I still be able to get it? How can I be sure I'm not pregnant? The morning after pill is

prescribed for women when there is a risk of pregnancy occurring. It must be taken within 72 (three days) of unprotected intercourse in order to be effective. It is only suitable for one episode of unprotected sexual inter-course in each monthly cycle. The morning after pill consists

of four pills containing hormones similar to the oral containing contraceptive pill. The first two must be taken within 72 hours of unprotected sex. The other two tablets are taken exactly 12 hours later. These tablets may cause a feeling of nausea and breast tendemess which will pass in about 24 hours.

The morning after pill works by delaying the egg release, that

is ovulation, by altering the lining of the womb so that the egg, if it is fertilised, cannot attach itself to the wall of the womb and will pass unnoticed out of the body, by slowing down the passage of the egg through the fallopian tube. The failure rate of the morning-after pill is less than 5%. However, there is a greater risk of failure the closer the

unprotected sexual intercourse takes place to ovula-tion, release of the egg from the ovary.

There are a number of women for whom the morning after pill is not suitable, including anyone with a history of clots or of ectopic pregnancy, that is pregnancy or those breast feeding. Should the morning after pill

fail and pregnancy occur then the risk of the foetus developing any abnormalities is believed to be extremely small.

After taking the morning after pill, the next period is usually on time or even a little early, occasionally it can be two to six days late. It is important that you attend your doctor three to four weeks later for a

HAIR REMOVAL **Electrolysis**

ELECTROLYSIS is a permanent method of hair removal using electricity. It should always be carried out by a trained electrol-

Electrolysis can be carried out on most parts of the body. The most usual areas being the chin, upper lip and sides of the face. It is done by using a very fine needle which erted underneath the hair. A very small current is passed through the needle, the needle is removed and the hair slides out with a tweezers. It is not always possible to stop the hair growth on the first treatment, therefore subsequent treatment may be necessary. However, the hair does become weaker after each treatment. So as to get full benefit from the treatment, no other form of hair removal should be used on the specific area being treated in between treatments.

After having electrolysis done the electrolysist will usually apply an after treat-ment lotion. This will help to cool the skin and aid in its healing. The skin may appear red and blotchy for a few hours after each treatment It is important not to touch the area with your hands and not to apply any creams or make-up for up to 24 hours as the skin will be quite sensitive.

Electrolysis is a lengthy process and must be repeated at regular intervals for best results. However, it is a permanent method of hair removal and once treatment is finished you will have the result you looked for.

Areas which can not be treated by electrolysis are the cyclids, inside of ears, nostrils or moles. Some medical prob-lems may not be treated, but your electrolysist will be able to advise on treatment. Electrolysis is very popular and is practised in most beauty salons. check-up and to plan contraception. While waiting for your check-up either abstain from sexual intercourse or insist on condoms.

Q. My aunt has recently been diagnosed as having breast cancer. Her sister also had it about three years ago but is doing fine now, thank God. I am worried that I may develop breast cancer myself as it seems to run in the family. Could you explain how I can examine my breasts myself?

A. Examining your breasts yourself is important, as a great many women are the first to find any lumps in their breasts. Remember that not all breast lumps are cancerous. You should examine your breasts monthly. The best time do so is just after your period. Undress yourself to the waist, oit in front of a mirror and lock sit in front of a mirror and look at your breasts with your hands by your side. Then look again with your hands on your head; look with your hands stretched above your head; finally look with your hands on finally look with your hands on your hips pressing them inwards until your chest muscles tighten. As you go through this drill look at the

following:

1. The size and shape of the breasts and the position of the nipples. Both sides should be more or less the same.

2. Feel for any lumps or thickening. Breasts feel lumpy before a period, which is why you check the breasts after a period when they are at their least lumpy.
3. See if either breast turns in

on itself or points up or outwards in an unusual

manner. 4. Check for any weeping or

bleeding.
5. Is there any unusual swelling or dimpling?

6. Are the veins standing out more than usual?

7. Does either breast look puckered or is there any unusual rash or colouring? To feel the breast, lie on a flat surface like a bed with your head on a pillow. With the flat of the fingers of the right hand feel the left breast. Examine all parts of the breast by pressing gently but firmly in towards the body, starting at the periphery and working in towards the nipple in smaller and smaller circles. Also check the tail of the breast, which goes in towards the armpit. Repeat this procedure twice, once with the left arm and then with the arm above your head and bent at the elbow. Reverse the process for the right breast, i.e. examine the right breast with the left hand. Should you find any lumps or if you have any concerns after checking the breasts then contact your doctor straight away.

Chef's corner Summer Fish Soup

Preparation: 15 minutes Cooking: approx 45 minutes Serves: 4.

1 tbsp olive oil 1 garlic clove, peeled and chopped" anopped
1 onion, peeled and
chopped
2 celery stalks, sliced
3 thsp freshly chopped flat-

1 (400g/14 oz) can chopped 1 tbsp tomato puree

METHOD: Heat the oil in a large pan and fry the garlic, onion and celery for 4 minutes until softened. Stir in 2 thsp of the parsley and cook for 1 minute. Add the canned tomatoes, tomato puree, wine and fish stock to the pan and bring to the boil. Reduce heat, cover and simmer for 15 minutes. Add the squid to the tomato mixture and cook for 10 minutes. Cut the monkfish and haddock into large chunks and add to the pan with the prawns. Stir once, cover and simmer for 10-15 minutes until the fish is cooked through. Spoon the soup into a large serving bowl and garnish with the remaining parsley. Serve with crusty bread.

Raspberry Pastries Preparation: 20 Minutes

Cooking: 15-20 minutes Serves: 8 2 (15cm/6in) square sheets frozen ready-rolled puff pastry, thawed 1 egg, size 3, beaten

4 tbsp raspberry iam 225g/8 oz fresh raspberries, washed 25g/1 oz flaked almonds,

toasted and chopped icing sugar to dust

METHOD: Preheat the oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas mark 6. Cut the puff pastry into 8 squares, each measuring 7.5cm/3in. Cut a 6mm/1/4in border around 2 oppsite corners of each square. It should look as if you've almost cut a square from the middle, but two corrections middle, but two corners are still attached. Dampen the edges with water. Lift the 2.

border and cross them over to overlap, so that they rest on top of the two free corners of the inside square. Repeat with the remaining pastry squares. Carefully place the individual pastries on a dampened baking sheet. Brush the edges with beaten egg. Spread 1 tsp of jam in the middle of each pastry and top with the raspberries. Bake for 15-20 minutes until the pastry is puffed and golden. Remove and place on a wire rack to cool. Remove and place on a wire rack to cool. Heat the remaining raspberry jam in a small ...saucepan until melted. Brush over the rasberries, sprinkle with the almonds and dust with icing sugar.







Nearly 5,000 people from West Waterford and Dungarvan paid their respects to the late Diana, Princess of Wales as they signed their names to Books of Condolence throughout last week.

Poems, tributes and private comments adorned the pages of both Books of Condolence at David Walsh's, Lower Main Street and at Dungaryan Tourist Office, Grattan Square.

The Tourist Office opened their Book of Condolence on Tuesday, September 2nd and it closed at 4.30 p.m. last Thursday when it was sent by courier to the British Embassy in Dublin. In that short space of time over 3,000 people had signed their name to the book, the huge queues often spilling out onto the street.

At David Walsh Office and School Supplies, over 1,550 people had signed the book by last Monday with signatures growing steadily. The book is still open to the public until its closure this evening (Wednesday), September 10th.

As all eyes turned to Princess Diana's emotional funeral on Saturday, floral tributes were placed before

her picture at the gates of St. Mary's Parish Church while some businesses around the town paid their own special tribute with pictures of the glamorous Princess on display in shop windows.

This huge response by the people of Co. Waterford to Diana's tragic death reflects the high esteem and respect she was held in by all. Her untimely demise at the height of her popularity has united the entire county in sorrow and shock.

LAND EATEN AWAY

The serious problem of coastal erosion around the county and particularly in Ardmore was also raised by members at the meeting. Coastal protection works amounting to £150,000 will be undertaken in Tramore to prevent future damage to roads and property by storm

Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson asked if the Council had any plans to survey coastal erosion in Ardmore and highlighted one area of Ballyquin where the coast is continuously moving closer to the Whe-

lan's residence. Likewise Cllr. Jackie Fahey declared that the land at Ballyquin is being eaten away. "It will be no length of time until the houses are affected," he warned. Cllr. Fahey subsequently called on Waterford Minister Martin Cullen, who has responsibility for the Board of Works, to use his influence in the Dáil

power and resources to get and draw down funding to combat this problem.

£5m has been allocated this year among the 15 maritime counties in the country. A survey carried out in 1990 however showed that £5.2m was needed for coastal erosion in Waterford alone and £125m for the entire country. Obviously the situation has worsened in the intervening years due to the frequent number of storms.

According to County Engineer, Mr. O'Flynn coastal protection works can only be grant aided if the works protect public property. He said it is most unlikely that a person would get funding to protect private or agricultural property. "They either find it themselves or let the land erode," he stated. Since 1841, the land at

Whiting Bay has receded by some 200 yds., entire roads, a bridge and a school have disappeared in Ardmore over the years due to constant erosion of the land.

U.D.C. To Develop New Industrial Estate

recently purchased approx. 15 acres of land from Waterford Foods at the rear of the Council's machinery yard on the by-pass road. This land will now be transformed into an industrial estate; a natural extension of the existing commercial park at Kilrush.

A total of 17 developers can be accommodated on the site, varying from 1/2 acre to 1 3/4 acres. The new industrial estate will be expertly landscaped and accessed by a new road between the former Apple Factory and Central Dairies properties. This new road will join up with the main Cork/Waterford by-pass road adjacent to Dungarvan Fire Station. A sign will be erected at the entrance to the estates, listing all the factories and their location.

Speaking at last Monday's meeting of the Urban Council, Waterford County Manager, Donal Connolly said 7

Dungarvan Urban Council sites will be sold initially and the remaining 8 sites which form a significant block of land will be retained in the event of a requirement for a larger site for a particular industry or commercial activity.

Interest has already been expressed in the new estate by five prospective developers and the Council will discuss the matter with them over the next fortnight. One of the conditions in the sale of a site is that the developer will be obliged to build on the land within 1 - 2 years of purchasing it. The money generated by the sale of the sites will help recoup the cost of the land and its subsequent development.

Complimenting Mr. Connolly and the Council staff on the successful progression of the new industrial estate, Cllr. Billy Kyne said the new facility will attract small and medium enterprises and presents tremendous opportunities for the town.

Childers Estate Residents Concerned At Proposed College

A group of residents from Childers Estate, Dungarvan have expressed serious reservations about the siting of the proposed new Technical College on the seafront near their estate.

In the past week, the County Waterford V.E.C. lodged an application for planning permission with the local Urban Council for the erection of a single storey Vocational School at Ringnasillogue.

Replacing the outdated and overcrowded school at Wolfe Tone Road, the new £1m plus college would comprise of 7 general classrooms, ancillary facilities, fenced basketball courts, car parking facilities and an entrance road financed by the Department of Education.

The V.E.C. acquired the site near the Sports Centre at Quann's from the Urban Council back in 1983 for a reported sum of £40,000. Since then progress on the project has been painstakingly slow and many now agree that it's a case of 'now or never' with regard to the final planning stages of the college.

Prior to last Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan U.D.C. where the matter was to be discussed on the agenda, a deputation of Childers Estate residents met with Council members and the press at the doors of the Town Hall.

Spokesperson for the group, Jerry Collins said that the new school would bring its own problems to the area such as increased transport services, noise, vandalism and would, he said, greatly interfere with the progress already being made in the estate by the residents themselves and the local authority under the estate management programme.

In a press released titled "Childers Estate - Our History", Mr. Collins states that the estate, with a population of roughly 600 people, has had numerous social problems but through the management programme, it has got a fresh lease of life.

"There is now a great civic and community spirit developing and residents have once again pride in their said Mr. Collins.

While admitting that school facilities at the V.E.C. need to be greatly improved for students and teachers alike, Mr. Collins declared that the local residents "do not see the proposed location as being in the best interests of either the residents, the pupils or the staff."

A CONSULTATIVE REPORT

The area at Ringnasillogue where the college is to be located is zoned in the Dungarvan Development Plan for recreation and amenity. Therefore in order for Council officials to even consider granting permission for the college, members were first required to agree on a material contravention of the development plan following which a notice will appear in local newspapers informing the public of this change in land zoning.

Proposing that the Council follow such a course of action at Monday's meeting was Cllr. Billy Kyne who is also Chairman of the V.E.C. Cllr. Kyne said he had met with the deputation of Childers Estate residents prior to the meeting and had extended an invitation to them to meet with V.E.C. members and Kieran Heffernan, Chief Executive Officer. "Through dialogue, we can minimise the number of objections to the development, he stated.

Cllr. Kyne saw the granting of a material contravention as the first step in a consultative process and said he hoped over the coming weeks to meet with people who have reservations about the project so that they can hopefully be resolved.

It's important that the college goes ahead now," he stressed, while adding that if people remain unhappy, then they have the right to lodge an objection.

His proposal was seconded by U.D.C. Chairman, Cllr. Austin Flynn who is a member of the teaching staff at the Technical College. "It's vital for the town to get this school it's a now or never situation and I will be supporting it fully," stated Cllr. Flynn. "We must show people that they need have no fears of having a school in the area," he added.

A notice of material contravention of the Dungaryan development plan appears elsewhere in this edition and the public are now invited to submit any observations or comments regarding the development to the Town Hall.

Members of the Council will vote on whether or not to grant the project planning permission at their October meeting.

Guinness Championships Set All Time Records

The attendances at the 1997 Guinness All-Ireland Hurling Championships are up 22% on 1996. By the time next month's Tipperary - Clare All-Ireland final is played (it will attract a capacity crowd of over 65,000) over 483,000 will have watched the action, compared with 395,572 last year.

In real terms the percentage increase will be up 25% as the 1996 figures were boosted by a draw between Limerick and Tipperary in the Munster Final. That match drew 40,000. There were no draws this year.

There were two additional games this year (the All-Ireland quarter-finals) but their combined attendance was 28,526, over 11,000 less than the crowd at the Limerick-Tipperary replay last year. So when the figures are adjusted to take this into account, the percentage increase in attendances on 1996 comes out at over 25%. The increase on the 1995 figures is even more staggering. In 1995 the total attendance at all the Guinness Hurling Championship games was 305,422. That's 177,578 fewer than the 1997 figures. That works out at a 58% increase in two years.

The most dramatic increase in attendances this year was in the Leinster Championship which was watched by 125,571, compared with 88,371 in 1996 and 65,593

The biggest crowd pullers this season have been -Tipperary v Wexford - 62,142; Kilkenny v Wexford -55,492; Wexford v Offaly/Kilkenny v Dublin - 52,079; Clare v Kilkenny - 47,961; Clare v Tipperary - 43,560.

ing approval by the Department of the Environment to proceed onto the contract document stage. Under an EU Directive, all towns with an effluent trading equiva-lent to that of a population in excess of 15,000 by the end of the century will have effluent treatment facilities. While Dungarvan has already set the wheels in motion to bring that about, Waterford Foods' support of the project is a major factor in its successful develop-

Cllr. Kyne continued that although progress has been made and the environmental impact study for the plant has been certified by the Department, he claimed that the management at Waterford Foods could have done more to advance the project.

"When will we get a public statement from the head of the new conglomerate that this is a high priority," he declared. While he "had no reason" to doubt the good intentions of the new company, Cllr. Kyne said the recently ratified merger of the two companies had added a new dimension to the situation. As the fourth largest dairy group in the world, AWG is expected to cut costs by £20m in the current year.

County Manager, Donal Connolly said the Council had reached an agreement with Waterford Foods regarding their contribution to the project. He had been in contact with the AWG for the same commitment to the development and was still awaiting a reply.
