Thank you for a well filled in form and for the information contained in it and for the useful map. Villierstown, a former linen town, is a delightful village. It forms a complete entity on its own, separated from the surrounding countryside by two quite charming entry points, one from Cappoquin through Dromana Drive and the other from Clashmore. All

THE BUILT **ENVIRONMENT 28** (26) MAX. 40

The Gate Lodge was a delightful and surprising entry to this village. The only other large buildings, the old Court House, the Church and the School are all well presented. The plaques explaining all items of interest are a wonderful addition. They bring the form and character of the whole village into focus. The colour schemes chosen

are most successful and add vibrancy. The treatment of unoccupied buildings is very satisfactory. Rather than being discordant they blend in with the existing housing

LANDSCAPING 32 (29) **MAX. 40**

The clearing and restoration of grass at Dromana Drive has been most successful and this together with the Green give the village a wonderful sense of greenness and order. They are very well presented with suitable shrubs and trees. The link road to the Quay is also very attractive.

WILDLIFE AND **NATURAL AMENITIES** 22 (21) MAX. 30

Villierstown is fortunate in its location and setting to be able to include many natural amenities. The proximity of the River Blackwater is a major asset in this regard. The small area of marshland that has been set aside close to the Quay to encourage waterside life is highly commended, as is the policy re-

garding hedge cutting.
LITTER CONTROL 28
(28) MAX. 40

Litter control was excellent except for one black spot at the Quay where the small bin was overfull and the litter had spilt onto the ground. A larger bin might solve this

TIDINESS 15 (14) MAX. 20

Again at the Quay, there was a problem. The cord from the pole to the life buoy was grossly tangled, making the life belt useless. It is important that this always be kept in perfect condition even though one of the facts of contemporary living is that items like this life buoy seem to get vandalised. There was a slight clutter of signs at the end of the village. The finger sign directing to the Quay is difficult to read. Perhaps the readjustment of these signs your continued participation

could be considered. RESIDENTIAL AREAS 20 (19) MAX. 30

The residential areas are extremely well presented. The colour schemes used are most successful and together with the delightful gardens and green areas add vibrancy and unity to the whole village.
ROADS, STREETS

AND BACK AREAS 25 (26) MAX. 40

The general impression is one of pleasure at such a delightful village. The sense of co-ordination and pride among all those involved in very obvious. All are to be highly applauded.

County Register Goes On-Line

Last week, Waterford County Council became the first local authority in the country to provide an on-line countywide service to the register of electors

This new service was launched by Council Chairman Lar Hart at a reception in the Dungarvan branch library. According to County Librarian Donald Brady, the register is one of the largest, most useful and current of the information services provided by local authorities. It contains 41,386 records at present and will be automatically updated each spring when the new register comes into force. It is now possible on a name or address basis to check details on a countywide basis at every automated branch library in the county.

Enquiries, can be carried out by the public as well as the staff and telephone enquiries will present no difficulty. Potential voters can check if they are on the official register and what polling station they attend.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

ANSWER

You should contact your County Council or borough Corporation for information on Disabled Persons Grants. Disabled Persons Grants are payable where alterations need to be made to a house to make it suitable for a physically disabled or mentally handicapped or mentally ill person. Alterations could include making the dwelling wheelchair accessible, moving light switches, door handles, installing a ground floor bathroom and toilet. The cost of the alterations must exceed £200.

Grants can be made for either local authority or privately owned homes which are at least one year old. In the case of local authority housing, the entire cost will be covered. For private homes up to two thirds of the cost may be granted, subject to a maximum of £8,000. As with other Department grants, work must be carried out by a registered contractor.

In planning extensions or adaptations to their homes, people with disabilities should ensure that they apply for a grant in good time - the grant will not be made if work has begun before formal approval of the application has been received.

Local authorities do have discretion in regard to these

Where Drinks Float Out

It is difficult to imagine a world without gravity

without gravity — there would be nothing to keep your feet on the ground.

Each time you took a step you would float off into the air — eventually heading out into space.

The Earth has powerful gravity but on the Moon is it much weaker, only about a tenth of the strength.

Astronauts who have been there found they

could bounce into the sky. A movement that would have been a small hop on Earth was a giant leap on the Moon.

In space there is hardly any gravity at all—and when astronauts leave their spacecraft there is a real danger they could drift away into the darkness.


To stop this they wear a special rocket engine pack which pushes them in the direction they need to go.

The rules of movement they are used to on Earth cannot be used in space.

Tools, drinking cups — even food and drink — will float away unless something holds them in place.


When an astronaut wants a drink and there is no gravity he cannot hold a cup to his mouth like we do on Earth. The liquid will not pour, it will simply float off into the cabin.

To stop this happening, astronauts must suck their drinks through a tube — and food has to be pushed straight into their mouths.

Where was Joan Of Arc Burned To Death?

Joan of Arc, the peasant girl who brought the French to victory at Orleans and Charles VII to his coronation, was burned to death as heretic by the English May 31st 1431, in the Place Vieux Marche in Rouen. Her great deeds of heroism and leadership played a major part in the revival of France at the crisis of the Hundred Years War against the English. She claimed to be inspired by the voices of three different saints.

She was born in 1412 at Domremy, a village situated between Champagne and Lorraine on the banks of the Meuse. She was a happy young girl, who brought cattle to the fields and played with people of her own age. When she was 13, she began to hear voices and see visions. Later these voices persuaded her to go to Orleans and raise the siege of the city. She received approval from the church entered Orleans and defeated the besieging English.

the besieging English.

After a well known battle at Patay in June 1429 she led the French to victory and she persuaded Charles the Dauphin to go to Rheims where he was crowned king. Joan the Maid of Orleans, was in attendance and stood near the altar during the ceremony holding her banner aloft.

Joan was captured by the Burgundians in a fight on May 30th 1430 and they handed her over to the Bishop of Beauvais. She was questioned by the church and then handed over to the English. Throughout her ordeal until the moment she was about to be burned she claimed that the voices were sent to her by God. The executioner said later that her heart wouldn't burn and that it was found intact in her ashes. This story is part of the legend of Joan of Arc.

Council To Examine Roads In Springmount/Lisfennell Area

A report on the traffic situa-tion in the Springmount/Lisfennell area in Dungarvan has been requested by Waterford County Councillor Jackie Fahey.

Cllr. Fahey, who is a resident of the area, told last week's

Council meeting that traffic in this particular location has increased enormously with the construction of Lisfennell Close and numerous other private

"People are continuously trav-

elling narrow roads at more houses are expecthigh speed", said Cllr. Fahey who pointed out that there are many exits, entrances and cul-desacs around the area. making it extremely dangerous for drivers.

He requested that the County Engineer John O'Flynn examine the situation and that a report be submitted by the engineering staff at the October meeting of the Council.

Mr. O'Flynn agreed that the roads at Springmount/Lisfennell are too narrow and said that

ed to be built in the area. With such a large number of houses, Mr. O'Flynn said it would be a ridiculous situation not to have adequate roads to deal with additional traffic. It would be a flaw in planning if a local authority was to allow a huge number of houses in an area.

Likewise, Co. Manag-er Donal Connolly said that if planning permission is granted to a project, adequate roads are required for proper ac-

Kyne Calls For Local Authority Houses In Villierstown County comed as a great support Waterford



At last week's meeting of Dungarvan UDC, Cllr. Nuala Ryan highlighted the problem of broken beer bottles on Abbeyside beach. Cllr. Ryan said she had walked the beach prior to the Monday night meeting and had found broken glass from beer bottles at the base of the wall down by the new road.

COUNCIL TO PART-FUND **CHRISTMAS LIGHTS**

Members of the Urban District Council have unanimously agreed to award a grant of £5,000 this year to Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce towards the cost of Christmas lighting in the

The existing lights, first used in 1992, were financed by contributions from local businesses and supplemented with a term loan. Since then the festive lighting with an annual maintenance cost of around £9,000 has continued to be funded by local businesses.

These contributions however have not been sufficient to meet the ongoing costs of the lights and the Chamber has accumulated a loss of almost £11,000 over the five year period.

In a recent letter to the Council requesting financial assistance, the Chamber said that the Christmas lighting provides an atmosphere and serves as an attraction to all individuals in the Dungarvan and surrounding areas.

Recommending that the Council make a contribution of £5,000 to the Chamber was County Manager Donal Connolly who said that the Christmas lights are a major asset to the town from a commercial point of view.

Members agreed that the £5,000 grant can be offset by a comparable rise in the commercial rate - approximately .20p.

DANGEROUS JETTY ON QUAY

The jetty at the Dungarvan quay has been described by the UDC Chairman as an accident waiting to happen.

Speaking at last week's Council meeting, Cllr. Austin Flynn said the jetty is now at a stage where it is about to fall down. The high tides and heavy rain of the summer have weakened the structure, moving the stones

Cllr. Flynn warned that the to make it safe and in the interim, he urged that barriers should be erected preventing the public from walking onto it.

£2,000 TOURISM CONTRIBUTION

Dungarvan UDC have made a contribution of £2,000 to Dungarvan Tourism Ltd. for 1997 which was already provided for in the estimate of expenses for the current year.

MS CYCLISTS CONGRATULATED

The 32 cyclists who took part in the recent 130 mile sponsored cycle in aid of Dungarvan Multiple Sclerosis were congratulated last week by UDC Chairman Cllr. Austin Flynn.

Cllr. Flynn said the cyclists, including the Council's Acting Town Clerk Joe O'Flaherty, had gone to a lot of trouble in preparation for the grueling course.

They are all to be congratulated on their achievement", he declared.

TRAFFIC **MANAGEMENT** MEETING

A special meeting of Dungarvan UDC dealing specifically with traffic management proposals for the town will be held on October 6th at which members of the Gardai and the County Engineer will be present.

The various proposals to ease the congested traffic situation in the town centre include the introduction of one way system at Western Terrace, provision of single yellow lines at Church Street and New Chapel Street, on and off-loading bays for lorries at O'Connell Street and the introduction of a residents parking permit, etc.

Draft car park bye-laws for Davitt's Quay and Scanlon's Yard car park will also be considered by members at this meeting.

The Council is currently awaiting observations from the Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce who are at present carrying out a detailed survey of local business reaction to the traffic management proposals.

"It's gone out of all propor-tion", he stressed. "We'll be prosecuted for breaking the skyline soon enough".

County Manager Donal Connolly said the Council intends to phase out the dump and replace it with a new central landfill catering for both the county and city waste.

A 150 to 200 acre site has yet to be identified for this purpose. This total acreage includes the area required for offices, recycling facilities, treatment plant and a gener-ous buffer zone to adjoining properties. The actual site of the landfill may be in the region of 50 acres over the 20 to 25 year life span of the site.

REPORTS DUE ON HARBOUR

Responding to a query raised by Cllr. Damien Dillon at last week's meeting, Town Engineer O'Dwyer said a report on the silt study in the harbour and the condition of the quay walls is due sometime this

VIRTUALLY RADON FREE

A recent survey carried out by the Radiological Protec-tion Institute of Ireland has found that levels of radon gas in Dungarvan is less than 1%, the lowest category

measured in the country.
That's according to Town
Engineer Ray O'Dwyer who read out the report at last week's Council meeting.

Concerns about the levels of radon in the area were previously raised by Cllr. Lar Hart who was skeptical of the Institute's findings. Having researched the subject, Cllr. Hart said it is almost impossible to measure radon in an area as each individual house has to be tested.

For people worried about the level of radon gas in their home, Cllr. Hart said it costs £15 to get a house tested for radon and the problem can be remedied. He added that he has application forms for a radon test if anyone is in-

ABBEYSIDE HERMITAGE- A GREEN OASIS?

The ongoing saga of the derelict green area known as the 'Hermitage' in Abbeyside was raised once again by Cllr. Nuala Ryan at last week's meeting. Cllr. Ryan enquired whether the owner of the site has been served with a notice under the Derelict Sites Act or the Dangerous Buildings Act.

County Manager Donal Connolly said that such an action had not been taken by the local authority 'at the moment'

Cathedral had fallen into disuse through lack of anyone to ring them, when a chance meeting led to a sudden and dramatic revival. Millie Balding (nee Sutton) now in her 80's, is the daughter of the verger who used to ring the bells before the war. She lives now in England but while on holiday in Lismore three years ago, she attended the Harvest Festival Service. Her lively account of her father's bell ringing inspired Jason Turk from Knockanore, then nine years, to try his hand-literally! He was barley old enough to reach the ropes but he found that he really loved ringing! He was soon joined by his elder brother Robin, and Martin McNamara from Lismore, who was inspired to join in when he heard the bells ringing. They were all greatly encouraged by the response of the townspeople who were amazed, delighted and in the case of some of the older people - deeply moved to hear the bells ring out once again.

The three boys, Jason now just twelve, Robin and Martin both fifteen, have been ringing ever since. They are all talented musicians, Martin has his own rock band, Robin plays classic guitar and sings with Cor Colaiste an Chraiobhín, Jason is county champion at the Fleadh, on tin whistle, piano and mouth organ. They play the bells as they have probably never been played before — jigs, reels, ballads, Bach minuets, Beethoven sonatas, jazz and spirituals as well as modern hymns like Lord of the Dance — the fast ones especially requiring considerable physical agility as there is no keyboard and every bell must be pulled by hand.

The bells are 100 years old

The bells of Lismore 5 a Centenary Bell Festival will be held to raise money for urgently needed repairs to the belfry and overhaul the the bells. This event is the first of its kind in this area and promises to be a great occasion. The young people will be playing a very big party in this festival. In addition to recitals on the bells by the three young bell ringers, two harpists, Marie-Claire O'Sullivan, aged fif-teen years an RIAM silver medalist, and Una Whyte, aged twelve years, both from Youghal, will be playing in the Cathedral. On Saturday evening the prize winning young people's choir Cor Colaiste an Chraoibhín offer an exciting programme of sacred music in lively, evocative modern settings, with flute and guitar accompaniment. The popular local choir, Blackwater Singers, will also be singing. On Sat-urday afternoon, Dr. Jan Van Putten, Cathedral organist, will be giving a recital. There will be historical displays of "Lismore in the Famine" and "Celtic Saints" in the Cathedral and floral displays on both days.

There are craft demonstrations in the Parish Hall wood turning, jewellery and weaving — and as a big at-traction for the young at heart, Robin and Jason will be presenting their model railway layout, a working scale model of a pre-war station and landscape, which they have been building themselves over two years. The teenagers Evelyn and Tara Coady and their friends are offering their highly skilled services as face painters - their novel approach to this art proved very successful at the recent Lismore Community Festival. They have a special link with the Cathedral as Harry Sutthis year, and on October 4- ton, the pre-war bell ringer,

DUNGARVAN CHAMBER OF COMMERCE **NEWS**

TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT PLAN

We in the Chamber have long been aware of the large exodus of people to other towns and cities on a regular basis to purchase their weekly/seasonal shopping, a fact which was confirmed to us most strongly by the results of a Shoppers Survey we conducted in late 1996 early 1997. From this survey we established that one of the main reasons for this was the inadequate Parking/Traffic facilities available in and around the town centre. It should be stated that this was by no means the only reason cited, however, it represented an area within which the means for correction were readily accessible to both the Chamber and the U.D.C.

Recently the U.D.C. have put forward a number of proposals for the implementation of new bye-laws, in an effort to ease the overall traffic congestion experienced on an almost daily basis in and around the town centre. The Chamber fully appreciate the good intentions of the Council, but on viewing the proposals it became immediately apparent that some of these were not perceived to be in the best interests of the business people of the town. We immediately undertook a survey of the commercial interests involved, the results of which confirmed our worst fears, i.e. many of these proposals were not considered to be "Pro

As might be expected from such a survey, a number of suggestions were put forward as to the long-term solution to Dungarvan's Traffic problem, ranging from the widely held belief that a major requirement was the provision of multi-storey car park which would alleviate a considerable amount of the pressure on the existing car parks to one-way systems/pedestrianisation of certain major thoroughfares. Based on an analysis of these results, a detailed submission was presented to the Town Clerk (Ray Moloney) for discussion by the U.D.C. members at their next meeting on October 6. We trust that the Councillors will give due consideration to the opinions of the business community when arriving at their final decisions. It must, of course, be emphasised that any bye-laws introduced at this stage can be viewed as being only a temporary solution. The fact being that given the current level of development (both currently underway and those in the pipeline), the commercial centre of the town is being relocated in a north-eastwardly direction, encompassing the Quay and the Lookout. This relocation will play a major role in future traffic flows and as such the entire traffic situation will need to be totally reviewed in light of these developments. It is envisaged that at this stage a fully comprehensive "Traffic Management Plan" will be introduced which will incorporate many of the suggestions mentioned above. Copies of the Chamber proposals are available to all businesses through our offices in Church Street.

Finally we would like to point out that we are at this present point in time very actively pursuing the AWG amalgamation in relation to its impact on the town of Dungarvan. A development committee is currently compiling statistical information and will shortly publish a document detailing their findings and setting out the outline for the future development of the commercial and industrial sectors of the town. Knockanore Man Assaulted By Robbers

Gardaí are following a definite line of enquiry following a break-in at an elderly man's home in Knockanore.

84 year old Patrick Kelly who lives on his own just a stone's throw from the peaceful village of Knockanore was left badly shaken after the incident.

Two teenagers broke into his home at around 7.30 p.m. on Sunday evening, September 7th, demanding that he hand over money. Mr. Kelly acceded and gave them £60 which is all he had in the house at the time. The robbers immediately left and Mr. Kelly alerted a relative in Co. Cork who in turn alerted the Gardaí.

Minutes after they left the two teenagers returned to

Kelly up demanding further money. The alarm was raised shortly after 8 p.m. but the criminals had departed the scene on foot before the Gardaí arrived.

The incident has shocked the rural residents of Knockanore who have expressed anger and revulsion over the cowardly behaviour of the robbers. Many people in the area may have noticed any suspicious activities or may have seen the two teenagers prior to and after the event. 

bers agreed to publish a public notice in the local papers informing people of their intention to rezone the area at Ringnasillogue to allow for the construction of the college.

The area in question is zoned in the Dungarvan Development Plan for recreation and amenity. Therefore in order for Council officials to ever consider granting planning permission for the college, a change in land zoning is the first priority.

These public notices were published last week and the Council is waiting on any submissions or observations from members of the public up to the start of October.

The matter will then be voted on by U.D.C. members at their October meeting. Should members agree

to grant planning permission to the project, potential objectors would then have a month to lodge any objection with An Bord Pleanala.

Meanwhile Acting Chief Executive Officer at the Co. Waterford V.E.C., Kieran Heffernan is currently in the process of arranging meetings between V.E.C. representatives and the Childers Estate residents with a view to ironing out any difficulties which may arise.

Spokesperson for the concerned Childers Estate group Jerry Collins, said the proposed £1m plus college would bring problems to the area such as increased transport services, noise and vandalism. He claimed the college would greatly interfere with the progress being made in the estate between the residents and the Coun-

cil under the estate management programme.

Meanwhile the existing V.E.C. college at Wolfe Tone Road which will eventually be replaced by the new facility continues to deteriorate. Condemned by the fire authorities, conditions at the school have depreciated so much that only last July some members of the V.E.C. were even contemplating the closure of the school for the safety of students and teaching staff.

A total refurbishment of the 60 year old building would cost in the region of £117,000 which an electrical overhaul of the building has been estimated at well over £24,800.

The Department of Education are very reluctant to sanction large amounts of money on the Dungarvan College in view of the fact that the replacement school is now at the planning stage. The committee is still awaiting approval from the Department to proceed with limited repairs on the windows and electrical work.





A Brief Guide To "Garden Talk"



Are you ever stuck for words? If you are new to gardening you will have noticed gardeners have their own words and

To take the mystery out of "garden talk," here are some of

Acid and Alkaline - An acid soil is one that is deficient in lime, and an alkaline soil one that has enough lime. Most vegetables do well in a soil that is slightly alkaline.

Aphids — A general term for greenfly, blackfly and the grey cabbage aphid.

Blanching — The practice of excluding light from the stems and/or leaves of a vegetable to improve the flavour.

Blind - A 'blind' plant is one without a growing point, sometimes the case among the brassicas.

Bolting — Vegetables go to seed before their time are said to 'bolt.' This sometimes happens with lettuce, particularly after transplanting in a dry period and also affects beetroot and carrots.

Brassicas - The term for greens and Brussels sprouts. Swedes, turnips, kohl rabi and radishes are also members of the brassica family.

Catch Crop - A crop grown quickly between the rows of a slower crop.

Compost - Manure made by the rotting of waste vegetable matter. The word is also used to describe a particular medium for seed sowing or potting.

Cordon - A method of training fruit, especially apples and pears, that keeps plants to a single stem.

Dibber - A steel pointed stick, about 30cm. long used for making holes for plants. Drill - A narrow furrow, made with the corner of a hoe, into

which seeds are sown at intervals. F1 Hybrid - A first cross of two plants that have been in-

bred to "fix" certain desirable characteristics. In vegetables, F1 hybrids are usually of better colour and shape than nonhybrids, and are also more uniform in size.

Foliar Feed - Feeding a plant through the leaves by spraying or watering with a proprietary solution.

Green Manuring — Growing a crop such as rape or mustard to dig into the soil to improve the humus content.

Humus — The dark, residual material of decayed vegetable matter or animal manures.

Liquid Manure - This can be made by putting some manure in a hessian bag and suspending it in a tub of water. Leave it for several days, stirring it well, you should dilute it until it is the colour of weak tea.

Loam — Ideal garden soil - neither too clayey or too sandy.


Mulch - A layer of compost, lawn mowings, peat, sawdust, well-rotted manure or black polythene put between rows of vegetables.

Set - A small, immature bulb - an onion, for example planted to grow on.

Spit - A spade's depth of soil. To dig 'one spit deep' is to turn the soil over to the depth of the spade.

Stopping - Halting the growth of a plant by pinching out the growing point. This is done with tomatoes when the plants have set as many trusses of fruit as are likely to

Soil worked down to receive a crop. 'A fine tilth' is soil that has been raked down fine and even.

RESEEDING

Weed Control

- Timing of reseed. At this stage the sooner the better. Later reseeds will have lower tiler counts next
- Weed seeds will germinate in tandem with grass seeds in new leys. Monitor all reseeds.
- Seedling docks, chickweed are the main problem
- Where clover is present use either Legumex Extra at 5 pint/acre, Acumen at 3.5 pts./acre or Nintex at 5/0 pts./acre.
- Where clover is not important use either Duplosan or Astix at 1.0 - 1.5 pts./acre or other CMPP brands at 3.0 pts./acre. Use 25 - 22 gals. of water per acre.
- Generally spraying occurs 6 weeks approx. post seeding. However new leys are very advanced this year so again monitor the reseeds.
- Check for fritfly particularly where reseeding was done with minimal cultivation. The fritfly will eat the central shoots of the new seedling. Control using either Dursban, Gammacol, Clinch, Grubber, Decies.

CATTLE

Castrating Weanlings

To castrate or not that is the question. Teagasc studies indicate that there is no long term weight gain advantage in delaying castration.

Selling Weanlings

Most male weanlings are sold entire and the vast majority of weanlings are castrated after purchase.

The demand for weanlings for bull beef is limited. Over 25 - 30,000 young bulls are finished each year. The live export trade for weanling bulls looks very uncertain. Exporters prefer top quality heifers. Many farms purchasing male weanlings would prefer to purchase castrated animal.

- 'If not castrating, separate strong male and female weanlings. Fast growing heifers can go in calf at 7 - 8 months or earlier in extreme cases.
- * If castrating, do it at least 4 weeks before weaning to

TILLAGE: Crop Damage Assessment 1997

Teagasc has been requested by the Department of Agriculture and Food to assess the losses on farms where cereal crops have become unharvestable as a result of the recent bad weather. Tillage farmers who have incurred serious losses of this nature should contact Teagasc, Dungarvan (058) 41211 with a view to inspecting the affected crop.

In accordance with Department of Agriculture and Food guidelines, Teagasc will only assess damage on farms where

- Cereals are the main source of income on the farm.
- * A significant proportion of the crop is unharvestable. Farmers must make a copy of their Area Aid applicator available during the inspection.

REPS: Preparing For Winter

You can't take risks around the farmyard in winter. Compliance checks on farms are still running at a high level and point source pollution from the farmyard will be a major focus for inspectors. To ensure you have no problem, check the following -

- Inspect concrete floors and ensure all joints are sealed. Make sure channels are not blocked and seepage tanks are empty.
- The deadline for spreading slurry produced last winter is the end of September under the REPS specifications introduced in May 1996. People who joined prior to the date and who have not had their plan revised have until the end of October. However you are in doubt, check with your planner. Slurry should be applied to the conversation ground.
- Get out farmyard manure now. It can be spread up until the end of October. It can be stored in a compact heap 2m high and this may continue during the winter but having sheds cleaned early means ground won't be cut up in the emptying process.
- Don't spread slurry on waterlogged soil or when rain is expected within the following 48 hours. This is vital. Make sure you leave the appropriate buffer strips between watercourses, wells and rivers when spreading.

IMPORTANT NOTICE **BOVINE BRUCELLOSIS ERADICATION SCHEME NEW BRUCELLOSIS COMPENSATION** ARRANGEMENTS FROM **15 SEPTEMBER 1997**

New compensation arrangements will apply to breakdowns occurring on or after 15 September, 1997. To encourage farmers to take appropriate measures to protect their herds, higher compensation rates will apply only in the case of eligible animals (i.e. female cattle and bulls aged 12 months or more) which have been pre-movement blood tested ('60 day tested') prior to purchase and then post movement blood tested within 30 days of purchase.

Eligible animals must be acquired from 'reliable sources' as defined by the Department. 'Reliable Sources' include purchases of eligible animals through special catalogued mart and dispersal sales or direct from farm to farm. In the case of special mart sales, all eligible animals at the sale must have been 60 day premovement tested, moved directly to the mart from the farms on which they were blood tested and moved directly from the mart to the buyer's farm.

In the case of dispersal/farm to farm sales, eligible animals must be moved in a single direct movement and must meet pre and post movement blood test requirements. Form ER109 must be completed by buyer and seller in a farm to farm sale at the time of sale and be received in the buyer's local District Veterinary Office prior to an outbreak of disease. Receipt of form ER109 will be acknowledged by the District Veterinary Office.

Each herdowner considering buying-in eligible animals on or after 15 September, 1997 should ensure full familiarisation with the new compensation arrangements, particularly in regard to the 'reliable sources' criteria, before buying in. The District Veterinary Office can be contacted in the event of any



A. You certainly sound miserable. From your description it would seem that you have an attack of vaginal thrush. This is a very common problem and one that your doctor sees practically every day. Thrush is a nuisance but is unlikely to develop into anything serious. Thrush is caused by too much of a tiny yeast-like fungus called Candida albicans. This fungus lives inside our bodies and is kept in check by other bacteria which prevent the fungus from taking over. However, taking over. However, sometimes certain events occur which upsets this natural balance and allows

the fungus to grow out of control. When this happens

control. When this happens you get thrush.
When you get an attack of thrush the vulva (underneath) becomes intensely itchy and sore. When you pass water it will sting because the salty uring the sore tissues and stings the sore tissues and you will have a vaginal discharge, usually white and thick and often looking like cottage cheese. While the antibiotics you took killed the bacteria that caused your flu, they also killed the bacteria that keep the fungus from growing out of control. diabetic are also prone to thrush because of the high levels of sugar in their blood and on their vulval tissues. Candida albican feeds on sugar, so it will grow rapidly and cause thrush. If your general health isn't too good your body's defences will not be able to fight off minor infections such as thrush. If you are taking the pill or preg-nant, the levels of oestrogen are higher than they normally would be: this hormone increases the sugar levels in the body and therefore increases the likelihood of an attack of thrush. If you damage the delicate skin that is underneath, your chances of getting thrush are increased.

Visit your doctor: the medication you need to cure thrush is only available on prescription. The medica-tion usually comes in the forms of creams or pesseries (special tablets) that you insert into the vagina. There are also tablets that you take orally. Have a chat with your doctor and decide what is the best treatment

for you. Thrush thrives in moist conditions, so to prevent thrush recurring wear cotton underwear and stockings rather than tights. Don't wear tight jeans and try to keep a low sugar diet. After a bowel movement, wipe from front to back to avoid bringing the fungus from the bowel to the vagina. Don't take antibiotics unless really necessary and don't use perfumed bubble baths and soaps. Use cool water for gentle rinsing. Hot water is too harsh for the delicate skin of the vulva.

Q. I am worried about my little girl. She is seven years old and her teachers have been complaining that she is daydreaming a lot in class and that she is falling behind. I brought her to my doctor and he thinks she may have what he called Petit Mal epilepsy. He has referred her to a specialist. I am frightened that she will not grow up to be a normal adult and that she will have difficulties about her driving licence etc. What is Petit Mal epilepsy and will she have it for ever?

A. Petit Mal is the old name for Simple Absence Seizures, which describes the condition very well. It is a form of epilepsy, but one that has a very good outlook. It is usually seen in girls between 6 and 12 years of age. The seizures are usually brief, lasting less than 15 seconds, and are often missed by teacher and parents alike and so can be going on for a long time before someone notices that there is some-thing wrong. This can lead to learning difficulties and to problems with the child's friends because they may say that she is a dreamer and may exclude her from games etc. Some children can have up to 100 seizures a day, and it may be thought that they have a behaviour disturbance or are lazy. In about a quarter of cases there is a history of someone else in the family having these seizures as well. While having an absence seizure the child is completely inattentive and cannot be roused out of this state. If you talk to the child herself she will often tell you that she is aware of getting lost in conversa-

The specialist will do a test called an E.E.G. (this stands for electroencephalogram) to get a reading of the electrical pattern of the brain. With Simple Absence Seizures there is a very characteristic pattern produced by the brain. The seizures are well controlled taking medication. tment should be Treatment should be continued until the child is seizure free for at least 2 years, when the E.E.G. will be repeated and if it is normal then medication will be withdrawn slowly. There is a small risk of relapse but the outlook is very good in that the seizures will not recur and that she will grow up to lead a normal life.

Preparation: 20 mins Cooking: 20 mins Serves 9 300g/11 oz chilled bought croissant dough 175g/6 oz canned stewed

Quarter, core and thinly slice the apples and pears. Arrange the slices alternately and slightly overlapping on top of stewed apple. For the topping, rub the butter into the flour until it just starts to stick together. Stir in the hazelnuts, sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle the topping over the fruit and bake for 20 mins until crisp and golden. Cool slightly, then cut into 9 pieces.





Dungarvan Scientist Honoured by President Robinson at Trinity College

Dungarvan-born scientist, Professor Ernest Walton was paid a special tribute on Tuesday, September 9 when President Mary Robinson visited her alma mater, Trinity College, to unveil a 'Blue Plaque' in his honour. Professor Walton was the only Irish scientist ever to be awarded a Nobel Prize. 'Blue Plaques' are placed with the support of the Institute of Physics to identify buildings in Ireland and Britain associated with major scientists. The President of the Institute of Physics, Dr. Brian Manley, also attended the ceremony.

Professor Walton made a major contribution to physics

Professor Walton made a major contribution to physics in 1932 when he and Sir John Cockcroft 'split the atom' for the first time, an achievement that earned both scientists the Nobel Prize in Physics in 1951.

Originally from Dungarvan, Professor Walton studied in Trinity College, both as an undergraduate and postgraduate, before moving to the Cavendish Laboratory at Cambridge, where his revolutionary experiment worked. He returned to Trinity College in 1934 and settled there as head of physics and the Erasmus Smith's Professor until his retirement in 1974.

On his 90th birthday, September 1993, Professor Walton presented his Nobel Prize medal and Citation to Trinity College. Professor Walton died two years ago at the age of





G.A.A. NOTES

Board Meetin P. J. Ryan, Chairman the Development Committee when a debate on the 1998

presided at last week's meeting of the County Board. It was a tremendous session and while the Chairman handled the meeting in his customary efficient manner, his job was not easy by interruptions that tended to

disrupt progress. Arising out of the minutes. Earnonn Murphy questioned the officers about correspondence pertaining to financial matters in the early nineties. When the replies from the top table did not satisfy him, Eamonn Murphy continued to hold centre-stage on the issue while the Chairman insisted that he was going to proceed with the business of the meeting. At this stage former County Board Chairman, James Tobin admonished Mr. Murphy and accused him of trying to hold up the meeting. He also referred to phone calls that had been made to his family.

The County Secretary, Seamus Grant also became embroiled in an argument with Eamonn Murphy on the subject which was being queried. Jimmy O'Gorman also became involved. After about 25 mins, the Chairman was able to proceed with the business of the meeting.

CORRESPONDENCE

A letter from Kilmacthomas Club referred to their championship football match against Ring on July 4th 1997. Speaking in support, Michael Browne said their grievance was with the manner in which the match was handled by the referee. The reference was to a goal scored by Kilmac' and which was not allowed. He said his club were very disappointed. The Chairman said that the referee's report had made no reference to the goal incident which Kilmacthomas had referred to and therefore there would be no point in discussing the matter.

LADIES FOOTBALL APPEAL

An exceptionally successful season by the ladies football in the county who have played in 4 Munster Finals and are currently preparing for the All-Irelands has made a huge drain on their resources and asked the County Board to help out financially. Following a brief discussion it was agreed to donate £500 and the meeting felt that the Divisional Boards might follow suit.

DÉISE DRAW

There was a 'readout' of the club membership of the county draw and the Chairman said it was good to see that a number of our units had increased their numbers since the last draw.

He told the meeting that

were considering a suggestion that a full-time or parttime organiser be appointed to canvass additional support for the monthly draw. He said that no decision had been taken and if it is, the County Board will be asked to approve. It would not come into effect this year.

Declan O' Meara, Chair-man of the Development Committee gave an outline of how the draw was progressing and an increase of 400 since the first draw two months ago was encouraging. Giving the financial details of the draw so far, it said it is imperative that clubs go out and canvas more members as otherwise the period of repayment to the banks will have to be extended. Declan also appealed to clubs to push the sale of the Déise 500 club tickets. He pointed out that the holders of these tickets had free admission to all games in the county for five years and they also enjoyed other benefits including going into a special draw for 15 All-Ireland hurling and football tickets every year etc.

PROGRESS REPORT

All three secretaries gave a report of championship progress and in all cases it was reported that the competitions were moving on schedule. James Tobin complained the semi-final involving Lismore and Passage was fixed for Walsh Park which would mean over 100 miles round trip for people from the far west to see the game. John Lyons was also critical of the decision by the G.A.C. and said this never happened before. Jimmy O'Gorman said he was speaking as secretary of the Lismore Club and he was briefly stating that there was anger and resentment in Lismore over the fixture. Noel Fleming said it was not good economy. Brendan Tobin said that the decisions of G.A.C. were final and could not be changed. The Chairman explained the reasons behind the decision to play both semi-finals on the same programme in Walsh Park on Sunday, September 21st.

During this discussion P.R.O. Brendan Tobin referred to the intention to allow group teams into the championship in senior hurling for the 1998 season and outlined the problems that would result for clubs such as Sliabh gCua/St. Marys who might be expected to provide players for both. This would put a big strain on the clubs and he thought it might not be a good idea. The Chairman stated that the matter could be discussed

REPORTS

Jimmy O'Gorman, Munster Council gave details of the 1998 Championship fixtures and also the Munster Club Championship programme of games. Waterford will play Cork in hurling and football and he said it was a bit worrying that the new county hurling champions here in Waterford would have to play the Cork cham-pions on the Sunday after our County Final.

The Chairman said that our hurling final is fixed for Sunday, October 19th be-cause the ladies football All-Ireland is fixed for Croke Park on the previous Sunday. He said the Munster Council might take a look at our situation and arrange a different date.

Both Munster Council delegates spoke about the inclu-sion of Cork and Kerry in the McGrath Cup which was originally intended for the four weaker counties. The meeting expressed firm opposition to these two strong counties being allowed play and the board representatives were told to make this view known to the Council. Tommy Hennessey gave the meeting information about the building of new Munster Council offices (probably in the Limerick Gaelic Grounds). The cost will be fairly substantial. In discussing this several members felt that the location of the offices was unsatisfactory for a number of reasons. Tommy Hennessey also gave details of the procedures for the awarding of scholarships.

John O'Leary, County Youth Officer spoke about the need for co-ordination of the work and activities of the committees who are catering for underage affairs. He said there was an urgent need to have all these committees brought together for discussions with members of Cois-de Gnótha.

CENTRAL COUNCIL REPORT

This included information on Phase 2 of the redevelopment programme at Croke Park, American football and the proposed holding of a World Pioneer Rally in Croke Park in 1999, drug abuse and procedures for dealing with reported uses. A progress report on the work being undertaken by the special committee dealing with registration, membership etc. and the meeting was told that a report can be expected by November 1st the date of the Special Congress.

Also a report was made proposed experimental foot-ball rules, the new make-up of the National Football League and the proposals to bring about an adjustment of the concluding stages of the hurling league next year, the Powerscreen All Stars and the decision to allocate tickets for the 1998 All-Ireland semi-finals on the same basis as allocation of All-Ireland final tickets. There was quite an amount of criticism of the proposed football rules experiment but the Central Council member pointed out that these would have to be by the provincial councils before the experiments could be tried out and also if they are to be accept-ed, they will have to have Congress approval.

TO MANAGE UNDER-21 HURLERS

A recommendation that the present senior hurling team manager, Gerald McCarthy would also train the county under-21 hurling team was approved. It was stated that the manager had approved.

It is expected that the selectors will be put in place at the next meeting of the board. In his contract, Gerald McCarthy was given the authority to pick his own selectors.

THE GAELTACHT APPEAL

The boring saga of the Gaeltacht under-21 B football appeal was given yet one more airing at the board meeting. We are beginning to lose track of the number of times that this matter has been discussed since August last year after the Gaeltacht team were removed from the championship after they had given 17 hours notice that they could not field in the Divisional Final against St. Olivers. After an amount of heated discussion on the subject, a proposition was moved that the case be closed for once and for all by the County Board. This was carried on a vote of 18 to 12. Quite a number of delegates did not vote.

COMPLIMENTS

At the conclusion of the meeting, the Chairman complimented all the people who had helped with the organisation of the big programme at Fraher Field on the previous day. He said the visiting counties were highly impressed with the field and all the arrangements for the day. He particularly thanked Tony Morrissey, Greg Fives, Bridget Clancy, Tom Drum-my, Stephen Power and others who had helped during the days leading up to the

The recent ban on the Clare supremo and his confinement to the dugout for the final, became a big talking point around Munster and elsewhere over the last two weeks. Ger has now become a legend in the Banner county and will be hailed as the man who brought glory and fame to the county.

I thought he enhanced his profile last week when asked about the 'ban' and he told the media: "it is going to be harder for me than it is for anybody else. 
"Lismore never looked so well as in recent weeks, there are more tourists in the town - the future is looking good", he declared.


