# STRONG OBJECTIONS TO PROPOSED COLLEGE SITE

Members of the Childers Estate Residents and Management Committee who have voiced serious reservations about the location of the proposed new college at Ringnasillogue have responded this week to recent reports that they were al-legedly 'set up' by people with a different agenda.

These allegations, as reported in last week's edition of the "Dungarvan Leader", shocked residents of the local authority estate who felt they were being portrayed as people who could be used as puppets "with no appreciation of the fundamental needs of their chil-

dren and community".

Co. Waterford V.E.C. member Jimmy Byrne had stated at a recent V.E.C. meeting that he had a suspicion that somebody was behind the objecting residents group. He was supported in his claim by fellow V.E.C. member Lar Hart who said he personally knew of someone who was pushing the Childers Estate residents to object to the

# Lismore Is Third Tidiest Town In

The beautiful heritage town of Lismore came third overall in the county, scoring an impressive 222 points out of 300 in this year's Tidy Towns Competition. Ardmore came second on 230 while Stradbally was again adjudged to be the tidiest town in the county scoring 234 (78%).

The following is the adjudicators report for Lismore which was visited by the Tidy Towns judges on July 10th. Last year's results are in brackets.

# OVERALL DEVELOPMENTAL APPROACH 32 (30) MAX. 50

# ROADS, STREETS AND BACK AREAS 29 (28) MAX. 40

Traffic flow, as a result of parking, would seem to be a problem at Main Street and Ferry Lane where the road is very narrow. Certain simple parking controls could easily solve these problems. It is noted that yellows line markings on Ferry Lane corner are proposed. All these roads, street and back areas are extremely pleasant and many unoccupied or derelict houses are being reconstructed, while successfully retaining the character of the town.

#### **GENERAL IMPRESSION** 7 (6) MAX. 10



All the houses and buildings are of excellent design and the mixture of styles and sizes has a wonderful cohesion about them. # KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

#### QUESTION

I am married with 3 children (18, 19, 20) in full-time education. I am in receipt of Long-Term Unemployment Assistance (£147.10). I have been offered a place on a CE Scheme, how will this affect my in-

#### **ANSWER**

On the CE Scheme you will get £164.45, less £3.80 PRSI, leaving you better off by £13.55. You will retain all the secondary benefits you were receiving immediately before going onto the Community Employment Scheme. If you get work outside your CE worktime, then you may be taxed on your income from CE and your other work.

As you are required to pay PRSI (A9) you may come back into benefit after 13 weeks. If you are on the scheme for 12 months and then go back to sign on, and qualify for full Unemployment Benefit as your children are over 18, you will not get any Child Benefit payment (it is only paid up to 18 on Unemployment Benefit) so you would lose £39.60 and would in those circumstances not get a Christmas bonus.

You should be aware that if your wife goes on a fulltime FAS training course, you will lose the Adult Dependent payment £40 and half the Child Dependent payment £19.80 (total £59.80). She would get £67.50 but no extra payment for the children as she is not on the Live Register.



# How The G Force Helps Us To Keep Our

The pull that gravity has on our bodies is

known as the G Force.

As we go about our daily lives on Earth the normal force we experience has a strength of 1. But there are times when we feel much stronger forces. This is known as Extra G.





# Stradbally First In County For **Tidiness**

## OVERALL DEVELOPMENTAL **APPROACH** 30 (29) MAX. 50

The committee is thanked for their completed application form and for their proposed work plan for the next 3-5 years. Stradbally, which has so successfully, over the past number of years, undertaken so many projects, now, in addition to their ongoing tasks within their own village, plans to extend their horizons and include an area approximately one mile from the village. The committee is to be much applauded for their wider interest and their concern for the common good. This is a very worthwhile undertaking and the committee and community are to be congratulated on previous achievements and are wished every success with their new under-

# THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT 32 (31) MAX. 40

The ambience of Stradbal-

Stradbally which always dens. The very successful colour schemes used on their houses is delightful. The ball alley is quite a dominant feature but has been extremely well handled by the use of ivy and creeper on the high walls and some screening to the open side. Some stone walling within the village is not of the standard design of local walls. The stone cap-ping of vertical stones at 150-200mm centres is quite discordant. The removal of the overhead wires and the installation of very nice street lighting has added tremendously to the visual impression of the village.

#### LANDSCAPING 33 (33) MAX. 40

On the whole this is very satisfactory but it is suggested that more emphasis be put on ground planting, thereby encouraging gardens for all seasons. Additionally if more trees are to be planted these should be larger types of trees that reflect those in the surrounding countryside. One of the problems in Ireland is that people are not inclined to plant indigenous trees in their towns and gardens, even when there is plenty of room to do so. Varlegated poplars should be avoided as they look very alien in the Irish scene.

ing of suitable berried shrubs is excellent. Perhaps the addition of those shrubs and flowers which attract butterflies could also be considered. With such a pollution free atmosphere many butterflies should be attracted.

#### LITTER CONTROL 34 (34) MAX. 40

Litter control is excellent within the town but in outlying areas. some litter was noted. This is a very real problem as in all probability the offenders are visitors.

#### **TIDINESS** 16 (15) MAX. 20

The general impression is one of tidiness and this holds for the approach roads and the surrounding areas despite the difficulties encountered at the neighbouring coves.

#### **RESIDENTIAL AREAS** 22 (21) MAX. 30

The residential areas are all charming, delightful and well kept, with a wonderful sense of colour both in painting and in the landscaping.



# Clampdown On **Beach And Strand Activities**

Waterford County Council burying animals on the motor bikes, vans, trailers, has made a number of byelaws concerning public health and safety on various throughout the county.

Under these bye-laws, which came into operation on June 1st last, it is now prohibited to light fires on the beach, throw stones, ride a bike, play football, hurling, tennis, golf, volleyball or any other game, or use a radio, mobile players, etc., in a manner as to cause a nuisance to other beach

beach, using a jet-ski or fast power-boat within 200 metres of the water's edge, except for the purpose of rescue, and spreading any nets, baits, boxes, fishing gear or shells on the beach.

The bye-laws also prevent people from parking a cara-van, etc., overnight on a road or car-park at the beach or to lead, wash, or ride any horse, pony, ass, mule or any similar animals onto the beach.

Dogs are not allowed to Other prohibited acts are roam unattended, while cars,

trucks, wagons or lorries are not allowed to be driven on, or left on the beach.

Anyone who contravenes a provision of these bye-laws will be liable on summary conviction to a fine not of less than £1,000.

Beaches and strands to which these bye-laws apply include Clonea, Ballydwane (Stradbally), Helvick, Stradbally Cove, Baile na nGall, Monatrae, Whiting Bay, Ballinacoury, Ballyvooney (Stradbally), Goat Island and Caliso

summoned before the courts for more serious speeding offences.

The nationwide launch of the new scheme, has made the courts very aware of clamping down on serious motoring offences such as speeding, careless, dangerous and drunken driving.

Speaking to the 'Dungar-van Leader' last Thursday, Supt. Reid said that since the launch of the scheme in this garda division, 339 people have been stopped for driving without seat belts which also constitutes a £50 fine. Up to now, Gardai have been lenient with respect to the wearing of seatbelts, but all occupants of a car must now comply fully with the law.

In the same period, there have been 43 arrests in respect of suspected drunk driving and 20 people have been charged with danger-ous driving offences. Gardai have issued cautions to 1,145 drivers, although it is anticipated that action rather than caution will be the norm in the future.

The scheme has certainly created a more visible Garda presence throughout the division with a marked increase in checkpoints, speed traps and more inspections of licensed

The covert Gatso van is also in operation throughout both counties. Located off the road, undetected by motorists, the van's hi-tech equipment records car registration numbers of offending drivers.

On average, 430 people die each year on Irish roads with 20 fatal accidents in the Waterford/Kilkenny di-

vision last year.
As a result of Operation Lifesaver, Supt. Reid said he expects to see a reduction in the number of fatalities on roads.

He pointed to the Louth-Meath Garda Division where the scheme has been very successful in making people more aware of speed and the dangers of drinking and driving. The operation will continue to be reviewed on an ongoing basis.

# Residents Shocked **V.E.C. Allegation**

**VESTED INTEREST?** 

The planning application for the construction of a single storey £1m plus vocational college is currently being considered by the Urban Council. The college is earmarked for a greenfield site adjacent to Childers Estate and Dungarvan Sports Centre. Members of the Council are expected to vote on the issue at their October meeting. The proposed location for the college which is owned by the Co. Waterford V.E.C. is zoned for recreational and amenity use in the Dungarvan Development Plan. At the October meeting of the U.D.C, members will therefore be voting whether or not to rezone the seafront site to allow the construction of the college to proceed.

objectors would then have one month in which to lodge their submissions with An Bord Pleanála who would have the final say in the matter.

While the Childers Estate residents appreciate that the final decision is not for the U.D.C., they are nonetheless seriously concerned about the partial overlap between the members of the V.E.C. and the U.D.C., many of whom occupy seats on both committees.

The residents have asked if these people will have an influence on the outcome of something which, they claim, they have a 'vested interest' in.

Concerned residents of the estate have also requested the Council to commission an environmental impact report from an inde-pendent agency. They are

"It is the proposed loss of this vital amenity that we vehemently object to," they stated.

The residents and man-

agement committee have already made huge strides in improving Childers Estate and view the green area of Ringnasillogue as vital to their progress. "It is a safe place for our children to play, for people to walk and the pursuance of many other activities. Our primary fear is that without this area, our children will be forced to resort to the busy streets for a playing area," highlighted the press re-

lease.
"It is the location of the proposed site that we are objecting to and not the proposed construction of a school. We merely wish to preserve the status quo of our community's amenities. We fully support the building of a new school for the area but not on a site that has been zoned for recreation and, in particular, not one that is crucial to the basic needs of our estate."

# ABBEYSIDE HERMITAGE - AN OASIS

The issue of the Hermitage was raised at the September meeting of the local authority by Abbeyside councillor Nuala Ryan who described it as her 'pet hate'. She proposed that the long-standing eyesore that is the former hermitage in Abbeyside should be transformed into an "oasis" of tranquility. Cllr. Ryan enquired whether the owner of the site has been served with a notice under the Derelict Sites Act or the Dangerous Buildings Act.

County Manager Donal Connolly said that such an action had not been taken by the local authority "at the moment".

Dungarvan U.D.C. member, Billy Kyne said that the state of the property was 'beyond the bounds of acceptability' recommending that it be taken over by the Urban Council and developed as an amenity area. The whole area of Abbeyside, he said, is being built on at an extremely fast rate and he added that it would be good long term value for money if the U.D.C. were to acquire the site as a green "oasis" area.

"Ît's a project we should consider," urged Cllr. Kyne who felt that such a green area would act as a buffer zone for the nearby Abbeyside school, the church and the surrounding housing estates.

County Manager, Donal Connolly said that the U.D.C. should endeavour once more to acquire the Hermitage site, it having been previously 'put off' by the owner's asking price. There also remained the option of pursuing the matter under the Derelict Sites Act.

Independent member Michael O'Riordan commented that the Hermitage "disgrace" had been discussed repeatedly since the early eighties without any progress whatsoever.



#### CATTLE

Managing Autumn Grass For Drystock

At a Discussion Group Event at Kildalton College last week, one of the stands discussed managing Autumn Grass for Drystock.

Nitrogen

It is now getting too late for nitrogen application. Grass production will therefore depend on climatic conditions.

Intake And Utilisation

It is important to continue to graze rotationally. Longer rotation length of up to 40 days is not a problem at this time of year. Post grazing height should be around 6 cm.

• Minimise Ground Damage

Grazing autumn grass can be problematic during wet spells. Be prepared to move stock to next paddock as grass becomes soiled even if it means leaving a lot of grass. House heavy stock first, weanlings and sheep do comparatively little damage. Plan grazing so that areas prone to wetness are grazed as opportunities arise

Grazing Priorities

Weanlings and breeding ewes (before and during mating) should get priority access to good quality grass. Suckler cows in good condition have a lower priority. If grass is scarce, heavier cattle should be housed for feeding.

Concentrates At Grass

Animals close to finish benefit greatly from meal feeding (3 kg.) on autumn grass particularly where grass quality is poor or the dry matter is low. Weanlings and store lambs are other categories of stock which can justify meal feeding. Supplementation of store cattle pre-housing or pre-sale is less likely to produce an economic return.

Ensuring Early Spring Grass

Areas most likely to produce utilisable early spring grass should be closed first starting in mid October. This will normally be first cut silage ground. Carrying heavy covers of grass overwinter is detrimental to sward quality in the following year and is not recommended. Graze all pastures to 6 cms, if possible plan to have early grass (i.e. close early) in convenient sheltered paddocks to facilitate early March turnout.

#### DAIRY

**Autumn Grass For Dairy Cows** 

At another stand in Kildalton budgeting Autumn grass for dairy cows was discussed.

Farm Grass Cover

This is a measure of the total amount of grass available on the farm. It is usually measured in kgs. of dry matter available per ha. (above 4 cms). Aim for an average cover of 1,100 to 1,200 kgs. DM/ha by early to mid September at 1.0 to 1.1 cows/acre. It should be possible to have adequate grass supply this year into October. Grass cover will decline from now on. The aim is reduce cover to 300 kgs. DM/ha by mid November.

#### Target Farm Grass Covers (Kgs. DM/Ha>4cms) September To November

**Target Cover** Month 1200 to 1000 September October 1000 to 500 500 to 300 November

Measuring covers is carried out with a grass cutter and quadrant or with a plate meter. Covers from paddocks at different growth stages are taken to obtain an accurate assessment of farm grass cover.

Cow Requirement

Dairy Cow requirements for grass is a function of cow body weight, current milk yield, stage of pregnancy and whether the cow is gaining or losing weight.

**Grass Allocation** 

Utilisation of grass in Autumn is often problematic because of a decline in ground conditions. Strategies to overcome poor ground conditions are being successfully implemented on many farms. These include -

**Back Fencing** 

Protected grazed areas within a paddock or field from further trampling after it has been grazed.

Roadways/Cow Walks

Getting cows to and from their grazing area is an essential part of any autumn system. Aim to minimise the grass area being walked across. Cow roadways can be supplemented with narrower cow tracks where large fields such as meadows are being strip grazed.

# Weekend In Memory Of Local Poet

From the 3rd to 5th October special events will take place in memory of the great poet of the Déise, Padraig Ó Mileadh. The local Comeraghs Comhaltas branch have an interesting programme organised, music and singing sessions, ceilithe, a commemorative lecture and a historical tour of Sliabh gCua and surrounding areas.

On Sunday, October 5th, Senator Labhrás Ó Murchú árd-stiurthóir Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann will lay a wreath at the plaque which was unveiled in honour of the poet in 1977. As well as being a poet, Pádraigh Ó Mileadh was of course a patriot who worked tirelessly promoting Gaelic Ireland. He was dedicated especially to our native language and his daughter the late Mrs. Hallahan and his grandson Monnie continued that tradition as teachers of music and dance.

# COMPENSATION TRIBUNAL FOR CERTAIN PERSONS WHO HAVE CONTRACTED HEPATITIS C FROM ANTI-D IMMUNOGLOBULIN, BLOOD TRANSFUSION OR OTHER BLOOD PRODUCTS

The Minister for Health and Children has amended Clause 1 of the Scheme of Compensation for certain persons who have contracted Hepatitis C from the use of Human Immunoglobulin Anti-D, whole blood or other blood products, pursuant to Clause 21 of the said Scheme so that Clause 1 of the Compensation Scheme shall forthwith read as follows:

The purpose of the Scheme is to provide compensation

- (a) to women who have been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C antibodies or Hepatitis C virus resulting from the use of Human Immunoglobulin Anti-D within the State,
- (b) to any person who has been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C antibodies or Hepatitis C virus as a result of receiving a blood transfusion or a blood product within the State. Such a person, where the context so requires, is hereinafter referred to as a "transfusee claimant", and
- (c) to children and partners of persons referred to at (a) and (b) above who have been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C antibodies and/or Hepatitis C virus.

The expression "within the State" shall not exclude from the application of the Scheme a person who -

- (i) is authorised by or on behalf of the Chief Executive Officer of a Health Board to go to another State to obtain medical treatment appropriate to his or her condition,
- (ii) receives a blood transfusion or blood product in the course of that treatment,
- (iii) is diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C antibodies or Hepatitis C virus, and
- (iv) establishes on the balance of probabilities that the antibodies or virus aforesaid resulted from that blood transfusion or blood product.

The Scheme shall continue indefinitely so as to give effect to the said purpose. Application for compensation may be made on the prescribed application form, which may be obtained from:

#### **ESSENTIAL OILS**

Over the next few weeks we will be dealing with essential oils and their uses.

Camphor: Camphor is a tall evergreen tree which bears clusters of small white flowers and red berries. Long ago a lump of camphor would be worn around the neck as a preventative measure against infectious disease. It was also used as a preventative for and respiratory nervous diseases.

There are three different types of camphor. Brown and yellow camphor are toxic and should not be used either internally or externally. White camphor on the other hand is non toxic and can be used in aromatherapy. In skin care it is used to treat acne, spots and oily skin condi-tions. Camphor can also be used to treat such conditions as rheumatism, sprains, muscular aches and pains. Colds and stuffiness are often treated with camphor, it is fast acting and will often abort a cold in the early stages.

Eucalyptus: Eucalyptus oil is especially used for respiratory problems such as croup and bronchitis. The eucalyptus leaf when dried can be smoked like tobacco for asthma. There are hundreds of different species hundreds of different species of eucalyptus. These can be divided mainly into three groups, medicinal, industrial and perfumery oils. Eucalyptus is non toxic when used externally, but is fatal taken internally. Skin infections, burns and blis-





# **Brilliant Drugs Presentation** By Pyramid Theatre Company

"What we saw and heard tonight should be compulsory for every parent in the country", was how one very satisfied parent summed up the visit and performance of the Pyramid Theatre Com-pany from Wales who had just presented their 90 min. production entitled "Other People's Children" to a relatively small, but very interested and enthusiastic audience in Ard Scoil Na nDéise.

Amongst the attendance were representatives of the second level schools of the district, local youth organisations, the Gardaí, civic officials, parents and young people,

The presentation opened with a slide show of drug-related headlines and media stories which set the scene for the live performance by a narrator and four very talented actors. The performance dealt most effectively and demonstrated very practically the lack of communication around the subject of

Several credible family scenarios - indeed parents worst nightmares in regard to drugs - were realistically presented and the views of the audience were then sought in dealing with the evident problems. The members of the Pyramid Company left nothing to chance and no one in the hall could have been left untouched at the end of their presentation.

Not only did they use their considerable acting talents to greatest effect, they also displayed a deep knowledge of their subject when called on later to ad lib the various solutions suggested by the audience.

So well were the various scenarios acted out and so realistic the atmosphere that the audience became part of the suffering family on stage and failed to applaud through the entire 90 mins. However when the company left the stage, they were treated to a resounding round of applause and were in no doubt that the audience had both enjoyed and appreciated what had gone before.

This was a very worthwhile exercise as a result of the combined efforts of the South Eastern Health Board, the Dungarvan Youth Resource Centre and the Pyramid Theatre Company, There was much to learn for those who were present and the beneficiaries have to be the young people of the district.

In closing, Dungarvan Youth and Community Worker, Triona Quinn thanked the Pyramid Theatre Company for an excellent drama. "I hope that we will

gain a few welcome tips from the performance and become more open to educating ourselves in the whole area of drugs," continued Ms. Quinn. "I say this because at present there is a very busy steering group working on running educational and preventative drug programmes with young people. 



# This Week In The Garden

#### Pot and Box Bulbs For Early Flowering

Now is the time for potting or boxing hyacinths, tulips, narcissi, brias, gladioli and bulbous irises for flowering in the greenhouse or house during this winter and next spring. If containers are provided with drainage holes use John Innes potting compost No. 1 or a peat based potting compost. If they are undrained bowls use special bulb fibre consisting of peat, crushed shell and crushed charcoal

Place the bulbs of tulips and narcissi almost touching one another and barely covered with compost. Space the smaller bulbs and corms about 2.5 cm apart and cover to a depth of 1 to 2 cm. Then stand all the containers in the coolest place available. This can be outdoors at the foot of a north-facing wall if the containers are drained, but undrained containers must be kept under cover or they may be flooded by rain.

#### **Pot Cyclamen Seedlings**

Cyclamen seedlings from the August sowing should be ready for pricking off or potting. Often the seed germinates irregularly, so if some seedlings are too backward for potting now, leave them in the seed pans, lifting the forward ones with a sharpened wooden label.

#### **House Late Flowering** Chrysanthemums

Now is the time to bring in all chrysanthemums that are to flower in the greenhouse before frost damages their tender buds.

Pot plants should be carried in and set on a hard bottom of ashes or gravel, or be arranged on staging, while plants that have been grown outdoors for lifting must be dug up with as much soil as possible and either be planted in the greenhouse borders or else be planted into suitable boxes

#### **Shelter Tender Plants**

Give shelter to all tender greenhouse plants that have been outdoors during the summer. This includes pelargoniums, marguerites, fushias and camellias.

# Plant A Healthy Winter's Diet

Spinach is an excellent vegetable, rich in vitamin A. B1. R2 and C. It also contains useful quantities of calcium. protein and iron. Winter spinach is sown in early to mid autumn for use during the winter months.

Winter spinach makes a good follow-on crop to some of the year's earlier sowings.

Before sowing, rake in a general fertiliser at 70g per sq. m. An open site with some shelter from cold winds is preferable

Sow the seeds in drills 2-3 cm deep and about 30 cm apart. Thin the seedlings to stand 23 cm apart. If the soil is dry at the time of sowing, water the drills well before-

Once established there should be no watering problems as the normal rainfall will be enough.

Although the plants are hardy they give a better and cleaner crop if some protection can be given, ideally with cloches during the winter months.

Straw or short litter tucked around the plants is one way of doing this. Picking can begin as soon as the leaves are large enough. Cut the largest leaves off close to the stem, taking a few from each plant.

Leaf production in the winter months is slower than summer, so take the leaves sparingly.

In early spring a dressing of nitrochalk at 35g per sq. m. will help the plants along by increasing production of leafy growth which in turn will help to give you earlier spinach piclangs. ah şahraw



#### ALMOST £1/4M RAISED FOR NCBI

Three Co. Waterford cyclists formed part of a 130 strong travelling party last August when they took on a great leisure cycle challenge in Canada as part of the high profile Irish Blazing saddles

Tony Elsted, an employee of Waterford Crystal and his brother Eddie from Ballinacourty teamed up with Liam Connors of Faha over a nine day constant cycle from Calgary to Vancouver in aid of the National Council for the Blind of Ireland (NCBI).

The 1,000 km. cycle across the Canadian Rockies was led by former world professional cyclist Sean Kelly while also taking part from Co. Waterford were Paul Butler of Carrick-on-Suir who is cycling in Boston with a team called Merlin and Dermot Blount of Tramore.

Each cyclist raised £3,000 prior to the route, which amounted to almost £250,000 in profit for the National Council for the Blind of Ireland. Tony, Eddie and Liam raised in the region of £10,000 between them. This proved to be the most successful tour by Blazing Saddles so far.

Annually, the Canadian 1000 is the biggest international overseas charity sporting event from Ireland to travel abroad.

The spectacular and record setting nature of this major breakthrough 3 Munster titles for the county is a most welcome development and all involved in this most noteworthy sporting

achievement are to be congratulated.



The narrow 2 pts. defeat was a bitter experience for Lismore who did not hide their disappointment at the end of their county semi-final game against Passage at Walsh Park on Sunday afternoon.

In a tension packed game that flowed over into an ugly melee after only 3 mins., neither side allowed the other to get their noses too far in front and as the final scoreline shows, only a puck of the ball separated them at the end of what was an enjoyable game for the patrons. As I wrote following their match against Roanmore, I was not very encouraged about Lismore's prospects of winning the title this year and for some reason their display here at Walsh Park was not up to the standard they have displayed in previous years. I now believe that getting a bye into the quarter-final and having just the one match against Roanmore before meeting Passage did not help their prospects.

Passage were in control for a long while but when Lismore did hit the front and led by 1-11 to 0-13 an injury to James O'Connor held up the play for a while and the delay seemed to help Passage as after this they scored 3 pts. (all from frees) without reply.

#### ALL-IRELAND 'B' S.F. CHAMPIONSHIP

This competition was introduced about five or six years ago as a result of a Waterford motion to Congress and it seems as if it is destined to go down the same road as the Railway Cup competitions which were once of such great importance on the calendar of competitions.

Last year, our game in the 'B' championship was fixed for a most unsuitable date when the majority of our players were club-tied or otherwise engaged, so in their wisdom the selectors decided to pull out, as did a number of other counties.

In the opening match Tourin, who had come through a couple of testing games against Glen Rovers, ran out worthy winners to take this J.H. 'B' championship for their second time in recent years. The club won the junior hurling 'A' county championship way back in 1977 when they defeated Rathgormack by a single point (3-6 to 2-8) in a thrilling final at Walsh Park. Their senior hurling triumph over Mount Sion in 1950 is also a proud chapter in this club's history.
