My brother and his family are thinking of retiring home to Ireland from England. I would like to get him some information on Housing, Social Welfare, Tax, etc. Can you advise me?

The Emigrant Advice Information and Counselling Service in conjunction with the Department of Social Welfare have brought out a practical guide called "Returning to Ireland" which covers Housing, Social Welfare, Health, Getting a Job, Taxes, Workers Rights, Education and useful addresses and phone numbers where to get further information. New Report Shows Public Health Status Of South East

Public Health Director, outlining the health status of the population of the South Eastern Health Board was launched last Monday by Michael Deering, Chairman of the SEHB.

Established over 18 months ago, the Public Heath Department highlights areas which need to be acted upon such as the new developments that are taking place in cancer services.

The launch took place at SEHB headquarters in Kilkenny where the Director of Public Health and author of the report, Dr. Orlaith O'Reilly, was on hand to an-

swer any queries.

Some of the important issues dealt with in the report are teenage pregnancies, accidents, cancer and cardiovascular disease.

HIGH PROPORTION OF TEENAGE PREGNANCIES

The SEHB has the second highest proportion of births to single mothers and has a high proportion of teenage pregnancies, particularly in the Waterford urban area. The Health Board is currently developing health promotion programmes and health services specifically targeted at this group.

HIGHEST HOSPITALISATION RATE

Injuries and poisonings are identified in the report as the major causes of death and serious disability in young people in the South East. The area has the highest hospitalisation rate for accidents involving children. One in three children who die, do so as a result of an accident. In

under 14 years of age in 1995. Wexford had the highest death rate from road acciparticularly in young men.
The SEHB wishes to de-

prevention strategy with the involvement of key agencies which would result in the development of local accident prevention programmes at community level.

COMMONEST CAUSE OF DEATH

The report reveals that cancer is the commonest cause of death in adults over 65 years of age with one in three premature deaths being caused by cancer. Cancer death rates were highest in women in Co. Carlow and in men in Co. Tipperary.

A Regional Director for

Cancer Services has been appointed and a plan for comprehensive cancer services for the people of the South East is being developed. Each hospital in the region will have a coordinator of cancer services and a regional steering committee for cancer services has been formed.

Two major priorities in the development of cancer services will be to ensure equitable access to services and the development, adoption and clinical audit of effective treatment protocols.

The Health Board will appoint a Consultant Oncologist in the very near future and aims to strengthen diagnostic services and palliative care services.

But just a small backyard will do for a goat. During World War Two a herd of goats was kept on a rooftop in Central


Many owners use converted pigsties and coal sheds. The essentials are few: a good floor with drainage, sound walls and roof, fresh air without draughts, and lots of natural light.

Balloons

THE first passengers of air balloons were animals. They flew for about eight minutes at the height of a three story house. When the first human balloonists tried for fly they could only control the balloon slightly. To make the balloon go up, they burned a fire fiercely and to make the balloon come down, they dampened the fire. There was the event of the hydrogen balloon then and this went very high if it had a lot of gas in it. Balloons were used for a lot of things, men used to go up in them when a battle was in progress to see what was going on below them. They were also used for letters and packages and these would get to their destination at some time or other. Balloons can only go in the direction of the wind. Balloons, sometimes, were blown miles off course and the people using then had to walk a good bit to the near-est house or town. An airship is a balloon with an engine and this could turn comers and fly against the wind. Airships were used for a time to carry passengers long distances, but after several crashes people stopped distances, but after several crashes people stopped using them. Balloons were let go up to high in some instances and because of altitude, people found it hard to breathe. To land a balloon in very high wind is very difficult. It can drift along for a good while before stopping. Up to 220 years ago no balloons existed, but in 1783 the Montgolfler was invented. 1783 also the introduction of the first hydrogen balloon. The first war balloon invented - 1794. 1797 the first parachute came about. The first women took to the skies in 1805. 1811 saw the introduction of the first airmail service by balloon. Then there was a break of forty-one years and the balloon with an engine was brought into being. Different balloons were invented through the years and in 1915, the first attacking airship was used in the war. This was called a zeppelin.

Survey Shows County Is Well On Way To Being Litter Free PACKED ATTENDANCE AT COUNTY ENVIRONMENT AWARDS CEREMONY

Most readers throughout the county are now aware that Waterford is currently battling to become the first litter free county in Ireland. The challenge has been thrown down by the Irish Business Against Litter organisation (IBAL) who have promised to build a £1,000,000 advance factory in the county should Waterford be successful in its endeavours.

position to market itself as Ireland's first and only litterfree county, helping to promote further industrial growth.

Rising to the challenge Waterford is now 53% of the way towards becoming 'litter by May 1998 thanks to the implementation of a Litter Action Plan and environmental campaign by both the County Council and the Corporation.

An Taisce (The National Trust for Ireland) were appointed by IBAL to conduct an independent monitoring programme which will determine ultimately whether Waterford becomes litter free or

The result of An Taisce's initial survey conducted in mid August, shows that Waterford is more than halfway towards meeting its goal which augurs well for our chances of securing the £1 million advance factory.

Last August's survey was the first of three countywide evaluations. An Taisce's next survey is expected to take place during October, again without the knowledge of any authority. A final report, to be published in April 1998, will announce the results of Waterford's litter status.

CIGARETTE ENDS & GUM BIGGEST OFFENDERS

The findings of An Taisce's first survey of the county and city were presented at a packed function in the Park Hotel last Wednesday night. Also taking place were the inaugural County Environment Awards to various towns, villages, burial grounds, schools, communities and other groups.

Outlining the survey results was Anne Wilkinson, Litter Project Manager with An Taisce who disclosed that cigarette ends and chewing gum were identified as the most prevalent form of litter.

A total of 60 sites in twelve different locations throughout the county were inspected by

> The areas where litter was particularly evident was outside general stores. Litter mainly consisted of discarded sweet papers, crisp packets and cigarette packets. Interestingly, fast food outlets and outside bank ATMs were not identified as problem areas during the course of the survey.

An important factor which could have influenced the results however was that schools and colleges were on holiday during the period of the survey. Littering outside schools has always been identified as a major 'black-spot' area and An Taisce's subsequent surveys will be undertaken during school term.

MAJOR BLITZ

NEEDED ON LITTER

According to Tom Cavanagh, Chairman of IBAL, Waterford needs a major blitz with the appointment of 30 litter wardens for a few months throughout the city and county in a no exceptions enforcement programme. Thereafter a week long miniblitz is needed (4 times a year) with a small number of wardens.

He said that any planned strategy to make Waterford a more beautiful county would lack credibility until the litter issue is solved.

'We are trying to illustrate that business is more readily enticed to invest in a location that continues to be environmentally clean over an extended period of time", added Mr. Cavanagh.

Responding to Mr. Cavanagh's comments, County Manager Donal Connolly revealed that the first anti-litter supervisors will commence work in a fortnight and a voluntary anti-litter working group, representative of all interest bodies, will be established within a month.

OVERALL DEVELOPMENT APPROACH 28 (25)

Thank you for a well completed detailed application form, map and explanatory notes and pamphlets. The Tidy Town Committee and the Enterprise Group are to be congratulated on their success in gaining support from the local community both in collecting money and in carrying out necessary tasks. It is important to keep pressurising the County Council for repairs to the footpath and lighting. The Old Still is quite a unique feature. The efforts put into enhancing its surroundings are well worth while The old graveyard is most interesting and worthy of care. The Kilmaloo Walk and the Raheen Walk are most interesting projects and you are wished every success with them and your many other undertakings.

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT 28 (26)

The grotto is a very fine structure. The school grounds are very well kept. Possibly a school sign should be put on this road to indicate the traffic to slow down. St. Mochuas Well is most interesting. The long term policy should be to replace the galvanised sheet gate by a more appropriate wrought iron gate. The other gateway could be repaired and then paint-

LANDSCAPING 25 (24)

A few more indigenous trees should be planted throughout the village as well as in the school grounds. The variegated poplar, while growing well, is inclined to create a discordant note. It should be a policy in future plantings to depend more on long term permanent plantings, thereby creating gardens for all seasons. The ESB should be approached regarding screening on the 38kV sub-station on the Youghal

WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES 19 (19)

There is a commendable policy to preserve and encourage all wildlife especially along the Raheen Walk and past the marshes on the walk. Clashmore is very well endowed with natural amenities and the works being undertaken appear to take them very much into account.

LITTER CONTROL 28 (29)

Litter control throughout the village was excellent. However, at the entrance to Mochuas Well a litter bin is needed as there was litter and also some tin cans and bottles in the river on both sides of the bridge.

TIDINESS 14 (14)

Waterford Co-op should better co-ordinate their advertising and provide more screening. The verges coming into the town from Villierstown were very untidy. Additional work is needed here.

RESIDENTIAL AREAS 19 (18)

The residential areas are very pleasant and consist of relatively modern detached houses and traditional terraced premises. Gardens were bright and cheerful. As one swings into the village there is a very interesting colour scheme on some houses, a pink one and a green one adjoining, and a yellow one on the opposite side. This colour scheme could be continued on the backs of the houses facing onto the Still Bridge, and be used as a colour palette for painting or colouring other houses.

ROADS, STREETS AND BACK AREAS 24 (24)

The verges of the approach road from Aglish need more attention and definition. The verge, on the quite narrow road leading up to the well, is well kept and very pleasant.

GENERAL IMPRESSION 5 (5)

Clashmore gives a good impression of a well cared for village, one where the community cares for its environment and heritage.



FAMINE TALK AT BALLYMACARBRY

The second part of a two part talk on the Famine took place at St. Patrick's Hall, Ballymacarbry on Friday last. The speaker of the first talk was Sean Murphy who gave a very good account of the Famine in the Comeraghs and the surrounding districts. He dealt with land conditions in Waterford before the Famine in 1845. trouble in Bonmahon and Protestant School in 1845, Kilmacthomas publicans would not close on time on the Hiring Fair Day May 1845, the construction of Monatouk Road, a scheme that was put in progress on October 10th 1846 under the control of Mr. Thomas Morrissey who acted as overseer and paymaster. He showed Morrissey's Pay Book where the men were paid 10d per day and the women were paid 7d per day while the Carters were paid 2s 6d per day. He also spoke of Fr. Thomas Finn C.C. Kil-rossanty and how he administered the last sacraments to the dying huddled together in an open tomb known as Valentine's Tomb in Kilrossanty graveyard. Fr. Thomas Finn afterwards became parish priest of Fourmilewater/Newcastle 1874 -1884. His remains are in-

terred in Newcastle Church. The second talk was given by Michael Desmond on the Famine and its effect on the parish of Kilronan 1841 -1851. He dealt with each townsland in the parish in great detail.

The attendance went home with a pile of history on the Famine. The talks were sponsored by Patrick and Carmel Melody, Ballymacarbry.

HANDS OVER THE REINS TO NEW INCUMBENT

It was the end of an era for Rathkeevin National School when principal of 25 years Pat Geary put aside his chalk and schoolbooks and handed over the reins to a new incumbent. But the parents and pupils of this rural school, situated off the Cahir Road a few miles from Clonmel, didn't let him go quietly.

A few weeks ago Mr. Geary and his family were guests of honour at a dinner in Knocklofty House (the former home of Lord Donoghmore) organised by the school's board of management and the parents. Pat was presented with a set of golf clubs in appreciation of his dedicated service to the school. Earlier that day Rathkeevin's 84 pupils and their three teachers, led by new school principal Mrs. Joan Holland, presented their own gifts - a beautiful lamp and clock - to their departing principal.

Mr. Geary who is married and lives at the Old Spa Road, Clonmel was first appointed principal of Rath-keevin National School in 1962. He began his teaching career at Cahir Boys School and describes his three years there as "wonderful". He then moved to the now defunct Dunhill National School in the parish of Ballylooby. He was there for four years before becoming principal of Rathkeevin.

The retired principal comes from Tralee in Co.Kerry - a county renowned for its tradition of producing teachers. Two of Mr. Geary's family, Triona and Aidan have followed into national school teaching. Triona works in the Sisters of Charity in Clonmel while Aidan has spent the last five years teaching in Kuwait. His other sons are Ronan who is an E.S.B. Engineer and Pádraig, who works with the Revenue Commissioners in Galway.

Romanian Stowaways Await **Decision Of Justice Department**

Five Romanian nationals who gained illegal entry into the country through Rosslare port yesterday morning were in custody at Youghal Garda Station last night (Tuesday) pending a decision on them by the Department of Jus-

The five were concealed in a large canvas-covered Pandoro container on board an articulated lorry which came through the Co. Wexford port and then proceeded on its journey to Cork.

On the Waterford side of Youghal Bridge, the truck driver stopped at a mobile fast food takeaway at 10.45 a.m. and it was then that the stowaways emerged from the container after slitting the canvas covering with a knife.

They sped through the of Bonmahon), said they nearest field leaving the perplexed lorry driver and the fast food operator looking on in disbelief. The gardai were contacted and within a quarter of an hour a major manhunt for the quintet was under way.

Gardai set up road blocks at different locations as colleagues searched outhouses and disused buildings in the general Ardsallagh/Clashmore area. Then shortly after 3.30 the five men were spotted on the roadside by Gardai and were taken into custody without offering resistance of any kind.

Later Sergeant Jack Gaine, who headed the search for the stowaways with Inspector Tommy Hayes (a native

were being detained under the Aliens Act pending a decision on their immediate future from the Department of Justice.

Sgt. Gaine said that from the condition inside the container, it would seem that the men had not been hoarded up there for any appreciable period of time. However the garda belief is that the container originatated from Italy.

The men are aged between twenty and forty and all of them are in possession of current and valid Romanian passports. One of the five spoke reasonably good En-glish and it was through him that the garda questioning was conducted.

Their immediate future in relation to this country now rests firmly with the Department of Justice.

Update On St. Joseph's Hospital Development

Cllr. Billy Kyne has received the following letter from J. Magner, Programme Manager, South Eastern Health Board -

Dear Cllr. Kyne,

"I refer to your recent enquiry on the developments at St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan. The present po-sition is that Phase I is presently underway in the hospital to provide a 24-bedded unit. This project is progressing in accordance with building time frame provided and is expected that the building will be handed over to the Board towards the end of this year/early January. As you will be aware the building must then be equipped and commissioned and in this regard we are presently in the process of finalising our equipment requirements for submission to the Department of Health. I am, however, happy that the project is progressing

very satisfactorily.
"In relation to Phase II I have written to the Department of Health requesting their approval to extend the terms of reference of the existing project team which is overseeing the current development on the site, to undertake the preparation of the brief for submission to the Department of Health for Phase II of the hospital development. This would be a further hospital block development of 26 to 30 beds.

"Additionally I have written to the Department of Health for funding to facilitate the upgrading of St. Elizabeth's Ward in the hospital. As you are aware, patients presently accommodated in St. Elizabeth's Ward will transfer to the new 24-bed unit and it is then planned that patients in St. Brigid's and St. Patrick's Wards on the first floor will be transferred to the vacant St. Elizabeth's Ward on the ground floor. However I am anxious that we should upgrade the existing St. Elizabeth's Ward prior to the transfer of patients from the first floor.

"I expect to have a meeting with officials of the Department of Health towards the end of this month and I will be raising the matter directly with them at this

In a detailed explanation for his decision, the Manager said that given the Government policy on telecommunications and the Department of the Environment guidelines on telecommunications structures, the proposed development was fully in accordance with the proper planning and development of the area.

Mr. Connolly however attached a number of conditions to the planning permission including one restricting the permission to a five-year period after which the company must either reapply to retain the structure or dismantle it.

He also directed that a system of independent monitoring of radiation levels from the proposed development be established and undertaken periodically to ensure compliance with such guidelines as may be set from time to time by the International Radiation Protection Association. The monitoring costs, the Manager ruled, would be met by

In upholding Mr. Connolly's decision, An Bord Pleanála states that subject to compliance with the conditions set down by the County Manager, the proposed development will not seriously injure the amenities of the area, will not be prejudicial to public health and will be in accordance with the proper planning and development of the area.

That, say the objectors, is a total nonsense. And to add insult to injury as they see it, the structure will have a fixed red light fitted as close to the top of the mast as Cllr. Hart added.

'It is more than obvious.' the spokesperson added, "that neither people who give these planning permissions, nor their children, live in the vicinity of these transmitters.'

Urban and County Councillor, Lar Hart, who has been implacably opposed to the erection of the mast on so pronounced and central a building from day one, has described the Bord Pleanála decision as "hugely disap-pointing" and one that in many ways flies in the face of public opinion in the Dungarvan area. Cllr. Hart, who is Chairman of Waterford County Council and Vice-Chairman of Dungarvan Urban Council, said that when bodies such as An Bord Pleanála can show 'scant regard" for the clearly expressed wishes of the majority within a community, it is almost an attack on democracy itself.

"The Bord Pleanála ruling has brought this particular saga to an end. The fight is over, there is nowhere else the objectors can turn to,





This Week In he Garden

Start To Plant Evergreen Shrubs

From now until mid-October is the ideal time for planting hardy evergreen shrubs. You cannot do this if the weather is dry, but neither condition is likely to continue for long at this time of the year. Plant firmly and stake all big specimens. Later on, if winds are very cold and drying, erect temporary shelters of hurdles, evergreen boughs or sacking between stakes to protect the shrubs, particularly on the north and west sides.

Plant Violets In Frames

Violets growing outdoors since April should now be removed to frames for winter flowering. The frames must stand in a sunny and fairly sheltered position and be filled with good loamy soil to within 20cm of the glass.

Plant the violet clumps almost touching one another. Water them freely, but do not close the frames yet.

Plant Rooted Carnation Layers

Carnation layers pegged down at the end of July should be well rooted by this time. Scrape away a little of the soil and see how things are. If there are plenty of fibrous roots around the cut area, sever the layers from the parent plants and a few days later lift them - each with a good ball of soil - and transfer them to their flowering quarters or pot them in 10-13 cm pots, place them in a frame, and plant them out next March.

Pick All Tomatoes

Outdoor tomatoes are not likely to ripen any more on the plants now, so it is as well to pick all the fruits that are showing some trace of colour and stand them in a sunny window to ripen.

Absolutely green fruits can be made into chutney. The summer crop of tomatoes under glass will be coming to an end and as every inch of greenhouse space is likely to be needed in the next few weeks, it is a good idea to clear these, treating them on the same way as outdoor fruits.

Check List For This Month

Expect the worst this winter - check garden fixtures before the weather picks on that rickety fence post or lifts that flapping shed roof.

October is ideal since it's not too cold or warm for heavy work and most growing and planting chores are over. SHEDS AND OUTHOUSES

These need a new coating of preservative at least every three years. Creosote is cheap and effective.

Check any glass for damage which might allow weather to rot the structure or damage contents.

However, the most vulnerable point is the roofing: check felt or corrugated sections are soundly fixed or the wind will surely peel them back on a blowy day. **FENCEPOSTS**

Check every post for possible rot and play. If a base is suspect then saw off the rot and drive in a steel fence spike, before refixing the remaining length of post and the fence sections.

These cross pieces are often ignored, but a fence section will quickly unravel if one end of a rail comes adrift. They are prone to rot because the wood grain tends to retain rainfall and they are at their weakest where the rail is tapered to fit into the fence post.

Fortunately, unless the entire rail is rotten, you can saw off the end and replace with a galvanised section which then slots into the post.

GRAVEL BOARDS

Close proximity to the soil causes these to rot quickly, but they are easily dug out and replaced. You can also use any old timber, providing it is long enough and saturated in preservative.

Having repaired the fence, make sure you protect new wood and coat the entire fence at least every third year anyway.

Silage Analysis

Cattle will be going into sheds in a few weeks time. Nobody needs reminding at this time how critical cost control will be over the coming wintering period in order to keep the head above water in relation to viability in cattle production.

There can be a difference of up to £50 per head in the cost of winter finishing between high quality silage (75% DMD) and stemmy silage (60% DMD). This difference consists of the cost of extra concentrates that must be fed with the lower quali-

There is nothing that can be done now about the quality of silage that is in the pit but in order to establish appropriate supplementation levels and indeed feed allowances in the case of suckler cows, it is necessary to get a measure of the feeding value of the silage.

Now is the time to have silage analysis done so the information can be put to use at the start of feeding

Feeding Pre-Mating

The benefits of 'Flushing' ewes before mating are well known. The advice is to have ewes on good grass for three to four weeks before the rams go out.

'Good grass' for flushing and mating of ewes means a sward about 9 to 10 cm. high providing enough to eat each day. Ewes will gain on a sward like this during late September/early October and indeed for longer if the weather remains dry.

All ewes should be at condition score 3.5 the day the rams go out. In any flock there will be a big variation in the amount of flesh on the ewes. Go through your flock now and take care of the foot problems.

Do whatever dosing and vaccination you deem necessary and condition score your ewes. Pick out the thin ones and give them five weeks of a good 'do', three weeks will probably be sufficient for the

If the flock are quite fat, then maintain them the way they are - don't let them get too fat.

Reps Records

- Records or the lack of them are causing increasing problems for many farmers. Don't expect miracles from your planner at the end of each year. Take full responsibility yourself for keeping the records.
- Stock numbers must be recorded monthly and if you are well over your planned numbers, get in touch with your planner.
- Keep all invoices and note where slurry and other wastes are spread.
- REPS records provide the Department of Agriculture and Food with the evidence that you have complied with your REPS plan in the previous year.

IFA Call For Reallocation Of Leader Funds

velopment Chairman Mossie O'Connor has called on the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to reallocate funding under the Leader II programme to agricultural and alternative farm enterprise projects at the mid-term review of the programme.

Mr. O'Connor who stated that the EU Leader Consultative Committee was meeting this week said that the reallocation of funds is necessary for two reasons. Firstly, out of a total expenditure and commitment to date of £36.2m, only £1.2m or 3.3% of funds have been provided for agricultural related projects. Secondly, with the de-cision of the CSF monitoring committee not to provide additional funds at the midterm review the Operational Programme for Agriculture, Rural Development and Forestry to open the alternative enterprises scheme, this measure should now be supported from the Leader II programme.

The Waterford IFA Rural Development spokesman said that Leader II programme has the opportunity to make a lasting impact on the economic development forestry and environment of Ireland's rural regions projects.

Waterford IFA Rural De- given its strong local and community involvement. However, a more flexible approach must be adopted by accepting farm diversifi-cation as a legitimate project for support.

These stressful events could be natural, for example earthquakes, fires, floods etc., or they could be man-made, for example wars, bad car crashes etc. Many people involved in the Stardust fire in Dublin in 1980 suffered from this condition, as suffered from this condition, as did many soldiers involved in

the Vietnam. In the heat of the disaster people usually experi-ence intense fear and an intense desire to escape from the situation, but rarely panic. Others may become dazed and helpless and wander around aimlessly for hours or days, even if they are brought to safety.

After the disaster many are preoccupied with the disaster and how close they have come to death, and are guilty about surviving when others have died. They may experience uncontrollable flashbacks which are very intrusive and disturbing. A sudden sound associated with the incident may bring on a flashback. This leads the victims to avoid situations where they may be reminded of the disaster and they become withdrawn and isolated. Many feel vulferable and frightened that it may happen again and also they feel angry that such a senseless event occurred. It is not only the victims of the disaster that have victims of the disaster that have these experiences; rescuers and the relatives of victims that died may also be affected. The diagnosis of P.T.S.D. depends on 1. being involved in a disaster that is outside the range of human living, 2. recalling the event in vivid dreams or flashbacks, usually as a result of hearing, seeing or indeed smelling some thing that triggers off the memory of the event; 3. avoid-ance of places and events that would trigger a flashback of the disaster leading to a with-drawal from normal life, and 4. being in a more aroused state

He may also prescribe a cream or some suppositries, tablets that you insert into the rectum, to help you or indeed he may decide that things have gone too far and you need to be referred to a surgeon for surgery to the piles surgeon for surgery to the piles for further investigation to rule out a cancer.
To prevent piles recurring or to

try to help ease them take a high fibre diet, plenty of fresh fruit, vegetables, wholemeal bread and bran. This is very impor-tant if you are taking medica-tion that causes constipation. Drink plenty of fluids and cut down on your salt intake. Eat a low fat diet - lots of chicken and tow fat diet - tots of chicken and fish. Wear cotton underwear and keep the anal area clean and as dry as possible. Try not to strain during bowel movements, leaning forward from the hips will reduce straining. DO NOT sit on the lavatory for ages reading the paper or smoking reading the paper or smoking, not alone do you hog the toilet but you greatly increase the risk of getting piles or indeed making them worse.



Health Tips from "Remedies

DEVIL'S CLAW OR HARPAGOPHYTUM

The colourful name of this African plant is derived from the appearance of its tough barbed fruit.

The medicinal properties of Devil's Claw were first discovered by various southern African peoples, who used an infusion (tea) of the tuber (underground stem) to treat digestive problems and arthritis. In the West the herb is now widely vailable as a remedy in health stores

in brackets): **OVERALL DEVELOPMENT APPROACH 21 (21)**

Thank you for a comprehensively completed application form and the most useful village map which accompanied it. The Committee are to be congratulated on their programme for their efforts in collecting funds and for their success in liaising with Ballyduff Community Council and Waterford County Council. It is to be hoped that the proposed plan being prepared by Waterford County Council will materialise soon. The Hall, which is being painted, will look very well when finished. Road signage, road marking, etc. should be completed soon.
THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT 24 (23)

The proposed works on the refurbishing of many of the individually significant buildings is to be commended. The Hall is beginning to make an impact and when the painting is completed it will add considerably to the centre of the village. The splendidly sited garda station is quite a feature and because of its great interest, the grounds around it should be enhanced in some way to make them more appealing. The school is well presented but some oak trees or similar trees would greatly add to its impact. It is a great shame that the storage compound of the Co-op creates such a bad visual impression in this important part of the village. Some effort should be given to ensuring that it be screened and tidied up.

LANDSCAPING 21 (22)

The flowers in tubs are very pleasant but there is ample scope for the planting of trees, that of themselves, would very much enhance the village. Consideration should be given to the variety of trees planted, so that they will reflect those growing in the surrounding countryside and hedgerows. Gardenesque type trees should be avoided, particularly those with coloured or variegated leaves.
Oak trees or some similar type trees should be planted on both the church grounds and the school grounds.
WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES 16 (16)

Ballyduff itself is rural with green fields up to the back doors, so respect for the environment is part and parcel of everyday life. The fur and feather reserve around the village additionally assures this.



Well known local ultra distance runner Ray McConnell from Cappoquin, achieved his athletic career ambition in Greece last weekend when he completed the gruelling 153 miles Athens to Sparta distance, run at the third at-

The Cappoquin Chickens employee completed the distance twenty-two minutes within the thirty six hours finishing cut off time in an entry where annually only one third of the runners manage to arrive at the end of the

Ray completed the course in good form and in good health after reaping the rewards of a recent seven months of full time preparation courtesy of his employers, Cappoquin Chickens. The Cappoquin company are to be commended on giving Ray his chance of a lifetime and Ray responded in style with what must surely rank as his best ultra distance run ever.

The "Poultry in Motion" vested McConnell usually

runs at a schedule of six miles an hour and seven hours into the event last Friday morning he was bang on schedule, having completed a distance of forty-two

The first fifty miles were daunting, the second fifty were the same and at this stage the runners were intro-duced to the mother of all hills for a distance of one and a half miles. This hill was so tough that many of the runners, including Ray, walked it at the same speed as if they ran it.

In total the runners encountered 24 hours of daylight and twelve hours of darkness. The temperature varied from 22°C to 30°C. 26 countries were represented and Ray struck an accord with a German and Australian

In previous runs, Ray experienced difficulties with his diet but on this occasion everything went okay for him with raisins, biscuits, rice, electrolite and water looking after his needs.

It must have been a very tired but elated Ray Mc-Connell that reached the finishing line in Sparta on Saturday evening. Two previous disappointments are now replaced by deserved success. Great credit is due to Ray and his better half Sylvia for taking on this challenge and defeating it. Each runner had finished the run officially when they kissed the feet of the statue of the leg-endary Greek runner Phedippides who actually died when he had completed the run.

The McConnells trip to Greece was sponsored by food chain Abrakababra and their venture received great airing on the Gerry Ryan Show last Friday and Monday.







The following year in the 1991 final in which they also defeated Stradbally it was only by a single score (1-9 to 1-6). The next year was the most remarkable in our football history when they drew with Rathgormack and after extra-time in the replay they were still level. Then after extra time in the replay of the replay, they emerged winners by just 2 pts. In the championship this year the club have again 'sailed very close to the wind' with a number of very close shaves. They drew with the group team in their first outing and managed a 2 pts. win in the replay. A single goal kept them in the hunt after their meeting with Ring in the next game and in the semi-final Dungarvan survived by a single point (0-8 to 0-7) against Stradbally. Seldom do we find a team having so many 'photo finish' victories in the championship. Strange to relate, if there is a team to challenge their unique record in this respect, it is Sunday's opponents, the Nire who are the close runners-up.

Back eight years ago when the Nire drew with Kilrossanty in the 1989 County Final, they lost the replay on



A LOOK BACK



Dungarvan defeated Stradbally who had decisively defeated the twice county champions Rathgormack and the Nire beat Gaultier who were the county finalists

last year. This is all very interesting but without telling us how the teams will play against each other.

They have rather contrasting styles with Dungarvan favouring the more direct style as against the Nire's more open style. Dungarvan are capable of winning with less scoring chances than are the Nire who can be squanderers in their scoring attempts. If the Nire can overcome this defect in their forward division, they just might win their first Conway Cup in Fraher Field. But they both have it all to play for and if it is not going to be a draw, may the better team win.



THE BANNER COUNTY?

When Clare won the hurling All-Ireland two years ago the matter of how Clare got the nick-name 'the Banner County' was being asked. I was asked by a reader and I promised to make enquiries. I did ask several Clare people living around, without success. A retired librarian in Dublin has now sent me the information requested:

The Banner County derives its name from an incident which took place on the battlefield of Ramilles on 23rd May 1706. An English army under the duke of Marlborough defeated a French one under Marshall De Villeroy. Colonel Charles O'Brien, 5th Lord Clare and Marechal de Camp in the French forces, led his Regiment of Clare (Clare's Dragoons) into glory, history and legend on the occasion. Lord Clare's dragoons distinguished themselves in this epic battle, destroyed a Scottish regiment in the Dutch service, engaged the English Regi-ment of Churchill with equal honour and captured the colours, the banners of both enemy regiments.

The two banners captured from the enemy at the Battle of Ramilles were deposited in the house of the Irish Benedictine nuns at Ypress, by another member of the O'Brien family. Afterwards Clare was referred to as the Banner County.


