Dungarvan Traffic To Go One-Way In New Year

A radical overhaul of Dungarvan's currently congested traffic circulation will see the introduction of a one-way system throughout the town in the new year.

Problem areas such as O'Connell Street, Grattan Square and Main Street have been targeted by Dungarvan U.D.C. under a wide ranging number of traffic

management proposals.

These proposals, which were ratified by members of the Urban Council at their meeting last Monday night, will come into effect next

January although it is anticipated that some of the more pressing traffic changes will be made before Christmas. Not surprisingly local motorists may find the new traffic flow directions confusing at first.

County Manager Donal Connolly however insists that the new one-way system will greatly enhance the town centre and eliminate congestion. Once operational, the one-way system

Council Hires Surveillance Operator To Flush Out Litter Bugs

A number of littering offences at the slate quarries in Clashmore attracted enormous media attention when they were brought before Youghal District Court last Friday.

In an all out bid to attain litter free status and thereby earn a £1m advance factory, Waterford County Council has hired a private surveillance operator to catch unsuspecting litter bugs in the act.

For many years the slate quarries in Clashmore have been a notorious dumping ground despite various notices, barriers and appeals by the County Council.

Six offenders from the Clashmore area were recently caught on film by the hired surveillance operator who hid out at the quarries

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Report of Tallow's Tidy Town Effort

Comments from the adjudicator (1996 marks in brackets):

OVERALL DEVELOPMENT APPROACH 33 (31)

The community and the Tidy Towns Committee of Tallow must be very highly applauded for the completed very detailed questionnaire and entry form, map, 1994-1998 Work Programme with comprehensive notes and photographs, and the reports from all the club secretaries regarding their efforts this year to make this beautifully placed town on the River Bride a healthy and better place to live in and enjoy.

The Committee must also be commended on their success in already having collected most of the £8000 pledge. Tallow is a very extended town, a sráid town, and as such there are prob-

lems with creating cohesion and a centre but the Committee with their forward planning are tackling this problem on a phased basis.

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT 23 (23)

There is a very rich built environment in Tallow and the Committee is approaching its problems in the correct way with their Work Plan. The solving of the many problems will take time but there is a very sound foundation to build on. The Bride Valley Stores with its bold lettering is a very strong feature at the turn into the Main Street. Its repainting should be encouraged.

The Alms Houses are a delight. The houses on the Old Road are being refurbished and already look well with flower-pots on the sidewalk. The toilets are very poor and in fact are in the wrong loca-

tion. To be properly looked after, they should be in the centre of the town rather than down a side road. The Rectory is a fine house. The street name signs are extremely satisfactory. Business people are being encouraged to keep their premises well presented and to retain traditional character.

LANDSCAPING 22 (21)

Flair Plastics, a large factory building, has a good planting programme of trees and hedges but could redo their title as it is chipped. The picnic area just past Flair Plastics is very pleasant and looks very well on the entrance to the town. If further planting is done it is suggested the variegated poplars not be used as they look very alien in the Irish environment, creating a discordant note and additionally are not a very satisfactory tree. Oak, beech, birch etc. are always much more in keeping. The planting at Waterford Foods is very satisfactory and will improve with time.

WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES 16 (16)

The Tallow and District Anglers Club is to be complimented on the work they are doing. The community is also to be complimented on their awareness of the value of flood plains of the River Bride and the River Blackwater and the importance of the bat nursery roost in the Protestant Church. The liaison with the District Wildlife Officer is very good.

LITTER CONTROL 27 (27)Ø

The business people and the local community are to be commended on their success in this regard as there was almost no litter visible.

TIDINESS 14 (13)

The Calor Gas Filling Station could be greatly improved by reconsidering their signage. South of Ireland Petroleum should be screened with a hedge behind the wire fence consistent with supervision of the site from outside. The idea of a Bottle Bank is to be commended but its approach needs some more consideration. The adjoining County Council dump really does need to be improved with screening and planting.

RESIDENTIAL AREAS 22 (21)

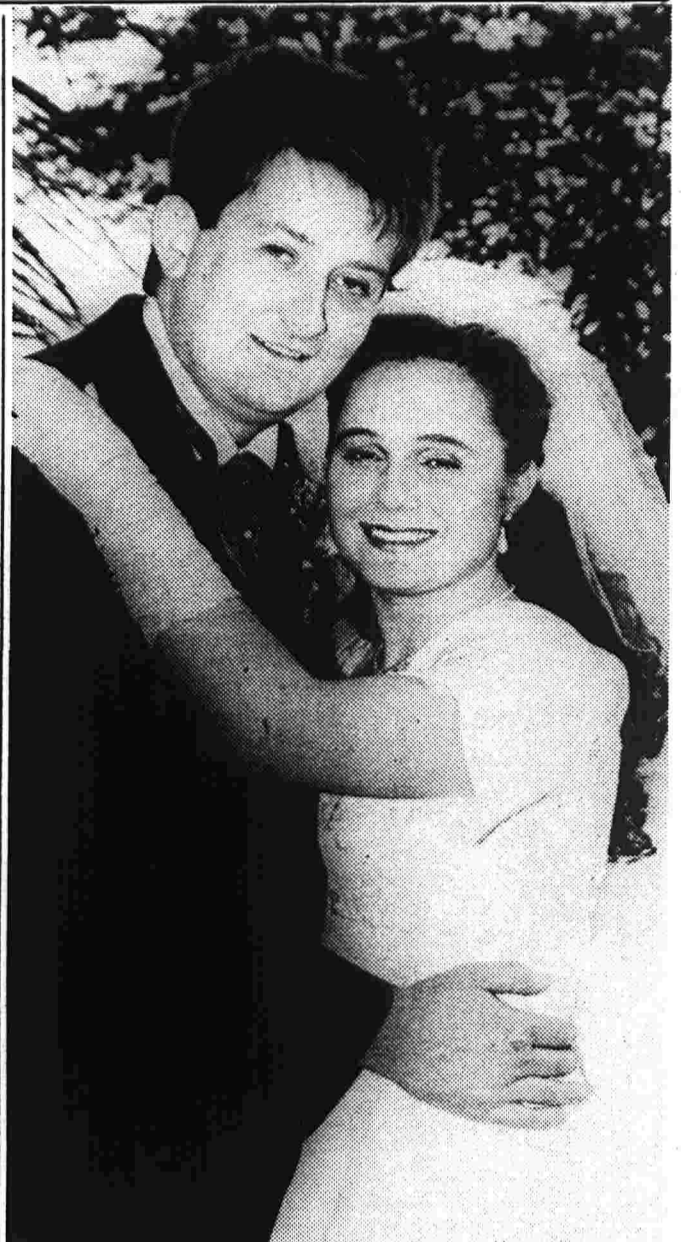
Private housing in Tallow is very pleasant, particularly the distinctive terrace of houses on West End. Many houses have been improved, though some seem to be in decline, but hopefully this problem can be overcome. Gardens are well kept and there are many planters and tubs that add much to the quality of the environment.

ROADS, STREETS AND BACK AREAS 25 (24)

The roads within the town are well kept and completely litter free and are much enhanced by the use of colourful plantings and gardens.

GENERAL IMPRESSION 5 (5)

Tallow is in many ways a typical Irish town being long and extended with little happening on side or back roads. This is called a sráid town and has its own problems in creating a sense of cohesion and a dominant centre. These problems are being tackled and a good impression of care is evident as is the concern with ongoing improvements. The many planters of flowers, both tubs and wall hanging, add to the colourfulness and quality of the street.

QUESTION

I have a son going into his final year in secondary school. I want to find out what the financial supports are for students going on to 3rd level.

ANSWER

The Department of Education has brought out a booklet "Third Level Student Support" which is available from the Department free. Telephone 0506-21363 or 01-8734700. It deals with the 1997/98 academic year but will give you information on grant schemes, fees, scholarships, ESF Maintenance, tax relief for students at 3rd level colleges or on fees for part-time study and study in the United Kingdom. It also has a comprehensive list of colleges approved for Schemes, and Local Authorities and their phone numbers for further information.

For the academic year 98/99 if there are changes in the Schemes, e.g. means test for maintenance grants, an updated version will be available early in 1998.

How Wild Creatures Get Ready For The Long Winter

Wild creatures do not begin their year on January 1 — they do not operate to a calendar.

Their year is governed by the seasons, by food, temperature and weather. And like the farming year, the wildlife calendar begins in the autumn.

You may think autumn is an odd season to begin with and spring would be better. But autumn is the busy preparation time for wild animals, birds and the vast majority of insects.

It is the time wildlife have finished the business of finding a mate and rearing their families — they must now prepare all over again to do the same again next year.

By autumn, birds that winter abroad will have departed and those that don't will settle down to a quiet time.

This is the case with animals and insects, many of whom sleep the winter

away after they have eaten heavily from the autumn harvests. This allows them to reappear fresh and strong to face the struggle of the spring.

During September and October the fruit trees are gathered and any left over fruits leave good pickings for the birds, animals and insects.

The hedgerows are becoming bright with autumn fruits; blackberries can be seen in every stage from bud to berry. Hips and haws add colour and a source of 'harvest' for the wildlife.

Why Do Birds Preen Themselves?

BIRDS preen themselves to clean and waterproof their feathers, to keep them neat and lying smooth and also to maintain their general health. This process starts soon after they are born, when the feathers start to break out of their sheaths. When the parents are out looking for food the young bird spends most of its time combing its feathers with its bill and freeing them from bits of sheath and other blemishes.

As the bird grows into adult life it continues the same process. It uses preen or oil glands which are situated on the back, just in front of the tail. The bird gently bites at the glands and rubs its head against them, spreading the secretion on its feathers. The oil is responsible for keeping the plumage waterproof, keeping it supple and for preserving the bird: insulating qualities. If the bird accidentally swallows this oil no harm is done as the oil is a source of Vitamin D.

Most birds have preen glands and often mix preening with water or dust bathing. You may see ducks dipping their heads under water, flicking their wings and moving their bodies while preening. The duck gets pleasure and fun out of this.

Spate Of Burglaries In Springfield

Dungarvan Garda are following a definite line of enquiry following a spate of burglaries in the residential area of Springfield, Dungarvan.

Six burglaries over a period of ten days has left residents in the estate extremely security conscious. Valued electrical goods and clothing from washing lines were among the items stolen over the past week. Gardaí have recovered some of the missing property which can be inspected at the Garda Sta-

tion, Youghal Road.

During the spate of Springfield burglaries, an ambulance was stolen from the nearby St. Joseph's Hospital and crashed later that night in Western Bay, the estate adjoining Springfield. Gardaí however would not confirm whether the two incidents are related.

They have urged householders in the area to secure their property and to ensure that all doors and windows are securely fastened at night.

Hart Appeals Against Election Posters

The Chairman of Waterford County Council, Lar Hart has appealed to each presidential candidate to refrain from putting up election posters or advertising signs anywhere in the county.

A second adjudication of the litter free status of the county will take place in November and this will be carried out, unannounced, by An Taisce.

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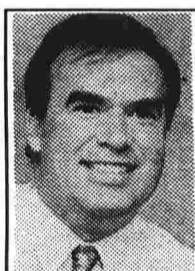
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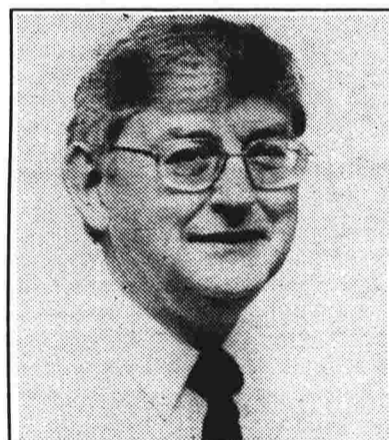
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Cappoquin Tidy Towns Report

The following are the adjudicators' comments (1996 marks in brackets):

OVERALL DEVELOPMENTAL APPROACH 36 (35)

Thank you very much for the very detailed programme of works, maps and the comprehensively completed application form. The Committee is to be very much applauded for their success in raising money for the carrying out of projects and their success in getting the community and public bodies involved. The undertaking of two major projects, the Glenshellane Wood Amenity Scheme and the Twig Bog Development, demonstrate the commitment of the community in Cappoquin.

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT 21 (20)

The town of Cappoquin gives a settled mellow im-

pression. There are many very fine buildings and shop fronts and there is obviously much improving work going on. The Tavern Bar sets a very high standard, a standard that is reflected inside as well as outside. The many very fine stone walls give a wonderful sense of permanence. The Town Square, basking in the sun, creates a nice sense of openness in that part of the town. All the entry roads are tree lined with fine stone walls and make quite a statement.

LANDSCAPING 23 (22)

The landscaping is very satisfactory with many tree-lined roads with beautiful stone walls. The grotto is a most attractive introductory feature to the town, a very pleasant apex between two roads with very nice rose plantings. The Village Square was most pleasing

with its well cared for floral displays. Hanging baskets and floral displays throughout the town gave a festive air. Perhaps the schools on Barracks Street could be encouraged to develop a tree-planting programme in their school grounds. The ESB sub-station though tidy needs tree and shrub planting.

WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES 21 (23)

The location of Cappoquin on the banks of the Blackwater is an area with many woods, trees and tree-lined roads, make it an ideal location for the successful encouragement of wildlife and natural amenities. The carrying out of proposals for the Twig Bog Amenity Scheme and the improvement of the forest amenity at Glenshellane Wood are being observed with interest.

LITTER CONTROL 30 (28)

The Committee must be complimented on the very high level of litter control which has been achieved. The night before the adjudication a great many visitors had been in the town for a road race, but there was absolutely no indication of this influx by the presence of any litter. Congratulations. Very fine looking litter-bins are much in evidence. These, together with the fine lamp standards, give an air of caring to the town.

TIDINESS 12 (11)

It was quite obvious on the day of adjudication that there is a very good maintenance and cleaning regime

in place. The Committee is to be complimented on their success in achieving this.

RESIDENTIAL AREAS 18 (17)

The standard of residential housing in Cappoquin is very high. Many have very pleasant well kept gardens. Of particular note was the terrace overlooking Mount Melleray Road and that opposite the National School. The small houses in Castle Street are charming. Unfortunately, there are some empty houses and a few derelict ones. The Committee is to be applauded for their efforts in endeavouring to overcome this problem.

ROADS, STREETS AND BACK AREAS 23 (23)

All the approach roads are of a very high order. The approach road by Glenshellane Wood is a particularly pleasant tree-lined road with Glenshellane Wood on the left and high banks and trees on the right, making a most attractive entry into the town. Some consideration should be given to easing some minor congestion caused by parking on both sides of the street. Perhaps parking could be restricted to one side of the road only. Even early on a Sunday morning it was difficult to get through the street.

GENERAL IMPRESSION 6 (5)

The general impression of Cappoquin is of a community that cares for its environment and is going to ensure that this environment will be there to hand on to future generations.

Major Catering Exhibition For The South East

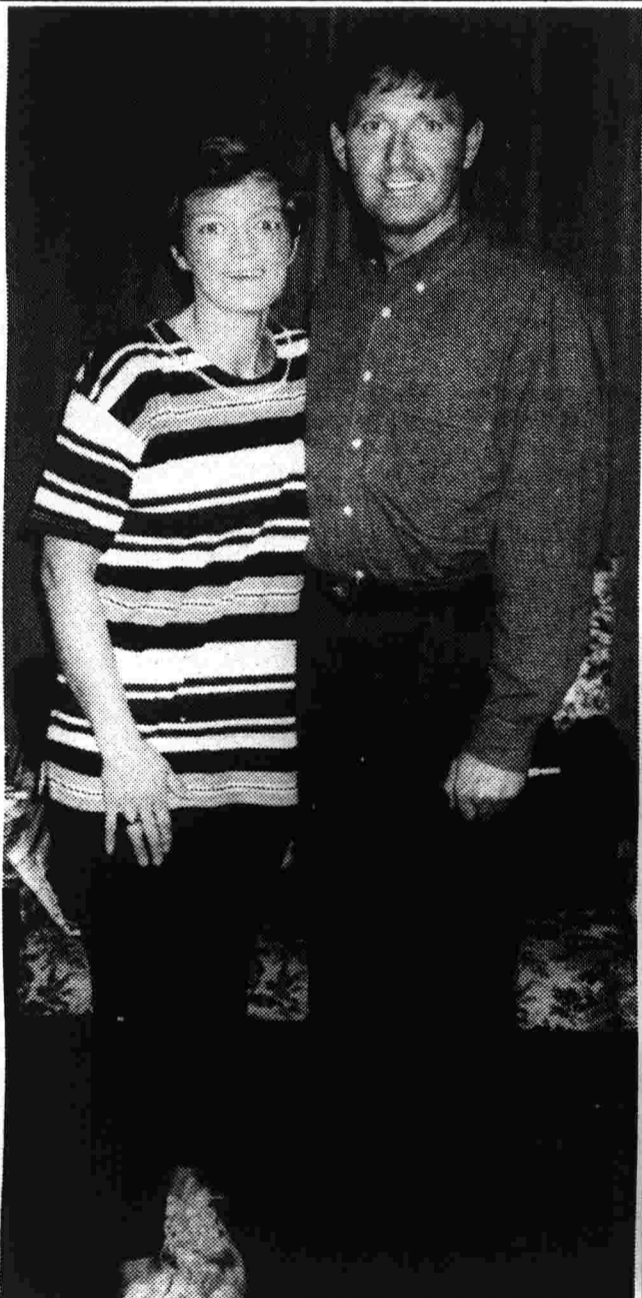

Council Hires Surveillance Operator To Flush Out Litter Bugs

(Continued from Page 1) with a long lens camera. Fines imposed by Judge Michael Pattwell at Youghal Court ranged from £10 to a maximum of £800 with costs. These fines however were imposed under the old Litter Act and legislation under the new Litter Act of July 1997 will see a maximum fine of

£1,500. Persons found guilty under the new Litter Act will also be obliged to pay the cost of the surveillance operator.

Judge Pattwell expressed his own personal abhorrence at dumping and was delighted that the fines are now on the increase.

The surveillance operator will continue to cover the

Clashmore quarries as well as the dump at Dungarvan, Moorefield in Tallow, the civic site in Lismore and parts of Ring/Old Parish where dumping continues to be a problem. Indeed the Council is currently processing a number of prosecutions under the Litter Act for persons caught dumping at the Dungarvan landfill in

Ballinamuck.

Meanwhile two anti-litter supervisors who have the authority to issue on-the-spot fines for littering have now been appointed in the county. Francis Hackett of Villierstown will cover the west of the county while Vivianne Dool of Orchardstown will cover the east.

Dungarvan Anti-Mast Campaign Heats Up

— PUBLIC HEALTH KEY ISSUE SAYS COMMITTEE

Local concerns about the possible health risks associated with microwave mast transmitters have surfaced yet again in Dungarvan following last week's news that Telecom are to proceed with their controversial structure on top of the Avonmore Waterford Foods building in the town centre.

Reaction has been both swift and strong spearheaded by the Committee for a Microwave Mast Free Dungarvan who have declared this week that their campaign against microwave radiation is only beginning.

Committee Secretary, Anne Wyer stressed that the issue at stake is one of public health and the safety of those living in Dungarvan who would be exposed to this radiation.

Speaking to the "Dungarvan Leader" Ms. Wyer, who resides at Georges Court, an area adjoining the proposed mast, declared that organisations such as the South Eastern Health Board, the Environmental Protection Agency, the Health and

Safety Authority and the Department of Health etc. have a duty to protect public health.

"It is time for these bodies to consider the huge body of new research results and to review the discredited IRPA/World Health Organisation standards accordingly," she added.

The creditability of the IRPA which sets the worldwide standards for 'safe' levels of microwave and nuclear radiation, dropped to

an all time low this week. Research results have now shown that the standards set by the IRPA for nuclear radiation are much too high leading to the development of cancers and DNA damage.

"Yet," declared Ms. Wyer, "this body of 'experts' is responsible for setting the limits of the microwave transmitters operating in Dungarvan."

She revealed that a recent

Danish study reported possible cancer following exposure to microwave radiation from transmitters or from mobile phones at 500,000 times lower than that currently allowed.

"The refusal of the planning authorities and the government to consider recent results which show that these microwave levels are much too high is difficult to understand," stated Ms. Wyer.

Presidential Candidates Visit Dungarvan

As the countdown to the Presidential election continues, candidates have covered nearly every corner of the country in their bid to enter Áras An Uachtarán.

Adi Roche who was nominated by the Labour party and supported by Democratic Left and the Greens will pay a flying visit to Co. Waterford tomorrow (Thursday), October 9th.

Ms. Roche will arrive in Dungarvan at 11.25 a.m. where she will meet with the local press. At 11.45 a.m. Ms. Roche will go on a short walkabout in the town before departing for Waterford City at 12 noon.

Meanwhile the Fine Gael candidate Mary Banotti will pay a short visit to Dungarvan next Saturday, October 11th when she will meet with local residents during a walkabout of the town centre at 3.30 p.m.

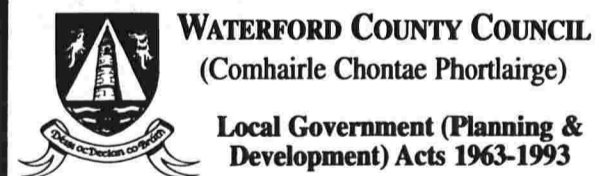

LISMORE CRICKET CLUB NOTES

The Spirit Of The Game

Recently whilst waiting rather apprehensively for my turn to bat, two incidents occurred which set me thinking. What is happening with modern youth and their attitude in sport? The first incident involved the teams in a soccer match playing on the pitch adjacent to the cricket square. Without warning, a melee started which seemed from where I was standing to involve 75% of the players with the hapless referee stuck in the middle trying to restore order.

The second incident involved a group of young teenagers who happened to pass by the outfield during the cricket match. It soon became clear from the mocking comments, in ignorance rather than malice, that these young lads hadn't the first idea of what cricket was about or how it was played. (If you can't understand it, take the mickey out of it). Had they taken the trouble to approach the players at the pavilion and ask how the game was played, their outlook might have been changed.

Cricket is a game where discipline is a must. We have all at times been 'given out' by dubious umpiring decisions or hit by very fast cricket balls but the rule is - keep your temper, no-one else wants it.

The following abridged text comes from a M.C.C. schoolboy cricket manual and parts of it should apply to all team sports involving a ball.

"Cricket is, in a sense, warfare in miniature and a cricket match should be fought out by both sides with all the resources of spirit and technique at their command. At the same time it should always be a recreation, a game to be played not only according to written laws but in harmony with an unwritten code of chivalry and good temper.

A cricket team should feel that they are playing with, as well as against, their opponents. The homeside should remember that they are hosts, the visitors that they are guests and both should realise that the true greatness of the game lies in combat and comradeship combined. Pursued in such a spirit victory should be the object of both teams from the first over of the match. In no other game perhaps is the individual and his team so closely integrated. One man can virtually win a match, not necessarily by technical skill but by intelligence, concentration and character: one man can lose it by a failure in those qualities. Unity of purpose and belief in each other is a tremendous asset in cricket. Nor does any other game expose a player to a more varied or exacting trial. It can be a lonely and formidable experience to walk out, perhaps after an agonising wait, to bat at the crisis of a match possibly to face a fast bowler on a fiery pitch. Formidable too to stand under a high catch knowing that to miss it may cost the game."

I happened to be at the Mardyke last Wednesday week. Hampshire Cricket Club were playing a Cork XI. Among the Hampshire players were two cricket greats Malcolm Marshall, the West Indian fast bowler, one of the fastest in the world in his heyday and England's Robin Smith, both players took the time to sit and talk and share a drink with all who were there. No prima donna status with either of them. Advice was given when asked for and questions answered. Nothing was too much trouble. They were a pleasure to meet as were the other members of the side. This to me is cricket - players, whether county internationals or village green sloggers, meeting and sharing their experiences.

One of the Hampshire players said to me "cricket has given me a good living. When I call it a day, I shall try to put back into the game what it has given me". We need that. How can any up and coming youngster go forward without the help of the old pro? Who knows, perhaps one of those teenagers passing by that afternoon will benefit.

The estimated set-up costs are in the region of £500,000 which includes refurbishing/renovation and outfitting the house. The estimated operation costs for year one are £456,000. So far fundraising has raised £260,000. There are eight fundraising committees working within the three Health Board regions and they are committed to raising a further £150,000 within the next year. A number of projects are planned in the near future, the main one being the Radio-A-Thon. The committee would much appreciate your support.

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Art Of Growing Hardy Shrubs



EARLY COLOUR: Forsythia's vivid yellow says Spring is coming

Ornamental shrubs are more popular today than they have been at any time in the past.

People who live in apartment blocks make up for the lack of a garden by caring for ornamental shrubs on their balconies or indoors.

And people who have just a small yard often choose to add colour and life to their patio with a selection of shrubs in containers.

But for the serious gardener the growing of ornamental shrubs can be a very satisfying and rewarding hobby.

Many ornamental shrubs are tender plants which prefer sheltered sites or dry or moist shade. But others can be hardy and thrive even in the most exposed conditions.

These hardy shrubs are perhaps the best kind for the beginner to grow.

But because they are hardy does not mean they cannot be beautiful and some of the best of the blooming shrubs can thrive in bleak and windy sites, although some are not suitable for coastal areas.

However it is important to make sure you have the right kind of soil and it is important to make heavy soils more open and free draining.

Many shrubs like moist soil types while broom and lavender thrive on well-drained soils. Rhododendrons and other Ericaceous plants prefer acid soil while others such as Hypericum and Philadelphus do well on alkaline soils.

Shrubs can be planted in boxes or containers or in open ground. Many gardeners like to design a shrub garden in advance. But remember, small shrubs can grow into large bushes.

Autumn is the main period for planting shrubs in containers but it is important to ensure you select a container that is the right size for the plant.

Established shrubs are easy to care for and need watering only during periods of prolonged drought. But most shrubs do benefit from regular applications of organic or inorganic fertilizer.

Flowering shrubs including Rhododendron and Lilac benefit if fading flowerheads are promptly removed. Removing old flowers diverts energy into growth and improves flowering potential for the next season.

Aglish Tidy Towns Report

Aglish picked up an extra four points in the Tidy Towns competition this year, scoring a total of 196 out of 300. The following is the adjudicators report from July 11. Last year's marks in brackets.

OVERALL DEVELOPMENTAL APPROACH 26 (25) MAX. 50

Thank you for a comprehensively filled in application form and map. The committee is to be commended for their efforts in raising money for projects and for their liaison with FAS and the County Council. Aglish is a very attractive town. The approaching roads have fine stone walls and well tended earthen banks. The wall across from the Co-op has been rebuilt and also some new hedging has been planted. Breakwater slabs have been put in the stream in the centre of the village. The addition of new litter bins is an advantage. The removal of the pole and multiple wires, visible on entering the village, should be part of future plans.

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT 29 (29) MAX. 40

The school, church and Garda Station are all well presented. There are many fine houses and gardens, all extremely well kept and pre-

sented. The approach roads have excellent stone walls and earthen banks that are well tended including the verges.

LANDSCAPING 26 (26) MAX. 40

Quite an effect has been created by the floral displays, particularly on the approach roads from Villierstown and also at the v-junction close to the Agricultural Stores. The road where the Church and School are is extremely pleasant and a wonderful panorama of the surrounding countryside can be got from there. It would be pleasant if future development did not take place on that side of this road so that this view can be maintained. Future planting should reflect the surrounding countryside by using similar trees and avoid variegated trees which create a discordant note.

WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES 17 (17) MAX. 30

Aglish is well situated to make the most of wild life and natural amenities and in addition they have put bird nesting boxes in the trees on Clashmore Road. The old graveyard with its very fine stone walls, is also a very important habitat.

LITTER CONTROL 31 (30) MAX. 40

Litter management is ex-

cellent throughout and there are ample litter bins in evidence. The pupils of the local school are to be congratulated on their efforts.

TIDINESS 15 (15) MAX. 20

The village has an air of care and tidiness. The black and white kerbing around the triangular piece of ground give a very crisp appearance. The ESB and lighting pole with nine wires from it, visible as one comes into the village, disfigures this entrance. Its removal should form part of the overall development approach.

RESIDENTIAL AREAS 20 (19) MAX. 30

Many excellent houses and gardens were noted. On the whole the residential areas create a very good impression.

ROADS, STREET AND BACK AREAS 26 (26) MAX. 40

All the roads are very pleasant. The approach roads with fine stone walls and well kept earthen banks are excellent. The roads within the village are well tended and much enhanced by the use of pots and planting beds. The signage which one sees on leaving the village on the Clashmore Road, should be reconsidered. Perhaps it should be higher up, as it is hidden by the hedge. Also some rearrangement of the finger signs should be undertaken as they are quite difficult to read.

GENERAL IMPRESSION 6 (5) MAX. 10

This is a village of charm and vitality. The interest and care of the community is very obvious, creating a sense of entity.

Tillage: COST CUTTING

There are only two ways to improve incomes on tillage farms. Increase output and/or cut costs. Irish cereal yields are very high by international standards: While the quest for increased yields will continue, the fall in grain prices is forcing cereal farmers to closely examine costs and to pare costs to an absolute minimum.

A new long-term experiment at Oak Park is comparing high-input 'insurance' type tillage farming to a lower input 'decision-based' approach. The trial is now in its third year and the indications, at this stage, are that the reduced input approach is giving a lower yield but a higher margin/acre. This is most apparent with Winter Wheat and less apparent in Winter Barley. A decision based approach requires higher level of management and each cost component needs to be looked at separately.

SEED

There is definitely scope to make a small saving on seed especially with winter wheat. Where soil conditions and seed quality are good, seeding rate can safely be reduced to 125-150 kg/ha (8-10 stone/acre) during October. Reduced seeding rate has the added advantage of reduced disease pressure and risk of lodging. Increase the rate for later sowings or where conventional seed drills give rise to uneven sowing depth.

FERTILISER

There is also definite scope to cut fertiliser costs. Many tillage soils have high P and K levels and do not require any basal fertiliser. Have your soils tested.

On the nitrogen front, many farmers use higher levels than those recommended by Teagasc. This may improve the appearance of the crop and cover up for other problems, but it does not pay.

These rates should be adjusted downwards on rotations closer to permanent pasture.

HERBICIDE

A small number of weeds will not reduce yield and will not significantly affect the weed seedbank in a field. Half-rate herbicides have consistently given satisfactory results in trials at Oak Park provided the timing is right and depending on the weed floral present. Certain weeds such as Wild Oats and Cleavers have a much greater effect on yield than others. With some herbicides the use of adjuvants will facilitate reduced rates. Good management and spraying precision are required but savings on weed control are possible.

Dairy

PLAN FOR SPRING GRASS NOW

- The last rotation should start between 6th and 12th October, depending on location.
- That means cows or any stock should not spend more than 1 to 2 days in each paddock or field.
- Too many farmers let cows and cattle run over each field for a week or more to clean off the strong grass around.
- Therefore, the paddock grazed on the 10th October (approx.) will not be grazed again until the end of February/early March.
- It is obvious these paddocks should be the driest and hopefully near the milking parlour.
- To have a good chance of having early grass, these fields should have perennial Ryegrass.

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Dungarvan Traffic To Go One-Way In New Year

will be monitored by Council officials on a regular basis and if necessary, changes will be made should problems arise.

As can be seen from the enclosed sketch prepared by Town Engineer, Ray O'Dwyer, traffic on O'Connell Street will only be allowed to travel one-way from the junction at Brigid's Terrace towards Grattan Square. Western Terrace and Keating Street will also operate one-way down on to O'Connell Street while traffic at Main Street will only be allowed to travel one way towards Dungarvan Library.

The traffic flow in the Square itself will also be changed to create a more circular movement. Drivers will not be allowed to turn left at M. J. Curran's corner, instead they will use the filter lane at the traffic lights to travel through the Square to turn left in front of the Bank of Ireland and back across in front of Tom Currans, Pughs etc.

Friary Street will remain two-way to cater for Scanlan's Yard car park while Church Street will operate a one-way system with traffic travelling up in the Mercy Convent direction. In addition a single yellow line will

be placed along the Convent side of Church Street to ease congestion caused by parking on both sides of the street.

Parking will also be prohibited on the church side of Chapel Street leading down to Quanns. Mary Street, Davitt's Quay, Emmet Street and T. F. Meagher Street will all continue to operate on a two-way traffic system.

PARKING CHANGES

The first 30 mins. of parking, which has long been an attractive feature for visitors to Dungarvan, will continue to be free although Mr. Connolly warned that this

"accommodation" will be rigorously enforced and any vehicles found parked in excess of half an hour without displaying a valid parking disc will be issued with a parking ticket. The free half hour applies to on-street car parking only and will not apply in the Council operated car parks.

Described by Mr. Connolly as one of the busiest shopping days in town, free parking will no longer be allowed on Thursday afternoons. Thursday was traditionally a half-day in Dungarvan when most shops closed at 1 p.m. This is no longer the case how-

ever and many local industries now pay their staff on Thursdays.

As agreed by the Council last year, the fee for parking discs will be increased to 30p per hour. Another measure which will come into effect next January is the introduction of a residents parking permit at £20 per annum. These permits will only apply to disc parking areas and will enable residents to park their car on their own street throughout the year.

With regard to the development of a multi-storey car park at Scanlan's Yard, the Council will continue discussions for the provision of same with potential developers of the Mulcahy/Ducey site at Main Street.

Mr. Connolly is also examining the possibility of cordoning off a number of car parking spaces in Scanlan's Yard which would cater for people who wish to avail of a car parking space on a long term basis. The annual fee for such a parking space would be approx. £250.

Recognising the urgent need for additional car parking spaces in the town, Mr. Connolly is currently involved in discussions for the

purchase of property at Lower Main Street at the rear of the library which could provide 35 extra parking spaces. The Council is also in the process of acquiring land adjacent to the Castle where a further 20 spaces may be provided.

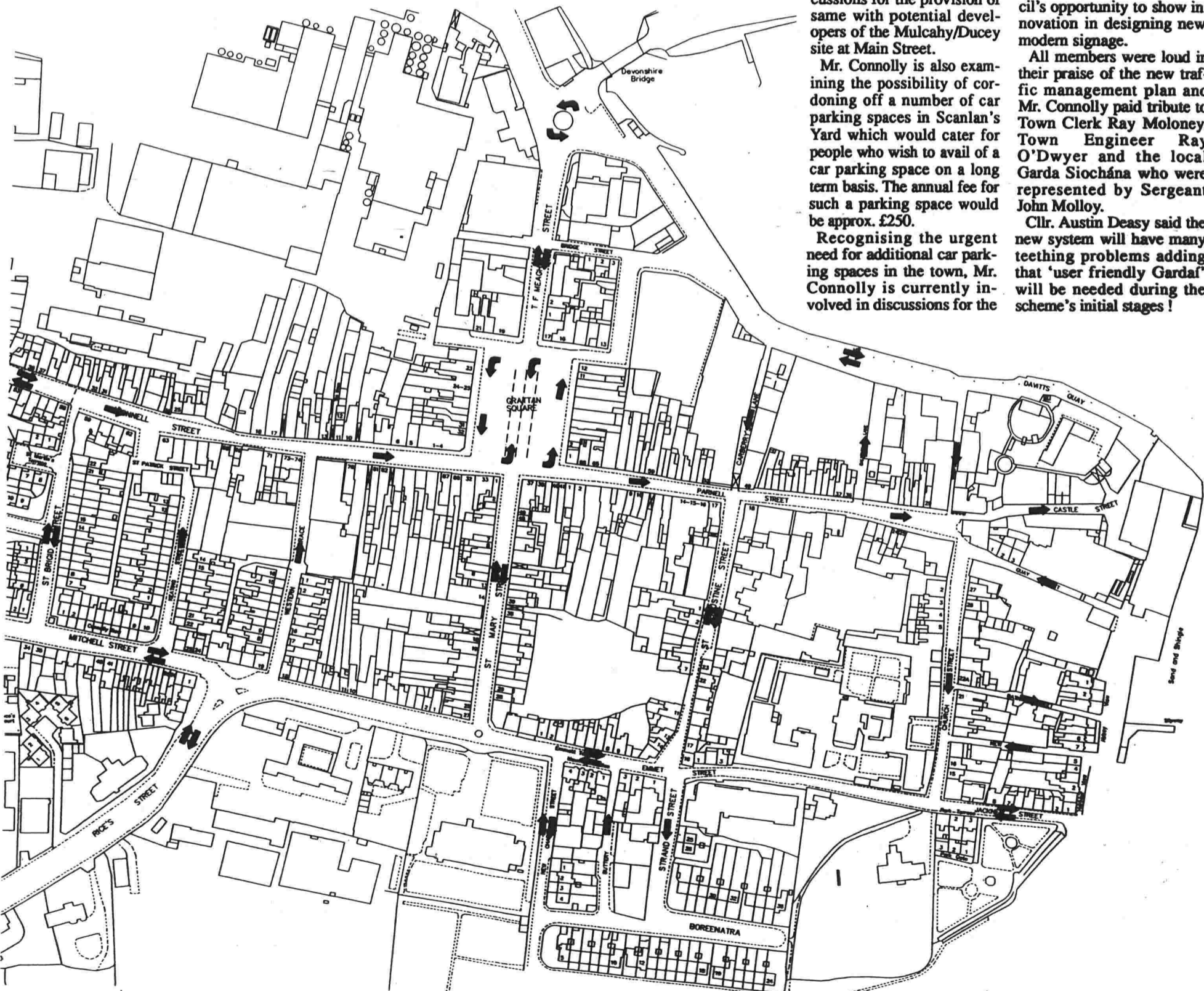
OVERKILL ON SIGNS

Speaking at last Monday's special U.D.C. meeting, Cllr. Billy Kyne warned of a possible overkill on signs and said now is the Council's opportunity to show innovation in designing new, modern signage.

All members were loud in their praise of the new traffic management plan and Mr. Connolly paid tribute to Town Clerk Ray Moloney, Town Engineer Ray O'Dwyer and the local Garda Siochána who were represented by Sergeant John Molloy.

Cllr. Austin Deasy said the new system will have many teething problems adding that 'user friendly Gardai' will be needed during the scheme's initial stages!

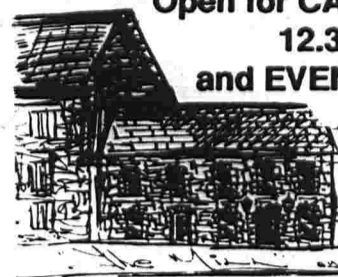

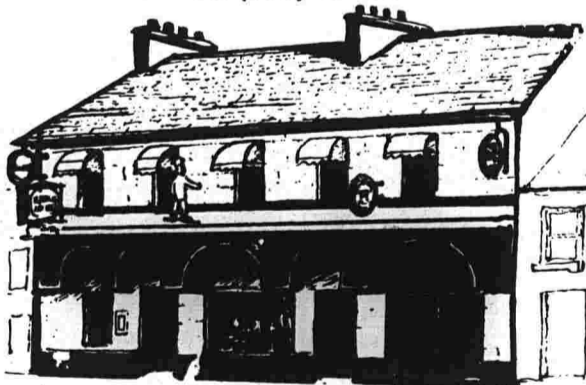

Family health

Q. A friend of mine was in a bad accident recently and was nearly killed. He spent a lot of time in hospital recovering. While he has recovered well physically from the accident, he can't seem to put it behind him. His doctor has diagnosed him as suffering from P.T.S.D. and has referred him to a psychiatrist for further treatment. He is baffled as to what this condition is. Could you please explain what it is and what is the treatment for it?

A. P.T.S.D. are the initials for Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. This disorder happens to a person when they experience a sudden and unexpected stressful event that is outside their normal range of experiences and which would be distressing for anyone. These stressful events could

be natural, for example earthquakes, fires, floods etc., or they could be man-made, for example wars, bad car crashes etc. Many people, involved in the Stardust fire in Dublin in 1980 suffered from this condition, as did many soldiers involved in the Vietnam. In the heat of the disaster people usually

experience intense fear and an intense desire to escape from the situation, but rarely panic. Others may become dazed and helpless and wander around aimlessly for hours or days, even if they are brought to safety. After the disaster many are preoccupied with the disaster and how close they have come to death, and are guilty about surviving when others have died. They may experience uncontrollable flashbacks which are very

intrusive and disturbing. A sudden sound associated with the incident may bring on a flashback. This leads the victims to avoid situations where they may be reminded of the disaster and they become withdrawn and isolated. Many feel vulnerable and frightened that it may happen again and also they feel angry that such a senseless event occurred. It is not only the victims of the disaster that have these experiences; rescuers and the relatives of victims that died may also be affected. The diagnosis of P.T.S.D. depends on 1. being involved in a disaster that is outside the range of human living; 2. recalling the event in vivid dreams or flashbacks, usually as a

result of hearing, seeing or indeed smelling something that triggers off the memory of the event; 3. avoidance of places and events that would trigger a flashback of the disaster, leading to a withdrawal from normal life, and 4. being in a more aroused state than before the disaster, having difficulty sleeping, being more irritable than previously, having outbursts of anger, and difficulty concentrating. The mainstay of treatment for P.T.S.D. is counselling starting as soon as possible after the disaster and it may have to continue for some time. If the person gets depressed they will need antidepressants as well.

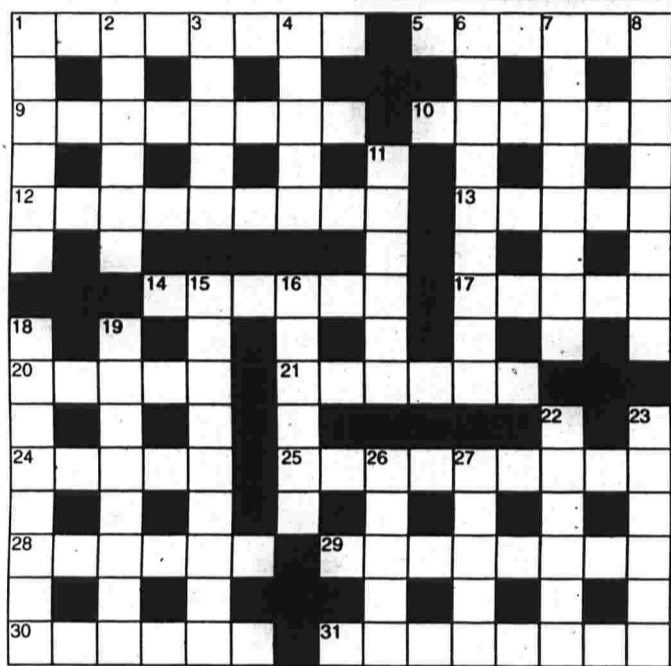

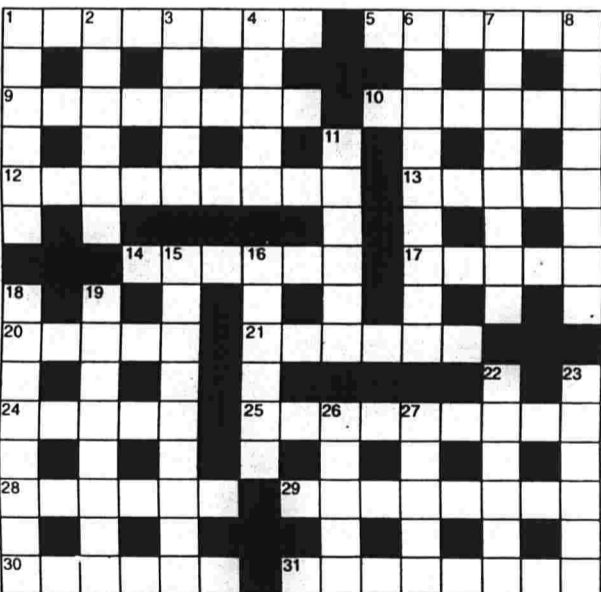

Tuna Tuscany Style

Preparation: 5 mins.

Cooking: 10 mins

Serves 4.

30ml (2 tbsp) olive oil
1 large onion, peeled and thinly sliced
210g (7 1/2 oz) can red kidney beans

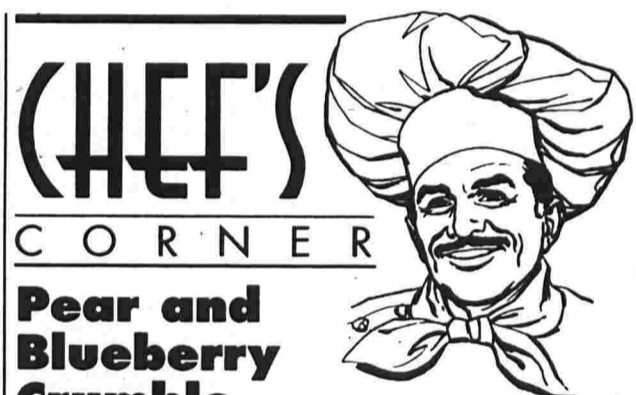
226g (8 oz) can butter beans
283g (10 oz) can broad beans
396g (14 oz) can tuna in brine
396g (14 oz) can passata
100g (4 oz) cherry tomatoes, halved
30ml (2 tbsp) fresh, chopped herbs (eg basil, oregano, or parsley)
50g (2 oz) black olives, pitted

Freshly ground black pepper

METHOD: Heat the oil in a large pan and gently saute the onion for 5 mins, or until soft and transparent. Drain all beans, rinse thoroughly, then add to the pan and mix well. Drain tuna, break into large chunks, then add to pan together with passata, tomatoes, 1 tbsp of fresh herbs and the pitted black olives. Season with pepper to taste. Heat the mixture through gently, stirring occasionally until hot, then sprinkle with remaining herbs. Serve with warm garlic bread or, for a more substantial meal, with jacket potatoes and a green salad.

of colds and coughs. It relieves nervous tension and other stress related problems. Perfumes, toiletries and soaps may also contain rosewood oil and it is also used in alcoholic and soft drinks and some food. Rosewood is very mild and safe to use.



Pear and Blueberry Crumble

Preparation: 20 minutes.
Cooking: approx. 40 minutes. Serves: 6.

knob of butter
50g/2 Oz demerara sugar
1/2 tsp cinnamon
2 tbsp clear honey
700g/1 1/2 lbs pears, halved, cored and thinly sliced
225g/8 oz blueberries
TOPPING
175g/6 oz plain flour
100g/4 oz butter
75g/3 oz demerara sugar
50g/2 oz ground almonds
cream to serve

METHOD: Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas Mark 6. Using a knob of butter, grease a 1.2 litre/2 pt oven-proof pie dish. Place the sugar, cinnamon, honey and 2 tbsp water in a pan.

Heat gently until the sugar dissolves. Add the pears. Gently bring to the boil, reduce the heat and simmer for 10 minutes until the pears are just tender. Add the blueberries. Meanwhile, sift the flour into a large mixing bowl. Add the butter and rub into the flour with your fingertips until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumb-crumbs. To speed up this process, use a food processor. Stir in the sugar and almonds. Spoon the pears and blueberries (juices as well) into the prepared dish and top with the crumble mixture. Bake for 25-30 minutes until the topping is golden and crisp. Serve the crumble hot or cold with cream.

— HELP SUPPORT CANCER RESEARCH

During the month of October thousands of people in towns and villages all over Ireland will be running in the Irish Cancer Society's nationwide Terry Fox Run for Cancer Research. This year's events will take place in over sixty locations countrywide with the lone Waterford run being held in Dungarvan on Sunday week, October 19.

Terry Fox, a young Canadian who had his leg amputated because of cancer, died in 1981 during his famous attempt to run across Canada to raise funds for cancer research. Today, annual runs are held in fifty-eight countries worldwide, making the Terry Fox Run the world's single biggest fundraising event for cancer research. The Irish Cancer Society, the major funder of cancer re-

search in Ireland, introduced the run in this country in 1993 and to-date the event has raised over £500,000 for Irish Cancer projects.

Cancer Research Advancement Board, stressed the contribution Irish Cancer researchers are making to the worldwide fight against cancer.

"Over the years, Ireland has developed a strong international reputation for its standards of medical research. We are making steady headway. Many cancers, previously incurable, can now be cured in the majority of cases, e.g. leukaemia, lymphomas, testicular cancer, bone tumours and a variety of cancers that affect children. In Ireland, 19,000 people develop cancer each year. Cancer research is paying off in better treatments, better prevention and brighter prospects for many people with the disease," he said.

TERRY FOX AND THE MARATHON OF HOPE
Terry Fox knew first hand how great the need for cancer research was. At eighteen years of age his right leg had been amputated above the knee as a result of bone cancer. It was at this time and during the treatment that followed, Terry saw the pain and despair of others and he knew he wanted to do something about it.

Before Terry started his Marathon of Hope on April 12, 1980 in St. John's, Newfoundland, he had run over 3000 miles in training. After dipping his foot in the Atlantic Ocean, Terry started on a journey that would take him through six provinces. For the next 143 days he ran an average of 26 miles a day before he had to stop just outside Thunder Bay, Ontario on September 1, 1980. The cancer had spread to his lungs. Long before that day, Terry had captured the hearts and imagination of the nation — he had become a Canadian hero.

Terry Fox died on June 28, 1981, one month before his 23rd birthday. He left us with a legacy of hope that continues to inspire so many today.

The Irish Society tells us that research advances do not come in a great leap forward. The problem of cancer can be

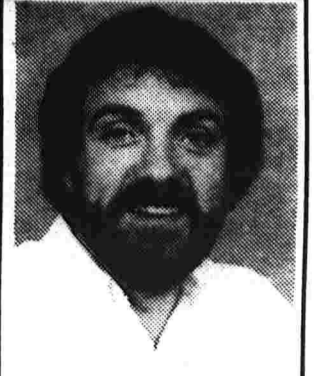

Waterford pipped Laois in the Senior decider. On that occasion they sealed victory with a late goal from a penalty and stepped up into senior ranks. What has happened since borders on fairytales.

After a big defeat by Kerry in the '93 semi-final, they reached the final 12 months later and Sunday is their fourth consecutive year to trot out in Croke Park on All-Ireland Final day. They suffered a defeat in '94 and '95 both at the hands of Waterford but bounced back last year to claim the Brendan Martin Cup after a replay victory over Laois.

Many teams would have given up after the setback suffered by Monaghan but it is to the credit of the

northern side that they battled on and last year got their just reward. Their team is possibly stronger this year with three new players all under 16 performing outstandingly well so far.

Waterford and Monaghan have met three times in 1997. In a league clash in Dublin last March, Waterford had a 10 pt. victory but it would be foolish to read anything into that game because both sides were understrength. On July 7th they clashed in the League Final in Ballinasloe. The game ended in a draw but Waterford were clearly a better side.

In the replay Monaghan turned in a super first half and playing with the wind led by 18 pts. at half-time.

Waterford fought back to trail by 2 pts. with 3 mins. to go when they had what seemed like a perfectly good goal disallowed. Monaghan claimed the title by 5 pts.

However that's three months ago and whether it's of any significance or not, remains to be seen. Both teams are now much fitter. Waterford will be hoping that their Croke Park record will be worth something, 5 visits and 5 wins including 4 senior titles. In contrast Monaghan's record reads 4 senior finals, 2 defeats, 1 draw and 1 win.

However Monaghan will readily point out that they are the team of the moment - league and championship winners. Mairead Kelly, Brenda McAnespie, Catriona Brady, Jenny Greenan, Linda Farrelly, Angela 'Baby' Larkin and Margaret Kearns are all top class footballers and given half a chance could destroy any team. However Waterford will be wondering how a 16 year old goalkeeper, Martina Grey will react to Croke Park. No doubt an early goal could greatly help the Waterford cause. There is a huge difference between a League Final in Ballinasloe in front of 1,000 spectators and an All-Ireland Final with the eyes of the nation on her. Likewise Edel Byrne and Niamh Kindlan, stars of that League triumph, are both under 16.

Waterford's record in the nineties is second to none 4 senior titles, 4 minor, 5 under 16, 2 league and 6 club titles has propelled

the Decies girls to the top of the honours list in all grades. Thirty successes in 34 finals since 1985 speaks for itself. That's the tradition that Waterford carry with them. Hopefully it will count for something.

This year's preparation began on Sunday, February 9th indoors at the Friary College and the ground work was done at Clonea Strand, Fraher Field and the Mill Field, Ballymacarby. Games were played at Cappoquin, Carlow, Ballylinden (Laois), Camolin (Wexford), Clondalkin (Dublin), Walsh Park (Waterford), Gracefield (Offaly), Fraher Field (Dungarvan), Ballinasloe (twice), Ennis, Navan, Lismore and Ballybodin (Dublin).

When Waterford take the field at Croke Park, it will be their 90th session this year. Annalisa Crotty leads the way having been present on 86 occasions and this team has certainly put in the effort. If the performance matches the preparation, then the Brendan Martin Cup could well be crossing the Suir again.

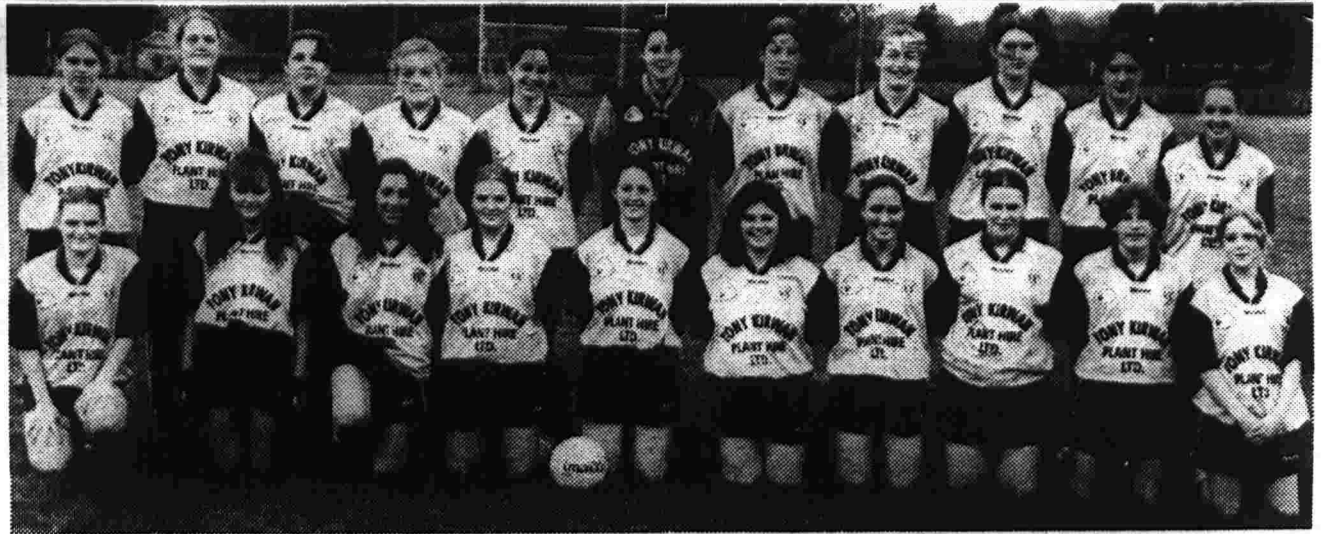

The 1998 odds for the hurling show that Galway are favourites at 4-1, Clare are second at 9-2, Tipperary are at 5-1 with Kilkenny and Wexford being quoted at 6-1, Limerick and Offaly are both on 8-1 and Cork are at odds of 10-1, Waterford are on 20-1, Dublin 25-1, Antrim 33-1 and Down at 50-1.

In football Waterford are not quoted. Dublin, Meath and Kerry are joint favourites at 6-1. A total of 20 counties are listed, some with very generous odds, going out to Fermanagh at 66-1.

SENIOR FOOTBALL COUNTY FINAL

Nire Capture Third Co. Title In Disappointing Final At Fraher Field

NIRE 1-8 DUNGARVAN 0-4

Very few among the 4,000 crowd who turned up at Fraher Field on Sunday would agree that this was a good County Final between the Nire and Dungarvan and coming out of the ground, people with whom I spoke described it as a pale shadow of what the same teams produced back in 1993 at the Cappoquin County Final. It was, I thought, in keeping with the disappointing standard of games all through the championship this year, when the number of top class matches were few and far between.

But it was a final, a great glamour occasion with all the usual embellishments and there were the moments of excitement to be enjoyed but certainly not enough to describe it as a memorable occasion.

After a great Minor County Final, the expectations were high and when the teams paraded behind the Dungarvan Brass Band,

there was a tremendous 'buzz' about the grounds as the crowd, who paid almost £12,000 at the gates, settled in for an expected thriller. It might have been any of the other 13 or 14 games in the championship as far as the patrons were concerned.

This is not to say that it wasn't contested to the very limit by the players on both sides and the quality of the game will make very little difference to the Nire who deservedly picked up their third title in just four years and it will make very little difference to Dungarvan either as to be realistic, when you lose, it does not matter whether you lost a good one or a poor one. There is no consolation in being recorded as the runners-up.

Patrons were at a loss in knowing why the final failed to ignite into the ex-

pected rip-roaring contest. Maybe it was because the first half produced only 6 pts. in all three from frees and three from play. The Nire failed to kick over a point for the first 17 mins. and Dungarvan, having scored two early points, didn't score again for the next 16 mins. of the first half and for a further 21 mins. into the second half. The game needed an early Dungarvan goal to bring the match to life in the second half but despite great efforts this did not happen.

Anyway the result means that the Nire are back as county champions and after a week of celebrating, they will begin to gear themselves for the Munster Club Championship game against Castlehaven in two weeks time. They wanted to win a title in the Shandon field - it

had been a lifelong ambition and now it has been achieved and judging by the post-match celebrations around the presentation area, this one is something special. They were delighted to have won and it was clearly shown on the faces of their huge support.

Dungarvan will naturally be very disappointed. They were really great county champions for almost four seasons and brought pride and glory to the club. With that sort of record it is tough, after reaching a county final to have to give best to their opponents. We have not seen the last of Dungarvan - not by a long stretch - but some replacements are needed before they take over leadership again in the county.

PLAY

There was no breeze of any consequence and the final started with Dungarvan playing into the country goal. They mounted an early attack and were awarded a first minute free which John Power converted.

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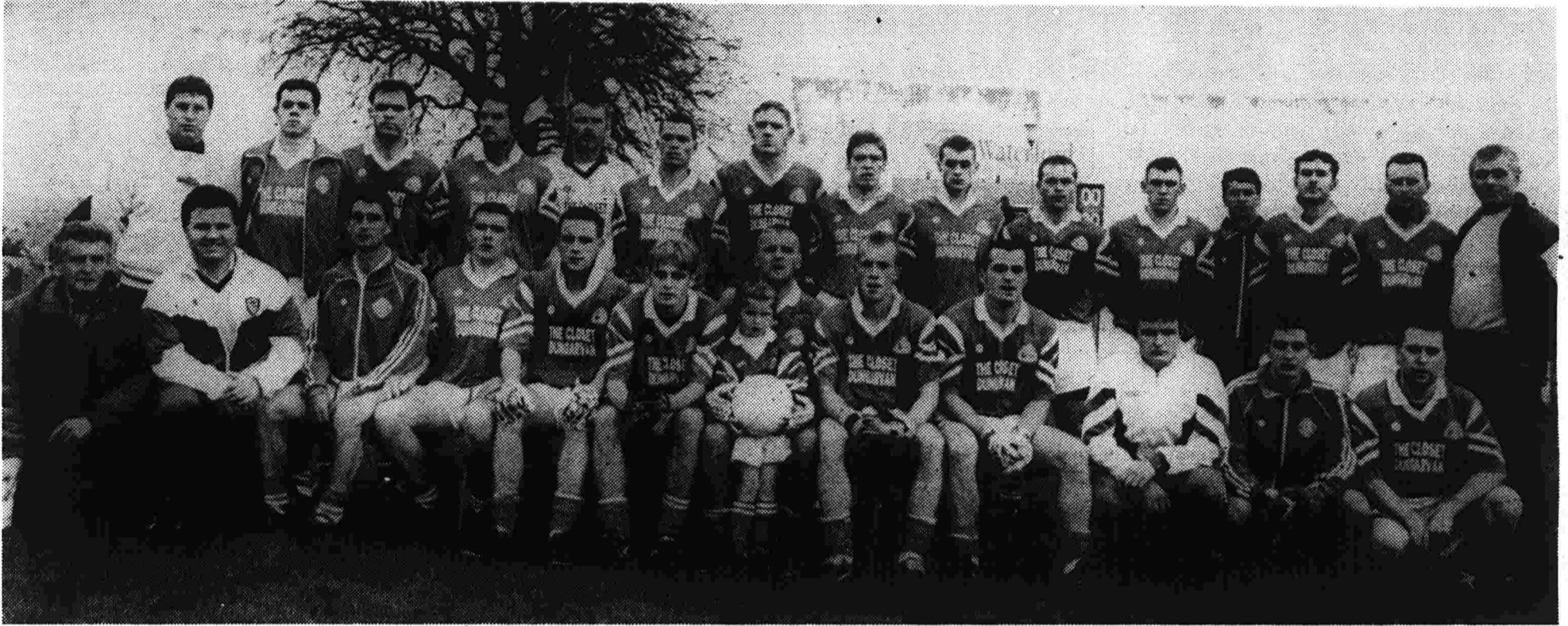

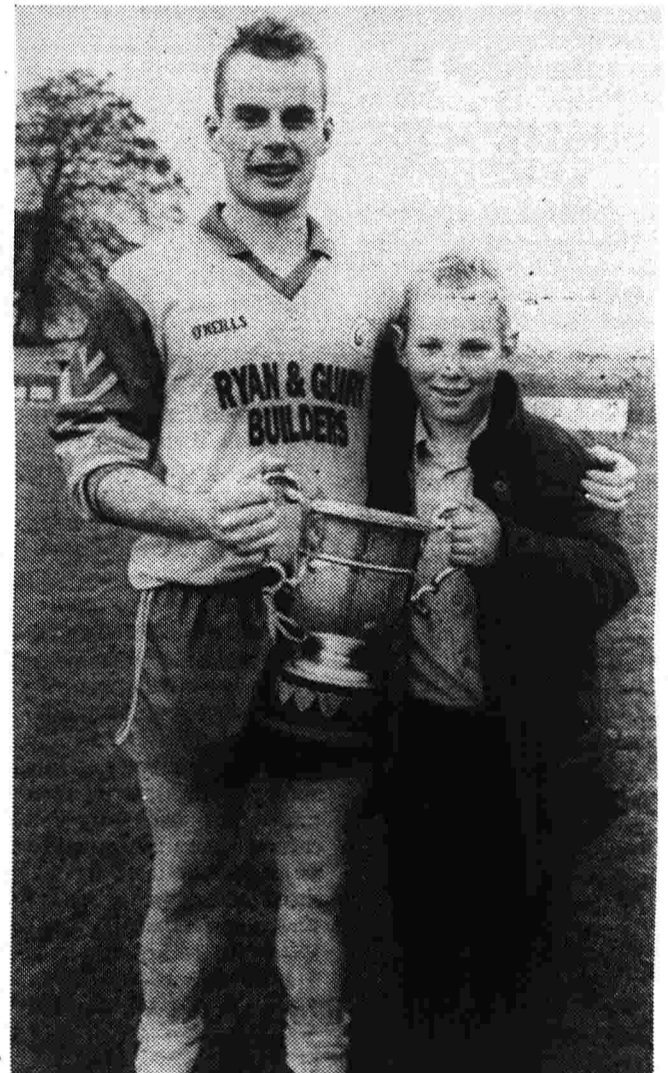

MINOR FOOTBALL COUNTY FINAL

Ardmore Take Title In Style

ARDMORE 2-8 RATHGORMACK 0-10

Ardmore bridged a 31 year gap when they took the Minor Football County title in real style at Fraher Field on Sunday last. Rathgormack were very worthy representatives of their division and made a very determined bid to deny Ardmore a long deserved county title but on this occasion their best was not good enough as Ardmore, having built up a two goal half-time advantage, were able to withstand enormous pressure in the final 10 mins. of an exciting and very entertaining county final.

Both teams played some splendid football and the standard could be compared with the best that we have seen in this grade for some years and this must augur well for the future of both clubs. The result will be particularly pleasing for Ardmore who, only a week previously, won the Western Intermediate football title and are currently preparing for the county final in that grade.

There was a very big crowd in the field before the start of this game which

indicated strong support from both areas represented in the game. They were given a lot to cheer about as the final had many exciting moments and several passages of good football. The second half saw a high quality contest with Rathgormack scoring 5 pts. as against four for Ardmore and seven of the nine scores coming from play.

PLAY

The game was 4 mins. old when Paul Power kicked over a 30 yds. free to give the eastern champions an early lead. Another 4 mins. went by before Wayne Hennessey sent a shot over the bar to equalise. And then another 4 mins. passed before corner forward James O'Neill kicked home a great goal to give Ardmore a badly needed boost as they obviously had not settled at this stage.

For the next 15 mins. Ardmore were completely on top and published their superiority on the scoreboard with points by Richie Hennessey, James O'Donnell, James O'Neill and a great opportunist goal by Declan Lenane in the 24th min. It was now 2-4 to 0-1 and with a 9 pts. lead and no wind to worry about, it seemed as if Rathgormack were going to be swamped. But those of

us who were thinking in this light were given a rude awakening when the eastern champions hit back to recover control of the match and score 3 pts. without reply in the final 5 mins. of this half. It was 2-4 to 0-4 when they broke for the interval.

SECOND HALF

Rathgormack continued where they left off at the end of the first half and had points by Edmund Hogan and Paul Power from play to reduce the gap and warn Ardmore that the contest was far from over. Whether or not it was because they were frightened into action or had shaken off any bit of overconfidence that may have crept in at half-time, Ardmore now began to hit back and the resurgence came in the form of points scored by Seamus Prendergast in the 43rd min. (they were now 20 mins. without a score), Declan Lenane in the 47th, Seamus again in the 49th from a '45' and Wayne Hennessey for the western champions final score of the final in the 50th min. It was now 2-8 to 0-6 and the result looked safe as far as Ardmore were concerned but here again the spirit of Rathgormack had not been reckoned with and back they came with a

vengeance' and putting the leaders under fierce pressure, as they had done in the closing stages of the first half, they sent over 4 pts. without reply. Aidan Power in the 54th, Paul Power in the 57th, Aidan Power in the 59th and Martin Cahill in the 60th.

The obvious joy and jubilation which followed the final whistle told it all for Ardmore whose players had not been born when their fathers (or most of them) won the club's other minor title in 1966.

County Chairman P. J. Ryan presented the trophy to team captain John Conway who responded delightfully before the team did a lap of honour in salute to their supporters.

After such a good match winning display, it would be unfair and invidious to start naming players who were outstanding as every player on the Ardmore side from goalkeeper Damien Lenane (who brought off some great saves) right up to corner forward James O'Neill, played his part in a great victory for a club that is obviously going from strength to strength on the football scene, thanks to the splendid attention given at juvenile level.

Also for Rathgormack, it was a great and very commendable team effort and while they may consider themselves as having been unlucky to have lost by 4 pts., they did contribute their share to a splendid minor final but were forced to give best to their better opponents on the day.
