Multi-Million Pound County Hall For Dungarvan

Even the local authority is getting in on the act with exciting proposals for a £3.5m County Hall to be located beside the existing Motor Tax Office at Davitt's Quay on the site of the former fire brigade building.



KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

I am concerned that my family have access to my money to pay for my burial when I die. What should I

ANSWER

There are a number of ways you can ensure this. You can buy Savings Certificates from An Post and instruct them to pay your nominee on your death. If you have a Life/Burial Insurance Policy you could name a member of your family as beneficiary. You could have a joint account with a member of your family provided that the amount in the account (s) does not exceed £5,000. This ceiling does not apply to monies which have been held in the joint names of a deceased and his/her surviving spouse.

You should of course make a Will and have someone named as Executor. You should inform that person where the Will is kept and about your assets.

The Revenue Commissioners have a comprehensive guide "V/hat to do about tax when someone dies" which should be required reading for personal representatives/Executors of Wills. It also contains useful telephone numbers and addresses. It can be obtained free by ringing 01-8780100. The Revenue Commissioners have a range of leaflets on all aspects of tax such as Medical Expenses Relief, Tax Exemption, Inheritance Tax, Probate Tax, Tax Relief on Home Alarms, etc., all available at the above telephone num-

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

ook Out For

Shrews A Mice, shrews and rats are everywhere in autumn. At this time of year, many shrews are found lying dead by the roadside.

There are three sorts of shrews in these islands — the common shrew, pygmy shrew (our smallest animal), and the water shrew.

It is usually the common shrew we find dead by the road. Shrews have a very short life - fifteen months at the maximum and in the autumn mouse and harvest mouse. We also

they have reached the end of their life span.

Most animals creep away to die in a secluded spot, but the shrew does the opposite. If you find one dead at this time of year, it will almost certainly have died a natural death.

We have two sorts of rat, the brown and the black rat - and three mice. the house mouse, long-tailed field

have voles, often mistaken for mice or rats - the banks vole, the short-

tailed vole and the water vole. Finally, there is the dormouse. Of these mice and voles there are all sorts of local varieties, some of which are sometimes considered to be separate species.

It is because rats and mice are nocturnal that you see them so rarely, but if you examine the fruits of autumn they will show traces of night feeding. A nut with a bevel edged hole in the shell and the contents extracted shows mice have been at work.

Moving Pictures

The first cameras took pictures very slowly. To make a film pictures were taken seconds after each other a film pictures were taken seconds after each other and joined. As the years developed cameras became faster at taking photos. Two men, then made a camera which was light enough to carry about. It took photographs on rolls of film, so people made news films. One of the first Hollywood epic films lasted for three-and-a-half hours. Hundreds of people had parts in it. The story line attached to early films were very simple and usually had happy endings. A lot of the first comedy films starred the Keystone Kops. The film was speeded up to make them seem to move faster. When the first cinemas opened, they often used to pay a person to play the plano during a film. If the film got exciting, so did the music. There was one problem with the first talking pictures - they didn't know where to put the micropictures - they didn't know where to put the micro phones. Actors found microphones hard to use at first. Some of the first coloured pictures were cartoons - Micky Mouse - created by Walt Disney. The first television sets made had a tiny flickering picture. You had to sit right up at the screen to see it and only one person could watch. The electronic camera takes much better pictures than the mechan-ical one. The first television pictures were very patchy.

ATGWU Officer Hits **Back At Media Job**

Loss Reports

Speculative job loss figures within the newly merged Avonmore Waterford Group, as reported in the national media last week, have sparked local concerns about the future viability of the Dungarvan and Kilmeaden factories.

Continued media 'leaks' and so called 'informed market sources' have painted a negative picture of future employment levels within the super dairy group. A figure of 1,000 has been put on the number of jobs likely to be axed throughout the groups worldwide operations in the UK. US and Ireland.

Reports have even suggested that the Dungarvan milk processing plant and the Kilmeaden cheese plant, both previously owned by Waterford Foods, have been identified by market analysts as potential closures. In the case of Dungaryan, market sources have argued that the milk plant is "contained by its location in the

These reported rumours however have been de-scribed by Jim Walsh, Pub-lic Relations Officer for AWG, as pure speculation. A business review is currently in progress by the eight executive study groups to determine the shape of the new organisation.

Mr. Walsh said that until such time as the results of this report are made public at the end of November, no decisions will be taken by management with regard to streamlining measures.

ATGWU district officer Tony Mansfield said unions are extremely angry over the continued publication of the demise of the Dungarvan and Kilmeaden operations.

In an interview with the 'Dungarvan Leader', he described the two factories as vital components of the dairy sector and said they were jewels in the crown of the former Waterford Foods group employing some 300 highly skilled workers in the

area.
"Production in the Dungarvan and Kilmeaden factories are geared towards value added products such as raw milk which is taken from suppliers and added to, then sold on the open market", Mr. Mansfield declared.

"This is what successive governments and the industry have been crying out for", he added.

Mr. Mansfield said he took great exception to reports

that the Dungarvan plant is contained in the town, stating that the plant is located on the fringe of the urban area with ample room for further development and direct access on to the main N25 road. The plant was further enhanced by investment in the late 80's and now handles 60 million gallons of milk within a 40 mile radius and beyond due to its prime location on one of the main national routes.

Adamant that both Dungarvan and Kilmeaden must be retained, Mr. Mansfield pointed to the valuable expertise of the highly skilled workforce, research and development and management at both plants and the commitment of the local farmer suppliers to build up these two sites.

"I hope that the elected representatives of the farming community supposedly involved in the merger will see to it that they will pull their weight in an area where we (unions) are denied - in the boardroom", he tressed.

Elected shop stewards from the four main unions representing the AWG workforce around the country are meeting to discuss the possible job loss issue in Portlaoise on October 21st.

DEASY CALLS FOR ACTION

Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy has called on the Tanaiste Mary Harney to ensure that there is an evenhanded approach when it comes to rationalisation and that no particular area is victimised.

Speaking in the Dail, Deputy Deasy said there is an onus on Ms. Harney as Minister for Enterprise, Trade & Employment to see that the rights of all workers are respected.

The Waterford Deputy had previously asked the Minister for Agriculture & Food, Joe Walsh, if he would hold talks with the AWG managenment to ensure that there are no significant job losses as a result of the merger, particularly in the Waterford end of the operation in Dun-garvan and Kilmeaden.

Minister Walsh however refused to become involved, stating that it was an issue

Commenting on the Minister's response, Deputy Deasy described it as being "totally negative and of little consolation to employees in Dungarvan and Kilmeaden who feel that their jobs are seriously under threat."
COUNCIL SEEK

MEETING

Against the background of unease and uncertainty over future employment levels in both plants, the Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce is to meet with senior management members of A.W.G. in the near future.

Likewise delegates from Waterford County Council including the County Manager, Donal Connolly and Chairman, Lar Hart have also sought a meeting with management representatives to discuss concerns over job losses.

Speaking at Monday's meeting of the Council, Cllr. Hart said it now seems that enforced redundancies may be introduced by the group, a move which he declared. would be unfair to workers

who have served the dairy company down through the years.

His views were shared by the majority of Council members with Cllr. Jackie Fahey stating that what initially appeared to be an amalgamation of the two dairy groups, now looks more like à takeover.

A former longstanding employee of Waterford Foods, now employed by a major trade union, Cllr. Billy Kyne said workers at Dungarvan and Kilmeaden want management decisions which would reflect the value of both plants. "If these two employment centres will be affected, it will have terrible effects on the local community and the commercial business sector of the county.'

who voted against the merger at both shareholder meetings, warned that many small farmers will be wiped out while Cllr. Con Casey said the scale of contribution of the co-op to the economy of Dungarvan was enormous. He added however that the modern Kilmeaden facility contributes in an even greater way to rural parts of the eastern end of the county.

Reaction To New Traffic Changes

merce welcome the new traffic changes which are being introduced by the U.D.C. in the New Year. We are delighted to see that the U.D.C. has taken on board a considerable number of the proposals and suggestions that we submitted subsequent to the survey of businessess in the town centre. We view the introduction of the one-way system as being an absolute necessity in order to alleviate the heavy congestion being currently experienced in both O'Connell Street and Main Street, although some of our members on the Western side of O'Connell Street have expressed serious concerns that considerable business may be lost in people departing the town for the west of the county and the tourist traffic especially during the summer months with day visitors homeward bound to Clonmel. It is difficult at the moment to see how this matter can be resolved to the satisfaction of all parties involved, but we will be monitoring the situation on an on-going basis. On a more pessimistic note

it is disappointing to see the increase in parking fees being raised from their current level of 10p per hour to 30p per hour in one fell swoop. This can only have a negative effect on the traders of the town and it provides another excuse for people to take their business else-

We, the Chamber of Com-nerce welcome the new many years tried to maintain however falls well short of unit. From 1 January 1999 raffic changes which are and increase upon previous the amount of additional banks will permit the openyear's trading by promoting Dungarvan as a consumer friendly location in which to shop but elements such as a 300% increase in parking rates do nothing to help us in this task.

From the point of view of the business people them-selves the introduction of reserved parking spaces at £250 p.a. can be viewed only as another form of local government taxation. It is absolutely essential that the proprietors and staff of local businesses be allowed bring their cars/vans into the areas in which they work and be allowed to find suitable parking accommodation at relatively low cost within these areas. Many of these individuals will need their cars/vans as a working tool throughout the day and as such it would appear counter-productive to add to their already spiralling business costs.

In relation to long term the only means of finding a problem is the provision of a multi-storey car park within the town centre. We are delighted to hear that the County Manager is currently in the process of acquiring a number of properties at both Lower Main Street and St. John's Castle which would

spaces required to meet the growing needs of a buoyant retail and tourism market.

We also feel that the introduction of the one-way system should help to create new parking spaces within these areas and that the provision of these extra spaces should in some means be allocated to businesses for the purposes of loading/unloading and that a number of these sites should be designated as official loading bays, otherwise the businesses of the town will once again be penalised by virtue of their lack of access to their own premises.

As mentioned previously whilst we welcome the overall concept included within this plan we need to stress most adamantly that the entire situation in relation to traffic/parking and its effect on the businesses of the town will need to be closely monitored over the course of the next 12-18 month period parking needs the Chamber so as to ensure that no-one has long held the belief that area is being overly penalised because of these permanent solution to the policies. Mary was not successful in getting through to the final but we congratulate her on her nomination and acknowledge the trojan work she has done for the community in Waterford city and county.



EDMUND IGNATIUS RICE'S DAUGHTER HONOURED

One hundred and thirty eight years after her death, Mary Rice, daughter of Edmund Ignatius Rice, was remembered and honoured in Carrick-On-Suir where she spent the last 10 years of her life and where she was buried in the year 1859. A limestone plaque was unveiled following the celebration of 11 a.m. Mass in St. Molleran's Parish Church, Carrickbeg which was celebrated by Rev. Fr. Pat Fitzgerald P.P. Carrickbeg/

Windgap.

In his address to a large number of people and invited guests, Cllr. David Shea, Chairman of the Urban Council said the Council and the people of the town by erecting this plaque wished to honour the memory of Mary Rice and by association her father, Blessed Edmund Rice and the Order he founded, the Christian Brothers. The second foundation of the Order was opened in Carrick on the site of the present monastery at Pill Road in 1806 and is still operating as an educational institution almost 200 years on. He referred to the fact that the exact location of Mary Rice's burial place was not known but that the site for the plaque was carefully chosen with the assistance of local historian Michael Coady, Brother Nolan who taught in Carrick 50 years ago but was unable to attend the unveiling due to illness and also Bro. 

will replace the antiquated offices at Shandon.

Cork company Bowen Construction Ltd. who built the acclaimed bridge across the Finnisk river at Dromana, have been awarded the contract which is expected to be completed by early 1999, on the 100th anniversary of the first meet-ing of Waterford County Council.

The new County Hall with a gross floor area of 44,724 sq. ft. will also house a number of local government agencies in what is being described as a 'One Stop Shop' approach.

Provisional agreement has already been reached with the driver testing centre, FAS, the resource centre for the unemployed, social welfare information office, the County Enterprise Board. Waterford Partnership and the Community Welfare and Environmental Health Offices. Discussions are also taking place with Dungarvan U.D.C. to see if move to the County Hall would be a viable option.

In addition to the £3.5m cost of the building, a further £1/2m has been budgeted for furniture, fittings and equipment. The Council intends to finance the project by way of a term loan of £4m from the Housing Finance Agency with annual repayments of around £350,000.

Not surprisingly members of the local authority were fully supportive of the project at their monthly meet-

ing last Monday.

The new building will house a state of the art Council Chamber, a facility which has long been lacking in the town with members forced to hold meetings in

Dungarvan Courthouse.
Outlining the details of the project, Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly said the overall effect of the building will be to mark it out as a modern building for a forward looking County Council.

"I am confident that the proposed new offices will adequately cater for the ac-commodation requirements of the Council into the next century," said Mr. Connolly, and will facilitate the development of an efficient and professional organisation to meet the changing needs of modern society."

Proposing that the Council formally approve of the development was Cllr. Jackie Fahey who congratulated all involved in the project. He said the new County Hall will provide better working conditions for Council staff while members of the public who avail of Council services are fully entitled to the new offices.

Seconding his proposal was Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson. The new County Hall will transform this entire area of Davitt's Quay and will be an immediately identifiable focus for the activities of Waterford County Council as befits the administrative headquarters of the county.

Tobacco Company **To Locate**

Planning permission has been granted by Waterford County Council for the construction of a new 30,000 sq. ft. factory unit at the I.D.A. industrial estate in Tallow.

Imperial Tobacco Ltd. is to set up a manufacturing plant that will lead to the creation of 110 jobs in the West Waterford town.

The Tallow plant, which is a Forbairt supported project, will manufacture some of the company's wide range of cigars and production is expected to start by the middle of next year.

Local County Councillor Willie McDonnell said he was thrilled at the company's decision to locate at Youghal Road in Tallow.

With a population of be-tween 1,200 and 1,400, Cllr. McDonnell said Tallow is enjoying an employment boom primarily through the unprecedented level of construction work.

The new factory, he said, would be very much "the icing on the cake." "Rest assured that Waterford County Council won't be found wanting in facilitating the new plant in every way it can and the company can also look forward to employing what will be a totally committed workforce,' he added.

Cllr. Gary O'Halloran **Criticises Council's** Attitude To Travellers

He added that the Council has an almost racist attitude towards travellers and pointed out to members that there are still 20 traveller families encamped on county roads without any services whatsoever.

Despite the angry reactions of Council Chairman, Lar Hart and fellow Fine Gael party members, the Clashmore Councillor continued on his tirade declaring that he would welcome a public inquiry into the dealings of the Council with regard to its housing policy for travellers.

Cllr. O'Halloran's continuous criticism of the Council finally wore thin with Waterford County Manager, Donal Connolly who said it was a pity the matter is raised at nearly every meeting of the local authority.

To say that there is a major traveller housing problem in the county would be a gross exaggeration, he stressed. Mr. Connolly added that Waterford County Council is trying to do as much as possible to help traveller families.

"It would be a total distortion of the facts to maintain that we are discriminating against them," he strongly stated.

Cllr. O'Halloran's volatile views were certainly not shared by the other Fine Gael members of the Council as expressed by Cllr. John Carey who launched a blistering attack on his party colleague. Disassociating himself with the disparaging remarks, Cllr. Carey suggested that FG members should organise a meeting to sort out the prob-

Likewise Labour's Cllr. Billy Kyne said the Council "can do without this enemy within" and claimed that O'Halloran is holding members up to ridicule at every public opportu-

"It's time the Council stops shooting itself in the foot," he warned. "We may have different views but we are all committed to a housing policy." Cllr. Kyne suggested that through the party whips, the Council would refrain from these "very emotive and unhelpful comments."

UTTER RUBBISH

Describing Cllr. O'Halloran's tirade as utter rubbish, Cllr. Austin Flynn said there are many people in Dungarvan and the county who also have to wait for houses. Clir. Flynn, who is Chairman of Dungarvan U.D.C. spoke of the many taxpayers on the housing wait in the town who, he said, are decent, honest people waiting patiently for their turn under the system.

These people, added Cllr. Flynn, are not causing litter or intimidating anyone. "It's more often the people on the side of the road who are not doing the county any favours," he declared. "They're making no contribution whatever to the country."

Cllr. Flynn further stated that the Council is not forcing anyone to live in dirt and squaller and warned that there are no rights without obligations.

The matter subsequently ended there or so it seemed until some time later when members were dealing with the Tramore Development Plan. Cllr. O'Halloran, obviously dissatisfied with Mr. Connolly's earlier response to his allegations, again raised hackles when he referred to a particular section dealing with traveller accommodation in the seaside town.

Having examined the situation thoroughly, the Council found that there is no need to provide for the accommodation of travellers within the town of Tramore as there are currently no travellers on the town's housing list.

Cllr. O'Halloran took great offence to this section of the plan and in his agitation even jumped to his feet on one

Delaying the meeting yet again, Cllr. O'Halloran described this section in the development plan as racist and gives the "entire population of Tramore a bad name". His proposal to delete the section from the plan failed, unsurprisingly, to get a seconder.





Plant Soon For A Spring Crop



GARLIC plaits: Plant ready to grow through the winter

While most popular vegetables are planted in the spring and grown throughout the summer for harvesting in the autumn, a handful of vegetables are planted in the winter for a spring or summer harvest.

These winter vegetables include shallots, garlic, leeks and salad rocket. So if you have never tried growing a winter vegetable before, why not give it a try this year. SALAD ROCKET

This hardy, spicy-leafed Mediterranean plant is used in salads although older plants may also be cooked. Salad Rocket is also known as Mediterranena rocket, roquette, erugala or rucola. It grows best in cool weather in moistureretentive soil in a cool climate. It is excellent under cover in winter and as a cut-and-come-again crop. Sow broadcast or in rows to cut as seedlings or thin to 15cm to cut when

GARLIC

Garlic plants grow up to 60cm tall with a spread of about 15cm. Each produces an underground bulb up to 5cm in diameter.

Garlic tolerates a wide range of climates but need a period of about two months at zero to 10 degrees centigrade in winter.

Some types are very hardy but you should use the kind recommended for your area. Garlic grows best in an open, sunny position on light soil that does not need to be very fertile.

For planting, split off individual cloves from mature, healthy, virus-free stock. To produce large bulbs garlic needs a long growing season.

Plant the cloves upright with the flat base downwards at twice their own depth, 10cm apart in rows.

Little attention is required during growth other than keeping the beds free of weeds.

Garlic takes from 16 to 36 weeks to mature, depending on the variety. The plants should be uprooted as soon as the leaves have started to fade. Store in bunches with plaits made from the dried leaves.

SHALLOTS

Possibly the most versatile in the onion family, the distinctly flavoured shallot forms clumps of about a dozen bulbs. They may be used fresh or after storing and can be eaten raw or cooked.

Shallots are very hardy and can be planted during the winter in mild areas. The sets should be sown in rows about 14cm apart. For an early crop of green leaves for spring onions plant small sets in the autumn or in trays under cover about 3cm apart.

Harvest the green leaves as needed. For good-sized bulbs do not pick the leaves but lift the bulb once the foliage has died down. Good stocks of shallots can be stored for up to a year.

Sucklers

WEANING SUCKLERS

The date of weaning depends on the condition of the cow and age of calf. Thin cows should be weaned soon in order to prevent any further loss in condition or to allow some recovery before the winter. First-calved heifers do not gain weight during the summer to the same extent as mature cows and are consequently at lower body condition score at this stage. These should be among the first group to

The second factor to consider in relation to weaning date is the age of the calf. February and March calves can be weaned about now. April and May born calves should be allowed suckle until November if possible.

Another consideration that will have to be taken into account is the amount of grass available. Where grass is scarce, suckling cows will lose condition. In such cases it is better to wean and feed meal to the weanlings. Spring calving cows should be at condition score 3 at present, i.e. well fleshed.

WEANING PROCEDURES

Outdoor weaning is preferable to housing. Select a well-sheltered, well-fenced field with good grass. Weanlings remain more settled if left in a familiar field at weaning. Therefore, it is better to withdraw the cows and leave the calves undisturbed. If cows are removed over a period, there is less disturbance. Start with the thinner cows and those that calve early in the

It is good practice to dose weanlings for Hoose (which also covers stomach worms). Respiratory diseases can be aggravated where there is damage to the lungs with Hoose.

Maize Harvesting

Many crops sown under plastic have been harvested or are ready for harvest. Other crops are not far behind. The optimum harvest date for high quality maize is when the whole-crop dry matter is between 28 per cent and 32 per cent with a cob dry matter content of 45-50 per cent.

This stage of development is characterised by the cob sheath turning yellow and a thumb-nail imprint remaining on the grain.

Chop length should be short (98 per cent under 2 cm.) and uniform. corn crackers should be fitted where the dry matter is high.

Dairving

OVER QUOTA? - DRY OFF COWS

Dry off cows that are thin (condition score 2). These are probably heifers and Holstein cows. They will cheaply put on body condition over a longer dry period without much meals.

Overfat cows (condition score 4) also should be dried off and sold as price for culls is quite good. They are probably poor milkers and eating much more feed than they should. Being overfat now they will be excessively fat at calving, leading to possible calving trouble and subsequent infertility.

UNDER QUOTA?

Meal feeding can be justified on, under or on-quota farms. Feed 2 kgs. of meal (will give 0.4 gallons). A cheap 12-14% protein ration of barley, citrus pulp, or maize distillers is adequate.

AUTUMN CALVERS

Autumn calvers should get 4-5 kgs. of ration now that grass is getting scarce. Feed 6-7 kgs. when they go on silage. Keep grass available to these cows as long as possible, graze them ahead of the main bunch.

FARMING LEADE

IFA Says Minister Walsh Must Announce Payment Of £50 Per Head Revaluation Premium

Waterford IFA Livestock Chairman, Maurice Donovan has said an immediate announcement is required from the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh on the payment of the £50 per head revaluation top-up premium owed on finished cattle disposed of between April 1 and June 10, 1997.

Mr. Donovan said he understood from the Department of Agriculture that the deadline date for the payment of the £17m. national revaluation money is October 15, 1997. He said "in view of the fact that applications have to be made to draw-down the £50 per head payment on heifers and payments had to be made by October 15, the time-frame is now exceptionally tight."

The Waterford IFA man said the original Government announcement regarding the £50 per head payment was made on April 23, 1997. He said "It was now 5 months late and high time an announcement was made confirming that the £50 payment will be made on steers, heifers and bulls without further delay.

IFA Demands Vital Budget Investment Boost For Agriculture

Launching IFA's submission in advance of the December Budget, President John Donnelly said: "As the only major sector of the economy currently suffering an income decline, agriculture needs an urgent boost in the forthcoming budget.

Mr. Donnelly called on Finance Minister Charlie Mc-Creevy not to overlook the investment demands of farming and other exposed sectors of the economy while easing the burden of personal taxation in the Budget.

He said: "Farming is facing into very challenging and uncertain times with tough negotiations on the Santer proposals for agricul-ture and a new World Trade Organisation agreement scheduled between now and the end of the decade. Minister McCreevy now has an exceptional opportunity to leave a lasting mark on the economically exposed farming and small business sector to help achieve the scale and efficiencies necessary to be competitive into the 21st

"Without vital investment incentives, farming will quickly become the poor re-lation in the rapidly growing and prospering Irish economy. Failure by the Minister to grasp this opportunity will have disastrous consequences for both our industry and the Irish economy as

He said: "While there is a compelling argument for reductions in the heavy tax burden on wage earners, farmers and the self-employed need greater business reliefs to meet the constant investment demands to keep their businesses competitive.'

A. Weaning babies from a pure milk diet onto solid foods is a gradual process starting somewhere betweeen 3 and 6 months. You should start introducing solid foods to your baby when milk stops being an

months of age. If solids are introduced before 3 months of age there is a greater risk of the baby developing obesity, allergies and poor co-ordination. Leaving the introduction of solids until after 6 months could result in the baby failing to thrive as it should and rejecting solids when they are even-tually offered.

The first foods a baby should be offered should be smooth, taste bland and should be gluten free, that is they should not be wheat is they should not be wheat based. Pureed fruit or vegetables or baby rice would be good choices to start. As time goes on the variety and quantity of food offered should gradually be increased. When are introducing a new food to the baby only give

him a little at a time and give him time to get used to it. If he doesn't like it, then leave it for a while and offer it again a few days later. By the time your baby is 6 months old he should be taking 3 small spoon feeds daily consisting of fruit, veg., potato, rice and meat, as well as his formula, or breast, milk. Avoid dairy products, eggs, and cereals that contain gluten until the baby is older than 6 months, due to their association with allergies and coeliac disease.

From 6 to 12 months you should gradually introduce more foods, having lumpier

texture and start giving him a cup to drink from. By the time your son is 12 months old he should be eating normal family foods without added salt or sugar. Eating a good vari-ety of foods is the key to making sure that the baby is getting an adequate intake of energy and of the necessary vitamins and minerals that are essential for normal growth and development. You can guard against iron defi-ciency anaemia, a very common problem is childhood, by including red meat in the diet, as well as iron fortified cereals, green vegetables and fruit.



First and foremost let it be said loud and clear, Monaghan are a great side, they have known the depths of despair, losing finals in '94 and '95 and have come back to win successive titles and I hope that when the dust has settled people will dwell on the positive aspects of a marvellous final.

The Mirror reporter David Kelly wrote "here is a message to All Ireland champions Kerry and all those teams seeking to win the Sam Maguire Cup in 1998 get a copy of this match on video. In a year when the mens game failed miserably to reach any particular high level of skill and excitement, the ladies of Mon-aghan and Waterford showed how the game should be played."

The game featured 34 scores, only sixteen wides, a game of contrasting halves, played at ninety

miles an hour. Conditions were ideal for football, although a slight breeze blew down towards the Canal goal. Diane Dempsey edged Monaghan in front in the 4th minute. 

He received a weekend for two people in the Golf Coast Holiday Centre, courtesy of former county player John McGrath.

SENIOR HURLING COUNTY FINAL

Challengers Passage To Test Champions, Ballygunner

While there is disappointment that none of the five western senior hurling teams made it to the senior hurling county final, there is nevertheless huge interest in the game which will be played at Walsh Park at 3.15 p.m. on Sunday afternoon following what will be a minor thriller involving western champions, Tallow and Mount Sion.

Very few people will dispute the fact that Ballygunner are the best team in the county at present. Not just because they have won the last two county finals and represented us with pride in the Munster Club Championship last year but in my opinion their brilliant display against Mount Sion in the semi-final three weeks ago. That was the best hurling game in this restructured knockout championship this year and in the opinion of many hurling patrons, that was a game that gave the county something to hope for in the near future. On that day the best of both sides gave us as good a game as would be seen in any county final or semifinal anywhere. Also when extolling the quality of our present champions Bally-gunnerrecall their displays against the Cork champions Na Piarsaigh whom they beat in round one of the provincial championship last ear and their dismissal of the Tipperary champions Boherlahan/Dualla in round two before running the Clare county champions Wolfe Tones to a single point in a thrilling Munster Club Final.

Such good form must be compared with the best club year fielded 8 of the team representing the county (in the Goatenbridge field opening tournament) and six Ballygunner men wore the jersey in the Munster Championship against Limerick at Thurles. This all gives a fair idea of the overall strength of the team in relation to the other 13 club senior teams in the county at this time.

With players of the calibre of Ray Whitty who has been on and off as county goalkeeper, Niall Warren a strong fullback with Garry Cullinane and Darragh Lapthorne or Cial Cantwell in the corners, Fergal Hartley who is captain in the centre-halfback position and Stephen Frampton and Rory O'Sullivan on the wings, to complete the champions defence.
