## Weekend Crime Spree In Dungarvan

Last weekend saw a spate of vandalism around the Dungarvan area which caused considerable damage and disruption to many businesses and property.

At approx. 11.30 p.m. on Saturday night, vandals set the front doors of Dungarvan Sports Centre at Ringnasilloge on fire with a blazing tyre. Gardai and the Fire Service were promptly on the scene. The solid teak double door of the Centre was completely destroyed in the blaze which also

caused an amount of smoke damage. Fortunately the Sports Centre was unoccupied at the time and subsequent sessions such as bingo were not affected.

On the same night, five windows at Dungarvan C.B.S. were broken by mindless vandals while in the early hours of Sunday

morning a house was broken into at Springmount from which a quantity of cash was stolen.

In yet another incident over the weekend vans owned by An Post parked at the rear of the Dungarvan branch were vandalised while the front window of Unique Gents in O'Connell Street was completely

destroyed in the early hours of Sunday morning.

## U.D.C. To Depart Historic Town Hall Offices

After spending over 100 years at the historic Town Hall building at Friary Street, Dungarvan U.D.C. have decided to pack up and move to more modern premises within the proposed County Hall at Davitt's Quay.

As reported in last week's edition, a £4m building to replace the antiquated Waterford County Council offices at Shandon and accommodating a 'one stop shop' concept of numerous public services is to be constructed on the site of the former Fire Station, adjoining the Motor Tax Office.

It will cost the U.D.C. up to £40,000 a year over a 20 year period to finance the move based on the square footage they will occupy in the new civic building.

# Avonmore Waterford Agree £10m U.S. Sale

## JOB LOSS MEDIA LEAKS DENIED

Avonmore Waterford Group has announced this week that it has reached agreement with a Dutch bio-technology company to sell a portion of its U.S. division for £10m in cash.

The Group have agreed to sell the cultures and media division of Waterford Foods Inc. to Gistbrocades NV, a £2 billion company who specialise in the production of specialist food ingredients such as enzymes, cultures etc. for the international market.

Discussions on the sale were underway prior to the merger of the two dairy giants. Waterford Foods had acquired the operations in Millville, Utah and Fond du Lac, Wisconsin in 1989. Despite performing significantly below expectations in 1994/1995, the U.S. operation bounced back in 1996 and is this year ahead of financial targets.

The offer by Gistbrocades of £10m paid in cash however was considered to be very attractive by AWG who are reported to be pleased with the deal.

The Millville and Fond du Lac operations manufacture and market starter media, dressing mate and cultures and are major suppliers of ingredients to the U.S. cheese making industry. Their sale will not affect the Group's Swiss cheese operations, also located in Wisconsin. A highly specialised end of the business, the U.S. cultures and starter media division is a market leader in supplying phage inhibitory starter media to the cheese industry. AWG will now focus on its core business which is the manufacture of cheese and food ingredients.

### MEDIA LEAK DENIED

Recent allegations that AWG have constantly leaked job loss figures and rationalisation plans to the media in order to 'condition' the public was vehemently denied this week.

Corporate Affairs Manager, Michael Patten who is one of the main media spokesmen for AWG said neither he nor any other authorised person has spoken to the press in that capacity.

An agreement was put in place between management and the unions whereby neither side would negotiate terms and conditions through the media until such time as the ongoing review of the merged company is completed and approved by Board members.

Mr. Patten said the company has honoured that agreement, both in spirit and in letter.

According to Mr. Patten, the 'informed' leaks to the national media warning of 1,000 job cuts and possible plant closures in Dungarvan and Kilmeaden could not have come from anyone inside the Avonmore Waterford Group.

The results of the review study which is currently being undertaken by eight assessment teams is due to be released next month. This review of the Group's operations, said Mr. Patten is accessible to very few top level executives.

### MAST ARRANGEMENT CONTINUES

Commenting on Telecom Éireann's controversial plans to erect a microwave mast transmitter on top of AWG's 'silo' building at Shandon, Mr. Patten admitted that the company had not anticipated that there would be such a strong public reaction to the development.

Prior to the merger with Avonmore, Waterford Foods entered an arrangement with Telecom allowing the latter to use the building if the mast application successfully passed the planning process.

"I don't think it's for us to question the planning process," said Mr. Patten. "It's up to the statutory authorities to make decisions regarding the worthiness of the planning authority and the impact it would have."

Despite Mr. Patten's assurances that reported job loss figures are purely speculative, the Dungarvan and Kilmeaden communities are still very concerned about the future of the two plants.

Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce, Waterford County Council and Fine Gael Deputy, Austin Deasy have already expressed their fears over the disastrous effects any possible plant closures or job losses would have on the local economy.

Only this week Dungarvan Urban District Council have also entered the lobby to retain both plants with Cllr. Damien Dillon calling for a clear statement of intent from 'AWG' management regarding their plans for future staffing levels.

Cllr. Billy Kyne said even the most optimistic of people have concerns about job losses in Dungarvan and Kilmeaden adding that it is a very worrying situation for local communities.

Waterford County Manager, Donal Connolly said it is up to the local authorities to make a case to retain this valuable local industry within the merged group. The Dungarvan plant, he stated, is ideally located on the main N25 and has many advan-

tages which must be brought to the attention of management.

Mr. Connolly has already met with AWG management officials on a number of occasions and is currently arranging a meeting between County Council Chairman, Lar Hart, the party whips and AWG management.

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# Referendum on a Proposal to Amend the Constitution in relation to Cabinet Confidentiality

The Seventeenth Amendment of the Constitution (No. 2) Bill, 1997, proposes to amend Article 28 of the Constitution by inserting the following subsection after subsection 2° of section 4:

- "3° The confidentiality of discussions at meetings of the Government shall be respected in all circumstances save only where the High Court determines that disclosure should be made in respect of a particular matter -
- i. in the interests of the administration of justice by a Court,
  - or
  - ii. by virtue of an overriding public interest, pursuant to an application in that behalf by a tribunal appointed by the Government or a Minister of the Government on the authority of the Houses of the Oireachtas to inquire into a matter stated by them to be of public importance."

The proposal will be submitted, by referendum, to the decision of the people on October 30th, 1997.

The statements below have been produced and published under the supervision of the Ad hoc Commission on Referendum Information consisting of Mr. Kevin Murphy, Ombudsman, Mr. Kieran Coughlan, Clerk of the Dáil, and Ms. Deirdre Lane, Clerk of the Seanad. The Ad hoc Commission was established on the invitation of the Minister for the Environment, Mr. Noel Dempsey, T.D. The Minister requested the Chairman of the Bar Council to nominate two Senior Counsel one of whom, Mr. Rory Brady, prepared the statement of the case in favour of the proposed constitutional amendment and the other, Mr. Diarmaid McGuinness, the case against.

## Statement of the Case In Favour Of the proposed amendment of the Constitution

### The Present Position

In 1992 the Supreme Court held that our Constitution implicitly provided that the contents and details of discussions at Government meetings are absolutely confidential. As a result of this decision Tribunals and Courts of Law are not entitled to investigate Government discussions. A veil of secrecy exists. This veil can only be lifted or removed by the Irish people.

### The Proposed Change

The amendment expressly inserts into the Constitution the principle of confidentiality. However, it also contains two exceptions that allow disclosure of Government discussions. The High Court, which is an independent body, is authorised to determine that disclosure of discussions on a particular matter should be made: (i) in the interests of the administration of justice by a Court; or (ii) by virtue of an overriding public interest where a Tribunal applies for such disclosure.

### The Benefits of Inserting Confidentiality in the Constitution

(a) In order for a Government to do its job properly Ministers must be free to express their opinions in confidence. It would be unfair to expose an individual Minister to public criticism because he or she expresses, at meetings of the Government, a strongly held opinion that is not then popular with the public at large or the media. Discussions on politically sensitive matters such as taxation, security of the State or the libel laws should be carried out without the risk of a Minister's position at Government meetings being made known to powerful interest groups who could try to damage his or her career. Thus confidentiality will protect full and frank discussion at Government meetings and will enhance the stability of Government as a whole.

(b) A Minister may wish to express, at Government meetings, an opinion in support of a policy or strategy that he or she believes is in the national interest but which at the same time may adversely affect the constituency he or she represents. Social, financial and political pressures could be applied to Ministers if the opinions expressed at Government meetings were to become matters of public knowledge. Our Ministers must be free to discuss matters in private without fear of personal or electoral repercussions. By making the amendment the Irish people are helping our Ministers to make decisions that serve the national interest and not simply local political interests.

(c) The amendment enshrines in the Constitution the confidentiality of Government discussions. It is no longer dependent on judicial interpretation. The Courts must follow this fundamental law of the State as adopted by the people.

(d) Coalition Governments are now commonplace. Through electoral and voting pacts Ministers can serve in different Governments with different political partners. A disclosure of the discussions of a previous Government could be made for short term political gain. This must be avoided. This amendment is a clear and unequivocal statement by the people of the standards required of its Government and politicians.

### The Benefits of Having Disclosure

(a) Corruption and dishonesty could feature in any political system and there are many instances of this throughout the world, such as politicians stealing from the national coffers or engaging in corrupt practices. Governments can discuss and agree on actions directed at their political opponents that involve violations of constitutional and human rights. At present such discussions would be immune from investigation. A corrupt or an unscrupulous Government could firmly hold the veil of secrecy in a closed position. Ministers of our Governments must realise that they may be required to account to the people, at a Tribunal or in a Court of Law, for any wrongdoing. The amendment will allow the investigation of discussions of the Government and make members of a Government amenable to the full rigours of the law.

(b) At present documents going to Government or recording its decisions can be examined by a Court or a Tribunal. But the discussions concerning such decisions cannot be so examined. The documents by themselves may be of only limited value to any investigation. The exceptions allow an examination of the actual discussions at Government and this will throw light on Government decisions and the reasons for them.

## Statement of the Case Against the proposed amendment of the Constitution

There are a number of different arguments against the proposal.

### No Change is Necessary or Desirable

1. Absolute confidentiality should not be undermined and should be maintained. The proposal would inhibit free and full expression of views and discussions in Cabinet which should take place without fear of subsequent disclosure in a future Tribunal or Court case.

2. The Government is currently responsible to the Dáil alone for its policies and decisions and through it to the electorate. The legality of its decisions and actions will still remain open to challenge in the Courts.

3. The Courts are not best suited to judging whether there is a public interest which should override Cabinet confidentiality and should not be permitted to interfere with that confidentiality.

4. The proposal is unnecessary as the Government could:

(a) re-argue the issue before the Supreme Court which has the power to reverse its previous ruling, or

(b) legislate to regulate Cabinet confidentiality as the Courts have in other areas rejected the notion of absolute rights and have allowed the Oireachtas to regulate rights proportionately.

### The Proposal is Too Narrow and Restrictive

1. The proposal, by now expressly recognising Cabinet confidentiality, copperfastens it in unacceptably narrow terms.

2. The proposal should not be limited to Court proceedings or requests from Tribunals and it is illogical for the Government itself not to be permitted to waive confidentiality.

3. The Government being accountable to the Dáil and the people should be able to disclose the reasons offered in Cabinet for any particular policy or decision and the views and arguments taken into account.

4. A number of proper exceptions are not provided for and are, therefore, prohibited, i.e.:

(a) Cabinet discussions concerning the resignation or sacking of any member of the Government;

(b) disclosures by a Minister to civil servants, etc., which are necessary for the purpose of explaining and implementing Government policies and decisions;

(c) the publication of political memoirs;

(d) *bona fide* historical research, by way of interview with former Taoisigh, Ministers, etc.;

(e) the exclusion of Cabinet material from the National Archives;

(f) revelations as to why a political party left the Cabinet table;

(g) explanations given by a Minister or an Attorney General to the Cabinet in respect of their actions;

(h) disclosure for the investigation of crime or even for the purpose of upholding Cabinet confidentiality and preventing any unauthorised disclosure.

5. In adopting this proposal, the Government was not entitled to tell the Dáil about the discussions that took place in Government concerning this very proposal. Thus not even discussions of proposed constitutional amendments, whatever their significance, may be revealed to the people who are asked to vote on the proposal.

6. The Taoiseach has acknowledged in the Dáil that another Referendum may be necessary to provide for some of the exceptions referred to above.

7. The exception relating to Tribunals could give rise to the result that, although the Oireachtas considered a matter to be of sufficient public importance to warrant a Tribunal of Inquiry, and it wished to inquire into relevant Cabinet discussions, the High Court could determine that there was no overriding public interest in allowing that. Thus the wishes of the Government, the Oireachtas and the Tribunal itself could be overridden by a single High Court Judge. Such a result would be anomalous and undemocratic in the extreme.

### Technical Objections to the Amendment

1. The proposal makes the High Court the sole arbiter as to whether absolute confidentiality should be maintained or not. It is illogical for the proposal not to provide for the Supreme Court having either ultimate or sole responsibility for this.

2. The High Court would, of necessity, have to require the disclosure to it of Cabinet discussions, before it could determine whether or not public disclosure should be made in respect of a particular matter. This would necessarily require non public hearings in relation to such applications. This is not clearly authorised by the proposal.

3. No disclosure is allowed before Court or Tribunal proceedings start. Thus information that may be necessary to commence such proceedings or for a criminal investigation cannot be obtained and may never come to light.

### An tÁbhar Bheartaithe

# WHEN OUR WILD ANIMALS GO TO SLEEP

**Fifteen of our mammals — and all our reptiles — hibernate.**

Of the mammals, twelve of them are bats which will all have retired by the middle of October. One, the pipistrelle, is not a very sound sleeper and comes out on warm days.

The badger and the hedgehog are also rather intermittent hibernators. The badger lives in a sett, sometimes as much as twelve feet below the ground, and comes out on most warm

nights, but because they are exclusively nocturnal you will rarely see one.

The hedgehog will make itself a nest in a bank or similar place and sleeps fitfully — sometimes coming out on the coldest nights — until the beginning of February, when it settles down to sleep hard until the middle of April.

Normally nocturnal, in autumn you will often see a hedgehog in broad day-

light. The red squirrel is a native of Ireland and is smaller and prettier than the grey, but has become scarce, disappearing from large areas where it used to be common.

It has been driven out by the grey squirrel, a larger and much more powerful animal (a big male squirrel has been known to kill a cat), which was introduced from America.

Grey squirrels do not hibernate, but on very wet days they will remain in their dreys to keep out of the bad weather.

## Trains

Rails were in existence before railway engines. Horses were used to pull wagons up hills and followed behind on the way down. The first engine was a steam one, but it was very slow and it took a long time to get up steam. Then Robert Stephenson invented a rocket. This was a much faster railway engine. It was the first train to go faster than 35 m.p.h. There was springs on this engine because without them it could have been shaken apart at high speed. The engine started more quickly because of the invention of a new sort of boiler which heated the water up more quickly. Some trains made a lot of smoke and on a couple of instances sparks showered out and passengers clothes caught fire. When they were building railways through indian territory in America, they found it to be very dangerous. The Indians tried to stop the workers. To make the first underground, whole streets were dug up, tracks were laid and tunnels were made. The streets were then put back on top again. The first trains in the London underground were steam engines and open carriages. People got very dirty when they travelled. First class passengers were very comfortable when they travelled, their carriages were closed in. At first, second class railway carriages were open with holes in the floor to let the rain run out. Railway lines had to be on the level because it was difficult for the trains to go up and down hills. The people who built the railways made cuttings and tunnels in hills for this reason. They made bridges over valleys and rivers.

# Gardaí Investigate Spate Of Burglaries In West Waterford

Gardaí in Dungarvan are appealing to the public for any information following a spate of burglaries in the west Waterford area last week.

Three retail outlets in Lismore and a garage in Tallow were among those targeted by burglars between 2 a.m. and 4 a.m. on Wednesday, October 15th.

The burglaries came in the wake of two separate break-ins in the space of a fortnight in Cappoquin when £10,000 worth of cigarettes was stolen from a local supermarket.

According to Sergeant Pat Norris of Lismore Garda Station, the intruders failed in their burglary attempt at a shop in Cappoquin. In the

nearby town of Lismore however, the burglars targeted local grocery outlets for tobacco. They were disturbed at the third premises by the shop owner who heard a noise and shouted down from an upstairs window. The Lismore resident saw masked intruders jump into a car and speed off in the direction of Tallow.

There they broke into a local garage and made off with an amount of oil.

A technical examination of the scenes have revealed clues which will be forwarded for forensic analysis.

Sgt. Norris said Gardaí are of the opinion that the criminals are from outside the Co. Waterford area, possibly from Cork, Limerick or Dublin.

On the same night as the west Waterford break-ins, other burglaries were also reported in Mitchelstown, Kildorrery and Clogheen.

A dark coloured Opel Vectra, registration number 97 L 1311 was stolen prior to Wednesday morning's burglaries in Limerick and its number plates were later found in Aghlish. Meanwhile number plates were also stolen during the early hours of Wednesday morning from a car in Ballyduff.

If anybody has the slightest suspicion about any vehicle or persons in their area they are strongly urged to alert the Gardaí at any time of day or night no matter how minor their suspicions may seem.

In the run up to Christmas when most shops are stocking up on supplies, Sgt. Norris urged retailers to be more vigilant and to have a minimum of tobacco products on display while keeping stocks out of sight in a secure place preferably in an area covered by an alarm.

## Safety Measures Needed At Pike Hill

Concerns have again been expressed about the dangerous condition of the Pike Hill which has been the scene of many serious accidents over the years. Speaking at last week's meeting of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Tom Cunningham

stressed that the slow lane on the Pike Hill is in very bad condition and poses a serious risk to motorists particularly with the approach of frosty winter weather.

He said drivers tend to pick up speed on the stretch from Leamybrien which leaves

them totally unprepared for the sharp winding descent on the hill into Dungarvan.

His views were shared by Cllr. Oliver Coffey who renewed calls for the erection of a flashing reduce speed light is a major contributing factor to accidents on the hill.

County Engineer John O'Flynn said the Council proposes to repair a water main along the slow lane and intends to seek funding from the National Roads Authority for resurfacing.

In relation to the flashing sign, Mr. O'Flynn said the Council will make a submission for funding to the NRA under the Low Cost Safety Improvement Scheme next year.

## PAVING THE WAY FOR LE TOUR

Major improvements are proposed for the Carrick road in time for next year's Tour de France.

The world's most famous cycle will pass through the county in July on its way to Youghal.

Literally paving the way for the Tour, the County Council plan to improve the double 'S' bend, the Coolnahorna bend and other works along the Carrick road stretch. The road is also currently being resurfaced.

Cllr. Wright is a former Chairman and member of Dungarvan Urban District Council to which he was elected in 1985. The sole

Democratic Left party member to sit on both local authorities, Cllr. Wright was also elected to Waterford County Council in 1991.

His decision to resign from the daily stresses of public life came after he was taken seriously ill earlier this year.

## SINCERE, HONEST AND HARDWORKING

Many glowing tributes were paid to Cllr. Wright by his County Council colleagues at their meeting last week.

While not always seeing eye to eye with colleagues on certain controversial issues, Cllr. Wright was a man of principal who was a most honourable and hardworking public representative.

Wishing him and his family every success in the future, Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) described Cllr. Wright as a hardworking member of the

Council who represented the public honestly and fairly.

Likewise, Cllr. Gary O'Halloran (FG) spoke of the personal friendship that had developed between them and said he had met very few people who were as hospitable as Tony Wright.

"He will be greatly missed", he added.

Cllr. Jackie Fahey (FF) said he regretted very much his colleague's decision to resign from public life. He said Cllr. Wright was a very active councillor who worked extremely hard as a public representative. While some matters he spoke of could be quite controversial, Cllr. Fahey said one could never question Cllr. Wright's sincerity.

Chairman of Dungarvan UDC, Cllr. Austin Flynn said he admired Tony Wright for his sincerity and

the strong belief he held in his views while Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson declared that he was sorry to see him go and wished him and his family good health in the future.

Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly described Cllr. Wright as a first class representative. While they may have had their differences, Mr. Connolly added that Cllr. Wright had the interests of his constituents at heart.

## WHO WILL FILL VACANCY?

The vacancy on the County Council created by Cllr. Wright's resignation is expected to be filled at the November meeting when members will co-opt their own nominee. It has already been speculated that Democratic Left party organiser Fiachra O Ceilleachair of Ring will be co-opted unopposed to both local authorities. It remains to be seen however whether DL will retain their seats.

"I'm hoping that this will weigh in the minds of those making the final decisions", stated Mr. Bruton.

# U.D.C. To Depart Historic Town Hall Offices

According to County Manager, Donal Connolly the Urban Council will benefit from many advantages by moving to the new site and stressed that there is no question of the U.D.C. losing its independence within the development.

He said he has no intention of selling the Town Hall which will continue to exist as a civic building. Its future, whether as a theatre or cultural centre etc. will be discussed by Council members at a later date. Construction work on the County Hall is expected to commence next April and will be fully completed by mid 1999.

"I recommend that the Urban Council should proceed with the County Council in advancing this project which will be of major benefit to the public services in Dungarvan," stated Mr. Connolly at last Monday's U.D.C. meeting.

The advantages arising from a joint arrangement between the County Coun-

cil and the U.D.C. would be greater convenience for the public, councillors and staff, savings through the centralisation of information technology and the availability of conference/meeting rooms plus a brand new Council Chamber.

While members have agreed to the move, it was stressed at Monday's meeting that the local authority would not become 'swamped' in time by the County Council. It was also felt that the Urban Council should have separate Council chambers for its meetings and civic functions rather than sharing an enlarged chamber with the County Council.

The sole voice of opposition to the move was Cllr. Billy Kyne who pointed out that the U.D.C. would lose its identity by moving to a site on the by-pass which has no historical definition. He believed the existing Town Hall provides excellent staff facilities and adequate public facilities.

Instead of footing an annual £40,000 bill, Cllr. Kyne suggested that the Council invest in the refurbishment of the Town Hall.

Mr. Connolly however said the Council would be housed in its own block within the new complex at Davitt's Quay, a location he felt which is quite central taking into account the entire urban area.

"I can assure the members that this would in no way reduce or interfere with the independence or autonomy of the elected members of the Urban Council, the Council itself or its staff," Mr. Connolly stressed. The people, he said, can tax their car, pay their rent and meet the FAS man all under the one roof.

Fully supportive of the move, U.D.C. Chairman Cllr. Austin Flynn said the County Hall project presents an opportunity for the Council to design its own offices and chamber starting from scratch.

Many people in Dungarvan, he added, can never come into the existing Council Chamber which is on the second floor of the Town Hall with no disabled access.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said the Council is living in challenging times and must accept the challenge of centralisation. "We can't afford to stagnate," he warned.

The historic move to the proposed County Hall was subsequently proposed by Cllr. Lar Hart, seconded by Cllr. O'Riordan.

# TRIBUNAL OF INQUIRY

## (Payments to Messrs. Charles Haughey and Michael Lowry)

WHEREAS a Resolution in the following terms was passed by Dáil Éireann on the 11th day of September, 1997 and by Seanad Éireann on the 18th day of September, 1997.

"Bearing in mind serious public concern arising from the Report of the Tribunal of Inquiry (Dunnes Payments) published on 25 August, 1997, which established that irregular payments were made to and benefits conferred on certain persons who were members of the Houses of the Oireachtas between 1 January, 1986, and 31 December, 1996.

And noting that the said Tribunal established that money was held on deposit in certain Irish banks by offshore banks in memorandum accounts ("the Ansbacher accounts") for the benefit of Irish residents including Mr Charles Haughey, (the history of which deposits is set out in chapter 6 of the Report of the said Tribunal),

And noting further that the Dunnes Payments Tribunal was unable by reason of its terms of reference to investigate the source of the Ansbacher accounts, other than in respect of sums paid by certain persons referred to in the said terms of reference.

Resolves that it is expedient that a Tribunal be established under the Tribunals of Inquiry (Evidence) Act, 1921, as adapted by or under subsequent enactments and the Tribunals of Inquiry (Evidence) (Amendment) Act, 1979, to inquire urgently into and report to the Clerk of the Dáil and make such findings and recommendations as it sees fit, in relation to the following definite matters of urgent public importance:

- (a) Whether any substantial payments were made, directly or indirectly, to Mr Charles Haughey (whether or not used to discharge monies or debts due by Mr Charles Haughey or due by any company with which he was associated or due by any connected person to Mr Charles Haughey within the meaning of the Ethics in Public Office Act, 1995 or discharged at his direction) during any period when he held public office commencing on 1st January, 1979 and thereafter up to the 31st December, 1996 in circumstances giving rise to a reasonable inference that the motive for making the payment was connected with any public office held by him or had the potential to influence the discharge of such office.
- (b) The source of any money held in the Ansbacher accounts for the benefit or in the name of Mr Charles Haughey or any other person who holds or has held Ministerial office, or in any other bank accounts discovered by the Tribunal to be for the benefit or in the name of Mr Haughey or for the benefit or in the name of a connected person within the meaning of the Ethics in Public Office Act, 1995, or for the benefit or in the name of any company owned or controlled by Mr Haughey.
- (c) Whether any payment was made from money held in any of the accounts referred to at (b) to any person who holds or has held public office.
- (d) Whether Mr Charles Haughey did any act or made any decision in the course of his Ministerial offices, to confer any benefit on any person making a payment referred to in paragraph (a) or any person who was the source of money referred to in paragraph (b), or any other person in return for such payments being made or procured or directed any other person to do such an act or make such a decision.
- (e) Whether any substantial payments were made directly or indirectly to Mr Michael Lowry (whether or not used to discharge monies or debts due by Mr Michael Lowry or due by any company with which he was associated or due by any connected person to Mr Michael Lowry within the meaning of the Ethics in Public Office Act, 1995 or discharged at his direction), during any period when he held public office in circumstances giving rise to a reasonable inference that the motive for making the payment was connected with any public office held by him or had the potential to influence the discharge of such office.
- (f) The source of any money held in the Bank of Ireland, Thurles branch, Thurles, Co. Tipperary, the Allied Irish Bank in the Channel Islands, the Allied Irish Banks, Dame Street, Dublin, the Bank of Ireland (I.O.M.) Limited in the Isle of Man, the Irish Permanent Building Society, Patrick Street branch, Cork or Rea Brothers (Isle of Man) Limited, in accounts for the benefit or in the name of Mr Lowry or any other person who holds or has held Ministerial office or in any other bank accounts discovered by the Tribunal to be for the benefit or in the name of Mr Lowry or for the benefit or in the name of a connected person within the meaning of the Ethics in Public Office Act, 1995, or for the benefit or in the name of any company owned or controlled by Mr Lowry.
- (g) Whether Mr Lowry did any act or made any decision in the course of any Ministerial office held by him to confer any benefit on any person making a payment referred to in paragraph (e) or any person who was the source of any money referred to in paragraph (f) or on any other person in return for such payments being made or procured or directed any other person to do such act or make such decision.
- (h) Whether any payment was made from money held in any of the bank accounts referred to at (f) to any person who holds or has held public office.
- (i) Whether any holder of public office for whose benefit money was held in any of the accounts referred to at (b) or (f) did any act, in the course of his or her public office, to confer any benefit on any person who was the source of that money, or directed any person to do such an act.
- (j) Whether the Revenue Commissioners availed fully, properly and in a timely manner in exercising the powers available to them in collecting or seeking to collect the taxation due by Mr Michael Lowry and Mr Charles Haughey of the funds paid to Michael Lowry and/or Garuda Limited trading as Streamline Enterprises identified in Chapter 5 of the Dunnes Payments Tribunal Report and any other relevant payments or gifts identified at paragraph (e) above and the gifts received by Mr Charles Haughey identified in Chapter 7 of the Dunnes Payments Tribunal Report and any other relevant payments or gifts identified at paragraph (a) above.

And further in particular, in the light of its findings and conclusions, to make whatever broad recommendations it considers necessary or expedient:-

- (k) to ensure that the integrity of public administration is not compromised by the dependence of party politics on financial contributions from undisclosed source
- (l) for the reform of the disclosure, compliance, investigation and enforcement provisions of company law (including in particular those which relate to directors' duties).
- (m) for maintaining the independence of the Revenue Commissioners in the performance of their functions while at the same time ensuring the greatest degree of openness and accountability in that regard that is consistent with the right to privacy of compliant taxpayers
- (n) for enhancing the role and performance of the Central Bank as regulator of the banks and of the financial services sector generally
- (o) for the effective regulation of the conduct of their members by such professional accountancy and other bodies as are relevant to these terms of reference, for the purpose of achieving the highest degree of public confidence, and
- (p) for the protection of the State's tax base from fraud or evasion in the establishment and maintenance of offshore accounts, and to recommend whether any changes in the tax law should be made to achieve this end.

"Payment" includes money and any benefit in kind and the payment to any person includes a payment to a connected person within the meaning of the Ethics in Public Office Act, 1995.

"Person" includes any natural or legal person or any body of persons whether incorporated or not.

And that the Tribunal be requested to conduct its enquires in the following manner, to the extent that it may do so consistent with the provisions of the Tribunals of Inquiry (Evidence) Acts, 1921 and 1979:-

- (i) To carry out such investigations as it thinks fit using all the powers conferred on it under the Acts (including, where appropriate, the power to conduct its proceedings in private), in order to determine whether sufficient evidence exists in relation to any of the matters referred to above to warrant proceeding to a full public inquiry in relation to such matters,
- (ii) To enquire fully into all matters referred to above in relation to which such evidence may be found to exist, and to report to the Clerk of the Dáil thereupon,
- (iii) In relation to any matters where the Tribunal finds that there is insufficient evidence to warrant proceeding to a full public inquiry, to report that fact to the Clerk of the Dáil and to report in such a manner as the Tribunal thinks appropriate, on the steps taken by the Tribunal to determine what evidence, if any, existed,
- (iv) To report on an interim basis, not later than three months from the date of establishment of the Tribunal or the tenth day of any oral hearing, whichever shall first occur, to the Clerk of the Dáil on the following matters:
  - the numbers of parties then represented before the Tribunal;
  - the progress which has been made in the hearing and the work of the Tribunal;
  - the likely duration (so far as that may be capable of being estimated at that time) of the Tribunal proceedings;
  - any other matters which the Tribunal believes should be drawn to the attention of the Clerk of the Dáil at that stage (including any matter relating to the terms of reference);

And that the person or persons selected to conduct the Inquiry should be informed that it is the desire of the House that -

- (a) the Inquiry be completed in as economical a manner as possible and at the earliest date consistent with a fair examination of the matters referred to it, and
- (b) all costs incurred by reason of the failure of individuals to co-operate fully and expeditiously with the inquiry should, so far as is consistent with the interests of justice, be borne by those individuals,

And that the Clerk of the Dáil shall on receipt of any Report from the Tribunal arrange to have it laid before both Houses of the Oireachtas immediately on its receipt."

## ANNIVERSARY OF FAMOUS PRIESTS DEATH

This year marks the 70th anniversary of the death of a famous Clare-born priest who died in Clonmel in 1927. Throughout his life Fr. Benedict Coffey O.F.M. was regarded as a shining example of dedication to his vocation and a selfless guide and counsellor to his colleagues and parishioners.

His noted capacity for administrative work, meanwhile, saw him reach high office in the Franciscan order both at home in Ireland and in Rome. Father Benedict was born Joseph Coffey in Ennis, Co. Clare in 1857. He was received into the Franciscan Order in Capranica in Italy at the age of 34 and ordained six years later. A year later he was shortlisted to become guardian at Saint Isidores in Rome or the post of definitor provincial. However, his rise through the Franciscan ranks was to occur at home in Ireland. In 1902 he was appointed superior in Athlone and during the subsequent decade served as superior in Killarney, Cork and Galway.

In 1911 he returned to Rome as guardian of Saint Isidore's but took time out to work as a Chaplain with the British navy during World War I. After the War, he returned to Ireland and served as Franciscan Superior in Galway and, from 1924 to 1927 in Clonmel. When Father Benedict Coffey arrived in the town the local Third Order branch was low in membership but with his gentle influence, he recruited between five and six hundred new members. Before long the Clonmel branch was one of the strongest in the country. It was a memorial to his commitment to the Franciscan ideals that was to long outlive him. In 1926 he initiated devotion to Saint Paschal Babylon, the patron of Eucharist Associations. Through his efforts the devotion to the Blessed Sacrament increased in Clonmel, as evidenced by the growth in numbers of daily communicants and enormous attendances at evening devotion in the Abbey Church, especially for the monthly Holy Hour devotions. Fr. Benedict Coffey's life was cut short by his unexpected death in 1927.

He was a tireless worker to the last and even on the day he died he attended office and High Mass at S.S. Peter and Paul's Church and worked until lunch time in confessional. After taking suddenly ill, he received the last rites and passed away peacefully. His funeral at the Friary Church was attended by the Bishop, and by fifty clergy and a huge congregation which filed reverently past, touching the dead priest's hand. He was highly respected by all those who were the subject to him as superior. He ruled, it was said, by love rather than command and upheld the true tradition of Saint Francis of Assisi in all aspects of his labours. Ar dheis De go raibh a anam.

## SHEEP SCAB ON THE RAMPAGE

Ireland's oldest agri-disease is now reaching epidemic proportions with sheep scab rampant in many areas around the country. Outbreaks of this disease, have now surged with many farmers ignoring requirements to dip animals and to notify the Department of Agriculture of any scab outbreaks. The Irish Veterinary Association officials admitted that the disease is now at serious levels in many counties. The problem is that many farmers think that the cheap, pour-on treatments will prevent scab, one vet explained. The fact is that only dip-treatments once a year guarantee that flocks are not affected by this disease. Sheep scab which is highly contagious eventually kills the infected animals unless they are properly treated. Animals which contract sheep scab suffer painful itching and by scratching against gates and posts in an attempt to gain relief, this helps to spread the disease to other animals in the flock. As well as posing a fatal threat to infected animals sheep scab ruins the value of the animal's fleece as well as its ability to put on weight for subsequent sale. Vets now call on all farmers with flocks affected by sheep scab to notify the Department of Agriculture. Vets have also admitted that many farmers have ignored advice to dip their flocks at least once a year since the mandatory requirement for dipping was abolished some years ago.

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**This Week In The Garden**

**Lift Gladioli**

All gladiolus corms will be better out of the ground now. Dig them up carefully with a fork, cut the leaves off just above the corms and place the latter in shallow boxes, in which they can be stored in any dry, cool but frost-proof place.

Remove any small corms and keep these for growing on a reserve bed. They may not flower next year, but they can be fattened up for the following season. Pull off and throw away the old, shrivelled corms that adhere to the bottoms of the new ones.

**Stop Feeding Chrysanthemums**

If feeding is carried on too long, buds tend to decay in the centre. From now on supply chrysanthemums with plain water only.

**Lift and Store Turnips**

Lift a good supply of turnips of reasonable size and store them in a frost-proof place for the winter. They will keep quite well in a heap in any dry shed or outhouse, but fare all the better for a light covering of dry sand or ashes. Cut off the tops first. If you leave some roots in the ground they will supply a useful crop of turnip tops in late winter and spring.

**Aerate The Lawn**

A garden fork or a hollow-lined aerator can be used to advantage at this time of year to relieve compaction on lawns — particularly those which have been used for games.

**Prepare Rose Beds**

Get all new rose beds prepared in October. The ideal time for planting roses is in November and it is good if the ground can have a few weeks to settle between digging and planting.

Dig the ground at least 60cm deep, and, unless it is already very rich, work in plenty of well rotted animal manure or decayed vegetable refuse in the second spit, but keep it away from the surface for it will do no good to freshly planted roots. Finish off with a surface dusting of basic slag at the rate of 170g per square metre. This adds phosphates to the soil.

**Sow Sweet Peas**

The best exhibition sweet peas are obtained from sowings made now. Some growers sow outdoors where the plants are to bloom. A better method in most areas is to sow in pots, about five seeds in an 8cm pot and to germinate them in an unheated frame.

Once the seedlings are up they can be ventilated freely, you will only need the lights in very frosty or windy weather. The advantage of this method is that the seedlings are much more under control and can be protected from excessive cold or wet if necessary.

**Prick Off Cauliflowers**

If you sowed cauliflowers last month you must now transfer them to a frame. Prepare a bed of finely broken soil in the frame and dibble the seedlings 8cm apart each way.

**Gather All Remaining Apples And Pears**

Complete the gathering of all apples and pears. It is not advisable to let them hang once the weather gets really wintry. Apples keep well packed in boxes in a cool but frost proof place, preferably with a slightly moist atmosphere.

Pears keep better in a dry atmosphere. Lay them thinly in a room with an average temperature of 10C. Never pile them one on top of the other. Watch carefully for ripening.

**Gather Fallen Leaves**

Sweep up all fallen leaves from time to time during the month. Leaves are a particular source of danger in the rock garden, for if they lie thickly on the plants, they may kill them.

**Turf And Repair The Lawn**

This is an excellent time to lay new lawns from turf or repair worn patches in old ones. Cut out the turf from worn places with an edging tool and lift with a sharp spade or special turf-lifting tool, making all sides straight.

When laying a number of turves side by side, stagger them like bricks in a wall so that the joints do not come together in both directions.

## TIMELY CAMPAIGN AMID RISING DEATH TOLL

Waterford County Council's Road Safety Working Group under the Chairmanship of County Engineer, John O'Flynn has designated this week Monday, October 20th to Saturday, October 25th as Road Safety Awareness Week. The Group's objective is to create public awareness of road safety issues and to reduce the number of accidents on our roads. The campaign is being fully supported by Waterford Gardai and W.L.R. FM who are focusing on aspects of road safety each day.

The road safety awareness campaign is particularly appropriate at this time in light of the increasing death toll on Irish roads 29 people killed over a 10 day period. Last year there were 357 traffic accidents in Co. Waterford of which 8 were fatal, 104 involved injury and the remaining 245 accidents caused damage only. By comparison in 1995, there were 319 traffic accidents in the county.

Last weekend two more fatalities were recorded on Co. Waterford roads. Fifteen year old David Butler of 11 Comeragh View, Carrick-On-Suir was killed in a traffic accident near Clonea-Power on Sunday night. It is believed that the teenager, who was cycling a bicycle, was struck by an oncoming car near Rathgormack between Carrick-On-Suir and Portlaw at around 7 p.m. The driver of the car was uninjured.

Meanwhile a motorcyclist who was in a collision with a pedestrian near Kilmeaden was also fatally injured over the weekend. Twenty six year old Keith Doolan of Powerstown, Clonmel was killed when his motorcycle collided with a 23 year old Cork pedestrian who sustained injuries.

### WORKING GROUP FORMED

The Road Safety Working Group, established by the County Council earlier this year, have developed a comprehensive strategy to promote road safety around the county. The group decided at an early stage that the organisation of a Road Safety Awareness Week would be a valuable means of promoting an awareness of road safety in the county which would complement the National Safety Council campaigns as well as the normal enforcement role of the Gardai.

Members of the Working Group are John O'Flynn, County Engineer; Anthony Walsh, County Safety Officer; P. J. Kindregan, Tom Linné and Billy Smith, (all W.C.C.); Margaret Fleming, Arts Officer; Inspector Michael Blake, Garda Siochana and Susan Clancy, Teachers Representative.

### SCHOOL INVOLVEMENT

During the week primary schools throughout the county are being visited by Garda Ray Quinn and Waterford County Council's Safety Officer, Anthony Walsh to promote road safety awareness emphasising safe cycling in particular. Additionally primary school pupils designing a sign on any aspect of road safety and submitting it to a Public Library may win a mountain bike.

The Council's Art Officer, Margaret Fleming has already written to all primary school principals asking that students would design a sign with any aspect of road safety in mind. A selection of the signs will be displayed in the libraries throughout the week. Each participant will receive a certificate and a draw will be made in each library on Friday, October 24th for a mountain bike kindly sponsored by Frank Murphy, Dungarvan and Bob Troy, Dungarvan.

### SEAT BELT SURVEY

The effectiveness of seat belts as a traffic accident countermeasure has been well established over the years. Therefore the importance of wearing seat belts is a critical part of the road safety campaign.

Surveys were carried out by the County Council on July 30th last to determine current seat belt usage rates in the county. The surveys were undertaken on the N25 at Leamybrien Village, at the Causeway, Dungarvan and on the N25 near Stafford

Miller, Dungarvan. Both Irish and foreign registered cars were surveyed to establish if any difference in usage existed.

According to J. P. Kindregan, Acting Senior Executive Engineer with the Council, the conclusions to be drawn from the survey are -

- overall seat belt wearing rates were 64% for Irish drivers and 60% for front seat passengers, compared with 89% and 90% for foreign drivers and front passengers respectively.

- wearing rates for Irish drivers and front seat passengers at Leamybrien were almost double the wearing rates in Dungarvan.

More than one-third of all drivers and front seat passengers are breaking the law by not wearing their seat belts and are doubling their risk of serious injury if they are involved in a traffic accident.

### ENGINEERING ROAD SAFETY

Road safety research shows that road user factors are involved in nine out of ten traffic accidents, road and environment factors are involved in at least one in four accidents and vehicle factors are involved in one in eight accidents.

Road engineering therefore plays a vital role in preventing and reducing road accidents. Waterford County Council, with the aid of grant assistance from the National Roads Authority and the EU, are pursuing a programme of upgrading the national routes (N25 and N72) traversing the county such as at the major realignment at the Sweep, Dungarvan. Proposals are currently at an advanced stage for the construction of an 8km £14m by-pass of Kilmac-thomas linking the existing improved sections at Kildermoy and Newtown Cross and work is ongoing in the Tramore Regional Road Design Office on the road network associated with the Waterford City By-Pass and Second River Crossing.

County Engineer John O'Flynn said the Council are concentrating on surfacing improvement works on regional roads of strategic importance within the county such as Clonmel to Dungar-

van and Leamybrien to Carrick-On-Suir. This work is being co-financed by the EU and the Department of the Environment. Under the government's 10 Year Restoration Programme, the County Road Network is being restored to a safe condition.

The safety of travel on the county's roads is largely dependent on the extent and quality of maintenance programmes. Maintenance activities particularly contributing to road safety are -

- maintenance of skid resistant surfaces.
- provision of good quality street lighting.
- provision and upkeep of road markings and road studs.
- drainage of road surfaces.
- provision and maintenance of adequate signposting.
- patching and pothole repair.

- verge cutting.
- snow and ice clearance.
- provision/maintenance of footpaths, pedestrian crossing.
- traffic calming.

Since 1994 the Council have availed of grants being provided by the National Roads Authority for low cost accident prevention measures at known accident 'black spots'. Improvement works have been carried out or are planned at several locations such as Scrahan Bridge, Tarr's Bridge, Rincrow Bridge/Tallow Junction and Youghal Bridge. Accident reductions of up to 30% are anticipated from these improvements.

### GARDAI APPEAL FOR CO-OPERATION

Gardai are appealing for the co-operation of all in their efforts to come to grips with what is now happening on Irish roads. They warned that motorists who resort to the flashing of lights to warn approaching vehicles of a Garda patrol presence in an area are making no contribution to the cause of road safety. With the approach of winter and a reduction in the quality of driving conditions, the onus of care on all motorists increases appreciably.

"Gardai, like the rest of the community, are appalled and deeply saddened at the recent carnage which has

claimed 20 lives in less than a week in our country", said Inspector Michael Blake of Dungarvan Garda Station.

"What makes this carnage all the more tragic is that in many instances, the terrible loss of human life was avoidable," he added.

For the duration of Road Safety Awareness Week, the Gardai are placing particular emphasis on four key factors which, they believe, contribute significantly to deaths and serious injury on our roads.

Throughout this week Gardai will be encouraging motorists to slow down, for all car occupants to wear their safety belts, for pedestrians to be seen by wearing bright or reflective clothing and for cyclists to light up and at all times ensure that they can be seen. Gardai are insistent

that if everyone takes these simple and basic precautions, that the number of road fatalities and injuries can and will be subsequently reduced.

The major factors resulting in loss of life and serious injury on roads are driving with excess alcohol, excessive speed, dangerous driving, failure to wear safety belts, driver aggression, lack of tolerance and patience and failure to exercise courtesy.

Inspector Blake made a special appeal to parents to be conscious of the obvious dangers when delivering or collecting children at school.

As the Garda representative on the road safety co-ordinating group, Inspector Blake thanked Waterford County Council, the teachers organisations and local media for their respective major inputs to ensure the success of the week-long road safety measures.

## SHEEP

### Know The Lambing Duties

Raddling the ram and then penning and feeding ewes according to the lamb date will reduce concentrate costs by about £1.75 per ewe over the winter.

Harnesses should be fitted a week before the rams are joined and then adjusted weekly as the rams will lose weight during mating. Always make sure that the crayon pens are bent correctly.

An alternative is to make up a paste of grease and marking fluid and apply to the rams brisket. This will need to be topped up weekly.

## TILLAGE

### Harvest Report

● 1997 will be remembered as one of the most difficult and protracted harvests. The exceptionally wet and humid August created major problems in all combinable crops. Varying combinations of lodging, sprouting, shedding and trafficability problems resulted in some disastrous yields. Despite these problems, some very respectable yields and quality were achieved across all areas of the county.

● Cereal production nationally is estimated at 1.936 million tonnes which is 0.2 million tonnes back on 1996 but compares very favourably with production levels post CAP reform.

● Prices of feed grain were back £14/tonne which in combination with a £10/tonne drop in 1996 has resulted in a drop in margin of £100 - £150 per acre for cereal growers.

## DAIRY

### Autumn Feeding

Spring calving cows should be yielding about 3 gallons/day at 3.5% protein and 3.8% fat. Feed supply has a major effect on cow performance in the Autumn time.

This performance needs a daily dry matter intake of 13 - 14 kg. which is equivalent to 90 - 100 kg. of fresh grass. Autumn grass is normally low in dry matter (12 - 15%) and energy and if this coincides with poor ground conditions, the DM intake is likely to be only 11 - 12 kg.

Supplement of 1 - 2 kg. concentrate (if quota permits) of 3 - 4 kg. dry matter of high quality e.g. baled silage - one bale per 30-35 cows.

Feeding 2 - 4 kg. dry matter of ordinary grass silage (10-20 kg. fresh) can have a depressing effect on intake, performance and protein %.

A combination of grass and meal in the autumn gives the highest milk yield and protein %. Keep grazed grass in the diet for as long as possible.

## Grassland

The growing rate in October normally declines from about 20 kg. dry matter/hectare at the beginning to less than 10 kg. at the end. Rotation length should be about 35 days but this is very much dependent on feed supply shortening rotations of 24-26 days are indicators of declining grass supply. Target grass cover for the whole farm should be about 1000 kg. D.M./ha.

Apart from grazing out paddocks well, an equally important aspect is to set up swards for early grass next Spring. The condition of a sward in October will have a major effect on grass cover next Spring. For dry soil paddocks earmarked for early grazing next Spring should have the final grazing in mid to late October. On wet or cold soils, the final grazing should start in early October and finish by the end of the month.

On all soils try to graze down to 300 kg. DM/ha or about 5 cms. Light animals are best to graze down as they do least damage. A final grazing with sheep, if possible, will give thick swards.

The trails were identified, researched and reported on by Mr. Dominic Clancy at the request of Dungarvan Tourism Ltd. and their four eventual choices are now freely and readily available to all those who like the outdoor life, enjoy exercising in pleasant surroundings or to the visitor who wishes to see the very best of what Ireland or Co. Waterford has to offer.

The new brochure was launched at a very pleasant function in the Dungarvan Tourist Office and was attended by the Cathaoirleach of Dungarvan Urban District Council Cllr. Austin Flynn, Waterford County

## New Ferry Service Is A Breakthrough For IFA's Market Access Policy

Following the inaugural sailing of the MV Purbeck, the new freight ferry service by Gaelic Ferries, out of Ringaskiddy Port, Cork recently, Waterford IFA Chairman, James Coughlan said the IFA Autumn Cattle Policy, clearly focused on market access for beef and live cattle would now pay dividends for the country's 100,000 livestock farmers.

Describing the new ferry venture as "a major breakthrough for the agricultural sector and livestock farmers in particular," Mr. Coughlan reported cattle prices already hardening with some factories having to increase their price up to 85p/lb today to get supplies.

Mr. Coughlan said when

other ferry companies ceased shipping livestock in August/September this year, IFA launched a very focused campaign to secure full uninhibited market access to the EU single market for all agricultural produce including live cattle.

"This campaign involved an intensive countryside lobby of all rural public representatives by our 29 County Executive demanding that the Government make the necessary financial resources available to provide an alternative ferry service. In addition, there was high level negotiations with both the Taoiseach, Mr. Ahern and the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh, and several other cabinet members."

# Family health

By Dr. DAVE BARRY

**Q. I am an elderly man, I live alone since my wife died 2 years ago. Recently I have been getting a lot of tightness in my chest especially when I have to run up the stairs or I get flustered, it goes away again when I sit down and rest. My brother has angina and the pain seems to be similar to his, I wonder if it could be? What is angina and what can I do about it? Should I see my doctor, I don't like to bother him if I can avoid it?**  
**A. From your description it**

seems likely that the pain you are getting is indeed angina, the fact that your brother also has this condition would help in the diagnosis. Angina is a sensation of discomfort or tightness in the chest. It is brought on by exercise and relieved by rest or slowing down. Occasionally it can be

brought on by cold weather or after a meal or by getting upset or excited. Angina occurs because the heart muscle is not getting an adequate blood supply for the increased work it has to do when it beats faster, for example when you exercise. This causes the heart muscle to become cramped, this cramp is relieved when

the heart slows down and the tightness goes away. Yes, you should see your doctor. Angina is a sign that the blood vessels to the heart are narrowed. This narrowing is usually caused by deposits of fat silting up the arteries over many years. Although the diagnosis of angina is usually straight forward, your doctor may want to organise further tests, in order to see if any damage has been done to the heart, or other organs due to the lessening of blood flow. There are some medical conditions that are associated with angina and your doctor will test for these, controlling these conditions will help to control the angina. The doctor will also talk to you about taking medication to control the angina, for example tablets you put under your tongue whenever you get the pain, and to see if there are any changes you could make in your lifestyle that

would prevent the angina from becoming worse and reduce the risk of a heart attack. Stopping smoking, eating a low fat, low salt diet and gradually increasing your activity levels and losing weight are among the factors he would look at. Remember, if the pain is not controlled by the tablets your doctor gives you, or if the pain lasts longer than 20 minutes then you should contact your doctor immediately. If there is a delay in finding the doctor and the pain persists then you should go to the nearest hospital immediately.

tonsils would justify the risk of removing them. Tonsillectomy is not a trivial operation and there is a definite risk of complications, for example severe bleeding requiring a blood transfusion, and infection. The main reasons for removing tonsils are having recurrent attacks of acute tonsillitis, for example 3 or 4 attacks every year that are severe enough to warrant missing school. Younger children are more likely to stop having severe attacks as they grow but this is much less likely in teenagers and adults. Tonsils are also removed if they are large enough to cause blockage of the airway and difficulty with breathing, or if acute tonsillitis is associated with complications, especially ear infections. Another reason would be if the patient had quinsy, that is an abscess of one of the tonsils. Another reason would be if the patient is carrying a particular bacteria in the throat that can cause heart and kidney problems. Have a chat with your doctor about it and he may refer you to a specialist for a second opinion.

**Q. My 5 year old daughter is prone to tonsillitis, she is missing a lot of school because of this. My own doctor is reluctant to send her for a tonsillectomy as he feels she will grow out of it. I had to have my tonsils out when I was 9 because I suffered greatly with them. What do you think?**  
**A. As you may have gathered, the removal of tonsils is an area of great debate among many doctors. The general advice would be that the benefit of removing**

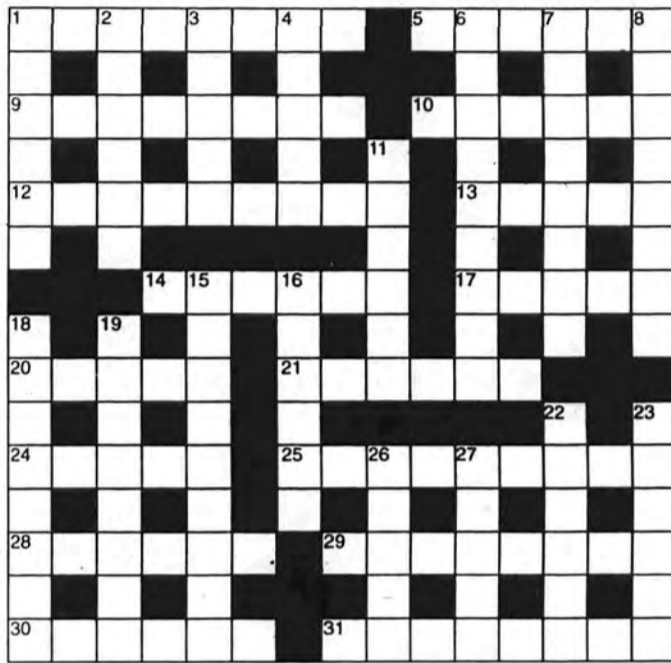

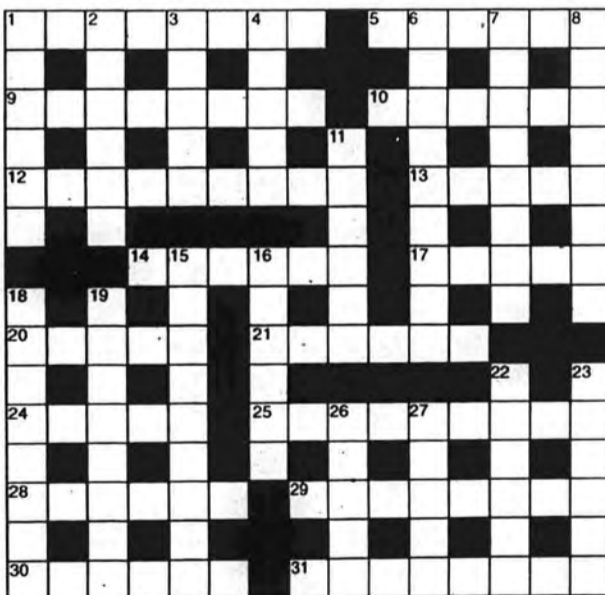

Arnica is an aromatic perennial plant. Growing in mountain woods, the plant is easily recognised by its bright orange-yellow daisy-like flowers.

Arnica has been used extensively in European folk medicine. Johann Wolfgang von Boathe (1749-1832), the German philosopher and poet, drank arnica tea to ease his angina in old age.

Best known as an effective ointment for bruises, sprains and muscle pain, arnica improves the local blood supply and accelerates healing.

Generally the herb is now taken internally only as a homeopathic remedy, mainly for shock, injury and pain.

# Beauty basics

### Essential oils

**Chamomile German** is a strong aromatic herb with a branching stem with feathery leaves and white flowers. It is a non toxic oil, but may cause dermatitis in some people. In skin care it is used to treat acne, boils, earache, inflammations, rashes, wounds, arthritis and neuralgia. Rheumatism can be treated with German chamomile and also colic, nausea and menopausal problems.

**Chamomile Maroc** has tubular yellow flowers which are surrounded by white ligulets. It is distantly related to German Chamomile. This is one of the most recent oils to come on the market. It is a non-toxic and non-irritant oil.

It is used in skin care to treat sensitive skin, also colic, headache and insomnia. It is used also in perfumes and colognes.

**Chamomile Roman** is a small perennial herb with a hairy stem with white flowers and an apple like scent. It had a medical reputation in Europe for over 2000 years. It was also used by the Egyptians and the Moors. It is a non-toxic and non irritant. Its aromatherapy and home use is the same as for German Chamomile. It is also used in the pharmaceutical industry in antiseptic ointments and tonic preparations. It is extensively used in cosmetics, soaps and high-class perfumes.

**Spanish oregano** is a perennial herb with a woody

stem and small green leaves with pink or white flowers which grow in clusters. Like common oregano it is also a skin irritant. Its oil is dark brown in colour and it has a strong refreshing odour. Spanish oregano is not used in aromatherapy and should not be used on the skin. It is however, used as a fragrance

in perfumes, especially in men's fragrances. Like common oregano it is sometimes used as a flavouring agent in some meat products and in pizzas. Both spanish oregano and common oregano act as antiseptics, expectorants, fungicides, stimulants and tonics. They should both be avoided during pregnancy.

## CHEF'S CORNER

# Coriander Steaks



**Preparation: 15 minutes + marinating**  
**Cooking: 15 minutes**  
**Serves 4.**

- 1 tsp coriander seeds
- 3 tbsp sherry
- 3 tbsp oil
- 4 (100g/4 oz) flash-fry steaks
- 2 red peppers, quartered and seeded
- 1 small onion, peeled and finely chopped
- 1 (142ml/5fl oz) carton soured cream
- knob of butter
- cooked pasta to serve
- fresh coriander sprigs to garnish

**METHOD:** Put the coriander seeds in a small bowl and crush with the end of a rolling pin. Stir in the sherry and 1 tsp of the oil. Brush the mixture over the steaks, place in a dish and cover. Leave at room temperature for 30 minutes or chill until required. Meanwhile, put the peppers,

skin side up, on a grill pan lined with foil. Cook under a hot grill until the peppers are charred and blistered. Allow to cool then peel off and discard the skin and chop the flesh finely. Drain off any juices from the steaks and heat in a small pan. Add the onion and fry for 3 minutes until softened. Add the chopped peppers and cook gently for 5 minutes. Process until almost smooth, then return to the pan and stir in the soured cream. Season, then heat through. Heat the remaining oil with a knob of butter in a large frying pan. Season the steaks and fry for 3 minutes on each side until browned and tender (they'll still be slightly pink on the inside). Arrange on a platter with the fresh cooked pasta and garnish with fresh coriander sprigs. Serve immediately with the pepper sauce.

# An Exhibition Featuring The Work Of Paddy Fahey

'The Irish in London' exhibition celebrates the photographic work of the late Paddy Fahey who was originally from Waterford. Paddy was a freelance photographer who worked for the British editions of all Irish newspapers from the 1940's to the 1970's. From 1970 onwards he was a photographer for the Irish Post. His photographic collection is a unique record of Irish life in London, chronicling as it does events as diverse as Old IRA men trooping the colours in Parliament Square in 1951, a young Bobby Molloy stepping it out at the Galway Association Dinner Dance and Big Tom playing at the Galtymore Ballroom in Cricklewood in the late 1970's.

This exhibition was produced by the Grange Museum in London. In 1995 the Grange acquired the Fahey collection of photographs from Paddy's widow Peggy. Since then it has conserved and printed up the entire

Fund of Great Britain and encouragement from the Irish Embassy in London.

# The Little Village Schoolroom Of Kilbrien

Sir, — What does one say about this historical building that has not all ready been said in song or verse. In its long and sometimes very troubled history, Kilbrien Hall, as it is now known, stands proud at the foot hills of the Comeragh Mountains. The hall was built shortly after the famine in the 1850's as the then school house (what is today the

church sacristy) was too small. The people of that time were to be complimented for their courage as in an age where money was not very plentiful and schooling (as it was known then) did not hold the importance it does today. Its doors were open to all and some very fine scholars were produced.

In 1949 the children were

on the move again as a new school was built some 300 yards down the road. The old school got a new lease of life by becoming Kilbrien Hall and many a great event was held there. Since the school was first built, it has become very much a part of the locality. It is a building of historical importance, so as guardians, we owe it, to all that have gone before us, to

restore it to its former glory.

Restoration is now in full swing. By the amount of voluntary labour that has come forward in helping with the restoration, it proves to the committee the esteem the hall is held in by the people locally. With the labour being voluntary, it only leaves for materials to be purchased. To finance this the following fundraisers are being held.

A sale or work is being held in the hall on Sunday, October 26, 1997.

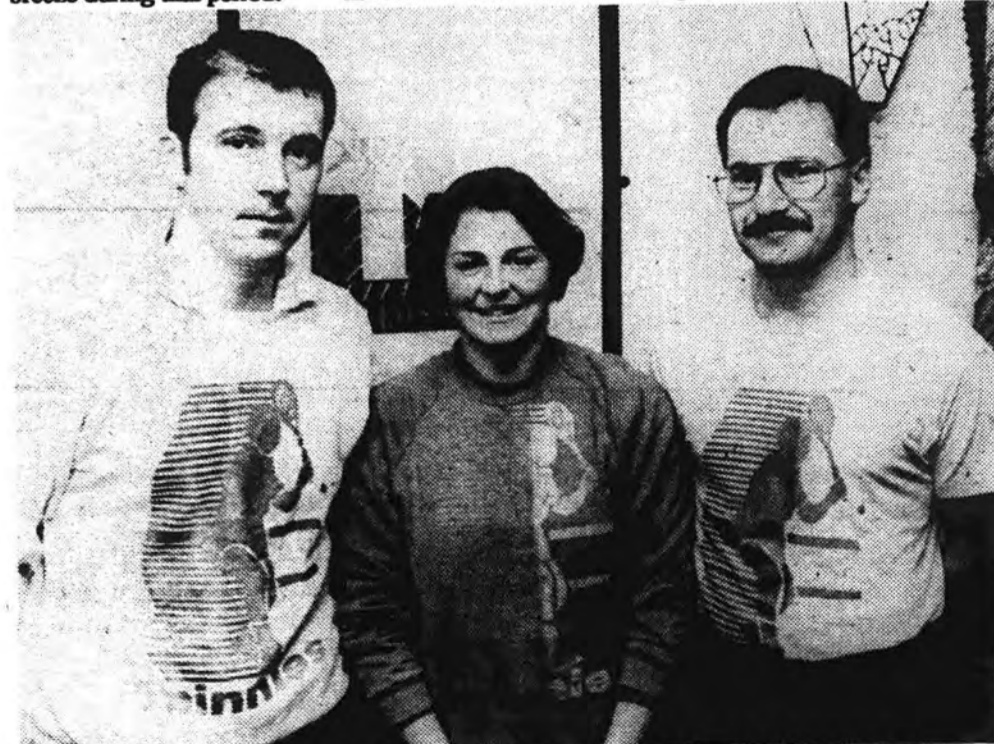



## MINOR HURLING 'A' COUNTY FINAL

# Tallow's Long Wait Ends In Glory At Walsh Park

## Splendid Hurling As Tallow 3-8 Defeat Mount Sion 1-10

After a wait of eleven rather barren years, a splendid Tallow minor team gained sweet revenge on their old adversaries, Mount Sion, who have thwarted their efforts so often in the past.

Back in 1986 Tallow defeated Mount Sion by 3-8 to 2-3 and have since been struggling to recover the title without success. Sunday's splendid victory made up for all the disappointments as the Western champions, leading by ten points at the break, held out magnificently against a strong Monastery team which was powered by a number of very promising players.

The standard of hurling was good and particularly in the second half when Mount Sion began to cut their arrears and Tallow defended magnificently. The huge crowd just loved this game and for the final seven scoreless minutes of the game, the anxiety of the Tallow support in the stand was obvious as they waited for the relieving sound of the final whistle.

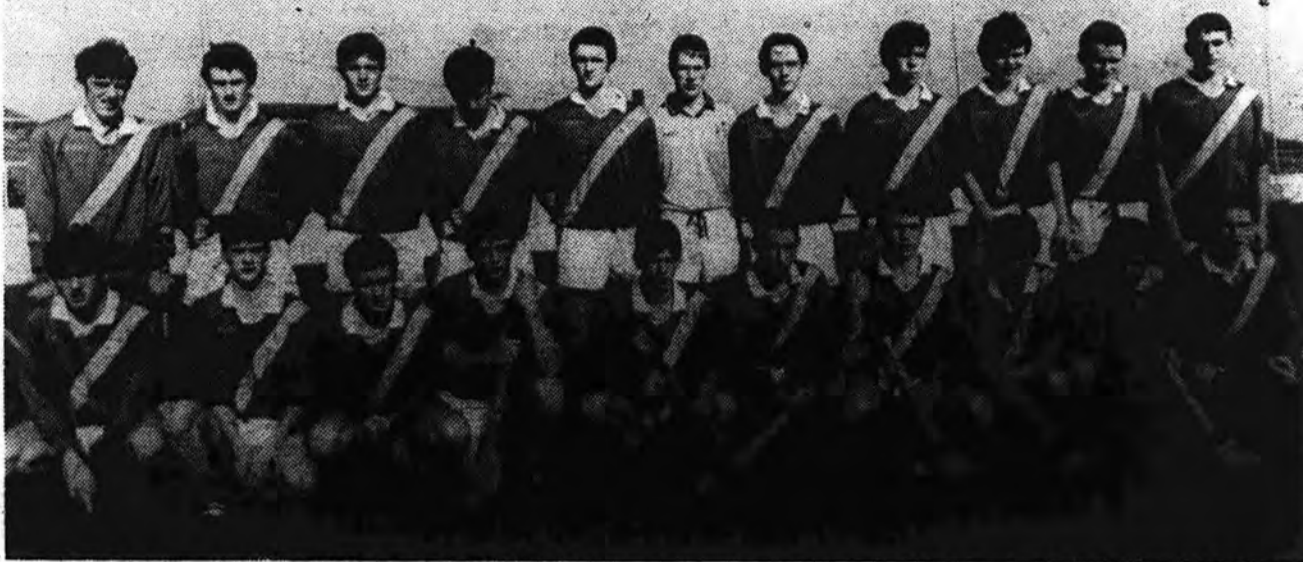
There was a similarity of colours, but as the game wore on, patrons had no difficulty in distinguishing the players.

### PLAY

The game started with Tallow, who are joined with their neighbours, Shamrocks, for underage purposes, playing with the fairly strong breeze. In the 3rd minute Tallow team captain

James Murray had the opener with a long distance point and this was followed three minutes later with a Ray Henley goal to give the Western challengers a 4 points lead within 6 minutes. Mount Sion put in their first attack, but Barry Power cleared. Following another Tallow attack centre forward Charlie Cronin had the ball in the Mount Sion goal to make the score 2-1 to nil in favour of Tallow who were completely in control of the match at this stage.

Almost 18 minutes had gone by before the Eastern champions raised a white flag and this was achieved by corner forward Jason Farrell, who had been moved from corner back before the start of the game. Mark Walsh missed the chance of a goal when he shot inches wide before Dan Kelly, who was to become Mount Sion's top scorer and Paul Murray exchanged points. James Murray pointed a 22nd minute free before Roy Henley shot home his second goal to put Tallow 10 points clear on a 3-3 to 0-2 score after 25 minutes of play. A splendid Pdraigh Tobin point extended the Tallow lead and they went still further ahead when Paul Mur-

ray converted a free in the 28th minute. A twelve points lead looked ominous for Mount Sion who were being given no room to settle and struggling to maintain a challenge. They did have the final two points of the half by Eoin McGrath and Carl Cunningham to leave the halfway tally at 3-5 to 0-4.

### NIGHTMARE

The first seven minutes of the second half must have proved something of a nightmare for Tallow supporters as they watched Mount Sion take almost complete control and leave the Western champions under severe pressure. During this period Mount Sion tacked on 1-4 without reply. Dan Kelly in the 31st and 34th minutes added points. Then Eoin McGrath and Dan Kelly had points before Mount Sion's goal by corner forward Patrick Bowe reduced the gap to a mere 3 points and with the breeze behind them and another 23 minutes remaining, it looked as if the long Tallow wait for this title was going to be extended still further.

Another Mount Sion attack was repulsed by strong defensive play involving goalkeeper Barry Power, son of an illustrious father who needs no introduction to the hurling fraternity in Portlairge, Seamus Tobin, Sean Slattery, Mossie O'Brien and their half back line of James Murray, playing a captain's part all the way, and James Baldwin. Twelve second half minutes had gone by before Tallow raised a flag, so when James

Murray pointed a free, it was a very relieving score. The captain added to his three star display when scoring another point in the 44th minute. At the other end, Pat Bowe, who had Sion's first goal, missed an open goal to the utter dismay of their supporters. An exchange of pointed frees by Dan Kelly and James Murray was followed by a spectacular save by Barry Power in the 50th minute. Dan Kelly pointed a free for Mount Sion and in a blazing final seven or eight minutes the Eastern champions threw everything they knew into a final effort to rescue the game. A great clearance by full back Sean Slattery with about five minutes remaining, must have been one of the big factors in killing the Mount Sion momentum at this point. Power finished off a great display by bringing off a late save, shortly before Roger Casey blew the final whistle.

As well as the players already mentioned, Tallow had great midfielders in Paul Murray and John O'Donovan, Shane (Finn) McCarthy, Mark Walsh, Pdraigh Tobin and double goal scorer Ray Henley.

But overall theirs was a full team effort and while a few might have merited a three-star rating, every player contributed his part to a great victory.

Mount Sion took too long to settle down in the first half and were left with too much leeway to make up in the second half, but all the way in the second half they proved a constant threat to

the winners.

Some of their best performances were given by Daniel Kelly, Eoin McGrath, John Paul Kennedy, Clive Power, Carl Cunningham and team captain Paul Hammond.

### PRESENTATION

Scenes of wild excitement were witnessed by the huge Tallow support as team captain James Murray mounted the stand to receive the cup from the County Chairman P. S. O Riain, who paid compliments to both teams for a wonderful final. James Murray in reply paid tribute to his panel of players, selectors and club and supporters, etc.

# Coaching And Games Development News



In the photograph are over 50 young hurlers who were chosen for the gala coaching day held at Dungarvan G.A.A. grounds on Saturday, October 4th. They were selected having attended coaching sessions at different venues throughout the county. Also in the photograph are the coaches on the day namely Rod Guiney (who kindly brought the Bob O'Keeffe Cup), Colm Bonnar, Shane Ahearn, Ray Barry, Tony Browne and Ken McGrath. This is the last project undertaken by the Coaching and Games Development Committee. A brief outline of the work done by this committee includes the following -

There are four full-time employees working to promote the G.A.A. in Co. Waterford. Part or all of their work programmes are drawn

up and published in poster form. There is a very successful FAS coaching scheme in operation throughout West Waterford and members of the Coaching Committee, in liaison with Coisde Peil, monitor this scheme. Adult coaching courses in football and hurling have been held at numerous locations throughout the county and these have been orchestrated by the committee. Throughout the winter months many indoor hurling tournaments/blitzes have been held and these have been very popular. Over 30 summer camps in hurling and football and involving over 2,000 children were held and the numbers of attenders speak for themselves. Referee recruitment and refresher courses were held and a small number of new referees came on stream. There were intensive

coaching sessions held for under-12's and a very successful gala day was held in early June. Exhibition games were held in conjunction with N.H.L. fixtures against Dublin and Antrim in Walsh Park. In conjunction with home I.N.T.O. there was a teacher's coaching course held in July. During the summer, the coaching on the greens in large housing estates in the city involved coaching hundreds of children, many being introduced for the first time to G.A.A. For five consecutive Fridays in Walsh Park, up to 150 children were involved in non-stop games. Special days were set aside, for the first time, for the preparation of our Tony Forristal and Sonny Walsh teams. An open ended elite squad of under-13's is currently being formulated and these will receive specialised tuition on

a monthly basis. A youth corner with penpictures of our county players and a special quiz was run in the "Dungarvan Leader". Some post primary schools held transition-foundation courses and we supplied personnel/equipment to assist a number of these. A county hurling plan was drafted and sent in to the Munster Hurling Development Committee and we were allocated moneys solely on the strength of these plans.

The above is but a brief outline of the work being undertaken and carried out by the Coaching & Games Development Committee. It's not all headline seeking nor should it ever aspire to be but the sceptics may be assured that we are a properly functioning and hard-working committee and we will continue to do so for as long as we hold office.

Even without Paul Flynn the 'Gunnery', if they have recovered from last Sunday, can win. Hopefully they will.

**INCREASED INSURANCE  
PREMIUMS**

As and from January 1st next year, the accident players injury scheme will cost 20 per cent more for all participating teams. Up to now the cost was £100 per team and £50 for minor teams. Because of pressure from counties to have team officials, etc., included, the scheme will have to cost more. Team officials who perform designated duties in association with the teams, will now be afforded the same cover as players. In future it will be known as the GAA Insurance Scheme. The Public Liability insurance is also due to be increased by 10% as and from next year.

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**Traffic Calming Project At Leamybrien**

A major project has started in the village of Leamybrien which will see the introduction of numerous traffic calming measures in the area. The work, carried out by Waterford County Council, began last Friday in the village. Huge traffic signs warning motorists of a 40 mph zone will be erected on both approach roads to Leamybrien replacing the small signs often ignored by speeding drivers.

The project is grant aided by the National Roads Authority and was first mooted in 1994 by Waterford County Councillor, Oliver Coffey. Welcoming the project, Cllr. Coffey said the new signs will help reduce speeding in the busy village. It is also proposed to relocate the existing telephone kiosk at the side of the main national road to a safer location.

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
