## VEC Considers Options As Legal Hitch Halts College Project

A legal matter has temporarily put a halt to the final planning permission for the construction of a £1m plus technical college at Ringnasilloge, Dungarvan.

Members of Dungarvan UDC were due to make a final decision on whether or not to grant planning permission to the project by way of a material contravention at their meeting last week. This material contravention would in effect charge the zoning of the land at Ringnasilloge from recreational and amenity to allow the development to proceed.

The matter was adjourned from last week's meeting however allowing the County Manager, Donal Connolly, time to receive legal opinion on a questionable matter.

The hitch appears to be that six of the Urban Council members who will have

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## KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

### QUESTION

My husband is unemployed and is receiving £133.90 Unemployment Assistance for our family of two children. I have MS which entails additional costs. Would I be entitled to any payment in my own right or how can we improve our financial position?

### ANSWER

If your condition is such that you require full-time care and attention (for at least 12 months) then you may be better off as a family if you were in receipt of Disability Allowance (medical certification is required to be eligible). If you qualify, your husband could then apply for the Carer's Allowance. If you qualified for Disability Allowance you would get maximum £80.70 (£67.50 personal and £13.20 half rate, children). If your husband qualified for the Carers Allowance he would get £83.70 (£70.50 personal and £13.20 half rate, children) giving a total of £164.40, making the family better off by £30.50.

However, if you are getting assistance under the Supplementary Welfare Allowance Scheme towards Rent or Mortgage, your Rent Allowance would be reduced, leaving you still better off, but only by £3. (Differential Rent from a Local authority would also be affected). But if you qualified for Disability Allowance you would be entitled to a Free Travel Pass and a Companion Pass which would allow someone to travel free with you. You may also qualify for the Free Electricity Allowance, TV Licence, Telephone Rental, if your husband is getting the Carers Allowance and your children are under 18 or if in full-time education, under 22.

The application forms are available from your local Social Welfare Office or the Social Welfare Services Office, Government Buildings, Ballinalee Road, Longford. Telephone 043-45211 or 01-8748444.

# Criticism Of Council's Clashmore Litter Prosecutions

Clashmore based County Councillor Gary O'Halloran has stated that he was both devastated and disappointed at the manner in which the Council handled recent prosecutions under the Litter Act.

Six offenders from the Clashmore area appeared before a recent sitting of Youghal District Court after they were caught dumping on film by a hired surveillance operator at the slate quarries in Clashmore. The private lensman has been hired out by the Council to stake out various dumping

locations such as outside the dump at Dungarvan, Moorefield in Tallow, the civic site in Lismore and parts of Ring/Old Parish.

The court imposed fines ranging from £10 to £800 with costs although under the new Litter Act of 1997 the maximum fine will be £1,500 plus the cost of the

surveillance operator.

While fully supportive of the Council's plans to stamp out indiscriminate dumping around the county, Cllr. O'Halloran quoted, "it ain't what you do, it's the way that you do it". According to the Clashmore barrister,

many of those prosecuted under the Act were old age pensioners, described by Cllr. O'Halloran as 'decent, respected and hardworking' members of the community.

In reply, Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly said it was regrettable that some people ended up in court but said the Council can only do the best it can to clean up the county. He added that the Council intends to take further prosecutions against littering and indiscriminate dumping.

## Local Irish Conference A Huge Success

The Bord na Gaeilge national seminar, recently hosted by Waterford County Council in Dungarvan, has been hailed as a resounding success.

According to Council Chairman, Lar Hart, indications are that the conference will return to the county in the near future. Over 300 people attended the seminar in the Park Hotel, creating a welcome off-season boost to the economy.

On the proposal of Cllr. Billy Kyne, a vote of congratulations was sent by the County Council to Anthony Walsh Irish Officer with the local authority and Waterford Crystal who donated a beautiful presentation crystal piece to mark the occasion.

When hosted in Gweedore, Co. Donegal two years ago, the Bord na Gaeilge Conference received negative local publicity with Council members being accused of wasting tax payers money to travel to and attend the conference.

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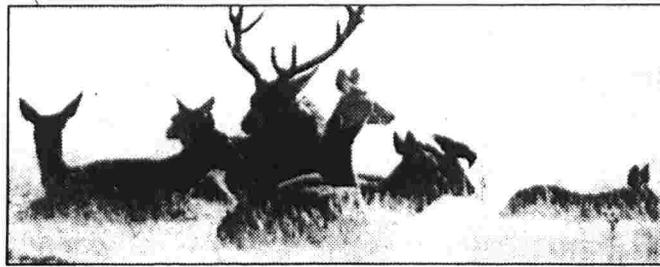
# Autumn Is Breeding Time For Bats And Deer

**In the autumn, bats and deer breed. Rabbits and hares have no fixed breeding season as they have several litters in a year.**

This is also true of the weasel — which will have more than one litter in the year, and the second and third may come as late as early October.

But in general the spring is the main breeding season for our wildlife.

Bats and deer alone are among Irish animals to breed only in autumn. The breeding season for bats is at the end of September, but the single



young one is not born until the following June.

Three kinds of native deer — red, fallow and roe — mate in

the autumn. The young are born in May or June of the following year.

The red deer is found only

in certain districts and often can only be seen in parks. But the fallow deer and the roe are reasonably common in the woods of southern England, though they are nocturnal.

In the rutting season the stags make themselves known by 'roaring' a bellow. The sound carries a long way.

In the autumn the stags of all our deer become savage and you should not approach them. Even the little roebuck can fatally injure a man.

### Junior Encyclopaedia

HOW YOUR COOKER AND MICROWAVE WORK

#### Gas ovens

Flammable gas goes around the burners and these are controlled by valves. When the gas is lit, the valve will control the height of the flame.

The gas comes from a cylinder or from gas pipes which run along outside your gate. Your home is connected to these pipes by a lot of special pipes. In an oven the heat rises from the bottom, but if you have it heated before you put your food in, the heat should reach the food from all directions.

#### Microwave oven

Food is cooked in a gas or electric oven by the production of heat from gas combustion or from current rising through the resistance. However, microwave ovens cook food by means of radiation. A tube called a magnetron generates the radiation. This makes the food molecules shake, making heat by internal friction that results from the collision of these molecules. Microwaves can be dangerous if the radiation hits the body, but microwave walls are insulated to prevent this from happening.

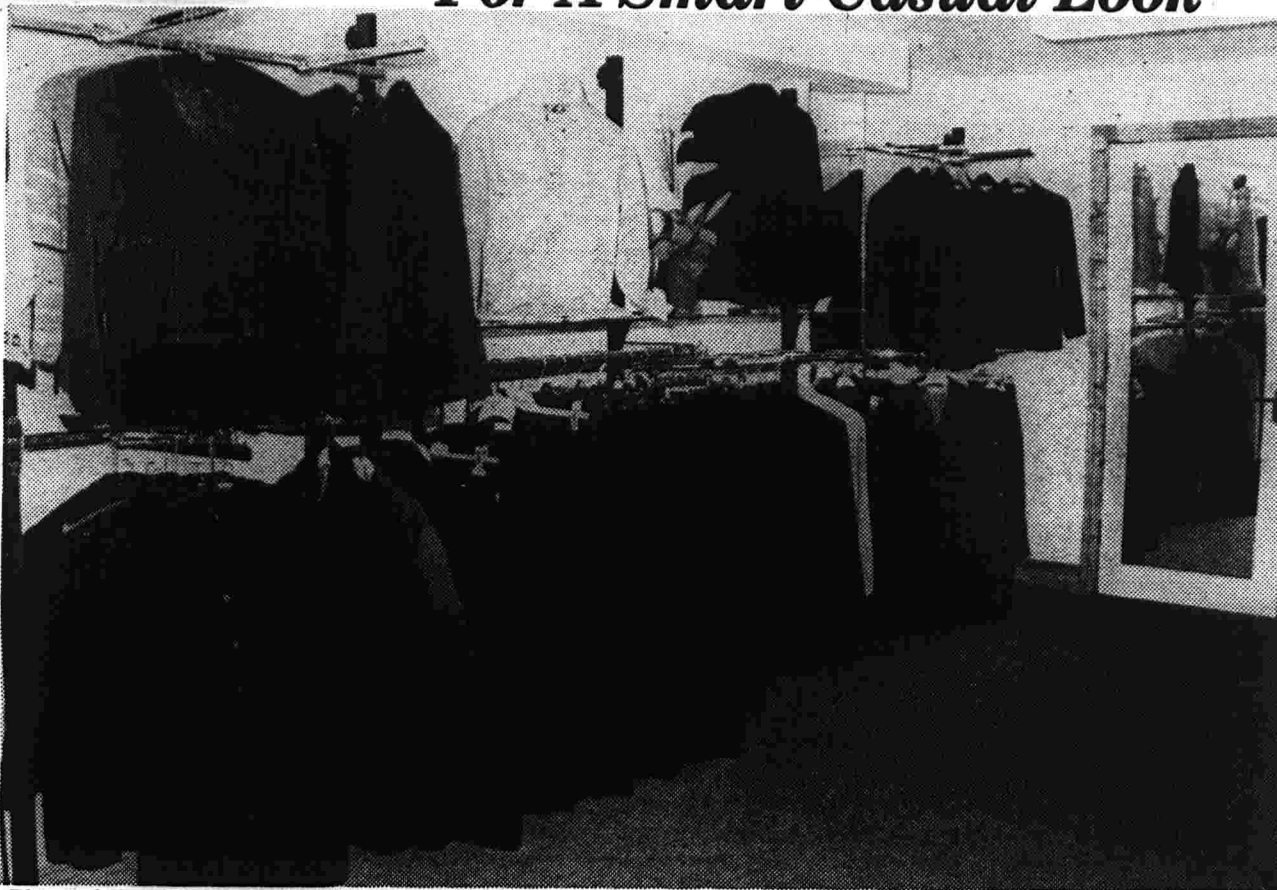

## Dungarvan Tidy Towns Report

It seems ironic that the year in which Dungarvan and the entire county is striving to attain litter free status in order to win the prize of a £1 million advance factory, the Dungarvan Tidy Towns Report showed a drop of one mark in litter control, scoring a total of 191 points as opposed to 192 points last year.

Commenting on this year's report, Cllr. Damien Dillon said the town is a disgrace when it comes to litter control with people abandoning rubbish on streets and from car windows.

Likewise Cllr. Lar Hart slammed that litter-wise, lunch hour is the worst time of day in the town centre. He warned that take-away owners have a responsibility like everyone else to ensure that their rubbish is picked up. Towns such as Villierstown and Cappoquin, he added, are doing trojan work in becoming litter free and it would be a 'fright' if Dun-

garvan would let the whole county down.

County Manager Donal Connolly said the Council intends to write off to the Tidy Towns adjudicating panel for a more detailed report.

He hoped that by the next Tidy Towns inspection, the litter situation in the town will have changed considerably and the current urban renewal projects will be more complete.

The following are the marks for this year (last year's marks in brackets)—

**OVERALL DEVELOPMENTAL APPROACH 39 (39) Max. 50**

Thank you for a very well filled in application form, the 3-5 year work programme and a map of the town which was quite helpful. Unfortunately, the street names were difficult to read and additionally many of the streets do not have street name signs. The Committee is to be very much congratulated for their success in liaising with Dungarvan UDC, Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce and Dungarvan Museum Society, the Local Authority and individual Residents Associations. This is quite an undertaking for the ten members of the committee. The 3-5 year programme is excellent and you are wished every success in its implementation.

**THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT 24 (24) Max. 40**

Dungarvan is a town with a very historic built environment including some unique historic features such as King John's Castle and St.

Garvan's Church. There are some very fine houses and buildings and most of these are well kept and painted. Approximately 10 acres of the town centre have been designated under the Urban Renewal Act 1994 and work is currently under way.

Most of this activity centres on the quay/castle area. An essential part of the future plans is that the whole quay front will be upgraded. This together with the new building programme that is envisaged, will make quite a difference to the fabric of the town. It is hoped that in the process of this development, the wirescape of the town that detracts so much at the moment, will be considered and placed underground.

**LANDSCAPING 25 (25) Max. 40**

The landscaping proposals are excellent. It is hoped that this planting will consist mainly of the larger types of trees and that despite its quick effect, variegated poplar will be avoided. Grassed areas throughout are generally well kept. There is a very fine park at Maher Street.

**WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES 18 (18) Max. 30**

The Committee is to be congratulated on their efforts in relation to wildlife, particularly your successful appeal to the Department of the Marine against a licence application for a clam growing farm.

**LITTER 20 (21) Max. 40**

It is appreciated that in a town as large as Dungarvan that litter is quite a problem. Your efforts in this regard are to be commended and your awareness campaigns are wished every success.

**TIDINESS 14 (14) Max. 20**

Similarly to litter control, it is appreciated that tidiness is also a problem in such a large area. Your approach of awareness is commended.

**RESIDENTIAL AREA 21 (21) Max. 30**

Dungarvan is a town with a very good housing stock. Streets and most of the estates were very well presented. The formation of Residents Groups should be encouraged if they are not already in place. Individual houses throughout were excellent, many with very fine gardens.

**ROADS, STREETS AND BACK AREAS 25 (25) Max. 40**

The lack of nameplates on most streets and roads make it very difficult to orient oneself in Dungarvan. There is a general lack of traffic signs and this extends even beyond Dungarvan. The finger sign on the main road from Ardmore does not include Dungarvan. Road markings are not strong/clear enough. It is understood that the Committee is unhappy with the present quality of signage, so it is expected that this problem will be dealt with in the near future in conjunction with the Local Authority.

**GENERAL IMPRESSION 5 (5) Max. 10**

Dungarvan is a very fine prosperous town, with fine buildings and houses. There are wonderful views and vistas and a lovely beach close to the town. It is appreciated that it is very difficult to monitor and organise a Tidy Town Programme but it is felt that over time this committee will be successful through involvement of the whole community.

## Proposed Extension To Abbeyside NS At Planning Stage

The proposed extension to Abbeyside national school is currently at planning stage. The Minister for Education and Science Michael Martin, has stated that the school's consultant design team recently completed a revised cost plan for the scheme which has now been approved by his Department.

Minister Martin was replying to a Dail question raised on behalf of Waterford Labour Deputy Brian O'Shea by Deputy Pat Upton. The school manager has been advised to proceed with an application for planning permission and fire certificate for the extension project.

When all the necessary planning work is complete, a decision on the timing of the tender and contract process will subsequently be made in light of existing contractual commitments and available capital funding.

The Minister added that he is not in a position to give a realistic commencement date for the project at this time.

## Miracle Runner Defies Horrific Head Injuries

Having survived horrific head injuries in a tragic collision with a car last February, 32 year old athlete Simon Lloyd of Wickham, Kent is now a walking miracle.

Engaged to Marie Bulfin,

daughter of Mary and Jerry Bulfin, St. Patrick's Crescent, Dungarvan, Simon is a regular visitor to the town and has even taken part in the Dungarvan 10k.

After being struck down by a car while crossing a dan-

gerous road near his Wickham home last February, Simon was air-lifted to hospital suffering multiple injuries and spent two weeks in intensive care. It was feared that he would be permanently brain damaged and

until only two months ago he used a wheelchair and crutches. Simon's horrific injuries included skull and facial fractures, massive bruising of the central part of his brain and lungs and a fractured leg.

A chartered accountant, Simon was the top O level English language student in the country but after the accident he had to learn to speak, read and write from scratch. Throughout his remarkable recovery his fiancée Marie stuck by him, nursing him back to health.

Only last Monday Simon, dubbed the miracle runner, took part in the Dublin City Marathon and his remarkable story has attracted the attentions of Channel Four, CNN, Sky Sports and national British newspapers.

Simon and Marie spent a short holiday in Dungarvan last week before travelling to Dublin for the marathon.

The accident has completely changed their outlook on life and Simon is currently writing a book on his experiences.

"I'm just very, very lucky to be alive", said Simon.

## Report Carried Out On Dungarvan Harbour

A report by Town Engineer Ray O'Dwyer on a number of studies undertaken on Dungarvan harbour was discussed by members of Dungarvan UDC last week. A substantial sum of money is required to improve and develop the local quay with £15,000 needed to improve the leading lights into the harbour in time for the next sailing season.

Dungarvan UDC intends to carry out short term priority works on the harbour

and will put forward a number of schemes costing £675,000 such as repairs to the quay wall and road infrastructure development to the Department of the Environment for funding.

With regard to the inner harbour quay walls from the Lookout to Abbeyside Church, the report found that structural work is needed on the Dungarvan side while masonry work is needed on the Abbeyside quay walls. One of the priority areas highlighted in the report is the badly damaged jetty near

the public toilets, currently closed off to the public because of its dangerous condition.

The development of a £2m marina in the harbour was also put forward in the report as a long term project for the town.

Welcoming Mr. O'Dwyer's report, UDC Chairman Austin Flynn suggested that the Council officials should visit similar harbours around the country to ascertain how development work has been carried out.

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## BOVINE TB AND BRUCellosis ERADICATION SCHEMES

### 1997/1998 HARDSHIP GRANT

1. The 1997/1998 Hardship Grant eligibility period will commence on 1 November, 1997. It is designed to alleviate the costs difficulty of some herdowners whose holdings are restricted on foot of a herd re-test and where animals are retained and fed during periods of restriction. Potentially eligible herdowners must meet certain conditions including requirements that they (i) must not have any income from milk sales, and (ii) must not have any off farm income. The Grant may provide eligible herdowners with a payment of up to £200 per month for a period not exceeding 4 months within the period 1 November, 1997 to 30 April, 1998.

2. The specific eligibility criteria attaching to the Hardship Grant are outlined in the terms and conditions document which will accompany the application form ER 97. Potentially eligible herdowners will be issued with the terms and conditions document, important notice and application form ER 97 by the District Veterinary Office. Supplies of the relevant documentation will also be available at District Veterinary Offices.

3. The onus is on potentially eligible herdowners whose holdings are or may be restricted at a re-test at 1 November, 1997 or during the period 1 November, 1997 to 30 April, 1998 to ensure that they obtain and familiarise themselves with the terms and conditions document and application form ER 97. The onus is on the herdowner to apply for a Hardship Grant.

#### Note:

Herdowners who received any Hardship Grant payment in respect of the period between 1 November, 1996 and 30 April, 1997 cannot qualify for a Hardship Grant during the current eligibility period 1 November, 1997 to 30 April, 1998.

# Cappoquin Notes

## CAPPOQUIN SALMON & TROUT ANGLERS ASSOCIATION

As anglers, all of us in the Cappoquin Salmon and Trout Anglers Association have a keen interest in the habitat particularly in the nursery streams for salmon and trout throughout the Blackwater system. Many of these streams are in need of urgent attention to enhance the spawning beds and provide an environment for a much improved survival rate of fry and parr to the smolt stage.

Note - Work carried out on the Moy system in Mayo has increased the survival rate by 600% in many areas.

Such a project requires the expertise of the Central Fisheries Board (C.F.B.) and of course a substantial sum of money. The Central Fisheries Board currently administer the E.U. funded Operational Programme for Tourism - Tourism Angling Measure. The programme provides grant aid for fishery development both in-stream and infrastructure. It is up to each fishery to apply for their own funding.

However Nursery Stream Development could be 100% grant aided as a separate Blackwater Valley Project. To achieve this, a representation needs to be made to the Central Fisheries Board; making a case based on the numbers and the potential numbers of tourist anglers throughout the Blackwater Valley. We believe that a federated representation of all interested parties to the C.F.B. could result in a very much enhanced return of salmon and sea trout to the Blackwater.

With this mission in mind, we will host a meeting at the Grand Hotel, Fermoy on Monday, November 3rd at 8 p.m. where this project can be discussed. Cappoquin Salmon and Trout Anglers Association will chair this meeting to facilitate the election of representatives.

Note - A representative of the C.F.B. will attend this meeting.

The time for action is now. Application time is running out as are the funds. This op-

portunity to enhance our stocks will not come again. We urge all of you to attend and make your voice heard for the sake of ALL anglers.

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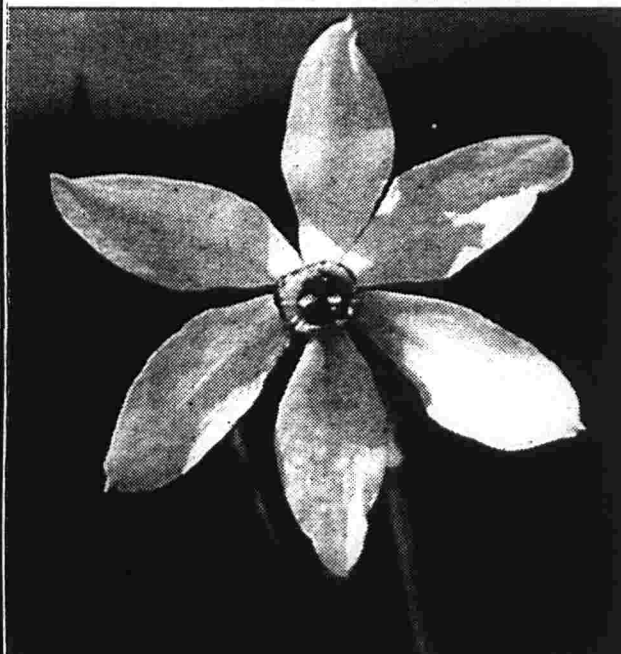
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# Why A "Daff" Is Really A Narcissi



DAFFODIL or narcissus? Actually they're the same thing

There are some flowers even the most uninterested non-gardener recognises immediately. Daffodils are one of the select band of universally popular plants.

Contrary to popular belief, there is no difference between a daffodil and a narcissus.

The botanical name narcissus is used for both plants and the separation into narcissus and daffodil is an entirely artificial one created by gardeners.

Narcissus thrive best in a strong, fertile, well drained soil. They do not appreciate being planted in soil dressed with fresh farmyard manure and once established, the flowering of the bulbs will be improved by an annual feed with a complete fertiliser at 56g per square metre, each February.

### Planting

Bulbs are best planted in August, if possible, so the roots are well established by the time growth stops at the onset of the cold weather.

Depth of planting depends on the bulb size, smaller species 5 to 8cm deep, larger flowered species and hybrids 10 to 15cm deep in bare soil, 10 to 20cm deep under the lawn.

### Leaves

A common practice is to knot the leaves so they look tidy after they have flowered but it is not a wise one. The bulb needs its green foliage after flowering in order to replace the energy spent on the bloom. It recharges its botanical batteries by exposing green leaves to the sunlight.

If you bundle the leaves up, you reduce their surface area and so reduce their sun-trapping efficiency.

You will also split and distort the tissues which transport nutrients and moisture down the bulb.

However, knotting the leaves is certainly better than cutting them off completely.

But for the health of the bulb and of next season's flowers, it is much better to let the foliage die down naturally.

If you must knot for tidiness, at least wait until the leaves start to fade and the tips become limp.

### Dividing

As long as a clump of daffodils is bursting with colour, you need not disturb it. The simple rule is to divide when a mass of tightly packed foliage produces only a scattering of flowers.

How often you will need to divide the clumps depends upon the variety of daffodil, but as a rough guide it will generally be no more than once every five or six years.

Lift the clump when the foliage has died, and separate the bulbs as soon as possible as daffodils do not benefit from being out of the ground, unlike some other bulbs.

## TILLAGE

### Barley Yellow Dwarf Virus:—

Aphid numbers are high. Spray all September early October sown crops at the first opportunity. A follow up spray later sown crops at the 1-3 leaf stage. Use any contact insecticide such as Decis, Cypersect, Cyperkill, Sumialpha, Swat, etc.

### Aphids in Volunteer Cereals/Grass Weeds:—

Sampling stubble ground with high levels of high volunteer cereals and or grass weeds has shown high aphid numbers. Where these aphids are ploughed down there is a very high risk of virus infection as the cereals plants are emerging through the soil. This problem will not arise where the stubble has been desiccated. Spray green stubbles pre-ploughing with either a contract insecticide or a desiccant. If using a desiccant, wait until the foliage is completely desiccated before ploughing. However, ploughing can take place within a few hours after an aphicide application.

## DAIRY

Recent trial work from Hillsborough has shown that to have 2½ hours per day grazing for cows from February 26, will add an extra £1 per day profit to farmers pockets. It is now the aim of discussion group members to set their farms up to achieve this target profit in Spring. You may ask why were they discussing this in October? It is very relevant because you cannot have early spring grass if you graze late in November. The obvious question then is, could that spring £1 not have been got from November grass? If managed correctly both £1's can be earned by grazing out paddocks in rotation in November. Start the last rotation around October 10th and finish that rotation on November 15 - 25.

Farmers who are running out of grass (not having planned it) should house all animals early in November. This will ensure reasonable grass in March. Remember, that for every week of meal feeding in Spring, 50 Kgs of meal is eaten by cows at 7 kgs per day (recommended). Spring grass will save on some of this cost.

## AGRI MONETARY COMPENSATION SCHEME FOR PRODUCERS OF FINISHED BEEF ANIMALS

A nationally funded scheme to compensate beef producers for losses of income they sustained because of green pound revaluations in January and March of this year has been approved.

### Eligible Animals:—

1. Finished heifers (not less than 450 kgs.), sold through livestock marts or slaughtered in licensed meat export premises or licensed abattoirs in the period 1 April 1997 to 10 June 1997.
  2. Finished male animals slaughtered at licensed premises during the same period.
- Application forms are available from District Livestock Offices and Teagasc Offices. The closing date is Friday, November 7, 1997.

## Co. Waterford ICMSA News

### SOUTH EAST AREA WELL REPRESENTED AT ICMSA NATIONAL A.G.M.

The South East area was well represented at the ICMSA National A.G.M. held in Limerick on Wednesday, October 22.

Speaking at the A.G.M. of the Association, ICMSA President, Mr. Frank Allen, urged the Government to enter into a ten year contract with farmers to save the family farm structures from extinction.

Mr. Allen said the lack of action by successive Governments on planning the agriculture industry, together with

the deep uncertainty about the future of farming was causing an exodus of farmers from the land at the rate of well over 100 per week.

"For the first time in almost half a century Irish farmers now find themselves struggling to survive without any State support for farm investment. Farmers simply cannot afford to pay the five figure sums of money required to comply with the EU environmental and hygiene regulations which are demanded in today's world.

Mr. Allen said benefits of the Celtic Tiger economy are by-passing farmers. "Almost every other sector apart from

farming is riding on the crest of a wave due to Ireland's booming economy. Farmers are leaving the land in their droves — forced to leave by the uncertainty of the future — to avail of the numerous jobs and better wages now being offered in factories and other sectors such as the building industry."

"It's a terrible indictment of the Government that it sets out through national policy to make the return from investment in tax driven urban and seaside projects more definite and profitable than investment in farming."

"The future of farming is a minefield of uncertainty, principally because of the shameful failure of successive Governments to develop a national plan for agriculture for the new millennium. What lies ahead for the sector is further clouded by the severe challenges posed by the imminent reform of the CAP, the approaching new world trade agreement, EMU and the proposed expansion of the EU."

The ICMSA President called on the Government to now honour its pledge in its Programme to carry out the most fundamental reform of the Department of Agriculture since it was set up in 1990. He said the central part of this review should be an aim to devise a ten year contract entered into by the Department to put the preservation of the family farm structure at the top of the political agenda. The first ten years of the new millennium should be a decade of care to achieve the

economic viability of our family farms, based on sound co-ordinated planning.

"The backbone of the rural economy is the family farm structure which is fading because of wanton neglect. Rural life as we know it in Ireland will disappear if farm families are not given the support they deserve as job creators, food producers, environmentalists and tourism promoters."

## IFA Demands Action From Minister Walsh On Severe Income Crisis On Hill Sheep Farms

Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman, Harry Gray, has called for direct action from Agriculture Minister Joe Walsh to address the severe income problem on hill sheep farms. "Mountain lamb prices have reduced by £6/lamb since August and together with the £8.50/head cut in ewe premium has left hill sheep farmers with a major income crisis, which must be addressed by Minister Walsh."

The Waterford IFA Sheep farmers leader said it is not appreciated at official level that the ewe premium and headage payment makes up 100% of the net farm income for hill flock owners. "When the ewe premium is cut by over 40%, it has a devastating impact on the income of hill sheep farmers."

Mr. Gray pointed out that the 1997 ewe premium may be less than £12/ewe, a cut of a full £8.50/head compared to the 1995 level of £20.59/ewe.

The Waterford IFA Sheep farmers leader said Minister Walsh and the Department could no longer ignore the income crisis in hill sheep areas. "IFA have put forward detailed proposals to

Minister Walsh as far back as last August, involving the introduction of extensification premium worth a minimum of £4.50/ewe an increase in the Rural World Premium to £10/ewe and increase headage targeted at hill sheep farmers."

Mr. Gray said Minister Walsh needs to set a deadline of delivery on these critical issues between now and Christmas. "The Minister must realise that this problem will not go away and IFA will pursue it until we get full delivery in line with the commitment in Programme 2000 and election promises made last June."

The Waterford IFA sheep farmers leader said that the Minister has a very strong case to make in Brussels in view of the fact that there has been huge savings in the EU ewe premium budget in 1996 and 1997. "The ewe premium has been cut by 40% involving savings of £650 in the EU sheep budget. Minister Walsh must ensure that this money is not lost to sheep farmers and secure it in the form of extensification premium and increase Rural World Premium."

## Donovan Says Delay £50/Head Payment To Winter Finishers Is "A Disgrace"

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan, has described the ongoing delay in the payment of the £50/head revaluation payment to Winter Finishers as a disgrace. Mr. Donovan said the £50/head payment was announced 6 months ago and at this stage not one penny has been paid out to the producers concerned.

Mr. Donovan said Winter Finishers promised this money to merchants and bankers in good faith on the back of the announcement from the Minister for Agriculture last April and now find they have been totally let down. The Waterford IFA Livestock leader warned Agricultural Minister Joe Walsh that there could be no renegeing on the amount of money due agreed at £50/head on finished cattle disposed of between April 1 and June 10, 1997.

Mr. Donovan called on Minister Walsh to immediately secure EU clearance and have this money paid out to hard pressed winter finishers without further delay.

The Waterford IFA man said that the long delays on this payment are not acceptable.

A total of £94,000 of the cost of the development

work has been raised including a £40,000 EU Leader fund grant from Waterford Development Partnership with £25,000 being received in interest free loans from the local community while the local organisations have contributed to £18,000.

Other speakers at the opening ceremony included P. J. Feeney, Chairman of Ballyduff Community Council who oversees the day to day running of the hall.

the final say in whether the project goes ahead or not are also members of the Co. Waterford VEC who originally applied for permission for the single storey college.

UDC Chairman Austin Flynn is a teacher at the existing VEC school in Dungarvan and a member of the committee, Cllr. Billy Kyne is Chairman of the VEC while councillors Lar Hart, Nuala Ryan, Paddy Power and Michael O'Riordan are all members of the Vocational Educational Committee.

While the Manager receives legal advice on this matter, the level of opposition to the location of the proposed college at Quann's remains as strong as ever.

Representatives of the Co.

Waterford VEC have already met with some of the Childers Estate residents in an unsuccessful bid to resolve the issue.

It was subsequently suggested by the County Manager that the VEC examine the Presentation site at the Youghal Road, as an alternative for the new college location. This relocation however would require the full cooperation of the Department of Education who are funding the entire development.

The Department have already indicated that the VEC should remain focussed on the processing of the planning permission for Quann's and if it should run into temporary or permanent dif-

ficulties, they would then re-examine the situation.

At last week's meeting of the Co. Waterford VEC, cognisance was given to the suitability and advantages of the Presentation site if attainable and all members acknowledged what was seen as the positive intervention of the County Manager both locally and nationally.

VEC members were unanimous in the decision that both sites - that of Quann's and the Presentation - should be examined further to keep their options open. The extra cost of a feasibility study

and possible purchase of the Presentation site however would be significant and would need the complete backing of the Department.

# Family health

**Q.** My 7 year old son is driving us mad. The problem is he keeps wetting the bed at night. This means that I have to change his bedclothes every day and I seem to have a never ending pile of wet sheets to wash. He is very good during the day. I am afraid he will keep this up for ages yet and I know that I won't be able to cope with it. Is there something physically wrong with him or is he just being bold?

**A.** Your son is suffering from a condition called nocturnal enuresis, to give it its medical name. This occurs when a

child over 5 wets the bed persistently. It is a common problem, at 5 years 1 in 10 children wet the bed, this reduces to 1 in 10 at 10 years and even in adults 1 in 100 still wet the bed. No single cause has been discovered for bedwetting. However many things are associated with it for example family stress, a history of bedwetting and deep

sleep. Bedwetting usually resolves itself by the time the child is 5 years old and most of those that are not dry at 5 will be dry at night by the time they reach their teens. Between the ages of 5 and 7 it is normal to try encouragement and star charts where the child fills in a star if he has been dry at night and he builds up a chart of stars.

After the age of 7 the pad and alarm are usually used. This is a small device which sounds a buzzer or bell which wakes the child as he begins to wet the bed and he becomes aware of what's happening. Your doctor may decide to treat your child with a medicine which will reduce the amount of urine he produces at night. It is unlikely that there is anything physically wrong with your son, however, your doctor will do some urine tests to rule out any problems such as infection which can be treated easily.

Remember it's not your fault or your sons that he wets the bed. Patience, love and encouragement will help in resolving the problem for everyone.

**Q.** My daughters teacher sent for me last week and told me that my daughter had head lice and that I had better get them treated or my daughter would be responsible for an epidemic of head lice among all the pupils in the school. I feel bad about this and felt so guilty that

she should pick up these dreadful bugs. I don't know what to do about them. I'm ashamed to go to my own doctor as my standards of hygiene are usually very high and I can't understand how she picked them up. Could you help me please?

**A.** Head lice are insects that are smaller than a match head. They are usually a grey-brown in colour. They can be found on any part of the head but most commonly they are found at the nape of the neck and behind the ears. If you suspect that your child has lice then this is a good place to start your search. They have evolved, over time as natural and very unwelcome inhabitants of human scalp. In fact they have adapted themselves so well to this environment that they cannot survive anywhere else. Lice live for about one month and during this time they live off the blood, which they get by biting into the scalp. The female louse lays many hundreds of eggs during her lifetime. She lays them on the hairs close to the roots. They are difficult to see as they are flesh coloured and they can be difficult to remove as they are cemented onto the hair. The eggs take 7 to 10 days to hatch, after this the egg cases or nits are a pearly white in colour and are much easier

to see. Head lice are contacted by head to head contact only, lice do not fly, jump or hop, neither are they carried by family pets. If you find lice in combs, hats, chair backs etc., you can dispose of them as they are already dead or dying. Anyone can get headlice no matter how careful they are. Head lice much prefer clean hair. Once you have them they can be spread very quickly among family members and close friends.

Head lice are easily treated by applying lotions or shampoos that are available over the counter at the chemists, the chemist will advise you as to the best one to use. Follow the instructions carefully and treat all members of the family as the lice are easily passed between family members. You should also get a fine comb from the chemist and comb your daughters hair over a sheet of paper to collect the dead lice and nits. Pay particular attention to the area around the nape of the neck and area behind the ears. If you suspect that your daughter may have picked up some more lice then treat her immediately. Check her hair and all the families hair weekly. Don't be alarmed or ashamed, head lice is a very common problem among school children and fortunately it is very easily treated.

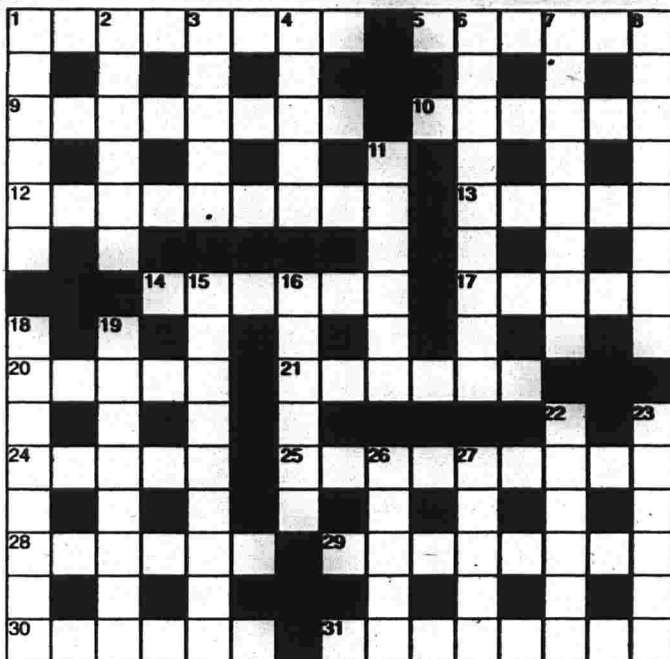

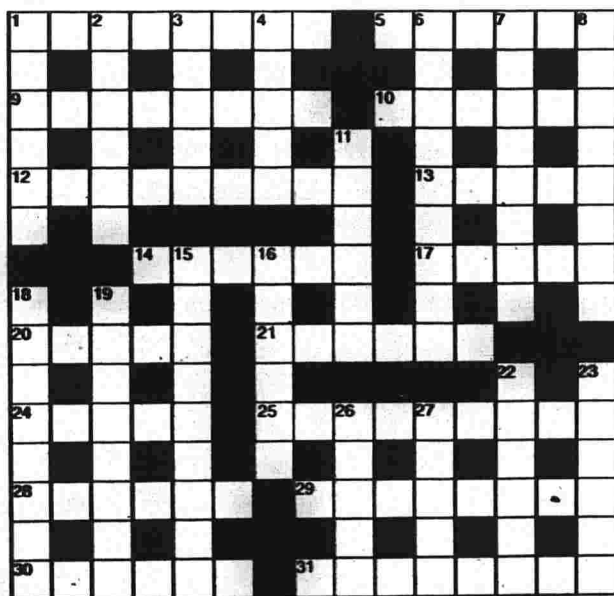

## Tips from the Tannery

CHEF'S CORNER



STARTER:

**Mussels with coriander, chilli, garlic and ginger**

- 4 pints mussels
- 1 tablespoon Thai fish sauce
- Juice of one lime
- 1 garlic clove - finely chopped
- 1 fresh red chilli — seeded and finely chopped
- 2 teaspoons finely chopped fresh ginger
- 2 tablespoons sesame oil
- 1 bunch spring onions — thinly sliced
- 2 tablespoons roughly chopped fresh coriander.

Serves 4.

Clean the mussels — discard any which are open — and place in a large saucepan with the fish sauce, lime juice, garlic, chilli, ginger and sesame oil. Cover and cook over a high heat for three minutes or until the mussels have opened.

Scatter over the sliced spring onions and chopped coriander and turn everything over in the pan.

Serve immediately.

MAIN COURSE:

**Poached mackerel fillets with mint, sherry vinegar and butter sauce**

For the sauce, first clarify the butter by placing it in a small saucepan and heat gently for a few minutes until it has melted and the solids have fallen to the bottom. Carefully pour off the clear butter and reserve. Discard the solids.

Half fill a saucepan with water and bring to the boil. Reduce to a simmer and rest a bowl over the pan. Add the egg yolks and 2 tablespoons water and whisk until fluffy.

Remove the bowl from the heat and gradually whisk in the clarified butter, building up an emulsion as if making mayonnaise. Add the lemon juice, cayenne pepper, black pepper and salt.

Place the sherry vinegar in a small saucepan and bring to the boil until reduced to 1 teaspoon. Stir into the warm butter sauce with the chopped mint. Keep warm in a bowl of warm water.

Boil 1 pint water and 1 tablespoon salt in a large frying pan. Reduce to simmer - add the mackerel fillets and poach for three minutes - turning after 1 1/2 minutes. Lift out with a slotted spoon and serve on warmed plates with the sauce spooned around. Garnish with springs of mint.

DESSERT: Raspberry Fool

Prepare one day ahead of serving. Fool can be made with canned or fresh or frozen fruit. If fruit is fresh or frozen, add sugar to taste.

Serves 10 — ideal party dessert

Soften the gelatine in cold water and dissolve in a little boiling water. Blend the raspberries to a puree and add the gelatine. Whip three quarters of the cream and add a little sugar to help thicken it. When it is almost whipped add the brandy. (If brandy is added too soon the cream will not thicken). Fold in the raspberry puree and place in a bowl and refrigerate overnight.

Decorate with the remaining cream.

Since fools are rich dishes based on cream and sugar the best fruits for flavouring are sharp rather than sweet. Rhubarb, blackcurrants and gooseberry fools are classics.

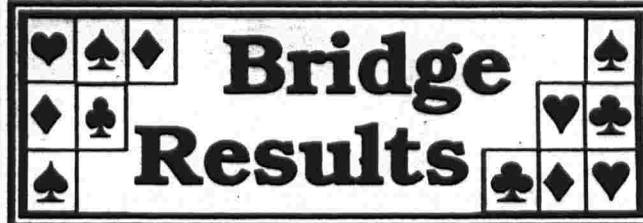

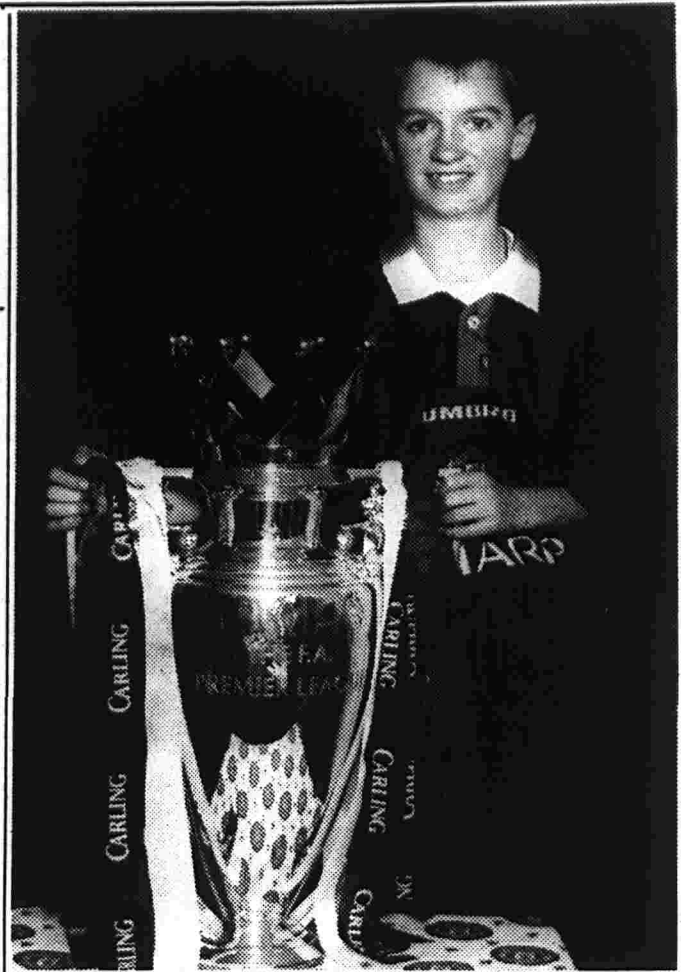
final score 3-1.

# CO. BOARD MEETING

P. S. O Riain, Chairman presided at last week's monthly meeting of the County Board which was held at Lawlors Hotel.

Arising out of the minutes of the previous meeting, the Chairman stated in reply to a question that the report on the outstanding ticket money was now almost completed and that a final report will be given to the November meeting.

## NEW PATRON

On a recommendation from Coisde Gnotha, it was unanimously decided to invite Most Rev. Dr. William Lee, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore to become Patron of the G.A.A. in the county following the retirement of Most Rev. Dr. Russell who had been Patron for a long number of years.

## MINOR FOOTBALL SELECTORS

A letter from Coisde na Peil asked about the appointment of minor football county selectors for 1998. Sean Whelan, Chairman County Bord na nÓg said that his board understood that they had been given the go ahead to appoint both minor hurling and football selectors and were now in the process of examining replies which had been received from clubs who had been invited to submit nominations. It was proposed that Coisde na Peil would communicate with Bord na nÓg on the matter.

## LADIES FOOTBALL

The Chairman, on behalf of the County Board, congratulated the ladies football team who had once again represented the county with great pride. He felt absolutely sure that they would overcome their bitter disappointment at the way in which the All-Ireland final ended and would bounce back stronger and more determined than ever. He thanked the members of the board and all the clubs who had attended the homecoming.

## SIDELINE CONTROL

John Murphy, Eastern Board representative referred to the practice of mentors and club officials parading up and down the sidelines at our games and referred in particular to Minor Hurling B County Final between Stradbally and Ballygunner at Clonea where he counted over 60 people on the line. The meeting agreed that drastic action will have to be taken against offenders in this re-

spect. The Chairman stated that he had issued clear instructions to referees that if necessary, games were to be stopped if this kind of interference continued.

## SENIOR HURLING REPORT

A very lengthy report from senior hurling team manager, Gerald McCarthy gave details of the plans now in train for the coming competitions.

He paid tribute to the splendid service given to the selection committee by Mossy Walsh who found himself unable to devote enough time to the panel because of increased work pressure and he welcomed Greg Fives on the committee. He said Greg's experience and his deep knowledge of the players in the county would make him an ideal choice for the position. John Galvin and Shane Ahearn will continue as selector and assistant trainer. He also welcomed Stephen Power on to the group as team secretary and paid tribute to Anthony Walsh who, through pressure of work, had also stepped down.

He said that the embargo (discipline) imposed on a number of players at the start of the season was now withdrawn and these players are back on the panel. Reporting on the panel of players, he said that some members had been dropped and some new players had been brought on. All this, the report said, was part of a sorting-out process in an effort to arrive at a panel of the best players in the county. Referring to standards, he said that a number of players on the Waterford panel would find their way on to any of the best teams in the country. The report concluded by giving some details of their preparation for the Waterford Crystal League and the Oireachtas.

## UNDER-21 HURLING SELECTORS

The Chairman informed the meeting that these appointments would be finalised at the November meeting of the board. Gerald McCarthy will also be manager of that committee.

## GOLF CLASSIC

The Chairman appealed to clubs to support the Golf Classic which was being organised to raise funds for county team training. The classic was due to be held at the West Waterford course last week.

## FINANCE

Treasurer Tony Morrissey gave an update on the finances and announced the receipts for the various programme of matches played since the previous meeting. He said that the gate receipts for the county senior and minor finals was an all-time record at over £20,000.

## COUNTY FINALS

The Chairman complimented everyone associated with the hurling and football finals and said that the manner in which they were organised was a credit to clubs, players, referees and officials.

James Tobin, Shamrocks referred to the excellence of the programme for the hurling county finals and said that the communications committee were to be highly complimented on its production.

Bord na nÓg who produced the football county final programme were also complimented on a top-class production.

## REPORTS

Tommy Hennessey reminded clubs that the annual club development grants were now being considered and all units entitled to a grant and wishing to avail of the scheme should have their application with him not later than Thursday, October 30th.

In the Central Council report, an outline of the proposed new format for the National Hurling League was given and delegates were asked to accept or reject the proposal which will go before the Central Council for approval at the December meeting. It was reported that Division 1 on the league will comprise 12 teams to be played in two groups of six (Waterford, Kilkenny, Wexford, Tipperary, Cork and Laois in Group B and Clare, Offaly, Limerick, Galway, Dublin and Antrim in A). After a brief discussion it was unanimously agreed to approve of the proposals. The top two teams from each group will play in the semi-finals and scoring averages will determine positions on table.

## PROGRESS REPORT

The secretary of each of the three boards gave an update on championship progress and it was shown that all competitions are running on schedule for a November finish.

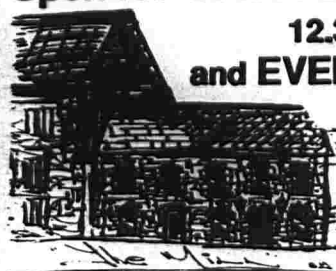
