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# ESB Supply Switch-Off In Ballyduff

Ballyduff residents were left literally in the dark last Wednesday when the ESB supply to the area was cut off from 9.30 in the morning to just before 6 p.m. that evening.

One caller to the 'Leader' Office from Mocollop in Ballyduff Upper said that many old age pensioners in the locality were left in complete darkness from 5 p.m. onwards.

Prior notification of the power cut however was issued to all households and business in the Ballyduff area, up to a week before the supply was switched off.

ESB Area Supervisor, Michael Norris, told the 'Leader' that the company had to CONTINUED ON PAGE 3

# U.D.C. To Order Clean Up Of Derelict Main Street Site

BY AISLING CONROY Owners of the derelict side-by-side buildings at Main Street, Dungarvan

will soon have to clean up their act and improve the dilapidated premises which have stood vacant in the town centre for the best part of a decade.

Dungarvan Urban District Council has decided to proceed under the Dangerous Buildings Act against Irish Nationwide Building Society in respect of the former Ducey and Mulcahy premises at Main Street.

INBS acquired the former drapery store and adjacent licensed premises with a view to developing the site into a multi million pound shopping emporium complete with apartments and a newly created pedestrianised street.

Detailed plans were drawn up by local architect Muiris O Cristoir, an application was made with the local planning authority and full planning permission was eventually granted to the

flagship project.

Months dragged by however with no sign of construction on the development and time finally ran out for the developers under the lucrative Urban Renewal Scheme.

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# KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

#### QUESTION

I am in a pension scheme at work but I really don't know much about it. Can I get information on it?

Under the terms of the Pensions Act 1990 Trustees of occupational schemes must give information to scheme members about their personal entitlements. Information about the running of the scheme and in particular about its financial situation, must also be made available to scheme members, to other beneficiaries and to trade unions representing scheme

In most pension schemes Trustees do not actually carry out the day-to-day business of the scheme themselves. In some cases they appoint a person within the company to look after the running of the scheme for them. More often they appoint a pensions consultant, an insurance broker, or life assurance company.

Even if they do appoint others to carry out these functions, Trustees are still responsible for making sure that full information about the running of the scheme is available and that members can get information about their own entitlements.

While he understood that local residents were left in the dark for an hour, he said it had been a planned switch off and had to be carried out before the winter set in.

Mr. Norris added that the ESB are forced to patrol and regulate all power lines and are legally obliged to replace all faulty poles.

"If we did not replace the poles in Ballyduff on Wednesday, the lines would eventually fall down causing complete disruption to the local electricity supply," he stated.

# **Dungarvan E.S.B.** Office No Longer Responsible For Public Lighting

The Waterford Regional Office of the ESB has taken over full responsibility for public lighting maintenance in Dungarvan town.

Previously managed by the Dungarvan E.S.B. branch under Area Supervisor Michael Norris, a new ESB crew with sole responsibility for public lighting has now been appointed by the Waterford office.

According to ESB Contract Supervisor, John O'Hanlon, the reason behind the centralisation of the repair and maintenance of public lighting is to increase efficiency.

Residents in Dungarvan can still report faulty street lighting through the Dungarvan branch who will immediately inform the Waterford office, via computer, of any repairs that need to be carried out in the

Mr. O'Hanlon maintains that the response time for repairs to street lighting will remain unaffected by the new system.

Through the appointment of a dedicated crew however dealing solely with public lighting, Mr. O'Hanlon believes the system to be more efficient. The crew, he added, will not be sidelined by other ESB matters which may arise during the normal course of the day.

Increased efficiency however was not evident in a case in Abbeyside last week when vandals broke the street lighting in McCarthyville.

The Waterford office was immediately notified by the Dungarvan branch. Nevertheless residents in the estate spent three nights without any public lighting before the newly appointed crew from Waterford repaired the lights.

The company has come under an enormous amount of criticism by U.D.C. councillors, residents and

visitors to the town.


Derelict boarded up buildings have no place in a vibrant town such as Dungarvan and locals have waited long enough for INBS to develop or even improve the site.

Recognising this fact,

Connolly has decided to move against the property owners under the Dangerous Buildings Act — a decision which was no doubt prompted by the recent Town Engineer's report which found the buildings to be unsafe.

INBS will be forced to carry out necessary works on the Main Street properties to render them safe.

Following this initial course of action, the Urban Council will then consider whether to serve a notice on INBS under the Derelict Sites Act which involves an annual monetary fine.

# New Discovery - The Biggest Dinosaur Ever To Walk

He was the biggest dinosaur you would ever have seen.

So big, in fact, that the mighty T-Rex would seem like a dwarf beside it - at only 10 feet tall and three tons lighter.

The Giganotosaurus, a giant, meat-eating dinosaur roamed South America around 100 million years ago. It would have stood 12 feet high and 47 feet long. Its skeleton is now at the Academy of Natural Sciences in Philadelphia where scientists hope to rebuild up to 80 per cent of it.

long.


As well as the discovery of this new dinosaur, new dino' footprints have been uncovered in the countryside near

#### Why Do Birds Preen Themselves?

BIRDS preen themselves to clean and waterproof their feathers, to keep them neat and lying smooth and also to maintain their general health. This process starts soon after they are born, when the feathers start to break out of their sheaths. When the parents are out looking for food the young bird spends most of its time combing its feathers with its bill and freeing them from bits of sheath and other blemishes

As the bird grows into adult life it continues the same process. It usse preen or oil glands which are situated on the back, just in front of the tail. The bird gently bites at the glands and rubs its head against them, spreading the secretion on its feathers. The oil is responsible for keeping the plumage waterproof, keeping it supple and for preserving the bird: insulating qualities. If the bird accidentally swallows this oil no harm is done as the oil is a source of Vitamin

Most birds have preen glands and often mix preening with water or dust bathing. You may see ducks dipping their heads under water, flicking their wings and moving their bodies while preening. The duck gets pleasure and fun out of this.

# **HEPATITIS C COMPENSATION** TRIBUNAL ACT, 1997

Mr Brian Cowen TD, Minister for Health and Children has appointed 1st November, 1997 to be establishment day for the purposes of the Hepatitis C Compensation Tribunal Act, 1997 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act").

#### Claims Pending

2. The non-statutory scheme Tribunal will stand dissolved from 1st November and, any claim which is pending before the non-statutory scheme Tribunal shall be heard and determined as if it was a claim made under this Act. It is not necessary for persons who have submitted claims to the non-statutory Tribunal to re-apply to the statutory Tribunal.

#### Claims Determined

- Under Section 6(3) of the Act a person who has had a claim for compensation determined by the non-statutory Tribunal may
  - (a) apply to the Tribunal to hear evidence at the discretion of the Tribunal which was not made available to the non-statutory scheme Tribunal in calculating the award made to that person,
  - (b) apply to the Tribunal to hear evidence on any statutory or non-statutory benefits which she or he has received or is entitled to receive which were taken into account by the non-statutory scheme Tribunal in assessing an award to that person,
  - (c) apply to the Tribunal for an award of aggravated or exemplary damages or an amount to be paid to her or him from the Fund,
  - (d) apply to the Tribunal for the adjustment of any award made by the non-statutory scheme Tribunal to an award to which she or he would have been entitled had Section 2(1) (a) of the Civil Liability (Amendment) Act, 1996 been in force at the time of the making of the award, or
  - (e) appeal an award.

"The Fund" referred to at (c) above is the Reparation Fund mentioned at 5 below.

#### Settlement Arrangements

The Minister has pursuant to Section 8 of the Act made arrangements to provide for the settlement of claims in respect of general and special damages by a claimant. Such arrangements are available from the Tribunal at the address below and are also being notified to Solicitors.

#### **Reparation Fund**

5. The Minister has established a Reparation Fund pursuant to Section 11 of the Act.

A claimant who accepts an award from the Tribunal or accepts an offer of a settlement under Section 8, in respect of general or special damages or both, may apply to have an amount paid to her or him from the Fund in lieu of the Tribunal assessing and awarding aggravated or exemplary damages. The amount paid out of the Fund to a claimant shall amount to 20 per cent of the total amount of the award from the Tribunal or settlement offer under Section 8.

Application forms for payments from the Reparation Fund are available on request from the Secretary to the Tribunal.



# Melleray Scout Centre On Airwaves

Jamboree On The Air, a teur radio to provide the the cables and preparing the world wide scouting event for the past 40 years was held over the weekend of the 18th/19th October. Scouts from all over the world, estimated at 500,000, took part. The object was to use Ama-

scouts with an opportunity to speak to each other and to swop stories about each others troop and its activities.

Preparations for this 2 day event involved the scouts in building radio masts, laying

maps that would be used to track the contacts around the globe. Computers play a big role in modern radio communications and the scouts were involved in using the computers to keep track of events over the week end. This year for the first time a J.O.T.I. Jamboree On The Internet was launched. This mode of communications proved very popular. Contacts made by whatever mode will lead to a continuing exchange of ideas and will build up to create a better understanding amongst scouts, of the extent of their

organisation. This year was the first time

that Mount Melleray Scout Centre took part in J.O.T.A. It ran a very successful radio station, EI 5 MCR, involving three transmitters on the high frequency bands and two transmitters on VHF & UHF. This amount of radios require a considerable number of different antennas and cabling all of which was accomplished in record time by the scouts and crew in the centre. On the day the equipment worked like a dream and we were delighted to get our first contact in JOTA 97 into Alice Springs, Australia, to be followed by a contact with the headquarters station of the Egyptian scouts in Cario. 

The ceremony took place at the mass grave near Ardmore's historic Round Tower where 11 of the sailors are buried.

Through the generosity of the local community, a suitably inscribed headstone has been erected at the graveside.

Coincidentally Rev. Warren's father, Rev. John Warren was involved in the prayer service as the bodies from the ill-fated S.S. Ary were brought ashore.

A decade of the rosary was recited in Irish by Fr. O'Connor who paid tribute to Ardmore man, Kevin Gallagher and his group who organised the ceremony.

# **FUNDING FOR ARDFINNAN** REGIONAL WATER SYSTEM

Minister of State at the Department of Agriculture and Food, Noel Davern T.D., has informed the John Brennan Fianna Fail Cumann Ardfinnan that the Department of Environment and Local Government has approved the provision of funding for the Ardfinnan Regional Water System.

Minister Davern explained that the funding now being made available would enable the scheme to go to construction. The work is comprised of two contracts. The civil works contract generally involves the con-struction of a treatment building, installation of a clearwater tank, sludge balancing and a waste water recovery tank. The mechanical and electrical contract generally includes inlet flow control valves, fitting and recording devises, chemical dosing and dissolved air flotation. The cost of the scheme would be in excess of £3 million. Minister Davern was informed of the decision by Noel Dempsey T.D., Minister for the Environment and Local Govern-





# Kitchen Herb Is A **Border Beauty**



A popular bedding plant often paraded in the the borders of royal parks and stately gardens, the salvia, or sage, offers many different varieties

The best known of all is the common sage. Used in kitchens for centuries, it is hard to imagine Christmas dinner without sage 'n' onion stuffing.

Sage also has a long history of medicinal use.
It has been credited with curing anything from colds to snakebites. In fact the name salvia comes from the Latin 'salvare,' meaning 'to heal.'

The soft greyish-green leaves are a common sight in kitchens, but it is usually the purple-leaved varieties — still suitable for cooking -that are used as decorative border

The purple varieties can grow to a considerable size, bushing out and taking over large parts of the border if they are allowed to grow unhindered. But it looks spectacular when it is covered in its spikes of

lavender flowers - which can reach waist height. Salvia should be given a light trim after flowering to stop older

plants showing their woody bases.
It prefers a sunny position with a light sandy soil where it will

remain perfectly hardy and will produce kitchen-worthy produce every year. Trim after flowering to stop older plants showing their woody bases.

For a sage that flowers all the way through till autumn,

choose Salvia uliginosa. Its purple-blue flowers are at their best during autumn. The flowers will be presented on long stems at eye level and can

be kept tidy with a few strategically placed support sticks. It likes a moist soil, but not too cold a position in winter.

A border of mixed sages can look stunning although it is important to choose varieties that will work together. To soften the effect of some of the brighter sages, use salvia argentia.

It flowers only once every two years and has large leaves covered in thousands of fine silvery hairs when the flowers are

It multiplies best in gravelly areas, but you can cultivate the seeds yourself in pots or gritty compost.

Ideally they should be planted under cover in late January in

an environment of around 18 degrees centigrade.

The plant should be quite big by May and should be out in the garden by then.

Alternatively, you can plant them in late February, but expect

the plants to be a lot smaller. The advantage of planting later is that the smaller plants will

be better for taking cuttings in June.
Plant it with a trowel, giving plenty of room for the roots and firm-in the soil quite hard around them. Water liberally if the soil is dry.

Some varieties such as S. patens originate from hot climates and will not survive outdoors during the winter.

They should be dug up as soon as their foliage is blackened by frost, usually in early October.

The dead growth should be removed just above the tubers,

which can then be stored in trays or boxes packed with dry moss peat to protect them.

**DAIRY: Dry Cow Therapy** 

The treatment of all quarters with "Dry Cow" long-acting antibiotics after the last milking of the lactation will help to control mastitis in the dry period.

There is now a wide range of antibiotics available for use in dry cows. When selecting an antibiotic, make sure that it is suitable for your requirements. Read the instructions on the pack. Failure to select the correct product may result in antibiotic residues persisting in the milk after the next calving. If in doubt get advice from your vet. Test carried out by Bill Meaney at Moorepark on six leading product brand names indicated that there was no difference in efficiency between the products. He states that there is likely to be more variation in the response between the infected cows treated with antibiotics than between the antibiotic products themselves.

In addition to the infected status of the animal, the care that is taken when the antibiotics are infused and the condition of the wintering facilities have also a major effect on the effectiveness of dry-cow treatment. The following is a simple reference list of the procedures to be followed when drying off cows -

- \* Dry-off abruptly.
- Record drying-off date.
- \* Disinfect teat with the Methylated Spirits before infusion.
- \* Massage antibiotic into udder quarter.
- Disinfect teats after infusion teat dip.
- \* Restrict feed intake.

If teat sealers are being used, ensure that the antibiotic and sealer components are infused in the correct sequence. The antibiotic component should be massaged into the quarter as usual but the sealer should not be manipulated in the teat after infusion.

Antibiotic treatment alone is not enough to protect the dry udder. The provision and maintenance of clean and dry lying areas in cubicles, loose house and calving boxes is also essential in mastitis control during the dry period.

TILLAGE

Slugs

Slug counts from traps in Oak Park indicate numbers are high.

While damage can occur after any crop, the risk is higher after oilseed rape, grass or set aside. Late sown crops are also more at risk.

A fine, firm seedbed is essential for control. Increase sowing depth to 4 - 5 cm. (1.5 - 2.0 inches). Slug pellets are best applied on the surface after drilling or at the early stages of an attack. Suitable products include Draza, Mazda, Metarex, Optimol, Whelehan's Mini Pellets and Genesis.

Change In The Area Being Farmed Under REPS -

Where there is significant increase in the area farmed (i.e. more than 2 hectares), Scheme participants may avail of one of the following options

I. The existing agri environmental plan can be amended to include the additional land and the enlarged holding farmed according to REPS for the remainder of the current REPS contract or

II. A new 5 year agri environmental plan to include the additional land can be submitted.

However increased payments for the enlarged holdings will only be available where option (ii) is availed of.

Participants must notify the Department of Agriculture and Food of any change in area farmed within 6 weeks (i.e. if land is bought, rented, leased, inherited etc. or sold). Failure to do so means expulsion from the Scheme.

**CATTLE:** Cattle Performance -

Several on farm trials have shown that cattle perform poorly in October - November. They only put 0.42 kgs./day (compared with 0.81 kgs. up to mid September). This is because they don't have enough to eat and are working too hard grazing bare pastures. As grass gets scarce, cattle must be -

- Allowed more grazing ground (often not possible).
- Fed good quality baled silage with the grass.
- Housed early or at least some of them should be housed.

# Suspension Of Young Farmer Aid Represents Government Lack Of Faith -coughlan Minimum

Waterford IFA Chairman, James Coughlan has said that the Government suspension of the Young Farmer Installation aid last August represented a lack of faith in young farmers and in the agricultural industry.

in the agricultural industry.
Mr. Coughlan said "the Government must reverse the decision to suspend the Young Farmer Installation

Scheme in the upcoming budget. IFA has already identified the young farmer measure as a key demand in the organisation's pre-Budget Submission."

The Waterford IFA Chairman said the aid, which is worth £5,600 has proved itself to be a vital component in the establishment and setting up of young educated

farmers in the agricultural industry. Since 1994 over 3,000 farmers have benefitted from the measure and the scheme has been complimentary to the Early Retirement Scheme in the restructuring of Irish agriculture to meet the challenges of a more competitive environment post 2000.

# Department Inspections Of Grain Farms At This Late Stage Unacceptable — IFA

Waterford IFA Grain Chairman Alex Heskin has strongly criticised the Department of Agriculture for grain farm inspections which are now taking place. "It is unacceptable that a number of arable aid applicants are now being subject to on-farm inspections when they should have received their area aid payments."

"Because of the very poor harvest all grain growers need their area aid payments immediately. On-farm inspections should have taken place during thee summer and not now when crops have been harvested."

"The experience of growers over the past number of years is that it can take over a month for a farmer to receive his cheque once he had been inspected. This is not acceptable to growers in 1997."

In light of the urgent need for all growers to receive their area aid payments, the Grain Chairman has called on the Department of Agriculture to make payments available to all remaining growers immediately.

#### Donovan Says No Basis To Reduce Cattle Prices

Waterford IFA Livestock Chairman, Maurice Donovan, has condemned the recent EU Commission decision to cut export refunds on male animals by 5%. He said, "in view of the very buoyant trade on both third country and continental markets, this cut should not result in any negative impact on cattle prices. Our meat plants should be able to recover this reduction in full from the market place."

Mr. Donovan pointed out that prices on third country markets had increased by up to \$500/t over the last number of months and continental markets are returning between 95p/lb to as high as 125/lb in Italy.

# Minimum October Milk Price Must Be £1 + VAT/Gallon As Dairy Board Butter Price Rises Again

Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman Michael Murray (Tallow) has said the latest £30/tonne butter price increase announced Friday, October 24 by the Irish Dairy Board brought the IDB's composite processor price for SMP and butter to 112.3p/gallon, a full 8p increase since April last.

"Most co-ops have this month reflected at least some of their improved market returns by increasing September milk producer prices by 1 to 3p/gallon," Mr. Murphy said.
"This latest butter price in-

"This latest butter price increase in given even ampler scope for all co-ops to pay a minimum price of 100p/gallon + VAT (103.3p/gallon VAT inclusive) into 1998." he added.

# Co. Waterford ICMSA News

Representatives from the County Waterford ICMSA met with Waterford County Council recently. The deputation included County Chairman, John Skehan, County Secretary Milo Murray, Tom Cronin, John O'Donnell and John Quigley, Area Officer with ICMSA.

They met with the County Manager Donal Connolly, Tom Dineen and Brian White.

The main issues discussed included rural roads, planning, environmental issues and coastal erosion.

#### **RURAL ROADS**

The Council informed the ICMSA delegation that they were working to a five year programme in relation to the roads and have gone about half way through this programme.

They also said that the community involvement scheme is in operation where the local community can come together and provide 20% of the cost of resurfacing category 3 roads.

This 20% cost can also consist of work in lieu of payment i.e. fencing, tractor work, etc.

The Council stressed the need to keep roads clean especially after slurry spreading and beet haulage.

#### **PLANNING**

The County Chairman stressed the importance of farmers getting planning for sheds, pollution control work, etc., as speedily as possible as this work can only be carried out at certain times of the year.

The advice given by the Council was that those applying for planning should call in to the office to make sure everything was in order when lodging planning permission details.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES**

The ICMSA delegation stressed the need for grant aid for pollution control work and dairy hygiene as this work when carried out does not increase ones income. The Council agreed to make representation on this issue.

Other issues discussed included the new water grants, coastal erosion, dumping and the need to keep the countryside clean. The Council Council informed the group that hedge cutting notices are being issued at present. They also hoped that farmers would dispose of plastic by recycling it. They expressed concern at the fact that beet and line being stored on the edge of roadways and said they would be in contact with farmers on this issue.

#### THE IMPORTANCE OF MILK

The view of the ICMSA President, Frank Allen, at the National A.G.M. held recently is that there is no room for complacency in the dairy industry. It is not sufficient to reject the forecast that we will end up with 25,000 dairy farmers by the year 2006 — we must take action to implement policies which will ensure that the exodus out of dairy farming does not result in the quota becoming the preserve of a small number of farmers.

Commentators who are saying to smaller dairy farmers — "you have no future in dairying, the smaller quota is finished" should be told in no uncertain terms that they are sending out a totally wrong message. The best approach must be one of saying that smaller quota holders who wish to continue in good farming should be helped and facilitated. They will not get a full income from dairying, but make no mistake dairying can be an important part of their total income — the challenge facing us is to ensure that they are enabled to earn other income to supplement their income from dairying. Future developments in rural development policies must address these issues.

Small, medium and large dairy farmers must devote their minds to controlling milk production costs. The future prosperity of dairy farmers will be directly related to our ability to be able to continue producing milk cheaper than any of the other EU Member States.

The Irish dairy industry is a strong, confident well managed industry, but past success does not automatically guarantee future prosperity. We must continue to improve efficiency and cost control at farm and processing level. We must go forward with the determination to succeed.

you give me some advice

A. A grommet is a tiny little tube that the ear surgeon inserts into the eardrum in order to ventilate the middle ear. Grommets are also known as ventilating tubes. If a child is prone to infection of the middle ear then there can be a build up of fluid in the middle ear space

which can cause deafness and encourage further infecas the fluid acts as an ideal food source for bacte-By ventilating the middle ear, it is given a chance to 'dry out' and to recover from repeated infections

After the grommet has been inserted no water must be allowed in the ear for at

least a week. After this time swimming is allowed as long-as the child does not go more than one foot below the surface of the water. The child is not allowed to jump or dive into the pool. If the child has to fly in an aeroplane after the insertion of a grommet there is no problem as the air will pass through as the air will pass through the tube during the flight and the child will not have a popping sensation as the plane takes off or lands. Your child cannot blow ballons or blow into musical instruments for 2 to 3 weeks. Grommets fall out by them-selves, the length of time that they stay in place depends on the type of tube used. You may find them on your child's pillow or usually you will not find them at all as they are very tiny and fall out of the ear canal easily. Grommets look somewhat like tiny spools used to hold sewing thread. Grommets sometimes fall out before the ear has healed properly and may have to be reinserted

but this is not a difficult procedure for an ear

surgeon.

Q. There has been a lot of reports in the media about drugs and drug abuse recently. In the eastate where I live some teenagers have been seen using drugs. I'm told that it's 'Ecstasy' that they're taking. This concerns meas I have two young chiltaking. This concerns me as I have two young children and I'm afraid that they'll become involved with drugs. Could you tell me what 'Ecstasy' is and how would I know if my children were taking it?

A. Ecstasy is the street name methylenedioxymethamphetamine, known to chemsist as MDMA for short. It is related to the amphetamine family of drugs.
Amphetamines are drugs which stimulate the body and mind and used to be prescribed for depression, tiredness, and obesity. They make a person feel good, put them in very good humour, increase concentration and energy. While people do not usually become physically addicted to them, their bodies do become used to the drug and the user may have drug and the user may have to take massive doses to achieve the effect of well being that they are after. Long term use may result in an illness that is very like

paranoid schizophrenia. Ecstasy is a 'designer drug', because it has been tailor-

made for specific effects. It is an illegal drug and is associated with 'Raves', that is parties that take place in the open air or in large warehouses, where hundreds of young people gather to dance etc. It is usually taken as a tablet, after an hour the user experiences a 'rush' and becomes euphoric and has a feeling of extreme well-being. This effect lasts 2 to 3 hours and then there is a sensation of 'coming down'. Users become less down'. Users become less inhibited and have a feeling of warmth towards others. Users have dilated pupils and a dry mouth, this feeling and the fact that the user has usually been dancing for hours causes the person to become dehydrated and they drink vast quantities of fluids, tea or water etc. This effect of dehydration is the reason that you often see water being thrown around at Raves. Use of this drug can cause sexual difficulties in both men and women, however paradoxically this drug can lead to teenage girls becoming pregnant due to the feeling of warmth towards others that it induces in them. Heavy use is associated with severe anxiety, confusion and depression. It can also be associated with criminal behaviour as users get the money to pay for the drugs.

#### STARTER: Curried leek soup with saffron

- 1 lb. leeks, white parts only weighed after trimming
- 2 oz. butter
- 1 tablespoon sunflower oil
- 2 tablespoon flour 1 tablespoon mild curry powder
- 1 litre light chicken stock

- 1/2 teaspoon saffron strands
- 1 1/2 tablespoon sunflower oil leek, white part only - thinly sliced
- 3 fl. oz. cream

Slice the leeks. Heat the butter and oil in a large saucepan, add the leeks and cook gently for at least 10 mins. allowing them to soften but without letting them brown. Add the flour and curry powder and cook for 3 minutes stirring frequently — then lower the heat and simmer for 15 mins.

Leave to cool slightly, then puree the soup in a blender and return to the pan.

Shortly before serving make the garnish. Warm the saffron in a large metal spoon over a low heat for about 30 seconds. Crush it (between 2 spoons). Pour on 1 tablespoon boiling water and leave to infuse. Heat the oil in a small frying pan and fry the sliced leek for 2 - then add the saffron and cook for one more minute - stirring.

Reheat the soup and pour into bowls. Drizzle 1 tablespoon cream over each bowl and scatter some saffron leek rings over the top.

#### MAIN COURSE: Linguini with prawns

Serves 6.

- 2 Courgettes Salt and black pepper freshly ground
- 8 oz. linguini pasta
- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil 6 oz cooked peeled prawns - thawed if frozen
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh dill
- Serves 4.

Trim the ends of the courgettes then cut across the courgettes to make 4 cm pieces. Cut each piece lengthways to make fine(ish) strips.

Place 3 pints water into a large saucepan. Add three teaspoons salt and bring to the boil. Add pasta and boil for approx. 10 min-utes until cooked (check packet - some vary). When the pasta is almost ready, warm the olive oil in a small saucepan over a low heat. Add the courgettes and cook gently for one minute but don't let them fry. Add the prawns and heat through for about 30 seconds, then add the dill and season to taste. Drain the pasta, tip into a large bowl and add the prawn mixture. Toss together and serve immediately.

#### DESSERT: Caramel Mousse

- 11 oz. sugar 1/4 pint water 1 tblesp. gelatine
- 5 eggs
- Slivered Almonds toasted 8 fl. oz. apricot puree 4 apricots - poached
- 2 egg yolks in syrup and sliced 1/4 pt. cream, whipped Mint leaves to decorate Cook 9 oz. of the sugar with the water until the

syrup reaches the light caramel stage.

Remove pan from heat and plunge the base into cold water to stop the cooking. Leave to cool slightly but do not allow it to solidify.

Soften the gelatine in a little cold water in a cup and dissolve over boiling water. Whip the eggs with the remaining sugar in a bowl over simmering water until the mixture is thick. Add the melted gelatine and stir until it has dissolved. Beat in the caramel. Remove the bowl from the heat and plunge into a large bowl of ice cubes (or half fill sink with cold water and some ice cubes). Continue beating and just before the mixture begins to set, fold in the cream. Pour into a mould sprinkled with the almonds. Refrigerate for 2 hours before

If you wish you can serve this with some apricot syrup spooned onto a plate and arrange the poached apricot slices around the mousse. Decorate with mint leaves.



#### ARAGLEN SOCCER CLUB

Araglen first had a soccer club in the late sixties or early seventies. One of their earliest matches was a Munster Junior Cup match at home to Clonmel town which they lost 10-0. You will not be surprised that the club went out of existence soon afterwards. The club re-emerged in 1981 with Mick Kenny being the link with the original club. Other founder members included Pat White and the Colbert brothers. A meeting was held in Higgins' Bar and the following Sunday a large number of players turned out for training, encouraging some fundraising to begin.

For two seasons Araglen relied on training sessions and challenge matches. At this time they had left the carnival grounds and were using Jackie Handeran's field which had previously hosted Gaelic football games. Because of the large number of Celtic supporters in the area, the club was renamed Araglen Celtic although the Celtic part is rarely used. The most memorable games played around the time were against Ballysaggart (0-2) and Ballindangan Utd. (0-1).

Araglen entered the Red House League in 1984 and played in Division 2. The club wore blue and white jerseys sponsored by McCarthy's Bar in Kilworth. The club suffered from poor organisation and their first game away to Lismore saw them lose 10-0, their worst defeat. Araglen failed to win a match that season and got their only point in a 2-2 draw away to Pinewood Rangers. They played one more season in the Red House League before opting out because of a problem fielding teams.

To keep interest alive, the club organised a tournament which is contested each year. The large cup for this tournament was bought by Mike "Spalp" Aherne. In 1990 the club formed a pirate league with clubs from South Limerick. This was called the Publicans League. The club won the league in its first season and immediately decided to reapply for membership to the Red House League in 1991. The club just failed to win promotion in its first season back and despite some encouraging results over the last five years, they remain in Division 2. The club have also moved back to the Carnival Field.



Congress in all future years will be held in Dublin and will not be moved to an outside venue unless there is a very particular reason for doing so. The meeting will take place on the weekend following Easter. The following are the main changes

County Boards must, in future, hold their annual conventions not later than December 31st.

Delegates to Congress will be selected or elected in accordance with the wishes of Convention/County Board.

County Board may submit its own motion regardless of how many motions are submitted by clubs. If a club has a motion passed at County Convention, then that club's name will appear with the motion on the Congress Journal.

Provincial Councils may also submit one motion and the Central Council can forward three motions.

In a year following a Youth Congress, counties may have an additional youth delegate attending Congress.

Delegates from all coun- by selected members of it was unanimously agreed county delegations. The topics will include such matters as Finance, Administration, Games Development etc. There will be a feed back to Congress on these discus-

Central Council were given the authority to call a special Congress in a year in which the playing rules are up for discussion.

There is to be a welcome change in the voting systems at Congress and in future, the election of President and trustees will be by proportional representation instead of the present single vote system.

A motion to have a postal vote for the election of trustees was heavily beaten. Members who are nominated for a position, must declare to the Director General at least two weeks before Congress whether they are/not standing.

of that Special Congress, the Director General's annual report will have to be published and forwarded to counties earlier than usual. Provincial and Divisional **Board Annual Conventions** must be brought forward by a number of weeks. This will mean about a month in the case of the two divisions here in Waterford. AMATEUR STATUS
