An elderly Knockanore man, stuck in mud for nearly 24 hours on the banks of the Blackwater river, had a lucky escape when he was discovered by chance by three Dungarvan men.

Michael Whelan of Hillview Drive, Ned Tutty and his son Patrick from Springfield, Dungarvan were out shooting duck in the Knockanore area at around 2.30 p.m. on bank holiday Monday, October 27th when they came across a slumped figure buried 3/4 feet in mud by the riverside. The area in question was roughly 5 miles along the turnoff just after Youghal Bridge on the Youghal side.

Speaking to the 'Dungarvan Leader', Ned Tutty said he thought at first that the man had been washed ashore. He said it had been pure chance that the trio had entered that particular field and it was Michael Whelan who first spotted the hapless figure in the mire.

Initial fears that the man was dead proved to be unfounded when he weakly moved his head. The three men immediately attempted to pull and drag the man out of the mud but all to no avail. The suction of the bog proved too strong and the men finally had to resort to digging with their bare hands.

The tide was coming in and the rescuers first objective was to get the man quickly out of it's path before alerting the emergency services.

# New Democratic Left Member of Waterford County Council

Fiachra Ó Ceilleachair of Democratic Left has been co-opted to fill a vacancy on Waterford County Council which arose from the retirement, on health grounds, of his party colleague, Tony Wright.

As predicted in local political circles, Ó Ceilleachair was the sole candidate put forward for the vacancy at Monday's Council meeting, proposed by Fianna Fáil's Cllr. Paddy Kenneally and seconded by Fine Gael's Cllr. Garry O'Halloran.

At the age of 27, the new Councillor becomes the youngest member of the Council. He hopes to build

on the political impact made by Tony Wright since his election in 1991 and will be fighting to retain the seat for the Dungarvan electoral area in the next local elections.

Tomás Ó Ceilleachair and Ann Mulqueen, Fiachra's parents, were present to witness his successful co-optation onto the Council. Well known personalities in

the Ring Gaeltacht community, Tomás Ó Ceilleachair is a former teaching staff member of Coláiste na Rinne and the previous owner of the 'Tigh An Cheoil' pub. He has a long record of involvement in community development issues in Ring and is a former local election candidate for the Labour Party and the Workers' Party.

Ann Mulqueen has also been involved in a wide range of community activities and is an acclaimed traditional ballad singer.

Fiachra is the older brother of Odharnaith, Sorcha, Neasa and Ogie.

Born and reared in the Ring Gaeltacht Fiachra is in the unique position of having attended all three local schools, receiving his primary education in Scoil Náisiúnta na Rinne and Coláiste na Rinne, then secondary education in Meanscoil San Nioclás. He went on to University in Maynooth College, receiving a BA and later an MA in Sociology.

## EXPERIENCED POLITICAL BACKGROUND

Following Democratic Left's entry into government in 1994, Ó Ceilleachair was appointed National Organiser for the party. In the intervening three years he has worked on issues with Ministers, T.D.s, councillors and party members in all areas of the organisation nationwide.

As National DL Organiser, he advanced issues with Tony Wright and the Dungarvan organisation such as the successful campaign for the abolition of water charges.

He accompanied the former Minister for Housing and Urban Renewal, Liz McManus and Prionsias De Rossa as Minister for Social Welfare on visits to Dungarvan. These visits highlighted his work on such issues as support for housing projects, estate management schemes, urban renewal status and funding for youth provision and community development.

In moving back to his na-

tive county of Waterford, Ó Ceilleachair is stepping down as National Organiser, but will continue to be a member of the Party's National Executive.

## 'BEGINNING OF GREAT ADVENTURE'

The latest addition to the County Council membership was given a warm welcome by his new colleagues and County Manager Donal Connolly last Monday.

On being co-opted, Cllr. Ó Ceilleachair said he was honoured that the members of his own local branch in Dungarvan asked him to go forward to be a DL representative.

Tony Wright, in particular, was an inspiration for Ó Ceilleachair to get involved in politics.

"Tony had a formidable reputation as a political performer and a proud record of achievement on behalf of the people. I am conscious of the hard act to follow," said Cllr. Ó Ceilleachair. "I will however do my utmost to

continue the fight for economic and social justice epitomised by Tony and the members and supporters of the Dungarvan branch."

As in the words of Lou Reid, Cllr. Ó Ceilleachair said it is "the beginning of a great adventure."

The young Democratic Left member is also set to fill a vacancy on Dungarvan Urban District Council later this month, also created by the retirement of Tony Wright.

# Unions Meet To Consider Improved Avonmore/Waterford Redundancy Package

Over the past month various interest groups representing workers at the merged Avonmore Waterford Group (AWG) have intensified their combined efforts in a huge drive to impress on AWG management the importance of retaining the Dungarvan and Kilmeaden operations.

Eight independent studies are currently being undertaken into all aspects of future development within the newly merged company and an announcement on any future rationalisation plans is expected to be made at the end of this month.

National media reports have cited market analysts as targeting both the Dungarvan and Kilmeaden operations as the most likely to be experience substantial job losses.

Despite the offer of an improved redundancy package for the 12,000 strong workforce the ATGWU, AEEU, TEEU and SIPTU insist that the retention of jobs within the company is their main priority.

Intense lobbying of all the political parties has been undertaken by the unions and representations are also being made to meet with the Tanaiste Mary Harney.

## COMPELLING CASE MADE BY DELEGATION

Of particular importance was the delegation led by Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly and the chief executive of the Waterford Enterprise Board, Ger Enright together with trade union representatives who met recently with senior AWG management and presented a comprehensive and detailed analysis of why the Dungarvan and Kilmeaden plants should remain as key elements of the new merged company. A key delegation member was full time AEEU official Billy Kyne, himself a former senior shop steward at Waterford Foods where he was employed for 33 years. Mr. Kyne is also a member of Waterford County Council and Dungarvan UDC.

The ATGWU Dungarvan District Officer, Tony Mansfield who is chairman of the Avonmore Waterford Trade Union Group, praised the 'brilliant' manner of the presentation made by the delegation to AWG management.

"In my view", he stated, "they made the most compelling case for the retention of both Dungarvan and Kilmeaden".

"These industries have taken several generations to build up and involve a major community effort in both western and eastern parts of Waterford right down to the farmer supplier level", said Mr. Mansfield.

"The final decision will rest with the AWG board and no doubt the elected representatives from Waterford on the board will bear it all in mind when making their decision", he added.

## AWG TO CREATE ENTERPRISE FUND

Reflecting the huge cross community awareness of the possible job shedding crisis, further representation has been made to AWG by the Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce.

While no new details emerged concerning the overall reduction in employment in the town, Pat O'Neill Chief Executive of AWG confirmed that the company was intent on creating an 'Enterprise Fund' in all areas affected by redundancies. Mr. O'Neill assured the Chamber delegation that the company would offer every assistance within the community to find replacement or alternative employment for all those affected by the redundancy package. Future meetings have been planned between the Chamber and senior management of AWG.

## CRITICAL MEETING

Meanwhile, the steering group of all four unions have continued with their mandate received in Portlaoise last month from union representatives of all the AWG sites around the country.

On today, Wednesday November 12th, the biggest meeting of its kind in the industry is again being held in Portlaoise where the improved voluntary redundancy terms will be considered by over 100 union representatives. Details of the package will be outlined and a decision will then be made whether or not to recommend the package to workers.

## TANAISTE TAKING PARTICULAR INTEREST

Tanaiste and Minister for Enterprise, Trade and Employment, Mary Harney said she is taking a particular interest in the employment implications arising from the creation of the new Avonmore Waterford Group.

Responding in the Dail to a query raised by Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy, the Tanaiste said that the former entities clearly envisage that there would be some loss of employment in the short term due to the merger. This, she stated, has to be viewed in the context of creating a global player in the food processing industry.

Minister Harney confirmed that she will shortly be meeting with representatives of the company to discuss the matter and seek to ensure that any job losses are minimal.

## APPEAL

Speaking at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Billy Kyne appealed to the fifteen board members of AWG who represent the former Waterford Foods, to stand firm behind the workers and communities of Kilmeaden and Dungarvan.

"These fifteen members will have to look into their hearts when making a decision about the future of both these plants", said Cllr. Kyne.

Likewise, Cllr. Garry O'Halloran stressed that it would be remiss of board members if they did not take the important stakeholders (i.e. the workers) of the group into consideration.

# O'Halloran Launches Attack On Traveller Document

Outspoken County Councillor and P.R.O. of the newly formed Southern Travellers' Justice Group, Garry O'Halloran was told to 'shut up or leave' last Monday's Waterford County Council meeting by exasperated Chairman, Lar Hart.

The Clashmore barrister incurred the wrath of the majority of his colleagues when he launched a scathing attack on the Council's newly created draft policy statement on traveller accommodation. The policy statement was pre-

pared by Waterford County Manager, Donal Connolly and submitted at this week's Council meeting.

Describing it as a 'blueprint for racism', Cllr. O'Halloran said the Southern Travellers Justice Group

have requested the Garda Commissioner to analyse the policy document for fear it may be in breach of the Incitement to Hatred Act 1989.

The draft policy statement, which was adopted by the County Council, provides for the establishment of a Traveller Accommodation Committee and deals with such issues as permanent and transient halting sites, unofficial roadside

sites, finance and progress made to date in providing accommodation for travelling families in the county.

Strenuously objecting to the content of the policy statement, Cllr. O'Halloran (FG) embarked on a personal manifesto on travellers rights and not even the repeated order to refrain from such dialogue by Chairman, Cllr. Hart could silence his tirade.

Cllr. Hart finally declared that he was asking Cllr. O'Halloran to shut up or leave the meeting and subsequently adjourned proceedings for five minutes.

Condemning Cllr. O'Halloran's comments, Cllr. Billy Kyne said that at times by his overstatement, he is doing the new Travellers Group a disservice. He described the draft policy statement as a common sense approach by the County Manager to build a solution to the problem.

Likewise Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson said the Clashmore councillor is showing no consideration for people who suffer as a result of unauthorised halting sites. "He is being extremely unfair to the Council," he added.

The Southern Travellers' Justice Group, chaired by Paddy Connors of Youghal comprises of members of the travelling and settled communities, both urban and rural. Representatives are derived from counties Waterford, Wexford, Cork, Kerry, Tipperary and Limerick.

The main aim of the group is to achieve equal status for travellers with fellow Irish citizens.

In half an hour's time they had dug down to the tips of the man's wellingtons and were able to lift him onto the safety of the bank. It took the combined strength of the three men to overcome the huge suction of the mud. Indeed, the physical exertion during that terrible half hour was so intense that Ned Tutty damaged his back.

When the elderly man was finally freed and brought to safety, Michael Whelan went to find help at a nearby house.

Ned and his son tried to talk to the injured man who asked them what day it was. It emerged that the man, John Daly, who is in his late 60's lives on his own in Newport in the Knockanore area. He was out walking with his dog on the previous Sunday evening when he

became firmly entrenched in the mud.

Mr. Daly had already survived two low tides which submerged most of his body and was facing into a high tide, reaching over 10 feet farther up the bank, which would have meant certain death.

During his grueling 24 hour ordeal, Mr. Daly's loyal sheep dog stayed at his side and only left when his master was finally found on Monday evening.

By the time the ambulance arrived before 4 p.m., the tide had filled in the hole where Mr. Daly had been.

He was immediately transported to the South Infirmary hospital in Cork where he was admitted to intensive care and was finally discharged on Thursday, November 6th.

The quick thinking and

prompt action of Michael Whelan and Ned and Patrick Tutty saved Mr. Daly's life. They are to be highly commended on their brave rescue and the efficient manner in which they carried it out.

Commenting on the rescue, Ned Tutty said it had been a chance in a billion that they had entered the field where Mr. Daly was stranded and said it must have been fate which led them to him. In over 20 years of hunting, Mr. Tutty said that had been the first time they had taken that particular direction down the breen into the field.

"It was a miracle that we stumbled onto him", said Michael Whelan. "Only for the three of us were there, we would never have pulled him out of the mud in time", he added.

# Ballyduff Drama Group Presents "The Field"

It might be felt that John B. Keane's "The Field" is merely a play of the 1960's and not relevant to today's Ireland. In our more civilised urbanised society, land and property rights might be considered to be less important. Then, only last weekend, two people are shot dead in Westmeath in a dispute over the positioning of a fence and the whole thing is brought back into perspective.

For centuries, landlordism ensured that the vast majority of the people who worked the land had no say in their own future. Then, along came the Great Famine and thousands upon thousands starved because they could not be masters of their own destiny. The subsequent Lands Acts freed ownership of the land into the hands of those who worked it. Admittedly, some were "pitiful patches" but it was land nonetheless and from here on, should people starve, it would be their own fault. "Land is all that matters, Tadhg - own your own land." Since then, affairs of the land — rights of passage, access to water and the position of fences — have been stitched into the Irish rural psyche because they were so firmly linked with survival.



John B. Keane's knowledge of the rural beast is second to no other. Without doubt, "The Field" is his finest work because it encapsulates his lifetime's observations along with the comedy and the tragedy that is his home place.

## Dungarvan Chamber Of Commerce & Industry Newsletter

A delegation from the Chamber met with Mr. Pat O'Neill (Chief executive) and Mr. Matt Walsh (Deputy Chief Executive) AWG last Wednesday evening to discuss the proposed rationalisation within the new company. The Chamber impressed strongly the importance of the existing plant and administrative offices to the town and the strong social commitment that had existed between the people of the town and the company. Whilst no new details emerged concerning the overall reduction in employment in the town, Mr. O'Neill did say the company was intent upon putting in place an "Enterprise Fund" in all areas affected by redundancies and that the company would offer every assistance within the community to find replacement/alternative employment for all those affected by the redundancy package. We have strong

views on how this Enterprise Fund might be used within the Dungarvan area to maximise the potential of new job creation. It is however too early at this stage to determine what the acceptance levels for the redundancy package may be and as such no meaningful negotiations can take place until this has been determined. Mr. O'Neill informs us that eight independent studies are currently being undertaken into all aspects of future development and that pending the outcome of these studies an announcement on the future will be made some time in late November or early December. Further meetings have been planned between the Chamber and senior management of AWF.

With Christmas approaching fast the Chamber has been busy organising many different events. A full afternoon's entertainment has been organised for Sunday December 14th. There will

be music from Dungarvan Brass Band and there will also be live music and Christmas Carols. Santa will be escorted to town by the fire Brigade.

WLR FM will broadcast live from Grattan Square throughout the afternoon from 3.00-6.00 p.m. This year the Chamber are teaming up with the Lions Club Christmas Hamper appeal, all contributions to this worthy cause will be greatly appreciated. All proceeds are distributed back to those in need within the immediate locality and as such we would urge everybody to support this year's appeal so as to make Christmas a happier and enjoyable period for those less fortunate than ourselves. Work on erecting the Christmas lights has already commenced. Most of the work involved will be carried out on Sundays and after 6.00 p.m. each evening. We respectfully request that business people and the public in general have patience with any ensuing disruption.

SOUTH EASTERN HEALTH BOARD

### Child Care (Pre-School Services) Regulations 1996

The above Regulations came into effect on the 31st December 1996.

Pre-school service providers are reminded that any person presently providing a pre-school service must notify the South Eastern Health Board in writing of their intention to continue to provide this service.

Any person intending to establish a pre-school service must notify the South Eastern Health Board in writing of their intention to do so.

Under the terms of the Regulations a "pre-school service" is defined as any pre-school/playgroup, day nursery, creche, day care or other similar service which caters for pre-school children including those granted-aided by health boards.

A "pre-school child" is defined as a child who has not attained the age of six years and who is not attending a national school or a school providing an educational programme similar to a national school.

The following categories of pre-school services have been identified for the purpose of implementing the Regulations:—

#### (i) Sessional Services

Sessional pre-school services mean the provision of

- a service providing a planned programme to pre-school children
- a service of up to 3.5 hours per session.

#### (ii) Full Day Care

A full day care service means the provision of a structured day care service for children for more than 3.5 hours per day. Services such as those currently described as day nurseries and creches are included in this definition.

#### (iii) Childminders

Childminders look after children in the childminder's own home. Only childminders caring for more than three children are covered by the provisions of these Regulations.

#### (iv) Drop-in Centre

A drop-in centre refers to services provided in shopping centres, leisure centres or similar establishment which is provided as part of a customer/client service and where children are left for a short period of time while the parent or guardian is availing of a service or attending an event.

# This Week In The Garden

## Cover Alpines With Glass

Some alpine plants suffer in the winter months because of the excess water in the air. The water works its way into the leaves and makes them rot. To protect from rain keep them covered by sheets of glass kept aloft with sticks or bent wire but leave the sides of the shelter open as air circulation is essential.

## Dig Up Early Chrysanthemums

Border chrysanthemums are quite hardy during the winter, but they can rot and die. To avoid losing your collection, take a couple of examples of each variety and pack them in a box with a little light soil, cut off the stems five to eight cm. above soil level and leave them in a greenhouse.

## Finish Planting Tulips And Hyacinths

There is still time to plant your hyacinths and tulips, hurry though, because they should have been planted in the last week of October.

## Greenhouse Early Bulbs

Take a close look at bulbs boxed or potted in September. A few developed plants can be brought forward into a moderately heated greenhouse to around 16 degrees during the day and let it fall to around 10 degrees at night. Once flower buds are well formed you can raise the temperature to around 21 degrees centigrade. Before bringing them into the greenhouse, make sure the roots are well established, either uproot a few to have a look, or examine the drainage holes at the base of the pots for signs of growth.

## Force Indian Azaleas

To get really early flowers on your Indian azaleas bring them into a slightly warmer environment. An average of 18-21 degrees centigrade will do. Spray them every morning with luke warm water. Other early flowering shrubs such as forsythias, ornamental cherries and even lilac can be brought into a greenhouse as long as the temperature gets no higher than 16 degrees.

## Pick and Store Grapes

There is no longer any point in leaving grapes hanging on the vines. If you have a cool, dark and dry room to store them in all the better — but they should be picked by now anyway. Cut each bunch with about 23 centimetres of the vine still attached. Put the vine end in a jar full of clean soft water with a few pieces of charcoal in it, making sure the grapes are hanging freely outside the jar.

## Prune The Vines

By now the leaves of early or maincrop vines should have started to wilt or fall off. Outdoor vines can be pruned. The method for cutting both back is the same. Cut off the two nearest new shoots to dormant growth buds stemming from the main rod or spur. Tear off or remove all loose bark from the main rods and rub in Gishurst compound, made up of soap and sulphur. It kills bugs and parasites that live in the gnarly parts of the plant.

When finished, remove any ties you have, keeping the plant upright and lay it as close to parallel to the floor as possible. This will help encourage an even growth.

## Plants In Frames

From now on until early spring, plants kept in frames will require very careful handling. Some, such as rooted viola, pansies, violet cuttings, sweet pea seedlings and violet clumps are quite hardy and only need protection from heavy frosts and beating rain. They also need ventilation. Lights should be placed on the frames when the sun sets. Plants such as pelargoniums, marguerites and choice fuchsias are likely to be damaged by the smallest amount of frost and need to be protected by sacks at night. Remove and burn any yellowing leaves and poke the soil around with a stick to aerate it.

## Cauliflower Protection

The curds of the cauliflower should be starting to form. To protect them from frost, bend some of the outer leaves over them.

## DAIRYING : Liver Fluke

\* The Department of Agriculture has issued a liver fluke warning.

\* Dairy cows do not become immune to fluke and damage to the liver is irreversible.

\* Consider control of liver fluke this year on all except the driest farms to eliminate the problem.

\* The choice of flukicide depends on the length of time that the cow is housed before treatment.

\* Flukicides on the market include Fasinex, Ridafluke, Trodax and Zanil. Check what stages of fluke (early immatures, immatures or adults) are being targeted before choosing a flukicide for your situation.

\* Most of the usual flukicides have a milk withholding period so are best administered during the dry period.

## Feeding Maize

\* Where there is a ceiling on milk production, feeding over 50% high quality maize silage as the winter forage component of the diet can have a significant concentrate sparing effect.

\* In this situation yields can be maintained and concentrate input reduced by 1.5 - 2.0 kgs./head/day.

\* When feeding maize silage, the crude protein content of the concentrate should be increased to 25%.

\* Provisions must also be made to include extra calcium, phosphorous and trace elements in the cows diet because maize silage is low in these elements.

## BEEF

At a recent Teagasc Beef Seminar in Kildalton College, Mr. Tony Petit, Teagasc Cattle Specialist spoke on key targets for cattle producers. Feed costs being the main variable cost require particular attention.

## Feed Costs

Indoor feeding (silage or silage and meals) is at least 5 - 6 times more expensive per kg. liveweight gain than grazed grass. Typical feed costs per kg. liveweight gain are given below for different stages of production.

Production Stage	Cost Per Kg.	Liveweight Gain
First Winter	70 - 80p	
Second Grazing Season	15 - 20p	
Final Winter	90p+	

The conclusions are clear-cut. Profitable beef production is dependent on -

\* Maximising weight gain at grass

\* Reducing winter feed costs.

Aim for 200 kg. liveweight gain at grass over the second grazing season (continental males). Good performance (average 0.9 kg./day) over a long grazing season (220 days) is essential to achieve the 200 kg. target. Early turnout is vital as it allows stock to exploit the high gain achievable on spring grass.

The first winter housing period should be kept as short as possible (130 - 140 days - mid/late November to mid/late March, is possible in many cases). Heavy weanlings should not be 'pushed' over the first winter.

The final winter is the most expensive phase of beef production. Daily grain barely covers feed/interest costs. If no price rise is imminent, steers should be sold once premium conditions are met (age, retention) and the animal is reasonably well finished (fat score 3, 4L). High quality first cut silage (75 DMD) plus meals is the most cost effective diet for producers finishing their own cattle. Feeding up to 4.5 kg. meal to steers on good silage (70 DMD) is justified at current meal prices (£120 - 130/). Heifers: finish at grass during the second grazing season if possible.

## LAST CHANCE TO CLAIM BEEF PREMIUM

Herd owners can lodge up to four 10 months premium and up to four 22 monthly premium applications between January 1 and December 5 1997. If you wish to make a final claim in 1997 you have three weeks to do so as applications must be with the Department of Agriculture, Portlaoise on or before Friday, December 5 1997.

Animals born between March 1 1996 and March 31 1997 qualify for the 10 MONTH premium and animals born on or before February 28 1996 qualify for the 22 MONTH premium, if applying before November 30 1997.

Animals born between April 1 1996 and April 30 1997 qualify for the 10 MONTH premium and animals born on or before March 31 1996 qualify for the 22 MONTH premium if applying between December 1 and 5 1997.

## Donovan Says Minister Walsh Must Guarantee £90/Head Special Beef Premium Payment

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan has said this week that the two cuts in National Special Beef Premium Quota was now coming back to haunt livestock farmers with the reality that Ireland is likely to exceed the 1997 national quota level of 1,002,000 head.

Mr. Donovan said the present and previous Minister for Agriculture gave away in excess of 200,000 premium rights on two different occasions since Ireland established a quota of 1.5m head in 1992, which has now been cut back to 1m head.

The Waterford IFA livestock leader said that Minister Walsh must ensure that livestock farmers are guaranteed the full £90/head Special Beef Premium. "If

this means Minister Walsh has to go to Commissioner Fishler and get back sufficient quota to guarantee a full Special Beef Premium payment of £90/head, he must do so immediately."

Mr. Donovan said that winter finishing of cattle was an exceptionally tight margin business and was unviable without the Deseasonalisation Premium. "If we fail to qualify for the £60/head payment for 1999, Minister Walsh must make a case to the EU Commission to have this payment retained in future years, even if it means some level of national subvention." He said that financing the slaughter premium out of the 22 month premium is a non-runner as it would mean a loss of up to £20m in EU aid.

## Waterford Co. ICMSA News

### ICMSA WELCOMES COMMISSIONERS COMMITMENT TO EARLY RETIREMENT

Mr. Pat O'Rourke, Deputy President of ICMSA, speaking after a meeting with Commissioner Fischler said that the Commissioner had given a commitment to review the Early Retirement

Scheme with the objective of making improvements to the Scheme.

Mr. O'Rourke said that the Commissioner had reaffirmed his commitment to deal with the enlargement clause issue. The enlargement requirement was causing farmers difficulties on a number of fronts. In the first

instance, farmers are having difficulty in getting suitable land and secondly, farmers are paying significant rents for land they may not require.

ICMSA proposals regarding enlargement if necessary to achieve viability, by increasing land area or the quota attached to the holding is much more logical and would ensure that the young farmer would invest in assets which would improve his/her viability and not assets which could be detrimental to his/her viability, and are just acquired to comply with the Schemes rules.

### BUDGET

Mr. Pat O'Rourke, Deputy President of ICMSA, speaking after a meeting with the Minister for Finance, Mr. Charlie McCreevy, at which ICMSA presented its pre-budget submission said that ICMSA had impressed on the Minister the need to reintroduce on-farm investment schemes and the installation aid scheme for young farmers.

Mr. O'Rourke continued: "Given the opportunities that exist for young people in off-farm employment at the present time, it is essential that every possible incentive is given to young people who wish to enter farming at the present time, a time when there is great uncertainty in agriculture. The installation aid scheme was one such incentive. This scheme must be reintroduced to provide young

small and medium sized farmers with the opportunity to develop their farms and to ensure their viability."

## Survey Shows Two Out Of Three Farmers Have Not Yet Received Headage Payments

An IFA survey of headage payments revealed that the Department of Agriculture has failed to deliver on the payment commitments set down in the Charter of Farmers Rights in the case of 2 out of every 3 farmers who applied under the 1997 headage schemes.

The survey of 295 farmers chosen at random shows that 201 or 68% have not yet received their 1997 headage payments despite the fact that October 31 was the deadline for payment. The survey was carried out through IFA's 12 regional offices nation-wide between Friday, October 31 and Monday, November 3.

Commenting on the findings, Waterford IFA Chairman, James Coughlan called on the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh, to intervene and release the payment blockage in his Department. Mr. Coughlan spelt out the commitments laid out in the Charter of Rights that all headage payments would be fully paid out by the end of October of each year.

Mr. Coughlan said that delays in making payments were causing severe financial hardship on many farms and were compounding the income crisis in many farm households.

The IFA President said that Headage Payments is worth about £115m. annually to up to 100,000 farmers who are mainly on low income and who farm in very difficult, poor land conditions. "With nearly £80m. still owed to farmers, it is unacceptable that these payments are not made on time," warned Mr. Coughlan.

Her daughters Karen and Val, her sisters Helen and Rose and two lifelong friends Angela and Mary. Outside of the church the route to her grave was once again lined by a guard of honour from her workmates at Couristan Carpets in Youghal.

The fact that her entire place of work closed down on the day was just another indication of the high esteem in which she was held. Though she shared a very happy life here in Tallow for many years, Ger never lost her love for her beloved Youghal. The people of Youghal did her proud in return last weekend.

Amidst a sea of floral tributes, Ger's remains were lowered in the soil of her adopted home. Her coffin was covered by a red carpet which was also symbolic of her life's work and we left her to rest in the knowledge that the words spoken by Fr. Farrell are indeed true. 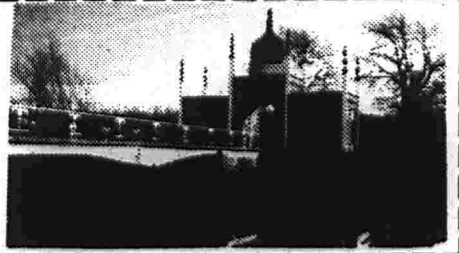

Hence my appreciation and admiration for local historian and author, Mike Hackett.

In recent years Mike has devoted a huge amount of his time to research, speaking to hundreds of people, collecting photographs and getting it all down on paper. Mike then went on to write and publish five books to ensure his town and countryside will be remembered for generations to come.

"Echoes Over The Blackwater" is Mike Hackett's latest publication. # Family health

By Dr. DAVE BARRY

**Q. Dear Doctor, I have a problem with my bladder. I have had this since my youngest child was born 3 years ago. I leak water every time I cough or sneeze. It can be terribly embarrassing in company when I laugh. I have to wear protection all the time. I know where every toilet is in my local town, as I have discovered that if I empty my bladder frequently I do not leak as much when I laugh or sneeze. What is causing this problem and can it be cured?**

**A.** You give a very good description of a very common problem, namely *Stress Incontinence*. It is defined as the involuntary loss of urine through the urethra when the pressure in the abdomen is suddenly increased, for example when you cough, laugh or run. The bladder and some of the tube leading from the

bladder to the outside, the urethra, are within the abdominal cavity, the tummy. At the junction of the bladder and the urethra is a ring of muscle which is involved in keeping urine in the bladder until we are ready to release it at a socially acceptable time and place. This ring of muscle works with muscles and

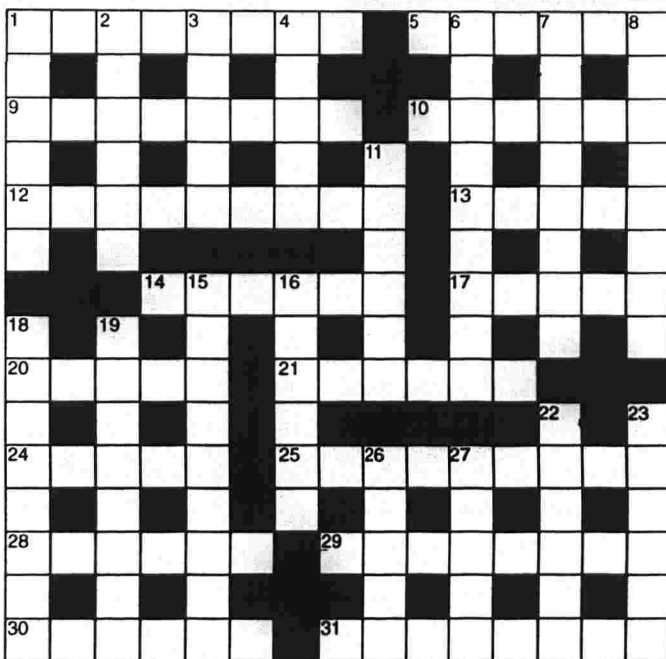
ligaments of the pelvic floor and the pelvis itself to keep urine in the bladder. After childbirth, hysterectomy (having the womb removed), the pelvic muscles and ligaments become stretched and bladder control is not as good as it was previously. Other causes include hormonal changes due to the menopause, diseases of the

pelvic nerves or congenital weakness of the pelvic floor muscles. Yes, it is a problem that can be fixed. Firstly you need to visit your doctor in order to be sure that this is the true nature of your problem and that there is nothing else complicating it and to have a complete physical examination. The doctor will test a sample of your urine in order to exclude other diseases like diabetes or kidney infections. Your doctor will probably advise you to lose weight as this will help to reduce pressure in the abdominal cavity. He may

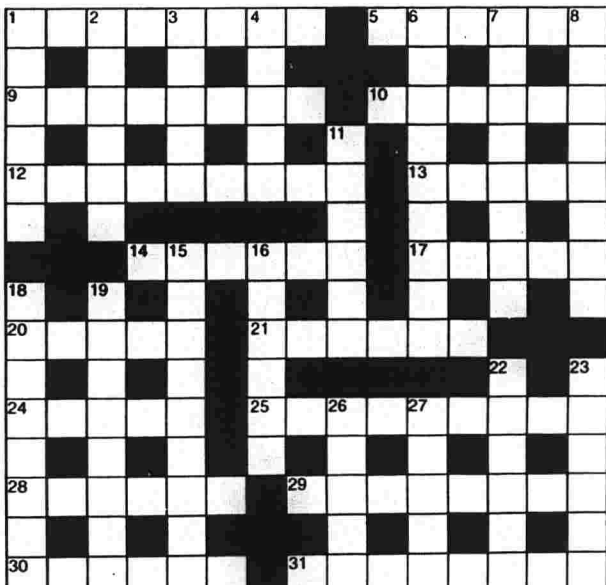
also give you advice on how to do pelvic floor exercises in order to build up the muscles that have been traumatised by childbirth. He may refer you to a physiotherapist for further treatment. If he feels that the menopause is the problem then he may prescribe a course of hormone replacement therapy. If these measures fail then he may be left with no option and will have to refer you to a specialist with a view to surgery to correct the fault and reposition the bladder.

## Tips from the Tannery

CHEF'S CORNER



### MAIN COURSE Coq au Vin

- 1 large chicken cut into eight pieces
- 2 carrots thickly sliced
- 2 sticks of celery — thickly sliced
- 2 onions, roughly chopped
- 4 garlic cloves, crushed
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 sprig thyme
- 1.5 litres red cooking wine
- 6 tablespoons seasoned flour
- 4 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 sprig tarragon
- 1 litre chicken stock
- Salt and pepper
- 3 1/2 oz. streaky bacon cut into thick strips
- 20 button onions
- 4 oz. button mushrooms

Begin 3 days before serving. Put the chicken in a large bowl, add the carrots, celery, onions, garlic, bay leaf, thyme and wine. Mix, cover and leave in fridge overnight.

The next day drain the chicken and vegetables in a colander over a bowl to reserve the wine marinade. Toss the chicken in seasoned flour. Heat the oil in a frying pan and brown the chicken, then transfer to a flameproof casserole.

In the same frying pan, fry the carrots, onions and celery until well browned, then add the wine marinade and pour over the chicken, adding the garlic, bay leaf, thyme and tarragon. Bring to the boil, simmer for 10 mins., then add enough stock to cover the chicken. Cover with a lid and simmer very gently for one hour.

Drain in a colander over a bowl — then pour the sauce back into a pan and boil to reduce and thicken. Strain through a fine sieve into a clean saucepan. Season to taste, add the chicken and set aside.

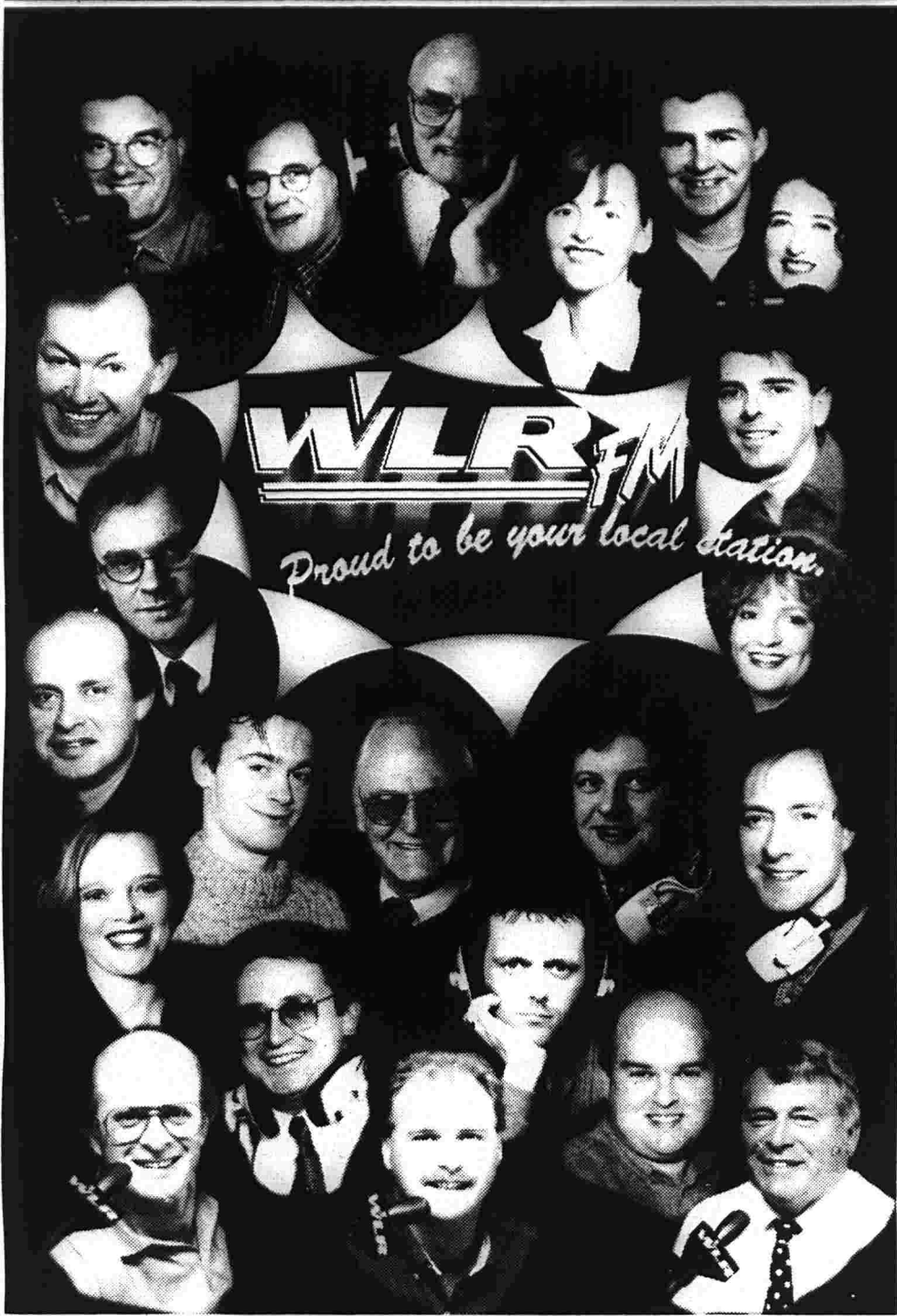
Fry the bacon gently until golden. Add the onions and fry until lightly coloured, then add to the sauce. In the same pan, sauté the mushrooms for a few minutes, then add to the sauce. Simmer for 15 minutes. Leave to cool, then cover with clingfilm and refrigerate for 48 hours. To serve, reheat and simmer for 5 mins.

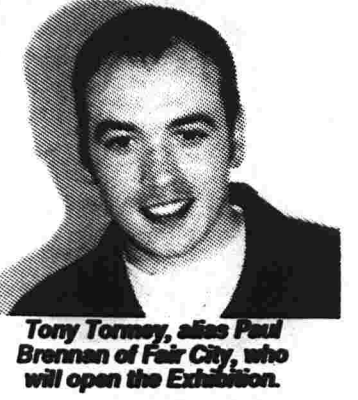

The Munster Uneven Ages Juvenile Cross Country Championships attracted huge entries to St. Augustine's College last Sunday on a day that was ideal for spectators and competitors alike. The status of juvenile athletics in Waterford received a further boost following Seamus Hannon's and William Harty's victories in Limerick last month with a further two individual victories as well as two second and one third placings and some fine team performances.

Under the organisation of Munster Cross Country Secretary John Harty, the fixture was a huge success with all concerned making their way home at the early hour of 3.30 p.m. following the presentation of Munster medals for the ten race fixtures.

## Touraneena's Title

The St. Paul's duo of Aife McCormack and Jennifer Maher were the first Waterford runners to impress when they finished a very respectable 7th and 8th in the under-9 race. The boys under-9 event brought Waterford its first gold medal of the day when E.C.K.'s David McCarthy ran a brilliantly judged race to win his second Munster title. Among the leading

contenders throughout, the Touraneena boy used his sprinting ability to telling effect in the last 60m to come home a very deserving winner.

Son of Rose and Laurence McCarthy, this was David's first run in over six weeks but it didn't affect what was an excellent run. # Waterford Footballers Play Down In League

## Shamrocks Take On Erin's Own In Intermediate Final & Geraldines Will Play Ballyduff East In The Junior Hurling Final At Walsh Park

Another weekend of exciting activity, as the hurlers of Shamrocks and Geraldines hold the hopes of the West in their quest for titles and promotion and the county footballers play host to Down in football at Fraher Field.

The weekend programme may include a couple of fixtures of lesser importance so a check of the fixtures column is advised.

### SHAMROCKS v. ERIN'S OWN

This is the big one at Walsh Park as the hurlers of Erin's Own and Shamrocks compete for the intermediate title and the right to play in the senior championship next season.

Recently when they met in the league final, the city team had a convincing victory and must be strongly fancied to repeat this result back in Walsh Park where they play most of their games.

Erin's Own club are unsure of the exact time that their club was founded, but they reckon that it was around 1923 or '24, a fact which makes them the oldest hurling club in the city. What is known and well recorded is their proud and distinguished history of achievement. They have won more than a dozen senior hurling county titles, including their famous nine-in-a-row from 1927 to 1935. They last won the title in 1962 and since then they have been up and down between senior and intermediate. They won the intermediate county title three years ago and are now confident that they can repeat this feat by beating Shamrocks here on Sunday.

Last year Abbeyside defeated Ferrybank in the intermediate final, and the city team came back this year more determined than before to lift this crown after many years of trying. Ferrybank drew with Erin's Own in the eastern final, but in the re-

play a very dynamic Erin's Own dominated from start to finish and with former county player Damien Byrne giving a masterful performance at centre half back and Noelle Kelly in brilliant form in attack, the winners were full value for their 2-12 to 1-12 victory.

Apart from Damien Byrne and Noelle Kelly, Erin's Own had splendid players in Alan Robinson, who was outstanding in goal, Brendan Doyle, Paul Gough, O. J. Shanahan, Pat Delahunty, Michael Gater, Angus Dowling, etc., and if the same players show the same form, they will be difficult to beat here.

A victory for the Shamrocks would be one of the most popular results of this or any year for a long time. With a limited panel they have continued to battle — sometimes very much against the odds — away for most of the way, but always seemed to find themselves dogged by hard luck.

This year Shamrocks have won the Western league as well as its championship counterpart with victories over Cappoquin, Ring and Colligan in the Western final. In the divisional final, the Knockanore side were not quite as impressive as in their other games, but as one of their mentors remarked afterwards, it is great to play below the usual form and still win.

Trained by Eddie Cunningham, Shamrocks have responded very well to the strict training programme set out at the start of the season and the expectations are that if they hit top form on the day, they are good enough to capture this title which has eluded them for so long. Their lineout will look like Liam Murphy, a confident and experienced goalkeeper, Tom Roche, Kieran Ahearne, who captains the side and will play at full back, Thomas Hickey, Mike Ryan, Michael Motherway,

John O'Donovan, Dan Casey, Liam Dalton, Sean Murphy, James Baldwin, Padraig Tobin, Kieran O'Keefe, Pat "Tare" Murphy, Kieran Murphy, etc. These and the other members of the Shamrocks panel are players who wear the clubs jerseys with a passionate pride and can be trusted to give it one hundred per cent when they face Erin's Own in this final which is expected to produce sparkling fare at the city venue.

### UNIQUE RECORD?

In writing notes on Shamrocks/Tallow games during the season, the name of Padraig Tobin cropped up on almost every occasion and after making enquiries as to whether there were two players of the same name, I found that the same player was involved all the times that I referred to. On checking to see if he had in fact played in the reported matches, I was informed that he had played in intermediate hurling and football with Shamrocks after he had previously played on the club's junior hurling and football teams. At underage level he played minor hurling (and won a county medal) with Tallow and minor football with Shamrocks. These clubs are joined for underage purposes. Padraig played under 21 hurling and football as well as under 16 hurling and football. In all I understand this very talented young player, who must now have established a unique record, played more than 65 matches this year. Where can we get greater dedication and commitment than this?

### GERALDINES v. BALLYDUFF

It is just 21 years since the Geraldines club won the county junior hurling championship when they defeated Portlaw in a rip-roaring clash at Fraher Field, Dungarvan. They have enjoyed a great degree of success since then by reaching county fi-

nals in junior hurling and football and in 1988 they won the 'B' junior hurling title. Their record over the past three or four years is most impressive playing in three finals without success.

They have a very worthy panel of players just now and practically all of these have contributed to their success in recent times, but all have yet to taste the cup of victory after winning a junior proper county hurling title.

They may do so on Sunday and if they fail, it won't be for want of trying.

One of their drawbacks is that they find it difficult to maximise their full potential and are not getting full value for their efforts.

The games that I have seen them win this year, should, practically all, have been won by a greater margin than that recorded on the scoreboard. In the west this year, the Geraldines had two matches against neighbours Clashmore before they finally survived to the next round. Against Ballinameela they played very well, but might have asserted themselves at an earlier stage. In the Western final, they were masters of Kilgobinet, but here again did not win by the kind of margin that seemed possible at the three-quarter stage. But the facts are that the Geraldines won and if that can be achieved without a team playing to their full potential, then all the better because they can carry on in the hope that their best is still to be produced.

It is expected that their management team of Paddy Corkery, Tom Scanlon and Richard Hurley, will stick with the team which brought them through in the west with Alan Ronayne in goal. He did bring off a few splendid saves when called on to do so against Kilgobinet.

Stephen Ronayne, Laurence Maher and Tom Curran will be in the full back

and the trio to do duty in the half back line will be Tom Cullinane, Tholm Keane, who played a captain's part in the divisional final and Sean Osbourne who substituted for the injured Mike Ware. In the middle of the field Pat O'Donovan will again have Alan Cullen as his partner. O'Donovan had a whale of a game in the western final. Up in attack the Aglish based team will have Donnacha Tobin, Noel Downing, Ned Scanlon, Michael Murray (who scored well against Kilgobinet), Brian Connery, Brian Ronayne and with an array of talent on the bench, I see the western champions in with a big chance, but I was advised by an eastern observer that Ballyduff will be very difficult to overcome here. Like the Geraldines, they have been around for quite a while and have been doing a lot of knocking on the door without success.

In their lineup will be players like Edward Geraghty, Tony Larkin, Brendan Regan, Michael Murphy, Albert Kearns, Pat Murphy, Shane Larkin, Derek Gahan, Francis Gahan, Niall Power, Mark and Brian O'Leary, etc., etc. Most of these players were on the side which defeated Mount Sion in the junior hurling eastern semi final in 1995, before being narrowly beaten by Ferrybank in the divisional final.

### WATERFORD TAKE ON DOWN IN NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE

The Northern county will be our guests at Fraher Field next Sunday and no doubt they will come here fully determined to continue their winning sequence and the Div. 1 team will unlikely be

in a mood to show us any mercy. A report of their match against Tipperary in the same league two weeks ago stated that they were unhappy about their performance and about leaving Tipperary get within six points of them.

Their most prominent players Glen McMahon, Gavin Murdock, Gavin Murphy, Shane Ward, Patrick Slone, Glen Deegan and others are names that mean nothing to us or to our players, but they are players with a good pedigree and playing on a Div. 1 side who are going all out to recover the Sam McGuire which they won a few years ago.

Waterford played very well against Cork two weeks ago and that display will have boosted their confidence somewhat and I'm sure they will strive to do very well against Down here on Sunday and while probably not expecting to win because of the acknowledged gap in standards, they will hope to at least benefit to the limit from the experience.

The Waterford team is not expected to show much change from the side which played Cork and will have Tom Brennan in goal with Oliver Costello, G. Walsh and Andy Hubbard in the full back line. Michael Byrne, Niall Geary and Matty Kiely will man the half back line. Don McMahon and Mark Radley will be partners again in the middle of the field and the attack will be chosen from Liam Daniels, Richie Power, Kieran Whelan, Niall Curran, Stephen Cunningham, Colin Keane, Frannie Halpin, etc. Liam Dalton will be assisting Shamrocks in the county final and will not be available.

## EARLIER CONVENTIONS

Because of the changes approved by the Special Congress, this will be the last occasion on which conventions will take place during the month of January. Next year, therefore the County and Divisional Boards here in Waterford will all hold two conventions, one in January '98 and another in December '98. In the first year of the change it will mean that the accounts will deal with an eleven months period. After this, the accounts, etc., will deal with a full year.

# Deserving Win For Ballygunner

**BALLYGUNNER 3-11 SARSFIELDS 2-7**

Ballygunner scored a deserved victory over Sarsfields in an exciting and keenly competitive first round Munster club hurling championship replay at Walsh Park on Sunday.

The 5,000 attendance was treated to a full blooded contest in which quarter was neither asked nor given by either side. The fervour and intensity of the exchanges never flagged, and, even though the Gunners always looked the probable winners, Sarsfields refusal to concede an inch kept them in with a battling chance.

Unquestionably the spoils of victory went to the better side, and Ballygunner played with a confidence and composure that stamped

them as serious contenders for provincial and even All Ireland honours. The returning Paul Flynn, who was ruled out of the drawn game through suspension, bolstered the Gunners in attack, and his brace of goals — one in each half — were the scores which ultimately put the saving of the game beyond Sarsfield's reach.

It was Flynn who opened his side's account with a pointed '65' in 90 seconds and when Paul Power tacked on another almost immedi-

ately the Gunners were off to the proverbial flyer. Within two minutes, Sarsfields, playing with the assistance of the breeze, were level with scores from John Murphy and Pat Ryan (free).

The game came a vintage spell for the winners. Hartley was emerging as an impregnable bulwark to the Sarsfields attack at centre back, and with Stephen Frampton and Niall Warren also growing in stature Sars scoring chances were extremely limited.

It took a breathtaking save by the veteran goalkeeper Tadgh Murphy to deny the outstanding Billy O'Sullivan a goal in the 14th minute, but when the wing forward rifled over a great point two minutes later the Gunners had regained a lead they never again relinquished.

Flynn went through for the first of his goals in the 17th minute, and the Sarsfields defence was beginning to come under increasing pressure as the Gunners stepped up the tempo of their play.

Sars moved Pat Ryan to full forward, Teddy McCarthy to the forty, and Brian O'Callaghan to midfield in an effort to arrest things, and they had the tonic of a marvellous goal from Ryan in the 27th minute after John Barry had put him in possession with a pass of pinpoint accuracy.

When Ryan followed with a pointed free the deficit was down to just two points, and though Liam Whitty replied with a Gunners minor on the stroke of half time, Sarsfields must have been relieved to go in at the break trailing by 1-6 to 1-3.

The Corkmen resumed with McCarthy restored to the full forward berth and Ryan renewing his midfield partnership with Tadgh Lynch, while the Gunners also revamped their attack in which Cormac Sweeney replaced an out of touch Darragh O'Sullivan.

Within two minutes of the restart Tony Carroll stretched the Gunners leader with a delightful point — a score that was to be the benchmark for a superb second half performance by the flying wing forward. But Sars continued to offer dogged resistance, and they had the deficit back to two points by the 35th minute with points from Ryan (free) and a magnificent one from

Teddy McCarthy.

Three minutes later, they again fell victim to a piece of Flynn opportunism. Liam Whitty's sideline delivery was superbly struck, and with his immediate marker nowhere in sight Flynn found his route to goal without an obstacle and he goaled.

Carroll skillfully slotted over a brace of points and the struggle was becoming an uphill one for Sars. To their eternal credit they refused to bow to what was beginning to look more like the inevitable. John Considine continued to hurl defiantly at centre back and Ryan finally began to win possession around the middle of the field. It was Ryan who gave them a flicker of hope in the 55th minute when he blasted a 25 metre free to the net to leave them trailing 2-11 to 2-6.

Within 30 seconds the Gunners had struck for the killer blow at the other end of the field. Straight from the puck-out they swept into attack and a hitherto subdued Mick Mahony finally sealed his side's victory with another superb goal from close range. Sars did manage one further point from substitute Gahan, but it wasn't nearly enough and the Gunners advanced deservedly to a semi final with Clarecastle on Sunday week at the same venue.
