Paves **Way For**

The area in question, which is owned by the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee, was

Indeed residents in the nearby housing estate of Childers claim the green space is used frequently as a play area by local children and have voiced their opposition to the proposed location of the college, rather than the structure itself. Know Your Rights

I am single and due to have a baby shortly, I am living with the father of our child. What surname will the child have?

ANSWER

Prior to 1st October 1997, the surname of the child was not recorded on the Birth Certificate. Births registered on or after 1st October will have the surname of the child, the mother's address and occupation and any former surnames of the father. These details were not included in births recorded before October 1st.

The surname assigned to your child at birth and recorded in the Birth Register must be either the surname of the father or mother or both. In your situation you must decide what surname your child is to have. If your child is to have your surname on it, then that information can be given to the hospital and it will register the birth at the Register of Births, Deaths and Marriages for the area in which the hospital is located. No details of the father will be recorded. If the father's surname is to be given to the child, then if you are registering the birth you must provide a declaration made by you naming the father (form SC1). This must be accompanied by a Statutory Declaration made by the father acknowledging paternity (SC3). In this case you will be required to attend at the Office of the Registrar to sign the Birth Register.

It is important to be clear about which name you want before you register the birth. It will be difficult to change the Register afterwards.

Call For **Restoration Of Young** Farmers' Grant

An appeal has been sent out to the Taoiseach Bertie Ahern and to the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh, to immediately restore the Installation Grant of £5,600, now scrapped by the Gov-

Waterford County Councillor Willie McDonnell proposed that the local authority request Minister Walsh and the Taoiseach to restore the grant aid in the interest of young farmers taking over the family farm.

Speaking at last week's Council meeting, Cllr. Mc-Donnell stressed the importance of the £5,600 Installation Grant for young farmers who incur huge expenses in legal fees for the transfer of farms and for farm improvements.

By restoring the Installation Grant and helping young farmers, Cllr. Mc-Donnell said the Government would strengthen rural Ireland.

His proposal was seconded by Clir. Jimmy Quirke.

County Council Backs Evicted Family

- STINGING CRITICISM OF INBS

Waterford County Council Whitestown, Clonea-Power has come out in strong sup-port of the Murphy family of from their 145 acre farm and

family home, on foot of a warrant granted to the Irish Nationwide Building Society, has sparked off a furious countywide reaction.

Prior to the commencement of last Friday's annual estimates meeting in Dungarvan, the eviction was condemned out of hand by members.

Cllr. Tom Cunningham called for a show of solidarity by members behind the evicted Murphy family. He said the actions of INBS had effectively locked a 52 year old widow Ann Murphy and teenage daughter Josephine out on the side of

While admitting that the Society was entitled to seek the recovery of the outstanding debt, Cllr. Cunningham declared however that what happened to the family in Clonea-Power was an absolute disgrace.

"Any farmer will think twice and three times about doing business with INBS again," he slammed.

He subsequently proposed that the Council call on the Building Society to immediately reinstate the family to allow for 'orderly' negotiations between the two sides.

Seconding the proposal was Cllr. Pat Coffey who said he was particularly saddened by the events, given that he has known the Murphy family for a long number of years.

Whatever about the INBS taking goods and chatels, no one could justify the eviction which had put the Mur-phy's out of house and

home," said Cllr. Coffey. Meanwhile ICMSA President Frank Allen has also called on INBS to allow Mrs. Murphy and her daughter return to their family farmhouse.

We cannot tolerate this sort of landlordism in this day and age", said Mr.

The ICMSA President said he was offering himself as a mediator in the hope that the issue could be resolved with a satisfactory outcome for both sides. Last week's heartwrenching eviction was a public relations disaster for INBS who have certainly done themselves no favours in County Waterford.

is becoming extinct. It has vanished from seven of Britain's counties over the past century, according to

the Mammal Society. Many other colonies are threatened by the destruction of woodland — chopping down trees and digging up ground where the dor-

Many of the country's woods are being ne-

glected. Traditional coppicing - cutting back wood to allow light to get to the ground - created an ideal habitat for the dormouse, but this is now a dying art.

Much of the suitable woodland is surrounded by roads preventing the dormouse from leaving its home to find more suitable abodes or breeding grounds. The change in the climate because of global warming is causing hotter summers and warmer winters. This causes the dormouse to get con-

fused when it comes to hibernation and breeding.

Other species facing extinction include the skylark and the bittern - which used to be found in marshes all over the country, but was hunted so much by Victorians it never fully recovered.





A planning application by ESAT Digifone for the erection of a 12-metre extension with additional antennae on the existing mast at the rear of Lismore Garda Station has caused great anxiety among local residents.

The final decision on any rationalisation plans or plant closures within the newly merged company will rest squarely with these board members who hold the future of the 12,000 jobs in their hands.

As many as 1,000 of these 12,000 jobs worldwide within the group are likely to be on the line and as already mentioned, there are very strong indications that Dungarvan and Kilmeaden operations will both experience substantial job cuts and possibly more in the case of Dungarvan.

Mr. Mansfield, said that in a merger one would expect equality of treatment as occurred in the Dairygold merger between Mitchel-stown and Ballyclough dairies where both companies were retained.

"Many of my members are wondering out loud if the word 'Waterford' as part of the AWG company name should in fact be removed,'

said Mr. Mansfield who strongly added that he did not regard the threat of closure of the Dungarvan complex at Shandon as equal treatment

EMPLOYING OVER 300

Employing just over 300 workers in the traditional dairy stronghold of Dungarvan, the former Waterford Foods company grew from humble beginnings as Shandon Dairies at the start of this century to Dungar-van Co-op before branching out into Waterford Co-op in the 60's and finally Waterford Foods plc in 1988.

The facility at Shandon and administrative offices at Main Street are intrinsic parts of the town providing not only direct labour but generating spin-off employ-ment for fabric engineers and suppliers of all kinds. With a milk pool of 75 million gallons over a 35 mile radius, the Shandon plant has the lowest energy costs

in the group.
This indigenous industry has a close and unique affinity with the town, generating business and wealth in Dungarvan and surrounding areas.

As a former publicly quoted international food business with sales in excess of £1 bn. annually, Waterford Foods had acted as a highly

successful ambassador for

the area.

Dungarvan's sister operation in Kilmeaden which was established in the 60's has also become a major industrial site providing vital employment for over 70 people in the Kilmeaden catchment area.

Intense lobbying of AWG management officials has already been undertaken by the unions, the Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce, Waterford County Council, Dungarvan UDC, the Wa-terford County Enterprise Board and Dail Deputies in a bid to retain the Dungarvan and Kilmeaden plants.

DECIDE FATE

Many local ATGWU

members who have given
the best years of their life to the Dungarvan dairy industry now feel completely ig-nored by the new AWG management.

According to Mr. Mansfield, the number crunchers, i.e. the men in grey suits are now making the decisions about our community based industry. No one, he said, has spoken up for the workers and their families and

their sentiments in the public domain.

Having spoken to many small farmers around the county, Mr. Mansfield said there is now a sense of regret among some former Waterford Foods shareholders who have only now fully realised that control of a company that had been built up slowly over the years is lost and in the hands of the 'number crunchers'.

"My concern, in respect to the wisdom of this so called merger from the outset, has been and remains that Dungarvan and Waterford as a whole have lost any influence in decision making, stated Mr. Mansfield. He said his job is to look after the interests of ATGWU members in Co. Waterford.

IMPROVED VOLUNTARY REDUNDANCY DEAL

Meanwhile the ATGWU and the three other main unions representing workers throughout the giant dairy group voted last week to recommend acceptance of an improved voluntary redundancy package worth in excess of £50m.

At a meeting in Portlaoise, attended by over 90 delegates from SIPTU, the ATGWU, TEEU and AEEU, there was strong support for the deal.

The original redundancy offer from AWG management was believed to be worth in the region of £40m and would have given workers five weeks pay for every year of service.

A steering committee, con-sisting of four full-time union officials and 12 other union representatives however was involved in negotiating the improved redundancy deal through a great deal of

hard bargaining.

Each of the four unions will now consult separately with their own membership who will decide on whether to accept or reject the package. Their respective decisions will then be conveyed back to the main union body by this Friday, November 21st.

It is expected that the improved package will be accepted by a majority of local ATGWU members in anticipation of the pending rationalisation proposals to be announced later this month. One can only wait in hope that management will recognise the importance of retaining the viable and extremely lucrative plants at Dungarvan and Kilmeaden.

Cappoquin Area Well Represented **At County Council Meeting**

The Cappoquin area fea-tured prominently in discussion at last week's Waterford County Council meeting. Local Councillor Nora Flynn raised numerous notices of motion dealing with various proposed de-velopments in the West Waterford town such as plans for the Cappoquin branch library and urgent footpaths replacement works.

Currently located on the first floor, it has long been proposed to relocate the Cappoquin branch library downstairs on the ground floor to improve public ac-

cess. Cllr. Flynn asked for a report on the project and enquired as to what stage the plans to upgrade the library

are currently at.
Waterford County Council
Manager, Donal Connolly said the Council had appointed architects to draw up a plan for the new library. He agreed to report back to the Council on the

£5,000 CONTRIBUTION FOR FOOTPATHS

Meanwhile on the issue of a footpath replacement programme for Cappoquin, Cllr. Flynn said she had previously requested that such a programme be drawn up for towns and villages throughout the west of the

Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson who s Chairman of the Cappoquin Community Develop-

group have made £5,000 available to the Council towards the reconstruction of footpaths from Shanbally to Walsh's Hotel. The Development Company have made this generous contribution as a result of their successful weekly Lotto.

Cllr. Wilkinson asked that a quick start be made by the Council on this urgent project.

In reply Mr. Connolly agreed that a comprehensive programme for footpath repairs is needed for Cappo-quin and said the Council will match the £5,000 contributed by the Development Company with its own funds.

TRAFFIC **CHAOS**

Problems associated with severe traffic congestion in Cappoquin were also raised at the meeting. Cllr. Wilkinson suggested

that the Council meet with the local Church of Ireland authorities to see if traffic congestion could be relieved

at the church junction.
Re-echoing Cllr. Wilkinson's sentiments, Cllr. Flynn claimed that Cappoquin lends itself to the trial introduction of a one-way traffic system similar to that proposed for Dungarvan.

AFFANE CROSS FUNDING

The dangerous junction at Affane Cross, Cappoquin is being submitted to the Nafunding under the Low Cost Safety and Improvement Scheme next year.

First brought to the attention of Council officials by Cllr. Nora Flynn over four years ago, the junction has been the scene of numerous traffic accidents over the years.


County Engineer, John O'Flynn told last week's meeting that the Council have submitted works at both Affane Cross and Finnisk Bridge for funding under the N.R.A.'s 1998 scheme. He said he expected the Roads Authority to allocated some funding for those projects.

DANGEROUS VEE ROAD

Another matter raised within the Cappoquin area was the dangerous condition of the vee road from Cappoquin to Mount Melleray and beyond.

Cllr. Nora Flynn pointed out the absence of white lines and the unprotected sharp inclines along some stretches of the road. She added that for the past two years, the Council had placed barrels around a gaping hole in the road at Monalaur and asked if the County Engineer would rectify the situation.

Cllr. Flynn also suggested that the bridge at Monalaur be examined to ascertain if structural repairs need to be carried out on it.



Still Time For Planting **Tulips**



VARIED BEAUTY - Spring Green is a pure white variety with green flanks.

TULIPS come in all shapes and sizes and bring a bold splash of colour to your flower garden in spring. They can be grown with daffodils to extend the early flowering season in a mixed border. Although the time to plant daffodils is now past, if you hurry there is still time to plant tulips in time for spring flowering.

Tulips are excellent for beds and borders and can be planted in clusters according to colour or variety to give a bold display - or scattered randomly across a bor-

Location is important and, as heights can vary from a few inches to more than two feet, it is worth checking the size the tulip will grow to before planting the bulbs.

Tulip Types

Tulips are classified in 15 divisions but are more conveniently grouped by their flowering season and garden

They come in early, mid-season, late and dwarf varieties and most tulips survive well in fertile, well-drained and humus-rich soils.

Some robust cultivars persist from year to year although many are best regarded as annual bedding

Colours and Cultivation

Ideally, tulip plants should be lifted after flowering then replanted until they have died down.

The bulbs rarely flower well in the second year, but if they are replanted in autumn, they may reach flowering size again within two years.

Dwarf tulips generally prefer open, gritty soils and full

Tulips include an impressive array of flower forms, from the simple upright goblets of single flowered tulips to the frilled and twisted petals of parrot tulips and the open double blooms of peony-flowered forms.

They are available in most colours, except blue, from the purest white to the deepest purple - with many glorious shades of yellow, red and crimson in between. Many of the dwarf tulips also have attractively marked leaves, making a welcome addition to a spring garden even before they flower.

comprise of seven general the Ringnasilloge site. classrooms, 10 varied specialist rooms, ancillary facilities including fenced basketball courts, car parking facilities and a playing pitch. The £1m project is being funded by the Department of Education who have expressed the wish that the VEC locate the col-

lege at Ringnasillogue. Members of the Co. Water-ford VEC, however argue that the site was first acquired from the local Council in the early 1980's with planning permission for a similar college development granted in 1986. At that time there were no objections to the development and many VEC members have voiced their amazement that eleven years later, over 200 objections to a similar college project on the same site have been lodged with the local authority. The possibility of locating the proposed techni-cal college to the Presentation site at the Youghal Road was not ruled out by VEC members who intend to adopt a twin track approach to the college application.

County Manager, Donal Connolly, who previously met with objectors in a bid to resolve the impasse, is expected to decide on whether to grant full planning permission for the single storey college within the next few weeks. There are strong indications that he will look favourably on the application, having himself recommended that members rezone

'We see Ringnasillogue as the least suitable place for a college", said Mr. Crotty, who pointed out that as the largest housing estate in Dungarvan, Childers is already surrounded by three

Supporting the deputations views, newly co-opted Democratic Left member Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair was the sole voice of opposition to the Ringnasillogue site. Cllr. O Ceilleachair felt that the proposed college at the rear of Childers would compound the bad planning of the estate and the town would lose a vital green area.

His views however were not shared by his fellow Council members who each gave his/her support for the site.

Absent from proceedings was Cllr. Austin Deasy. Proposing that the UDC re-zone the Ringnasilloge site thereby allowing the Council to grant planning permission for the college was Cllr. Michael O' Riordan who was immediately seconded by Cllr. Nuala Ryan.

A legal query previously raised about the legality of six members of the VEC, who are also members of the Council, voting on the planning application was resolved by Reid Associates who advised that the situation did not debar members from voting on the issue.

UDC Chairman Austin Flynn is a teacher at the existing VEC school in Dungarvan and a member of the committee, Cllr. Billy Kyne is Chairman of the VEC while councillors Lar Hart, Nuala Ryan, Paddy Power and Michael O' Riordan are all members of the VEC.

Computer **Package** Information **Evening**

DAIRY

The members of the Rathgormack/Carrick On Suir Dairy Discussion Group had their November Meeting on a members farm in Rathgormack where they saw Grassland Management at its best. Milking cows are currently grazing a cover of 2,400 kgs. per hectare of grass and dry cows are cleaning up behind them. The animals are being block grazed with a back fence behind them. There is sufficient grass to keep cows out until December, weather permitting.

This is a spring calving herd yielding an average of 1,100 gallons per cow. They are all in excellent condition and have been fed only 160 kgs. of concentrates this year. They have not received any concentrate feeding since early May.

It is planned to have the cows out again in early February, the paddocks required were cleaned off and closed off in early October. These paddocks how have a cover of 800 kgs per hectare.

All of the group members were very impressed by what they saw and motivated to apply some of the lessons learned on their own farms.

TEAGASC/AWG/IFI/ QUALITY **SILAGE COMPETITION**

This very popular competition is being run again this year. There are categories for Dairy Farms, Beef Farms and Maize Silage. A new dimension of the competition is that the dairy farm category is now split into farms with quota under 40,000 gallons and farms with quota over 40,000 gallons.

All farmers in Co. Waterford who have their silage samples analysed by Teagasc or A.W.G. will be eligible. Samples sent for analysis up to Mid-December are eligible and judging will take place in January.

BEEF **WINTER FEEDING**

At current store prices, the beef price next Spring would need to be 3-4p/lb higher than last spring, i.e. 87 to 90p/lb, in order to leave even a modest margin of £50 per head on overwintering. Animals that are eligible for the 22 month premium appear to offer the best prospects.

High quality silage is necessary to obtain a margin over feed costs in winter finishing. Get your silage assessed and relate meal feeding levels to silage quality.

With good silage feed about 4.5 kg meal per day to continental steers and about 4.0 kg/day to noncontinentals. Each 3 unit drop in DMD requires 1 kg more meal to compensate.

In well managed suckling to beef units, some cattle that are close to being finished may have to be held on to claim the 22 month premium and complete the retention period. These cattle should be penned separately and fed a lower level of meal, e.g. 2 kg/day, to avoid having them overfat at slaughter.

Sell cattle as they become finished, once premium conditions are met.

BEEF RATIONS

Look for an energy level close to barley (1 barley unit) of ME of 1.25 (11.0 as fed). A crude protein of 12 % is adequate in beef finishing rations when fed with good silage.

Ask your supplier for a breakdown of the ingredients. Mixtures of straights (e.g. barley, wheat, pulps and cereal by products) can be brought for £115 to £120 per tonne. Addition of minerals and feed additive would add about £5 per tonne to the cost. Compound rations made up of similar ingredients cost about £140 per tonne but include minerals, feed additive, would have about 3% less

IFA Supports McCreevy Action On Rural Investment

Waterford IFA Farm Business Committee Chairman, Gerry Murphy, has welcomed Finance Minister Charlie McCreevy's commitment to introduce an initiative to boost investment in rural areas.

He said: "IFA has urged Minister McCreevy to act on IFA's proposals for a new scheme of investment reliefs targeted at attracting investment funds into rural areas. The introduction of such a scheme would encourage investment in rural areas and safeguard traditional Irish rural heritage. while providing alternative income sources for farmers and their families.

Mr. Murphy said: "For too long rural areas have drawn the short straw when it comes to attracting investment funds, principally because funds have been channelled towards designated areas in our towns and cities. The Minister has an important opportunity to redress this imbalance with a new scheme of investment reliefs focussed on rural areas which would help provide incomes for rural dwellers and safeguard much of our architectural

rural heritage.
"A key element of such a scheme should be a special capital allowance on the costs of refurbishment and renovation of derelict structures and buildings," he added.

Mr. Coughlan said farmers are still awaiting payment of

treme financial hardship as a result of non payment and Minister Walsh must now intervene with his Department to alleviate the problems that his is now creating on thousands of farm families throughout the country."

The Waterford IFA Chairman said it is an unacceptable excuse that delays are due to problems with Area

in the present Government if it does not fully restore these two schemes in the forthcoming budget on December 3.

'Restoration of these schemes are vital if Irish farmers are to stay abreast of modern farming standards."

'Mr. Allen pointed out that thousands of farmers are unable to avail of the REPS because of the shelving of the Control of Farmyard Pollution Scheme. They needed the grant from this scheme to help them install the anti-pollution facilities which are necessary in order to qualify for REPS.

ICMSA SEEKS PLAN TO STEM EXODUS OF DAIRY **FARMERS**

The Government was urged by the President of the ICMSA, Mr. Frank Allen, to devise a plan of action to stem the exodus of farmers from milk production.

He said that the Government should introduce incentives in the December budget aimed at maintaining a vibrant producer base. He called on Finance Minister, Mr. Charlie McCreevy, to introduce income tax relief for certain categories of farmers buying milk quota.

He pointed out that spending by farmers on buying quota from the Department of Agriculture's Restructuring Scheme amounted to a total of £136 million since 1990.

He said the average expenditure by individual farmers under the Restructuring Scheme is £4,000 per year and must come from after tax income. This can pose an enormous financial burden on these families who more often than not have existing financial commitments due to purchase of quota under previous schemes.

He pointed out that purchase of milk quota is currently not allowable as an expense for income tax purpose. The magnitude of investment by farmers in the rural economy through purchasing milk quota under the Restructuring Scheme should not go unrewarded by the Government. Income tax relief on such purchases should be introduced in the December budget.

ICMSA PRESENTS CHEQUE TO SUPPORT COURT CASE ON LIVE EXPORT ISSUE

Speaking at the presentation of a cheque to the EU Live Exporters Association in support of their Supreme Court case against Pandoro, ICMSA President, Mr. Frank Allen, called for the establishment of a guaranteed "roadway" to Europe for all cattle exports.

Mr. Allen continued: "We are supposed to have a single European market but we have yet to establish our right to have a cast-iron guarantee that we will be guaranteed the right into the future to continue to maintain live exports at costs of transport that are competitive.

"Thankfully live exports have started up again, but we have yet to establish the farmers right to have his cattle transported to mainland Europe. We are supposed to have a single market but a single market does not exist unless our right to have our animals transported to Europe is enshrined in law.

ICMSA CRITICISE DELAY IN HEADAGE PAY-

ICMSA President, Mr. Frank Allen said his Association has been inundated with complaints from farmers over the fact that they have not yet received their annual headage payments.

Mr. Allen pointed out that these payments were due to farmers in October. He said the Government had breached the terms of the Charter of Rights for Farmers which states that payments must be made when

This situation is totally intolerable. Just like every other sector farmers need to be paid on time to meet their financial commitments," said the ICMSA President.

Waterford IFA Chairman, James Coughlan has said that the extreme action by Irish Nationwide Building Society in evicting a Co. Waterford farm family was unwarranted and unaccept-

The Waterford IFA Chairman said: "It is totally unacceptable that a widow and her family are put on the

In a letter to the Managing Director of the Irish Nationwide Building Society, Mr. Michael Fingleton, IFA, requested that the Irish Nationwide vacate the property immediately to allow discussion take place to resolve the issue.



The survey highlighted the fact that cigarette butts and chewing gum could cause Co. Waterford to lose its £1m advance

With this in mind a recent application for grant aid was made to the Department of the Environment and Dungarvan U.D.C. has been no-tified that a payment of £5,000 has been sanctioned. The measures proposed in the application included the services of Gumbusters International among other wide ranging initiatives.

The pavements in the town centre are now looking betfactory, promised by IBAL, ter than they have done for if the county could attain many a day and Dungarvan U.D.C. is asking the public to co-operate in keeping them that way. By taking your daughters diet in hand and trying to ensure that she eats better, you will notice that her sleep at night will be improved and she w drink a lot less milk. She wakes at night because she is hungry and she is filling

herself up with milk. As milk does not contain iron she would be at risk of developing iron deficiency anaemia. You can increase her iron intake by giving her more red meats, maybe in the form of burgers or stews. Try to get her to eat more foods containing vitamin C, for example, oranges, orange juice, kiwis, tomatoes and green vegetables, as the vitamin C increases the amount of iron absorbed by the body.

If you are still having a lot of trouble with her eating, take her to your doctor as she needs to be checked over to make sure that she is not ill in any way. Your doctor may be able to refer you to a dieti-cian who will give you further advice and guidance.

Cabbage Soup with Crispy Bacon

1 pint chicken stock

11/2 lb. cabbage thickly sliced

11/2 oz. butter

1 tblsp. sunflower oil

2 onions chopped

1 large potao diced Salt and pepper

1/2 pint milk

Garnish 6 slices of day slightly stale bread

1 oz. butter

6 thickly sliced rashers chopped and fried

Serves 6.

Put the stock into a large saucepan, add the cabbage, bring to the boil and simmer for 6 minutes. Drain, reserving the stock.

In a clean pan, heat the butter and oil and fry the onion for 10 minutes. Add the diced potato and cook for a further 3 minutes. Pour on the hot cabbage stock and simmer for 25 minutes.

Add the cooked cabbage and 1 pint water. Bring back to the boil and simmer for 10 minutes. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Leave to cool for 5 minutes, then lift out about 12 oz. of the cooked cabbage. Process or chop this cabbage and keep warm. Pour the rest of the soup into a liquidizer or food processor and blend with the milk. Reheat and adjust the seasoning to taste.







The Munster Council of B.L.E have recently purchased the most modern technology in starting and timing equipment for the tracks in Munster at a cost of over £50,000. It consists of two computers, a printer, timing box to cater for two colour cameras - one at each side of the track, two trackside clocks, electronic wind gauge with display clock and false start detector which will give the athletes their reaction times.

Indeed, the Munster Council has come a long way since 1989 when it was necessary to find a complete group of officials to administer the sport in the province. At that time the council was about £2,000 in the red and it was very difficult to operate. No attempt was made to cut out any competition but each and every event was reorganized.



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
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
