

# **Planned Dungarvan College May Move To Youghal Road Site**

Although planning permission was granted within the past fortnight by Waterford County Manager, Donal Connolly for a £1.5m Technical College for the Co. Waterford V.E.C. on the seafront site at Ringnasillogue, Dungarvan, it now appears that the college will be built on an alternative site in the town.

Chief Executive Officer of the V.E.C., Kieran Heffernan told last Monday's meeting that following an in-spection of the two sites last week, a Senior Department of Education official will be recommending the alternative site at the Presentation on Youghal Road.

If, as is likely, the V.E.C. moves to the Youghal Road site, it will be hailed as a victory by the residents of Childers Estate who have vigorously opposed the build-ing of the college on the nearby green field site at Ringnasillogue.

The residents of the urban council estate mounted a determined campaign against siting the college alongside their housing development. One of their main concerns was the increased traffic the new college would in-evitably generate and the anti-social behaviour which they feared would be an inevitable consequence of having the college on their doorstep.

Mr. Heffernan said the planning permission granted for the site at Ringnasillogue contained a total of 22 conditions. One was that a perimeter fence would have to be built all around the college and that the car parking facilities would have to be improved to accommodate 35 cars. Both conditions, he said, would have a cost factor.

The Senior Department official who inspected the U.D.C. owned site at Youghal Road would be recommending it to the Department. Mr. Heffernan said he had discussions at the weekend with the County Manager and he would be very hopeful about the availability of that site in the event of the Department finally opting to locate the college there.

# Know Your Rights

I am on the Third Level Allowance from Social Welfare in my 2nd year in college. My girlfriend is working and we are considering moving into a flat together. Will this affect my allowance?

No, you met the conditions for the Third Level Allowance when you commenced the particular course of study. Your position will not be assessed until you finish your course and return to sign at the exchange. If you girlfriend was in receipt of a Social Welfare means tested payment then that would be adjusted (probably downwards because the department will not regard your claims individually if you are cohabiting but will treat one of you as the "spouse" of the other for means test purposes) to take account of your living together.



# Why Jurassic Park Could Not

Scientists used to believe it was possible to create new dinosaurs by using tiny molecules found in insects — which bit them, millions of years ago.

Researchers in the Natural History Museum in London tested the method used in Jurassic Park — where blood from a mosquito was used to re-create dinosaurs. The mosquito in the film

had been preserved because it was trapped in amber, a sticky substance released by pine trees, which turns hard over many years.

To test the Jurassic Park method scientists took bees

encased in amber that was over 30 million years old.

But they found that no trace of the bee DNA remained

so it would be impossible to re-create a dinosaur.


Liquids and gases can escape from amber, so the DNA does not stay intact.

DNA is a "genetic fingerprint" something that everybody has, but everybody is different.

Although a DNA molecule is so small it cannot be seen by the naked eye, it contains all the "instructions" needed to shape a living being.

The fact DNA does not survive has disappointed scientists — because they thought that looking at ancient DNA could show how animals have developed over millions of years to what they are now.



# Gardai And Chamber **Urge Caution Over**

Chamber of Commerce have urge retailers to exercise extreme vigilance over the Christmas Season.

At a recent seminar Sgt. Tim Cronin the County Crime Prevention Officer gave a most interesting and informative talk on the various aspects of retail-related security issues which affect businesses throughout the year but most especially in the busy periods e.g. Christmas. Listed below is a brief synopsis of some of the main items of discussion.

CASH MOVEMENTS

Minimum amount to be

The Gardai and Dungarvan from the tills and transferred curity. All electronic security into some form of safe at regular intervals during the day. The most effective form of safe is one fitted with a time lock and which is fitted with a chute feed. Transporting cash to and from financial institutions creates an obvious risk. To minimise the risk involved a minimum of two people should escort the cash each carrying separate lodgements. The lodgements should never be openly visible and on arrival at the night safe the money should be deposited as quickly and efficiently as possible.
PREMISES

When items such as alcohol and cigarettes are been held on the premises, they should be stored in a purpose built secure room fitted

systems fitted to premises should meet with the IS 1 19 standards and be fitted with a radio back up to avoid dis-ablement of the alarms through the cutting of telephone cables. A panic button should be located out of sight but an easily accessible point. If fitting a close circuit television unit the equipment used i.e. the camera, lens, etc. should be suitable and the camera should be strategically located within the store to cover the area in question. Proper lighting should be installed in these areas so as to ensure a good quality play back. The tapes should be 24 hour time lapse and each tape should be maintained for one calendar month. To ensure good quality recordings tapes should kept in tills should be taken with adequate electronic se- not be used more than 12

times. The keys to business premises which all access to secure areas should be divided between a minimum of two individuals.

# IN STORE AWARENESS

Traders should be constantly alert to the threat of stolen/forged cheques and counterfeit money. Should they be in any way suspicious they should confiscate the item and immediately alert the Gardai. Shop lifting cam prove a major headache in the busy periods and extra vigilance is required, once again should you have any suspicions you should immediately contact the Gardai and the

We were very fortunate in the Brickey Club that he threw his lot in with us. He got involved initially with the underage section and at a time when it was very difficult to get adults to look after the juveniles, he did trojan work himself and he persuaded many other newcomers to be-come involved in the club. I remember one occasion when he brought all fifteen players for an under-12 match in Cappoquin in the back of his own van. That was the kind of man he was; he didn't believe in talking about it, he just went out and did it.

Ambrose, subsequently, became overall chairman of the club and he played a major role in the purchase of Bushy Park, the development of the field and the construction of the Club Pavilion. He was one of a three-man sub-com-


mittee (with Pat Barry and Joe Keane) who in 1984 purchased the present Bushy Park for the club. In fact it was Ambrose who identified the present field as the ideal new home for Rodaithe Na Brice.

He was a far-seeing man and he realised that without a pitch of our own, the continued existence of the club out into the future was not guaranteed. For as long as boys and girls use the present fine complex at Bushy

Park, Ambrose's memory will remain alive.

# *DISABILITY DIARY*

In roughly the last 200 years we have seen the abolition of slavery, sending children down coal-mines at the age of 5 years, the disappearance of the Berlin Wall, the end of Communism and Apartheid. This leaves people with disabilities living in the Celtic Tiger still struggling for Equality and Civil Rights in 1997.

- -My daughter and her school have been disgracefully let down by the State whose officials engage in a shameful game of buck-passing which ensures no State body ever accepts responsibility for the child, her well-being and her education.
- -I live alone. I never go out and so see no one. I am 52 years of age and live like a hermit. I get £60 a
- -All my school go to the cinema once a month. I'd love to go there but they told me that the place in which the films are shown is upstairs. Please try and stop things from being held upstairs or downstairs.
- -When Peter was a baby and up until five years of age we were advised to put him in residential care, predicting that "he would ruin our life". This was a cause of distress when we needed support.
- -Parents do not expect the State or society to take over their responsibilities. They are prepared to make whatever sacrifices are necessary. "But with the best will in the world they cannot do it from beyond the grave."

These are just a few of the submissions from the ordinary disabled people, and parents of disabled people in our county, to the Commission on the Status of People with Disabilities. The Irish Council of People with Disabilities was established in March 1997 by the Government. This Council is recognised by Government as the umbrella organisation of people with disabilities in Ireland i.e. physical, sensory, learning, mental/emotional health. The Council aim is rights not charity. Make sure you as an individual or your organisation are affiliated to the Council.

Council, Council officials indicated that the area in question was not included in the current programme of £385,000 of expenditure on public lighting. The County Manager indicated that the area could be included in the next programme, depending on how quickly the current programme is carried out.

Cllr. O Ceilleachair contends that there is a "clear

and convincing" case to provide extra lighting in this part of Ring. "When one part of Ring. "When one considers the pedestrian traffic using this route. The Community Hall, Colaiste na Rinne and the Primary School, the conclusion is that every illumination and protection should be afforded. I am disappointed that the 1997 programme is running ahead without this area's inclusion. All methods of raising the money to get the job done must be looked at, including help from Udaras Na Gaeltachta. In the meantime will continue to highlight the need for action and will not be satisfied until there is a guide and comprehensive addressing of this issue.'

# Council Examines **Housing Sites In** Leamybrien

# LOCAL SOLDIER HURT IN MORTAR BLAST

SHOCK NEWS FOR

MANY WORKERS FROM

The shock news by American computer disk-drive

makers Seagate Technology of Clonmel has cost Clonmel 1,400 jobs, many from Ballymacarbry, Touraneena and many parts of Waterford. The Company announced the immediate closure of its two year old Clonmel plant, that means 1,100 permanent and 300 temporary contract jobs will be lost. This news comes as a double blow to

Clonmel which still has memories of Digital's 1991 clo-

sure. Many workers from Ballymacarbry were spell-

bound with the news. Seagate are non-union and there

are no worker representatives. Many suspected that

something was wrong when the November profit sharing bonus had not come through.

A County Waterford Army Corporal was at home on Wednesday, December 10 with his family after being released from the Hospital Collins Barracks, Cork, he was fortunate to have escaped serious injury when a mortar exploded during training at Kilworth Mortar Range on Tuesday, December 9. The mortar exploded during an infantry light support weapons course being run by the 12th Battalion Kickham Barracks, Clonmel.

Up to fifty personnel from Clonmel were in Kilworth for the course when the explosion occurred. Corporal Seamus Dolan of Ballydonagh, Kilmanahan and Corporal Tom McGrath, St. Molleran's, Carrick-on-Suir, both with over twenty years service in the army were lucky to escape without serious injury. They were discharged from hospital after treatment for shock and minor injuries.

19 year old Pte. Laura Guerin, a young lady from Fermoy who joined the army last March was seriously injured in the explosion. Her arm was shattered when the 60mm shell exploded, she was rushed to Cork University Hospital where she underwent surgery to save the hand. The 60mm mortar shell was being loaded into the breech of the launcher when it exploded. An emergency was declared immediately at Lynch Barracks, Kilworth.

This blast was the worst since 1977 when five soldiers were killed during an army exercise involving an 81mm. Explosive experts were called to Kilworth on Tuesday night to investigate the circumstances of the explosion.

# Warning On Christmas Tree Lights

sumer Affairs, William Fagan, urges consumers to be especially careful and safety conscious when purchasing and using electrical appliances, particularly over the Christmas period. Christmas tree lights designed for indoor use should under no circumstances be used out of doors. Instructions for use should be carefully noted and should be in English. Boxes must bear the CE mark and should be marked EN 60598-2-20.

The Director wishes to bring to the notice of traders in consumer electrical goods, their responsibility to ensure that electrical goods placed on the market do not constitute a hazard to persons, domestic animals or property.

The attention of traders is particularly drawn to Christmas tree lights sets (indoor and outdoor) and to their responsibility to ensure that such sets meet the requirements of the Low Voltage Electrical Equipment Regulations. It should be noted that Irish Standard, I.S. EN 60598-2-20 would be deemed to meet the requirements of the regulations.

# Council Examines Housing Sites In Leamybrier

The matter was raised at last week's Council meeting by Cllr. Oliver Coffey who informed officials of a possible site in the village owned by a local landowner.

The site in question could accommodate up to 25 houses which would be constructed over a number of years. Cllr. Coffey pointed out that the last local authority house to be allocated in Learnybrien was in 1981.

Welcoming the news that the Council are examining the situation, Cllr. Coffey said many people from the area are forced to move to Kilmacthomas and Leamybrien. New local authority houses in the village however would encourage people to stay in their own area.

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# TRIBUNAL OF INQUIRY

# INTO CERTAIN PLANNING MATTERS.

WHEREAS a resolution in the following terms was passed by Dáil Éireann on the 7th day of October, 1997.

"That Dáil Éireann Resolves

- A. That it is expedient that a Tribunal be established under the Tribunals of Inquiry (Evidence) Act, 1921, as adapted by or under subsequent enactments and the Tribunals of Inquiry (Evidence) (Amendment) Act, 1979, to inquire urgently into and report to the Clerk of the Dáil and make such findings and recommendations as it sees fit, in relation to the following definite matters of urgent public importance:
  - The identification of the lands stated to be 726 acres in extent, referred to in the letter dated 8th June, 1989 from Mr. Michael Bailey to Mr. James Gogarty (reproduced in the schedule herewith) and the establishment of the beneficial ownership of the lands at that date and changes in the beneficial ownership of the lands since the 8th June, 1989 prior to their development;
  - 2. The planning history of the lands including:-
    - (a) their planning status in the Development Plan of the Dublin local authorities current at the 8th June, 1989;
    - (b) the position with regard to the servicing of the lands for development as at the 8th June, 1989;
    - (c) changes made or proposed to be made to the 8th June, 1989 planning status of the lands by way of:-
      - (i) proposals put forward by Dublin local authority officials pursuant to the review of Development Plans or otherwise;
      - (ii) motions by elected members of the Dublin local authorities proposing re-zoning;
      - (iii) applications for planning permission (including any involving a material contravention of the Development Plan);
  - 3. Whether the lands referred to in the letter dated 8th June, 1989 were the subject of the following:-
    - (a) Re-zoning resolutions;
    - (b) Resolutions for material contravention of the relevant Development Plans;
    - (c) Applications for special tax designations status pursuant to the Finance Acts;
    - (d) Applications for planning permission;
    - (e) Changes made or requested to be made with regard to the servicing of the lands for development;
    - (f) Applications for the granting of building bye-law approval in respect of buildings constructed on the lands;
- (g) Applications for fire safety certificates; on or after the 20th day of June 1985.

### And

- (i) to ascertain the identity of any persons or companies (and if companies, the identity of the beneficial owners of such companies) who had a material interest in the said lands or who had a material involvement in the matters aforesaid;
- (ii) to ascertain the identity of any members of the Oireachtas, past or present, and/or members of the relevant local authorities who were involved directly or indirectly in any of the foregoing matters whether by the making of representations to a planning authority or to any person in the authority in a position to make relevant decisions or by the proposing of or by voting in favour or against or by abstaining from any such resolutions or by absenting themselves when such votes were taken or by attempting to influence in any manner whatsoever the outcome of any such applications, or who received payments from any of the persons or companies referred to at (i) above;
- (iii) to ascertain the identity of all public officials who considered, made recommendations or decisions on any such matters and to report on such considerations, recommendations and/or decisions;

- (iv) to ascertain and report on the outcome of all such applications, resolutions and votes in relation to such applications in the relevant local authority;
- 4. (a) The identity of all recipients of payments made to political parties or members of either House of the Oireachtas, past or present, or members or officials of a Dublin local authority or other public official by Mr. Gogarty or Mr. Bailey or a connected person or company within the meaning of the Ethics in Public Office Act, 1995, from 20th June 1985 to date, and the circumstances, considerations and motives relative to any such payment;
  - (b) whether any of the persons referred to at subparagraphs 3(ii) and 3(iii) above were influenced directly or indirectly by the offer or receipt of any such payments or benefits;
- 5. In the event that the Tribunal in the course of its inquiries is made aware of any acts associated with the planning process committed on or after the 20th June 1985 which may in its opinion amount to corruption, or which involve attempts to influence by threats or deception or inducement or otherwise to compromise the disinterested performance of public duties, it shall report on such acts and should in particular make recommendations as to the effectiveness and improvement of existing legislation governing corruption in the light of its inquiries.
- 6. And that the Tribunal be requested to make recommendations in relation to such amendments to Planning, Local Government, Ethics in Public Office and any other relevant legislation as the Tribunal considers appropriate having regard to its findings. "payment" includes money and any benefit in kind and the payment to any person includes a payment to a connected person within the meaning of the Ethics in Public Office Act, 1995.
- B. And that the Tribunal be requested to conduct its enquires in the following manner, to the extent that it may do so consistent with the provisions of the Tribunals of Inquiry (Evidence) Acts, 1921 and 1979:-
  - (i) To carry out such preliminary investigations in private as it thinks fit using all the powers conferred on it under the Acts, in order to determine whether sufficient evidence exists in relation to any of the matters referred to above to warrant proceeding to a full public inquiry in relation to such matters,
  - (ii) To enquire fully into all matters referred to above in relation to which such evidence may be found to exist, dealing in the first instance with the acknowledged monetary donation debated in Dáil Éireann on the 10th of September 1997 Dáil Debates Columns 616-638 and to report to the Clerk of the Dáil thereupon,
  - (iii) To seek discovery of all relevant documents, files and papers in the possession, power or procurement of said Mr. Michael Bailey, Mr. James Gogarty and Donnelly, Neary, and Donnelly Solicitors,
  - (iv) In relation to any matters where the Tribunal finds that there is insufficient evidence to warrant proceeding to a full public inquiry, to report that fact to the Clerk of the Dáil and to report in such a manner as the Tribunal thinks appropriate on the steps taken by the Tribunal to determine what evidence, if any, existed and the Clerk of the Dáil shall thereupon communicate the Tribunal's report in full to the Dáil,
  - (v) To report on an interim basis not later than one month from the date of establishment of the Tribunal or the tenth day of any oral hearing, whichever shall first occur, to the Clerk of the Dáil on the following matters:

the numbers of parties then represented before the Tribunal;

the progress which has been made in the hearing and the work of the Tribunal;

the likely duration (so far as that may be capable of being estimated at that time) of the Tribunal proceedings;

- any other matters which the Tribunal believes should be drawn to the attention of the Clerk of the Dáil at that stage (including any matter relating to the terms of reference);
- C. And that the person or persons selected to conduct the Inquiry should be informed that it is the desire of the House that -
  - (a) the Inquiry be completed in as economical a manner as possible and at the earliest date consistent with a fair examination of the matters referred to it, and, in respect to the matters referred to in paragraphs 1 to 4 above, if possible, not later than the 31st December 1997, and
  - (b) all costs incurred by reason of the failure of individuals to co-operate fully and expeditiously with the Inquiry should, so far as is consistent with the interests of justice, be borne by those individuals.
- D. And that the Clerk of the Dáil shall on receipt of any Report from the Tribunal arrange to have it laid before both Houses of the Oireachtas immediately on its receipt."

I refer to our many discussions regarding your following six parcels of land:-

- Lot 2: 12 acres (approx) at Jamestown Road, Finglas.
- Lot 3: 100 acres (approx) at Poppintree, Ballymun.
- Lot 4: 255 acres (approx) at Donabate (Turvey House and Beaverton House).

I submit the following proposals for your consideration:-

Lot 6 Option to be granted for nominal consideration (£100.00) for a period of 2 years at a purchase price of £30,000.00 per acre.

### PROPOSAL No. 2 - Participation Proposal

As an alternative to the outright purchase proposal above I am prepared to deal with Lots 1 - 5 (inclusive) above on the basis that I would be given a 50% share in the ownership of the said lands in exchange for procuring Planning Permission and Building Bye-Law Approval. The time span which I would require to be allowed to obtain the Permissions and Approval and my anticipated financial expenditure (apart from my time input) in respect of the different lots would be as follows:-

### Lots 1, 2 and 3

A period of 2 years within which to procure a buildable Planning Permission and Building Bye-Laws Approval for mixed development including housing, industrial and commercial.

My financial expenditure up to a figure of £150,000.00 (to include Architect's fees, Consulting Engineer's fees, Planning and Bye Law charges etc.).

# Lots 4 and 5

Time requirement - 3 years.

Financial Expenditure - up to £150,000.00

In considering the above proposals the following points of information should be borne in mind by all parties:-

- 1. From the point of view of obtaining Planning Permission the entire lands (lots 1 to 6 inclusive) have the following shortcoming:-
  - NO zoning for development purposes

  - NO proposal in current draft development plans (City and County) for the zoning of the lands or any part thereof for development purposes.
- 2. We face a very severe uphill battle to arrange for the availability of services and for the ultimate procurement of Planning Permission.
- 3. The steps to be taken on the way to procuring a buildable Planning Permission and Building Bye Laws Approval are notoriously difficult, time consuming and expensive. Material Contravention Orders must be obtained and this involves their procurement of a majority vote at 2 full Council Meetings at which 78 Council Members must be present and it also involves satisfactory compliance with extensive requirements and pre-conditions of the Planning Authority and the inevitable dealing with protracted Appeals to An Bord Pleanála.
- 4. It is essential that the Planning Application should be brought in the name of an active housebuilding company which enjoys good standing and good working relationship with the Planners and the Council Members and in this regard I confirm that in the event of our reaching agreement regarding the within proposals that all Planning Applications would be made by one of my Companies which meets the said requirements.
- 5. In the case of all of the lands the applications will be highly sensitive and controversial and we can realistically expect strenuous opposition from private, political and planning sectors. One of my active companies will have to take the limelight in such applications and withstand the objections and protests which will inevitably confront it. Apart from the anticipated financial expenditure as outlined above it should be borne in mind that I will personally have to give extensively of my time and efforts over the entire period of the applications including the necessary preliminary negotiations in regard to services and zoning. It must be borne in mind that I will have to abandon other projects which would be open to myself and my companies in order to give proper attention to this project. If I am successful in changing your lands from their present status of agricultural lands with very limited potential even for agricultural use into highly valuable building lands I would have to be rewarded with a minimum 50% stake in the ownership of the lands. Our advisors would have to work out the details as to how this can be effected in the most tax-efficient manner.

I look forward to hearing from you in relation to the above proposals. In the case of the first proposal which relates to the outright purchase of the lands (excluding Lot 6) I would not be adverse to a proposal which would involve the vendors retaining a participation stake of up to 20% in the purchasing company if you felt that an ongoing interest in the future development of the lands would be more acceptable to the present owners.

### DAIRYING

At the Teagasc "Future Of Dairying" Scheme, Dermot McCarthy, Chief Dairy Specialist stated that dairy farmers have little to fear from the Santer Proposals relative to other sectors of farming. Quotas will remain until the year 2006 and will be made more flexible. It is not clear how this will be achieved. The main debate will centre around the level of compensation required to offset the proposed 10% reduction in intervention price. Dermot also stated that the butter fat quota is virtually certain to be triggered this year and each farmer must assess his/her own situation and make adjustments where possible.

David Wallis, Teagasc Adviser highlighted the huge variation in the cost per gallon of milk production ranging from 35p to 70p. The important point of David's talk is that all dairy farmers must know their individual cost per gallon. This is essential in order to maintain incomes in an era of declining prices.

So make it a New Year's Resolution that you will make the effort to have your costs analysed in 1998. SHEEP

### Sheep Rations

The total quantity of concentrate needed by housed twin bearing ewes pre-lambing will vary with silage quality. At 70% DMD, 20 kgs. per ewe are required while at 60% DMD, 37 kgs. per ewe are required.

Sheep rations must supply energy in a concentrated form where total feed intake is limited and supply additional high quality protein.

Specifications For Sheep Rationing

- \* Energy (MJ/kg) minimum 10.25 MJ ME 'as fed' or 12 MJ ME in the dry matter.
- Crude Protein 16% minimum, 18% desirable may need 20% with low digestible hay.
- Oil 5% (could go to 7.5% if protected fat).
- \* Fibre 6 8.5%.
- \* Ash 7 8%.

# SILAGE PIT MANAGEMENT

Pit management greatly influences the 'freshness' of silage.

- Remember, air rots silage so you must manage the pit face to minimise air penetration.
- Use a shear grab or saw to cut down or remove silage from the face.
- \* Only disturb small areas of the pit at each feeding.
- \* Do not leave layers of tossed silage exposed to the
- \* Prevent water running down the face of the silage pit by rolling back the polythene.
- But weigh down this polythene tightly on top and at the sides.
- Too many farmers pull down the polythene over the face of the pit.
- This is wrong as it causes the glasshouse effect resulting in quicker rotting and fungal growth.
- Nothing could be worse for silage intake.



ries to support Irish sheep farmers and stop using cheaper and poorer quality lambs from Northern Ireland to bring down prices to flock owners.

**Gray Calls On Lamb Plants To** 

**Support Irish** 

Mr. Gray said he was aware that the major factories were actively sourcing lambs in the North and at the same time attempting to blame lower UK lamb prices to the price drops here. He said this short-term quick buck policy was seriously undermining farmers confidence in the meat plants. "Farmers are angry that the factories are engaging in this at a time when lamb prices have reduced from 1.30p/lb to 1.08/1.10p/lb."

Mr. Gray said that factory orice should be up to 10p/lb higher than current quotes based on French market returns. "Grade 1 lambs are making 20.5 to 21.5FF/kg equivalent to 1.13p/lb. Grade lamb is making 18.5 to 19 FF/kg equivalent to 102p/lb. With skins worth up to 20p/lb. the gross factory return is 128p to 130p/lb.

# Deepening **Income Crisis In** Farming —IFA

The 5% decline in national farm income in 1997 published by the CSO (Monday, December 8) does not tell the full story about the low income problem in a number of sectors of agriculture, or about the deepening income crisis as the year ends. Cattle prices have fallen further this year from their disastrous 1996 levels, when the UK BSE crisis was at its worst. And for many grain growers the combination of low prices and weather damage has left little or no income in 1997.

This was stated by Waterford IFA Chairman, James Coughlan, in a reaction to the estimate by the Central Statistics Office of 1997 Agricultural Output and Income, published recently.

Mr. Coughlan said: "The recently published Teagasc National Farm Survey showed that in 1996, 38% of farms had an income from farming of less than £5,000 and 63% had an income from farming of less than £10,000. With average farm income this year falling by a further 5%, it is clear that a low income crisis exists for very many farm families.

Average prices for farm products fell by 6% in 1997, due mainly to the over-valuation of the £IR against the main European currencies. It is essential that the Government takes whatever action necessary to ensure that the £IR is not linked-in to the euro next May at a rate higher than our present EMS central rate.

"The 5% decline in national farm income in 1997 is a stark contrast to the growing prosperity of other sectors of the economy. With average pay levels of employees set to increase by close to 4% this year, the income gap has widened dramatically. Already over the past five years the number of people working fulltime in agriculture has fallen by 20,000 or 4,000 per year. The recent Santer proposals on the next round of CAP reform have added to the uncertainty amongst farm families about their future.'

# CROSS-COMMUNITY **MEETINGS**

Since the shock announcement of Dungarvan co-ops closure, various meetings involving all sections of the community have taken place.

At a recent highly successful meeting convened by Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce held in the Granville Hotel, Waterford last Monday, with An Tanaiste Mary Harney and her Programme Manager, Katherine Bulbulia, the AWG/Waterford Foods situation was discussed at length. Other bodies represented at the meeting were Donal Connolly Waterford County Manager, the County Council, Dungarvan

Urban Council, ATGWU, AWEU and Brendan Kenneally, T.D.

Jim O'Dwyer chairman of the Chamber's industrial committee gave a detailed presentation on AWG's pro-posals in relation to staff redundancies and plant closures and the major implications such a move would have on the area. The imminent loss of 130 iobs would take £3 million p.a. out of the local economy and it is conservatively estimated that a minimum of a further 80 jobs would be lost in the supply/services sector with substantial further loss of local rev-

### LOSS OF £383,000 IN RATES

The AWG annual contribution to the local rates bill currently runs at £383,000: the loss of this revenue to the UDC would mean dramatic cutbacks in the levels of services currently being provided and/or a punitive increase to other rate payers. Considerable investment has been made by both SmithKline Beecham and Stafford Miller in their plants over the course of the past two years, but all of the benefits investment and are being effectively cancelled out by the AWG

The company has to-date been very reluctant to release specific details as to why (on economic grounds) the plant closures are necessary, other than to make mention of a £2.5 million contribution to an enterprise fund and a further contribution of £2.5 million development fund by way of soft loans. They have yet to come up with a practical solution as to how this fund is to be administered and what specific geographic areas are to benefit from it.

Among the proposals put forward by the Chamber to An Tanaiste was that a well resourced and totally independent Task Force be established to examine the overall situation and that special status be given to Dungarvan and Kilmeaden areas so as to maximise the potential of the area. The introduction of an Enterprise Park with special tax status would be a major boost for the area. The IDA should be approached with a view to finding a suitable tenant for the Advance Factory as its

number one priority.

Tanaiste was requested to ensure that this development go ahead with or without private funding. A local company (Casey Cablevision) has recently installed fibre optic cables throughout the town; this puts Dungarvan at the cutting edge of technology, but in order to maximise the benefits which might accrue, considerable further investment is required and once again the Tanaiste was requested to research this matter and to arrange financial assistance to ensure a speedy and successful completion of this project.

The planned development of a new Technical College for the town which has been left very much on the back burner by consecutive governments and the ongoing developments at Dungarvan harbour and King John's Castle were also highlighted at the meeting.

Finally, the Tanaiste was asked to intervene with the developers of what is known as the "Mulcahys Property" at Main Street, Dungarvan. This site has remained in a derelict condition for the past number of years and notwithstanding the best efforts of the Chamber and the UDC, no attempt would appear to have been made to rectify this situation.

### 'QUICK KILL' POLICY

Austin Flynn, UDC Chairman, then addressed the meeting. He said he failed to see how AWG Management could "get away" with the dissemination of so little information without being called "to book" by any authority (public or private). He emphasised the absolute need to complete the Sewage Treatment Plant as per the original plan, i.e. by the year 2000. He emphasised the catastrophic effect that a shortfall of £383,000 in rates would have on the town.

Cllr. Flynn then queried the wisdom and the viability of AWG rerouting innumerable trucks secondary roads through towns such as Carrick-on-Suir, and he wondered what secondary effects this would have on the infrastructure and the community life in general in these areas.

He stated that Dungarvan currently has 6/7 major projects "on the point of fruition" which if completed would add considerably

bution by AWG. The to the long term future of Tanaiste was requested to the area. He welcomed the Tanaiste's interest and he hoped that her personal in-tervention would have sufficient impact on AWG management to allow them to see the error of their Billy Kyne, County Coun-

cillor, deputising for Cllr. Lar Hart, chairman of Waterford County Council, reiterated the futility and economic madness that has been shown by AWG Management in closing the Dun-garvan and Kilmeaden plants. Financial analysis has shown that the operations at Dungarvan and Kilmeaden have proven themselves to be more efficient and profitable than their counterparts in the Avonmore Group. He suggested to the Tanaiste that she should seek a medium term deferment of the closures which would allow both plants to continue to operate at full capacity for the next 3/5 years, during which time an independent analysis should be carried out by Department, ICTU and industry representatives, to define whether the decisions as currently proposed by the company are based on sound economic policies. He considered the current proposals as "Quick Kill" policy which did not take into account the fact that the Dungarvan plant could at the moment process the full group milk production quota with relatively little investment by comparison with that require to bring the Ballyragget plant to a similar

Donal Connolly, County Manager, summed up the contributions of the previous speakers by saying that it had been well established that AWG not only had a duty of care to their employees but also to the entire Dungarvan community, and that pressure should be brought to bear on management to ensure that this social responsibility is fully

Tony Mansfield, Dungaran District Officer of the ATGWU, complimented the Tanaiste on her recent handling of the Seagate situation and he hoped that she would expend the same levels of energy and expediency when it came to handling Dungarvan's plight. He referred to a previous meeting he had had with the Tanaiste a fortnight ago where he had assured her that there was nobody within the company who was looking after the

interests of Waterford and as such, it would require external bodies to fill this role. He pointed out to the Tanaiste that AWG has given no firm commitment in relation to the security of the clerical and administrative jobs, and he felt that the company owed it to their employees to make public their plans regarding the future of these positions.

He went on to say that the Unions have, thus far, been extremely patient in their dealings with management but that this patience was being exploited to its absolute limit by the lack of information and co-operation available.

### TANAISTE **EXPRESSES** CONCERN

Ms. Harney replied that whilst she had previous discussions with Pat O'Neill, Chief Executive of AWG, the situation as presented to her was one of a "fait accompli" with the details being agreed by all parties involved. She had been most impressed with the unanimity of views expressed by the speakers who represented a broad and diverse section of the commu-

She agreed to meet with Mr. O'Neill in the coming week and to relay to him, the extreme levels of anxiety and discontent which she had witnessed during the meeting. She expressed deep dissatisfaction at the fact that little or no consultation would appear to have taken place prior to the decision making process and she expressed a strong desire that the Chamber have full representation on any proposed task force.

Having listened to the arguments she expressed concerns about the impact of the decisions on the Dungarvan and Kilmeaden areas and that she would take this matter up with Mr. O'Neill at their meeting.
In relation to the Sewage

Treatment Plant, the Tech-

nical College and the various other projects in the pipeline, she would speak to the respective Ministers in an effort to ensure that these projects would be undertaken without any further delay. She said that she would ask both the IDA and Forbairt to look upon Dungarvan as an area of "special need," to ensure that any job losses created through the AWG and Seagate closures would be compensated for through

the introduction of new in-

dustry and the expansion of existing ones. She further

promised to visit Dungarvan very early in the new year to discuss further the situation as of that point in time.
FIGHT NOT OVER

According to Billy Kyne, the fight to retain Dungarvan and Kilmeaden is still being made and there is yet 'a lot to be played for.' Speaking at last Monday's meting of the UDC, Cllr. Kyne stressed that there is no need for a quick cessation of what Dungarvan does best, i.e. milk process-

At what was the Council's last meeting of 1997, Cllr. Kyne said it was important that the message went out that the County Manager and all relevant agencies in the town are doing all in their power to retain these invaluable industries.

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy, Austin Deasy said that after talking to the Tanaiste, he got the distinct impression that she is dismayed at what has happened to allow an efficient plant such as Dungarvan to be closed down.

Deputy Deasy said he would be hopeful that the farming community will support the anti-closure lobby in the days and weeks to come.

Farmers in the Dungarvan milk supply area are to meet this week to consider the implications of the plant's closure in Dungarvan. In recent weeks farmers have become dissatified with the decision to make the Ballyragget plan the sole milk processing facility within the newly merged company. The meeting will be attended by officials of the Dungarvan IFA branch and local shareholder members of the board of AWG including company vice-chairman Tom Corcoran.

# **Traffic Chaos In Tallow Town**

town of Tallow, the boom in trading has brought with it such problems as a lack of parking space resulting in traffic chaos in many parts of the town. The construction of flower beds and additional trees in the town square by Waterford County Council earlier this year has, no doubt, added to the problem of inadequate parking facilities.

A recent move by the Garda Síochána, in conjunction with the Council, to erect 'no parking' bollards along West Street surprised and indeed angered many townspeople.

These bollards were erected on the first traditional shopping day of Christmas, De-cember 8 apparently to allow for the free flow of heavy traffic through the town.

The matter was publicly raised at the December meeting of the County Council by Cllr. Willie Mc-Donnell who was speaking on behalf of Tallow traders when he described it as the worst possible time to restrict parking during the bus-

Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson who bollards again.

While business has never stressed that it is hard been better in the Brideside enough to keep business going without the added restrictions on parking.

Outlining the situation, County Engineer, John O'Flynn said Cork County Council are currently carrying out major road works on the Fermoy/Tallow road, part of which has been closed to traffic.

In co-operation with their Cork counterparts, the County Council agreed to divert traffic through Tallow. Other contributing factors to the town's traffic congestion is the ongoing construction work on a housing development in Cockpit Lane, the delivery of material to the Co. Cork roadworks and the removal of earth from the factory site on the Youghal Road.

When pressed by Cllr. Mc-Donnell as to how long the 'no parking' bollards will be in place along West Street, Mr. O'Flynn revealed one week or two at the most.

# Drugs Raid On St. Joseph's Hospital

A Dungarvan man was taken into custody by Dungarvan Gardaí yesterday evening (Tuesday) for questioning in connection with last Monday morning's break-in at St. Joseph's Hospital in which a quantity of drugs were stolen.

The man was detained under the Criminal Justices Act (1984) which allows gardaí to hold suspects for up to six hours. Some of the drugs, all of

which were categorised as 'dangerous', have been recovered by local gardaí although they are still warning the general public who may come into possession of the drugs not to take any of them.

The break-in occurred in the early hours of last Monday when a window was broken in a back door of St. Joseph's Hospital. The thieves got away with varying quantities of different drugs, among them clazaril, which is potentially fatal.

Gardaí have made an appeal to anyone who might find discarded bottles of the drugs to make immediate contact with Dungarvan Garda Station on (058)

While keeping an open mind as to who may have been involved in the drugs raid, gardaí are convinced that someone with an intimate knowledge of the hospital is implicated.

## Health Tips from "Remedies

### AROMATHERAPY

A. is the use of organic essences of aromatic plants for heating and the maintenance of vitality.

The essences, or 'essential oils' as they are commonly known, are extracted from a wide variety of plants, and are very concentrated. For example it takes the petals from 30 special roses to produce one drop of rose oil and several kilos of lavender to produce a small bottle of essential lavender oil.

If infected with T.g. people may have a flu-like illness or a prolonged illness not unlike

glandular fever or, indeed many people may have no symptons whatever. Toxoplasmosis is not harmful to healthy adults or children. It is dangerous when the patients immune system is underdeveloped, as in the unborn child, or if the immune system is not working properly, as in people are infected with the A.I.D.S. virus or those who may be on medication to suppress the immune system.

If a pregnant woman becomes infected with Toxoplasmosis, there is a substantial risk that the baby will become infected. The severity of the effects on the baby depend on what stage of pregnancy the disease was caught. If the infection occurs early in the pregnancy then the baby may be miscarried if the infection is miscarried, if the infection is caught in the middle trimester (3 to 6 months) then the baby may develop any or all of the following;

Hydrocephalus (excess fluid in the brain)

2. Scarring of the brain tissue
3. Retinochoroditis (damage

to the back of the eye)

Due to these effects the baby may have epilepsy or be mentally retarded or may lose part, if not all, of his vision. Sometimes these problems, particularly the eye problems may not develop until later in childhood.

If you feel you may be at risk of catching Toxoplasmosis, observe the following precautions:

1. Cook meat thoroughly and make sure that there are no traces of blood or pinkness in the meat. 2. After preparing raw meat,

wash your hands, the cooking utensils and the work

3. Avoid unpasturised goats milk and milk products.

4. Wash fruit and vegetables

before eating.

5. If handling dirty cat litter,

gardening and wash hands

sand boxes covered to stop the cats using them as litter

If you plan to have a baby or if you think you may have been infected by Toxoplasmosis, go along to your doctor and he will be able to do a blood test to find out if you have already have had Toxoplasmosis and you are immune from further infection, or if you are infected and will need further tests and treatment with antibiotics which will reduce the risk of the infection being passed on to your baby before she is born.

2 oz. butter 8 oz. leeks - white parts only, chopped 2 cloves garlic chopped 13/4 pints chicken stock

15 green peppercorns

6 oz. cooked chicken breast diced

2 tblsp. chopped fresh

1 lb. canned sweetcorn





He was a deeply religious man who served his God with admirable fervour and his fellow man with a diligence way beyond the call of air nuair a tháinig Liam duty. The letters and cards from past pupils to the family were testimony to Micheál's kindness, courtesy and caring nature to the many youngsters who resided at the college over the years. Many people actually travelled to the funeral obsequies from Dublin and further afar to pay their own personal tributes to 'An Maistir.'

# William Harty Enters The Record Books

The fourth annual Brickey five miles road race created its own piece of Waterford athletics history last Sunday when fourteen years old William Harty from Ballinamult became the youngest ever winner of an adult road race in the county. The victory was as decisive as it was sensational with the Munster under 14 cross country champion beating seasoned campaigners Martin Drake (Hilltop Hotel) and Bernard Feery (St. Catherine's) by over two hundred yards. This achievement is a record that should stand not just for years but for generations.

In ideal running conditions an entry of seventy two run-ners came under the starting orders of Martin Curran and it wasn't long before Martin Drake hit the front. Martin went through the one mile mark in four minutes fifty seconds and entering the canal section he was a good fifty yards clear of the field. A lot of the action unfolded on the two mile canal stretch for when O'Meara's bridge was sighted it was William Harty who had opened a fifty yards lead. Any fears that he would weaken in the closing stages of the race were soon dispelled as the young Ballina-mult boy increased his lead by the minute to come home a most deserving winner in a time of 27 minutes and 22 seconds.

To cap a most successful day for him, he set a new juvenile course record by thir-ty two seconds when erasing his older brother, Philip Harty's mark of



# DEVELOPMENT

Both Declan O'Meara (Chairman) and Greg Fives (Treasurer) addressed delegates on matters relating to finance and the monthly

Declan O'Mara said the finance committee were looking at additional ways of raising money to help pay for the huge development programme which had resulted in both county grounds being brought into line with modern day needs. He said they were asking the County Board for permission to proceed with an examination of ideas which might include a weekly lotto.

Greg Fives gave the meeting an outline of the funding resulting from the Deise Draw and said that at the present it was not generating sufficient cash to service the financial needs of the committee.

He also spoke about the Ash Project which had been established by a former finance committee and said the committee were considering having people employed to caretake the plantation, which is becoming highly valuable. It appears that the 10,000 ash trees are maturing in accordance with expectations. He appealed for more support for the 500 Club and appealed to clubs to canvass more people for the monthly draw.

The Co. Chairman commended the Finance committee and said that very many clubs could do a lot more to promote the draw. Many of the smaller clubs were giving good example to some of the bigger units. He also said that the County Board would give their full support to any new ideas which are brought up by the Finance group.

### **SUPERVISOR**

A new football coach supervisor has been appointed in succession to Larry Tompkins who is no longer within the FAS Scheme in the county. She is Ann Hogan, Seana Phobal who has been involved in a voluntary capacity with the coaching for a while. The appointment was given County Board approval last

but just the same, it is still a major talking point in some quarters. The twenty million will be paid over to Croke Park in three instal-ments — £7 million next year, £7 million in the following year and £6 million in the third year. It is money to be paid out of the National Lottery as a grant towards the cost of the major redevelopment in Croke Park.

£40 million has already been spent on phase one and almost the same again will be paid out for phase 2, which is the development of the Canal End. Phase 3 will be the redevelopment of the Hogan Stand and this will be undertaken in two or three years time when the Canal End development is completed.

The overall cost of this development, together with the building of the GAA Museum, will be approximately £138,000,000. Understandably, it will provide great employment and millions will be spent on the purchase of materials and it will include the payment of about £15 million in VAT to the Government.

In an official announcement on the subject, it was made clear that there were absolutely no conditions attached to the grant, no requests made and no promises given. Also it was officially announced that the grant will not in any way impact on grant applications from the National Lottery by clubs or by claims from any of the other sporting bodies.

The announcement by Charlie McCreevy in his budget speech two weeks ago was welcomed by GAA people all over the country and needless to mention, the good man was berated by all the anti-GAA factions here, there and everywhere. At the same time it must not be forgotten that many of the rival associations agreed that the GAA, having undertaken such a major development, were deserving of this massive allocation of funds. There were of course, the many journalists/writers who criticised the grant beyond reason and it was easy to read into some of these articles the begrudgery, greed and narrowmindedness of the authors.

In the midst of all this the man himself, Charlie, as a panel member on the RTE programme "Questions and Answers" on Monday, De-

cember 8, made a magnificent defence of his decision and was at his best in putting a number of other panel members in their boxes and exposed their begrudgery and anit-GAA

What I thought odd even very funny — through-out all the ridicule, was the number of people who seemed to blame the GAA for taking the money, as much as the Minister for

giving it.

But of all the criticism and ridicule that I read and heard about the whole business, none could compare with the load of ill-informed rubbish which I read last week (as I'm sure many others did) by a commentator who is known for his anti-GAA bias. In writing about all the money that the GAA is making and telling his readers about the tens of millions that the GAA are making, he certainly got his sums all wrong and was obviously concocting his own figures to strengthen his case against Croke Park.

Like other critics, he qualified his ridicule by saying that "he had the greatest re-spect for the GAA." What a load of rubbish.

At the County Board meeting last week the grant by the Minister for Finance was applauded and regardless of their political opinions (and these vary on the board) everyone showed their appreciation of the gesture of goodwill and help.






