KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

I am on the Farm Retirement Scheme and I shall be 66 in May. Will I qualify for the Contributary Old Age Pension?

If you entered insurance for the first time in 1988 and have continued to be insured (self employed) since then, you will qualify for the Contributory old age pension. However, your EU Farm Retirement Pension will be reduced by the amount of your pension.

If you do not qualify for a Contributary Old Age Pension you should apply for the Non Contributary old age pension. Your income from the EU Farm Retirement Scheme will not be taken into account. If you qualify for a full or partial Non Contributary Pension your Farm Retirement Pension will be reduced by that

The EU Farm Retirement Pension stops after ten years or when you are 70, at which time you will have either your Contributary or Non Contributary Old Age

£4.4 Million Allocated For County Road

Martin Cullen, T.D., is pleased to announce that his colleague Noel Dempsey, Minister for the Environment and Local Government, has approved funding totalling some £4.4 million for several significant nonnational road improvement schemes in Co. Waterford.

This grant represents an increase of 22% on last vear's allocation.

The monies allocated to Waterford include some o million for a restoration improvement grant to Waterford County Council as well as specific EU co-financed improvement grants for the Lemybrien/Carrickon-Suir area and £180,000 for the Kilmeaden/Carrickon-Suir area.

Welcoming the decision, Minister of State Cullen said that it was "further evidence of the Government commitment to deal with the long identified problems of regional and county roads."

ord Nelson Became Britain's How Greatest Sea Hero

Admiral Lord Nelson — who died in the Battle of Trafalgar in 1895 — is Britain's most famous sea hero.

Nelson's Column, in Trafalgar Square in the centre of London, is probably the best-known memorial to

He was born in 1758 and joined the Royal Navy in 1770 — when he was just 12 years old.

He began to earn his reputation as a hero when he was 35, fighting the French and Spanish, then Britain's worst enemies, at sea.

He was blinded in one eye by a battle injury in 1794

- and three years later he lost his right arm in an-

But his injuries did not stop him from leading his sallors to many great victories.

At the Battle of Copenhagen in 1801, Nelson put a telescope to his blind eye to avoid seeing a signal from his commander, Sir Hyde Parker, which would have prevented him beating the Danish fleet. He was killed in the Battle of Trafalgar on October

21, 1805, when he ignored advice and went on deck amid the fighting - with all his medals clearly

A gunman on an enemy ship recognised him because of the medals - and shot him.

Nelson was taken below deck where he survived just long enough to hear the battle was won and Britain saved from the danger of a French in-



FURTHER TAX INCENTIVES

Dungarvan has seen some dramatic changes in recent times in terms of level of development which has taken place. Had someone not visited the area for ten years or so, they would have great difficulty in recognising the "Old Boro" as nobody at that time could envisage the differences brought about primarily due to one piece of legislation. I refer of course to the Urban Renewal Scheme, whose primary aim is to regenerate urban accommodation and to revitalise the older parts of many towns which for many years had been allowed to fall derelict and devoid of both domestic and commercial use.

The bad news is that the existing Urban Renewal Scheme expires on July 31 of this year, the good news however is that a replacement scheme is currently being introduced, namely, "the Integrated Area Plan" (IAP). There are two primary differences between both schemes (1) whereas the existing scheme "blockpainted" certain sections of the town within which all buildings automatically qualified for inclusion, the Replacement Scheme extends the overall area for possible inclusion but each individual submission will be assessed directly on its merits (or otherwise); (2) The existing scheme is administered entirely by the Urban District Council whereas the Replacement Scheme falls under the jurisdiction of the County Council in consultation with the relevant local authority in each

The tax benefits which accrue to developers over the course of a ten year period makes development of these areas a very attractive and potentially lucrative proposition. The Chamber has notified in writing all of its members of the IAP and we strongly suggest that all potential developers should enter their submissions in writing (and if possible include a map illustrating the outlines of the boundaries of their property) to the Town Hall, Dungarvan, not later than this coming Friday, February 13. Developments that embrace local socio-economic benefits, including employment, training, education, social housing, good quality design and/or conservation of historical or listed buildings. may stand a better chance of inclusion.



Charged With Dumping At Local Landfill

where they were charged as a result of illegal dumping at the local slate quarries.

The indisputable evidence was provided by way of a hired private surveillance operator who is under the instructions of the Council to hide out at notorious dumping areas around the county and capture the unwary dumpers on film. Such was the case of the landfill site at Ballinamuck, Dungarvan which was closed at the time the illegal dumping took place.

Speaking at last Monday's County Council meeting where several members mounted a last ditch attempt led by Cllr. Billy Kyne to have the pending charges quashed, Mr. Connolly however stuck to his proverbial guns claiming that the Council had evidence that many of those facing charges deposited rubbish outside the gates of the dump thereby breaking the law.

"The fact that refuse was left outside the dump does not make it any lesser," he declared. "There is a sign warning against illegal dumping on the site."

The Manager stressed that if the local authority is serious about the Litter Act and its goal of becoming the first litter free county in Ireland, then it must take action. The benefits of achieving litter free status would include the prize of a £1m advance factory for the county.

Mr. Connolly revealed that a number of further prosecutions under the Litter Act are currently "in the pipeline". If the Council were to make an exception in the case of the people appearing in court later today, then a precedent would be set for further similar cases, he felt.

CONFUSION

Today's pending court cases have opened up a can of worms in relation to the Ballinamuck landfill. There is much confusion among members of the public regarding the correct procedure for dumping refuse at the site particularly in light of the traditional right of way into the dump used by fishermen.

A County Council spokesman however said the landfill is open Monday to Friday 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 12 noon. People using the dump when it is open may leave their refuse with an appropriate ticket at the entrance if they do not wish to drive in.

However when the landfill is closed (when most people are off work), rubbish cannot be left at the dump and

Legal proceedings were reluctantly dropped by the Council on the advice of their solicitor against a local 80 year old man who was recorded entering the closed dump via the right of way and throwing his bag of rub-

bish into the skip. CALL FOR WITHDRAWAL

The controversial issue was originally raised at the outset of Monday's meeting by Cllr. Billy Kyne who proposed that standing orders be suspended and that court proceedings pending on those who disposed of refuse at the Dungarvan landfill site be postponed for three months. The people concerned, he added, should be allowed, without prejudice to either side to make a contribution of £80-£100 towards the Council's costs for the subsequent withdrawal of legal proceedings.

While stating that he does not condone indiscriminate dumping, Cllr. Kyne however said the incident has implications for how the County Council responds to representations by its elected members in support of people who ask not to be forced into the courts to tell their own side of the story.

The Abbeyside councillor was contacted by three of the people facing charges. One woman, he explained, went to the local dump to dispose of two plastic bags of domestic refuse as the family would be away for a few days and did not want to leave these bags unattended until the next refuse collec-

Cllr. Ó Ceilleachair added that surely the Council would make an exception in these cases and suggested that a skip should be provided for public use when the dump is closed or alternatively a public right of way into the landfill.

Likewise Clashmore councillor, Garry O'Halloran who previously criticised the Council for prosecuting people in breach of the Litter Law in his own area, said the authority should afford the people concerned the chance to pay off their fines. The Council would get far more public support, he felt, if it were to accept the people's offer of a £80-£100 contribution.

Mr. Connolly however remained completely resolved to a legal course of action and said the Council has had major problems with illegal dumping at the gate entrance to the Dungarvan landfill, particularly over Christmas.

When the authority embarked on its anti-litter campaign, the Manager said he had made it clear to members that the Council would have to take prosecutions against people in breach of the Litter Act. "We won't succeed in our campaign if we aren't serious," he warned.

As exchanges between Cllr. Kyne and the manager grew more tense, Mr. Connolly finally declared, "We all want to be great fellows but we can't play it both ways applying regulations but not enforcing





Get Prepared For Salad Days



SALAD DAYS: Cucumber Petits from SE Marshall and Co.

You can grow cucumbers in three different ways — in the open, in frames or in the greenhouse.

The type of soil is not as important as the quality of the soil you use, but a good medium loam is a good choice.

A cool greenhouse is good for raising the cucumber plants—
to be sown from late March into April. Fill several nine centimetre pots with a good compost— and put one or two seeds on
edge, 13mm deep in each. If both seeds sprout, remove the
weaker one. If the pots fill with roots before they should be
transferred to frames in mid-May, re-pot them.

If a greenhouse is not available, it is possible to raise the plants on a warm windowsill inside — so long as the pots are turned daily so that they grow upright and evenly.

TRANSFERRING OUTSIDE

Although cucumbers can be transplanted successfully, it must always be done with care because they do not like to have their roots disturbed.

For this reason, use fibre pots, which can be planted out and will break up in the soil — keep the soil moist until the pot has disintegrated.

GROWING IN FRAMES

Frames that were used for vegetables up until late May or early June, are especially good for taking cucumbers.

If manure was put into the frame at the start of the season no more will need to be added. If not, remove the soil, add some fresh compost and well rotted manure, then replace the soil.

A frame with a single sliding top (light) will take just one plant, one with two lights will take two plants.

Plant the cucumber in the centre of each light, and when it has made six leaves it is possible to pinch out the growing point. Allow two shoots to form and grow six leaves — then pinch them in the same way as before. Stop these shoots when they reach the corners of the frame. When the male flowers appear, they should be pinched out — female flowers have a minute cucumber behind them — to encourage the growth of seeds in the cucumbers.

WATERING

Never plant cucumbers in a dip where water can gather around the base of the plant. It is better to plant them on a lump of soil where water will drain away from the stem and prevent rotting.

A good method of watering is to sink two 13cm pots in the soil either side of the plant and another 30cm away from it and water into these. Keep a small can of water in the corner of the frame so the water will be the same temperature as the frame.

BUYING PLANTS

Always choose plants which are dark in colour and have short joints. Avoid any which are light in colour, lanky or have thin stems. These will have been forced too quickly.

Your best bet is to find an amateur grower who has a few plants to spare.

GROWING INDOORS

Prepare trenches 75cm apart at about a spade's depth — put in a good layer of manure then return the soil. If the plants have not been grown in a greenhouse or frame, you can sow seeds directly into the soil toward the end of early summer (late May).

Plant three seeds on edge around 13mm down and 8cm apart, and when growing remove all but the strongest plants.

If the nights are cold, protect the seedlings with a jam jar or similar. Stop the plants when they have six leaves — and do not remove the male plants as outdoor plants need to be pollinated to produce fruit.

The Fota House Irish Landscape Collection Museum Society Lecture

had been Earls of Barrymore and were descended from Philip De Barry of Wales who colonised a large Anglo Norman conquest of the 13th century.

Built by Philip in 1206, macnoise (George Petrie) and Barrymore Castle, near Carrigtwohill, now a heritage and visitor centre, stands as a memorial to their ancient power. Fota House and Estate, which embraces the whole of Fota Island, was acquired by University Col-lege, Cork in 1975 from the last of the Smith-Barrys, the Hon. Mrs. Bell.

In 1983 the house was opened to the public by Mr. Richard Wood who has restored it in conjunction with U.C.C. in order to display his collection of 18th and 19th century landscape paintings in their natural setting. The collection, acknowledged to be the most important in its field outside the National Gallery of Ireland, traces the development of Irish landscape painting from the mid 18th to the late 19th century when most of the great Irish country houses were constructed.

On Thursday, February 19 Richard Wood will deliver a public lecture on the collection at the invitation of Dungarvan Museum Society, in

TRANSFER OF LAND ELIGIBILITY 1998 What is it?

The transfer of Land Eligibility Scheme is an optional scheme. It allows a producer who has land which is eligible for EU Arable Aid (land tilled for a crop other than grass reseeding between 1/1/1987 and 31/12/1991) to transfer the eligible status of the field(s) to other land on the same holding. This has major benefits in terms of crop rotation and flexibility for sugar-beet and potato

Summary Of Rules

Transfer can only take place within a holding.

A holding consists of all land farmed including land taken and excluding land let.

The 'donor' land can comprise a whole parcel or a

The 'donor' parcel or field can be split where part of that parcel or field is growing an ineligible crop e.g. sugar beet, potatoes.

The recipient field or parcel can be split provided the sub-divisions are at least 20m wide.

Where a single crop is being claimed for different purposes e.g. barley partly claimed for Arable Aid and partly for forage area, there should be a 1m strip or a recognisable boundary between the sub-

Where transfers were made in previous years 'until further notice' there is a facility this year to reverse

Maps will not be required to support parcel sub-divisions as the maps to be sent in with Area Aid applications will suffice.

Permanent transfers are only allowed on foot of a Compulsory Purchase Order.

Milk Recording

 Too few farmers are milk recording in Ireland. How come over 90% of all New Zealand cows are recorded even though their milk yield is only 800 gallons (approx.) ? The answer is simple, 'they cannot afford not to'. The same answer goes for us even though we argue that quota problems year in year out reduces each cow's potential. But that's the same for each cow in the herd and a correction is made for date of calving

when ranking cows under "Production Index". So you will be able to sort out the good cows from the bad

Good cow information is vital for good long term plan-

We need cows that can produce 1100 - 1200 gallons of milk with 3.5% or 3.6% protein from reasonable level meals. It is only by breeding replacements from the "best" cows will we achieve this long term aim.

It costs £7 to £12 per cow depending on the number of recordings per year.

Every 6 to 8 weeks is good enough for most farmers. * It represents very good value for money as you get the following information for each cow

Mild yield, kgs of fat and protein, % fat and protein, S.C.C.'s, calving internal (very valuable information), value of each cow's milk. The herd is ranked under "Production Index" which is a ranking of all cows from best to worst, taking into account her age, calving date etc. The age profile of herd is outlined.

The milk yield is so important in maximising 10 or 22 month premia or extensification claims.

Without milk recording an 1000 gallon/cow herd will be deemed to be 16% more heavily stocked. That means that for every 50,000 gallon quota, an extra 13 premia (either 10 or 22 month) can be claimed worth £1,170 or alternatively extensification (worth £30 per premium claimed) could be claimed.

* Therefore act now.

Go to your Co-Op and let them know you want to start milk recording in 1998. Don't worry about milk meters as the Farm Relief Service, who usually do the recording, can supply meters at £1.15 per cow per year.

IRISH **BEEF CAN** RETAIN SHARE OF **BRITSH** MARKET

The Committee Chairman of Waterford IFA Livestock, Mr. Maurice Donovan has said that the recent major promotion of British beef will create problems for Irish beef exports in the short term, but Mr. Donovan also said that the quality and commercial reality of Irish beef should allow Ireland to retain its prime position on beef exports into the UK.

Mr. Donovan continued by asking that the close contacts and excellent relationships between Irish exporters and British retailers continue to be maintained throughout this difficult period. "It is viister for education, Joe Walsh and An Bord Bia adopt a pro-active approach, with the key contacts in major UK multiples to ensure that Irish beef retains its prime position on UK supermarket shelves." He said that market research data shows that Irish beef is held in high regard by British consumers.

Mr. Donovan has also pointed out to the key players in the British beef industry that the negative advertising and lobbying against importing beef from Ireland and other countries will result in damaging the overall beef consumption in Britain.


A. One of the causes of muscle cramp, which is an involuntary contraction of a muscle or group of muscles is disturbance in the flow of blood to the tissues. This type of circulatory disturbance warrants checking. I suggest you see your own doctor for advice.

Q. I have five children and when one of them gets a tummy bug they all come down with it. What causes this and how can I stop it spreading?

A. The 'tummy bugs' which cause sickness and diarrhoea are usually viruses which are easily transmitted from one person to another if they're in close contact as would be the case in a Many family situation. bacterial and viral infections are transmitted by the 'faecal - oral' route, so meticulous attention to personal hygiene after using the toilet is essential. Food poisoning usually produces sudden and serious vomiting, sometimes with diarrhoea. This results from eating food contaminated with bacteria or toxins produced by bacteria. Good kitchen hygiene with proper storage and cooking of food will minimise the risks of food poisoning. Gastro intestinal germs may be passed by a cough or sneeze so, as far as your circumstances will allow, confine anybody with a bug to a separate room and avoid close contact.

Q. I take good care of my nails and eat plenty of calcium rich foods. Despite this they are split-ting badly. What is the cause of this and how can

A. I would suggest that you go to your doctor and have him check this out. Occasionally, splitting nails can be caused by psoriasis or anaemia, although there are usually other signs of this. Generally speaking, taking more zinc-containing and wholemeal foods like beef liver, peas, nuts, eggs and bran will be more likely to help than calcium. Household cleaners can be detrimental to the health and appearance of the nails so protect against this by using gloves.

Add the pepper and mushrooms to the pan and stirfry for 3-4 minutes. Stir in the spring onions. mangetout and bean sprouts. Stir-fry for a further 2 minutes. Mix the stock with the chilli and soy sauces. Stir into the vegetables. Add the beef. Bring to a simmer, gently mix in the noodles and heat through. Serve with extra hot chilli sauce.

Brush with any remaining tikka mixture during cooking. Serve 2 per person, hot or cold, with any remaining pilau rice, the lettuce, spring onions and poppadoms. Garnish with coriander.





Registration Of Members

Last year two court cases, where the decisions went against the G.A.A., gave rise to serious concern among clubs all over the association. The courts pointed out, to some degree, where club liability began and ended in the matter of membership/registration.

Immediately following these rulings, the then President, Jack Boothman set up a committee whose brief was to examine the whole question of membership and registration in order that clubs could be advised to do what was right in this re-

gard. It is disappointing to find that this committee have not yet come up with proposals/recommendations for the guidance of units throughout the country. Nine months is a long time for a committee to sit on a matter like this without being able to come up with a report.

At the same time, it would be wrong to place all the blame on the committee as clubs too, have a responsibility in the matter and far too many of them are careless and neglectful in dealing with the matter.

time, half the clubs in the county do not have up-todate club constitutions? In fact I am fairly sure that some clubs do not have 'outof-date' constitutions. Clubs do not seem to realise that if for any reason they find themselves at court defending themselves against a claim for damages etc., they may be asked to produce a copy of the club constitution. An up-to-date copy of the official club constitution is now included in the latest issue of the official guide which is available from the County I'm sure that even at this Board. This advises on all

matters relating to trusteeship of club property, land deeds, vesting etc. etc.

The payment of club membership fees is also very important in all this as a non paid-up player is technically not legal to play.

It has been officially advised that until such time as the special sub committee examining the matter come up with proposals etc. that clubs should continue to make sure that this side of their administration is attended to in accordance with how it is outlined in the official guide.
