It is regrettable that cheap sensationalism more often takes precedence over deserving newsworthy stories. Again, Dungarvan is left to suffer the consequences of adverse publicity following last week's misguided 'rent boy' allegation made in the public domain without any supporting evidence or background research.

The simple effort of putting hand to phone and contacting the local Gardai would surely have put such a cheap 'sleazy' headline to bed at an early stage. Jokes aside, this type of publicity is fast earning Dungarvan an extremely bad image among people living outside the area.

The 'Dungarvan Leader' rightly chose not to jump on the publicity bundwagon last week and instead of selling out the town for a gutter press headline, we focussed on more deserving stories of local interest.

Having attended last Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan UDC, this reporter was amazed and shocked to hear the break-

ing story on local radio of an alleged male prostitution ring based in the town's public toilets. Such an inference was not made at any time during the Council meeting and was obviously related at a later stage to one of the reporters present during an interview after the

The matter itself was raised by Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair at the very end of the meeting under the item 'Any Other Busi-

He referred to 'unspeakable' writing on the walls of the mens public toilets on Davitt's Quay and declined to divulge any further de-tails. Cllr. O Ceilleachair said the graffiti represented a worry for people visiting the town in that it resem-bled a "classified agency looking for prostitutes". His request that the Council clean up the offending graffiti was acceded to the following morning. The rest as they say is history.

The fact that Cllr. O Ceilleachair chose not to reveal any details of the graffiti during the meeting but obviously saw nothing wrong in later confiding to the press raises serious ques-

No matter what good intentions he may have had, the mere inference alone that a prostitution ring could be possible was enough to be snapped up by headline happy hacks.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

My husband, who is self-employed, will be 66 shortly and getting his Contributory Old Age Pension. Will I get an Old Age Pension when I am 66.

You will only qualify for a Contributory Old Age Pension if you have worked and have been paying PRSI before reaching the age of 55 with enough contribu-tions to entitle you to a Contributory Pension. If you are your husband's dependent he can claim an amount for you currently £51 if you are under 66 and £55.40 when you are 66. If you both have no other income or savings you could apply for the non-contribu-tory Old Age Pension. Your husband would lose the amount he is getting for you and you would get £67.50 (currently). You should, of course, apply for your free travel at 66.

If you are farming and making a joint return with your husband then you continue to make the same PRSI return on the farm income and provided you entered insurance before you were 55 will qualify in your own

right for a Contributory Old Age Pension at 66. Should your husband die before you reach 66 you will qualify for a Contributory Widows Pension, but when you reach 66 go on to the Contributory Old Age Pension which pays more.

the allegation. Naturally they are quite annoyed over the whole fiasco like many other organisations in the town who struggle year after year to put Dungarvan on the map and boost the local economy.

Speaking to the 'Leader', Inspector Michael Blake said the Gardai viewed the doors of both mens cubicles in the public toilets and the only semblance of a telephone number was one which was barely legible.

"We found very vulgar, sexual graffiti," said Inspec-tor Blake. "We have no reason to believe it was anything other than simple graffiti, similar to what one would find in many other public conveniences around the country."

Expressing the views of the local business community, a source in Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce said that if the media were as quick to report the good news rather than the sensationalistic, the town would be much better off.

"Tabloid journalism is the phrase that comes to mind", said the source. "There's sufficient good stories in this area that warrant the same amount of attention and energy".

REPLIES

In a letter to the editor outlining his position on the matter, Fiachra O Ceilleachair said various media tend to make stories more interesting and perhaps controversial. "I'm very sorry to disappoint in that a huge amount of proportion was added to the matter I raised", he stated. "My con**FRONT PAGE**

tention is that public conveniences, wherever they are, should be maintained to the highest standard. Dungarvan must be no exception".

The bad press given to the town as a result of the young councillor's remarks however has been strongly castigated by fellow UDC member Lar Hart who felt that inferences made to prostitution were both ridiculous and rash. If the matter had been raised in its entirety at the Council meeting, Mr. Hart said the other eight members would have had a chance to reply.

"If that had been me raising the issue I would first have checked my facts with the Gardaí who would certainly know if such allegations were true", he declared.

Cllr. Hart said that for a public representative to shoot off such a story straight from the hip was completely irresponsible. Dungarvan, he continued, has already had its fair share of bad press as a result of the controversial Angel of

Meanwhile UDC Chairman Austin Flynn who deftly nipped the story in the bud on local radio said he is looking forward to a report on the issue at the next Council meeting on March 16th. The County Manager, he said, has checked with the Gardaí who have strongly denied that any such prostitution ring ever existed in the

A director of South East Tourism and PRO of Dungarvan Tourism, Cllr. Nuala Ryan said she was disgusted to hear the story on local radio particularly in view of the fact that an alleged prostitution ring wasn't even mentioned during the meeting.

"This kind of story doesn't do the town any favours", she stated.

Abbeyside Athlete Sets

Although underage for his resents a new Irish under-17 400m indoor record and Joseph now holds the fastest time in Ireland in all

age group, the Dungarvan A.C. athlete took silver medal position in the 400m final and was only less than half a second behind the overall winner. His excellent time of 51.32 secs. repthree age groups from under-16 to under-18. The previous record was set in 1984 by T. P. O'Connor of Limerick Emeralds.

Under the guidance of his father Tommy, Joseph trains four times a week at St. Augustine's hockey pitch. His rigorous training includes sprints, exercises and running over a 400m distance track.

Joseph's record breaking talent is all the more astounding given the grievous injuries to his legs which he sustained at the age of 12. After falling in glass, he received 54 stitches to his leg and shortly afterwards he accidentally burned his foot with boiling water. Months of treatment ensued and Joseph still bears the scars of his third degree burn.

Prior to these accidents, Joseph showed great potential as a top sprinter with Scoil Mhuire, Abbeyside. His long recovery period fi-nally ended in 1995 when he won the 100m sprint at the Ring/Old Parish Open Day. This proved to be a

massive boost to the young athlete's confidence and from there his career has gone from strength to

That same year, Joseph set a new Irish record in the Junior Colleges 600m Indoor Championship at Nenagh. Athletic ability is a trait in the O'Donnell family and trained by their father who judges at Munster and national level, all the children have shown enormous po-

Joseph's twin brother, Eamonn holds All-Ireland medals for cross country events and won the 100m Hurdles in the County Championships in 1996. His other brothers Mark won the Munster under-12 1,100m two years ago while Paul holds a bronze medal for the under-10 200m at the National Community Games Final in Mosney.

Joseph is continuing his training as a member of Dungarvan A.C. and is looking forward to his next major event in Nenagh on March 4 when he will compete in the intermediate schools 600m.

Construction **Start On Houses** For Presentation Sisters

In the past fortnight construction work has commenced at the green field site fronting onto the Presentation Convent at Youghal Road, Dungarvan.

E. O'Brien and Sons, building contractors, have been successfully appointed by the local Urban Council to construct two semi-detached four bedroom houses for occupation by the Presentation Sisters.

These houses will be situated near the old graveyard on the left hand side of the Youghal road site and are expected to be completed in May.

When the purchase of the Convent and lands at Youghal Road/Mitchel Street was negotiated by the Council, it was agreed that the purchase price would include the construction of two houses for the Presentation Community on their own lands.

Picking Wild Mushrooms Is Fun **But Be Very Careful**

There are millions of different fungi — and many of them grow in your local wood.

Most of the fungi you see in Ireland are relatively harmless — but some are deadly.

Experts in fungi are called mycologists. Only a very small number of species can kill you if ou eat them, but many others have nasty side ef-

fects and some can make you very ill. Slippery Jacks — a type of fungi — can stain your fingers an orange colour. They are perfectly edible but are quite slimy when cooked. The Death Cap is a dangerous variety which

makes you sick. People who eat it become very thirsty, go pale and haggard and become very anxious.

Mycologists advise not to eat any picked

mushrooms without referring to a book on the sub

The golden rule is: "If in doubt, throw them out." But provided you know what you are doing and pick only edible mushrooms - you can find a tasty meat growing wild in the fields.

The best time for picking wild mushrooms is on

warm, wet mornings from July to December their growing season.

A good reference book to help identify different types is "Mushroom and Other Fungi of Great Britain" by Roger Phillips.

Ms. Leech said that Waterford Tourism's plan for the coming year would continue to build domestic appeal, expand marketing initiatives in the UK and start to extend programmes into Europe. We also intend to address the seasonality issue further with activity based promotions and with particular focus on the November to April period."

Waterford Tourism is starting the year with strengthened membership of 270 members and with increased funding. "Our 1998 marketing budget has increased to £210,000 of which 60% — or £126,000 — will be directed towards the UK and Northern Ireland markets, with the intention of growing the combined visitor numbers from Britain and Northern Ireland to 260,000" said Ms. Leech.

She paid tribute to the support received from private industry and from local authorities in Co. Waterford who are responsible for contributing some 60% of Waterford Tourism's resources.

Waterford's branding as the "Crystal County", introduced last year, has already proven to be very successful both in domestic and overseas markets.

Waterford Tourism aims to increase visitor numbers to the county to 1.2 million; and to increase the tourist spend to £140 million by the year 2000.

CO. WATERFORD COW TAKES EUROPEAN PRIZE

It was a joyful St. Valentine's Day for Irish breeders at the European Holstein Friesian Championships in Brussels. Winning two of the eight classes, placed second in two others and a third in the team event, it was the first time for an Irish Holstein Friesian selection to compete at

Europe's premier show.

Finishing third in the international class behind Italy and France and ahead of the strong Dutch team, representing one of the biggest exporters of dairy stock in the world was a major boost for Ireland opening doors in the lucrative European market for our best quality dairy stock. The junior champion and class winner Bunaclay SB Ginger from Tom Julian's herd in Rhode, Co. Offaly was purchased by German buyers for £40,000. Considerable interest was shown by Italian buyers in another class winner Rossbridge Lancer Electra 2 exhibited by John Skehan, Rathgormack, Carrick-On-Suir winner of the Irish Baileys Championship. Negotiations are believed to be continuing for the purchase of this animal. A lot of European consumers were under the impression that Ireland and England were the same place but the success of the Irish cows in Brussels had helped to break the perceived link.

ASH WEDNESDAY

Man drawn from the dust, must return to it and all that he does meanwhile, with the exception of what good he may achieve, is but dust and vanity, the good alone survives. Such are the truths which the Church wishes to engrave in the memory but still more in the hearts of her children by the sprinkling of ashes on the first day of Lent.

This custom dates from the first centuries of the Church and was then observed, not towards political sinners who had submitted themselves to canonical penance, to obtain thereby reconciliation with the Church and admission to a share in the divine Eucharist. The bishop imposed on them the obligation of wearing the hair-shirt and penitent garb, placing ashes on their head and then excluding them from the Church until the day of Easter. Meanwhile they had to remain humbly prostrate at the Church porch imploring the prayers of those who, more happy than they, might assist at the divine mysteries within the sacred building.

The custom of putting ashes on the head in token of penitence is even more ancient than Christianity. The Jews practised it and the Holy King David tells us that he had submitted to the observance. It may be said rather to date from the first ages of the world, for the holy man Job, long before even the time Moses followed the custom. Nothing is, in fact, more calculated to lead the sinner to enter into himself than the remembrance to his last end. Nothing is better fitted to beat down pride and put a check on futile projects and guilty purposes than the terrible and sad memento, "remember that thou art but dust".

Empires, riches, honours and dignities, resplendent palaces, triumphal cars, fair adornments, beauty, strength and power all crumble away and their very possessor is but a ruin and a ere few days have sped will have dwindled into dust. 

Gentle Art Of Growing Cacti

Many experts object to the expression "cacti-i and succulents" because cacti are succulents.

A succulent is a plant adapted to store water in difficult conditions.

This can include salt marshes and places where roots may be frozen — but most house plant succulents come from dry climates.

The water is stored in thick fleshy organs,

usually the leaves, or the stems of the plant.

Many succulents originate from areas that have a sharp fall in temperature at night. They have developed the ability to absorb dew

Experts have discovered dew forms, particularly well on spines - and they believe that may be why so many cacti are covered in sharp spikes.

Even succulents need some water and contrary to popular belief, very few types actually grow in hot and dry deserts.

Most grow in areas where there is a little rain and sparse vegetation to give some shade.

Cacti and succulents are found in parts of America and Africa - and other countries of similar climate.

CULTIVATION

The key to successful cultivation of cacti is to give them: a little water in the growing season and hardly any in the resting season.

It is very unwise to keep them constantly wet around the roots — as stagnant moisture will kill them.

The correct type of soil to use for terrestrial cacti — those which grow in the ground -- is loam based sell which has not been manured or dressed with leafmold, etc.

Sharp sarid should be added to assist drainage, or preferably crushed brick. A little peat should be added to help retain a little mois-

ture in the pot. Very acid soils should be avoided and limer should added

if a pH soil test comes above pH6. A typically good moisture is 60 per cent leafmold, 30 per

cent garden soil and 10 per cent drainage material (crushed brick).

POTS

Pots for succulents should not be too small. They should not be any less than 7cm — as any smal ing difficult.

Most succulents grow so slowly they only need transplanting once every two or three years. The soil should be completely replaced when the time

comes to change the pot. Plastic pots — and other pots which do not let water in or out — are greatly preferred by growers.

PLANTING Planting terrestrial cacti and succulents is almost exactly the same as many other household plants.

They should be planted in a smallish pot in sterilised compost, with vigilant checks on water levels — because they should not be left to dry out completely.

Some seedings may have to stay where planted for a full

Epiphyllums need to be on the surface of the soil under glass or clear polythene.

CUTTINGS

Leaf and stem cuttings work well with most cacti - but should not.

Minister Endorses New AISLING CONROY County Hall For Dungarvan

The first sod for the new £4m Waterford County Hall was turned by the Minister for the Environment and local Government, Noel Dempsey during a short ceremony at Davitt's Quay, Dungarvan last Friday.

Attended by members of Waterford County Council, U.D.C., Dungarvan Tramore Town Commissioners and Lismore Town Commissioners, windswept event near the former Fire Station building on the quay marked an his-toric milestone in the annals of local government in the

As the administrative seat of the county, Dungarvan can hope to further consolidate its position with the provision of a landmark building housing all the various strands of municipal services to the public.

The project, undertaken by contractors Bowen Construction Ltd. is scheduled to take approx. 12 months to complete in time for next April's centenary anniversary celebrations for the County Council.

VALUE FOR MONEY!! Speaking at Friday's ceremony, Chairman of the County Council, Lar Hart said the new state of the art facility will put an end to the fragmentation of services which currently exists within the town.

This will have major benefits for the public in terms of convenience and will greatly improve the overall efficiency and effectiveness of the services we provide," said Cllr. Hart. "In this regard, I feel we have the opportunity to set an example for other local authorities."

He complimented the design team Kelly, Barry, O'Brien, Whelan of Cork and Building Design Part-nership, Dublin on what he termed "a visually striking design of excellent architectural merit which represents real value for money.'

The County Hall project will cost in the region of £3.5m to construct with a further £.5m to cover furniture, fittings and equipment, the total cost of which will be financed by way of a term loan of £4m from the Housing Finance Agency with annual repayments of approx. £350,000.

ONE STOP SHOP

Digging out the first piece of earth on the site of the development, Minister Dempsey said he was delighted to attend the ceremony particularly in the context of local government

The Government, he said, is committed to the whole concept of giving better quality service to the public. The Minister confirmed that the Department of Social Welfare intend to locate their local offices and services to the new County Hall and he hoped to see many more public services relocating to the 'one-stop

Following the open air ceremony, the Minister ad-


dressed a meeting of both the County and Urban Councils in Dungarvan Courthouse where matters of local interest were discussed such as the Dungarvan sewerage scheme, the West Waterford regional water supply, rural depopulation, the anti-litter campaign, the pending urban renewal scheme etc.

On the issue of the county's ambitious anti-litter campaign, Minister Dempsey said that if it takes fines to bring people to their senses "then so be it".

Referring to a number of recent cases in Co. Meath where maximum fines of £1,500 was imposed on people found to have illegally dumped bags of rubbish. Minister Dempsey said he hopes that judges take note of such instances and enforce the maximum fine under the Litter Act.

Responding to concerns raised by Clir. Pat Coffey regarding the long awaited start on the West Waterford regional water supply scheme, the Minister said it is very difficult to get EU cohesion funds for the full scheme. Discussions are ongoing, he said and his Department will be as helpful as possible.

CHANGE NEEDED IN EARLY RETIREMENT RULES

Mr. Maurice Harvey, Chair-man of ICMSA's Rural Development Committee said that under any review of the Early Retirement Scheme, the 50% off-farm income limit must be examined.

Mr. Harvey said that given the current uncertainties in farming, many young farmers have to rely on an offfarm job to ensure that they survive in farming. However, for many young farmers who participate in the Early Retirement Scheme. In order to be eligible, they have to give up their off-farm job, a job in many cases which could be critical to their future survival as farmers.

The 50% rule, Mr. Harvey said, also discriminates against smaller farmers. For example, a farmer with £20,000 farm income can earn up to £20,000 from an off-farm job, whereas a farmer with £5,000 farm income can only earn up to £5,000 from an off-farm job. It is the smaller farmer who needs this off-farm income but the scheme discriminates against him.

To remove this anomaly, a rule change should be made to the Early Retirement Scheme. Instead of a percentage of total income, Mr. Harvey said an absolute fig-ure should be set for offfarm income. This figure should be set at a reasonable level. Such a change was made to the eligibility for quota from the Suckler Cow and Ewe reserves, Mr. Harvey said, and has operated

BRUCELLOSIS IN CATTLE (GENERAL PROVISIONS) (AMENDMENT) ORDER, 1998 (S.I. No. 39 of 1998).

The Minister for Agriculture and Food has made an Order, entitled as above, to come into effect on 23 February, 1998. The Order provides for a compulsory 30 day pre-movement test for Brucellosis for all female bovine animals and bulls, aged 12 months or more, except to slaughter.

The Order also provides that bulls aged 12 months or more and female animals aged 18 months or more may be sold not more than once, whether by private or public sale, during the validity period of any 30 day movement test and these animals must move directly from the holding on which the test was carried out to the holding of the purchaser or via a mart to the holding of the purchaser.



"It is essential that a floor is put under hoggett prices at present levels and the surplus on the market is removed in order to prevent any negative impact on the 1998 Spring lamb trade."

The IFA sheep farmers leader called on Minister Walsh to put forward an APS proposal to this week's Farm Council meeting in conjunction with his coileague, UK Minister for Agriculture, Jack Cunningham.

OUR LOCALITY

Many of the people now living in Ballinacourty know little about its history but there are very few who have not heard of the reputation of its farmers as the most famous potato growing communities in the land. They have also achieved fame through the production of other crops such as sugar beet, cabbage and cauliflower.

History tells us that when a section of British coastguards took up duty in a building overlooking the harbour, long before the turn of the century, they introduced potato growing to the local farmers. This was the main industry in the Channel Islands from where

they came to Ballinacourty. Being a very industrious community, the potato growing fraternity worked early and late on the land and when their crops were harvested, they were sold in towns all over Munster. The new industry resulted in increased employment and the area generally became better off.

Courtly Home — When excavation work was being done in preparation for the erection of the now defunct Quigley Magnesite Plant, the foundations of a building was discovered which was once the stately home of Robert Lonergan, Justice of the Peace for Co. Waterford. Courts were regularly held there when law-breakers were taken to his residence for trial. This was how the name Baile na Cúirte (Ballinacourty) originated.

Coastguard Station — Ballinacourty also became a place of note because of the Coastguard Station. Until its erection, the 20/25 strong company of coastguards whose mission was to prevent smuggling and assist shipping around the coast, lived in private houses. The children of the coastguards all attended Ballinacourty School but did not receive religious instruction. The station was burned down during the War of Independence. Eventually it became the property of the Golf Club when they moved to the Ballinacourty Course from Clonea. The restored Coastguard Station was again destroyed by fire accidentally in 1990 and was completely demolished.

Lifeboat Station — Before the turn of the century, a lifeboat was stationed at Ballinacourty. The crew were comprised of local men and coastguards many of whom were involved in the abortive attempt to rescue the 20 man crew of the illfated Moresby which was lost off Ballinacourty on December 23 1895.

THE SLATE QUARRIES

Home Of The Common Newt

On the borders of Clashmore and Grange, in an area known as the 'slate quarries', it is home to the Common Newt found only in small numbers in a few known areas in Ireland.

Newts look something like lizards but have no scales and move very slowly. They like open woodland and scrub with pond areas close by. In winter they mostly hibernate. They live in ponds in Spring during the breeding season returning to land during the summer. They emerge mostly at night and feed on slugs, worms and insects using sight and scent to capture their prey. Their main predators are hedgehogs, rats and they can live up to ten years.

We are reminded that Newts are a protected species. Yet another of the great wildlife riches in our area.

life threatening and difficult to Reflux. oesophagitis, (which seems to be what you suffer from) is characterised by a burning sensation behind the lower section of the breastbone or high in the abdomen. It is aggravated by eating spicy food, by alcohol and by smoking. It can be worse when lying down, especially following a heavy meal. Obesity is often a factor - one of the more usual

cause of this is hiatus hemia The condition is treated by antacid drugs. Care should be taken with diet - cutting out foods which bring on the symptoms, avoiding alcohol and stopping smoking.

Q. My little girl of three sometimes stammers a bit when she is trying to tell me something. Is this normal? I am uneure as to how best to handle the situation as I have read that its best ignored. Is this the correct approach? A. Many children between the ages of three and six go

through a stage of stuttering. This happens when the child's language is developing at a very fast rate and the child simply cannot get her words out quickly enough. Your daughter may be unaware that she is doing it, so pointing it out may not be the right thing to do - give her your full attention when she is talking to you. Allow her plenty of time to tell you what she wants to say, without interrupting her and hopefully she will grow out of this hesitant speech very quickly. Very few children develop true stammering, if it is upsetting your daughter or you feel its developing a problem ask your doctor to refer you to a

Q.I'm 46 and for the last two years I've had to go to the tollet 20 times or more a day. Recently, I was rushed into hospital when I was unable to pass any urine and I had to have catheter. Could you please explain why happened?

speech therapist.

A. Urinary retention (the inability to empty the bladder) is common in men but rare in women. In men, its invariably due to some problem with the prostrate gland which lies at the base of the bladder. In woman, it can occur after surgery in that area - eg. vaginal repair, a difficult labour or a hysterectorny. Pressure on the base of the bladder from fibroids or ovarian cysts can also have the same effect, and a vaginal prolapse may also interfere with normal emptying. Your own doctor should be able to reassure you.

Q. My eight-year-old gets very nauseous and there are some mornings when she actually gets sick. The doctor gave her a thorough examination and can't find anything wrong with her. She missed a lot of school before the holidays because of this and my doctor suggested I send her to school regardless. I think this is cruel. Do you think a second opinion is

A.The holiday period would have been a good indicator whether this a kind of school phobia or not. If the sickness is worse on Sunday nights and Monday mornings but clears up when she's at school would also indicate a kind of school phobia. A child professional to get your second opinion from. This condition is a form of separation anxiety and is often caused by worry about parents health or wellbeing. The child therefore is not so much anxious about school as about leaving home. Reassurance from you that you will be fine while she's at school and will be there when it's time to collect her may work. Then insist that she goes to school. This way, I think over time she will gradually feel less anxious and the nausea should disappear.

Spoon the mixture into the loaf tin and smooth the top. Bake for 45 minutes or until well risen, then reduce the oven temperature to cool, Gas mark 2 or 300 F/150 C, and bake for a further hour until firm to the touch. Allow to cool in the tin for 10 minutes, then turn out on a wire rack to cool completely. Serve sliced, spread with butter.

Chicken in Rum and Orange Sauce



Dr. Paddy Kiely

(1897 - 1998)

Dr. Paddy Kiely died in Cork on January 29 within a week of his 101st birthday. Son of John and Mary Kiely, one of a family of ten, he grew up in Moonakirka. He had his early schooling at Stradbally National School and at St. Augustine's College, Dungarvan.

He qualified in Medicine at UCC in 1920 and gained his Fellowship in Surgery in London and subsequently his FRCSI (Hon.). He was Professor of Surgery in University College Cork for thirty years until his retirement from that office in 1968. Afterwards he continued his general surgical practise well into his seventies.

His brother, Dr. John Kiely, who died in 1996, was also a surgeon in Cork during the same era. In 1958 his book "Textbook of Surgery" was published and his spur to the less energetic student as some suitable reading material was to have a read of "The Book."

He was predeceased by his wife Christina and sons Dr. John (also a surgeon) and Jim, by a number of years and is survived by seven children, twenty-eight grandchildren and eighteen greatgrandchildren.

"PK" as he was known to colleagues, friends and students, had a great interest in sport, having played college, club and inter-county football. He played a good game of gold off a single figure handicap and was a past captain of Lahinch and Cork Golf Clubs. He enjoyed nothing better than a good fourball for a little wager with a shot to save and the post mortem in the 19th.

Horse racing and ownership with a tilt at the bookies from time to time played a big part in is life. His racing colours (Waterford's) of blue and white bird's eye was sported on the flat and over jumps, from Tramore to Fairyhouse and from the Curragh to Aintree. His horse Dominic's Bar,



ridden by the great Martin Moloney, won the Irish Grand National in 1950, while Cabin Fire, whom he felt was his best, ridden by Tim Hyde, was brought down when "flying" according to himself at Valentine's in the Grand National of 1938, won by Battleship (B. Hobbs).

He also liked a game of cards and on one occasion when returning by train from the Curragh a controversial end to the game seemed likely around Watergrasshill, so "PK" duly opened the window of the carriage and the rest is history as he felt the man repairing the line might be in greater need of a few bob.

In the celebration of a full life he would be pleased to think he was a man of common sense who never lost touch with his roots, who had a great belief in the infinite majesty of God, who gave his all, and to quote himself: "what you haven't got you cannot give."



WATERFORD HURLERS' LOSS OF DIRECTION

A chara,

In 1992 Waterford defeated Clare in the Munster senior hurling championship and came within three points of beating Limerick in the semi final. Indeed, were it not for shrewd Limerick switches and monumental bungling on the Waterford sideline, the senior hurlers would surely have joined our successful minors in the Munster final in what would have been a great day out for Waterford hurling supporters

Since then, Clare have won two All Irelands and Limerick two Munster titles. This shows how close Waterford were to the breakthrough in the early 1990's. I formed the view after the 1992 championship that we were about three good players short of what was needed to win out in Munster. Then, virtually out of the blue, the players we needed emerged from the victorious under 21 team of that year, with plenty back-up from the successful minor team. Apart from Sean Daly and Johnny Brenner, who were already established seniors, the under 21's offered us further players of promise in the likes of Tony Browne, Fergal Hartley, Paul Flynn, Mark O'Sullivan, Pat Fanning, Tom Fives and Noel Dalton.

Tragically, Waterford did not have a management setup in place capable of grafting this new talent onto the strong pool of players already in place. The disastrous defeat against Kerry in 1993 set the scene for a loss of direction and a downward slide. Gradually, the excellent players of 1992 faded out - the likes of Damien Byrne, Jimmy Beresford, Daithi Foran, Shane Ahearne and Liam O'Connor. Even Johnny Brenner and Sean, who should now be reaching their prime, are gone. Of the 1992 senior team, only Sean Cullinane, Stephen Frampton, John Meaney and Brian Greene are still involved. More significantly only four of the 1992 under 21 team are now on the senior panel - Browne, Hartley, Flynn and O'Sullivan. There is no doubt in my mind that a blend of these two teams should have been able to win out in Munster, and the failure to do so must go down as a missed opportunity of major proportions.

However, 1992 was not just a flash in the pan as regards unearthing new young hurling talent. Every year since then, Waterford have fielded a good minor hurling team — the product of underage coaching structures put in place some years ago. As a result, there has been a steady flow of promising new material. Of particular significance has been the emergence of forwards with potential such as Ken McGrath, Dan Shanahan, Michael White and Dave Bennett. Meanwhile, seven of the 1992 minor team have also graduated onto the senior panel. Consequently, a fresh combination of new blood and established players is now being blended to-

In my view, in terms of potential talent, the current senior hurling squad is possibly the strongest I have seen in my almost 40 years of following Waterford hurling. It has been normal for Waterford to have ten or a dozen good hurlers, with a mediocre tail and few substitutes worth calling on. I now feel we have 20 or more hurlers available. The big challenge for the current management is to get the best out of the potential that is there. Apart from cultivating skills, the biggest test will be to get the players' heads and hearts right. The re cesses of Clare, Limerick and Wexford has been based as much on determination as inherent skill. We must be prepared to match that. The first game of the year against Kilkenny in Dungarvan did not augur well, but there has since been a big improvement against Cork and Kilkenny in Walsh Park. With the bad conditions at this time of the year, we look more for attitude and commitment rather than skill. We need to get used to beating the big guns, if even in secondary competitions and challenge games. We cannot afford an inferiority complex going into the championship.

The management team seem to be getting things going, it is now up to the players to show the desire to match their natural talent and give their long-suffering but still numerous supporters the day in the sun they have been looking forward to for so long.

Western Board Meeting

Paddy Walsh, chairman presided at last week's re-sumed meeting of the Western Board which was held at Lawlors Hotel.

REFEREEING

Because of the very serious situation pertaining in the referee situation, the chairman stated that he had invited the Referees Committee to be present and that Pat Moore would spell out the very worrying situation in relation to this very important matter.

In giving details of the situation, Pat Moore told delegates that of the 27 clubs in the west, a total of 19 did not supply the Board with a referee. This, he said, was an indictment of these units who were content to leave it all to the other eight clubs to supply people to handle all our games.

He said that with championship and league, the Western Board will play approx. 350 matches this season. Bord na nOg will play about the same number with the County Board expected to play about 90 matches in this end of the county, the total here will be in the region of 800 games in all. He said that the clubs who do not have a referee invariably insist on a 'good' ref being appointed for their matches.

The situation in the east is much better and at a Referee Coaching session which he had attended on the previous evening, a total of nine new aspiring refs attended and showed great enthusiasm.

In a final effort to deal with the situation here in the west, a number of meetings will take place. First meetings will be for the new referees of clubs who have been notified. On this Thursday night, Pat Moore will chair a meeting in Lawlors and John Kelly will do likewise at The Sportsmans Inn in Cappoquin. Both meetings begin at 7.30 p.m.

In his appeal, Pat Moore said that new members had nothing to worry about as they would be well coached and introduced gradually into the stream of the business. He said that if all clubs supplied one or two, the whole problem would be solved.

The chairman said the officers had a recent meeting with the referees body in the west and having discussed expenses, it was agreed to recommend that in future referees be paid increased expenses and travelling at the normal rate if having to travel over 20 miles. 
