





IRISH SOLDIERS OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR

THE DEAD **MAN'S PENNY**



Thomas Colbert died of wounds in France, 25 Sept. 1914. He was in the Royal Irish Regiment, 2nd Battalion. His grand-nephew is Tom Street of Kilrush. He was born in Aglish.

The memorial plaque or "Dead Man's Penny" was produced shortly after World War 1 as a memorial of

the fallen World War 1 soldiers to their relatives. It was made of bronze, measured 4 3/4 inches in diameter and weighed 15 ozs. It was engraved with the figure of Britannia and other details and bore the name of the fallen soldier with the inscription, "He died for freedom and honour."

Some 1,150,000 plaques were issued commemorating those who fell between August 4, 1914 and April 30, 1920. Each plaque was accompanied by a letter from King George and a parchment scroll which bore the

There were almost 1,000 of these plaques dispatched to Co. Waterford relatives and most of them are now, sadly, lost and forgotten. Each one bears its own tragic story and represents shock and depression in a thousand

If you would like to see a real plaque and scroll, they will be on display at the Dungarvan Museum World War 1 talk on Thursday, May 7 at 8 p.m. in Lawlors Hotel.

Minister Satisfied With Number of Local GP's

The Minister for Health and Children, Brian Cowen, has expressed satisfaction at the "sufficient" number of general practitioners in West Waterford who offer cover for medical card holders in the GMS scheme.

The matter was raised in the Dail recently by Waterford Labour Deputy, Brian O' Shea who asked the Minister if he was satisfied with the level of cover for medical card holders in this area.

Minister Cowen revealed that the number of G.P's participating in the GMS in West Waterford is 13, who provide a service for 7,775 local medical card holders. Their average GMS panel is 590, which, he added, compares very favourably with the limit of 2,000 medical card holders per G.P.

MOUNTAINS ARE MADE FROM THE EARTH'S **MOLTEN ROCK**

A VOLCANO is a deep vent in the Earth's surface - from which molten rock and gas erupt.

Over the years rock erupting from the vent forms a hill around it, creating the familiar volcano shape we know today.

The Earth's surface is made up of giant plates - with cracks in between them. Most of the world's volcanoes are found along the edges of these plates. Many are beneath the sea, including a number in the mid-Atlantic.

Earth's crust - creating mountain ranges such as the

the molten material that lies beneath the Earth's surface.

Scientists believe the Earth was originally made of molten rock and although the surface has cooled down, the centre is still extremely hot.

Researchers are still trying to find a perfect way to predict volcanic eruptions. Signs that an eruption is coming include swarms of small earthquakes as the lava rises up through the volcano - and physical swelling of mountain slopes.



Proposals For Over 190 **Houses At Tournore**

Speculation has been rife in the locality concerning a proposal for a major private housing development in Abbeyside. A planning application has already been lodged with the planning section of Dungarvan UDC for the construction of 192 houses at Tournore, in the vicinity of Duckspool.

The application, which was lodged by Cork based John Daly and Ian O'Leary, involves over 20 acres, formerly owned by the late Mrs. Denny and currently retained by a nephew in England.

A spokesperson for Dungarvan UDC told the 'Leader' that the local authority is awaiting a number of documents to complete the application which will be subsequently considered by the County Manager.

The land at Tournore however is zoned for agricultural use in the Town Development Plan and would require a majority vote of UDC members to enable any residential development to proceed by way of a material contravention.

Gardai Investigate Weekend Vandalism in Lismore

Gardai in Lismore are investigating a spate of vandalism which occurred in the town last weekend.

On Friday night, April 24th a mindless attack was carried out on the local GAA community centre where extensive damage was done to a number of expensive double glazed windows.

The Lismore community centre is a much needed and widely used amenity in the town. All the money raised for the building was through the support of the local community and it is extremely frustrating for all involved in Lismore GAA club, its supporters and those who fund raised for the project to see it come under such a malicious and unwarranted attack.

The following night (Saturday), the workshop of a prominent club member, located only 400-500 yards from the community centre was also vandalised and again a number of windows were broken.

two-way.

On Friary Street traffic will flow one-way from Main Street to Emmett Street, however motorists wishing to park in Scanlons Yard Car Park will be allowed to travel from Emmett Street along the southern end of Friary Street in to the car park. All

park will be obliged to turn right. Strand Street will be one-way from Emmett Street to Boreenatra with Buttery Lane one-way in the opposite direction.

The changes however are not made in stone as Council members have agreed to review the situation in three months time. Council

"Motorists familiar with traffic patterns in the town centre may experience some teething problems at first", said Cllr. Flynn, "but I have

no doubt that the one-way system now being introduced will facilitate improved traffic movement in the long term."

In carrying out its review in three months time, the Council will be seeking the views of all motorists particularly lorry drivers and hackneys, as well as local businesses and the Cham-

ber of Commerce, to ascertain the success or otherwise of the plan and to identify areas where fine tuning may be required.

A map of the one-way system is available free of charge at the Town Hall.

So from May 5 the message is -"Follow the arrows and go with the flow !"

would have to dump fuel. It was obvious from the expression on the air hostess's face that something was seriously wrong", said Martin.


"Then the cabin pressure failed and there were massive ibrations throughout the plane...it was a frightening experience", he added.

As the Boeing prepared to land, a full on-the-ground emergency plan came into operation and passengers looked fearfully on as a team of ambulances, fire brigades and police vehicles rushed to meet the plane as it taxied down the runway.

The local group, who were accompanied by three wheelchair users and two disabled people, were later told that the rear end of the plane had hit the ground, blowing off a panel and badly damaging the tail sheet leaving a large gaping hole in the underside.

Shaken but undeterred by the incident, the group were put up in a 4 star hotel that night and flew out to Kuala Lumpur the following morning, April 6th where they successfully completed the sponsored walk to arrive home safe and sound!

Asked if he would take to the skies once again Martin said, "something like that can only happen once to a person and if they're lucky they'll survive"



Labour Councillor Paddy Power has called on the local UDC to bulldoze a derelict site in Abbeyside, which he claims is serving as a haven for anti-social elements. He stated that the Hermitage property has become a 'den of iniquity' for local youths, not to mention an eyesore and potential health hazard

Last month some 1000 members of the public petitioned the UDC to acquire the site and transform it into a much-needed amenity area. However, the lands, which have outline planning permission for 35 houses, are estimated to be worth as much as £250,000.

Councillors agreed at Monday night's meeting of the authority that the situation couldn't be tolerated any longer. "It's been going on for 20 years now," said Cllr. Billy Kyne.

Cllr. Paddy Power didn't pull any punches. "The carry-on there is unbelievable. The residents near-by need some protection. We should move in in the morning with a JCB and clear the place."

Acting County Manager, Peter Carey urged caution however, stating that the Council simply couldn't take the law into its own hands with what was, after all, private property.

Recently, I saw in "Saol" (a monthly Irish newspaper) an advertisement from Cumann Staire Uí Fhiaich, for a four-day excursion to Scotland, concentrating on Kent Augustus and Kent George, where 1798 prisoners had been jailed after the rebellion. I answered the advertisement and there followed a letter from Séamus Mac Seáin and later a long telephone conversation in Irish with him, and as a result, I set off for Belfast on Easter Sunday and was met at the train by Séamus and brought to his house. There was one other person from Dublin.

It was a long journey next day to Inverness where our next three days were spent. For all of you out there who have been planning European and American and Indian holidays I will cannot emphasise too much the thrill of Scotland, of Inverness and Culloden and Loch Ness (well worth visiting, even without the monster!).


The real thrill was being part of a group of 23 people, all of whom spoke Irish naturally all the time; there were 4 children (2 families) between the ages of 4 and about 12 and it was quite obvious Irish was their first language whether they were playing snakes and ladders or throwing snowballs, or just complaining about bed-time.

It was all a revelation. On further enquiry from Séamus Mac, I was told that in the late 60's, a group of people who attended Connradh na Gaeilge bought 2/3 acres of outskirts of the city; on this they built 14 houses and this was the beginning of their Fior Gaeltacht. There is now a primary school with 16 teachers and a bigger one is planned, as the present school is bursting at the seams. Some of the original builders are now grandparents.

What a happy story from Belfast. I was deeply impressed and felt I had to share to with you.

On May 22nd all of us have a big decision to make, because that's when the referendum to accept or reject amendments to treaties governing the European Union takes place. These amendments are known as the Amsterdam Treaty and will influence Ireland's future.

For example, the Treaty states that a Common Foreign and Security Policy (CFSP) includes all questions relating to the security of the Union including the progressive framing of a common defence policy, which might in time lead to a common defence, if the European Council so decides. The adoption of a European common defence would be subject to agreement by the Member States, in accordance with their respective constitutional requirements, which may, in Ireland,



RECENT DEATHS

Late Sister Raphael Cox

It is with regret we pen the death of Sister Raphael Cox, a native of Upper Strand, Youghal who passed to her eternal reward at St. Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel on March 14, the Feast of Saint Maud.

Having done her training in Home Economics in the St. Louis College, Ramsgrange, Co. Kilkenny, she entered the Convent of Mercy, Cahir in 1928 and she

made her final profession in 1934.

The Cox family has suffered the horrors of the Civil War when her younger brother Captain William Cox was shot dead. Sister Raphael often spoke of this outrage and of the great trauma her parents and family endured. In all there were five boys and six girls in the family, all of these except one predeceased Sister Raphael. Sister Ambrose, the sole survivor, a Sister of the Joseph of Cluny congregation in Mount Sackville, Dublin. She spent 30 years in Sierra Leone, 12 of these as Provincial of her Order. Sister Raphael's ministry was spent in four different places, Clonmel, Ballyporeen, Cahir and Clogheen.

She cared for the sick with great generosity and diligence. She used her great skills in home economics with much success, enterprise and loving concern. She spent many years of her religious life in Clogheen, in the midst of very beautiful countryside. Here she enjoyed gardening, cultivating heathers, fuchsia and potted plants, and her own special rockery. She also loved mountain walks and often did some climbing with her energetic companions. Mount Angelesby and Major Eales, high peaks in the Knockmealdowns were no strangers to her. Sister Raphael loved to spend time in her native Youghal, and she always came back renewed

and refreshed after a holiday there.

Before she passed away she was planning a visit home after Easter. Her eternal home now in Heaven, will make up a hundred-fold for what she missed. Sister Raphael was a woman of prayer, in her final years, in particular, her rosary beads was her constant companion, and we entrusted to her many intentions for people and families in trouble, as well as local and national concerns.

Profound and sincere feelings of regret were widely expressed at the news of the death of Mr. John (Johnny) Tobin, Ragwell, Mountain Road, Clonmel and late Knockanaffrin, Ballymacarbry, which sad event took place at his residence on Friday, April 24.

Deceased in his 91st year was a member of an old and respected Nire Valley family. For some time he had not enjoyed the best of health and was predeceased by his wife Helen by some eighteen years. For many years he was held in high regard by management and fellow workers. He was nephew of the late Larry Tobin proprietor of the Sliabh Na mBan Hotel, Clonmel and a member of the Tipperary senior football team that won the All Ireland final in 1900.

He was truly one of nature's gentlemen possessed of a friendly, good humoured and generous disposition. His unassuming wit, rich fund of anecdote and a remarkable facility in recalling experiences of his earlier years held the listener enthralled and endeared him to all with whom he had contact.

A loving and kind husband and father his family were

his pride and joy. He was a wonderful neighbour always ready with the hand of help, and his demise has evoked feelings of sincere regret among his family,

neighbours and many friends.

Many tributes have been paid to this man but perhaps the finest was paid to him on Saturday evening by the large concourse of mourners who were present when his remains after the rosary was recited by Rev. Fr. Paul Murphy C.C., S.S. Peter and Paul's, Clonmel were removed from O'Donoghue's Funeral Home, Clonmel to S.S. Peter and Paul's Parish Church, Clonmel. On Sunday morning the Feast of Saint Cletus the 11 a.m. Mass was celebrated for the repose of his soul, the celebrant was Rev. Fr. Paul Murphy C.C., S.S. Peter and Paul's. After Mass the funeral left for St. Helena's Church in the Nire Valley, and he was laid to rest in the family plot with his wife Helen who predeceased him by eighteen years. Fr. Paul Murphy C.C. officiated at the graveside in the presence of a large concourse of mourners who came to pay their final respects to a Christian friend whose memory they will cherish.

Progress On Ardmore Mast Controversy

Waterford County Council have indicated that it may use its influence to encourage Esat Telecom to relocate a mast from the Garda Barracks in Ardmore to a non-residential part of that area.

The news was contained in a letter to Cllr. Fiachra Ó Ceilleachair, who has been suggesting a compromise be reached so that Esat would not proceed with a 30 metre mast at the barracks adjacent to College Rd. housing estate

and Ardmore Primary School. In response to Cllr. O Ceilleachair's correspondence with the County Manager on the matter, the Council claimed "the Council do and have used their powers to suggest compromise between Esat and local communities whereby proposed masts might be relocated to non-residential areas."

Whilst welcoming this indication, Cllr. O Ceilleachair is concerned about another part of the response which says "the Council require compliance with the international radiation protection association guidelines and the other Government guidelines and takes these standards into account when dealing with any application."

As things stand, warns Cllr. Ó Ceilleachair, such Government guidelines would see the erection of this massive mast in such a well populated area like College Rd., Ardmore being considered safe.

Cllr. Ó Ceilleachair, speaking after meeting residents in Ardmore on Thursday, April 23, said he was satisfied that Ardmore people would remain vigilant on this issue and would project their opposition to a point where compromise from Esat would be effected.

Referendum to Amend the Constitution Articles 2, 3 and 29 Submissions Invited Referendum Commission

The Referendum Commission comprising, Mr Justice T.A. Finlay, Chairman, former Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Ombudsman, the Clerk of the Dáil, the Clerk of the Seanad and the Comptroller and Auditor General has been established as an independent statutory body under the Referendum Act, 1998.

The core function of the Referendum Commission is to oversee information campaigns on proposed amendments to the Constitution, to facilitate debate and discussion on the matter and to do so in a manner which is fair to all interests concerned.

On the 10th April, 1998 agreement was reached in Belfast by all the participants in the Multi-Party negotiations on a range of matters covering relationships within Northern Ireland, between North and South and between the two Islands. In the context of this Multi-Party Agreement, the Irish Government undertook to propose and support changes in the Constitution of Ireland relating to the constitutional status of Northern Ireland. The Commission is now concerned with the provision of information in respect of a referendum to amend Articles 2, 3 and 29 of the Constitution. The proposed change is set out below.

The Commission requests individuals and organisations, who wish to express their views on the proposed amendment, to submit details to the Commission at the address provided below.

Submissions should be as brief as possible and must be confined solely to the subject matter of the amendment to Articles 2, 3 and 29.

Submissions must be received by the Commission by 17.30 on Monday, 4th May, 1998 and having regard to the time constraints of the Commission, submissions received after that date will not be entertained.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment

The proposed amendment to Article 29 is concerned with Articles 2 and 3, additions to Article 29 itself and finally the conditions under which the proposed changes may be implemented.

A referendum will be held on 22nd May, 1998, on a proposal to add the following sections to Article 29 of the Constitution.

Article 29

7

1°. The State may consent to be bound by the British-irish Agreement done at Belfast on the 10th day of April, 1998, hereinafter called the Agreement.

2°. Any institution established by or under the Agreement may exercise the powers and functions thereby conferred on it in respect of all or any part of the island of Ireland notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution conferring a like power or function on any person or any organ of State appointed under or created or established by or under this Constitution. Any power or function conferred on such an institution in relation to the settlement or resolution of disputes or controversies may be in addition to or in

substitution for any like power or function conferred by this Constitution on any such person or organ of State as aforesaid.

3°. If the Government declare that the State has become obliged, pursuant to the Agreement, to give effect to the amendment of this Constitution referred to therein, then, notwithstanding Article 46 hereof, this Constitution shall be amended as follows:

(ii) the following Articles shall be substituted for Articles 2 and 3 of the English text:

"Article 2.

It is the entitlement and birthright of every person born in the island of Ireland, which includes its islands and seas, to be part of the Irish nation. That is also the entitlement of all persons otherwise qualified in accordance with law to be citizens of Ireland. Futhermore, the Irish nation cherishes its special affinity with people of Irish ancestry living abroad who share its cultural identity and heritage.

Article 3

1. It is the firm will of the Irish nation, in harmony and friendship, to unite all the people who share the territory of the island of Ireland, in all the diversity of their identities and traditions, recognising that a united Ireland shall be brought about only by peaceful means with the consent of a majority of the people, democratically expressed, in both jurisdictions in the island. Until then, the laws enacted by the Parliament established by this Constitution shall have the like area and extent of application as the laws enacted by the Parliament that existed immediately before the coming into operation of this Constitution.

2. Institutions with executive powers and functions that are shared between those jurisdictions may be established by their respective responsible authorities for stated purposes and may exercise powers and functions in respect of all or any part of the island."

(iv) The following section shall be added to the English text of this Article:

"8. The State may exercise extra-territorial jurisdiction in accordance with the generally recognised principles of international law.".

4°. If a declaration under this section is made, this subsection and subsection 3, other than the amendment of this Constitution effected thereby, and subsection 5 of this section shall be omitted from every official text of this Constitution published thereafter, but notwithstanding such omission this section shall continue to have the force of law.

5°. If such a declaration is not made within twelve months of this section being added to this Constitution or such longer period as may be provided for by law, this section shall cease to have effect and shall be omitted from every official text of this Constitution published thereafter.

Extension Of Energy Action Programme Proposed

The sponsorship of an initiative to offer free loft insulation and draught-stopping for pensioners living in Co. Waterford is to be considered as part of the 1999 Estimates for Waterford County Council.

Cllr. Fiachra Ó Ceilleachair urged Waterford County Council officials to examine the "Energy Action" programme operative in Waterford city, which is sponsored by the Corporation. Council officials have confirmed to Cllr. Ó Ceilleachair that this will now be done and its inclusion in next year's estimates can be decided in due course.

The "Energy Action" programme has been operating successfully in several parts of the country. On the go since 1996 in Waterford City, the initiative utilises FAS sponsored workers on CE Schemes to install insulation and draught stopping to houses normally identified by Waterford Corporation. The Corporation contributes roughly £15,000 to the initiative so that material can be purchased for work in about 130 houses. The administration of the initiative receives European funding.

"The administrators of the Waterford City Energy Action Programme would like to see the service extended into the county. This, obviously, needs the movement of the County Council and I will be pushing for positive consideration of such a worthwhile scheme, " said Cllr. O Ceilleachair.

"It's great that pensioners living in one part of Waterford can be helped out like this, but it's only fair that pensioners from the county area should have the same access."

Approval of Bodies in Relation to the Referendum on the Amendment of Articles 2, 3 and 29 of the Constitution Referendum Commission

The Referendum Commission comprising, Mr Justice T.A. Finlay, Chairman, former Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Ombudsman, the Clerk of the Dáil, the Clerk of the Seanad and the Comptroller and Auditor General has been established as an independent statutory body under the Referendum Act, 1998.

Under Section 7 of the Act a body may apply to the Referendum Commission to seek a declaration that it is an approved body for the purposes of the referendum to amend Articles 2, 3 and 29 of the Constitution. Approved bodies will be entitled to appoint agents to attend at the issue and opening of postal voters ballot papers, at polling stations and at the counting of votes. Members of either House of the Oireachtas, who currently have the right to appoint such agents, will continue to have this right.

In order to become an approved body, an applicant must fulfil conditions and follow the application procedure set out in the Referendum Act, 1998.

The conditions are:

- the body must be a body corporate or unincorporated body which, or a branch of which, is established in the State, governed by a constitution, a memorandum of association or other such document or other written rules and having a membership of not less than 300.
- the body must have an interest in the referendum and have a name which is not identical to, or does not closely resemble, the name of a political party registered in the Register of Political Parties.

If a body requires clarification on the approval process, it should contact the undersigned.

A political party for the time being registered in the Register of Political Parties shall be deemed to be a body for the purposes of the Act and need not establish compliance with the above conditions but must, in order to become an approved body, comply with the application procedure below.

The application procedure is:

- applications must be made on the official form which is available from the undersigned on request;
- the closing date for receipt of completed application forms is 17.30 on Monday, 4th May, 1998.

The Referendum Commission may refuse to make a declaration if a body does not fulfil the conditions and procedure outlined above, or fails to provide the Commission with reasonable information or documentation which the Commission considers necessary to determine the application.

The Commission may also revoke a declaration made by it in relation to a body where it is satisfied that false information has been furnished to it. The Act also provides, under Section 9, that it will be an offence to knowingly provide false information in relation to an application.



OUNTY ICMSA NE

10% QUOTA INCREASE ICMSA DEMAND

The ICMSA President, Frank Allen, called for a 10% increase in Ireland's milk quota to be a key demand from Ireland in the negotiations on the Santer proposals.

"Ireland needs this size of quota increase in order that we may prepare for a time when quotas will be abolished. This could happen between 2006 and 2010.

"Increased quota is needed to help Irish farmers and also to improve the efficiency of the processing sector.

'Commentators who are calling for the immediate abolition of quotas are somewhat misguided. Our first priority must be to get the best deal possible on the quota system — which would be 10% increase for Ireland. Subsequently we can prepare ourselves for a world without quotas.

"If and when quotas are abolished we must make sure that dairy farmers continue to get adequate direct can continue to have a reasonable income while farming in a manner that is friendly to the environment.

"We must also ensure that milk continues to be produced in the Disadvantaged Areas", concluded Mr.

MOVEMENT PERMIT SYSTEM

The movement permit system for female cattle is to be overhauled following proposals put by ICMSA to the Department of Agriculture. The ICMSA's Deputy President, Mr. Pat O'Rourke said that the current system places considerable and un-work — but why nothing necessary incurvements of the shipping transport.

Mr. O'Rourke said that up to 100,000 work days of farmers time may be involved annually to comply with this form under the present system. The ICMSA's proposals which have received a positive response from the Department of Agriculture would streamline the procedure without in any way weakening the solid tractability system which is in place for cattle.

The proposed new system would involve the farmer requesting by phone or fax the movement permit from the DVO, by providing the herd number and the individual tag numbers of the animals for which the permit is being sought. The DVO would respond by posting the permit to the farmer, who would then submit it together with the identity cards at the point of slaughter or export.

Mr. O'Rourke said he was confident that the new system would be welcomed by farmers and should be n in place as soon as possible.

STRUCTURAL FUNDS **FOR SHIPPING**

ICMSA President, Frank Allen, congratulated the EU Live Exporters on their decision to invest in Gaelic Ferries in order to ensure the continuation of live exports on the Cork/Cherbourg route. The ICMSA President raised the issue as to why structural funds were never made available for shipping transport. We have rightly devoted massive structural funds to developing trans-European road net-

Mr. Allen said: "The Irish road to Europe is on-board ships which carry our goods to our market - the single market in Europe. As our economy expands we will export more goods

tle, but when we arrive at Rosslare or Cork, there is no structural funding available to guarantee that a super highway shipping road is available to get our goods and cattle to the market place in mainland Europe.
"A guarantee of reason-

I.F.A. **DEMANDS** IMMEDIATE ACTION TO RESOLVE **BLOOD** RESULT DELAYS

IFA Animal Health Chairman Liam F.Egan, has warned the Department that the continuing delays in the return of blood tests results from the State Laboratory in Cork are unacceptable and, in the absence of immediate improvement, private laboratories will have to take over some of the work load.

The Animal Health Chairman said: "The situation is totally out of control and is making the marketing of female cattle impossible for farmers."

Mr Egan said: "The implementation of the 30 day test regime and other measures to deal with Brucellosis was conditional on the Department ensuring that private blood test results would be returned in 5 days and round test results within 9 days. The Department agreed with IFA that if these turnaround deadlines were not met, then private laboratories would be used for blood testing.

Mr. Egan said: "The situation is now at crisis level. Results are taking more than 16 days to come back to farmers and it is impossible to sell female animals under these conditions. The Department must now take private labs on board for Brucellosis testing. Farmers are paying for this service and the State Lab is unable to provide a proper service."

ICMSA Welcome New REPS Package For NHA/SAC Areas

Mr. John O'Connor, Chairman of ICMSA Farm Services Committee commenting today on the new REPS package for NHA/SAC areas said that while the package is attractive he had a number of concerns which he hoped will be addressed.

Mr. O'Connor welcomed the increase from £77/acre to £80/acre for SAC areas, and also the extension of this payment to NHA areas which is in line with ICMSA policy. He also welcomed the decision to remove the 10 acre rule for commonage areas and also the facility to move NHA boundaries where problems arise.

However, Mr. O'Connor said that he bad a number of concerns including, that the agreement was signed in February 1997 but farmers have not received payments as yet. Mr. O'Connor said that retrospection of payments will have to apply. In addition, farmers with non-NHA land may lose out compared to the February 1997 agreement, these farmers will have to be accommodated.

Now that the agreement is in place, Mr. O'Connor said that he hoped commonage plans will be drawn up immediately to ensure that farmers in these areas can join REPS without delay If they so wish.

1998 EU Suckler Cow Premium Schemes and 1998 Cattle/Beef Cow Headage and **Equine Headage Schemes**

Application forms:

Application forms are now being posted to all registered herdowners who participated in the following Schemes in recent years:

- EU Suckler Cow Premium Scheme for non-milk suppliers.
- EU Suckler Cow Premium Scheme for Small Scale Milk Producers (with milk quotas of less than 25,638 gallons at 1 April 1998).
- EU Cattle Headage Scheme in More Severely Handicapped Areas and Beef Cow Scheme in Less Severty Handicapped Areas and in Coastal Areas with Specific Handicaps.
- EU Equine Headage Scheme in all Handicapped Areas.

Any intending applicant who has not received an appropriate application form by 8 May 1998 should request one immediately from the Local Office of the Department. Intending applicants should ensure that they have completed the application form appropriate to their needs.

Completed application forms should be returned so as to reach the Local Office of the Department on or before Friday 29 May 1998. There will be no extension to this

Payment in respect of applications under these Schemes which are received after 29 May 1998 but before 24 June 1998 will be reduced by a cumulative 1% for each working day the application is late. If any application is received on 24 June 1998 or later, no headage or premium will be paid.

Intending applicants for the Cattle Headage and Beef Cow Schemes and the Equine Headage Scheme are reminded that they must retain the number of animals applied on for a minimum of 2 calendar menths from the day following receipt of a valid application. The retention period for the EU Suckler Cow Premium Scheme is 6 months from the day following receipt of a valid application.

Change in eligibility criteria for Beef Cow Headage Applicants are advised that this year under the Cattle Headage/Beef Cow Headage Schemes the definition of a beef cow has changed. Now, to be eligible for the high

(£84/£75) rate of headage grant, the beef cow must have calved at least once, belong to a meat breed or be born of a cress with a meat breed and be part of a herd intended for rearing calves for meat production. This means that:

- the requirements regarding breed and calving are exactly the same for both the Suckler Cow Premium Schemes and Cattle Headage/Beef Cow Schemes in 1998
- in-calf heifers and Friesian cows are not eligible for the high rate of Cattle Headage/Beef Cow grant
- in-calf heifers and Friesian cows may, however, be acceptable for the low (£40/£33) rate of headage
- any animal declared as a Friesian or other non-beef breed in previous years should not be declared as a "Beef Cow" under these schemes in 1998.

All applicants should ensure that the application form is completed carefully and fully and in particular that the correct eartag numbers of the animals being applied on are clearly entered on the application form.

Q. Over the last couple of weeks, I've found it hard to hold my urine once I get the urge to go. Now the same thing is happening to me with my bowel movements. What is wrong with me?

A. There might not be any connection between these two understandably distressing symptoms. You say to have the urge to pass urine quickly,

this is called urge incontinence or irritable bladder. The other problem you are going through with your bowels sounds like irritable colon. This may cause pain, constipation, occasional diarrhoea and also the overwhelming desire to get to the toilet quickly before you have an 'accident'. You will have to go to your doctor to get these conditions checked out especially the problem with your bowel. Any unexpected changes in your bowel habits, particularly if it goes on for a few days should be reported to your doctor.

Q. I am 24 and have always had bed periods. I went on the pill and this helped for a while, but I had to come off it as it caused high blood pressure. Now I am reduced again to sweats, dizziness and terrible pain. Please help me.

A. I would love to be able to give you an easy answer. There are no sure-fire solutions other than having a baby which nearly always cures period pains. I imagine you have tried all the cures that the chemist has to offer - if not ask for a pain killer which contains codeine which will help to relax the womb mus-cle. Another thing you could try is evening primrose capsules which may help to reduce the sensitivity of the womb. A lot of women feel that vigorous exercises such as skipping can have a massaging effect on the womb. If you cannot get anything to give you relief, you should go back to your doctor who will refer you to a gynaecologist.

Q. My baby is now sixweeks-old. My problem is that I have stretch marks on my stomach. Why so some women get them while others don't? Will they fade and how can I avoid them if I get pregnant

A. The good news is that most stretch marks do fade from their original red/purple to a whiter colour, but the bad news is that there is no effective way to avoid getting more. Most women get them during pregnancy, but young people may get them during

puberty. Even the thinnest of young people get them, so it isn't just a question of the skin stretching or an increase in girth. Getting stretch marks while pregnant is most likely to do with hormone changes. A lot of people believe that skin helps where stretch marks appeared or are likely to appear helps.





Desert blooms for your garden



MANY cactus plants and other succulents grow naturally only in lesert or jungle conditions but they can also make striking dislays out of doors in cooler climates

Whether grown indoors or outside, specially prepared well-drained soil or compost is essential. A sunny site with adequate protection from frost is also required for most species. When buying cacti and other succulents, always choose healthy unblemished plants that show new growth or have flower buds forming, do not buy damaged or slightly shrivelled specimens or any with dull, dry or flaccid segments.

Also reject plants which have outgrown their pots. Cacti and other succulents require well-drained conditions and benefit from being planted in a bed raised a least 10 inches above ground level

To ensure good drainage make the bed slightly sloping and provide a thick base of gravel or crocks that is at least one-third of the total depth of the bed.

Never construct the bed on a concrete or other unpermeable base as this impedes drainage. Choose a bright sunny site with a minimum temperature of 5C

Cacti and succulents do not normally thrive in ordinary garden soil as it is not sufficiently well drained. However cacti can be planted in pots, bowls or hanging baskets where they usually survive well

Cacti display a unique variety of sizes and shapes and a wealth of colour and texture. Many bloom only briefly and bear large brightly coloured flowers while others flower for longer periods. In cool climates most cacti are grown in the greenhouse or as house plants but hardier species make beautiful garden dis-

With careful selection attractive arrangements of cacti and other succulents may be grown outdoors even in relatively cool the hardier species require good drainage. Among hardier varieties are Opuntia Humifusa, Sedum and Sempervivum along with some Crassula and Umbilicus species.







"Mud, Frost, Sun, Sweat, Agony and Ecstacy" — The Wonderful World of Juvenile Athletics

You are probably asking yourself "What"s with the title?" To fellow runners who have reached the "lofty" age of eighteen, the title needs no explanation. Above all the other sports that I have competed in, athletics arouse such a rollercoaster ride of physical and emotional feelings. From moments of glorious elation to the depths of bitter disappointment, my four years of juvenile competition has contained all of the above. In my own relatively successful athletics career, I have had the great honour of representing both Waterford and Munster. Though representing Munster may not mean much to the captain of the Irish rugby team, wearing the royal blue of my province was my proudest day in sport. I have had the honour of running (about 200 yards behind!) some of the finest juvenile athletes our country has unearthed for many years, some of whom will feature in future Olympic games. To have had the chance to train with them is something I will cherish.

For my own part, I am not and never will be an "elite" exponent of the art of running. What I am, though is an honest, hard-working runner who gives his all for this great sport. My major stumbling block in this sport has been my erratic training schedule, which has been the case throughout my running life. Bad idea. Everyone, in all walks of life, needs a guiding hand, someone who can advise and tutor. For a number of reasons I have never had this opportunity. However, with University just around the corner (I hope), my training schedule will alter considerably.

Why do I run, if in my heart and soul I know that I will never be a top performer? Firstly, I just love to run. While I run, all my daily trials and tribulations disperse from my thoughts. for thirty minutes or so each day, I am a person with no problems. Secondly, running is a welcome distraction from the Everest of education, the dreaded Leaving Cert! The old saying "mens sana in corpore sans" is essential in the hectic months which lie ahead. There is one other reason for my continuation in athletics. I hope that one day I might just have the opportunity to run in the green of my country. My main source of the hope that I have comes from the Shane Healy story, an athlete who only started running when he was nineteen, going on to compete at the Olympic games in Atlanta. Without hope what is there in life to live for, never mind athletics. I will never, ever, lose hope.

From the mud and mire of the fields of Cavan, to glorious days of sunshine on the Santry track, athletics have been great to me. I have made great friends, been lucky enough to win a few medals and had the privilege of watching some great athletes in action. Though I will never be a Treacy or a Coughlan, I will run and run and run. Keep on running, fellow eighteen year olds. Athletics is just too great a sport to give up.

COMPLAINT

County Bord na nOg wrote complaining about being pushed aside recently when they went to Ardmore to play a scheduled fixture. A senior football fixture was also scheduled and took precedence with the result that young players had to spend hours at the venue something which displeased their parents as well as the Juvenile Board.

The chairman apologised to Bord na nOg and said this should not have happened and the matter would be looked into in order to ensure that it would never happen again.

DONATIONS

There were applications for financial assistance from a number of societies and these were referred to Coisde Gnotha.

The Leukaemia Association applied to have a match played between Kilkenny and Waterford to raise funds and there was an appeal from the Handball Board, who had incurred quite an amount of expense because of their recent participation in finals, etc.

REPORTS

Games Development reported on their activities and explained that the planned school games which were to have been played in conjunction with the national hurling league matches, were cancelled. Extremely bad weather was the cause

FINANCE

Treasurer Tony Morrissey reported on the gate receipts for the recent hurling league matches. At the Waterford/Kilkenny match at Walsh Park the 'gate' was £19,782, ten per cent of which was retained by the Walsh Park committee for rent.

The chairman announced that a £25,000 grant had been received from Central Council for Walsh Park.

FLOODLIGHTING CONFERENCE

A floodlighting conference is to take place within the next week to examine a proposal to have a floodlit venue in every county.

This is being pursued by the new Munster Chairman, Sean Kelly, who is

anxious that venues will become available for night matches when daylight runs out. Waterford will be represented by the county chairman.

LOTTO

The new county lotto is progressing very satisfactorily and the chairman of the Development Committee, Declan O'Meara reported that the numbers for the second draw were well up on the previous draw. He said that an update on the financial aspect of the draw will be given at the May County Board meeting. In response to a question, he stated that a small number of clubs have not yet become involved, but the committee were hopeful that this will be put right soon.

The matter of a levy on clubs who do not participate was mentioned, but not pursued.

CENTRAL COUNCIL REPORT

A report on Congress was given and related Central Council matters which included Registration, transfer of under-age players, reinstatements report, etc.

A report on the decision to have a Property Insurance cover scheme set up within the Association, was given. This is a mandatory centralised national

blanket property insurance scheme for all Association property. It will cover fire, burglary, flood and storm limited damage, money/cash cover, etc. etc. There is to be a moratorium of six months after the scheme comes into operation on July 1st. This will be until mid-December. The premium for Munster will be subscribed to be the six counties in the province and they in turn will collect from the clubs in their own counties.

RULE 21

A report was given on the in-camera' meeting of Central Council who had recommended to Congress that a special Congress be held on Saturday, May 30th to debate the matter before, reaching a decision.

Rule 21 is the regulation which bans members of the British Armed forces and police from becoming members of the Associa-

tion. After the report was given some delegates submitted that the subject should be discussed in private by the Board, but a proposal by the Central Council representative that a decision should be deferred until the May meeting of the Board after delegates would have had a chance to discuss the matter with their committees. This was agreed.

EFFECTIVE CHILD MANAGEMENT

The recent seminar on the above subject which was organised and sponsored by Waterford Urban Development Committee in the city and held at the Bridge Hotel was referred to at Central Council when the organising committee were highly complimented on the outstanding success of the undertaking. Limerick Are Favourites But Waterford Have A Good Chance At Thurles

With the whole county on a 'high" following the spectacular display when, beating Kilkenny at Wash Park two weeks ago, it is expected that a huge crowd will travel to Semple Stadium, Thurles on Sunday next to see Waterford take on the current league champions, Limerick in a bid to win a place against Cork or Clare in the I998 National League Final.

This will be Waterford's fourth appearance in a league semi final since 1997

and our fifth attempt to get to a final since we took our only title back in I963 when we beat Tipperary in what has been described as the best league final since the leagues were introduced in I926.

Limerick on the other hand have won a total of eleven league titles - the last being last year when they defeated Galway.

In our previous league semi-final appearances we lost to Tipperary by 4-I9 to I-8 (1987), lost to Galway by 5-I6 to I-12 (1988) and lost to Clare by 2-I4 to 0-5 (1995).

Victories over Tipperary in Thurles, over Laois in Portlaoise, drawing with Wexford (Leinster champions) in Walsh Park before beating Kilkenny comprehensively two weeks ago must surely mean something. We did lose fairly badly to Cork in Dungarvan, but in view of our subsequent performances, the Cork defeat is now seen as a lapse from which we showed early and posative recovery.

With the management and the panel of players, there is no question of underestimiating the magnitude of the challenge facing us as we cannot ignore the justifiable claim to favouritism by Limerick whose recent championship record speaks for itself. Unluckily defeated by Offaly in 1994 and again by Wexford in I996 in the All Ireland finals having won both Munster finals impressively, they have the same panel of players (more or less) in training now and they had all the same players available at Semple Stadium, Thurles when they beat us by 2-20 to 1-17. Before that game in the Limerick dressing room, their then manager Tom Ryan described Waterford as a smoldering volcane waiting to explode. On the morning after the match, the media, having described it as a top class game of hurling, stated that defensive blunders probably cost Waterford the game against Limerick. That was our last meeting with Limerick and even though that was the championship and this is the league, the county at large will relish the prospect of seeing a return game, with most of the pressure on Limerick. It certainly holds out an exciting prospect for Water-

Going for their twelfth league title, Limerick are the only one of the 12 teams in the top Division to have full points and the task of breaking thelir long winning sequence falls to Waterford.

Resisting this challenge will be the panel of players who have won two Munster titles, a league title and reacing a couple of All Ireland deciders in the last four years.

Joe Quaid is one of the better goalkeepers on the intercounty circuit at the present and behind a defence consisting of players like Mike and Deelan Nash, David Clarke, Mark Foley and Stephen McDonnagh, it will be very difficult to get past the Feonagh star.

Mike Houlihan and Shane O'Neill could be their centre field pair, but there are reports that Ciaran Carey will return to play here. Mike Galligan, Barry Foley, the sharpshooting ace, Gary Kirby, T.J. Ryan, James Moran and co. will be included in their forward section and with such an experienced crew as this on board they will again be hopeful of sinking the Deise challenge.

It has been a long time since Waterford hurled as well as they did against Kilkenny and many hurling judges would certaintly rate that display on par with what Limerick may be able to prooduce here at SIemple Stadium.

Whether or not things will work out this way is another matter, but at the

moment there is a more positive air of confidence about our prospects, than there was when we went up to play Limerick in the championship last June.


